


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PREFACE.

To all patrons of this work, inquisitive to know the origin and antiquity of the name of Morse, the subscriber would respectfully observe that the results of a partial investigation favor belief in a Norman origin of very high antiquity. Complete certainty may yet be attained. Different modes of spelling names which have in this country been considered as identical, have prevailed in England for four hundred years, denoting distinct names. The want of uniformity in the orthography of our ancient records, and in the signatures of members of the same family, has embarrassed him in determining the original transatlantic mode of spelling some of the names heading the following catalogue. None but the race of Samuel are ascertained to have observed uniformity. As he stands recorded Morse in England, so he and his have ever since written their names. In the autograph of Joseph, the same spelling is preserved; but his son John, an excellent clerk, wrote his own name Morse, and the names of his nephews, uniformly Morss. Others of this family adopted a fourth mode of spelling.

Anthony and William, at the time of their embarkation, were registered Morss; and this manner of spelling was adopted by a part of their descendants, while another part uniformly signed their names Morse. The autographs of Anthony, sen., and of his brothers, William and Robert, still preserved, are spelt Morse. The former mode, however, was from the first generally observed in Town and Church records: and all the confusion may be attributed to clerks who led one another astray, and finally some of the race; and perhaps to draftsmen, who by misspelling the name in wills and deeds, created a necessity for its adoption to secure property.

John of New Haven, and the four first generations of his race, signed their names Moss; and a highly respected part of his descendants have retained this spelling to the present day; while others have exchanged Moss for the more common name of Morse.

It appears then that the families here traced, have derived their cognomen from two distinct names in Europe.

Moss is a very ancient name. Its claim to a high antiquity is justified by the great extent of its range and its early occurrence in History. If any of this name are referred to in Dooms Book, none but his official title is given, which is not improbable: for as early as 1177, at the conclusion of a treaty in the Foedera, between Henry II. and William of Sicily, a Dignitary is introduced, adding "Ego Justus Mazz, Episcopus," and giving his testimony and sanction. Now when it is considered that Henry inherited Normandy, and was only great grandson to the Conqueror; that the feudal system in his reign held the Saxons in vassalage; that the monarch would have been jealous of a foreigner, and that a more efficient instrument of papal policy and ambition might have been found among the king's own countrymen than among foreign-

ers, to sanction or negative his treaties, it is inferred that Bishop Mazz was a Norman. Difference of orthography is not conclusive against the identity of Mazz and Moss; for on our records, if not mistaken, I have found the former spelling substituted for the latter; and the name of Mazz seems not to have been perpetuated unless in the form of Moss. But as this personage was a Bishop, and lower or Sir names had not yet been introduced, the only inference to be drawn is one favorable to the Norman origin and great antiquity of the name.

Camden, who wrote his remains about 250 years ago, has classed "Mosse" with local names. But from what locality on the north side of the channel it was derived, he does not inform us; while he maintains that there was no ancient town, village or hamlet in Normandy which did not give name to some family in England.

If Moss * was a local name and originated in Normandy, it was not improbably derived from the Latin, *Mos*, (fashion) with another *s* added, after the northern custom, to express the plural and denote a place of fashions: or the Normans might have brought the name from Moss, a seaport of Norway, 60 miles S. of Christiana, as the Norwegians seem to have afterwards done to Moss, a seaport in the north of Ireland, and as the Saxons had previously brought the name of Angle from Denmark to *England*. Moss had doubtless been the natal place of many a Norman. Its situation was admirably secure and central as a rendezvous of the sea kings; and there they might have gathered before their descent upon France and final settlement in Normandy. Here, although they through commerce and intermarriages with their neighbours, soon exchanged their language for the French, yet they retained their Scandinavian words long after the Conquest, and very probably the name of Moss. The towns of Moston, Moss-Fen, and Mossdale in England seem to have taken the names of original proprietors: And who but Norman proprietors or their heirs were ancient enough to have given them their names?

But however derived, the name of Moss has a vast range. It occurs among the Jews, the Celtic Irish, and with circumstantial differences among the Saxon nations upon the Continent. In England it has long been a common and honored name. "Rt. Rev. Charles Moss, D. D., was Bishop of Bath and Wells in the last century, and had a son who was Bishop of Oxford, and a daughter who married the under secretary of state under Lord Grenville. Bartholomew Moss, M. D., was the founder of the lying-in Hospital at Dublin. John Moss, Esq., Banker of Otterspool, is father-in-law to Walker Ferrand, Esq., of Harden Grange who was lately M. P. for Tralee," and the name has not been rare among the clergy of the establishment.

The name of Morse also claims a high antiquity. It first occurs A. D. 1358, in the reign of Edward III. As a journey was about to be undertaken into France during a truce with that country and the captivity of her king, Edward addressed his order to "Hugo de Mors de conductu pro familiaribus cardinalis Petragoricensis et aliorum." From the nature of this commission and the prevalence of chivalry at the time, it is inferred that Hugo was a Knight. In Berry's Heraldry occurs the following coat of arms:—"Morse, ar. a battle-ax in pale, gu. (another ppr.) between three pellets—Crest two battleaxes in

Saltier ppr. banded with a chaplet of roses." This coat of arms, with the excellent motto, "In Deo non armis fido," I trust in God not in arms, Prof. Samuel F. B. Morse informs me, has been in the family in the south of England nearly 500 years; going back quite to the date of the order of Edward. "All names," says Camden, "with *de* formerly written before them were borrowed from places." But it has not been ascertained that any place in England ever bore this horrible name, the Latin word for death. Where then was Mors? and of what country was Hugo a native? Both words point us to France, where Hugo for ages has been a common and distinguished name, and where a dialect of the Latin had become the vernacular language of the people, and from which they would have borrowed names for their places.

Besides, where would Edward have sought a man of qualifications, for the trust reposed in Hugo, to conduct a Cardinal with his retinue of English Bishops and nobles in a country just overrun by the King's troops, and full of enmity towards his subjects? Not among Saxons lately manumitted: not among the descendants of Norman barons, who, by a foreign residence of three centuries, had lost their acquaintance with the language and manners of France; but among continental subjects, who were familiar with the inhabitants and the dangers of the country to be traversed, and over which Edward was asserting a disputed right to reign. If Hugo, then, was a Frenchman, who served the hated king of England, this hatred might have expatriated his family, as France recovered her independence: and if we admit that they settled in England, he might have been the progenitor of all in that country and America who legitimately spell their name Morse or Morss; for such have retained essentially the same coat of arms for about 370 years, the former adding *e*, and the latter *s*, probably to obscure the original and horrid sense of the word.* That Mors was the original and true spelling of the name, was not improbably the opinion of the faculty of Harvard College, for on the triennial Catalogue, the *e* final was omitted in the names of John and Joseph Morse, the first two alumni of the name, though it is certain that they always retained it. Thus was it also spelt by Judge Sewall; and both Webster and Worcester class Mors with Latin proper names. The importance of Hugo's commission, the existence of a coat of arms synchronizing with its date, indicate a rank to which pertained hereditary possessions. Yet in Burke's History of the Extinct Peerages and of the Peerage and Baronetage of England, the name of Mors is not to be found. His territorial possessions, then, were situated in some other country, and in what country so probably as in France, the birth place of the noble families of England, and where for 300 years she had retained allies and more or less dominion.

But if neither Peers nor Barons of this name have flourished in England, numbers of them have enjoyed landed estates and high official stations. John Morse, Esq., is mentioned in early times as Alderman of Herford, and as having married Elizabeth, daughter of — Herford, Esq., of Sufton, and whose mother was the daughter of William and Elizabeth Booth of Sallop and grand

daughter of Richard B. and Margaret Pershall of Horsely. Robert Morse of Shirston, as having married Frances, the daughter of Sir Philip Redingfield, grandson to Solicitor General R. in the reign of Elizabeth, and the granddaughter of Sir Henry Payton: also Mary Morse as daughter and coheir of Morgan M. and as having married Oliver Cromwell, great-grandson of the Protector, and inheritor of the estate at Theobalds, and as the mother of Olivia C. now Mrs. Russell, on whom lately devolved the representation of the Protectorate family in England; and other Morses of eminence in different parts of the kingdom whose communications may throw further light on the history of the name. Those inheriting it, though numerous, would seem to be less so in Europe than the Mosses. Its range is more restricted, being hitherto chiefly, if not exclusively, confined to families of English extraction.

After all, this is not the country in which to make the investigation; and we may perhaps despair of information more definite or certain, until a thorough search can be had in Europe. But whether it would not better comport with the dignity of Americans to add to the future honor of the name, rather than exume those won and buried in the dark ages upon another continent, is respectfully submitted.

In offering to the Morses and others the following collection, the author begs leave to state, that originally excited by no higher motive than a youthful curiosity to know the history of his own ancestry, he at length discovered reasons of a moral and scientific nature for extending his researches to embrace all races of the name in this country. Of the magnitude of the undertaking he had no conception. But descended from the Puritan Samuel on both sides,* reared in sight of the geographical centre of his race, aided by the reminiscences of grandparents, born in 1729 and 1730, and of others whose memories had received traditions from the lips of the 2nd generation born in New England, he about thirty years ago commenced the Memorial now given to the press. To bring it to the state in which it appears, he has inspected ancient family papers, consulted the records of churches, parishes, towns, counties, cities and colonies, wherever he could ascertain that any of the name settled prior to 1750; transcribing names and arranging them in the connexions indicated by the records themselves, the testimony of living witnesses, or the identity of Christian names as connected with ages. The utmost particularity and accuracy have been aimed at as essential to the success of the future genealogist, and to guard against the confusion to which the repetition of the same given names would lead; to enable the student to calculate the range of mortality in different generations living in the same climate, or in the same generation residing in different climates and on different geological formations; to estimate the probable expectancy of life at any age in any given family of uniformly good habits, and the maximum of longevity attainable by any member of such family; calculations of practical importance in the disposition of business and property and in assuming bonds of maintenance; and also to assist *all* in finding their kindred, that such as fear God and wish the highest good of the race, may not commit a sin in marriage, to be visited in *some* form or other upon the third and fourth generation.

But he will not prolong these prefatory remarks to point out the various uses of the Memorial. On the bare record of names is reliance mainly had to

insure by association, traditions of their histories ; that the listener may be encouraged to stand up for God and human rights, do his duty to himself, his family, neighbour and country ; and leave some happier trace of his existence here than a pile of riches ; that he may also be warned against vices, especially avarice, " the basest passion of the basest souls," which extinguishes every noble sentiment, every element of humanity, and makes its slave a scandal to his race : And above all other things, that he may in this way be warned against turning his back upon the stated and faithful preaching of the Gospel ; for here he may learn that the families who cling to religion are safe, but that when they let go, they fall temporally and eternally.

In collecting materials for this work the subscriber most gratefully acknowledges the generous agency of correspondents too numerous to be named. To Samuel A. Morse, Esq., of Cheshire, Conn. ; Abijah H. Moss, Esq., of Lockport, N. Y. ; Mr. Civilian Morse, of Bennington, Shiawassee Co., Mich., and Chauncy Morse, Esq., of Plainville, Conn., are the descendants of John¹ Moss chiefly indebted for the collection of his race. To the former gentleman is he under obligation for the materials relating to the history of this distinguished Puritan ; and to each of the gentlemen for encouraging lists of subscribers.

Dea. Jesse Morse, of Dublin, N. H., Doct. Charles Morse, of Providence, Joshua Coffin, Esq., of Newbury, Hon. Freeman H. Morse, Esq., of Bath, Me., Albert Augustus Morse, Esq., of Abbeville, S. C., and Mr. Chauncy Morse, of Canterbury, Conn., have rendered much assistance.

The work is not complete. Names are omitted, either because never recorded or not reported : and notwithstanding great care in copying, the author dares not pronounce it void of all errors. Who could be expected to record 20,000 births, marriages and deaths (and here is that number), without a mistake ; especially where family and monumental records are at variance with those of the town and church, and the chirography often enigmatical or nearly illegible ? Still he has confidence in its correctness prior to 1750 ; and believes the inaccuracies, if any exist, attach to the modern generations, which living witnesses are requested to note and communicate to him, that errata may be supplied on a leaf to be pasted into each copy of this edition at the end of one year after its publication.

The notes, hastily written as materials were found, with a view to being transcribed and improved, are sent to press in their original form, for want of time to improve them.

The Memorial, with all its imperfections, is now humbly submitted to the candor and indulgence of those for whose benefit it has been prepared. Should it meet the expectations of those who have regarded the undertaking with so much favor as to give their patronage to a stranger unknown in the world of letters, he will be secure in the conviction that he has wronged no man. Should it lead any to calculate the shortening of life and read other signs of physical degeneracy, then the causes may be sought out and shunned, and the race brought back to their primitive strength, stature and longevity. Should it draw some to communion with their strong minded, discerning and patriotic sires, it may perchance disclose and correct false estimates in themselves. Should it awaken others to see the superior happiness of their fathers in circumstances so inferior to their own, they may discover that it is a real misfortune to become rich. Should they inquire into the origin of such happiness,

they may perceive that it was not drawn from any of the objects in which they are hoping to find it; that to them such objects were as vain and unsatisfying as they have hitherto been to the living: and that they unitedly testified to the love of God and faith in his Son as the only source of happiness in this world and the only preparative for it in that into which they have entered. Should it provoke others to imitate their exalted virtues and noble deeds, tradition will follow their names also with encomiums, urging their posterity to "go and do likewise;" and thus may God be further glorified here by worth that has passed away.*

But should it find others inclined to care nothing for departed worth, may they ponder the declaration of Burke, that "he only deserves to be remembered by posterity who treasures up and preserves the history of his ancestors."

Should others indolently or scornfully reject proposals to fill up chasms of two or three generations, and thereby connect themselves with a godly ancestry, here placed within their reach; such negligence is a surer criterion than either bumps or pedigree, of traits and habits of which few would endure a suspicion. Besides, it is unkindness to their posterity; for it debars them from the moral and scientific uses of family history, and from the noble satisfaction of reading their legitimate descent from a *Puritan* stock.

Should others go further, and disdain all communion with these departed sires, depend upon it, that children who can see nothing but deformity in such parents are themselves deformed; and if they will exclude them because they had the faults of their age, and their enemies have accused them of no other, then let them apply their close communion to themselves, and direct that in the light of a superior age, posterity shall try them by improved standards; and ere their monuments crumble, their own children may stand up with the pious horror of their fathers, cast out their names as evil, and hold up their memories to obloquy.

Should others alas! forfeit the rich inheritance of a good name; vain to conceal will be the glare of wealth, the power of station, the office of friendship, and the pen of eulogy. Argus-eyed genealogy will find it out, and trumpet-tongued tradition swear that they shall be remembered only in their true character: and the higher their rank, the louder and longer will be her blasts.

Should any persist in evil courses, condemning the memory of sainted ancestors, despising perishable records to be seen only by the few, be it known to them that there is another record, as imperishable as the memory of God, to be read in the audience of the universe.





1. Samuel Morse¹ of Dedham, Mass., born in England, 1585; emigrated to New England, 1635; settled at Dedham, 1637, and died at Medfield, April 5, 1654; see p. 3, also Appendix, No. I.
2. Joseph Morse¹ of Ipswich, born in England about 1587; emigrated to New England, probably, 1635; settled in Ipswich prior to 1641, and died there 1646; see p. 74, and also App. No. LXXII.
3. Anthony Morse¹ of Newbury, born at Marlboro', Wiltshire, England, May 9, 1606; emigrated to this country and settled at Newbury, 1635, and died there Oct. 12, 1686; see p. 90, also Appendix, No. LXXIX.
4. William Morse¹ of Newbury, brother of Anthony, and born 1608, emigrated and settled with him at N. and died there Nov. 29, 1683; see p. 130, and Appendix, No. LXXXVII.
5. Robert Morse¹ of Elizabethtown, New Jersey, brother of Anthony and William, arrived at Boston prior to 1644, settled soon after in Newbury, and in 1667 removed to New Jersey; see p. 135, and Appendix, XCI.

7. John Moss¹ of New Haven, born in England about 1619, emigrated and settled at New Haven, 1639, and removed to Wallingford, Ct., 1670; see p. 144, and Appendix, XCVII.

KEY.

- Names occurring as parents stand the nearest to the left-hand margin. The husband's name is followed by his wife's, and her name by the date of her birth, marriage, and death, when ascertained, and these with the names of their last reported residences.
- The names of their children stand immediately below, and are numbered 1, 2, 3, &c., in the order of their births.
- The first figure to the left of the *father's* name is his number in the list of his father's children; and the second number to the left of that, and the first in the margin, refers to the page from which his name has been drawn, and on which he occurs as a child, with dates of birth, death, &c.
- The second figure to the left of a *child's* name refers to the page where he is reported as a parent.
- id.* standing in the place of the second number before a parent's name, refers to the same page above, where he occurs as a child. When *id.* stands before a child's name, it refers to the same page below, where he occurs as a parent.
- The minute figures immediately after names denote the number of their generation, each Puritan sire being No. 1. Thus, Samuel.¹

A little attention to this explanation will enable any reader to trace the generations here reported either in an ascending or descending order.

When a widow is married a 2d time, her original surname is included, when known, in brackets; thus, Martha [Haven] Wesson.

Numerical letters, next to the right margin, refer to notes in the appendix; and the figures on the left of such letters in the appendix, refer back to the page on which stands the name to which the note relates.

The practice of double dating between Jan. 1 and March 25, thus, 1675'—6, until the introduction of N. S. in 1752, is retained to prevent confusion and enable families to compare and correct their dates.

N. B. Prior to 1752, the civil year began in March, which was called the 1st month, April 2d month, often expressed thus, 25, (2.) i. e. 25 day 2d month.

To render O. S. into N. S. the 1st month must be accounted the 3d, and ten days be added to all dates between 1582 and 1700, and eleven days to dates between 1700 and 1752. For the single year 1600 eleven days should be added.

* Where o is not used it is not implied that they were not members. Nearly all of the first generations were members in full communion.



The appraisal of his estate in 1657 at only £385, suggests the probability of his having left in Eng. a much larger amount, to which traditions of claims in Eng. may refer.

Having learned to speak the languages of the French and Indians, he exerted much influence over them, and had the happiness of being advantageously known and extensively beloved. He is such an admirer of free institutions, and so valient for the rights and *true* interests of the people that he would make a good republican, and a reformer of our reformers ; and joyfully would the race with which he stands incorporated, welcome him and his lady from the arctic climate of the Bay of Chaleur, to the more sunny land of her fathers, where he might find a wider field and freer scope for his talents and philanthropy.
8. James Shannon,⁷ Barrister, studied in the office, and for 5 years resided in the family of the Hon. Amos Botsford, one of the most eminent men of his day in the Province of N. B., the first Speaker of her Legislature, of which he continued a member and master spirit until his death ; when he was succeeded in both offices by his son, Hon. Wm. B., A. M., Yale Col., lately one of the Supreme Judges of that Province. Hon. Amos was a gent. of various attainments. Previous to his removal, ab. 1783, from Ct. to Westmo. Co., N. B., he had been an officer in Yale Col. To such an instructor and patron as well as to his own genius and social relations, was Mr. Morse indebted for his early distinctions. Having commenced his professional career in his own native Province, he was soon placed in public stations. He was by popular suffrage 19 years a member of the Legislative Assembly of N. S., and by Executive patronage 6 years a member of her Legislative Council. In such estimation were his services held, that the tender of his resignation, May 26, 1843, was not accepted ; and when renewed in 1844, Lord Falkland, the Gov., at length returned the following complimentary note : —

" I have to acknowledge the receipt of your communication dated Jan. last, tendering your resignation of the office of Legislative Councillor, and signify its acceptance. I cannot but express to you my sincere regret at your not having it in your power to attend the session of the Legislative Council. SAMUEL MORSE belonged to that class of Puritans who strove to separate from the corruptions of the English church, yet continued in her communion until their embarkation for this country. His emigration evidently originated in the same circumstances, and was undoubtedly dictated by the same well known motives as that of the earlier emigrants to New England.

Wm. Laud, the enemy of the Puritans, being elevated to the Primacy of England in 1633, a Commission was illegally instituted soon after, consisting of a Committee of the Privy Council, called the Commissioners of Plantations, who, to embarrass the Puritans, prohibited the promiscuous passing of his Majesty's subjects to this country, requiring subsidy men to procure a license and other persons the attestation of two justices before they could embark. Accordingly our Puritan Sire, Samuel Morse, however he might have approbated a different course in his sons, who were of age, took care, when about to remove, to conform to existing laws, as appears from the following extract from a MS. at the Augmentation Office in Rolls Court, Westminster Hall, London, transcribed by Judge Savage.

"15 Apr. 1635 Theis parties hereafter expressed are to be transported to New England, imbarqued in the Increase, Robert Lea, Master, having taken the oath of allegiance and supremacy as being conformable to the orders and dicipline of the Church of England, whereof they brought testimony per certificate from the Justices and Ministers where there abodés have lately been. Samuel Morse, husbandman aged 50 Elizabeth Morse (wife) aged 48 Joseph Morse aged 20."

One hundred and twelve others are recorded as embarking in the Increase between the 12th and 18th of April. Whether the rest of his family embarked clandestinely after the clearance of the ship, as was then the common and only way by which the more distinguished Puritans could escape, or took passage in some other vessel, is not ascertained. On arriving in this country he first settled at Watertown, then the metropolis of the colony. Here he and his family became conformable to the orders and discipline and doctrines too of the Puritan Church, to enjoy which was doubtless their motive in emigrating; and in view of which they were enabled to put forth the mighty moral effort requisite

to the undertaking. Who in all the catalogue of his descendants has ever proved himself capable of the like, or laid the foundation of so much good? But for the virtues he possessed, the voice he heeded, the choice he made and the efforts he put forth, what might not have been the condition of his descendants, if indeed any had been perpetuated? To God be the praise. Yet to us it may be profitable to reflect upon the instruments of our happy condition and the obligations we owe our puritan ancestors.

About the time he arrived, the General Court sitting at New-towne granted a tract of land south of Charles River to 12 men, who took Samuel Morse and his sons into their company, and preparatory to settling upon it held their first recorded meeting on the 15th of Aug., 1636, as is supposed, at Watertown, and there adopted and signed the following covenant.

"1. We whose names are hereunto subscribed, do in the fear and reverence of our Almighty God, mutually and severally promise amongst ourselves and each to other, to profess and practice one faith according to that most Gospel rule the foundation whereof is everlasting love.

"2. That we shall by all means labour to keep off from us all such as be contrary minded, and receive only such unto us as be such as may be probably of one heart with us as that we either know or may well and truly be informed to walk in a peaceable conversation with all meekness of spirit for the edification of each other in the knowledge and spirit of the Lord Jesus, and the mutual encouragement unto all temporal comforts in all things seeking the good of each other out of all which may be derived true peace.

"3. That if at any time difference shall arise between parties of our said Town, that then such party or parties shall presently refer all such difference unto from one, two, or three other of our said society, to be fully accorded and determined without any further delay if it possibly may be.

"4. That every man that now or at any time hereafter shall have lots in our said Town, shall pay his share in all such rates of money and charges as shall be imposed upon him rateably in proportion to other men: as also become freely subject unto all such orders and constitutions as shall be necessarily had or made now or at any time hereafter from this day forward as well for loving and comfortable society in our said Town as also for the prosperous and thriving condition of our said fellowship; especially respecting the fear of God in which we desire to begin and continue whatsoever we shall by his loving favour take in hand.

"5. And for the better manifestation of our true resolution herein every man so received to subscribe hereunto his name, thereby obliging both himself and his successors after him forever as we have done.

among whom were Ezekiel Holliman, who founded the Baptist

Church at Providence and baptized Roger Williams, Edward Evered, the ancestor of the President of Harvard College, Col. John Dwight the progenitor of the late President of Yale College, and others whose descendants have been distinguished. This constitution has no date, but it must have been executed prior to Sept. 6, 1636, for the original grantees, with such as had become associated with them, state in a petition for a further act of incorporation subscribed at that time, that they were already under covenant. They named their Town "Contentment." But the "Great and General Court," in complying with their request on the 10th of Sept. 1636, named it Dedham. By this act they first became fully organized. Dedham then included, beside its present territory, Medfield, Walpole, Wrentham, Franklin, Bellingham, Needham, Dover, Natick, and the S. E. part of Sherborn. Every part of this territory was purchased of the Indians before it was assigned to settlers. King Phillip had executed two deeds conveying all his right to every part of it, long before he burnt Wrentham and Medfield. In the first enterprise in settling Dedham, Samuel Morse seems to have been the leader; for no sooner had they become incorporated than they, after expressing their gratitude to God for inclining the General Court to grant their petition, chose him collector of money to be given and to pay out according to such several occasions as should arise concerning their Town. This was the fullest expression of confidence in his honesty and capacity in their gift. This seems to have been done at Watertown, in Sept. 1636. Immediately after, a few of the Proprietors commenced operations at Dedham, but it was not until the March following that the settlers with their families passed up Charles river in boats, and held the first assembly in Dedham. Daniel and Joseph Morse attended the first meeting in Aug. 1636, and had lots assigned them. Their brother John was admitted and had land assigned him in 1637, and before the close of this year D. contained "30 Families who had lately come from different parts of England." A Law of the Colony required them to locate their dwellings within half a mile of the site appropriated for a meeting house. Accordingly each man had a home lot of 8 or 12 acres, as he was single or married, and a share in a large inclosure which was cultivated in common. Lots of meadow or wet Prairie were early assigned, for making hay, and their other lands were held in common and used as pasturage. Some had the right of pasturing more cattle than others, which was determined by various circumstances, as were the grants of land afterward made:

"Such as the number of members in a family; ability to improve the land; or exercise a useful trade; usefulness in the Church and Commonwealth; rank, &c. Tracts were set apart for the support of the Gospel and Education. Their first Meeting house, 36 feet long and 20 wide, and 12 feet high, was framed and inclosed and cov-

ered with thatch, in 1638-9; 'completely finished' 1646; lathed upon the studs, daubed and whitened over in a workmanlike manner, 1657."

Their School House, 14 by 18, two stories high, with a watch tower upon it, was of the same materials. Their houses were correspondingly rude and humble. Yet the proportion of educated men in that humble hamlet was ten times greater than in any of our present villages or Towns, and "most of the settlers were undoubtedly men of character and standing in their own country." In 1638 a church was organized upon strictly Congregational Principles, and the following covenant adopted Nov. 8, 1638:

"We, whose names are subscribed, having found by woful experience, the unsteadfastness of our hearts with God, and proneness to go astray from his ways, for which we desire to abase and humble ourselves in his presence, and desiring to be joined forever to the Lord, and to cleave together in spiritual love and communion, according to his holy institutions, that we might enjoy in his name such holy helps as the Lord Jesus in wisdom and compassion hath ordained in his gospel for his people, thereby to let out himself unto them, and to build them up in faith and holiness, till he hath prepared them for everlasting communion with himself:

"We do therefore, in the name and presence of God, and of our Lord Jesus Christ, and before his people here assembled, solemnly enter into covenant with the Lord our God, professing and acknowledging the Lord Jesus, our blessed Redeemer, to be the only priest, prophet, and king of his church, and (through the help of his grace) his only merit we rest upon for our pardon and peace with the Father; his only teaching and righteous government with all the blessed ordinances of his kingdom; we do embrace and submit unto in all things as the only rule of our lives, renouncing all our own righteousness, with all the doctrines, devices and commandments of men, not agreeing with his holy word; especially all the superstitious and tyrannous commands of Antichrist, and his adherents, wherein we have in any kind been entangled; professing and promising, through the help of his rich and free grace, henceforth not to live unto ourselves, but unto the Lord Jesus, who hath bought us with his blood, avoiding carefully all such things as be offensive to his majesty, and dishonourable to our profession of his name, with all such dangerous temptations as our sinful hearts are wont to be drawn aside withal, in special, the inordinate cares of, and entanglements in, the affairs of this life: Promising and professing also, through the help of the Lord, to live together in this our holy fellowship, according to the rule of love, in all holy watchfulness over each other, and faithful mutual helpfulness in the ways of God, for the spiritual and temporal comfort and good of one another in the Lord; and all to the setting forth of the praise of his rich grace in Christ, who hath called us in his abundant mercy to this holy fellowship with his Majesty and one with another."

The Rev. John Allin, who is believed to have been a member of the Westminster Assembly, was chosen to be their Pas-

tor. Samuel Morse and other members of the Church at Watertown had previously applied for letters, "that so the foundation of a Christian society might be laid in Dedham;" but they were denied, on the ground of an unwillingness "to dismiss any but into a settled Church." This objection being obviated, they "were received [30 (5) 1641:] Mr. Phillips their Pastor, and Mr. Carter and Mr. How, elders, testifying in their favour." John Morse was received in 1640, "giving good testimony unto the Church, of the gracious workings of the ordinances upon his heart to the obedience of faith." "Lydia, wife of Brother Daniel M. was received 29 (11) 1639, giving a clear testimony of the gracious work of God in his effectual calling." Hannah, "the wife of Joseph, was comfortably received 19 (9) 1639." Daniel was received from Watertown 30 (2) 1643. His sister Mary was admitted 7 (4) 1646.

"The first settlers of Dedham were a remarkable collection of people. Tradition brings down a high character attached to most of the names found on its early records; and their public and private acts fully confirm it. Orderly and industrious in their habits, they allowed no one to remain in their community who was not engaged in some regular occupation. Any violation of rules was followed by a penalty; yet the most exact strictness was accompanied by equally unfailing loving kindness. Liberal were they towards each other and their neighbours and public spirited. Thrifty were they, husbanding both public and private resources with great economy and industry. Above all, they pursued a liberal and enlightened policy in matters of religion. The Church severe within itself, would spend a whole winter in inquiring into the qualifications of applicants for admission; rejecting upon the slightest doubt, and trying gifts and graces by all the subtle tests made use of at that age; yet they molested no one who was not a member for his private opinions. In such a sound and sensible community we find, as might be expected, no persecutions, no witches, no supernatural occurrences." "The Church appears not to have been disturbed by discontented or factious spirits. Indeed the turbulent passions found no aliment here. The plantation went on regularly advancing in population and wealth. The fruits of religion were exhibited in the life, but without ostentation and uncharitableness."

In such a community did the Patriarch Samuel Morse see his exiled sons settled, living in all good fellowship with God's peccatorial people, rearing numerous families in the knowledge of that faith for the sake of which he had led them forth into the wilderness. In the civil transactions of Dedham he and his sons bore an honorable part. Besides serving as Treasurer he was townsman (selectman) 1640-42* and his elder sons were advanced to office. But they were too enterprising, and ambi-

tious to set up God's ordinances, to rest here. They therefore united with other citizens and proprietors of Dedham in petitioning for a new town; and the General Court in "1649 granted Dedham so much land meadow and upland on the western bounds of them beyond the River, (Medway), so as that they erect a village here within one year from the 22 of 8 mo. and this without annexing the usual condition of such grants, that they should within a specified time also erect a meeting house and settle a minister; knowing from the high religious character of the petitioners, these would be done within the shortest time possible." Accordingly Dedham 1 (11) 1649, O. S., but Jan. 12, 1650, N. S., chose a committee to lay out a road to "the Village" before the middle of April, and Medfield arose at once with her meeting house, church and minister. In this town home lots were assigned to Samuel Morse and his sons Daniel and Joseph, and son-in-law Deacon Samuel Bullen. Here he settled, it is believed, with his younger son Joseph, and erected the house which was first fired by the Indians, when they, led by King Phillip, laid that town in ashes, Feb. 21, 1675, O. S., killing 18 of the inhabitants. This house stood about three quarters of a mile E. S. E. of Medfield meeting house, 30 rods south of the road leading to Dedham, on an eminence overlooking on the E. a depressed area which comes to the road, and which must have been originally a dark swamp. The land is now owned by Eliakim Morse, of the 8th generation descended from him, and has never passed out of the name. To the praise of this branch of our Family, the trace of the site of this house no profane hand has been suffered to obliterate.

No ancient records of the Church in Medfield exists. Still we are authorized from their standing and the usages of those times to believe that the Patriarch and his family contributed largely to its numbers when it was gathered in the year 1650 or 1651. Here he lived to behold another pious and prosperous community spring up, the first born of Dedham and resembling the parent. And now advanced in years and summoned to set his house in order, we find him attended by that excellent man, Rev. Ralph Wheelock, "who had been an eminent non-conformist preacher in England," one of the witnesses of the following Will.

MEDFIELD, Anno Domini 10 mo. 2d, 1654.

"I, Samuel Morse, being sick and weak in body but of good and perfect memory, praised be God therefor, doe make this my last will and testament in a manner as folowith: First I bequeath my soul into the hand of a merciful God that gave it, with assured hope of everlasting life through the gracious merits of my dear Saviour and blessed Redeemer, Jesus Christ.

As for that little estate of outward things which the Lord hath been pleased to bestow upon me whether they be moveable or immoveable, as house, lands, chattle, households stuff, &c., I will and bequeath them all unto Elizabeth Morse, my dear and loveing wife

to enjoy, possess and make use of her life during the term thereof, and after her decease out of life, my will is that all that estate which she was in life possessor of shall be divided amongst my children, both sonnes and daughters, that is to say, John Morse, Daniel Morse, Mary Bullin and Ann* Morse, the widow of my dearly beloved sonne Joseph deceased, who with my said children shall have an equal portion upon a just division with them for the children's sake of my beloved Joseph. Therefore, my will is that the above named Ann, the wife of my dear Joseph shall make an equal distribution of all that portion upon division unto every child of my sonne Joseph, when they and every one of them shall grow up to the age of one and twenty years.

Lastly, I constitute and appoint Elizabeth, my beloved wife, the sole executrix of this my last will. In witness whereunto, I have put my hand the day and year above written.

His estate was appraised 27d of 11m. 1654, at £124 07. He seems to have disposed of most of his property a few months previous. John had the homestead that he had left in Dedham, and from the means at the command of Daniel soon after, it seems probable that he had for those days a common amount of property.

Granted unto sundry men by the
Proprietors of Dedham, 18 day 6 mo. 1636.

1. "Joseph Morse twelve acres more or lesse, (part of it being swampe as it lieth between Samuel Morse towards the North, and the rest of the said swampe towards the South, the one end abutting upon the said swampe towards the East, and the other end abutteth upon John Morse and Mr. Edward Allyn towards the West. The way leading from the Keye" (the landing on Charles River N. N. W. from the old Parish Church, or N. W. of the new stone Court House about 60 rods) "unto the pond" (Wigwam Pond) "running through that end of the lande."

2. Samuel Morse, 12 acres more or less as it lieth between Daniel Morse towards the North and Joseph Morse towards the South, and abutting upon the little River towards the East, and the way leading from the Keye to the Pond towards the West.

3. Daniel Morse 12 acres more or less as it lyeth between Philomon Dalton towards the North, and Samuel Morse towards the South, and abutteth upon the little meddowes towards the East, and the way leading from the Keye to the Pond towards the West.

John Morse hath granted unto him and his assignes forever from Samuel Morse, being part of his gratification lott for an house seate, twoe acres more or lesse, as it lyeth betweene Richard Evered towards the North, and the swampe towards the South, and abutts upon Joseph Morse towards the East and the swampe

* The orthography in ancient Records is not uniform. Her name was usually written Hannah and Hanna, and if pronounced without the aspirate, the mistake might easily have occurred.

towards the West. John had also granted to him by his Father Samuel, 12 acres more.

The Father and two sons owened all the land from High Street to the Pond, except Rev. Mr. Daltons lot of 12 acres which seperated them from it. John Morse hath more granted unto him and his assignes forever from Samuel Morse, being the residue of his gratification lott, 12 acres more or less, as it lyeth between Robert Hinsdell towards the North, and Richard Evered for the most part towards the South, and abutts upon the *Waest* towards the East and the swampe towards the West; the way 4 rods broad, running through the West end thereof."

By the aid of this record his lot can be re-surveyed, and the trace of his house and well identified; affording a retired and commanding prospect for a monument to his memory. Will it not benefit us and our posterity thus to honor him? or shall we wait for a nobler generation; one endowed with more reverence and gratitude.

Page 3, No. II.

John sold his place in Dedham 27 (9) 1654, soon after the death of his parents, removed to Boston, and became established as a Merchant Tailor; and the next year visited England, probably to receive an inheritance for himself and brothers, as a change for the better in their circumstances immediately followed. He made his Will in 1655, giving his widow, Annas, £40, and the rest of his property inventoried after his death in 1657 at £385.-09.05d, to be equally divided to his children (viz. the 8 youngest) "each to have a like proportion and not one to have more than another." In 1670 his Widow, who had now returned to Dedham, sells her house in Boston for £51. Her will, proved 1693, gave her property to be equally divided to her surviving children, Ruth, Ezra, Abigail, Ephraim and Bethiah.

Page 3, No. III.

Daniel Morse² removed from Dedham to Meadfield 1651, and settled soon after in Bogestow, the aboriginal name of the valley of Charles River, between S. Natick and Medway Village. He purchased, about 1656, a tract of 800 acres of choice land, which had been granted by the General Court to Simon Bradstreet, May 22, 1650, (afterwards Governor) and since called "the Farm," situated in the Eastern part of what is now Sherborn. He was guilty of no contempt of the law enacted 1635, that "no dwelling house shall be built above a half mile from the meeting-house in any new plantation, without leave from the General Court, except mills and farm houses of such as have their dwelling in the Town," when he located half a mile N. W. of the Farm Bridge, on the site now owned and occupied by Leonard Morse, one of his descendants, and 4 miles from the

village of Medfield; for that law had become obsolete. He commenced improvements here about 1657, and subsequently removed his family, probably in '57, the last year of his service as a selectman in Medfield.* Here his thoughts were early turned to the erection of a new town and Church, as appears from the following Petition.

"The humble Petition of several of the inhabitants of Bogistow, to be presented to the much honored General Court, 7 of 3mo. 1662."

"Whereas, the Providence of the most wise God who hath appointed the bounds of all mens habitations, having in mercy we hope disposed of us and our families in that place commonly called Bogestow, upon lands which we purchased of several gentlemen in this country, and having for some years although with great difficulty attended upon the means of grace at Medfield; first, in respect of the distance; and secondly, by reason of the great danger that many times we goe in, in going over Charles River, which is caused by great floods and much ice, although as yet no great hurt done, for which we have great cause to bless God; yet considering that it may be more for the honor of God and the future good and benefit of ourselves and posterity, that we should endeavour the setting up of the worship and ordinances of God among ourselves; especially, being increased to some number of inhabitants already, and more are daily expected. These and such like considerations doe imbolden us whose names are here underwritten, humbly to petition this much Honoured Court liberty to be a Towne of ourselves with such others as may be admitted to our Society hereafter. And further, we your humble Petitioners are bold to request this Honoured Court to grant unto us and our associates for those ends formerly exprest such a tract of land as may be in some measure comfortable for our future subsistance, as a small village in this Commonweal; namely, so much land as containes five miles square, where it may be found adjoining to our own lands already purchased, or upon Natic line, or upon Medfield bounds as this Honoured Court shall see meet. And wee who acknowledge ourselves subjects of this Commonwealth shall pray as our duty is that God would bless and prosper you in all your weighty occasions.

In answer to this Petition, the General Court appointed "Ephraim Littlefield and Edward Jackson, a Committee to view the place and return their apprehensions." The result seems to have been unfavorable. Still they persevered. In 1674, their petition was renewed; and though 12 years had intervened, it had only two more signatures than the first, among which appear the names of his three eldest sons and nephew, Joseph Morse, Henery Adams and Jonathan Wood, not subscribed to the first petition. In their second application, the same most noble reasons that ever dictated a petition to a Legislative body, are boldly and prominently avowed. They say, after referring to their civil and religious embarrassments, "Wherefore for our relief and that wee may not wholly omit our duty to spread the Gospel in this wilderness by the procuring of the ministry of the word amongst ourselves, not only for our edification and consolation, but also that God and the word of his grace may be to our posterity a standing refuge, wherefore for our encouragement in *this work* and the better regulating affairs amongst us," we humbly petition, &c. In this petition, the original of which is still preserved, they modestly leave blank the place for the name of their new town, yet we cannot doubt but some of them at least had a choice, and that the General Court consulted and respected it. Daniel Morse was among the very first who planted on the West side of Charles River, and evidently the leader of this enterprise. He left England in the ardor of his youth; had now attained an age when early associations are wont to revive; was one of the few solitary Puritans who remained; was by far the greatest land-owner and contributor in the settlement; precedence was given to his name in petitions and the records of public meetings; and he with his sons and nephew were one third of the subscribers to this Petition; so, that his choice of a name would most likely have prevailed; and that choice naturally have been the name of his native place in Europe. He had the means of securing the name he preferred without having it inserted, as was often done in similar cases. One of his sisters was the wife of "the most worshipful Capt. Daniel Fisher" of Dedham, for a long time Speaker of the House, whom he calls "his brother;" and it is no longer doubted that another sister was the wife of Hon. John Hull, Treasurer of Massachusetts. John Morse, merchant, then one of the most active citizens of Boston, was his nephew; he knew Gov. Bradstreet and must have had other

S. E. by (Dea.) Samuel Bullin, his brother-in-law, and S. W. by the brook. This lot enlarged to 22 acres with improvements, he sold for £20, June 7, 1666, to John Hull, Esq., of Boston, master of the mint for many years, and afterwards father-in-law of Chief Justice Sewall, and one of the assistants, who was induced to purchase and improve a farm in Sherborn for a country seat. Four circumstances favor the belief that he was connected with the Morses. He had been a Silversmith and Merchant, was "Treasurer of war," 1675-'76, and afterwards Treasurer of Massachusetts. He was a man of daring courage, and one of the richest in the Colonies.

friends in a condition to influence the Court to adopt the name of his choice. In the act of incorporation, the Court named the town after the venerable and classical Sherborn in Dorsetshire, in S. W. of England. They were wont to select the name of the place from which a distinguished settler came, for the new town in which he was a settler or proprietor, and sometimes did so contrary to the expressed agreement and wish of the petitioners. It is ascertained that many of the early towns derived their names in this manner. Now considering the possessions, age, character and connexions of Daniel Morse, it seems almost certain that the Court took the name of his choice for the Town of which he in several respects was the honored Father. These circumstances lead to the belief that Daniel Morse, with his Father and Brothers, were originally from the vicinity of Sherborn, Eng., and traditions among the descendants of his brother John corroborate it." *

Twenty or more years of perseverance in seclusion and toils had now begun to be rewarded. But the prospect was soon clouded. Scarcely could he have known the fate of their second petition before they were alarmed by the report of the massacre at Swansea by the Indians. They did not, however, flee for greater safety, and abandon their infant town to certain devastation, but prepared to defend it, as appears from the following petition signed four weeks before the burning of Medfield, and addressed, as is supposed, to Maj. Gen. John Leverett, then Governor.

" May it please your Worship,

Prostrating my humble service to your Worship, I made bold lately to request your help of 4 men to be the garrison at my house which is for my family and my sons with me, most being married men; I humbly prosecute my request that so it might be that I might have 4 men out of Medfield, and that Edward West and Benjamin Fisk (sons-in-law) might be two of them, they living in the remote part of Medfield next my farme and they being willing to come if liberty by authority were given that they might be imprest by authority to be ready when I shall call for them. Thus I make bold, humbly begging the everlasting blessing and constant presence of the Almighty to be with your Worship.


* Rev. Joseph Morse of Stoughton, who was brought up in the immediate neighborhood of his grand uncle Daniel, must have daily heard him converse, and was in his 18th year, when D. died, left it on record in his family, that their sire came from Devonshire, as his grandson Joseph, late of Stoughton, informed me. Sherborn is near the border of Devonshire,


After the incorporation of Sherborn, Daniel Morse appears the most prominent in "ordering its affairs." He was chosen first Selectman and his eldest son Town Clerk. He was appointed a commissioner with this son, Henry Lealand, and Thos. Eames, to negotiate with the Natick Indians an exchange of 4000 acres now in Ashland and Hopkinton, for the same quantity in what now constitutes the N. W. and central parts of Sherborn. This they accomplished by stipulating to "pay 200 bushels of corn to boot;" "one-half in hand: and at a subsequent Town Meeting for equalizing the cost of the exchange, Daniel and his sons assumed to pay three fourths of the amount.

In 1679, Daniel, with his nephew Joseph Morse and one other, were chosen to "treat with a minister for settlement." In this they were unsuccessful; and the condition of their becoming a town not having been complied with, Daniel with his sons, Benoni Larned and others, petitioned the General Court in 1680, imploring "aid that they may be relieved of their difficulties, professing a desire to "settle a pious and able minister, without which their hopeful plantation would be ruined, and they and their wives and children be forced either to live like heathen without God's Sabbaths and ordinances, or remove." Oct. 12, Daniel Morse, senior, and others with the Selectmen, were chosen to the very delicate office of "seating the meeting as soon as the seats in their meeting house then building should be made;" and the next year he was elected the first of a Committee to divide the common lands of Sherborn. He was now suffered to see his town and family advanced in numbers and means, but his pious solicitude for the establishment of the institutions and ordinances of the Gospel was not relieved until five years after; as appears from the following notice in the diary of Judge Sewall, who had married probably his niece, the daughter of Hon. John Hull of Boston.

"Thursday Mar. 1685, went to the gathering of the Church in Sherborne, and ordaining of Mr. Daniel Gookin their Pastor. But six brethren and three of the name of Mors. Messrs. Mr. Willson, Mr. Adams, Mr. Nath'l Gookin of Cambridge, managed the work. Mr. Nath'l Gookin, the younger, introduced the Elder, a *happy type of the calling of the Jews*. Mr. Torry, Brinsmade, Fisk, Esterbrook, Man, Moody, Hubbard, Nehemiah Sherman, Woodruff, Rawson Grindal, Willson, jr. there, and Fellows of the College. Only Maj. Generall and self of the magistrates. No relations were made but I hope God was with them."

With what joy and gratitude must this venerable Puritan have witnessed the solemn transactions of that day! After toiling and suffering for 35 years in the wilderness; having, like a missionary, the establishment of the Gospel mainly in view, he is permitted just before he departs in peace, to behold such an organization effected as he could believe would prove "a standing refuge to his numerous posterity." In reviewing the scene,

The original bounds of Natick extended south by Charles river, from where the line of Dedham crossed the river "as far as the house of Nicholas Wood, and from thence," (his house, not the river,) "upon a westerly line 4 miles; and westerly the bounds thereof to extend as far as Cochituate Brook at the common passing place or highway that leadeth from Sudbury to John Stone's house, then by John Stone's land and Sudbury river, extending up this river 4 miles, to be measured by a straight line from the said wading place on Cochituate brook; and from the said termination (of this line) of 4 miles, to be counted (bounded) by a straight line extending to the aforesaid termination of the line of 4 miles that leadeth (west) from the aforesaid house of Nicholas Wood. All the land lying within the said compass adjoining to the bounds of Sudbury, Dedham, and Watertown, not formerly granted to any town or particular person to be for the use and behoof of the plantation of Natick. Granted 1653.

The part of Natick lying East and South of Charles river was subsequently taken from Dedham; also 2,500 acres of Needham, on the north side of the river.

The author has been thus particular from an apprehension that he might save history on the eve of being lost, and aid in the investigation of the history and titles of many places once owned by Morses, whose instruments of conveyance, if ever executed, have failed to be recorded.

one can hardly refrain from the wish that the veil had been lifted, and he favored with a vision of the blessings already realized.

In 1687 he made his Will, giving his homestead to his youngest child Samuel, providing for his Widow, confirming to Obediah (Deacon) lands previously conveyed in two deeds of gift; to Daniel, his house lot and lands given in two deeds; to Jonathan his house lot and lands "expressed in three deeds," and to Nathaniel (Dea.) he made similar confirmation. To his daughter Bathiah Perry he gave £39 in movables, a house lot and land pre-conveyed; to Mary West land in Dedham, and land near the meeting house valued at £34 10d; to Bathsheba Fiske £19 10d to make her portion equal to her sisters; to Lydia Wight a part of the lot he "purchased of his Brother *Daniel Fisher* of Dedham," supposed to be in Dov. or S.* Having set his house in order, he the following year died, Æ. 75; and is believed to have been interred in the "neglected Burying Ground" in the south part of Sherborn. For the benefit of the present and future generations and the honor of his race, a hope is indulged that amongst his numerous and affluent descendants, the means and spirit will no longer be wanting to insure him a monument worthy of the Patriarch of Sherborn.

Page 3, No. IV.

Joseph Morse is recorded as having with his brother Daniel taken the Freeman's oath May 6, 1635, though he did not leave England earlier than on the 18th of April, and was then aged 20. There must be an error in the Records, or the voyage was made in 19 days, during which he attained his majority and was admitted to his oath without a year's probation, contrary to law and common usage. He first settled in Watertown and early united with the Church. He attended the first recorded meeting of the proprietors of Dedham, Aug. 15, 1636, and was with Daniel among the first to whom land was there allotted, of which "they did not take immediate possession, which occasioned some complaint." He removed to Dedham in 1637. In "1649 Dedham was granted so much land, Meadow and Upland on the Western bounds of them beyond the river so as that they erect a village there within one year from the 22 of 8 mo." Joseph Morse was one of the proprietors of this grant who complied with the condition, and called their Town Meadfield, from the "broad meadows" which it embraces. Such was the character of the petitioners, that the General Court, in incorporating Medfield, dispensed with the other customary conditions, such as the building of a meeting-house, the settlement of a minister, and the reservation of lands for public uses; knowing

* A farm lot had been given Capt. Daniel F. by the proprietors of Sherborn for being "helpful in undertaking the settlement of the Plantation."

that they would certainly and promptly attend to these things from regard to higher authority: and it is certain that the Court was not disappointed. Joseph settled here with his father. How long he remained is uncertain. Prior to his death, in 1654, he seems to have removed to Dorchester, where his wife's connections had previously settled; as appears from the following record: "1654, 4 mo. Inventory of the estate of Joseph Morse of Dorchester which he had at Medfield apprized at £183 by Tho. Wight, George Barbour, and Robt. Heusdall." In 1652 his estate had there been rated at £260 and yet it was the 4th in amount rated that year. No trace of his grave has yet been discovered. Four years after, his widow married Tho. Boyden at Boston, and returned to Medfield. Boyden became guardian of her children, whom tradition says he defrauded. The sons settled in Medfield; and Samuel, the elder, inheriting a double portion of his father's land and the bequest of his grandfather, settled on the homestead, the place which they had jointly improved, half a mile S. E. of Medfield meeting house. Two of his gr. gr. grand daughters, Mrs. Abigail and Mrs. Mary Morse, aged 86 and 83, are still living upon the same place, and merit our gratitude for the preservation of the history of their family.

Page 3, No. V.

"In the great crisis in the liberties of the colony, when Randolph was engaged in those hostile measures which resulted in the subversion of the charter and the oppressive administration of Gov. Andros, who declared the title to lands void and exacted heavy sums for the re-purchase of them, many were discouraged and disposed to submit to the encroachments of the British Government, while others were for adhering to the charter according to their construction of it, and leave the event. Here was the origin of the two parties, Patriots and Prerogative men, or Whigs and Tories, between whom, says Minot, controversy seldom intermitted, and was never ended until the separation of the two countries. Daniel Fisher, the ancestor of Fisher Ames, was the representative from Dedham, the speaker of the house, and the leader of the Patriots among the Deputies. He was one of the four whose impeachment, says Randolph to the Earl of Clarendon, 'will make the whole faction tremble.'"

"Grievously oppressed by the administration of Andros and hearing indirectly of the landing of the Prince of Orange in England and the consequent revolution in the government there, the people of Massachusetts, without waiting for a confirmation, determined to take its truth for granted, and simultaneously set about accomplishing a revolution of their own. On the morning of April 18, 1689, Boston was in arms. The governor and Council were seized and confined, and the old magistrates reinstated. The country people came into town in such rage and heat as made all tremble to think what would

follow. Nothing would satisfy them but that the Governor must be bound in chains or cords and put in a more secure place ; and for their quiet he was guarded by them to the fort. Whose hand was on the collar of that prisoner leading him through the excited crowd, at once securing him from escape and guarding him from outrage ? It was the hand of Daniel Fisher of Dedham ; aye, 'a second Daniel come to JUDGMENT,' a son of the farmer, and heir of his energetic ardor in the cause of freedom, the son of Abigail Morse, and a just representative of traits *characteristic* of her father's race for at least five generations."

Page 3, No. VI.

John continued the business of his Father, and also became a shopkeeper* and traded in real estate, had deeds of land on "School House street;" of Warehouse and Wharf, and sold four acres South of the Common, in 1661, for £30. Boston in 1673 contained 1500 families. His name first occurs Sept. 7, 1657, as clerk of "the Artillery Company," now "the Ancient and Honorable," subscribed to a form of constitution which they adopted, and asked the General Court to confirm. He was then only 18. June 25, 1675, one day before the news reached Boston of the massacre at Swansea by King Phillip, Lieut. Theophilus Frary and John Morse were appointed by the Council "Commissaries for provisions in the present expedition." June 28, they received two orders "with the consent of the council," one directing them to take provisions to the commissioners of the army; another Sept. 24, to relieve Thomas Welden, and another Sept. 13, 1676, to fetch to Boston the country stores at Marlboro', and April 28, 1676, John Morse and his two men, William Learned and Samuel Allen, with Richard, Nath'l and John Sanger, were "exempted from other service to help Caleb Church guard the mill at Watertown."

In 1678 he made his will, giving his eldest daughter, Elizabeth, to Mrs. Nathaniel Williams, and one-sixth of his estate "to improve for her," and the remainder to his wife to use for the equal benefit of the rest of his children. His estate was appraised at £610. Oct. 18, 1679, his widow Elizabeth petitions the General Court for compensation for his services, alleging that "he did serve his country as Commissary for above two years." He was one of the original proprietors of Mendon, where lands were assigned him in 1667 and 8. "John Morse of Mendham, died at Roxbury 25 (8) 1679," leaving a widow Elizabeth and land on the East side of the River," probably in Medfield, and an inheritance from his Grandfather Samuel. When a famous Synod at Boston decided that parents not in full communion with the Church, might, on a mere profession of their faith, bring their children to baptism, he joined the remonstrants, and with his wife and others left the First Church, and united to form the Third Church, now the Old South.

* In 1675 and '76 he was of the firm Morse & Williams, probably brothers-in-law.

Ezra M.,³ having at the age of 14 lost his energetic father at Boston, was probably committed to the care of some friend at Dedham, where he reappears at the age of 21, and unites with two others in purchasing for £250 the only mill in D. supplied with water from Charles R. through a canal leading "thro' Purchase Meadow to E. Brook. The next year ('63,) he sold out his interest in the mill to Nath'l Whiting. In 1664 a new corn mill being wanted, the town gave him and D'l Pond leave to build one on the same artificial stream above Whiting's. Against this Whiting remonstrated, and in '67 brought a suit against M., which did not result in his favor. Whiting next commenced a new water course, of which complaint was made, and both parties being summoned before the selectmen and advised with, agreed not to interfere with each other's rights. Complaints however continuing to be made, and the removal of Morse's dam being judged advisable, he, at his own suggestion, received from Ded. a grant of 40 acres near Neponset river at the old saw mill or at Everett's Plain, where he might find it most to his satisfaction. In 1678 he had leave granted him to cut timber to build a saw mill on Hawes' brook in the way leading to the S. meadow; and in '81 to make a reservoir for the same on common lands."

"It is worthy of remark, that the descendants of Nathl. Whiting and of Ezra Morse have held the principal mill seats of D. quite down to the present generation. The numerous branches of both of these respectable families, have always been among our most substantial citizens." HAVEN.

Page 3, No. VIII.

That Ephraim M.³ settled at Newton, Long Island, is inferred from the early occurrence there of the names peculiar to his family: from the introduction of his nephew John at the age of 16 years to preach at N.; from his being alive at the date of his mother's will, in 1693; and from the non-appearance of his name on any town or church record in Massachusetts, after Phillip's war, in which he served. The silence of the records, to which his family were so attentive, leads to the belief that he had no children of his own; and that after the death of his brother, Commissary John, and the marriage of his widow to a second husband, he adopted their orphan, John, carried him to Newton, where he married young, and became the progenitor of the Long Island Morses. The names of Ephraim, John, and Abigail, and the time of their births as near as can be gathered, are in perfect harmony with this supposition; and its correctness may be further inferred if the original race on Long Island were uncommonly precocious and combative.

Page 3, No. IX.

Rev. Joseph Morse graduated in 1695, and was the same year chosen schoolmaster in Dedham, where it is presumed he studied divinity under Rev. Joseph Belcher. He preached 1701—7 in Watertown Precinct, (now Western) without gathering a church. About 1707 he removed to Dorchester "New Village," afterwards Stoughton, but now Canton, where he preached ten years and nine months before a church of twenty members was gathered, Oct. 30, 1717, to elect him Pastor, an act indispensable in those times, to ordination. "In a few weeks after his ordination, two persons discovered a disposition not to obey those who had the rule over them, and who were accordingly laid under suspension by the Church; but the affair was soon after accommodated. In 1723 several charges were exhibited before the Church against their pastor, one of which was for preaching false doctrine; but the church voting that they were not uneasy or dissatisfied with Mr. M., these difficulties appeared to have subsided. In 1725 Elhanan Lyon exhibited a charge against Mr. M. respecting something said by him before a Committee of the General Court. The Church at first voted that it did not properly belong to ecclesiastical cognizance; but difficulties increasing, an ecclesiastical council was called, the second result of which was communicated to the Church Nov. 11, which was not accepted. April 1726, the Church called another Council, to convene on the 13th of May, who published their result the next day. June 14th it was proposed to the Church to concur with the advice of the Rev'd Council in their result—which was not accepted. Finally a Council of nine Churches, was held at Dedham, July 17, 1727. It appears that they then censured both parties, and required them to acknowledge their faults to each other; and declared that if the Church of Stoughton do not fall in with this advice, that refers to the confessing their faults, and so remove the scandal they are lying under, they are to be looked upon as scandalous and disorderly, and are to be dealt with as such by neighbor Churches." This the Church interpreted as referring *to many of the Church* who had proceeded against Mr. Morse much otherwise than the Gospel directs. The Church as a body never acted against him. It is probable that this council advised the dismissal of Mr. Morse. Mutual acknowledgments took place; Mr. M. continued his relations as a Brother after his pastoral connection ceased, and died in communion with the Church, and was interred in what is now Canton. Mr. M.'s records evince him to have been a correct scholar, and they are interspersed with many pious reflections.—E. DUNBAR'S SERMON. During the ten years of his ministry 31 persons were added to the Church, and 167 baptized.

His estate was inventoried at £1,763 5s. and 6d. His library at £35, and his plate at £37 10s., a consequence, probably, of his having been persecuted out of the pulpit.

Rev. John Morse,⁴ of Newton, N. Y., had the precocity of a Pascal. I have not mistaken the record that makes him to have been born 31 (1) 1679, O. S., or Apl. 10, 1679, N. S., and that an error should have crept into the College catalogue, which makes him to have graduated in 1692, is wholly improbable. If then the Commencements were as now held in August, he could have been no more than 13 years and 4 months old at his graduation; less than 16 when he began to preach at Newton, and not more than 18 at his ordination. Was such precocity original or hereditary? and if the latter, from what stock was it derived? That it was hereditary, may be presumed from his uncle, John, after passing his youth in the country, having, on moving into Boston, received marks of public respect and confidence altogether above his years, and being enabled at 18, on the death of his father, to take charge of his business and enlarge and prosecute it successfully.

Circumstantial evidence exists of a connexion between the family of John Morse and Richard Evered, of Ded., the ancestor of Pres. Everett, and others as renowned for precocity as for learning and eloquence.* Hence the suspicion that John M., the grandfather, married the sister of Richard E. or of his wife. None of the descendants, however, of either of the brothers of John, *senr.*, have been remarkable for early maturity.

Rev. John, at the age of 18 "Clerk at Newtowne, Long Island," buried his father, Ezra, of Dedham, and being "resident in Boston" on a visit, was appointed guardian of his brother Seth, aged 10. In 1700 Rev. John at Newton made his will, giving all his property to his brother Seth, of Dedham," and immediately after the Court at Boston appointed Seth another guardian. Rev. John d. unm. a. ab. 21.

In 1699 was "granted to Saml. Morse and his assigns, &c., 1,400 acres of land as it lieth in that division agreed upon and laid out on the N. side of 'Sherborn' road leading to the falls, the propriety thereof being purchased of several of the proprietors of this town of Dedham as appears by deed under their hands to said Samuel M. abutting upon Mathew Rice in part and John Collier in part toward the N.; upon Natick towards the W.; and S. upon the school farm in part; a pond and a brook running out of the same, in part towards the E." This tract was subsequently included in Needham Leg, extending almost to Saxonville; which, by a recent exchange of territory, has become annexed to Natick. Tradition says, that Indians in Deerfield, wishing to join the Naticks, bargained their lands there for an equal number of acres in Dedham, adjoining Natick, and that the tract assigned in exchange, being afterwards found to overrun, the amount of the Leg was detached and sold to Samuel Morse, and his title recorded as above in the books of the proprietors of Dedham.

In his will, 1704, he gave to his sons Samuel, Eleazar, and Benj., "land purchased of Dedham, near Natick, 300 acres and 2 more lots on and by the river," which with "the estate in his father's farm," bequeathed to them and their 4 sisters, was appraised at £583 only. Samuel settled upon the land in N.; Eleazar upon "the Farm," and Benj. d. young.


1. Rev. Amos Clark grad. at Har. U. 1804, studied divinity with the Rev. Mr. French, of Andover, and the Rev. Dr. Bates, then of Ded., was licensed by Ded. association, 1806; became a teacher of the languages at Dedham, Boston, Salem, and Sherborn, spending ab. 5 ys. in each place, and preaching only occasionally. After supplying at Sh. for two years, he was ordained Pastor, May 20, 1830, which office he sustained until ab. 1842, when the feeble state of his health required him to resign.

6. Wm. Morse^e early exhibited capacity and moral worth, became a member of the chh. and was honored by public confidence. Insanity had never invaded his family in this country, but he being in the service under Gen. Bradstreet, in the second French war, and compelled with his company to march 14 miles on the bed of a river in water, was, with his companions, seized with a fever, with which half the company died. The rest became temporarily insane. His insanity regularly returned at intervals of 14 years during the remainder of his days; and finally led to his exposure and death in a snow storm. As his insanity was not inherited, it was not transmitted, and his descendants rank among the most substantial and enterprising citizens of Athol.

4. Levi⁷, a Revolutionary pensioner, went privateering to France early in the revolution. He served six weeks in Rhode Island at the time of Sullivan's expedition, in the company of Capt. Amos Perry, of Sherborn, and Col. Hawes's regiment. "In 1778," he says, "was engaged several days and nights in constructing redoubts, and exposed to cannon shot and shells, several days. We were overtaken with a severe storm whilst on the Island, without tents to cover us. In 1779 and '80 I served in Sherborn 15 months, (pr. in guarding public stores kept there); enlisted under Reuben Partridge, commanding officer in the State of Massachusetts, for the term of three months at each engagement. In 1781 I served three months in the state of New York, at West Point, Peekskill, and vicinity." Another paper labelled, "A list of towns from Sherborne to West Point," contains, "Messmates, Sergt. Joseph Dows, Daniel Brick, Abraham Coolidge, Joseph Fairbanks, Jesse Phipps, Levi Morse." He was also in the expedition for the suppression of the Shays' Rebellion. He must have gone to Union as early as 1788, and probably in 1787. He was in Annapolis in 1785, and perhaps from one to two years altogether, about that time. After first going to Union, he generally returned for several years to spend the winters at Sherborn. He taught school in Meduncock, now Friendship, Maine, where he became acquainted with Polly Gay Bradford, born 8 Nov. 1772, at Annapolis, (now Onslow) Nova Scotia, whom he m. 8 March, 1792. She was probably a descendant of Gov. Wm. Bradford, of Plymouth. Her father, Carpenter Bradford, b. at Kingston, Mass., "put out" to a shoemaker, ran away, enlisted, was captured when about 16 years old, de-

tained as a prisoner one year in Canada, during which he was waiter to a Catholic priest, returned and married Mary Gay in Stoughton, Mass. When the neutral French or Acadians were exiled from Nova Scotia, and their lands with the improvements were offered gratuitously to settlers, he went to Annapolis, N. S., where he was at the commencement of the Revolutionary war. Then the British authorities summoned the inhabitants to take the oath of allegiance. He held up his hand; but, being an ardent whig, when the words were uttered, "you solemnly swear to be true to King George," he substituted the words George Washington for King George. "Tut, tut," said the officer, "that will not do." Conscious it was time for him to flee, he left the place the same night with another whig, and proceeded towards Halifax. Just before arriving there, a boatman, either loyal or timid, refused to take them across a river. They threatened to shoot him; but the difficulty was compromised by their being allowed to take the boat and leave it on the opposite side of the stream. He passed on by land to Castine, where he enlisted under Capt. Eddy and remained some time. After the Revolutionary service, he settled in Meduncook, now Friendship, sent for his family, and there died. The genealogy has never been carefully traced, but this Carpenter Bradford may have been the son of Carpenter, the son of Elisha, the son of Joseph, the son of Gov. William. Mr. Morse was m. 8 March, 1792. "1792, May 22, set out from Meduncook to move my wife to Union; arrived there 23d May."

Persis,⁷ who m. Dr. Jonathan Sibley, of Union, Me., had three children; 1. John Langdon,⁸ b. Dec. 29, 1804, fitted for College at Phillips' Academy, Exeter, graduated at Harvard University in 1825, was Assistant Librarian at Harvard University in 1825-6, studied Divinity at Cambridge Divinity School, was ordained at Stow, Mass., 14 May, 1829, left Stow 31 March, 1833, precisely four years from his acceptance of the invitation to settle there. During part of the year 1837 he was editor and became proprietor of the American Magazine of Useful and Entertaining Knowledge, published in Boston. He has been Assistant Librarian at Harvard University, since 1841. He made the indices to Washington's Writings, to Prescott's Ferdinand and Isabella, to Prescott's Conquest of Mexico, to the North American Review, (during Dr. Palfrey's editorship,) to the first series of Sparks' American Biography, to Young's Chronicles of the Pilgrims, &c. 2. William Cullen,⁸ b. 1 March, 1807, lives in Union, Me., unm.; 3. Moses, b. May 5, 1813, d. Aug. 16, '26.

Page 40, No. XXVII¹.

Lt. Samuel Morse, from his 15th to his 19th year, was his mother's chief dependence to manage the farm in Medfield, upon which she resided as a widow with a family of *little* children.* During his minority, it is probable that he and his brothers often

* She had eight children. The name of the youngest, an infant at the death of the father, and alive 1660, has not been ascertained.

visited, and at times resided with their Uncles, Ens. Henry Phillips, Deacon of the First Church in Boston, and Clerk of the Market, and Hon. John Hull, the father-in-law of Chief-Justice Sewall and other connections, who belonged to the nobility of the Colony; and if so, it will explain the origin of the aristocratic feeling which he and his brother Capt. Joseph Morse, transmitted to their descendants of three or four generations; and which, however absurd, may not even yet be completely eradicated. Lt. Morse became an energetic, thrifty, and honored citizen of Medfield, where he inherited the place of his father and grandfather, and probably built the first mill.

On the fatal morning of Feb. 21, 1675-6, he rose very early, and walked 3-4 of a mile south-east from the town, to fodder his cattle. In doing this he uncovered the leg of an Indian without disturbing him; and fearing to engage with him alone, lest others in concealment might be roused to overpower him, and believing it the intention of the enemy to fire his barn, he, to save his cattle, tarried to turn them out before he ran back to give the alarm. For this he was censured. His house, the most remote one in the southeast part of the village, he passed just in season to hurry off his family to the garrison; and no sooner had they left, than the signal for a general assault was given by the firing of his house.

He was commissioned Lt. by Sir Wm. Phipps, Nov. 27, 1693, and reappointed by the Earl of Bellomont, Oct. 3, 1699, when 60 years of age.

Page 40, No. XXVIII.

Hon. Capt. Joseph Morse settled in Bogistow about 1670, on the west side of Charles river. The trace of his milk cellar and tan vats are still to be seen, one mile and a third north of Death's bridge, on the west side of Sewall's brook, ten rods south of Holbrook's mill. The site of his house was about three rods north-west of the cellar hole, over which the road now passes. At this time his nearest neighbors were, on the south-west, Henry Leland, three fourths of a mile; south, Thomas Holbrook, one and one fourth mile; and north-east, his father-in-law and son Jonathan, one half mile.

Mehetabel Wood, who became his wife, was the first white child born in a territory comprising two entire townships, and large portions of four others. Her father, Nicholas Wood, a man of character and consideration, was from Dorchester, where his father's name had been enrolled among the very first planters of the town, and where he must have shared with them in the privations and, as it is hoped, spiritual joys thus described by Capt. Clap.

Affairs of y^e Plantation ; in Granting many Parcels of Land & Meadow to I suppose every particular Person ; but for y^e House-lots where they first Set down we have no Records of them, they being taken up as aforesaid.

In these years great was y^e Straits and Difficulties these People met with for want of Provision for themselves & Families ; and as Capt. Clap expresseth it, " Oh y^e Hunger that many suffered, and saw no hope in an Eye of Reason to be supplied, only by Clams, & Muscles, and Fish ; and *Bread* was so very Scarce, that sometimes y^e very Crusts of my Fathers Table would have been very Sweet unto me : And when I could have *Meal & Water & Salt*, boiled together, it was so good, who could wish better. And it was not accounted a strange thing in those Days, to Drink water, and to eat *Samp* or *Homine* without Butter or Milk. Indeed it would have been a strange thing to see a piece of Roast Beef, Mutton or Veal ; tho' it was not long before there was Roast *Goat*." And yet this people were very contented under their outward wants so long as they could enjoy the worship of God without any molestation : they did not meditate a Return to England, but as y^e S^d Capt. Clap saith, " I do not remember that ever I did wish in my Heart that I had not come into this Country, or wish myself back again to my Fathers House ; Yea I was so far from that, that I wished & advised some of my Brethren to come hither also, which accordingly one of my Brothers and those two that had married my two Sisters, sold their means and came hither.

" The Lord Jesus was so plainly held out in y^e Preaching of y^e Gospel to poor lost Sinners, and y^e absolute Necessity of y^e *New birth*, and Gods spirit in those Days was pleased to Accompany y^e word with such efficacy upon y^e Hearts of many ; that our Hearts were quite taken off from *Old England* & set upon *Heaven*. The Discourse not only of y^e Aged, but of y^e Youth also, was not, *How shall we go to England?* (though some few did not only so discourse but also went back again) but *How shall we go to Heaven? Have I true Grace wrought in my Heart? Have I Christ or no?* O how did Men and Women, young and old, Pray for *Grace*, beg for *Christ* in those Days ; and it was not in vain : Many were converted, and others established in Believing ; many joined unto y^e Several Churches where they lived." I mention this to show what sort of people they were that came first into this Country, what their Spirit & Design was, what a fervent love and zeal they had for God & his Instituted worship, how contented under their Straits and Difficulties, while they enjoyed y^e Gospel & y^e free profession of their Religion."

Nicholas Wood, with Andrew Pitcher and Thomas Holbrook, in 1653, had purchased of Richard Parker of Boston five hundred and thirty-five acres of land at Bogistow.* This they

* Prior to the full incorporation of Medfield, May 22, 1650, the General Court granted farms on the west side of Charles river, beyond Dedham. in what is now Sherborn and Medway, to several gentlemen in payment of public debts, and as gifts, viz. : To Rev. John Allen of Dedham, in 1643, was granted 200 acres. " To Capt Robert Kayne Oct. 23, 1649 ; 1,074 acres 'Meadow & upland upon Pawsett Hill beyond Dedham village' (Medfield) bounded S. by Mr John Allen's farm ; S. by E. & E. & N. E. by Charles R. ;

first divided into three qualities, plain,* upland, and meadow, as was then the custom, and then divided each quality into three parts, giving each man scattered lots. After the division, Holbrook bought 80 acres of P. in three lots. On one of 20 acres he placed Henry Leland as a tenant in 1654, and twelve years after, sold it to him; L. having, in 1660, purchased Brown's grant at a third sale for £40 on three years' credit, and probably conveyed to H. in exchange a part of the same near Death's Bridge, where H. next built. Wood s. on the north-east part of Parker's grant, and as a senior, possessed of more property, and as the leader of the enterprise, to him belongs the distinction of

N. & N. W. & W. by wast lands: to *Richard Brown* of Watertown at the same time 200 acres bounded on the S. & S. W. by *Kayne's*; on the E. by *Charles R.*; on the N. W. (pr. N. E.) by *Richard Parker*; and on the N. W. and W. by wast lands: To *Richard Parker* of Boston at the same time 435 acres bounded south by *Brown's*; on the S. E. by *Charles R.*; on the E. by the upland running into the River; and on the N. W. the W. and S. W. by waste land; and 100 acres more sold to him by the surveyor general:" Parker's lot was to "continue so far on the River taking in the meadow on both sides as lyeth on the E. side of the path going from *Pawsett Hill* to *Natick*:" To *Simon Bradstreet* in 1656, was laid out "800 acres" which seems to have been bounded on the N. W. by *Natick*; E. by *Charles River*; S. by the farm pond and *Parker*. Indian rights, if any existed, were excepted. To *Thomas Holbrook*, 1657, was given 50 acres, and he purchased of the General Court 43 more, which made up "the upland running into the River" E. of P's grant; to *Capt. Eleazar Lusher*, May 26, 1659, was granted 250 acres the S. angle thereof lying near *Medfield new grant*, (now E. *Medway*,) and the N. angle near the S. W. angle of *Natick bounds*; and also 12 acres of meadow (*Sewall's*) in two parcels beyond the N. W. angle, lying on the brook *Wennakening*, (now *Sewall's*,) which *Lusher* sold to *Henry Adams* of *Medfield*, 15 (15) 1660, who is presumed to have sold it to *Hon. John Hull* in exchange for lands he had in M. At the decease of H. it passed to his son-in-law, *Judge Sewall*.† To *Dean Winthrop* and *Francis Vernon*, May 11, 1759, was laid out 700 acres as it abutteth upon *Medfield (Medway)* line in part towards the S. and a stony ridge in part and *Bogestow brook* in part towards the E. and S. E.; and upon a Pond (*Winthrop's*, now in *Holliston*) in part towards the W. and upon waste lands on all other parts. No other grants are ascertained to have been made within the limits of ancient *Sherborn* prior to her incorporation, 1674. The remainder were granted by the Court to the farmers then settled upon these grants with the proviso that they should set apart 200 acres "for the country," having no part of them themselves, but that they should be distributed among such other persons as would come to inhabit in S. and as the major part should think meet. Fifty acres only should be allowed to each new settler until 20 new families should be settled there; and then the whole not already granted should be disposed of as the major part of the inhabitants qualified to vote should judge meet.‡ The Court annexed no other condition, as in the solitary case of *Medfield*, implying a confidence in *these few* petitioners probably without a parallel in the previous acts of that body.


* Their plain, probably cleared by the Indians, was north-east of the ancient *Leland* homestead in *Sherborn*, where *Wood* and his company are presumed to have had their first enclosure, and to have raised their first corn.

† On this farm, it is believed, was built, about 1678, by H.'s tenant and brother-in law, *Dea. Bullen* from *Medfield*, the first stone wall in *Sherborn*: which convinced the settlers of its feasibility, and prevented their hauling cedar rails from their *precious* swamp in the West of *Holliston*; to facilitate which they had laid out a direct road of 10 miles, and divided the swamp so as to give each man a small lot.

first planting Sherborn. Capt. Morse settled on the north part of the same grant, having, it is presumed, bought Pitcher's remaining 98 acres in an unimproved state. Here imagination paints him wielding the axe, the scythe, the hoe, the flail, and the swindling knife, clad in undyed woollen and tow fabrics from the spinning wheel and loom of his better half; breakfasting on bean soup, supping on milk and hominy, and dining on wild fowl, bear's meat, or venison, with turnips, brown bread, and a hard indian pudding for a dessert; every Sunday morning tidily dressed, rowing his wife across Charles river in a log canoe, and walking with her four miles through swamps and woods to Medfield meeting and back again; or fording the broad stream on horse-back, with Hitty on a pillion behind him, and their child on his left arm; spurring up Dobbin lest they be *too* late and the minister go in before them; cheered with hope, soothed with love, contented and happy; when Indian hostilities began, and menaced all their earthly joys and prospects.

During Philip's war, Capt. Morse was sorely tried, and, according to tradition, his combativeness, largely developed by nature, was largely called into action. On that memorable morning of Feb. 21, 1675-6, when Medfield was assaulted by Philip at the head of "500 warriors," laid in ashes, and 18 persons massacred, he was at his remote and feeble settlement, with a wife near confinement, and her sister-in-law still nearer, whose husband, being on the other side of the river, fell the first victim to the fierce tomahawk. The warriors were now dancing in fiendish exultation on the west side of the river: the only bridge by which they could flee to a stronger garrison in Medfield, or draw relief from thence, was on fire; and the two or three garrisons of Bogestow consisted of only about ten or twelve men each; so that immediate destruction seemed before them. The effect of all was, the premature confinement and death of the sister-in-law; and Mrs. Morse subsequently lost her child. The Indians deferred their attack until the 6th of May, when "they met with a notorious repulse at a stone house on the margin of Bogestow Pond. On the 2d of July there was near this a new conflict in the woods, and more execution done upon the enemy." "So vigorous was the attack upon them that they never dared to show their faces there afterwards." Capt. M. is understood to have been personally engaged in these conflicts, and by his courage and conduct to have won the confidence of the public in him as a soldier. Capt. M. signed the petition for the incorporation of Sherborn in 1674, and was among the first received as inhabitants; and he subsequently enjoyed the confidence of his fellow citizens, and received the highest honors in their gift, however humble the *present* sense of the terms by which these honors were expressed. He was chosen Capt. of their only company of militia, one to treat with a minister to settle in S. to build a parsonage, to preserve order and obedience to laws,

and often to moderate Town meetings, serve as selectman, and represent S. in the great and General Court at Boston ; also to locate roads and divide the common lands, objects of paramount interest and importance to their infant town and to posterity. His name very often appears subscribed to important documents in neat though heavy characters, always slanting to the left ; and it is evident that the public had great confidence in his integrity, judgment and influence. He seems to have succeeded nearer than any other man in inheriting the patriarchal influence of his Uncle Daniel. His remains were interred upon an eminence in the ancient but now *neglected* Burying Ground in the S. part of Sherborn. His head stone, broken by the plough of a barbarian, barely enables one to identify his grave. A gneiss slab, with rude etching, marks the grave of his second wife, H. M., situated a few paces to the left or S. E. of his. On the right or N. W. side and nigher to it, is the head stone of his third wife.

Shortly before his death he executed the following Will :

In Dii Nomine Amen, this fifteenth day of February Anno Domini One thousand Seven hundred and sixteen, Ipso Anno Rigni Regis Georgii Magniæ Britanniae &c. Quarto. I, Joseph Morse of Sherborn, in the County of Middlesex, within his majesty's province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England, yeoman, being sick of body but of perfect mind and memory, do make this my last will and testament. That is to say principally and most of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God who gave it ; and my body I recommend to the Earth to be interred in a decent Christian manner, at the discretion of my Executors hereinafter named, nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God : And as touching such worldly estate as herewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life, I give demise and dispose thereof as followeth, viz :

Inps. I give and bequeath unto Hannah my well beloved wife all the household goods and moveables which she brought to me upon marriage and also the sum of thirty pounds in current money, or bills of Credit in lease of her thirds out of my Estate and release and quitt of all further and other claims therein or thereunto. Item, Whereas I have heretofore advanced for and towards the settlement of my eldest son Joseph Morse, a considerable portion out of my Estate, I now further give and bequeath unto my said son Joseph, to complete the whole of his portion, two-third parts of all my right and interest of and in eight acres, and a half acre of Salt marsh, situate in the township of Milton, in the province aforesaid, one moiety or half part of a tract of Dividend land situate in Sherborn aforesaid, upon the westerly side of a road that leads from Duty Meadow Bridge to the meeting house : to him his heirs and assigns forever. Item, I give and bequeath to my son James Morse, a tract of land and meadow in Sherborn aforesaid, containing by estimation thirty acres be the same more or less, and adjoining to his home lott on the Southeast part of said home lott, and also the other moiety or half part of that tract of Dividend land before named, lying on the westerly side of the aforesaid

road leading from Duty Meadow Bridge to the meeting house. To him his heirs and assigns forever. He or they paying and discharging the sum of forty pounds in part of the legacy hereinafter given and bequeathed to my daughter Kesiah in time and manner hereafter expressed in this my will, which land and meadow aforesaid under the proviso aforesaid, makes up with what I have heretofore advanced for him upon his settlement, his full part and portion out of my Estate. Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Isaac Morse and his heirs and assigns forever, all that part of a certain farm situate in Sherborn aforesaid, yet undisposed of, which I purchased of Moses Adams, being one moiety or half part of a certain farm, and also all the land which I purchased of Thomas Holbrook, the same lying adjoining the aforesaid farm land; and further my will is that my said son Isaac shall have out of my Estate at my decease a good horse and a pair of good steers not less than four years old, unless he receives the same or the value thereof in lieu thereof in my life-time and I also give and bequeath unto my said son Isaac all the Edifices and buildings and other improvements standing or being upon the aforesaid lands to him bequeathed as aforesaid and also all the timber, boards, nails and other materials which are already provided for the finishing of the buildings thereon. Item, I give and bequeath unto my two sons, viz David and Asa Morse* part and part alike, the whole in two equal parts, being divided to them, their heirs and assigns forever, all my farm whereon I now dwell, situate in Sherborn aforesaid with all the houses edifices buildings and appurtenances whatsoever thereto belonging, and also all and singular, my other lands with the rights of township members, and appurtenances whatsoever thereto belonging in Sherborn aforesaid or elsewhere which are not otherwise disposed of in this my will, and also all my goods and moveable estate of what nature or denomination soever not otherwise disposed of in this my will, provided always and upon condition that my said two sons David and Asa, their respective heirs or assigns, do well and truly pay and discharge all the several legacies hereinafter assigned and mentioned to be by them paid unto my daughter Mehitable Breck her heirs and assigns forever. One third part of eight acres and a half of Salt marsh belonging to me lying and being in the township of Milton, and also one-fourth part of my household goods not otherwise disposed of in this my will, and thirty and seven pounds and ten shillings of money or true and lawful Bills of Credit of the aforesaid province to be paid unto her the said Mehitable Breck or her heirs within one year next after my decease by my two sons David and Asa Morse out of my estate before given and bequeathed to them.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Hannah Coolidge one-fourth part of my household goods not otherwise disposed of in this my will and thirty and seven pounds and ten shilling of money or bills of Credit as aforesaid, to be paid to her, the sd Hannah

* David is presumed to have sold his half to Wm. Rider in exchange for lands in Natick, given him there for services as clerk and surveyor. Asa, who had the S. half, sold, about 1727, to Patridge, who sold to Barber, who left it to his sons Elisha and Oliver. Walter, the son of Oliver, now occupies the S. half and the site of Capt. M.'s buildings.

APPENDIX.

Coolidge or her heirs within one year next after my decease by my two sons David and Asa Morse out of my Estate before given and bequeathed to them. Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Barns one-fourth part of my household goods not otherwise disposed of in this my will, and thirty and seven pounds and ten shillings of money or bills of Credit aforesaid, to be paid unto her the said Sarah Barns or her heirs within one year next after my decease by my two sons David and Asa Morse out of my Estate before given and bequeathed to them. Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Keziah Morse one-fourth part of my household goods not otherwise disposed of in this my will and ninety and seven pounds and ten shillings of money or bills of Credit as aforesaid to be paid unto her the said Keziah Morse or her heirs when and so soon as she shall have attained the age of eighteen years or on her marriage day if that shall first happen viz: forty pounds part thereof by my son James Morse and fifty and seven pounds residue thereof by my two sons David and Asa Morse. My will and meaning is, that my debts, funeral charges and my Legacies to my wife together with the horse and steers given to my son Isaac be raised levyed and paid out of my Estate before willed to my two sons David and Asa. And further my will is, that in case any of my children depart this life in their minority their portion herein bequeathed unto such deceased, shall be divided amongst my surviving children, part and part alike: And in case any of my children or their representative will not rest satisfied with this my will, but commence any suit in the Law to disannul or make void any part thereof, my will is, that the portion hereby willed and bequeathed unto such child or children, be transferred to and divided amongst such of my children as shall rest satisfied with this my will. Lastly, I do constitute and appoint my loving and dutiful sons Joseph Morse and James Morse and David Morse to be the sole Executors of this my last will and testament: and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke, and disannul, all former and other testaments, wills, legacies, bequests and Executors by me in any wise heretofore named, willed and bequeathed. Ratifying and confirming this and none other to be my last will and testament.

The testator's will and meaning is further, that his son Isaac Morse shall have the quantity of three loads of grass yearly for the space of four years next after the decease of the said testator which he shall cutt in each year on the said testators home place northerly side of the brook. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, the day and year first within written."

From this Will he appears to have been rich in lands. Sherborn originally extended N. to Sudbury R. in "Framlingham" near the old Burying Ground; N. W., it was bounded by Sudbury R. and Cold Spring Brook, including portions of Ashland and Hopkinton, S. W., it extended to Deer Brook, including a part of Milford.

Page 40, XXIX.

Hon. Joshua Morse of Medfield inherited the ancient homestead and lands in other places, was largely engaged in transferring real estate, was one of the original proprietors of Sturbridge, Innholder at Medfield, and in his house were held the meetings of the proprietors of S. for 12 years after their incorporation. He was a member of the church, and educated a son for the ministry; served the town in all the offices in their gift, sometimes representing them in the General Court. He was a strong minded, energetic, mirthful man, and inherited and transmitted a good amount of aristocratic feeling; and many of his descendants of various names, have been respected for talents and moral worth, quite down to the present generation. He left a large estate for those times, and a character untarnished by meanness or fraud.

Page 40, XXX.

Joseph Morse s. on Dirty Meadow Hill in S., 100 rods N. E. of the late Deacon Micah Leland's, devoted himself to improving a tract of the best land in S., drew land in Douglas, died aged 75, leaving a property, inventoried at £643,9s. Mrs. Prudence, his wife, was the daughter of Henry Adams of Medfield, and her mother was the excellent Prudence Frary, niece of Capt. Theophilus F. of Boston, and daughter of John F. of Dedham, by his wife Elizabeth Harding, who was received to the church in Dedham April 24, 1639, "giving good satisfaction." Henry Adams, the father of Prudence, was the grandson of Henry A., whose remains sleep in honorable company at Quincy; and the son of Henry jun., who m. Elizabeth Paine, 17 (8) 1643, or Elizabeth Russell, according to Pres. A. pr. sister of Mr. James Russell of Charlestown, who married the daughter of Gov. John Haynes. Henry A. jun. was slain by the Indians at the massacre in Medfield, and his wife Elizabeth accidentally shot the day after. Madam Prudence Frary Adams died 1750, aged "88, having seen the 5 generation." Her daughter Prudence lived to be nearly as old, and her son Jacob Morse of Doug. died aged about 83, and her grandson Jacob died aged 85, and others at a similar age. (See Longevity of the same stock in the race of Joshua Morse, p. 40.)

Hannah Morse ⁴ h. Isaac Cooledge Esq. of Sherborn (son of John C. a soldier in Philip's war, by wife Mary r. Capt. David Morse,⁴ settled on land near the Indian Village of Natick, about 1727. His name appears among first white settlers in Natick, except those connected with the mission. When they had increased, so that a company of militia could be formed, he was appointed Captain. In 1746, when the "plantation of N." was to be erected into a parish, he was empowered by the General Court to call the first meeting. He seems to have long been the master spirit among whites and Indians in N., for which hereditary combativeness fitted him. No record or tradition to my knowledge, accuses him of wronging the Indians; and as some of his sons were early and *devotedly* pious, he is presumed to have instructed them by Christian examples.

Rev. Doct. Ebenezar Morse of Shrewsbury, now Boylston, possessed a strong, clear and vigorous mind, a bold and independent spirit, keen and ready wit, and a kind, benevolent and christian heart. He had uncommon versatility of talent. He was so bright in the classics as to command in his retired location, a school of young gentlemen preparing to enter college; and it was under his thorough tuition and inspiring influence, that the foundation of the literary eminence of many in our early history was laid. Of this number was the late accomplished Revd. Dr. Harris of Dorchester, whose parents by the destruction of Charlestown, at the battle of Bunker Hill, having become houseless, placed their son in Mr. M's. family, by whom he was prepared for college and aided in his embarrassed yet brilliant course. Of the value of Mr. M's aid, Dr. H. during a long and honoured life, was wont to speak, acknowledging his obligations and praising his benefactor; and on hearing read the death of Mr. M. he composed some beautiful lines, giving vent to his

gratitude. Mr. M. was a well read and successful practitioner of medicine, and even taught the theory and practice then in vogue to some who became eminent in the profession. He was a sound divine and an able writer of sermons as his preserved MSS. attest. He united such qualities as commanded the respect and confidence of his coevals in the ministry and the veneration and ardent love of his youthful brethren.

With his church he lived in good fellowship: nothing occurred to interrupt his amicable relations to the citizens of the town until 1775, when the spirit of the revolution had broken forth with fearful violence, attended with all its natural and often unreasonable jealousies. Mr. Morse, it would seem, whatever were his convictions of the measures of the British government or the desirableness of resistance, having expressed doubts of the success aimed at, and perhaps also of the morality of some measures resorted to, was summarily and informally dismissed by his parish. To such abuse, which virtually deprived him of the ministerial office for no offence against any rule of Christianity or usage of the Churches, he would not submit. He therefore with a part of the church who adhered to the pastor, invited a highly respectable council to consider their case and aid in securing Mr. M. an honorable dismissal, and one that might allow of his continuing to minister to such of his charge as should choose him. This was done, and he spent the remainder of his days in B. actively employed as a teacher, physician and preacher; and every attempt of his enemies to destroy or harm him resulted in their defeat and shame.

The mob having locked the pulpit against the pastor, introduced something in the form of another preacher, who was soon found running about reporting a private conversation had with Mr. M. much to his prejudice. Mr. M. hearing what was in the wind, contradicted having made the statement alleged. This involved the preacher in the charge of falsehood; and finding Mr. M. believed, and that he would be obliged to father the lie; he, as stupid as perfidious, attempted to wash his character by bringing an action against Mr. M. for falsehood. When they met for trial, they were called to dine at a common table with the venerable judges and members of the bar; when the prosecutor, as if conscious of guilt, without sense to conceal it, or modesty to hold his tongue, took the lead of conversation, and commenced the vindication of his character, alleging that so faultless from his infancy up had he been, that he was never whipped but once, and that was for speaking the truth. "Fact," said Dr. M. "I guess it cured you." The sport and result of the trial may be conceived, but what became of Elder —, — how long he answered for the tool of party, or whether he became a Rogerene, a perfectionist or a quack doctor, cannot now be remembered.

Rev. Doct. M. lived honoured by all acquaintances capable of appreciating intellectual worth and moral excellence; and died in his 82d year, lamented.

Page 41, No. XXXIV.

11. Joseph Morse⁵ inherited the energy and enterprise of his honored father. He early sojourned in different colonies, as business called. He became the proprietor of the celebrated George Tavern, Roxbury, much resorted to by men connected with the government. While the expedition was preparing to proceed, under General Amherst, against Oswego, he was induced to undertake the arduous office of furnishing and forwarding provisions through the swamps to the army as it should proceed to invest that place. The disasters of the campaign fell heavily on him. His property, invested in provisions, &c., was seized by the enemy and he carried prisoner to Canada, and subjected to long and severe confinement, and was finally sent to France. On his way he was recaptured by a British man-of-war, drawn out of a crowded hold ere he was *entirely* consumed by vermin, and the horrors of his situation reported to George II. The king sent for him to the palace, and was so moved by the knowledge of his history that he gave him an extensive tract of land in Nova Scotia, on which Amherst is situated, promising to lay his case before parliament, after which a more ample reward might be expected. He returned to New England, and before parliament met the king died, and Mr. Morse's case was never presented. Having settled his business in New England, he removed to Nova Scotia and commenced a new town, which he named in honor of General Amherst, and where he died some years after. His widow married for a second husband, William How, who, with other settlers from New England, partaking of the spirit of '76, conceived the vain project of revolutionising Nova Scotia. They chose Eddy colonel, and How major, and wrote to Washington for troops. They were attacked and defeated. How entered the American army. In consequence of this, as he had an interest through his wife in the estate of her former husband, it was confiscated. She returned to Medfield, where she lived respected until 1807, and died, aged 83. She was a lady of energy and surprising fortitude, and the exertions she made to save her property displayed the courage of a Spartan.

Page 42, No. XXXV.

1. Henry Morse⁵ settled on a tract of rough, unimproved land in the N. W. part of Medway, lately annexed to Holliston, and now occupied by his gr. gr. grandson, Uriel Cutler. In 1726 he built a small framed house about twenty-five rods north-east of Cutler's, and in 1736, another two-story house, which, in 1849, gave place to that occupied by Cutler. The great improvements which he made still attest his industry and enterprise. When his eldest son, Ezekiel, was drafted to join the expedition destined to reduce for the second time the fortress of Louisburg, his wife was expecting confinement before his period of service might close. The father, then forty-six years old, volunteered to take

the son's place, and shared in the perils and glories of a victory celebrated by proclamations and thanksgivings throughout the empire. He and his wife were members of the church in Holiston. He divided his farm to his three sons, and built each of them a house and spacious barn. He was mirthful, and high minded; and had moral traits which remind one of the full-blooded Englishman. The great physical strength of his family he did not transmit, but the type is so legible still in his great great-grand children, and so perfect in some, that it can scarcely fail to be transmitted through two generations more.

Page 42, No. XXXVI.

1. Thomas⁵, a member of the church, removed from Sherborn to Dublin, in good circumstances, about 1770. A captain's commission was sent him by the royal governor, Wentworth, of New Hampshire, to keep him loyal, which he indignantly spurned; and ere hostilities commenced he had three sons trained to volunteer at the first call, while he, advanced in years, remained at home with the others to carry on the farm and encourage his fellow citizens to patriotic efforts. He was pronounced by one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, who had much intercourse with him, to be the "shrewdest man he ever knew."

Page 44, No. XXXVII.

Ebenezer Morse⁶ at the commencement of the revolution became involved in the same condemnation with his Rev. Father. Irritated by the rashness and taunting of the whigs, he contracted a bias in favour of the crown; and too proud to dissemble his opinions or to endure the obloquy to which they exposed him, he in 1777 took up his residence in New York. Being an expert and skillful carpenter, he was soon placed at the head of a yard in which station he continued until the cessation of hostilities. In the mean time he made the acquaintance of a young lady whose mother was from Coburg and father from Wertemburg to whom he was married Sept. 22, 1782. With her he soon after embarked for N. S. and settled at Shelburn. Here having received the rewards of ability and loyalty in the appointment of assistant Commissary and in the grant of a house lot and other lands, he built a house and resided until 1788, when he returned to the States and soon after settled at Newfane, Vt., on a branch of West River. The country was then new, densely stocked with trees that defied both fire and steel. Bears, wolves, panthers, and wild cats, were thick and bold, and he had to encounter all the perils and hardships of a new sparsely and remote settlement. But in the face of all, he erected comfortable buildings, cleared up a farm, and to the great advantage of the settlement added a saw and grist mill. The longevity of his race was cut short in him. He died at the age of 55 a respected citizen, manifesting political repentance by works rather than confessions.

Page 45, XXXVII.

8. Doct. Eliakim⁶ Morse read medicine with his father, commenced practice in Woodstock, Ct., removed to Boston, engaged in the London trade, accumulated an ample estate, and retired to Watertown, where he now resides; and though in his 91st year he rides into Boston on horseback, and has the vigor of mind and body common at 70.

Page 45, XXXVII.

2. Ezekiel Morse⁶ married Rebecca, grand-daughter of Abraham Cuzans of Sh. and previously of Boston, and daughter of Isaac of Holliston by wife Martha (Haven) Wessan, born at Lynn April 11, 1690, daughter of Nathaniel and Elizabeth H., and grand-daughter of Richard Haven, from the west of England, about 1644. Ezekiel and wife were both members of the church in Holl. He inherited the homestead without his father's capacity for, or application to business. He was a zealous Whig, and when "the regulars broke out of Boston," he was languishing with a mortal injury received from the kick of a horse, yet he ordered Abner, his only son, scarcely 16, harnessed for the field, and hurried off, to be shot, if need be, but not in the back; and he was obeyed.

8. Dea. James Morse⁶ had a puny body, a good mind, and an excellent heart. He was early called to fill various offices in the gift of Medway; and often delegated as a counsellor to the churches. Spiritual, devout, sound in faith; meek and exemplary in his walk; he was beloved as a brother and confided in by his own and other pastors. Too small and feeble for actual service, he declined a captaincy, and performed no other military

service in the revolutionary war, except to superintend the guarding of public stores. Being an ardent whig, and having a good command of language, he as moderator of Town meetings and superintendent of the drafting of soldiers, which once devolved upon the selectmen, exerted an inspiring influence in the cause of freedom. It was somewhat proverbial in Medway that "if the little Morse was present all would move again." He was happily connected in life. His pious and discreet widow survived to the age of 88, to adorn a profession made in early life, and has appropriately inscribed upon her gravestone in S. Milford,

By long experience have I known
Thy sovereign power to save;
At thy command I venture down
Securely to the grave."

Mr. M. enjoyed the entire confidence of his fellow-townsmen, and was honored with the highest offices in their gift, the duties of which he discharged with ability and an eye to the public good. He was a member of the Congregational church in D.

Major John Morse⁶ served two campaigns in the war of the Revolution without compensation and contributed to hire three other soldiers; and after the war, settled with his father on the homestead in Dublin. At the age of twenty-three, he was chosen to represent D. and Marlboro' in the legislature of N. H., but declined. Subsequently, and at sundry times, he accepted the office from the citizens of D., the duties of which he discharged with honor to himself and his constituents; and he has left a reputation for sound sense, cool deliberation, strict integrity, and promptitude in fulfilling his engagements. When the original political parties arose, he adhered to the administration, then befriended, probably, by nineteen twentieths of the intelligence, patriotism, and moral virtue throughout the land; and when the tongue of time shall have silenced political slanders, or changed the tune now played for office by demagogues, his race may proudly boast that he was a federalist. He fell when the contest of these parties was at its acme, lamented by a large circle of friends, and even his bitterest enemies wept over his remains.

Joel Partridge of Medway, b. Feb. 29, 1747-S, and d. Feb. 13, 1823, was the 10th child of James Partridge of Medway, b. in Medfield, Oct. 1700, the son of John Partridge, Jr., whose father was an original proprietor of that town in 1650, then an inhabitant of Dedham. Joel's mother was Keziah Bullard, b. Dec. 2, 1711, the dg. of Malachi and Elizabeth B., and grd. dg. of Benj. Bullard, by wife Elizabeth, who s. on the N. side of Bogestow pond in Med., then Medfield, about 1654, and whose

descendants have inherited, under different names, down to the youngest generations of the present day, a disposition to insanity. Most of the suicides ever committed in Medway, and the bordering townships, have occurred among them, as well as cases of monomania, for which civil and ecclesiastical tribunals may not have always made due allowance. Benj. Bullard was entrusted with public duties that showed confidence in his sanity. His wife's father, Geo. Thorp, was pr. insane.*

*See the genealogy of different families of this race in Charlton, where nearly twenty suicides are said to have occurred in about twenty years, in a population of 1000 or 1200; and also the pedigree of incurable patients at the asylums and of others whose insanity or suicide is ascribed to other causes or deemed unaccountable.

The insanity of that race is more than nine generations old. When crossed with certain families it is no further transmitted. For instance, among the descendants of Joseph Morse² of Medfield, who have often intermarried with it I have not succeeded in detecting a single instance of hereditary insanity, until crossed a second time with that race. But it is otherwise with the race of his brother Daniel² of Sherborn, and the race of his Uncle Joseph of Ipswich. When crossed with these and certain other races, derangement reappears and is transmitted. Can Physiologists explain this, or show when the repairing principle will arrest the transmission, so long as marriages are contracted without attention to genealogy.

Abner Morse, Esq., the only son of his parents, like to have never been born; and, as it was thought, never would have been had not his ambitious and often disappointed mother first trained her submission by naming a daughter WAIT-STILL; and had he not been born, there could never have been this other Abner, 30 years enceinte before the birth of the child the reader is now holding. To the overjoyed parents, his arrival must have been ominous of more than the perpetuity of the name; but among all the rare consequences within the sweep of their excited imaginations, fancy could hardly have created such an anomalous birth as the memorial. But as strange effects often result from common causes, the reader will not infer that Abner Morse, Esq. was any thing more than a common child, brought up in a common way. At the age of sixteen, he was sent as a volunteer drummer into the army; and the first office he ever held was to hold a spyglass for Washington to look through at the enemy; and the second, to kindle that unfortunate fire on Dorchester Point (South Boston) at which the British directed a shot, killing three valuable officers, and barely missing him.*

* The author has often thought, in view of certain instrumentalities in the Church, that if the Devil had been the engineer, and possessed foreknowledge, he would have levelled so as to have hit the boy also.

He remained in the army until the evacuation of Boston, and reëntered it as a volunteer for another campaign at Rhode Island. Deprived of his father at an age of peculiar temptations, and exposed as he was in the army, where he served two or three campaigns, it was a wonder that he preserved good moral and industrious habits. He enjoyed no literary advantages above those of the common district school; yet he made himself acquainted with surveying, military engineering, and became a neat and accurate draftsman, and was well acquainted with municipal law and the law of process. Among the multitude of causes that came before him as a magistrate in the space of fourteen years, no decision given by him is known to have been reversed by a higher court. He had a ready dispatch of business, and was much employed in settling estates, and taking care of the bereaved and unfortunate. He was for twenty years a sort of stereotyped moderator of town and parish meetings, serving sixty-five times in that capacity. He represented Medway three years in the General Court, and served as selectman fourteen years, and repeatedly as grand juror, &c. He was commonly employed to look after the interest of the town in her foreign negotiations and disputes, and is allowed to have done more public business than any of her former citizens. He was naturally very excitable, mirthful, social, combative, and persevering. He had a clear and heavy voice, a ready flow of words, and, for one not early trained to public speaking, uncommon influence in debate. He was appointed justice by Governor Sullivan, and reappointed by Governor Strong, and again by Governor Brooks, and was an acting magistrate at the time of his death. In early life, when military honors were yet prized, he held the commissions of captain and major of artillery. He regularly attended on Orthodox preaching at Medway, W. Parish, until the removal of their house of worship, when he became an attendant at Holliston, where a common headstone marks his grave and that of his consort. He married Mille Leland, a woman ever beloved and honored in the relations of wife, mother, neighbor, friend and Christian. Precious and admonitory be her memory! She was the dg. of Lt. Asaph Leland of Holl., (b. Feb. 7, 1730, d. Aug. 7, 1812) and Beulah Littlefield (see p. 41); and grd. dg. of Dea. Timothy L. of H., (b. Feb. 22, 1684, d. May 22, 1744), and Elizabeth Learned (b. Apr. 21. 1694, d. Dec. 11, 1757); and gr. grd. dg. of Ebenezer L. of Sh. (b. 2 (11), 1657, d. June 30, 1742); and gr. gr. grd. dg. of Henry L. (b. ab. 1620, d. Apr. 4, 1680, at Sh.), and gr. gr. grd. dg. of Hopestill L., b. at Yorkshire, Eng., 1580, s. at Weymouth ab. 1638, and died at Medfield, 1655.

Her grandfather, Dea. Timothy L., was one of the fathers of Holl. Before the meeting-house was built, he opened his spacious house for worship, one mile north of the centre of H., where the church was organized, and he chosen deacon. He

served H. as treasurer above twenty years, and as selectman thirteen years, and was much employed otherwise in promoting the interests of the town. No Leland before him, nor for fifty years after him, in this country, was so prominent or honored.

Her grandmother Leland was a woman of piety and energy. Soon after her marriage, when she was but fifteen years and nine months old, Mr. L. being absent, a huge bear came into his cider-mill, near her open kitchen door. She seized his musket, slipped up stairs and loaded it, and had not bruin made good his retreat, she had doubtless proved a markswoman. She was the daughter of the excellent Dea. Benoni Learned (b. Dec. 4, 1656, l. and d. where Mrs. Doct. Wyth r. in Sh.) and Sarah More from Sudbury, and grd. dg. of "Isaac L. of Woburn, and Mary Stearns, dg. of Isaac Stearns of Reading; and pr. gr. grd. dg. of Wm. Larnett, who, with his wife Goodeth, was rec'd to the chh. in Charlestown, 1632, took the freeman's oath May 14, 1634, signed a remonstrance respecting Mrs. Hutchinson, pronounced seditious, for which he made acknowledgments Nov. 2, 1837. He was a proprietor of Woburn, where he died Apr. 5, 1646."

Mrs. Morse's great grandfather, Ebenezer Leland, settled in Sherborn where William Leland, senior, resides, where stood a garrison house built after Philip's war. He united with the church in Holliston, 1738, aged 81. Her great-great-grandfather, Henry Leland, b. about 1620, d. 1680, and was received to the church in Dorchester, 1653, and one of the first planters of S. 1654. He was brought up a tailor, and, according to tradition, was of small stature and very amiable temper. Her gr. gr. gr. grandfather, Hopestill Leland, according to tradition, came from Yorkshire, Eng., clandestinely; landed at Weymouth with his son Henry, and pr. two or more daughters, about 1638, and was one to constitute the church which broke up in 1643, after Mr. Newman had preached to them four years. He was probably an itinerant tailor, and a man of eminent piety. He died in Medfield, 1654, aged 75.

"Rev. John Morse in early life gave himself to God and lived a life of unassuming piety till death." It was in the family and under the faithful ministry of Rev. John Leland of Peru, in the progress of a general "old fashioned" revival that he indulged his first hopes. *Many* others did so at the same

time, and to all human appearance lived like him a life of godliness controlled by affections not natural to man. Having tasted the blessedness of the Gospel, he desired to impart it to others ;* and he made his way to the pulpit over obstacles which few, if any, at this day would attempt to surmount. "He graduated at the College in Providence, studied Theology with the venerable Dr. Emmons and the Rev. Mr. Sanford, who afterwards became his father-in-law. In 1792 he was ordained and settled over the Congregational Church at Green River, N. Y. Soon after his settlement he witnessed an interesting revival of religion, and his labors were crowned by the great Head of the Church. During his labors here for twenty-three years, he had many warm friends, and the Church were remarkably well united in him and looked upon him as a man of God ; a man possessing a discriminating mind and sound judgment. During his residence at Green River, he labored some of the time as a missionary, in destitute places. In 1816 he moved to Otego, and became the Pastor of the Presbyterian Church in that place. Soon after his settlement the Spirit of the Lord was poured out and souls were given him as seals of his ministry." He continued his labors at Otego twelve years. His last sermon was on the occasion of President Harrison's death. His Theology was sound, of the New England stamp, which enabled him during the prevalence of the new measures for producing revivals to see the rock upon which the Churches were driving ; and, had his counsels been heeded, how many fatal shipwrecks would have been avoided ! He rejoiced to have the Holy Spirit honored in the work of regeneration and in the sanctification of believers, and in his last letter to the author, a few weeks before his death, he bewails the tendency of current errors to rob God of this honor. "He loved and preached the distinguishing doctrines of grace which supported him in his last sickness and death. As he approached the grave, his faith and entire reliance on Christ and his atoning blood for salvation became stronger and stronger. Said he to Mr. James, who visited him in his last short illness, 'I am a great sinner, but O ! the efficacy of Christ's blood to atone ! It is sufficient. There is a fountain filled with blood drawn from Immanuel's veins, &c. That is all my hope. The grave has no darkness, no gloom to me.' He was asked 'are you willing to die ?' 'O, yes ; I long to depart, that I may be with Christ. I am almost home.' To his daughter, the night before his death, he said : 'It is not a dreadful thing to die.' During his short illness of four days, he enjoyed his mental faculties in a remarkable manner. Not a cloud came over his mind to darken his prospect beyond the grave. He appeared to wait with pleas-

* About 1785 he held meetings for religious conference in Medway and Holl., at which commenced the first revivals in those towns. These, of which he was the acknowledged instrument, determined the character of several churches, which they retain to this day.

ure till his change came. Seldom has one been found to have rested more implicitly on the Savior, or to have drawn richer consolations from that blessed Gospel which he had preached more than forty years to others. On Tuesday, 3 Jan., 1844, about 12 o'clock, P. M., without a struggle or a groan, he gently fell asleep in the arms of the Savior." "Mark the perfect man and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

He commenced the study of law with Judge Thatcher of Thomastown, Me., and finished with Timothy Bigelow of Boston, whose office and a share of its emoluments passed immediately into his hands on being admitted to the bar. He married the daughter of Dr. Jackson, M. D., Edinburgh, whose father was one of the aldermen of London, and passed his remaining days in Boston, in the practice of his profession, welcoming numerous acquaintances to the hospitalities of his house. He consented, at a sacrifice, to represent Boston one year in the General Court, but declined a second nomination. He was a member of the city council at the time of his death, and also one of the standing committee of the Bar, with Samuel Hubbard, W. D. Sohier, John Pickering, Charles G. Loring, John R. Adan, and James T. Austin. "When his death was reported, a special meeting of the Bar was held and a resolution adopted to testify their respect for him by attending his funeral. This being declined on behalf of his family, whereupon it was motioned by John Pickering, Esq., and voted that the Bar of Suffolk are deeply impressed with the lamented decease of their late brother, Elijah Morse, Esq. His urbanity of manners and active usefulness will be testified by all, while his zeal and fidelity to his clients will be appreciated by those who met with him in the walks of his profession.

Voted, That the foregoing resolution be transmitted to his family as a testimonial of sincere sympathy in their loss of a father and a husband, who united the virtues of private to the energies of active life."

Hannah Peck was the dg. of Franklin P. of Onondaga Hollow, N. Y., who was the son of Wm. P. of Lyme, Ct., and

Juda Marvin. Wm. P. might have been a descendant of Mr. Joseph P.* of Hingham, the br. of Rev. Robert, A. M., of do., (for whose history see Bloomfield's Topographical History of Norfolk, Eng., also Cotton Mather's Mag.) "Mr. Joseph P., 1. (25) 1645, and three others, while riding to Seaconk, where they were about to settle, sheltered themselves and their horses in an Indian wigwam, which, by some occasion took fire, and (although they were all four in it and laboured to their utmost &c.) burnt three of their horses to death, and all their goods, to the value of £50." He is named in Winthrop's journal. He was appointed by the Court of Plymouth, July 3, 1656, to solemnize marriages at Rehoboth, and with two others to hear and determine all controversies there, "except the amount should exceed £3." He died Jan. 12, 1662. In his will he gave his gold ring to his son *Joseph*; to *Samuel* a silver baker and two silver spoons and one gold ring which had been his mother's; to *Nathl.* his biggest silver cup, one gold ring and two silver spoons; to *Israel* his silver salt—and two silver spoons. He had a dg.—Hubbut alias Hobart. Juda Marvin was the dg. of Dea. Renold Marvin of Lyme, and Betsey Kellogg, who d. at L. aged 110 years, distinguished for the prompt disposal of her hand. The story is this:—Dea. M., having lost his first wife some time previous, rode early one morning to her father's door, and without dismounting, knocked and inquired for Betsey. Promptly attentive, like other young ladies to the calls of single gentlemen, she was instantly at the door, not to receive a love letter, or a salutation in the form of good morning, but in the more welcome form of "Betsey, it has been revealed to me that you are to become my wife." The will of the Lord be done! exclaimed the damsel, with corresponding taste and congeniality of feeling, anticipating the reward of her submission in the richest husband in New London, Co. Whether the Deacon alighted to seal the engagement with a kiss, or put spurs to his horse and galloped off to enter his bands before the will of the Lord should alter, tradition does not inform us. By the brevity of their courtship they saved time to serve their generation; and it is needless to add that the marriage was a most happy one.

His brothers were Wm., Jona., Thomas, Oliver, and Nathan, (of Wilbraham,) father of Judge S., of Wayne Co., N. Y. Her mother was Hannah Thompson, dg. of Nathaniel T. and Hannah Mix,

I dare not trust fraternal affection in delineating the character of this sister. That she had a clear conviction and deep sense of evangelical truth, and aimed to deal faithfully with her own heart, is evident from a diary kept by her, for no mortal eye but her own; that she had talents for distinguished usefulness, which she had cultivated and consecrated to the noblest objects of female pursuit, is the testimony of others; and, had her life been spared to occupy the station in which Providence seemed about to place her, she would have proved no hindrance, it is believed, but a real helpmeet in the church. But she has ascended in triumphs* to serve in a higher station; and who, I would ask, has received her mantle? or does it now rest upon the ground? If any of you, my kindred, for whom she fasted, and wept, and prayed will make your way in impenitence to the judgment seat, her prayers will then all turn against you, and the remembrance of them plant daggers in your hearts for ever. But though dead, she yet speaks. Hear her, in the following lines, written on a hasty visit to the graves of our departed parents, and the desolate family mansion, one week previous to her death, while in perfect health, and dropped with a sister for insertion upon her headstone, which she directed to be placed with her remains beside the grave of our ever honored mother, in the event of her never more visiting the place:—

My morn was bright, my health was firm,
And youthful flatteries strewed my way;
I seized each phantom as it came,
And gave my life to pleasure's sway.

* Rev. Dr. Beecher, senior, her pastor, who repeatedly visited her in her short sickness, which was a disease of the heart, and heard her honest eloquence, pronounced hers one of the most triumphant deaths which he had ever witnessed.

6. Eunice Taft Morse married Oct. 7, 1841, Rev. John C. Smith, missionary of A. B. C. F. M., died at Oodooville, Ceylon, Ind., May 9, 1842, leaving a character that the race might contemplate with humility and gratitude; and I cannot but deeply regret the lack of space and time to present this character in a form to instruct, encourage, admonish, and warn the present and future generations of the race. To do it justice, would require a little volume; and such might ere this have been offered to the public, worthy of a place upon the same shelf with Harriet Newell and Fanny Woodbury, had not similar publications become so very common. Briefly, for the present, I would say that her mind, originally vigorous and sensitive, was early instructed in the doctrines of the Gospel, and guarded from contact with the glitter and dissipation of fashionable life, until early religious impressions had ripened under the Spirit of God into a sound hope, and indifference to temptations from such a quarter. Her religious character assumed its form at once, and such a form as might have been hoped for in a genuine convert under the ministry of Rev. Horatio Bardwell, once a missionary in India. She received a part of her education at the Female Seminary in Ipswich, and devoted herself subsequently to teaching. Milford, Bellingham, Upton, and other places enjoyed her labors, and testimonials from her pupils and employers show how ardently she was loved, and with what patience and assiduity she discharged her trust. Her desire to aid and urge forward her pupils was too strong for her constitution. These efforts, in connection with mental application out of school, had undermined her health ere the early and strongest desire of her pious heart, to help evangelize the heathen, could be gratified.

Hon. James K. Morse was blessed with pious parents. His father, when about to leave the world, manifested the greatest solicitude that this gifted son might preach the gospel, the importance of which he now more fully saw in the light of an opening eternity; and he received assurances on his dying bed that allayed his anxiety. The son pursued his collegiate course and entered a school in Miss., with a view to the fulfilment of his promise. A change now came over him. The reasons are to us unknown. If they were the prospects of more usefulness, he must have misjudged; if they were the evanescent honors of this world,* may the sequel of his history warn others, of rare gifts and attainments, with the vows of God upon them, against allurements so vain and often so fatal.

From Rev. Dr. Beecher of Boston.

"Mr. James K. Morse was known to me as a student in Illinois College. Whilst under my care as President of that institution, he was a diligent and successful student. He graduated with honor to himself, and great hopes were entertained by his instructors that he would be eminently useful in the ministry, to which it was his purpose to devote himself. His mind was rapid in its operations and discriminating in its perceptions. His address was pleasant and conciliating. His rapid rise to eminence in the law — which he ultimately selected as his profession — shows what he might have done as a minister of the gospel. The suddenness with which his earthly hopes were blasted, evinces in a striking light the worthlessness of all hopes that do not fix upon the eternal and imperishable honors of the kingdom of God. Though he has vanished like a dream from earth, faith follows his departing spirit to a brighter sphere. In that better world, may every one whose eye shall fall upon these lines prepare to meet him, and to dwell with God.


The following account of the horrible murder of Col. James K. Morse, of Hernando, Miss., appeared in the Memphis (Tenn.) Eagle, about Feb. 16, 1846.

* The distinction he so early attained as a Lawyer and candidate for Governor, (failing of an election by three votes only.) will not, when the splendor of his address and talents are considered, convict him of unchristian ambition or intrigue. On the contrary, he maintained a christian character, and was urged to accept the offices of Deacon and Elder in the Presbyterian church, with whom he regularly worshipped. He lost his life in consequence of having, as counsel, procured the acquittal of his client, accused of abducting Tyson's slaves.

"Col. M., in company with Mr. Bedford Forest, was on his way to attend the Chancery Court at Holly Springs; when riding along between Esq. McCarsons and Mr. Carruthers, he was met by Mr. James Dyson, of Marshall Co., who, with a double-barrel gun in his hand, accosted Col. M. thus:—

"‘You are the d——d rascal that hired a man to swear a lie against me.’ To which Col. M. answered in the negative. Dyson then called him ‘a d——d liar,’ to which Col. M. replied, ‘you are the liar if you say I did so.’ Whereupon D. shot him dead while sitting upon his horse, an ounce ball passing through his breast. When he fell, Mr. Forest alighted from his horse, and was in the act of raising Col. M.’s head from the ground, when D. told him to leave him or he would kill him in a minute. Forrest went on to Mr. Carruthers, and D. proceeded immediately to the Post Office, got some papers, and returned by the dead body of Col. M., by which a little boy was standing, and proceeded immediately to Holly Springs and employed a lawyer to defend him.

"Mr. Forest despatched a runner to Hernando, when our excellent sheriff, Col. James Murray, with eight or ten men, set off in pursuit of Dyson, to his plantation. A few moments after their arrival at his house, he returned from Holly Springs; they seized and secured him and brought him to our jail. The excitement against him is terrible; if he escapes popular vengeance, it will only be to be hung by the law, unless he effects his escape, which he need not hope. The body of Col. M. was brought home and buried during ill-suppressed excitement against the murderer. But so soon as a large concourse left the grave, a general rush was made for the jail, to hang up the murderer forthwith. But his poor, miserable, yet devoted wife was there, whose tears and anguish, and imploring pleas of mercy for her husband, were more than the enraged multitude could disregard, and they fell back, leaving the wretched and devoted wife alone with her husband. A meeting of the citizens will be held on Monday, and I have great fears the murderer will not be permitted to be tried by the laws. He is a most depraved monster, and even now gloats in his boasting of having killed a man in Madison, Tenn., besides two negroes. He deserves the most infamous death known to the laws."*

Page 1, No. LXXII.

Joseph Morse¹ of Ipswich, was probably one of the first of the name who settled in New England. The date of his arrival has not been preserved. He was probably among the early, but not the first proprietors and settlers of Ipswich, whose incor-

* The unhappy murderer was allowed two trials. The first resulted in his conviction; the second in his acquittal, at a cost of only \$40,000 paid for his defence, and the consciences of a second pannel.

poration took place 1633; for it is evident from their records that he was acting as a commoner with them 28, (12,) 1642, and the extent of his improvements, four years later, indicate an earlier commencement, than '41. The destruction of their earliest records precludes the hope of discovering his relative standing in the community; but from the company in which he is found, the uncommon education in his family, and the references in his will to copies of precious religious books, it is inferred that he was a person of standing and piety; and that by his prayers, and godly examples as well as by his sacrifices and enterprise, he has imposed everlasting obligations on his race, which, it is hoped, they will gratefully acknowledge in the erection of a monument to his memory. His will is dated 24, (2,) 1646. In this he gave a dwelling house to his wife Dorotha, his new cloak to his son Joseph, his great Bible to Hannah, and other Bibles and religious books to his children. To John he gave "his other house, all his apparel, a yearling heffer and three improved lots of land," which John sold on removing to Groton, Jan. 4, 1663, for £80. The father's estate was inventoried 28, (7,) 1646. His elder son Joseph had settled at Watertown, and, as a proprietor, drew 120 acres in the division of lands in that town, in 1637.

According to tradition, the evidence of early intercourse, and the identity of names given to their children, Joseph of Ipswich and Samuel, sen., of Dedham were brothers. Their father's name was probably John, of the West of England.

Page 74, No. LXXIII.

John Morse² took the freeman's oath, 1654, and "was accepted by the town of Groton to possess the allotment of John Lawrence, jun., which he is presumed to have purchased of him." Morse had a "twelve acre right" in the Common lands of Groton which would have entitled him upon partition, to above 650 acres, or more than one mile square. He was chosen Town Clerk from 1669 to the destruction of the place, by the Indians, March 13, 1676, N. S., by which event he became a severe sufferer, as appears from his petition for relief, to the honorable Council at Boston, Aug. 17, ensuing; alleging "that he, an inhabitant of Groton, had by the calamity of the war, been deprived of his estate and carried away captive by the enemy, and had not wherewith of his own to reimburse Mr. John Hubbard for the £5 paid down by him for his ransom."

On the 12th of 10th mo., 1677, he united with other selectmen in warning a general meeting at Concord of the dispersed inhabitants of G., and there subscribed, with eleven others, to the resolution —

"That if the Providence of God prevent not by death or sickness or by the enemy, that then we will go up in the Spring following and begin to repair our habitations again if God permit, and for the true performance of this agreement we do engage the forfeiture of

our whole right in G. unto those that do go up and carry on the work." "He was rechosen clerk in '79 and '80, and served many years as selectman. He was an excellent Town clerk, and copied by the appointment of the selectmen the transcript of the several proprietors' lands into a new book making a volume. Upon the 1st page he wrote,

' See that you set nothing in me,
But what you can prove true to be.' "

Three of his nephews, Jonathan, Joseph, and Jeremiah, became also proprietors of G., and Jonathan succeeded him as town clerk for five consecutive years, and served with him as selectman. John lived to endure the trials of the war of 1689, no less afflicting in alarms and the loss of life than the former had been, and died at Groton or Watertown in 1695, leaving a widow, Dina, but no sons to perpetuate his memory, and reap the rewards of his labors and sufferings.*

Page 75, No. LXXIV.

Guilford (Ct.) June th 22 : 1709.

" Dear and Loveing Wife after my hearty Love to your Selfe and my Children I would give you an account of the dealings of God towards me sence I left you: I was taken sick soon after I Came on bord, and was so sick all the way that I thought many times that the Seas must have ben my grave: but our Good God beyond my expectations has Brought me to Land and I am through much difficulty Goten to Guilford to my Cousin Jones and under her Care which is a Considerable Support to me under my Great affliction, and now my Dear Wife, though I have Great Reson to think that I shall not live to see you again, yet I hope through the Grace of God to meet you in Heaven and I must desier that you would not be greaved that I caim away from you, but Labour with me to Submit to the Holy will of God in this, as in all other of his dispensations toward us; and if I never see your face, this is my last request that you would labour with all diligence and faithfulness to bring our Children up in the fear of God; teach them to love and fear Honor and obey God and there Mother. I am not insensible that your work may be Difficult but go to God for wisdom and the Lord grant you the Comforting directing presances of his Holy spirit to Gide and Care you through all your Duty and difficultys: be Careful to keep good order in your family and if thear be any that will not Submit to Good order put them where they may: Give my Searvis to Mr. Angier and desier the prayers of the Congregation that if the Lord please I may be restored, if not, fitted for his Holy Will: So I Commit you and yours to the Grace and Conduct of my Dear Lord to whome

Rev. Wm. Morse,⁸ a Unitarian clergyman known as the author of several published discourses, has served as a stationed minister at Nantucket, Quincy, and Marlboro', prior to his settlement at Tewksbury. He was the first patron of this work.

Page 84, No. LXXVI.

Silvanus Morse,⁸ A. M., is advantageously known as a teacher. For years he was principal of the academy at East Bradford, but now keeps a select boarding school for lads, in a very accessible, yet retired and romantic location in West Boylston.

Page 85, No. LXXVII.

[From a Religious Magazine.]

Died, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. A. G. Story, at Little Falls, Herkimer county, on the morning of Monday, the 4th instant, the Hon. JAMES O. MORSE, of Cherry Valley, first Judge of Otsego county Courts, in the 50th year of his age.

In the death of Judge Morse, not only the immediate circle of his relatives and friends, but the whole community suffer a severe loss. Connected as he was with most of those institutions which have for their object the prosperity and good order of society, his loss is every where felt, and manifested in almost universal expressions of sympathy and regret.

He was born at the Farm in Marlboro', Massachusetts, on the 13th of February, 1788. When he was at the age of five years, his father left his native state, and removed with his family to Oneida county, N. Y. In the year 1804, he connected himself with the Hamilton Oneida Academy, (now Hamilton College,) then under the direction of the Rev. Robert Porter. He entered Union College in the year 1806, and received from that institution the degree of A. B. in the year 1809. In the same year he commenced the study of the law, under the direction of the late Isaac Seelye, Esq., in the village of Cherry Valley, where he subsequently commenced the practice of his profession, and has since continued to reside. In the year 1812 he was married to Mary G. Phillips, daughter of the late Rev. Andrew Oliver, of Springfield.

His intimate acquaintance not only with the general principles, but also with the practical details of his profession, and the untiring zeal and energy with which he prosecuted the business entrusted to him, immediately placed him in a conspicuous position among his brethren at the bar. In his business he was remarkable for energy, perseverance and despatch. No obstacles would prevent, or even much retard the consummation of

his purposes. He possessed strong powers of discrimination, and exhibited in the conduct of his affairs singular forecast and sagacity.

He was distinguished for great clearness and strength of intellect, and remarkable powers of memory. He seized almost intuitively the strong points of the subjects of his investigation, and presented his views to others with great energy and distinctness. To a clear and vigorous mind and a retentive memory, he brought the aids of untiring industry and indomitable perseverance. He labored as long as strength lasted, and often beyond his strength. In his public stations, he was distinguished for efficiency and promptitude. By diligent improvement of his time, he had amassed a vast amount of literary and scientific knowledge, all of which he endeavored to turn to practical account, and to make conducive to the public good. Indeed, he was indefatigable in the pursuit of general knowledge, and, considering the constant attention which the practice of a laborious profession demanded, his attainments were unusually great; perhaps few men of the present age have accumulated such large and diversified stores of miscellaneous knowledge. His information on almost every topic connected with the literature, science, religion, and politics of our own nation and of almost every other quarter of the globe, was seldom surpassed in its extent and variety.

As a speaker, he was ready, clear, and convincing. He was a practised and useful public writer. To this fact, the pages of the Magazine bear ample testimony; as many of the Reviews and other articles published in it are the productions of his pen. These papers were usually written with great rapidity, in moments snatched from the busy cares and pressing duties of a laborious public life. He contributed also frequently to other periodicals, and to several newspapers; among other pieces he was the author of a valuable series of numbers on Political Economy, which appeared about a year ago in the Albany Argus.*

For the last ten years of his life he was the presiding Judicial Officer of the Otsego County Courts; and we have the authority of the most eminent councillors in saying, that the important duties of his office were discharged with courteousness, promptness, and great legal ability. His charges to juries, and his legal opinions are spoken of as characterised by rigid impartiality and profound legal research.

About eighteen years ago he became a subject of regenerating grace, and connected himself with the Presbyterian Church in Cherry Valley, of which he was for nearly seventeen years

one of the ruling elders. "His loss," says the Rev. Mr. Lochead in his funeral discourse, from which the following is extracted, "will be long and deeply felt by this Church, for he ever proved himself to be one of its most active, consistent, and liberal members. He had a warm and generous heart, a large and liberal mind, and was ever ready to promote by his influence, his purse, and his pen, every moral and philanthropic object, and every Christian and patriotic cause. He had an eye to pity, and a heart to feel for the woes of the human race. And his was not the pity of the sentimentalist, who can weep over the tale of distress, but who will not move a step, or lift a finger, or sacrifice a cent to relieve it. No; never did our departed brother say to the naked, *be ye clothed*; to the hungry, *be ye fed*; to the ignorant, *be ye instructed*; or to the heathen, *be ye evangelized*; while he withheld from them the means of enjoying these comforts and blessings. He had not only a feeling heart, but an open and a liberal hand. He seemed to act under the profession which, as a Christian, he had made, that he was but the steward of God, and the almoner of his bounty to a suffering world and a struggling church; remembering the words of his Saviour:—"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done unto me." Hence the cause of Christ, both at home and abroad, found in him one of its most generous friends. He was one of the strongest pillars of the church, and one of the most liberal contributors to every benevolent object, and every Christian enterprise. He was peculiarly and deeply interested in the cause of missions. He watched the progress of evangelical religion, both in nominally Christian and in heathen lands. Hence the minute and particular knowledge which he had of the moral and religious character of almost every people and nation on the face of the globe. He was, in the best of senses, *a citizen of the world*. He looked upon man, and felt for him, to whatever people or nation he belonged, as a brother and an heir of immortality. He was therefore the munificent patron of the Bible, Missionary, Tract, and Education Societies, which are directly engaged in the blessed and glorious work of enlightening the dark places of the earth, of evangelizing the benighted heathen, and of sanctifying and saving the perishing sons of men in whatever country or clime they may be found. Hence, too, on the first Monday of every month you might calculate on meeting him at the monthly concert of prayer, when his liberal alms and fervent prayers were offered, and, we have reason to believe, ascended up to the God of Missions, as a memorial of his ardent and enlightened zeal for the glory of God, and the best interests of men, in the universal extension of the Redeemer's kingdom. It is worthy of remark here, as an evidence of his interest in the cause of Missions, that last winter, during the sitting of the County Court at Cooperstown, on the evening of the first Monday of February, he adjourned the

Court and invited his associates, and the members of the bar and others present, to attend the monthly concert. The place of meeting was crowded; and he delivered a very interesting discourse on the subject of Missions, in which he evinced his thorough knowledge of the operations of the church, and of the moral state of the various nations of the earth, and exhibited the true spirit of the gospel of Christ.

"As auxiliary to religion, he was the munificent patron of learning and the arts. He was the warm, steady, and enlightened friend of popular education. Indeed, among the last, if not the very last public act of his life, was consecrated to this important cause. He attended a convention of the friends of popular education at Cooperstown on the 14th of November, when he assisted in forming a county society for the improvement of Common Schools, and supported with his accustomed eloquence and zeal the judicious resolutions which were then passed. He had also prepared two excellent lectures on this subject, and delivered them in some of the towns of the county.

"It were vain to particularize the various objects of benevolence which found a place in his large heart, and efficient aid from his enlightened mind and liberal hand; for, as it has been justly said, 'the chord of sympathy for suffering of every kind found an answering vibration in his bosom.' Hence another trait of his benevolence. Like the stream from the living and overflowing fountain, it was spontaneous, full, and free. His deeds of benevolence, his acts of generosity, and his liberal contributions, were the natural and spontaneous expressions of the noble and generous sympathies of his heart. Believing the saying of the Lord Jesus, that it was more blessed to give than to receive, he esteemed it his privilege, and he felt it to be his happiness to give. He took great delight in aiding promising young men in obtaining an education for a profession. There are many men, now usefully employed in the ministry, at the bar, and in other pursuits, who are greatly indebted to him in this respect, and who gratefully attribute their present standing and success in their several vocations, to his kindness, and counsel, and seasonable aid.

"The wisdom that is from above, says the apostle James, is pure, peaceable, gentle, easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy. Those who knew him intimately can testify that these were the prominent characteristics of his heart and life. No better testimony need be borne to the purity of his heart and life, than that of a gentleman who attended him during the last two or three days and nights of his life. Then, when the strength of disease had overthrown reason, and his actions and expressions were the actings out of his prevailing habits of thought and feeling, unguarded and unrestrained by any prudential motives, and the mask, if he ever wore one, was thrown off, and the real man appeared —

then, amid the vagaries of his disturbed imagination, however disjointed and strange, all was perfectly pure and proper ; such as the most delicate eye and ear might witness and hear, betokening a pure heart, a chaste conversation, and a stainless life.

" All who had the happiness of an intimate acquaintance with the deceased, knew him to be peaceable, gentle, easy to be entreated, as well as full of mercy and good fruits. Some have thought that he cultivated these virtues even to a fault. He was eminently meek, gentle, peaceable, long-suffering and forbearing. No man can be so much in public and political life as he was, and in such times as these, without having his motives impugned, his actions misrepresented, and his character slandered. This was occasionally his lot, but never did I hear him retaliate in the least, or even hint at his grievances ; but when the malice or injustice of his slanderers was ever mentioned in his presence, he was ever ready to frame some apology for his enemies, to express his forgiveness, and to turn the attention of himself and those around him from such disagreeable subjects by introducing some new and interesting topics of conversation.

" Though as a Christian, his faith was shown by his works, and his union to Christ was manifested by the fruits of righteousness and peace which he brought forth, he was deeply sensible of his unworthiness in the sight of spotless purity ; and all his hopes of acceptance with God, and of a happy immortality, were founded solely on the merits of his Redeemer. After all the works of faith, and labors of love, and deeds of benevolence which he performed, he felt that he was an unprofitable servant ; and that if judged by his works only, he would have no hope of acceptance with God ; and his desire was to be found in Christ, not having his own righteousness which is of the law ; but having that righteousness which is of God by faith. His desire was to live in the Lord, and to die in the Lord ; we have reason to hope that the blessedness of such is now his ; that he has rested from his labors, and that his works have followed him."

" In all the various relations of life which Judge Morse sustained, public, ecclesiastical, social, and domestic, he was most exemplary. He was a learned and upright Judge, an affectionate husband, a tender and indulgent father, a humble and fervent Christian, a generous and devoted friend, a public-spirited citizen, and an active, enterprising and extensively useful man.

" His death was not less sudden and unexpected, than it was afflictive. He left home on the 22d of November, to transact some professional business in Montgomery County. He was arrested on his way by an attack of typhus fever, which deprived him of his reason and baffled all human efforts. He was carried from Fonda to the residence of his son-in-law, at Little Falls, where he received every aid and attention that medical skill, affection, and friendship could bestow ;— but all in vain. On Saturday, the 2d of December, he appeared to recognise those who ad-

dressed him, and would answer their questions when aroused; and we have reason to believe that he was then sensible of his low state, from the fact that in the afternoon, during a short lucid interval, he offered a coherent, appropriate, and most fervent and affecting prayer, and relapsed immediately into a state of stupor. On Sabbath morning, he endeavored to sing a line or two of a hymn, and was observed by those around him to be apparently engaged in calling upon the Lord. In the evening he seemed to be fast sinking into the arms of death. His family and friends being anxious to know the state of his mind at this crisis, his afflicted wife aroused him, and asked him if he found Christ to be precious to him now; he raised both his hands, and with great animation answered: '*Yes that INDEED I do!*' She again asked him, 'Do you put your trust in him?' He fervently replied, '*Yes, Yes.*' These were the last words he uttered. He continued fast failing until 4 o'clock the next morning, when, without a groan or a struggle, he peacefully expired.

"He left an aged mother, an afflicted widow, three sons and two daughters to lament his loss. His remains were carried to Cherry Valley, and there interred.

Page 87, No. LXXVII.

The General Court early granted Doct. John Alcock, of Roxbury, a farm of 1,000 acres at Assabath River, which had been laid out and settled as early as 1657; for by virtue of a grant in May of that year to John How and company of Sud. for a plantation at Whipsufferage, (Marlboro') they immediately laid claim to meadows included in Alcock's grant, and mowed them, which occasioned altercation. To settle the dispute A. agreed to relinquish 200 acres to them in case the General Court should confirm the plantation laid out to them, and they settle a town there and agree with the Indians; and they agreed to bind themselves, &c., in the sum of £300 not to interfere or prevent him or his from quietly enjoying all the remainder of his grant. This agreement was entered into July 27, 1657, A. having in the May preceding procured from the Court a confirmation of the grant previously made him, proceeded to strengthen his title by obtaining the next day the following deed from the Indians.

"Know all men to whom these presents shall come, that we Peter, Josias Hoddin, and Solomon, inhabitants of the Indian town of Whipsufferage, have for divers causes and considerations us moving thereunto in the name of Annamaed, Nusquas and the rest of the inhabitants of the said town of Whipsufferage freely and fully granted unto John Alcock (Physician) of Roxbury, power to take possession of all that land formerly granted by the General Court, and confirmed by the General Court May 1657, unto the said John, his heirs, executors and assigns forever,

In witness hereof we have set to our hand and seal, this 28 of July, 1657. In presence of Samuel Hooker, Thomas Holland.

Another deed to Doct. A., of the farm, probably of later date, is said to exist, signed by twenty-five Indians. The same number and probably the same Indians who subscribed at Natick, a deed for Marlboro' for £31. The farm was not annexed to Marlboro' until the 18th century.

Doct. Alcock (now Alcott) belonged to the nobility of the colony; and, as was then their custom, improved the Farm as a kind of manor. He is presumed to have built the splendid house, for those days, which stood one hundred and fifty years on the spot now occupied by the mansion of Stephen Morse, Esq., and which, defended by a neighboring garrison, escaped the torch of the enemy often seen skulking about during the 2nd or 3d Indian war. Hither Doct. Alcock and his family occasionally retreated, it is believed, until his wife and daughters had contracted such an attachment that she interfered with her husband in making his will, requesting or demanding that her daughters should have their whole portion in the farm. The Doctor accordingly, in 1666, left "the Farm of 1000 acres, at Assabath River, with stock and utensils," to Anna, Sarah, and Mary, who, in 1670, were the wives of John Williams of Boston, (probably of the firm of Morse & Williams,) Zack. Whitman of Hull, and Joshua Lamb of Roxbury. In 1690, John Alcock, their brother, deceased, possessed of one sixth of the farm, then appraised at £30. The Heirs of Doct. Alcock and of his son John, in '91-2, are presumed to have sold a part, or all of their shares to Joseph and Samuel Morse, whose patrimony must have been adequate to the purchase. Joseph settled in the house built by Alcock; Samuel built a little distance W. S. W., and their junior brother Jonathan afterwards bought and settled on a tract adjoining to the farm, and built at a short distance west of Samuel, so that one garrison might protect their three families. Their removal transferred the seat of the family from Watertown, and from that day to the present, the plantation of Stephen Morse, Esq., with the adjacent Morse Cemetery in Marlboro', has been the geographical centre of the race of Joseph¹; it now offers an inviting spot for a monument to his memory.

Page 87, No. 12, 9th and 21st lines.

Gardner Morse, Esq., of New Haven, a valued correspondent, has contributed most of the following genealogy of his mother's family:

"Rebecca How, (wife of Stephen Morse,) a lineal descendant of John How, Esq., (son of John How of Hodinhule, Eng-

land,) who was one of the earliest proprietors and settlers of the town of Sudbury. He took the freeman's oath May 13, 1640, and was Selectman and Marshall in 1642. He was one of the thirteen inhabitants of said town who petitioned for a tract of land, eight miles square, for the town of Marlboro', in 1656. He was a proprietor of Marlboro', and, according to tradition, the first English person who came to reside in the town. He lived near the Indian planting field, conciliating, by his great prudence and kindness, his savage neighbors, and enjoying their highest respect and confidence, being made their umpire in all their difficulties. In 1661 he was licensed to keep a house of entertainment, and kept the same when there were but two houses between his tavern and Worcester. His descendants occupied the same place for many generations. He died about 1686, (his will was proved June 19, 1689,) and had by his wife Mary, (who died about 1698,) twelve children, born between 1641 and 1663, ten sons and two daughters, of whom the second son, *Samuel*, born Oct. 20, 1642, married Martha Bent, in 1663, and had, in Sudbury, before 1675, seven children, of whom the seventh, *David*, born Nov. 2, 1674, married Hephzibah Death, in 1700, and kept the "How Tavern," at Sudbury, which has been continued by his descendants of the same name, upon the same spot, uninterruptedly to the present time; the same being now owned and kept by Lyman How, Esq. He had six children between 1702 and 1721, of whom *David*, the fifth, born 1717, married *Abigail Hubbard*, * March 15, 1743, or 2, and had ten children, Bulkely, Persis, Peter, Abigail, Joseph, Israel, Alice, David, *Rebecca*, (married Stephen Morse,) and Lucy.

The descendants of John How, now living at Marlboro' and other towns in the vicinity, are very numerous. They sustain generally, as is believed, a reputation which reflects no dishonor upon their ancestry, many of whom were distinguished as lead-

* Abigail Hubbard was the daughter of Joseph Hubbard and Rebecca Bulkely, and granddaughter of Jonathan Hubbard and Rebecca Brown, both of Concord, married Sept. 26, 1704; and great-granddaughter of John Hubbard, whose relation to the enemy enabled him, in 1676, to redeem John Morse from captivity. John H. was *very probably* the nephew or brother of Rev. Wm. H., the historian, the son of Mr. Wm. H., who removed from Ipswich to Boston, 1662. Rebecca Bulkely was the daughter of Joseph Bulkely, who married Hannah Merriam, (daughter of Joseph Merriam, and granddaughter of Joseph Merriam,) and through this line, from Thomas Stow and Grace Chitwood, daughter of Sir Richard Chitwood.

Joseph Bulkely was the son of Peter Bulkely, and grandson of Peter Bulkely, and great-grandson of Rev. Edward Bulkely, D. D., (who married Olive Irlby,) and great-great-grandson of Thomas Bulkely and Elizabeth Grovener; and great-great-great-grandson of William Bulkely, and of the 6th generation from Humphrey Bulkely, and the 7th from Hugh Bulkely, and the 8th do. from John Bulkely and Andryne Colley, (daughter of John Colley and Nicholas Bird,) and the 9th do. from Peter Bulkely, and the 10th, from Robert Bulkely, and the 11th, from William Bulkely, and the 12th, from Robert, one of the English Barons, who in the reign of King John, (who died 1216,) was Lord manor of Bulkely, i. e. the County of Palatine of Chester.

ing men, and pioneers in the new settlements, and all, so far as is known, as fearless and undaunted in times of peril and alarm. Of the early members of the family, *John*, son of John first named, was killed in an engagement with the Idians, April 20, 1675, *Thomas*, another son was a Colonel, Sheriff, and Justice of the Peace, and one of the leading men of the town of Marlboro', for many years. *Ezekiel*, a great-grandson of John, and grandson of Samuel, and son of David, was Lieutenant Colonel of the Militia, who met and opposed the British troops at Concord, on the memorable 19th of April, 1775, and pursued them on their retreat. *Isreal* and *David* (sons of David, second, and wife Abigail) were in the same engagement. The coat of arms of John How, the original received by him from England being now in possession of Lyman How, at the "How Tavern," in Sudbury, bears the following inscription :

How, E^t. of Lancaster and Baron How of Wormleighton. 1st Commissary of the Treasury, 1st Gentleman of y^e bedchamber to his Majesty, Knight of the Garter and one of y^e Gov^r of the Charter house. Created Baron How of Wormleighton in y^e County of Warwick Nov. 18th, 1606 in y^e 4th of James y^e 1st and E^t. of Lancaster June y^e 8th 1643, in y^e 19th of Charles y^e 1st, of this family which derived themselves from a younger branch of y^e antient Baron How's men famous many ages since in England, among which were Hugh How y^e Father and Son great favorites of King Edward y^e 2d.

Anthony came from Marlborough, England, and, like Samuel of Dedham, belonged to that class of Puritans who strove to separate from the corruptions of the established church while they continued in her; and the date of his separation synchronizes with that of his embarkation for New England, 1635. Few materials are supplied, either by records or tradition, illustrative of his history. That he was a man of moral courage, energy, and perseverance; that he was enterprising and capable in business, and laid the foundation of the competence and wealth of his family; that he was called to public trusts of civil and sacred character; that he reared pious and distinguished children; led a long life of strict integrity and humble piety, fearing God and loving his people, no one can doubt who attends to the records of the community in which he lived and died. The character of his descendants is an eulogium upon his piety. So generally inclined to a godly walk were the five first generations of his race, that it was loosely but proverbially said in reference to them, that it was as natural for the Morses to be religious as for certain other families to be vicious! And I have met with many; I am confident there are many hundreds of his race now living and rejoicing in hopes, whose spiritual lineage, as certain as their natural, can be traced to him without a break of one generation. But alarmingly different have I found it in tracing certain families of other names, living in the midst of evangelical churches, and hearing the same doctrines, who for five generations at least have not afforded a single instance of piety or even profession of it!

Anthony, senior, settled about half a mile S. of the most ancient cemetery in Newbury (Old Town), on a slight eminence in a field now owned by Michael Little, and still called the Morse Field, where the trace of his house, a few rods from the road, is yet perfectly visible, affording a beautiful spot for a monument to his memory.

Be it known unto all men by these presents, that I, Anthony Morse, of Newbury, being sick and weak of body, but of perfect memory, desire heere to make my last will and testament, commending my soul into the hands of my blessed Redeemer,

and my body to the dust from whence it was taken, in assured hope of a blessed resurrection; and do heere dispose of my worldly goods as followeth: *Imp^s*. I give and bequeath unto Mary my wife, my goods and cattle and apoint her to be sole executrix of this my last will and testament; and to have all my house and all my land in her possession till my son Anthony shall be of the age of one and twenty years, and he my son Anthony shall live with her until he be eighteen years of age, and then I would have him put to learn a trade; and if my wife shall change her condition, then my said son when he is of the age of one and twenty years, shall have my house, barne, orchard, and all my land and freehold, for himself and heirs forever, paying to his three brothers, viz. Joseph, John and Peter ten pound apiece and to his sister Mary ten pounds, when they shall be of age of one and twenty years, but if my said wife Mary shall not marry again, she shall have the house and land in her possession until my son Anthony shall marry, and then the said house and land, to be divided between them during my wives life and after to be wholly to the use of my son Anthony, and then when the house come wholly into his hands, then within four years after he shall pay the abovesayd forty pounds to his three brothers and sister abovesayd, and also pay to his sister Elizabeth, forty shillings at the day of her marriage, and I also give to my daughter Elizabeth her own mother's apparrell, and I also desire my son Joseph may be put to learn a trade, that is I desire he may be a taylor, and for my funeral to be discharged by my executrix. This is my last will and testament revoking all other wills. In witness wherof I have set to my hand and seal.

Page 107, No. LXXXI.

Rev. James Morss, D. D., of Newburyport, was not unknown to the author, while serving as stated supply for several months to the 2nd Presbyterian Church in Newburyport, in 1819. The

acquaintance then commenced inspired the highest esteem; and I delight to record his high character in the following extract from a sermon preached at his interment by Rev. Chas. Burroughs, D. D., of Portsmouth:—

“ His story is brief. There are not circumstances about it to give it romance. One feature in it, however, was very bright and perfect. It was the feature, or rather the grace of godliness, which irradiated the whole path of his pilgrimage, and rendered him, in that respect, ‘a burning and a shining light.’ Descended from respectable and pious parents, he was born in Newburyport, October the 25th, in the year 1779. His early tuition was at your public schools, where he was distinguished for industry, gentleness, purity, love of truth, and kindness of heart. After receiving the common rudiments of education, he was apprenticed to his father, at quite an early age, as a joiner. But God had other work for him to do. He had not been long engaged in his mechanical pursuits when an accident occurred that altered the destination of his life. He fell on the ice and broke his wrist. The apparent misfortune led him to relinquish his profession for the more congenial pursuit of intellectual culture, which carried him with high merit, through his collegiate course at Cambridge, to the momentous office of the ministry. How little do we understand or reason upon the movements of Providence. How often does God render disappointments our greatest mercies, and send them as the most effectual agents of his love. There is an infinitely kind hand that constantly orders our footsteps; that often frustrates human plans, and our obstinate, blind wills; and, for our ultimate good and his own glory, decides our lot. That divine interposition, by a peculiar voice, changed a parent’s will, and made our departed brother a ‘faithful minister of Christ.’ In his seventeenth year he entered Harvard College, where he held a high literary reputation in his class, which contained many excellent scholars. Some of them rank among our most eminent men in theology, jurisprudence, science, and the arts. Among the departed of that class, we mention with enthusiasm the classical and eloquent Buckminster, one of the most delightful of men and of preachers; among the living, are the distinguished Chief-Justice of this Commonwealth, several clergymen of great learning and piety, and also an artist, who in his profession is perhaps inferior to none in his own country, and to few in any other. Yet amidst so many bright scholars, our departed brother was graduated in the year 1800, with a fair fame and high standing; and he acquitted himself in the public exercise that was then assigned to him with great credit. Soon after leaving college he determined to devote himself to the pastoral profession. Though his early education was not among Episcopalians, yet, at the commencement of his theological studies, there were various circumstances that disposed his mind favorably towards the Episcopal Church. He examined diligently and impartially its doctrines and polity, and placed himself as a student under the instruction and counsel of the venerable and amiable Dr. Bass, then Bishop of Massachusetts. At that time little was the Episcopal Church known; strong were the prejudices against it. So feeble was its condition, that it had only sixteen ministers in the five States that

afterwards composed the Eastern diocese. Notwithstanding all these discouraging circumstances, our departed brother attached himself to our ecclesiastical polity with great firmness and ardor. He received Deacon's orders on the 3d day of July, in the year 1803, from the Rt. Rev. Bishop Bass, and officiated as his assistant in the Church where we are assembled, until the death of that beloved prelate, an event which occurred on the 10th of September, in the year 1803. In the ensuing month of November he was invited to become the rector of this church, and entered immediately on the duties of his office. On the 11th of June, in the year 1804, he was admitted to Priest's orders in the Church Du Saint Esprit, in the city of New York, by the Rt. Rev. Benjamin Moore, Bishop of the diocese of New York. For almost thirty-nine years, he has been your faithful minister of Christ. Melancholy have been the changes among those who were officiating in the States of the Eastern diocese when he was ordained. Almost all of them are dead. Only two continue to reside in the diocese. One is our venerable Bishop; the other is the only Episcopal clergyman in these Eastern States that has been continued a Rector of the same church longer than our deceased brother. That aged presbyter is the Rev. Mr. Fowle, who has been more than fifty years connected with the church in Holderness, N. H. Your beloved pastor was honored with a doctorate in divinity by the College of New Jersey, at Princeton, in the year 1826, at the annual commencement of that institution. During the long course of his ministry he has enjoyed an unusual portion of health; he has been constant in attendance on all his duties, and deeply interested in the temporal as well as spiritual welfare of his flock. He has experienced many trials, and has always exhibited under them great Christian firmness, submission, and improvement. It was not his sad lot to have any trials touching his pastoral union. There perhaps never was a happier sacerdotal connection than that which subsisted between him and his church. But it is the immutable law of God, that the closest and most tender union shall be dissolved. For several weeks past, our departed brother has suffered from a severe cold, so that he discharged his duties with much labor and inconvenience. He was unwilling to show himself any favor, or in any way to relax his services. A few days since, he was suddenly attacked with a violent disease, attended with many alarming symptoms, that seemed the sad precursors of death. He met the disorder with great calmness and submission; but it filled his family, parishioners, and all who heard of it, with consternation and sorrow. Their fears were realized, for it proved his last sickness. It was brief. You know with what faithfulness, interest, and emotion he attended, though feeble, to all the services of his church during the affecting season of Passion Week. You doubtless remember the touching sentiments and admonitions of his last discourse, which was a funeral sermon, preached about three weeks since, on the first Sunday after Easter. It seems to have been the precursor of his own decease, and ought to have left a deep, salutary, and permanent impression on his hearers. It was only a week since that his indisposition assumed a dangerous form. It was my privilege to pass last Saturday with him. He was very feeble, so that it was thought inexpedient to propose to him the reception of the communion. While

sitting at his bedside, he solicited me to read the office for the visitation of the sick. Taking the prayer-book, though contrary to the advice of those around him, he engaged earnestly in the service, and in tones firm and fervent, he made the responses. At the conclusion of the service, he said, 'This comprehends all that I could desire; it meets my wishes and feelings.' With great humility he confessed his conviction that he had fallen far short of his duty. I remarked that our justification was only by faith in the merits of Jesus Christ as 'a full, perfect, and sufficient oblation and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world.' He cordially assented to my views, and expressed great feeling and satisfaction at them. His mind was perfectly calm; and he gave assurance in all his sufferings in the course of that affecting day, when we were thus permitted to meet together, that he was indeed a godly man. Nor was it on that day only that he afforded such testimony; for it was conspicuous and powerful in all his life. It was not my privilege to see him again. On Tuesday morning last, about one o'clock, when no one was with him but his faithful and affectionate friend, one of his wardens, who was his watcher, he suddenly, and without any warning or struggle, expired. A disorder of the heart, attended with some other functionary derangement of the system, seemed the probable cause of his dissolution.

"Even until he finished his course, he kept the faith. Awful as was the blow that thus numbered him with the dead, still we cannot fail to adore the divine mercy that spared him from the visitation of a long and distressing sickness, and from an infirm and afflicted old age. The dread summons for his departure found him ready, with 'his loins girt, his lamp trimmed and burning.' The certainty and nearness of death, and the duty of preparing to meet his Judge at the last great day, were topics familiar to his mind, which he deeply felt and faithfully preached. It is a singular fact, that the last sermon which he wrote, but which he was not spared to preach, was on these striking words, 'Verily, verily, I say unto you, the hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God; and they shall hear and live.' How affecting is this text, which our departed brother chose as his last theme. How prophetically it seemed to be a warning of his own decease; how clearly it told, not only that the hour was coming, but that it then was; that it had actually come to him; that he was on the verge of the eternal world, when he should hear the voice of the Son of God and should indeed live. How appropriate was the subject for the closing meditations of his ministry! How much better would it have been for me to have taken that discourse for the present occasion; it would be vastly more appropriate and affecting than any thing that I can say. It would be the pathetic persuasion of lips that are sealed in death. It would be the most fitting instruction and resistless eloquence for this solemn hour. Death found him a godly man. You all know that he was so. His discourses, full of sound doctrine, earnest exhortation, and impressive language; his benignant expression of features; his natural, easy, and devotional manner of reading the Church service; his tenderness and feeling in administering the Communion; his affectionate and spiritual demeanor in his intercourse with the sick and afflicted; all these bear witness that he

was a godly man. As such he lived, and as such he died. He practised what he preached; he felt what he uttered; and he always endeavoured to act, with the aids of divine grace, so as to make himself a godly man.

"He was a godly minister of Christ. He was learned in the Scriptures, and he elaborately searched them with humility and prayer. He was sound in 'the faith once delivered to the saints.' He was an able defender of the Trinity, justification by faith, the necessity of conversion, repentance, and a holy life, the doctrines of grace and of salvation by the alone merits of the atoning blood of Jesus Christ, as our Redeemer. He was a true and thorough Churchman, learned in ecclesiastical polity, and faithful in the observance of our rites and discipline. His was a pure and reasonable service, free from fanaticism and bigotry. He was an able and scriptural preacher; for he made the word of God his text-book, and not the philosophical works of man. His manner of preaching was simple, impressive, and beautiful; he was ever seeking to 'speak the truth in love.' His whole heart was engaged in the spiritual improvement of his flock, and he had no other ambition or desires. Rightly did he 'divide the word of truth;' and the food that he gave to his hearers was the heavenly manna. His theme was constantly 'Christ crucified.' The great doctrine of the atonement was never absent from his discourses. He was interested in the spiritual nurture of the young; loved most affectionately the children of his Sunday School, considered it as one of his most valuable fields of duty, and not only gave it his prayers, wishes, and patronage, but his faithful and unwearied personal services. He was a man of prayer, and lived very much in intercourse with his God; and we have every reason to say that he was indeed a godly minister of Christ.

"A spirit of godliness was evinced in all his moral traits. Notwithstanding his learning, talents, acquirements, influence, and distinction, he was eminent for humility. The estimate that he formed of his own abilities and worth was very far below that which was formed of him by those who best knew him. There was a delicate, shrinking, retiring manner about him, which ever touched our sensibility and conciliated our tender regard. He was full of philanthropy and disinterestedness. He thought at all times of others, and not of himself; and he often suffered great personal sacrifice from his too ready and active generosity. He was also full of sympathy, and the feelings of the poor and afflicted took full possession of his soul, so that he was unhappy till he had done all in his power to relieve them. Never was a fonder parent, a more faithful husband, or a more true friend; and his gentleness and kindness were as bright and constant at home, as they were in his social intercourse with his parishioners, or amidst his devotions and preaching in this house of prayer. He had great personal firmness, decision and energy, however, wherever any exigency demanded them. His hand was as open as his heart in melting charity. His tongue was the law of truth as well as of goodness; and every one revered him for his scrupulous veracity. That he was a constant, genuine, precious and disinterested friend, I have the fullest conviction from experience. For more than thirty years I have known, felt, and esteemed his friendship as one of my richest blessings.

He had a delightful spirit of submission. His trials caused him neither murmuring nor despondency ; but only served to awaken a stronger confidence in his God. To what ever vicissitudes, vexations, or embarrassments he might be exposed, yet he ever evinced under them the most perfect equanimity of temper. He was true and just in all his dealings. He never said or did any thing intentionally to wound another's feelings. He was courteous and affectionate, and secured an universal popularity. He was a most valuable and efficient member of society. He warmly patronized all the institutions established for the public good. The cause of learning and education was very dear to him. He did all that was in his power to sustain, elevate, and improve your schools, lyceums, and philanthropic societies. He was a beautiful living example of virtue. He moved in his various duties with such constant and striking excellence before your eyes, as to cause virtue to be admired ; and he so constantly diffused its graces over your hearts, as to cause it to be loved. Though firm in his belief of the essential importance of the doctrines and discipline of the Episcopal church, and though devoted to them with the warmest affections of his heart, yet he betrayed no intolerance or uncharitableness in his opinions towards those who differed from him. He mingled amongst all classes and denominations of men as a brother ; and fastened to him all who knew him, by his bright, warm chain of tender Christian sympathy. Surely he was a godly man.

"Did time allow us, we might dwell very long on his other excellencies of heart and life. We might speak of his merits as a scholar ; of his ability as a writer ; and of the numerous and valuable articles which, through the press, he has given to the public, for the benefit of learning, religion, and virtue. Those able productions are before the world. We might tell of his high standing in the Church ; of the ecclesiastical offices that have been conferred on him ; of the ability with which he has discharged them ; and of his weighty influence in our ecclesiastical councils. We might praise his merits as a public speaker, where he was successful in the exhibition of just and enlightened sentiments, graceful delivery, and classical diction. We might commend his dignified demeanor, benevolent features, and attractive courtesy. We might dwell upon the good that he has done in the Church ; of his spiritual labors and triumphs among his own flock ; and of his acceptableness, wherever he went, as a gentleman and a companion, as a Christian and a preacher."

Page No. 119, LXXXII.

Hon. Charles Morse of Wilton, Me., removed from Sutton to Maine, a poor boy of 15, without hardly the advantages of a common school education. In 1809, he settled in Wilton, where he resided until death.

In early life, he suffered the vicissitudes and deprivations not unusual in a newly settled country ; but by his perseverance and integrity, he succeeded in acquiring the confidence and esteem of the community, and became a highly esteemed and influential citizen of Wilton ; enjoying that popularity which is not sought after, but which follows from a just appreciation of mor-

al and intellectual worth, directed by a sound and discriminating judgment, and that practical wisdom called common sense. Hence his counsel was sought after by his neighbors in their individual concerns, by the town in the management of its municipal affairs, by the militia as its commander, and by his fellow-citizens as a senator and representative in the State Legislature. In all these situations he acquitted himself with honor. In his deportment he was modest and courteous. In his habits he was temperate, industrious, and frugal, that his hospitality might be the more extended. His benevolence and sympathy embraced all the sons and daughters of affliction without distinction of sect, clime or *color*. The sick, the dying, and the mourning were the peculiar objects of his solicitude; and more frequently than any other man whom the writer has ever known, did Col. Morse, while his own health permitted, watch by the sick-bed of his neighbors, whether rich or poor; and his judgment and experience in such cases rendered his services most valuable. But it was reserved for the religion of Jesus to chasten and polish a character already estimable in the sight of man. The solemn and all important declaration that "man must be born again," was in 1823 deeply impressed upon his mind, and led him to see his own lost condition, and flee to the hope set before him in the gospel. In the Saviour, with the eye of faith, he saw the all atoning sacrifice for sin; he repented and believed, and humbly sought at the foot of the cross, pardon and peace. Publicly professing that Saviour whom he had found and whom he loved, he united with a branch of his visible church, in 1824; and from that time became a useful, active, and consistent member. The missionary cause, the temperance cause, and the cause of *universal freedom* found in him a hearty supporter, an ardent advocate. He contributed liberally to the support of the Gospel, and delighted in the instituted duties of religion. In the prayer meeting and the conference room, his fervent prayers and affectionate exhortations to the unconverted, we have strong reasons to believe have been under the blessing of God, the means of great good.

He suffered for a long time from a disease of the lungs, yet he endured his sufferings without a murmur or complaint, awaiting his appointed time; and when it arrived he calmly sunk to rest.

Page 122, No. LXXXIII.

Woodstock 1 Feb. 1745.

To the Rev. Mr. Cleaveland, Boston.

Dear Brother,

We are all in bodily health. Your sister has been wonderfully strengthened, and her bowels of compassion have been drawn out for this people in such a wonderful manner, that it seems as if the soul and body would part asunder. The last Monday in January, the Lord gave me a sight to see some

of my neighbours persecuting the blessed Jesus. It seems to me that the enemies of the Lord grow stronger against me; and the Lord has brought me out of this church. Dear brother, I desire your prayers and the prayers of your people for me, and not only for me and mine, but also for this destitute people that I live amongst. We are in a pitiful condition. Mr. Barker has left us: and we desire that you would send a letter [informing us] where we can get a minister; and send word how long it will be before you come this way yourself. There are several that desire to hear you preach. Your brother is under great concern by times. And so we remain your loving brother and sister, Joseph and Kezia Morse.

Page 123, No. LXXXIV.

Rev. Jedediah Morse, D. D., of Charlestown, Mass, the father of American Geography, and for a series of years one of the most distinguished men in this country, had no obituary published of him at the time of his death. This neglect may have occurred from the conviction then entertained by his acquaintances that his sons would shortly favor the public with a full history of his eventful life. This has been delayed. But as it is still expected, and his character sure of preservation by others, I shall not presume, unsupplied as I am with the requisite information, to attempt more than a deficient outline.

He was the son of a highly respectable farmer and magistrate, for whom I have heard him express the highest filial gratitude and respect; and the records of Woodstock and the traditions of the aged, show how well such regards were deserved, and lead to the belief that in the valuation of the natural minds and moral merits of his distinguished family, down to the present generation, and that in the final award of honors, this revered sire will come in for the first, the greatest share.

Dr. Morse was graduated with distinction at Yale College, where he was appointed Tutor, studied his profession, and also taught a private school. The want of geographies in his seminary induced him to prepare notes for his pupils, to serve as text books, which he at length had printed. This was the origin of his labors in this field of learning. He had an original passion for geography, which tradition says rendered him so absent minded that once in reciting Greek, being asked by his teacher where a verb was found, replied, upon the coast of Africa. The Rev. Dr. Holms, his fellow-townsmen and student, having married the daughter of Pres. Styles, and received a call from the church in Cambridge, is presumed to have introduced Dr. Morse at Charlestown, where he spent most of his days in the relation of pastor to the first Congregational church.* When advanced

* Dr. Morse was peculiarly happy in his domestic relations. His lady was of a family distinguished for piety and refinement, and descended from ancestors of the first standing in New Jersey. Her talents fitted her for extensive influence in society; and few women, it is believed, have ever occupied a similar station in Massachusetts with more dignity and usefulness.

in life, with health somewhat impaired, he relinquished his charge, having received an appointment from the department at Washington to visit and report the state of the Indian tribes in the interior. Having made this visit and given in his report at Washington, which was afterwards published, making a large volume, he retired to New Haven, where he not long after closed his active, useful life. That he had a powerful constitution, and a mind of rare activity, enterprise, and fertility, must be inferred from the amount of his ministerial labors; the number, size, and variety of works which he prepared for the press. That he was respectable as a writer, and attained a transatlantic reputation is evident from his geography having been made a text book in the seminaries of Great Britain, and from D. D. having been conferred on him at Edinburgh. Yet his style was diffuse and prosey; his sermons more edifying than pithy or moving; and his productions indicate general information rather than profound knowledge or originality of mind. Still he could write with force, as is evident from an able review in the *Panoplist* for 1814, or '15, in which he appears as the leader of a forlorn hope at the commencement of the first theological battle between the Orthodox and Unitarians in New England. This article promises to outlast all his other writings; for, while his geographies, gazeteers, and histories have been superseded, or must as inevitably be as the prices current; and while his controversies with competitors for authorship have been consigned to an oblivion from which they will never be withdrawn; yet this review, the publication of which marks an epoch in our ecclesiastical history, together with his agency in founding religious and charitable institutions, and fitting out missions to foreign countries, secures the transmission of his name to the people of another age.

Page 123, No. LXXXV.

Extract from the discourse preached at the funeral of J. C. Morse, Esq., by Rev. Edgar Perkins, Pastor of Congregational Church, Lockport, N. Y.

"Joseph Carpenter Morse was born in Columbia County, in the year 1800 his age always running accurate with the century. His early years were spent under the paternal roof in the place of his nativity, enjoying such educational advantages, and engaging in such industrial employments as were usual for young persons in his circumstances. As the period of manhood approached, his father's family and himself with them, removed to Courtland County in the central part of this State, where he completed his academical and legal studies. After his admission to the bar he united himself in marriage with an estimable member of one of the most respectable families in that county, and opening an office for legal practice in the village of Courtlandville, settled in that place. Successfully and satisfactorily conducting that proportion of the business of the profession in

that place and vicinity which his abilities, diligence, and address did not fail to secure to him, he continued to reside there for about four years, when he removed to this village, becoming one of its early inhabitants, and one of the oldest, as he has always been one of the principal members of the bar, of the county. From that period to the time of his sudden and unexpected death, now so widely felt and so deeply deplored, his history is amply within the means of your knowledge, and I may forbear remark."

Page 125, No. LXXXV¹/₂.

Professor Samuel Finley Morse of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., had a passion for painting as innate as his father's for geography ; and in his youth the blank margin of his Virgil was more attracting to his pencil, than the text to his eyes ; and many a curious figure arose there in the absence of his teacher's eye. At the age of 15 he carried this passion with him to college, where, a fracas occurring among the students, supplied a theme for his pencil to the diversion of his fellow-students. The caricature reflecting upon some of the faculty, who had interfered, was seized and handed to President Dwight, and Morse was called up. After receiving his acknowledgement without signs of penitence, the President began to lecture him on wasting his time, breaking college laws, not observing his engagements, dishonoring and displeasing his father, disappointing and grieving his mother, &c. ; but Morse heard it all unmoved. At length said Dr. Dwight, "Morse, you are no painter ; this is a rude attempt, a complete failure," &c. This cut him to the heart, and he was dismissed. As he returned to the College, weeping, he was met by students inquiring, "What did Dr. Dwight say to you ? What has he done ?" "He says I am no painter," roared Morse, with the pain of a wound in his darling passion.

The eminence he has attained as an artist, the reforms he has introduced, and the good he has done, are best known to gentlemen of similar pursuits. As the acknowledged inventor of the Magnetic Telegraph, his name is immortal. The following complimentary lines, by one of the race, appeared some years since in a journal, which are inserted without criticism.

THE GENIUS OF AMERICA TO FRANKLIN AND MORSE.

Eripuit cœlo fulmen, sceptrum tyrannis,

This verdict admiring worlds accord to Franklin's genius ;

For Morse posterity reserves a fame not less than his,

Exigit monumentum ære perrennius.

While Franklin turns away God's thunderbolt from men,

Morse enchains the lightning harmless to his pen.

"Tho' marble and recording trap decay,

And like the grave's mem'ry pass away,"

Their names shall brighter grow as time rolls on,

Their fame remain, when time and earth are gone ;

The Thunders shall reëcho Franklin's name,

The lightning flash for ever Morse's fame.

Page 125, No. LXXXVI.

Extract of a letter to Prof. Zenas Morse, of Hamilton, N. Y.

“ Woodstock, Ct., Oct. 28, 1830.

“ No doubt your feelings are sufficiently fortified to hear particulars of your very amiable sister. I assure you, Sir, that I write what I do know, and testify that I have seen. Altho' Mary always maintained the dignity of her profession, and those who knew her best loved her most ; and though she was in a good degree reconciled and patient during her illness, yet it was not until disease had wasted her flesh and exhausted her strength and hope of recovery was gone, that grace triumphed so wonderfully in her soul. Perceiving herself near dissolution, her soul seemed to quit its hold of terrestrial things and get a glimpse of Heaven, and become absorbed in rapturous joys. Her spirit gained an ascendancy over the weakness of her body, and her tongue broke out in Heavenly songs of praise and animated expressions of joy.

“ Never, no, never shall I forget the look, the expression and joy of her countenance. I never before witnessed the power of divine grace in an equal degree. I have said and still do say that Elijah in a chariot of fire was not happier than Mary in death. This sweet frame of mind continued, except some short intervals. But the intervening clouds quickly passed away, and one continued benign and heavenly smile diffused itself over her deathlike countenance. Seeing the discharge from her ulcerated lungs, she with placid look and smile observed, ‘ this corruption will put on incorruption.’ While her whole soul was swallowed up in the love of Jesus, her affection for her friends appeared with increased ardour and strength. Seeing the health of her father, whose life had just been despaired of, returning, and herself drawing near the grave, she said with affectionate sweetness, ‘ Father, I shall reach Heaven before you ;’ and with the same tenderness of expression, she said to her mother, ‘ I love you, my dear mother, but I love my Jesus better.’ As her thoughts turned on her absent brothers, she said, ‘ Tell my dear brothers, I hope to meet them all in Heaven.’ She expressed her love in particular for her sister Samantha. ‘ O, tell her to lay a sure foundation for her hope. Tell her Jesus can make a dying bed feel soft as downy pillows are.’

“ All who approached her bed side were forcibly struck with wonder and admiration. Her anxiety for sinners, was equal to her love and attachment to saints. Two nights previous to her death she continued all night in prayer, and concluded by exclaiming vocally, ‘ Who shall separate us from the love of Christ,’ &c. ; and continued, ‘ No, my dear Jesus, no, nothing shall separate us.’

“ The day before her death, the unruffled tranquility of her soul evinced that the sting of death was taken away ; and she joined with her sister in a song of praise. Soon after, believing herself dying, she observed, ‘ If this is dying, it is happy dying. sweet dying.’ The day following, which proved her last, she exclaimed, ‘ I shall die this day, according to my desire. I feel a sweet sinking into the arms of Christ.’ She then made an entire surrender of her body and soul to Him who died to redeem both. She then ten-

derly kissed her surrounding friends, and fell sweetly asleep in the arms of Jesus."

Page 128, 5th Line.

Andrew Morse's father, Enoch, for service in the French war, had a *tract* of land assigned him by the Crown, at "Menus," now in the Provinces; was shipwrecked, with his family, and rendered penniless in attempting to settle upon it. None of his heirs have ever laid claim to the land.

Page 1, No. LXXXVII.

William¹ Morse, after settling in Newbury, led a humble and monotonous life until his dotage; for, according to the most credible record, he was 72 when he was made to figure so unhappily in the first legal investigation of witchcraft in New England. The following account from Coffin's history of Newbury is inserted, not to excite contempt or indignation towards those who, in common with Lord Chief-Justice Hale and others of the wisest and best men of that age, believed in witchcraft, but to provoke gratitude towards God that we live in an age of more light and security.

"This year is rendered memorable by the commencement of the only recorded case of supposed witchcraft, in Newbury, that was ever subjected to a legal investigation. The principal sufferer in this tragicomedy, for so it might well be called, was Elizabeth Morse, who, with her husband, William Morse, a shoemaker, resided in a house, still standing, at the head of Market street, in [now] Newburyport. He was then sixty-five years of age, and is said to have been a very worthy, but credulous, unsuspecting man, and consequently a very easy dupe to the impositions practiced upon him. Not suspecting any deception, the good man readily attributed all his troubles and afflictions to the supernatural agency of witchcraft, instead of watching the actions of those around him, especially of a roguish grandson, who lived with him. At that time, especially, a belief in witchcraft was almost universal, and afforded a ready solution of every thing strange and unintelligible. No one appears to have suspected the boy as the author of any part of the mischief, except one Caleb Powell. Believing from what he had seen, that the whole affair was the result of human agency, with nothing supernatural or marvellous about it, he informed Goodman Morse that he believed he could ascertain the cause of his trouble, and develop the whole mystery. The better to conceal his purpose, he affected, as will be hereafter seen, to have a knowledge of astrology and astronomy, and if he only had another learned man, and said *Morse's grandson with him*, the whole truth would come to light. The consequence was, that suspicions of witchcraft, and of dealing in the black art, fell upon him. He was accused, tried, and narrowly escaped with his life, thus affording another proof of the danger arising to any person, in being, or pretending to be, wiser than his neighbors.

“ That the whole affair may be understood, the evidence, and so forth, taken from the court records in Salem, is here subjoined.

‘ *December 3d, 1679.* Caleb Powell being complained of for suspicion of working with the devill to the molesting of William Morse and his family, was by warrant directed to the constable, brought in by him, the accusations and testimonies were read and the complaint respited till the Monday following.’

‘ *December 8th, Monday.* Caleb Powell appeared according to order and farther testimony produced against him by William Morse, which being read and considered, it was determined that the said William Morse should present the case against Caleb Powell at the county court to be held at Ipswich the last Tuesday in March following and in order hereunto William Morse acknowledgeth himself indebted to the treasurer of the county of Essex the full summe of twenty pounds.

‘ The condition of this obligation is that the sayd William Morse shall prosecute his complaint against Caleb Powell at the time.

‘ Caleb Powell was delivered as a prisoner to the constable till he find security of twenty pounds for the answering of sayd complaint, or else he was to be cast into prison.

“ The following is a specimen of the testimony against him.

‘ John Badger affirmeth that Caleb Powell said that he thought by Astrologie, and I think he said by Astronomie too with it he could find out whether or no there were diabolically means used about the said Morse his trouble, and that the said Caleb said hee thought to try to find it out.’

‘ *Anthony Morse’s testimony.*

‘ I Anthony Mors ocasionally being at my brother Morse’s hous, my brother showed me a pece of a brick, which had several tims come down the chimne. I sitting in the corner towke the pece of brik in my hand. Within a littell spas of tiem the pece of brik was gon from me I know not by what meanes. Quickly after, the pece of brik came down the chimne. Also in the chimney corner I saw a hamar on the ground. Their being no person near the hamar it was sodenly gone ; by what meanes I know not, but within a littell spas after, the hamar came down the chimney, and within a littell spas of tiem after that, came a pece of woud, about a fute long, and within a littell after that came down a fiar brend, the fiar being out. This was about ten deays agoo.

Newbury December eighth, 1679.

Taken on oath December eighth, 1679 before me

‘ *December 5th, 1679.* The testimony of William Mors and his wife, which they both saw one last Thursday night my wife and I being in bed we heard a great noises against the ruf with stekes and stones throwing against the hous with great vialanse whereupon I myselfe arose and my wife and saw not anny body, but was forsed to returne into the house againe, the stones being thrown so vilantly aganst us we goeing to bed againe and the same noises in the hous we Lock the dore againe fast and about midnight we heard a grete naves of A hoge in the house and I aros and found a grete hoge in the huse and the dore being shut I opened the dore the hoge running violently out. The next morning a Stek of Lenkes hanging in the Chemney fast I saw com Down vilintly and not anny body ner to them and Jumped up upon A Chaire before the fire ; I hanged them np again and they Com down again into the fire. The next day I had an Aule in the window, which was taken away I know not how and Com Dune the chimney. I take the same aule and put into a Cubard and fasened the Dore. The same aule Com Down 3 or 4 times. We had a basket in the Chamber Com Down the

Chemney. I tooke it up myselfe and laide it before me, it was Sudinly taken away I know not how and Com dune the Chimney againe. I then took a brick and put into it and said it shold cary that away, if it ded goo up againe. It was taken away I know not how and Com dune the Chemney and the brick a Letel after it. On Saturday next Com stekes on Light fire dune Chimney and stones, and then my awls taken away from me 4 times as I used them and Com Douen the Chemney 4 times. My nailes in a cover of A ferkin Com douen the Chemney againe. The dore being Locked I heard a hoge in the house I let alone until day and found it to bee one of my owne, willing to goo out. The next day being Sabath Stekes and stones were thrown viliantly [down] the Chemney. On Monday next Mr. Richeson and another saw many things. I sent my boy to se if nothing was amis in my barne. I not being abel to tey my Catel up to nightes but stel being untied with many other strange thinges, the frame being thrown Downe upon the boy: We all run out to help him in.

‘When we Com in we saw a Coten whele turned with the Leges upward and many things set up on it as a Stale and a Spade Lick the form of a ship. Potes hanging over the fire Dashing one against the other I being forsed to unhang them. We saw A andiron dance up and dune many times and into a pot and out againe up atop of a tabal, the pot turning over and Speling all in it. I saw a tub turn over with the hop flying off it. I sending my boy to fetch my toles, which I doe mak ropes with, so soone as the dore being opened thay Com viliantly Doune of themselves. Againe a tub of bred Com dune from a Shelve and turned over. My wife went to make the bed the Clothes Ded fly off many times of themselves, and a Chest open an Slut and Dores fly together. My wife going into the Seler thinges tumbling dune and the dore flyng together vialintly. I being at prayer my hed being Cuffed with A Cloth A Chaire did often times bow to me and then Strike me on the side. My wife Com out of the other rome A wege of Iron being thrown at her, and A spade, but [did] not rech her, and A stone, which hurt her much, I setting by the fire with my wife and to more neighbors with us A stone Struk against the Lampe and struk it out many times, and a shoo, which we saw in Chamber before Com doune the Chemney the Dore being shut and struk me A blow one the hed, which ded much hurte. A mate of A ship Coming often to me and said he much grefed for me and said the boye was the case of all my truble and my wife was much Ronged, and was no wich, and if I would let him have the boye but one day he would warrant me no more truble. I being persuaded to it he Com the nex day at the brek of day, *and the boy was with him untel night and I had not any truble since.*’

“The preceding testimony is in the handwriting of William Morse.”

* * * * *

“The following additional testimony, taken from the county files, is here presented, as necessary to a full understanding of the whole case. It is in the handwriting of John Woodbridge, esquire, and was undoubtedly copied by him from the original, written by William Morse himself. The curious reader will be much amused in comparing this, and the preceding testimony of William Morse, with the report of the same case, made by Increase Mather in his ‘Remarkables,’ and especially that made by Cotton Mather, in volume second, pages 391 and 392 of the Magnalia. In that ‘wonderful’ book, the latter gentleman perverts and amplifies the testimony to a ‘prodigious and nefandous’ extent. If his fourteen astonishing histories’ in his ‘Thaumatographia Pneumatica,’ have been as much indebted to his imagination for the dress which they now wear, as that of William Morse, it is no wonder that Mr. Savage, in his appendix to Winthrop, volume first, page 417, says of him, that ‘in-

stead of weighing evidence, [he] had not discretion enough to be trusted to wipe the scales.'

'The testimony of William Morse, which saith together with his wife aged both about sixty-five yeeres, that Thursday night being the twenty-seventh day of November, we heard a great noyes without round the house of knocking the boards of the house and, as we conceived, throwing of stones at the house, whereupon myselfe and wife lookt out and saw no body and the boy all this time with us, but we had stones and sticks thrown at us that we were forced to retire into the house againe, afterwards we went to bed and the boy with us and then the like noyes was upon the roof of the house.

'The same night about midnight the doore being lockt when we went to bed, we heard a great hog in the house grunt and make a noyes, as we thought willing to gett out, and that we might not be disturbed in our sleep I rose to let him out, and I found a hog in the house and the doore unlockt. The doore was firmly lockt when we went to bed.

'The next morning a stick of links hanging in the chimney, they were thrown out of their place, and we hanged them up againe and they were thrown down againe and come into the fire.

'The night following I had a great awle lying in the window, the which awle we saw fall downe out of the chimney into the ashes by the fire.

'After this I bid the boy put the same awle into the cupboard, which we saw done and the doore shut to, this same awle came presently downe the chimney againe in our sight, and I took it up myselfe. Againe the same night we saw a little Indian baskett, that was in the loft before, came downe the chimney againe and I took the same baskett, put a piece of brick in it, and the baskett with the brick was gone, and come downe againe the third time with the brick in it and went up againe the fourth time and came downe againe without the brick, and the brick came downe a little after.

'The next day being Saturday, stones, sticks and pieces of bricks came downe so that we could not quietly eat our breakfast, and sticks of fire also came downe at the same time.

'That same day in the afternoon my thread four times taken away and came downe the chimney againe; my awle and a gimlett wanting, came down the chimney. Againe my leather taken away came downe the chimney. Againe my nailes being in the cover of a ferkin taken away, came downe the chimney.

'The next being Sunday many stones and sticks and pieces of bricks came down the chimneye. On Monday Mr. Richardson [the minister] and my brother being there, the frame of my cow house they saw very firme, I sent my boy to skare the fowles from my hogs' meat. He went to the cow house and it fell downe, my boy crying with the hurt of the fall. In the afternoon the potts hanging over the fire, did dash so vehemently one against the other, we sett downe one that they might not dash to pieces. I saw the andiron leap into the pott and dance, and leap out, and againe leap in and dance, and leap out againe, and leap on a table and there abide, and my wife saw the andiron on the table. Also I saw the pott turn itselfe over and throw down all the water. Againe we saw a tray with wool leap up and downe and throw the wool out and saw no body meddle with it. Againe a tub his hoop fly off, of itselfe and the tub turne over and no body neere it. Againe the wooden wheele upside downe and stood upon its end and a spade sett on it. Stephen Greenleaf saw it and myselfe and wife. Againe my rope tooles fell downe on the ground before my boy could take them being sent for them and the same thing of nailes tumbled downe from the loft unto the ground and no body neere. Againe my wife and the boy making the bed, the chest did open and shutt, the bed clothes would not be made to ly on the bed but fly off againe.

'Thomas Rogers and George Hardy being at William Morse his house affirme that the earth in the chimney corner moved and scattered on them, that Thomas Rogers was hit with somewhat, Hardy, with an iron ladle, as

is supposed. Somewhat hitt William Morse a great blow, but it was so swift that they could not tell what it was but looking downe after they heard the noyes they saw a shoe. The boy was in the corner at first, afterward in the house.

‘Mr Richardson on Saturday testifyeth that a board flew against his chaire and he heard a noyes in another roome, *which he supposed in all reason to be diabolically*.

‘John Dole saw a large fire stick of candle wood to fall downe, a stone, a fire brand, and these things he saw not whence they came, till they fell downe by him.

‘Elizabeth Titcomb affirmeth that Powell sayd that he could find out the witch by his learning, if he had another scholar with him.

‘John Emerson affirmeth that Powell sayd he was brought up under Norwood and it was judged by the people there that Norwood studied the black art.’

‘In another paper entitled ‘a further testimony of William Morse and his wife,’ he states that ‘we saw a keeler of bread turn over—a chair did often bow to me and rise up againe—the chamber door did violently fly together and the bed did move to and fro and not any body neer them.’

‘He also states that the cellar door did violently fly down and a drum rolled over it—his ‘barn door was unpinned four times, and going to shut the doore, *the boy being with me*, the pin (as I did judge) coming downe out of the aire did fall down neer to me.”

‘Againe Caleb Powell came in as before and seeing our spirits very low by the sense of our greet afflictions, began to bemoane our condition and sayd that he was troubled for our affliction, and sayd that he eyed the boy, and drawed neere to us with great compassion, poore old man, poore old woman, this boy is the occasion of your grieffe, for he does these things and hath caused his good old grandmother to be counted a witch. Then sayd I, how can all these things be done by him? Then sayd he although he may not have done all, yet most of them, for this boy is a young rogue, a vile rogue. I have watched him and see him do things as to come up and downe.

‘Caleb Powell also said he had understanding in Astrology and Astronomy and knew the working of spirits, some in one country and some in another, and looking on the boy said you young rogue to begin so soone. Goodman Morse, if you be willing to let mee have the boy, I will undertake you shall be freed from any trouble of this kind while he is with me. I was very unwilling at the first, and my wife, but by often urging me to it, and when he told me whither and what employment and company he should goe in, I did consent to it and we have been freed from any trouble of this kind ever since that promise made on Monday night last till this time being Friday afternoon.’

‘After enumerating a great variety of marvellous exploits such as ‘hearing a great noyes in the other roome,’—‘my chaire would not stand still but ready to throw me backward,’—‘my cap almost taken from my head three times.’—‘a great blow [on the back of my head],’—‘the catt thrown at my wife and thrown at us five times, the lamp standing by us on a chest, was beaten downe,’ and so forth, thus he concludes:

‘Againe a great noyes a great while very dreadful. Againe in the morning a great stone being six pounds weight did remove from place to place. We saw it. Two spoones throwed off the table and presently the table throwed downe, and being minded to write, my ink horne was hid from me, which I found covered with a rag and my pen quite gone. I made a new pen and while I was writing, one eare of corne hitt me in the face and fire

sticks and stones and ——— thrown at me, and my pen brought to me. While I was writing with my new pen, my ink-horne taken away. Againe my spectacles thrown from the table, and throwne almost into the fire by me, my wife and *the boy*. Againe my booke of all my accounts throwne into the fire and had been burnt presently, if I had not taken it up. Againe boards taken off a tub and sett upright by themselves, and my paper, do what I could, I could hardly keep it, while I was writing this relation. Presently before I could dry my writing, a monmouth hat rubbed along it, but I held it so fast that it did blot but some of it. My wife and I being much afraid that I should not preserve it for the publick use, we did think best to lay it in the bible and it lay safe that night. Againe the next [night] I would lay it there againe, but in the morning it was not to be found, the bag hanged downe empty, but after was found in a box alone. Againe while I was writing this morning I was forced to forbear writing any more, I was so disturbed with so many things constantly thrown at me.

This relation taken December eighth, 1679.'

* * * * *

"At the March term at Ipswich court the following additional testimony was produced in the case of Caleb Powell, taken February twenty-seventh, 1680.

'Sarah Hale aged thirty-three and Joseph Mirick testify that Joseph Moores hath often said in their hearing that if there were any wizards, he was sure Caleb Powell was one.'

NOTE. This Joseph Moores was the boatswain of the ship, of which Caleb Powell was mate, and Joseph Dole, captain.

'Deposition of Mary Tucker aged about twenty.

'She remembereth that Caleb Powell came into thier house and sayd to this purpose that he coming to William Morse his house and the old man being at prayer he thought not fit to go in, but looked in at the window and he sayd he had broken the enchantment, for he saw the boy play tricks while he was at prayer and mentioned some and among the rest that he saw him to *fling the shooe at the old man's head.*'

"The court, after reading all the testimony that could be produced against Caleb Powell, came to the following conclusion:

'Upon hearing the complaint brought to this court against Caleb Powell for suspicion of working by the devill to the molesting of the family of William Morse of Newbury, though this court cannot find any evident ground of proceeding farther against the sayd Powell, yett we determine that he hath given such ground of suspicion of his so dealing that we cannot so acquit him but that he *justly deserves to beare his owne shame and the costs of prosecution of the complaint.*'

It is referred to Mr. Woodbridge to hear and determine the charges.'

"The court at this time must have been men of profound wisdom and accurate discrimination, as they appear to have determined, first, that he was just guilty enough to pay the expense of being suspected, secondly, that he ought 'to beare his owne shame,' and, thirdly, that they had no reason to believe that he was guilty at all. This somewhat resembles the case, which is not found in the books, where A. sues B. for breaking a borrowed kettle. The defence was, 'first we never had the kettle, secondly, it was broken when we borrowed it, and thirdly, it was whole when we returned it.'

The people, however, were not so lenient as the judges. If Caleb Powell was innocent, some other person must be guilty of 'being instigated by the divil,' for, in their opinion, no agency merely human could produce effects so strange and unaccountable. They

accordingly selected Elizabeth Morse, the wife of William Morse, as the guilty person, as we shall hereafter see.

At a court of assistants on adjournment held at Boston May twentieth, 1680.

'The grand Jury presenting Elizabeth, wife of William Morse senior. She was indicted by the name of Elizabeth Morse for that she not having the fear of God before her eyes, being instigated by the Divil and had familiarity with the Divil contrary to the peace of our sovereign lord the king, his crown and dignity, the laws of God, and of this jurisdiction, after the prisoner was at the barr and pleaded not guilty, and put herself on God and the country for triall, the evidences being produced were read and committed to the jury.

'The jury brought in their verdict. They found Elizabeth Morse, the prisoner at the barr, guilty according to indictment. The governor on the twenty-seventh of May after ye lecture pronounced the sentence.

'Elizabeth Morse, you are to goe from hence to the place from whence you came and thence to the place of execution and there to be hanged by the neck, till you be dead, and the Lord have mercy on your soul.

'The court was adjourned diem per diem and on the first of June 1680 the governor and magistrates voted the reprieving of Elizabeth Morse condemned to the next session of the court in October as attests.

It appears from this record, that the reprieve was not agreeable to the deputies, who, on assembling in November, thus complain :

The deputies on perusal of the acts of the honorable court of assistants relating to the woman condemned for witchcraft doe not understand why execution of the sentence given against her by said court is not executed and that her second repreevall seems to us to be beyond what the law will allow and doe therefore judge meete to declare ourselves against it with reference to the concurrence of our honored magistrates hereto.

No record gives any farther information concerning her, until May, 1681, when her case was again brought before the general court, to whom her husband sent two petitions, the one on the 14th, and the other on the 18th, which are as follows :

'To the honored generall court now sitting in Boston.

'The humble petition of William Mors in behalfe of his wife, Elizabeth Mors your distressed Prisoner. humbly begging this that you would be pleased to give your petitioner leave to present to your consideration what may clere up the truth in those evidences wch hath bin presented and what is otherwise as first. To Joseph Bayley his testimony. Wee are ignorant of any such thing. Had it bin then spoken of, we might have cleared ourselves. He might have observed some other as my wife, it being a frequent thing for Catle to be at a stand.

'To Jonathan Haines. As to his Catle, or himselfe, not making good work at such a time, when Catle are haggled out, to place it on such account, yt his neglect in not bringing us a bow of mault was the cause, which had it bin spoken of wee might have given full satisfaction.

'To Caleb Moody. As to what befell him in and about his not seeing my wife, yt his cow making no hast to hir calfe, wch wee are ignorant of, it being so long since, and being in church communion with us, should have spoken of it like a christian and yn proceeded so as wee might have given an answer in less time yn tenn yeares. Wee are ignorant yt he had a shepe so dyed. And his wife knowne to be a pretious godly whoman, yt

hath ofne spoken to hir husband not to be so uncharitable and have and doe carry it like a christian with a due respect in hir carridge towards my wife all along.

‘To John Mighill. About ye loss of his catle was yt he came one day to worke, and would have had him come anothor day to finish it because ye raine came in so upon us, and his not coming, judges my wife was angry and yfore had such loss, weh wee never knew of. This being twelve yeares agoe, did amaze us now to here of it.

‘To Zachariah Davis. To sensure my wife now for not bringing quills aboute sixteen yeares agoe yt his loss of calves was for that, when his father being in communion with us did profess it to us yt he judged it a hand of God and was farr from blaming us but rather troubled his sonn should so judge.

‘To Joshua Richardson loosing a shepe and his taking it forth off our yard, my wife should say you might have asked leave, and whether over-driving it or what, now to bring it in I hope will be considered.

‘To John March Test. He heard John Wells his wife say she saw imp o’ God into said Morss howse. She being prosecuted would not owne it and was adjudged to pay damages, and now this is brought in.

‘To James Browne Test, yt one day George Wheeler going forth, my wife should say for a trifle she knew he should not come in again, which my wife knowes not of it, nor doth some of ye owuers ever remember such a thing as to judge or charge it on hir, but now is brought forth sixteen yeares after when his wife said to goody Hale yt said Browne was mistaken. Hir husband did come home well that voyage; and that James Browne should say to Robert Bedell yt Powell, whom wee sued did put in these words and not himselfe in the test and yt said Browne did owne to his unkle Mr. Nicholas Noyes yt he could not sware to such a test; and did refuse to doe it before Mr. John Woodbridge, and Mr. Woodbridge did admire he had sworne to it. And for his seeing my wife amongst troopers. What condition he might be in wee leave it to consideration. Wee are ignorant of such a thing till now brought in so many yeares agoe as he saith.

‘To goodwife Ordway. Hir child being long ill, my wife coming in and looking on it, pitting of it, did feare it would dy, and when it dyed Israell Webster our next neighbor heard not a word of it, nor spoken of by others, nor any of ye family, but hir conceite, and now brought in.

‘As for William Chandler’s test. about his wife’s long sickness and my wife’s visiting hir, she through hir weakness acted uncivilly and yet now to bring in against my wife, when for so many yeares being in full communion with us never dealt with us aboute any such thing, but had as loving converse with him as christians ought, and knew no otherwise till now.

‘To widow Goodwin hir having hir child sick, gave forth yt it was bewitched by my wife, as she thought; wee hearing of it dealt with hir aboute it, and she brake forth in teares, craving forgiveness, and said it was others put hir upon it to say as she did, but now urged by Powell to say as she now saith.

‘To John Chase so saying yt he saw my wife in the night coming in at a litle hole, and ye like, when he himselfe hath said he did not know but he was in a dreame, and yt unto several persons he hath so said, though now as he test, when my wife disowns any such thing.

‘To John Glading yt saw halfe of my wife about two a clocke in ye day time, if so, might then have spoken, and not reserved for so long a time, which she utterly denies it, nor know of any such thing, where she should be at yt time as to clere hir selfe.

‘To William Fanning should say my boy said the devill was at his howse. Upon Fanning’s saying to the boy ye devill was at their howse, and he would have me chide ye boy, which I could said Fanning ye boy might be instructed to know ye devill was every where though not as at our howse, and should not in time of affliction upbraide him to our grief.

‘To Jonathan Woodman, seeing a catt, and so forth, he struck at it, and it vanisht away and I sending for Dr. Dole to see a bruise my wife had by

the fall of a peece reching downe some bacan in our chimney, which was many days before this time, as doctor Dole affirms it was no green wound, though neglected to send for said Dole till then.

‘To Benjamin Lowle about my boy’s ketching a pidgin; my boy desired of me to see to ketch a pidgin, by throwing a stone, or ye like, and he brought a pidgin, which I affirm was wounded, though alive.

‘To goodwife Miricke about a letter. My wife telling her somewhat of ye letter, which she judges could not be and my wife hearing of it there was a discourse and so forth about this love letter, might speake something about it by guess, and not by any such way as she judged, and many have spoken, guessing at things, which might be.

‘As to our troubles in ye howse it hath bin dredfull, and afflictive and to say it ceased upon hir departure, when it ceased before for a time and after she was gone there was trouble againe.

‘As to rumors of some great wickedness committed in ye house, which should cause ye divill so to trouble us, our conscience is clere of ye knowledge of any such thing more than our common frailties and I reverence the holy sourainty of God in laying such affliction on us, and that God’s servants may be so afflicted in this manner as hath bin knowne. And that Mr. Wilson of Ipswich, where she hath bin twenty-eight weekes, did declare to me yt my wife’s conversation was christian-like as far as he observed. Thus praying for you in this and all other your concernes, am your distressed servant.

WILLIAM MORSE.

Newbury May fourteenth 1681.’

“From the preceding petition of William Morse, and his attempted answers to the accusations and charges brought against his wife Elizabeth, and sent to the general court, it appears that seventeen persons had given in their testimony in writing, stating their reasons why they verily believed goody Morse was really a witch, and ought to be hung, according to the old Mosaic law, which says, ‘thou shalt not suffer a witch to live.’ Of these testimonies only one is to be found on the files of the general court. If this one is a fair specimen of the whole, the loss of the remainder is not greatly to be regretted, except as a specimen of the logic of that day, and of the manner in which some of our ancestors stated their premises, and drew thence their most profound conclusions. It is here presented entire, and if it does not most conclusively prove that Elizabeth Morse was guilty of witchcraft, and ought not to have been suffered to live, it will only furnish another evidence that belief and demonstration are not identical, and that what is sincerely believed is not for that reason always true. Zechariah Davis thus testifies verbatim and literatim.

‘When I lived in Salisbury, William Morse’s wife asked of me whether I could let her have a small passell of winges and I told her I woode, so she would have me bring them over for her the next time I came over, but I came over and did not think of the winges, but met goody Morse, she asked me whether I had brought over her winges and I tel her no I did not thinke of it, so I came 3 ore 4 times and had them in my minde a litel before I came over but stil forgot them at my coming away so meting with her every time that I came over without them aftar I had promised her the winges, soe she tell me she wonder at it that my memory should be soe bad, but when I came home I went to the barne and there was 3 cafes in a pen. One of them fel a danceing and roeing and was in such a condition as I never saw on cafe in before, but being almost night the cattle came home and we put him to his dam and he sucke and was well 3 or 4 dayes, and on of them was my brothers then come over to Nubery, but we did not thinke to send the winges, but when he came home and went to the barne this

cafe fel a danceing and roeing so wee put him to the cowe, but he would not sucke but rane a roeing away soe wee gate him againe with much adoe and put him into the barne and we heard him roer severall times in the night and in the morning I went to the barne and there he was seting upon his taile like a doge, and I never see no cafe set aftar that manner before and so he remained in these fits while he died.'

Taken on oath June seventh, 1679.

"From the date of the preceding testimony, it is evident it was used in the county court prior to the transfer of the case to the state tribunals. On the eighteenth of May, William Morse presented the following petition:

'To the honored governor, deputy governor, magistrates and deputies now assembled in court May the eighteenth 1681.

'The most humble petition and request of William Morse in behalf of his wif (now a condemned prisoner) to this honored court is that they would be pleased so far to hearken to the cry of your poor prisoner, who am a condemned person, upon the charge of witchcraft and for a wich, to which charge your poor prisoner have pleaded not guilty, and by the mercy of God and the goodness of the honored governor, I am reprieved and brought to this honored court, at the foot of which tribunal I now stand humbly praying your justis in hearing of my case and to determine therein as the Lord shall direct. I do not understand law, nor do I know how to lay my case before you as I ought, for want of which I humbly beg of our honors that my request may not be rejected, but may find acceptance with you it being no more but your sentence upon my triall whether I shall live or dy, to which I shall humbly submit unto the Lord and you.

"For reasons which do not appear on the records, the deputies had changed their minds, and, instead of being dissatisfied with her respite, were willing to grant another hearing of the case. This the magistrates opposed. In the court record it is thus stated:

'The deputyes judge meet to grant the petitioner a hearing the next sixth day and that warrants goe forth to all persons concerned, from this court then to appear in order to her further triall our honored magistrates hereto consenting.

"On the court records I find nothing more concerning Elizabeth Morse. From an essay on witchcraft, by the reverend John Hale, of Beverly, and published in the year 1697, I make the following extracts:

'She [Elizabeth Morse] being reprieved was carried to her own home and her husband (who was esteemed a sincere and understanding christian by those that knew him) desired some neighbour ministers, of whom I was one, to discourse his wife, which we did, and her discourse was very christian, and still pleaded her innocence as to that, which was laid to her charge. We did not esteem it prudence for us to pass any definite sentence upon one under her circumstances, yet we inclined to the more charitable side. In her last sickness she was in much trouble and darkness of spirit, which occasioned a judicious friend to examine her strictly, whether she had been guilty of witchcraft, but she said no, but the ground of her trouble was some impatient and passionate speeches and actions of her while in prison upon

the account of her suffering wrongfully, whereby she had provoked the Lord by putting contempt upon his word. And in fine she sought her pardon and comfort from God in Christ and dyed so far as I understand, praying to, and resting upon, God in Christ for salvation.'

Benjamin³, tertius, resided exactly opposite the head of Marlboro' street, in Newbury; and was a member of the 1st church. He gave the land for the Town and County House, erected on the site of the house since built by Rev. Abraham Moor, and now owned by the heirs of the late Capt. Amos Knight. Circumstances almost prove that he was the precocious rogue whose feats involved his grandparents in so much persecution; and precocious he must have been to have contrived and executed them at the age of eleven years. When the date of his father's marriage, and the birth of his brother Joseph shall be ascertained, the question may be more accurately weighed which of the brothers was the rogue. Both made very likely men.


"Oct. 20, 1786, he was appointed an ensign in the second American regiment, and when the army was disbanded by act of Congress, he was discharged. On January twenty-eighth, 1787, he was appointed, by John Hancock, lieutenant of a company in Boston. On April nineteenth, 1788, he sailed for India, arrived at the Isle of France January second, 1789, and in July, went to Madras, having procured recommendatory letters to the English consul, residing at the court of his highness the Nizam, and by whom he was presented in form to his highness, who presented him with the command of one thousand infantry. The Nizam was then in alliance with the English, and had taken the field against Tippoo Sultan, with one hundred and fifty thousand infantry, sixty thousand horse, and five hundred elephants. In 1793, he was a prisoner of war at Ougene, and was released August fourth. In 1794, he wrote he was raising two battalions on the partizan principle. In September, 1797, he was in Camp Hydrabad, and after many years' service, he sold out to Captain Felose, a Neapolitan partizan. He was appointed by General Jackson naval officer of Boston, March fourth, 1830, where he died October fourth, 1830, aged sixty-six. 7. Rev. Paul Coffin⁵, D. D., married Mary Gorham of Charlestown, and had Dr. Jonathan Gorham Coffin⁶ of Boston, and Charles⁶, Esq., A. M.

8. Charles⁵, A. M., M. D., of Newburyport, one of the most accomplished men, and excellent of the earth, married Hepzibah Eames, of Boston, July 1, 1773; had Hector, a distinguished master of a packet ship; and Rev. Charles⁶, D. D., founder, and, for many years, President of Greenville College, Tennessee.

The writer of this sketch, at a later period, has repeatedly seen him, when engaged in parts of his work requiring but little nicety of touch, with a book spread out on the bench before him, from which a paragraph would be every few moments snatched to be digested amid the vigorous blows of the mallet.

Mr. Morse's mind seems to have received its earliest development through the study of subjects connected with art and poetry. Indeed he seems to have chosen his present business from the fact that it gave an opportunity for the gratification of an instinctive but partially developed love of sculpture. Under other circumstances, this early capacity and love for art might have made him an artist. But in his robust and well-proportioned nature, the reasoning faculties ultimately predominated over the creative fancy, and led him through the early study of art and poetry to those profound and comprehensive pursuits that form the basis of the statesman's mind. In this transitive period of his mind he was aroused to enthusiasm by his studies

in poetry and literary history. With the most eager interest he went over the labors, difficulties, and triumphs of the monarchs of literature in all ages. He sympathised with them in their aspirations after excellence and their dreams of immortality. The clearness and original heartiness of his mind would not long permit him to remain in the gorgeous "cloud land" of fancy; for shadows he sought substance; from facts that gratified the imagination he sought principles that would form a firm footing for the reason. He passed, as his mind grew, from poetry and art and general literature to metaphysics. He read with care and advantage the principal writers on moral and intellectual philosophy, and the subjects connected with them; and thus learned, in that admirable school for the intellect, the limitations of human inquiry, so necessary to him who would form just conceptions of God, man, and nature.

History, politics, political economy, and public law, seem to have taken his attention at a still later and maturer period, and these formed his mind more immediately for the public life to which he was subsequently called. At intervals, in connection with these subjects, he has obtained a general acquaintance with physical science, so far as it can be pursued without an acquaintance with the higher mathematics. Whatever could aid him in attaining excellence as a public speaker, in the best works in logic, rhetoric, and style, he consulted with diligence and care. Early in his career he became connected with a society of young men which met steadily for debate upon historical, political, and moral questions. This society comprised a large portion of the more active-minded men of his native town, of various pursuits and professions. Almost immediately Mr. Morse was recognized as among the ablest reasoners and most fluent and correct speakers in the society. The debates in their society had a very important bearing in training his mind to habits of thorough investigation and logical analysis, and developing his capacity as a speaker. These debates often required extensive reading and careful thought, and Mr. Morse always prepared for them with great assiduity. The writer of this sketch speaks from personal knowledge when he says that often days of laborious investigation were expended in preparation for a single debate. Often has he seen the notes for these discussions lying on a desk in Mr. Morse's workshop, to which additions would be made as he digested his reading and systematized his reflections over his labor. All the discussions were conducted, and the business transacted, in this society with strict reference to the forms of parliamentary law, and he thus became tolerably expert in that perplexing but necessary part of the education of a legislator before he had ever been a member of any legislative body. With this training he was able at once, when elected to represent his native town in the legislature, to take a high stand as a debater and a man of business. We have been thus particular

in giving the means and the process of Mr. Morse's mental growth on account of the false idea that has been formed by many, of his habits and character. He is no mental prodigy that has sprung into his present high position at a bound, by mere force of rude, uncultivated talent; but a man whose taste and power of reasoning and expression have been cultivated and developed by many years of energetic and constant mental labor — by a familiarity with all the great masters of thought in every age — by the constant practice of writing and speaking under circumstances that subjected him to the severest criticism. Probably few professional men have, during the same length of time, devoted more hours to purely literary labor than has Mr. Morse. No conclusion unfavorable to profound and protracted study as a preparative for public life, can be drawn from his career. Few men have better illustrated the remark of Webster that "Genius is thought, Study is application."

Before throwing his first vote he had investigated the fundamental principles of the political parties dividing our country, and had adopted the general principles of the Whigs.

Becoming known to his townsmen by his general attainments, his correct and comprehensive views as a politician, he was selected in the year 1839, to represent his native town in the Legislature of the State. This office he continued to fill for four years in succession. During his first year of membership he seldom mingled in the debates, and made but one premeditated speech, and this was upon a local question. In the succeeding sessions he engaged freely in all the discussions of interest or importance, and his talents were acknowledged by all. He was twice the Whig candidate for speaker; his straightforward course as a public man, the great excellence of his private character, his skill and power as a debater, gained for him the respect of his political opponents and the entire confidence of his own party. Many of the speeches which he made during this period were reported and published extensively by the Whig papers of the State. A portion of these we have examined; our limits allow but a brief notice of a few of these. In April, 1841, Mr. M. made a speech on the bill to raise a State tax, in which he gave an able and searching examination of the financial management of the land agent of the State. The speech is clear, well thought out, accurate in statement, showing no effort after any thing beyond the simple financial object which he had in view. During the same session he spoke on a bill for incorporating a manufacturing company, in reply to some animadversions on the manufacturing policy of Massachusetts, and in defence of the character of the operatives. This was at a time when the policy of the dominant party was adverse to corporations for such purposes, and he took occasion to show the good effect upon the State of fostering home industry, and to demonstrate the propriety of that policy that has been since, in a measure,

adopted by the Democratic party of the State. In May, 1842, he spoke on a bill for the apportionment of representatives to the Legislature. It is a straight-forward, manly discussion of the points at issue, well fortified by statistics; the conclusion is an indignant protest against what he considered the injustice of the bill.

In June, 1843, he spoke on the bill for districting the State for members of Congress. This speech is marked by all of Mr. Morse's most brilliant and vigorous points as a speaker. It combines close and logical argument, ridicule, sarcasm, and lofty and indignant rebuke. It was made without special preparation, without the aid of notes, and occupied an hour and a quarter in its delivery. It was called out by what he thought an infringement of the freedom of elections—the State having been so districted as to secure the election of members of Congress belonging to the dominant party. So great was the influence of his eloquence in the Legislature, and afterwards during the canvass, that he was elected to Congress from the very district with which the greatest liberty had been taken, although a majority of the voters were politically opposed to him.

In the same session he made a speech on the refunding of Gen. Jackson's fine, in which he discusses in an able manner, the vexed question of the right of instruction, and exposes the fallacies of its advocates with great power and effect.

In August, 1843, Mr. Morse was nominated by the Whigs of his district as a candidate for Congress. The nomination was hailed with interest in all parts of the State, and called forth expressions of confidence and respect from all the leading Whig papers. Perhaps few men have been candidates for Congress, whose fitness for the office was more unanimously acknowledged by both friends and foes. After a severe contest he was returned in a district (as we have already hinted) containing a clear majority of his political opponents; thus showing the strong hold which he had gained upon the community by his talents and personal character. His first speech in Congress was an extempore reply to some severe animadversions of Hon. C. J. Ingersoll of Philadelphia, upon the motives and character of the Maine Commissioners on the North-eastern Boundary, and upon those of Mr. Webster, as the negotiator of the treaty of Washington. Excited by the occasion, in a brief pointed reply, he successfully repelled the charges of Mr. Ingersoll, and made a very favorable impression upon the House.

On other occasions afterwards he spoke on subjects in which he or his constituents were interested, as opportunity offered, but did not, except on two questions, occupy the time fixed by the rules of the House. A bill admitting Florida and Iowa into the Union had been reported. The constitution of Florida contained a provision prohibiting the passing of any law for the emancipation of slaves, and prohibiting the entrance of free blacks into

the State. Mr. Morse submitted an amendment providing that the act for the admission should not take effect until these unjust articles in the constitution of Florida should be rescinded. Judge Bailey of Virginia attacked this amendment and its mover with great acrimony and coarseness, speaking of the amendment as coming from the "*extreme north-east*," and from a member "*not greatly distinguished for statesmanship*," and of such a movement from such a quarter as "*highly arrogant*." The reply of Mr. Morse is one of his happiest efforts of improvisation. We give an extract from that portion relating to the personal attack of Judge Bailey.

"Sir, if it be a crime in a young man and a young member not to have gained distinction as a statesman — not to have identified his name with great governmental measures — not to sit reverently and in mute astonishment, when the oracle from Accomac (Judge Bailey) condescends to enlighten the world with the rich fruits of his long experience as a statesman, then indeed have I much to answer for. I must surely plead guilty to the charge of a want of distinction. Sir, if I may be pardoned for so far departing from the rules of correct taste as to make a momentary allusion to the '*undistinguished*' individual whose acts and standing as a 'statesman' have been so unceremoniously forced on the attention of the House, by the censor from Virginia, permit me to say that I regard myself as but an humble member among the humblest of those who occupy seats on this floor. I am no favorite of fortune — she has never lavished her bounties on me. My only inheritance has been a strong arm, a determined spirit, and a life of toil. In that humble sphere, among the first cherished objects of my soul was love of our country and her free institutions, which have left the paths to honor and the prizes of industry, integrity, and laudable ambition open to *all* — to the humble individual who now addresses you, as well as to the brilliant luminary who has just taken his seat. If, mid the visions of my youth, I ever sent forward an aspiring thought to this central point of attraction in the republic, it was always accompanied by the consoling thought that the representatives of a great people, so far as rights and privileges are concerned, met on the same level; that a rising and falling scale of privileges, as applied to members on this floor, either conventional, or such as may silently steal upon them by party tyranny, or which may grow up under habits of exclusiveness and assumed superiority, are against our written code, and the spirit and genius of our institutions.

"This, Mr. Chairman, is a representative body; we meet under a written constitution — all, in the eye of that constitution, standing on the same ground. To the member of large experience, of superior wisdom and virtues, I am ever ready to yield a willing homage; but never, for a single instant, can I yield a right — for rights here do not appertain exclusively to the member — they are not his to yield — he holds them for the benefit of others, particularly for those whom he directly represents, and unfaithful and craven-spirited must be the man who will yield a single right, however trifling, to the exacting, overbearing and 'arrogant' demand of the gentleman from Virginia."

Although in no sense an imitation, it reminds one of the celebrated reply of the elder Pitt to Walpole, when he had been accused of "the atrocious crime of being a young man." Though Pitt's speech, as it has come down to us, is said to have been stripped of some of its power, having been disguised by the balanced periods and antithetical point of Johnson, who reported it, we may know its power from its effect. Walpole, made bold by years of successful corruption and intrigue, exclaimed, on hearing this early effort of the "great commoner," "we must silence that terrible cornet of horse;" and we presume that Judge Bailey also soon learned that he had aroused the wrong antagonist, and that the "undistinguished member" from the "extreme north-east," was capable of measuring swords with the best statesmen of the Old Dominion on their own ground.

Mr. Morse's closing effort in Congress was a speech against the admission of Texas; and it seems to us the ablest of his published speeches. It is worthy of remark that there is evidently a constant improvement in the tone and character of his public efforts to the latest period of his political life. This speech is marked throughout by condensation, terseness, and energy of style, and great skill and power of argument. Our limits will not permit an analysis of this able speech. It is sufficient to say that it met the highest expectation of his friends, and added to the high reputation which he had already acquired. An extract from a speech so well wrought out and logical, will fail in giving an idea of its symmetry and proportion as a whole, or the finish of the parts; still we feel impelled to give one or two paragraphs, as illustrative of the high moral ground which Mr. Morse has ever taken in treating questions of national and state politics. In these days of time-serving expediency, it is refreshing to meet a statesman who really *believes* that for nations as well as men honesty is the best policy. Appeals had been made to the North in favor of the admission of Texas, on the ground that its trade would be increased by the measure; said he, "Such an appeal on such an occasion, and in favor of such a measure, is unworthy of an American representative, and will be at once and indignantly rejected by all honest men. Suppose the future should verify the predictions of those who address themselves to man's love of gain; suppose it should widen, to some extent, the circle of trade, would that heal a wounded constitution? Would that give us back our lost honor or restore the rights of plundered Mexico? Would it blot out the infamy of forging new and stronger manacles for an oppressed and inoffensive race? Will a little paltry trade indemnify us for the loss of national virtue, for unsettling and corrupting the public mind with that anti-Christian desire for conquest which is even now calling from this hall for the subjugation not only of provinces, but of kingdoms and empires that lie beyond Texas? No, sir! no; national virtue, national justice, national

honor, are more precious than the wealth of the universe, and however much it may be our duty, as legislators, to seek new channels for trade, it must never be done at such a tremendous sacrifice."

Mr. Morse was not reelected to Congress, entirely, as we believe, through the influence of the Liberty Party, who, although he had, even in Congress, and elsewhere, been one of the boldest advocates of freedom, they thought themselves called upon to make a diversion, which resulted in the election of a gentleman in favor of the annexation of Texas, and of the Mexican war.

After the expiration of his Congressional term, he was unanimously nominated by a large convention from all parts of the State, as the Whig candidate for Governor. This nomination called out the most hearty responses from the Whig papers of the State, but although he obtained a larger vote, probably, than would have been thrown for any other Whig, he failed of an election. Mr. Morse positively declined being a candidate a second time for the office, though earnestly desired to do so by the voice of his entire party in the State.

It is necessary for us to notice, in passing, Mr. Morse's present relation to the Whig party, and the causes that have led him into it. During the whole of his public life, he has ever been a steadfast opponent of the extension of slavery, and of aggressive war. This opposition has sprung from no time-serving political expediency, but from deep seated conviction. Having attended, as a delegate, the Whig State Convention called to express the voice of the party in reference to the selection of a candidate for the Presidency, he expressed himself strongly against the claims of Gen. Taylor to that nomination; thinking, with Mr. Webster and many other distinguished Whigs, that it was a nomination "not fit to be made," and, moreover, that he was not the deliberate and fair choice of the Whigs of Maine. After the nomination had been made at Philadelphia, he saw no reason to change his opinion of Gen. Taylor, and maintained, with unyielding constancy, his deliberate convictions. Perhaps no man in Maine could have brought more weight of influence to the support of Gen. Taylor, than Mr. M., and consequently no man would have been more fully entitled to the gratitude of his cabinet, in case of a successful issue of the campaign. He might have held himself aloof until the critical moment of the contest, and like many other distinguished politicians, set his own price for his services and adhesion. But Mr. Morse took no such course. He had opposed Texas; he had opposed the Mexican war; he had opposed the tendency of our people to elevate to high civil office on the ground of mere military service. He had given utterance to these sentiments, not to point a period, or to secure a reputation as a philanthropist, but because he believed them. He never pursued philanthropy as a *trade*. When, then, it became necessary for him to sacrifice to principle his hopes of political

distinction, he was not found wanting. He was also a *Whig* from principle and conviction, and he could not yield the great doctrines which he had defended with so much eloquence and power to temporary expediency, by giving his vote and influence to Mr. Van Buren, who *had* stood, and *still* stood before the world as the embodiment of those principles which Mr. M. believed fatally injurious to his country. Though sacrificing every thing but his honor for Free Soil, he could not become a member of the *Free Soil party*, for he had not changed his political principles. Said he to a friend, "In declining to give my vote and influence to Gen. Taylor, I neither adopted any *new* articles of political faith, nor *abandoned* any *before* entertained; I simply moved on in what I believed a straight-forward, consistent course." Whatever may be thought by his political friends of the expediency of his course in not voting for Gen. Taylor, no man may dare to insinuate aught against his honesty and manliness of purpose. He dared to stand alone. And we believe it to have been the most honorable act of his whole political life. Few men have the nerve to withstand the persuasion of friends, and the taunts of enemies, in circumstances like these. When the passions of the time shall have subsided, the position of Mr. Morse will become clear, and his motives will be vindicated to all. We believe that the people will yet call him from his voluntary retirement, and delight to do honor to a statesman whom the ostracism of party can neither intimidate nor subdue.

On one occasion only did he give in public his reasons for refusing his vote to Gen. Taylor. Having been earnestly requested to do so by many personal friends in his native town, he spoke at length on the candidates and questions at issue, in a speech described by a political antagonist present, as one of "great power, and which produced a tremendous effect." Although called upon suddenly, yet excited by the occasion, he brought all the sources of his mind to bear upon the subject. He seemed to feel called upon to show cause why he was not found in those ranks in which he had so often and so vigorously done battle for principles which were still dear to his heart. And most ably did he acquit himself. Never has he occupied a prouder position than on that occasion — standing alone, deserted by those who had flattered and courted him in other days, yet clothed with the irresistible power of a good conscience, and a just cause. Having thus given vent to his protest against what he conceived to be injustice and want of principle, he quietly retired to his labor, despising alike government patronage and political honors, if they must be bought by forfeiting allegiance to truth and duty.

During the last winter, while absent from Bath, (which had recently received a city charter,) he was selected, without his own knowledge or consent, to the office of Mayor. The duties

of this office he is now discharging, while he at the same time carries on his usual business.

Of Mr. Morse, as a speaker, enough has been said incidentally, already, to give an idea of the writer's opinion. A few words, only, need be added. His style is clear, correct, and copious—perhaps a little too stately and scholar-like for the highest popular effect. His sentences are harmonious, and always carefully finished. His diction has in it, perhaps, somewhat too large an infusion of the latin element, for a tribune of the people. His habit of always mounting to first principles in his investigation of subjects, has led him sometimes to use scientific and general forms of expression, where singular terms, and idiomatic forms, would have more energy. When, however, he becomes aroused to his intensest glow of passion, these traces of the retired student pass away, and he becomes terse, condensed, and idiomatic.

His correct and cultivated taste, and his familiarity with the masters of English speech, have prevented him from indulging in those cant expressions and low allusions which too often disfigure the speeches of politicians accustomed to address political assemblies. His written productions are marked by a chasteness and beauty of diction and illustration which give proof of equal power as a writer and speaker.

His manner, as a speaker, is excellent. His enunciation is clear and distinct; his voice strong; his position and gestures graceful and dignified. In his early efforts, he spoke somewhat too rapidly, and this, sometimes, gave the impression of a want of repose, but time and practice have, in a great measure, removed these defects. He is, in person, of middle size, slightly inclined to a full habit, of unusual physical strength and agility. He has a full and finely developed forehead, black hair, and a large black eye, which, when he is excited in argument, literally glows and flashes. His intellectual powers are strong, symmetrical, and harmoniously developed. He is, in mind, as well as in body, eminently a robust and healthy man. Had he less strength of reflective and reasoning power, he might show to the superficial observer more of the elements of genius, by giving freer play to a naturally strong and vivid imagination. But though the admirable proportion of his mind may deceive those who do not know him intimately, as to the strength of its individual capacities, it is this, more than any thing else, which has fitted him alike for the debater and the committee man, for the member of an administration or the tribune of an opposition. His will is firm, and his industry indefatigable, and his moral character without reproach. In all the relations of public and private life, no breath of dishonor has ever touched his name, and when the present causes of political excitement shall have passed away, we may confidently expect that he will again be called by the people to the service of the State. But if fidelity to all the turns and

changes of party shall always be thought of more value than fidelity to truth and conscience, his character and example, both public and private, will enroll him among those who deserve well of their country and mankind.

5. Robert Morse appears to have left England about the commencement of the civil war, and to have first established himself in Boston as a tailor. That he was a Puritan of rigid morality, sterling worth, rare enterprise, and considerable property, circumstances attest. He resided at Boston, Newbury, Rowley, and Long Island, before he settled in New Jersey, and was considerably concerned in the transfer of real estate in some of these places. Tradition makes him to have been the brother of Anthony and William; but the records are unfavorable to so near a relationship, though one undoubtedly existed. His moral qualities, as far as hinted at, were more like those of the Dedham family, as have been those of his descendants down to within my own observation. He was perhaps related to both families, and may form the connecting link by which they may be traced to a common origin in England. In this supposition I am strengthened by the allegation of the oldest and one of the ablest genealogists in this country, Jonathan Leland, Esq., of Sutton, that he formerly noticed the resemblance between the races of Samuel and Anthony, and was satisfied of their original identity. Further, John Morse of Dedham, also a tailor and the son of Samuel, moved into Boston and established his business there at the time Robert made his first appearance at Newbury, as though he had taken Robert's place; and when Robert removed to Long Island, Ephraim, the fourth son of John, who had undoubtedly been brought up a tailor, aged about twenty, seems to have attended or soon followed him, and settled at Newton. (See VIII.) The remainder of Robert's history is to be explored in the archives of New Jersey, and particularly in town and church records at Woodbridge, Elizabethtown, and vicinity, where he will probably be seen to have acted a conspicuous and honorable part in founding and conducting the settlement; and where he seems to have laid the foundation for the wealth and respectability of his enterprising race. This part of his history would have now appeared had not a certain communication failed to reach the compiler. Robert, by removing to New Jersey, did not consider himself as forfeiting his interest in the proprietary of Newbury, but did no more than assert his claim. The last deed conveying "all" his private lands in "Auld Newbury" to Nathaniel Clark for £ 90, was signed July 12, 1667, "Robert Morse," as were his other deeds. His race, like himself, appear to have had such a horror of a monotonous life that it is impossible to trace them.

Dr. Morse owned a useless slave, named Pete, at the time of a strong opposition between his personal friend, the late Gov. Ogden, and the affluent Mr. Gibbins, when the latter ran a steamboat free between Elizabethtown and New York. Pete took advantage of the opportunity and walked himself off. The Dr., who cared nothing for the negro, but sympathizing with a

most honorable man, as I believe all the high-minded in the community did, whose eyes were not put out by the glare of Gibbins' wealth; and, not willing that Gibbins should find it for his interest to attempt any longer to break down Ogden, determined to make him pay for the slave, and brought an action. Gibbins defended the suit with great pertinacity, and took it through every stage of litigation that his ingenuity, and that of the ablest counsel could suggest. But there is a bottom to the bottomless pit of chancery, and Gibbins was compelled to pay for the negro with costs. Among other defences which Gibbins put in, was the want of notice or warning, "something equivalent to the putting in mora in civil law pleadings." After the final decision of the case, Dr. Morse, with a very grave face, accosted Mr. Gibbins, expressing surprise that a man of his wealth should object to paying for a negro, and that he should have urged the want of notice or warning; "and now sir," he added, "I give you fair warning, if you ever bring him back, I will sue you for \$ 300 more." "Why," said Mr. Gibbins, "did you not want him?" "No sir, I have often told him if he would run away, and never come back again, I would give him \$ 20."

His course, though censurable, finds an apology in the conduct of Gibbins towards the patriotic Ogden, and the violence of the hostility then existing between their friends.



Hon. Nathan Morse,⁶ Esq. late Recorder of New Orleans, was educated in a private Seminary of great and just celebrity at Elizabethtown, and enjoyed the enviable opportunity of reading law with Gov. Aaron Ogden, a man eminently distinguished by his services in the revolutionary war, and a statesman of the first order. At the age of twenty-one he removed to Cincinnati, then a small village on the Ohio river. Here he remained a year or two, when he removed to New Orleans. In 1808 he married, in Attakapas Co., La., Miss Martha C. only daughter of Judge E. C. Nicholls, one of the most accomplished men of his day, who could write and speak in three or four different languages, as though each had been his vernacular tongue; and who had been appointed to a Judgeship by his acquaintance and friend, President Jefferson.

The author's acquaintance with Judge Morse was too limited to allow of an attempt to sketch his character. I never met him but once, and I must say that no man of the name ever attracted this heart more powerfully. The interview happened twenty-seven years ago, and yet the impression is as vivid and pleasing at this time as though it had been of yesterday's occurrence; and I cannot recall it without an ejaculation, that as long as the name shall endure, every Morse may aim to be a gentle-

man. An incident occurred at this time to draw forth his self-possession, forbearance, and cordial generosity, towards an inexcusable offender. This self-control and generosity of spirit, he must have had in an eminent degree, as the following mournful account, gathered from survivors, will show.

In descending the Mississippi, Oct. 1833, it was discovered that the steamer *St. Martin* was on fire, and in a few minutes all efforts to extinguish the flames were vain. The tiller ropes being burnt, and the engine still in motion, the boat was running at a fearful speed without approaching either shore; and her velocity only fanned the fearful element that was fast consuming the frail boat, and encroaching upon the alarmed passengers. Judge Morse was perfectly calm and collected, and prevented several from jumping overboard while the boat seemed to be running toward one of the shores; but as soon as she took a turn towards the middle of the river, he advised all to take their chance, as the fire was fast approaching the passengers, already crowded together in the fore part of the boat. The greatest danger consisted in their being compelled to dive into the water in front of the wheels, now moving with the velocity of mill-stones, and which were believed to have destroyed most of the company who then perished. With a full consciousness of this danger, Judge Morse determined, at the risk of his own life, to save if possible, a little black boy who accompanied him, and who was much frightened, and unable to swim. He being a very athletic man, an excellent swimmer, and perfectly cool and self-possessed, had a fairer prospect, if unencumbered, of saving his life than others who escaped. He was warned by many of the passengers that the boy would greatly embarrass if not drown him. Still he persisted in the attempt, and throwing off his coat he seized the lad and dove with him as deep as possible to avoid the wheels, but was never seen to rise, being undoubtedly struck as were many others slightly, who dove unencumbered and escaped.

Thus perished, with others, one of the noblest specimens of humanity of which the race could boast, filling large circles in the higher walks, and crowds in the lower, with grief and sadness. As soon as intelligence of his death reached New Orleans, the Bar met, called Geo. Strawbridge to the chair, and resolved, "1st, That the members of the Bar of New Orleans, deeply sympathise with the afflicted family of their deceased brother, Nathan Morse, Esq., who, as a lawyer, a gentleman, and a public servant, has been so long distinguished in this community, and that, in testimony of their respect for his memory, the members be requested to wear crape during the space of 30 days. 2nd, That the members of the Bar will coöperate with the authorities of the city, in any public testimonial to be shown to the memory of the deceased. 3rd, That these resolves, reported by Messrs. Denniss, Eustis, Preston, and Lockett, be communicated to his family, and published in the newspapers of the city."

"Oh, who has not heard of Killarney,

On his return to America in 1834, Mr. Morse commenced the practice of law in New Orleans, but the next year, removed to his present residence in the western part of Louisiana, there continuing his practice until he entered the political arena in 1842. Since then, his course has been so conspicuous, and connected with such momentous events, that the future historiographer will easily find it. I may, however, add, that "the first vote he ever cast, was for Andrew Jackson;" that he was first taken up by the Democratic party, of which he has uniformly continued a member, and elected by them a member of the Senate of Louisiana, for the term of four years. In 1844, he was chosen to fill a vacancy in the 28th Congress, of which body he has, by reëlections, been continued a member up to the present time.

Of course he has been a member of that body in the most eventful period of our country's history since the revolution, and has exerted no common influence upon the destiny of millions. On the issue of still doubtful events, is suspended the decision of posterity on the wisdom of measures which he has supported. Referring to the Congressional Globe, the reader will see his course on the momentous questions relating to the annexation of Texas, the Tariff, the Mexican war, Oregon, Territorial Government of California, and find in his speeches talents of which his constituents may be proud, and language becoming the scholar and the gentleman; and let it be borne in mind, that some of these were made in the height of excitements, becoming Paris more than Washington, and that Mr. M. is an ardent man, and does what he attempts with his might.*

* In the last presidential canvass, he sometimes addressed his constituents in French, six times in twenty-four hours, and so much physical strength does he inherit, that he once swam across the Mississippi, and again walked, in one day, fifty-three miles, carrying a pack of seventeen lbs.

His speech on the death of a member from Louisana, is honorable to his heart, and evincive of rare power to move the affections. I regret the want of space to introduce an extract, which is said to have drenched the house with tears.

But neither correspondents, nor periodicals, have supplied me with ought to record of him so welcome or useful, as the verbal testimony of our northern members to the excellence of his private character.


Hon. Henry Morse⁷ was born in the woods, twelve miles north of Cincinnati; took his first degree in a log cabin, and married at the age of nineteen, with *very* slender means for the support of a family.* Who, under such circumstances, could have risen? But some minds can easier climb the Andes than others mount a stone wall; release themselves from toils without the help of a mouse, in which others, after one struggle, would lie down and die. Judge Morse from a lad was ambitious of an education; and this desire, though long suppressed, finally urged him upon the pursuit at the eleventh hour. When he had arrived almost to the age of thirty, and had accumulated a little property, he began to think it was not too late yet. He then commenced the study of the English Grammar privately, without a teacher, and persevered successfully in his studies, spending many a sleepless night, concealing, under attention to business, what had now become his chief object. Prior to this he had held the offices of Postmaster, Justice of the Peace, &c., and now, at a time when military honors were prized, he was elected Colonel, which office he held for some time; and had his country needed his services in the field, "he certainly had tendered them." In 1834 he was elected State Senator for Hamilton Co., and was the first native of Ohio, (Buckeye,) who ever held a seat in her Senate. In the session of the Legislature of 1837-8 he was elected Associate Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Hamilton County, which office he held for seven years. At the commencement of this term, he began the regular study of the law, and in a very good law school, too, it is presumed, from the ability of the Cincinnati bar, and the variety of causes and pleadings which he heard from the Bench. In due time he made his way to the profession for which he seems to have had an innate desire and adaptation of genius. He read law with Hon. Adam N. Biddle, Esq., was admitted in 1840 to practice in all the courts of Ohio, and in the Circuit and Federal Courts of U. S. He was repeatedly offered partnership by some of the best law-

* His father, a highly respectable and able farmer, whose house was always open and free, the home of the county schoolmaster and itinerant preacher; having expended liberally upon the elder brothers, reserved his home farm for Henry the youngest, but becoming involved by going security for a supposed friend, and dying suddenly without a will, left him nearly nothing.

yers, but declined, and continued on the bench until the expiration of the term for which he had engaged. In 1845, he opened an office in Cincinnati, and commenced practice.* His long employment in public life, the extent of his acquaintance, the soundness of his judgment, and the integrity of his character, secured him at once an extensive practice; and when the whole of his history can be written, it is believed that it will furnish valuable hints to the young, and entertainment to the romantic.

Page 139, No. XCVI.

4. Capt. Theodore Morse, of Falmouth, Mass., was a fine, lofty looking gentleman, distinguished for temperance, piety, and literary taste. Having witnessed a case of suicide in a fit of delirium tremens, he ever after totally refrained from intoxicating drinks, and whenever urged to partake, he would exclaim, in reference to that occurrence, "What, would you have me cut my throat with ———'s razor!" He accumulated a library of ancient and valuable books, which was the wonder of the town, and almost his only source of amusement. Such was his fondness for reading, that he was said to live in his library, into which no one could enter familiarly, except his beloved daughter Berecynthia, whom tradition represents to have been one of the most beautiful young ladies in the colony, endeared to all who knew her by the sweetness of her disposition, the softness of her manners, and the gentle kindness of her heart.†

Capt. M. was exceedingly tenacious of his political opinions, never forgetting his allegiance to his king. His loyalty was rewarded by the royal governor, who sent him, in his old age, a Captain's commission. Of this distinction, if disposed to be vain, he must have soon become weary, for the Whigs gave him the sobriquet of Tory Morse, and with loud threats of tar and feathers, carried him to Cambridge, where he barely escaped, on account of his venerable age.

His son, Rev. Asarelah, a peaceful man, of unsullied purity, of whom it is said, in a book entitled "Two Mites," that "the amenity of his manners smothered away the roughness of his adversaries;" espoused the cause of the Whigs, which compelled

* It is not so easy to determine when he commenced practice, who was almost a lawyer by nature; as appears from the part he took while a youth, on the farm, in deciding disputes, and settling difficulties; in drafting deeds, bonds, &c. with strict legal and equitable correctness, dictated entirely by the natural mind, without ever having opened a law book, or seen the statutes of the State.

† A note, just received, informs me, that Berecynthia, now Mrs. Swift of Lunenburg, aged 86, is still "halting in the waters of Jordan, bereft of speech, and almost of motion, evincing life in an extraordinary memory, and in seeing and hearing as acutely as in middle life. She had experienced the saddest reverses of fortune before, yet when she followed husband, and children, and grandchildren to the grave, she came forth from the furnace with the light of Heaven upon her countenance, often saying, 'He that hath given, hath taken, blessed be His name.'"

him to resign his station as a pastor in Nova Scotia, and make his way as he could to his father's house. Here commenced a political discussion between father and son, which was conducted in writing, and in a very amusing manner, they always handing each others papers with a pair of tongs.

Capt. M. belonged to a race distinguished for longevity. When advanced to a great age, and feeling that his last hours were approaching, he sent for the minister and choir of his church, and after the service was over, he sitting erect in his chair breathed his last.

Page 1, No. 97.

John Moss¹ was one of that noble band who founded the Colony of New Haven. His foresight, courage, and enterprise in embarking in the work; his wisdom and prudence; his self-denial, firmness and perseverance in carrying it on; are well-attested by records, when read in connection with the history of his times, and the privations and trials of his situation. Looking through such media, the observer beholds a character admirable for symmetry, strength, and expression, looming up to view; regrets the distance of time that hinders an embrace; and feels disgust at the deformity and pollution of many a lauded intruder upon his view. John Moss was a godly Puritan. He was fraternized by the holiest and wisest men of his day. He coöperated efficiently and conspicuously with them in works the most honorable and useful ever attempted by human hands. He lived to honor God and do good: and lives there one of his race capable of appreciating moral worth, and sharing in the blessings of which he was instrumental, who can consent to forget him? Too long have we wasted incense at the altars of political gamblers and deified murderers. Let us cease from such mischievous folly and contemplate the heavenborn virtues of this sire until we kindle a flame to God's praise to be fed by the libations of a more consistent posterity.*

Of the time and place of John Moss' birth, and the date of his arrival in New England, we have no certain information. If he had attained his majority when admitted a member of the General Court, 1639-40, he was born as early as 1619, which would have made him 89 years old in 1708, when he, as is alledged, removed from Wallingford. But as his removal at that age is improbable, and as none of his children or grandchildren are known to have attained so great an age, he was not probably born earlier than 1622. That he came unattended by relatives is improbable. Francis "Moss" and Christopher Moss of Boston were not improbably his brothers; and John Moss, who

* For the good of his living posterity, and for the instruction and profit of their descendants, may we not hope for a convention of his race at Wallingford or Cheshire, to exchange the friendly greetings of a common brotherhood, and inscribe on marble or sienite, an expression of filial reverence and gratitude

married into the high family of Robert Kaine of Boston, and owned a house in Shoe Lane, London, might have been of the same race. Hopkins, Eaton, and Davenport, arrived in Boston, June, 1637; too intent on planting at New Haven to listen to proposals from the General Court to settle in Mass. John Moss probably came in that company; and a careful perusal of all the wills of the first planters of New Haven, may enable my correspondents to detect his relatives, and the place in England from whence he came. He was no common youth. Without regard to the tradition which makes him to have been a relative of the father of Bp. Moss, senr., he must either have been of high family, or extraordinary precocity. He doubtless arrived at New Haven, 1638. The first record of him was dated Feb. 18, 1639-40, when he signed a social compact as one of the proprietors and planters, and was admitted a member of the General Court. At this time he was probably a minor.* "Upon the formation of the government he took an oath, July 1, 1644, to support the same." He resided in New Haven thirty years. Perceiving that the time had arrived for the enlargement of her settlements, he was one of the foremost to undertake the settlement of Wallingford, as appears from the following record of the action of New Haven, originating the plantation at that place.

March 11, 1669. 1st. The committee doe consent to put the said village designe into the hands of a competent number of persons fitly qualified for that work, provided they seasonably appear, and engage to undertake the same, upon their articles; and further, shall appoint some fit persons of ye said number to be a committee, with full power to manage their plantation affairs, until the place come to be an orderly establishment within itself.

2d. Ffor ye safety and well being of church affaires for ye ministry and maintenance, the Committee do order, that ye sd undertakers and successors, planters before admitted, shall subscribe the following engagemt, Vide He, or they, as afs'd. shall not, by any means, disturbe ye church when settled there in there choice of Minister or Ministers, or Church officeis, Rights, or in any of their other Church Liberties or administrations, nor shall refuse or withdraw due Maintenance from such ministry, and until such Church be settled, shall Submit to such order as ye said Comitee shall make, for a godly minis. to depence ye word of God among them.

3d. That the saide Committee to be appointed, and their suc-

* The Puritans appear to have regarded rare gifts as a dispensation of Providence, setting aside human law and common usage. Hence Mrs. Hutchinson became a ruling elder in the church at Boston; Mary Starbuck the Queen of Nantucket; John Morse at eighteen the guardian of his brother Seth; and his brother Ezra at nineteen or twenty competent to take public contracts and transfer real estate; and if John Moss brought hither such intellectual superiority as shone forth in his grandson, the grandfather of Moss Kent, he might have been elected in his minority to a seat by the side of hoary headed legislators.

cessors, in Receiving of planters, shall have due respect to new haven persons being fit, and offering themselves, so far as it can Consist with ye good of ye place, and capacity thereof.

4th. Lastly, these articles being accepted, the s^d company, and all others admitted planters among them, shall enjoy their Accommodations and lands without payment of purchase Money to new haven, to themselves, their heirs, successors, and assigns for ever, so far as concerns n haven town's, purchase within the village Bounds.

the said town of N. Haven concenting thereunto.

And we doo nominate Mr. Samuell Street, John Morse, John Brockett, and Abraham Doolittle, to be a comitee, whom we hereby empower to manage all plantation affaires in ye s^d village, according to, and in pursuance of, the above written articles, and to see the same attended and performed by the planters, either are or shall be by them ye s^d comitee admitted, and also for disposal and distribution of allotments in some such equal way shute beste such the condition of the place and inhabitants thereto, and to use the best means they can for procurement of some able and fit man to dispencc the word of god among them, and Lastly, we do empower them, the above named Comittee, to make choice of such other fit persons unto their exercise of their powr and trust, with themselves, for their assistanee, if any such shall appear among them, and the major part of the s^d comitee hereby appointed or inteded, have full powr to act in all the premises as they shall see cause, in pursuance of the s^d articles and undertaking, in testimony whereof, and to all the said articles and promises, we, the comitee appointed by N^w Haven, thereunto have set to our hands.

Extract from Wallingford plantation record, 31, 11 Month, 1669.

"We whose names are underwritten, being accepted by the Comittee of new haven ffor ye intended village, as planters, And desiring that the worships & ordnances of god may In due time be set up and encouraged among us as the maine concernment of a christian People, Do Sincerely, & in the fear of God, Promise and ingage our Souls, that we shall not, neither directly nor indirectly, doe any thing to hinder or obstruct any good meanes that shall be used by the s^d Comittee, or others, intrusted by them to promote the premisses, by procuring a godly and able ministry among us to dispencc to us the word of god; and when Such ministry, or a Church of christ shall be settled among us, we engage by no meanes to disturb the same in there choice of a minister or ministers, or other Church rights, liberties, or administration, nor shall refuse or withdraw due mantanance from such minister or ministry; and further, we doe engage our Soules peaceably to submit to such

settlement and civil order as the s^d comittee shall direct among us, either by themselves, or some others, as a comittee by them appointed upon the place, until the s^d village come to an orderly establishment within its selfe; and lastly, we doe engage, personally, to settle upon the place by may next come twelve month, if Gods providence inevitably hinder not, and to observe and perform all and every the other Articles agreed upon."

Organization of the Church, 15 Feb., 1676, at Wallingford.

"At a lawful and full meeting of ye inhabitants of ye towne of Wallingford, and upon the 15th day of the 2d month inst., 1675, it was ordered and enacted by the towne, that as there had been conference about establishing a church of Christ in the aforesaid towne, and also a solemn day set apart and celebrated by the towne unanimously, to seek Gods guidance in so great a work, they have now also all freely and unanimously concluded, if it be the will of God that there shall be a Church of Christ gathered, and to walk according to the congregational way, and have also all freely and unanimously left the management of the same in the hands of the persons whose names are underwritten, that if it be the will of God to incline their hearts, so many of them as may be a competent number for that work, may, in his time, lay the foundation.

His name was associated with nearly all the leading measures of the village and settlement of Wallingford, for a series of years. The 2d home lot was assigned to him, situated near the south end, on the east side of Main street. His name was early placed on the committee for the distribution of the common lands, where it remained for a succession of years. He was placed at the head of a committee to gather and organize a church; occasionally appointed to defend the accused in civil courts; and on the union of New Haven with Connecticut, he was repeatedly deputed to attend the General Court at Hartford, and was appointed a magistrate. His steadfastness to the interests of the settlement, his abilities and his worth, the records abundantly show. He was a benefactor and ornament to the settlement, and a firm pillar in troublesome and eventful times. The place and date of his death is not reported. If he did not die at Wallingford, his death might have occurred at Jamaica, or at the residence of a daughter, which remains to be discovered.

Page 144, No. XCVIII.

John Moss² removed with his father to Wallingford 1670, and in 1672 signed a second agreement of the proprietors of that place, and had a conspicuous lot assigned him on the west side

of Main street. It does not appear that he took a very active part in public affairs, though his name is recorded in connexion with several minor offices.

Page 144, No. XCIX.

Joseph Moss², the father of Rev. Joseph, long resided at New Haven, filling many offices. He was often juror in the County Courts, and grand juror. He appears from the records, to have been a useful and worthy member of the community at New Haven.

Page 144, 27th Line.

Rev. Joseph Moss³, was grandson of John Moss, one of the first planters of New Haven. J. was an instructor in the grammar school, and afterwards minister of Derby. No clergyman of his time had a higher reputation than Mr. Moss. (Prof. Kingsley's *His. Dis.* p. 93.) He probably had no son of his own, but adopted his 2d cousin, Israel Moss, who resided in Derby until 1721, when he removed to Cheshire. I regret my present inability to report a list of the published works of this eminent minister. On a plain slab of sandstone in D. is inscribed in capitals,

Here lyes interred ye body of the Rev. Joseph Moss,
The faithful and affectionate pastor of the flock in this town
25 years, a learned man, a good christian and a well
furnished divine, who departed this life, Jan. 23,
Anno Domni 1731-2, Ætatis Suæ 53.

With holy ardor of seraphic love,
He dropt this clay, and soared to Christ above.

Page 145, 10th Line.

Joseph Moss⁴ was a warm and zealous defender of the doctrines and worship of the Church of England. To him the Episcopal Church in Cheshire is indebted for its origin. He it was who first gathered some of his friends and neighbours, and read to them the service of that church. In 1760 he purchased the ground on which the Episcopal Church now stands, and, with the aid of a few others, erected a small edifice for the accommodation of the Episcopalians in C. Seven years afterwards, he gave a deed of this ground, and of the adjoining place to the Wardens of St. Peter's Parish "for the consideration of £7, 10s. and for love and good will to the Church of the ever blessed Redeemer." About the same time he deeded the Green to the same officers, and for a like consideration. He continued to act for many years as the lay reader, and clerk of the parish.

Extract of a letter from Hon. Wm. Kent, late Circuit Judge,

New York, Oct. 14, 1849.

The Reverend *Elisha Kent*, my paternal great-grandfather, was a native of Suffield, Connecticut; was graduated at Yale College in 1729; became a Congregational minister, and was settled, first at Newtown, Connecticut, and afterwards in the town of South-East, County of Putnam, in the State of New York, where he resided many years, and died on the 17th of July, 1776. He married *Abigail Moss*, daughter of the Reverend Joseph Moss, of Derby, Connecticut. She died sometime previously to the year 1752.

The only sons of *Elisha Kent* and *Abigail Moss*, so far as I know, were *Moss Kent* (my grandfather,) and *Elisha Kent*. The last named person was, in 1810, living at Royalton, Vermont, aged 76 years; and he has, I believe, descendants in Vermont.

Moss Kent, an amiable and excellent man, of whom my father never spoke without reverence, and the tenderest regard, was born in 1733, and married, in 1760, to Hannah Rogers, daughter of Uriah Rogers, a physician of Norwalk, Connecticut, by whom he had three children, viz: *James Kent*, (my father,) *Moss Kent*, and *Hannah*, who married William Pitt Platt, of Plattsburgh, in the State of New York. The best information I can give you of my grandfather, will be the following extract from an entry made by my father in his family bible.

"February 4th, 1794, about 5 o'clock, A. M., my honored father, Moss Kent, departed this life, at my house in the city of New York, aged 61 years and 10 days. He lay about 18 hours under his last fatal stroke of the Palsy, but it was within two days of a year since he survived his first stroke of the same disease at his residence in Lansingburg, which rendered him unable, ever afterwards, to stand alone. He was brought to my house by my brother, about the 1st of last November. My father was graduated at Yale College in 1752; was admitted to practice law in Dutchess County Court in June, 1755, and lived and practiced law with credit and prosperity at Frederickstown, in Dutchess County, until the late war came on, when he removed to Greens Farm, near Fairfield, in Connecticut. Here he suffered greatly by the ravages of the British troops, and lost almost all his property in Dutchess County, by converting it into the *Continental* money. About six years ago, he moved to Half-moon Point, (now Lansingburg,) in New York, where he resided 'till his disabling stroke of palsy a year ago. He held at Lansingburg, the offices of Surrogate, Justice of the Peace, and Assistant Justice, and was prosperous and happy. He was a firm believer in the christian faith, cordially attached to the principles of the Revolution, and in social and domestic life, everything that was virtuous, endearing, and amiable."

There were sisters of my grandfather. *Sybil Kent* was one,

who married Mr. *John Kane*.* The family of *Kane*, descendants of Sybil Kent, is very numerous, and, I may say, distinguished, in the State of New York, and in Pennsylvania. *Mary Kent*, another daughter, married Malcolm Morrison, and has descendants of the first respectability now residing in our State. Sarah Kent, another daughter, was married to Alexander Grant, an officer in 42 regiment of the British army, who was killed in the revolutionary war. She, I believe, left no descendants. Lucy Kent was married to *Charles Cullen*; has descendants in the State of New York.

The children of my grandfather were, as I have mentioned, *James Kent*, *Moss Kent*, and *Hannah Platt*. Of these, *Moss Kent* died May, 1838, aged 72 years. He was never married. He was a man of great worth, and of the purest character—a lawyer by profession. He held successively the offices of first Judge of the County of Jefferson, was Member of Congress for 4 years, and Register of the Court of Chancery. *Hannah Platt* died in 1846, aged 78 years. She has numerous descendants living in the village of Plattsburgh, one of whom, her son, has the family name of *Moss Kent Platt*, and is a gentleman of high reputation.

I cannot give all that I deem material of the long and useful life of my venerable father, within the bounds of this sheet.

He was born on the 31st of July, 1763, and died on the 12th December, 1847. My father had three children, viz: *Eliza*, who married Sept., 1816, Isaac S. Hone, Esq., of the city of New York, and *Mary*, who married Sept., 1839, the Revd. *John S. Stone*, D. D., Rector of Christ Church, Brooklyn, New York, and *William Kent*, the writer of this letter. During his protracted life of 84 years, he was blessed with unfailing health and energy, physical and mental, and rarely has it been the lot of any one to employ those gifts of Heaven with equal industry, perseverance, and usefulness. In domestic life, he was, as he describes his father, every thing that was “endearing, and amiable, and virtuous”—the best of husbands, the kindest of fathers, the most sympathising of friends, the most fascinating and instructive of companions! He held successively the offices of *Master in Chancery*, *Recorder of the city of New York*, *Judge of the Supreme Court*, *Chief-Justice of the Supreme Court*, and *Chancellor of the State of New York*; and retiring from the last mentioned office at the age of sixty, in accordance with the limitation of our State constitution, he became Professor of Law in Columbia College, and gave to his profession his “*Commentaries on American Law*,” which have become the assistant of every lawyer, and the text book of every law student in the

* QUERY. Is he not descended from Capt. Robert Kaine, through an only son Benj., whose family removed to Lynn at an early day. If so, their ancestor's munificence entitles him to a place along with Harvard, Faneuil, and Yale. His Will, probated about 1656, fills 62 pages, folio, and is a great curiosity.

Union. I shall be supported, I believe, by the opinion of the American lawyers, when I claim, as the result of his professional genius and juridical labors, an immense portion of the great operative code of laws which controls and regulates the affairs and interests of the citizens of his native State — perhaps I might say, of the Union. To almost the last moment of his earthly existence, his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated, and it was with calmness and resignation, amidst the regrets of the whole community, and in firm belief in the Christian faith, that he surrendered up to his Maker that life which he seemed to have used as “ever in his great Taskmaster’s eye.”

Pages 135 and 215. No. CII.*

WILL OF JOSEPH MORSS.⁴

In the name of God, amen.:—I, Joseph Morss of Elizabeth Town, in the County of Essex and Province of New Jersey, being in good health and perfect memory, blessed be God therefor, do, this fifth day of June, Anno Domini one thousand seven hundred and seventy-three, in the thirteenth year of the reign of King George III, &c., make and publish this my last will and testament, in manner and form following (that is to say,) *Imprimis* and first of all I commend my soul into the hands of God who gave it me, and my body to the earth from whence it came. And as for the worldly goods wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me, I dispose thereof as follows:—first, I give and devise, and I do order and my will is that all my debts and funeral charges be paid by my executors out of my movable estate. *Item*;—I give and devise unto my eldest and well-beloved son, Joseph Morss, all my lands, and right to lands which lay above and to the north-west of the first mountain or south mountain, to hold to him, my said son Joseph Morss, and to his heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise unto my two sons, John Morss and Isaac Morss, my great island of upland called Pardon's Island, to be equally divided between them, share and share alike, to hold to the said John Morss and Isaac Morss, and to their heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise unto my said son, John Morss, the one-half of my lot of land at the Roundabouts, that I purchased from Francis Bucklowe in the County of Middlesex, being the westernmost half of said lot, and in breadth five chains, to hold to my said son, John Morss, and to his heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise the other half of said lot which I purchased from said Francis Bucklowe, unto my son Isaac Morss, and to his heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise unto my son John Morss, the south-east half part of my lot of salt meadow at Pardon's Island, that was purchased from Capt. John Baker by my father Joseph Morss, deceased, and the other half I give and devise unto my son Isaac Morss, to hold to them, the said John Morss and Isaac Morss, their several heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise unto my son John Morss, all that part of my lot of salt meadow that I purchased from David Donham, which lies to the north-east of a large ditch, and the other half I give and devise to my son Isaac Morss, to hold to them the said John Morss and Isaac Morss, and to their several heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise to my son Isaac Morss, that part of my homestead near to my mills, and begins at the north-west corner of the lot left for the use of the mills, called the Mill Lot, by the mill-pond, thence south thirty-six degrees, east one chain and sixty links; then south eighty-seven degrees, west one chain to the middle of the old well; then south seventy-nine degrees and fifteen minutes, west seven chains to an apple tree; then north fifty-three degrees, west to the mill-pond and creek; then down the same to the beginning, bounded south-east by said Mill Lot, to hold to him, the said Isaac Morss, and to his heirs and assigns forever. *Item*;—I give and devise unto my son John Morss, that other part of my homestead called the small orchard, beginning at the south-

ernmost corner of a piece of land I have sold to my son John Morss, in the middle of the road that leads from Oliver's bridge down to my mills; thence south-westerly six chains and a half, through a small swamp or pond to the land of Amos Morss; then along the same north-westerly to the mill-pond; thence down the same to another of John Morss's corners on the middle of the bridge; then along the middle of the aforesaid road to the beginning; also I give and devise to my said son, John Morss, another part of my homestead, beginning at the east corner of a lot of salt meadow belonging to Capt. John Scudder; thence north twenty-one degrees and a half, west to the middle of said road; then north fifty-five degrees, east along the road two chains; then south fifty-six degrees east, to the salt meadow of other persons; then by the same to beginning, bounded south-west and north-east by land hereafter devised to my son Isaac; also another part of my homestead whereon he now lives, lying to the north-westward of the middle of the road aforesaid, and is bounded north-east by the mill lot and land before given to my son Isaac Morss, south-east by the middle of the aforesaid road, south-west by land of said John Morss, and north-west by said Thompson's creek; also I give and devise to my said son, John Morss, the one equal moiety and half part of the aforesaid mill lot, which begins at the easternmost corner of a piece of land before devised to my son Isaac Morss, at the mill-pond; thence south thirty-six degrees, east one chain and sixty links; then south sixty-seven degrees, east one chain and twenty links; then north seven degrees, east one chain and eighty-five links to about six feet below the mill, to said creek; together with one half of the mills, and utensils, stream, and all other privileges and advantages had, taken, used and heretofore deemed to belong thereto; also, I give to my said son, John Morss, a small piece of land on Thompson's creek, below my dwelling house, in length six rods; bounded north by said creek, east by the landing, and south by said road, to have and to hold the several tracts and parcels of land, with the buildings, utensils, and privileges thereunto belonging or appertaining, to him my said son, John Morss, his heirs and assigns forever. *Item*; — I give and devise unto my son Isaac Morss, my dwelling-house where I now live, with that part of my homestead whereon it stands, bounded north-west by the mill lot and land given to my son John, and the middle of the road, south-west by land given to my son John Morss, east and north-east by the salt meadow of other persons, and north by said creek and small lot given to John Morss; also, another part of my said homestead, bounded south-west by Amos Morss's land, north-westerly by land given to my son John as above, and the middle of the road, and north-east by land before devised to my son John, and south-east by the meadow of John Scudder and Daniel Terril; also, I give and devise to my said son Isaac Morss, the other equal moiety and half part of the mill lot, mills, utensils, privileges and advantages whatever belonging thereto, to have and to hold the above-said several tracts and parcels of land, with the mills and privileges thereunto belonging as above mentioned unto my said son, Isaac Morss, and to his heirs and assigns forever. *Item*; — It is my will and I do hereby order and direct that if my said son, Isaac Morss, should happen to die before he arrive at the age of twenty-one years, without issue lawfully begotten of his body, then and in that case I give and devise to my son John Morss, all the several tracts of lands, buildings, privileges and advantages so devised to my son Isaac Morss, I give unto my said son, John Morss, to hold to him the said John Morss, and to his heirs and assigns forever; and my will further is, and I do hereby order and direct that in case my said son Isaac Morss should die before he arrive to the age of twenty-one years without lawful issue as aforesaid, then and in that case I order and direct that my son John Morss shall pay within one year after the death of my said son Isaac Morss, the several sums and legacies hereinafter

mentioned, (to wit :) to my son Joseph Morss, the sum of fifty pounds ; to my daughter Easter Marsh, widow, the sum of fifty pounds ; to my daughter Hannah Roome, wife of Jacob Roome, the sum of fifty pounds ; and to my daughter Rachel Winans, wife of Matthias Winans, the sum of fifty pounds ; and also a further sum of fifteen pounds to my daughter Hannah Roome, in lieu of a legacy which I shall order my son Isaac to pay to her when he arrives at the age of twenty-two years. *Item* ; — I give and devise unto my daughter Easter Marsh, widow, all that piece of salt meadow that I purchased from Robert Morss, joining meadow of Peter Trembles, to hold to her, my said daughter Easter Marsh, and to her heirs and assigns forever. *Item* ; — I give and devise to my daughter Rachel Winans, wife of Matthias Winans, all that lot of salt meadow which I purchased from Richard Kinny and John Little, bounded south-west by meadow of David Donham, deceased, north-west by said Thompson's creek, to hold to her, the said Rachel Winans, and to her heirs and assigns forever. And as to my movable estate, I give and bequeath the same in the following manner. After my debts and funeral charges are paid, all the remaining part I give and bequeath unto my well-beloved wife Anne Morss, my three daughters, Easter Marsh, Hannah Roome, and Rachel Winans, to be equally divided between them, share and share alike, that is, each to have a quarter thereof. *Item* ; — My will is, and I do order that my wife shall have the use and profits of all the lands, meads, mills, tenements, advantages and privileges whatever, which I have herein this my last will given to my son Isaac Morss, so long as she shall continue my widow, and no longer ; and it is my will that, should my wife refuse to accept of what is given to her as her dower, then I give and bequeath unto my son John the use and profits of two-thirds of what I have given to my son Isaac Morss, during the life of my said wife ; and my will is, and I do hereby order and direct that my son John Morss shall pay to my daughter Hannah Roome, within three months after my decease, the sum of fifteen pounds ; and that my son Isaac do pay to her, my said daughter Hannah Roome, also the sum of fifteen pounds more when he attain to the age of twenty-two years. *Item* ; — It is my will and I do hereby order that my negro man, named Peter, shall be free at my decease, and receive the profits of his own labor, and in case he shall become poor and unable to support himself, then I order that the estate which I have given to my two sons John and Isaac, shall be chargeable for his maintenance, equal alike, and I hereby appoint the Mayor of the Borough of Elizabeth for the time being to see it duly performed, and I do desire and empower him to perform the same. And I do make and ordain my loving brother, Amos Morss, sole executor to this my last will and testament, and in case of the death or disability of the said Amos Morss, then I make and ordain my nephew Samuel Wood to be my sole executor to this my will, and I do hereby revoke and disallow all and every other former will and testament by me made, ratifying this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I, the said Joseph Morss, have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

Page 223. No. CIII.

The opening of the American war found Dea. Ebenezer Moss on the frontier in Vermont, where as a member of a Committee of Safety he was peculiarly obnoxious to tories, who sent out threats that if they could get "curled head Moss in their clutches, they would put him where he would lie quiet." The history of his flight in 1777 would make a chapter of romance.

He long served as deacon in the Congregational church; and on the day previous to his death, he conversed with sweet composure and familiarity on his approaching end; alleging that he was prepared to die, and had no desire to live longer; that he should soon converse with departed saints, calling them by name, and behold the resplendent glories of his divine Redeemer, adding "there is a great deal of good company in Heaven."

He married Elizabeth Kent, probably the niece of Rev. Elisha Kent, and the daughter of Mr. Kent, of Suffield, by wife Elizabeth Spencer, a "precious woman of cherished memory," who, early deprived of her first husband, married Mr. Austin, of Torrington, Ct., and trained up a numerous offspring in the way they should go. "Her piety appeared to all; and the exceeding sweetness of her natural disposition, connected with unusual refinement of feeling, and the most happy and winning address, disarmed the enemy of her religion, and made the weapons of asperity itself drop harmless." And the same excellent spirit dwelt also in her daughter, Elizabeth Kent. The following narrative is illustrative of her religious history, while her praise as a mother may be read in her living descendants of three generations, and no doubt explored in others yet to come:—

"Not long after her marriage the Lord visited her with sickness, and she expected very soon to appear at his tribunal. Her agonies of body and mind were indescribable. But in the height of her mental distress, Christ appeared to calm the surges of her spirit, and the voice, 'Live, for I have found a ransom,' filled her with peace.

"At the commencement of the revolutionary struggle, her mind became greatly distressed with the apprehension, then encouraged and generally entertained, that if vanquished, we should be persecuted for our religion, and she be tempted to forsake her Redeemer. While thus harassed, she commenced washing for her family; when a scene opened to her vision which she declared she could never forget nor describe. Such entrancing views of Christ, such a rush of sweet, consoling, enrapturing scriptures were poured in upon her soul, that she lost sight of the world, while at her work; and when hanging out her clothes, could not remember that a single worldly thought had passed her mind since she commenced; and she was now prepared to say, Come British, come persecution, come death, in all your terrors, I am fully armed, and ready to meet you. From that time her doubts and fears were few, and of short duration, and during much of the remainder of her life, she enjoyed the faith of assurance."

Riches are deceitful, and beauty is vain, but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised.

Page 223. No. CIV.

Doct. Alpheus Morse read medicine with Dr. Maine, of Dorset, received his diploma, July 18, 1800, from the first medical Society in Vermont; practised in Dorset 1801-31, in Lewis, N. Y., 1831-37, and in Upper Jay, N. Y., 1837-51. Ambitious mainly to merit the character of a good physician, when offices of honor and profit not connected with his profession have been offered, he has uniformly declined them from inclination and a sense of duty; well satisfied, no doubt, as men of science must be, that the physician who goes into politics ought

to go out of practice. But I must not attempt his history. Propriety commands me to suppress what had flowed out upon my sheet in relation to this venerable man ; yet I cannot refrain from joining in the request of others, that he would record the ways of God to him and his, with his reflections thereon ; and this for a more public work than a mere family journal. Late intelligence inspires hope of his compliance ; as he enjoys such health, now in his eighty-third year, as to continue his practice. And long may he survive as an instrument of good to a degraded world, ere he sleeps with his fathers, and is numbered with those who have done virtuously.

Page 223. No. CV.

“ Mrs. Maria Morse, consort of Rev. Hiram Chamberlain, was the first eastern female who followed the tide of emigration to Missouri, as a missionary from the Home Missionary Society. Under the nurturing hand of pious parents, and the ministry of Rev. William Jackson, she had early given her heart to Christ, and publicly pledged her life to his service. The spirit of Mills and Newell was abroad, and her eyes had followed their paths of light over the dark waters to heathen shores, and were watching the rising empire of her Saviour there. In several revivals where her influence was felt, it was manifest that her bosom glowed with zeal in the cause of missions. Yet when her hand was first sought as a companion of a missionary to Missouri, she deemed herself unworthy of such an arduous service, but at last yielded to the invitation with a trembling anxiety about her qualifications ;” and it was very apparent to the compiler, who had several interviews with her at Newark, N. J., that she went not forth to the field in her own strength. “ Proceeding with her husband she arrived at St. Louis, March 8, 1826. The fatigue of such a journey in so inclement a season, connected with the change of climate, and loss of her infant in the ensuing summer, so impaired her health, that she languished for twelve months upon the borders of the grave ; willing, and to mortal eyes prepared to go to her final rest.” The calmness of her mind, as in other cases, no doubt conduced to her recovery, and “ her years were lengthened out. She subsequently visited her paternal home, received a last farewell from a numerous circle of endeared friends, and then returned with cheerfulness, and with such resignation that she was never known to sigh for a second visit to her father’s house. She was at home in the West, — she loved the country and she loved her work ; and only regretted the want of strength to perform her part in the sphere of her husband’s labors. In the winter of 1834, she was violently attacked with influenza, from which she calmly warned her friends not to expect her recovery. She had previously appeared unusually spiritual, spending much time in prayer and devotional reading, thus becoming prepared for the approaching conflict. The birth of a son, was followed by inflammation of the brain. Of course her last, were days of untold sufferings ; yet marked by sweet submission. So profound was this, that it appeared like scintillations of light, even in the darkness of her delirium. During intervals of reason, she spoke sweetly of Heaven. To the questions, Are you willing to die ? are you willing to live ? she meekly answered, ‘ If it is the Lord’s will.’ Her heart overflowed with gratitude to friends for their kindness. A few hours before her death, she inquired the day of the week, and when informed how late it was, she smiled with joy in anticipation of rest ; adding, ‘ It is well.’ She then desired prayers, saying, ‘ Bless the Lord, my dear husband, O, bless the Lord !’ She then continued to say, ‘ Listen, oh listen ! I hear it, I hear it !’ and sunk to rest.”

From her diary it appears that her mother was the author of the following covenant, which the daughter adopted, and which has been extensively published and recommended : —

"I now promise in the presence of my heart-searching God, that, by the assistance of the Holy Spirit, I will daily pray for the following objects : —

"On the Sabbath, for Sabbath schools and all ministers of the gospel.

"On Monday, for all missionaries and the spread of the gospel.

"On Tuesday, for all my relations and friends, and the impenitent.

"On Wednesday, for the outpouring of the Spirit on the churches.

"On Thursday, for colleges and common schools.

"On Friday, for the Jews and heathen.

"On Saturday, for all the benevolent exertions of the day, and for a blessing on the holy Sabbath."

Page 225. No. CVI.

Abijah H. Moss, Esq., is perhaps the only individual of his race who has attained to refinement and honorable distinction without the ordinary helps, and in opposition to most adverse influences. His father, naturally enterprising and industrious, was a man against whom the tide of adversity beat hard and long. Allured by the prospect of improving his condition, he, about 1801, removed from Bridport, Vt., to Lower Canada. Geology was then unknown. Here, judging as thousands are still doing, from the color of the soil, the position of the surface, the frequency of the springs, and the size of the trees, *irrespective of geological formation*, he purchased a tract of wild land, far better adapted to the growth of sorrel than the cereal grains, and commenced opening a farm far remote from any considerable settlement. Here the subject of this notice was born. But as the act of Congress of 1802 declares that the children of parents who then were, or had been citizens of the United States, though born out of the jurisdiction of the same, shall be considered as citizens, he is, and ever has been, by the terms of this act, a citizen of the United States. The father continued upon the farm until the son was seven years old, subject to all the privations, hardships, and perils of a wilderness. Bears and wolves were thick and destructive. So bold were the latter, that in their nocturnal maraudings, they would surround his premises, "break into barns and stables where sheep had been put for safety, killing, and throwing into a huge pile, in the middle of the floor, an entire flock."

At length, after twelve years of fruitless toil, hope was relieved by despair. He abandoned "his farm without being able to sell, or dispose of it," removed to Sheffield, now Waterloo, and for two years engaged in merchandising, tavern-keeping, and milling. He next resided at St. Armand, then at St. Johns; and in 1816 he returned to Whitehall, N. Y. From thence he removed ten miles west of Cayuga Lake, to a country "then regarded as almost beyond the bounds of civilization." His wandering life had now exhausted his means, and the whole dependence of a family of eleven was on the labor of the father and elder children. Here he shifted from one thing to another until he obtained a tavern upon the great thoroughfare four miles east of Geneva, and commenced a lucrative business. But fortune only smiled to give edge to another frown; for on the 26th of March, 1818, while the inmates were asleep, the house took fire, and so rapid was the spread of the flames, that they barely escaped with their lives, leaving their clothing and all the contents of the building above the lower story to be consumed. The son, then twelve years old, awakened by the cry of fire, now bursting into his room, thought only of safety for himself and a younger brother in another chamber, whom older room-mates had left asleep; and rushing in, awoke him and attempted to flee down stairs. But being driven back by the flames, they escaped by leaping from a chamber window upon the frozen ground. When morning came, the son, who fared no harder than the rest, found himself without hat, shoes, or a rag of woollen clothing. Char-

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



ity administered *some* relief, but nothing to reinstate the father. For a time he knew not where to go, or what to do; and here let us adore the sovereignty and goodness of God. For, had this calamity befallen them in a manufacturing country, we had never heard of Abijah H. Moss. His age and tractability, the wants of the family, and high wages, would have hurried him from a pure air, as needful to the growth of the mind as the vigor of the body, and immured him in a cotton mill, where the agent and incorporation would have done all his thinking for him, assigned him his task, paid him his wages, cajoled him with flatteries, and given him, by day and by night, for life and for death, all the carbon he could breathe, and have made him a slave in every thing but belief and law.*

The father finding nothing better, commenced making brick at Waterloo, and the next three seasons carried on the same business at Niagara, U. C., the son working in the yard with him, when not down with the ague and fever. During all this seed-time our friend had nearly *no* opportunity for learning. But in the autumn of 1822, he returned; and now in his eighteenth year, first attended a *district* school, where grammar and geography were taught.

The next spring he joined his father, who in the mean time had purchased land in Porter, N. Y., and "camped" upon it with his family in a log-cabin. Here he passed two years, attending short district schools, denuding land, making brick, and waiting upon a sick family, especially upon his worthy mother, in her last hours. But by improving his minutes of relaxation, studying often by fire-light, he accomplished himself to teach school, and excelled in the employment. From 1825 to 1827, he was clerk in a store at Lockport, and in 1828, employed on the Pennsylvania canal, at Pittsburg. In 1829 he engaged in merchandising at Lockport, which business he relinquished in good credit in 1833. During this time he became inspector of common schools, and Colonel in the militia. In 1834 he was chosen to the highly responsible office of County clerk for the term of three years; after which he entered the office of Messrs. Gardner & Bradley, of Lockport, as a student at law, was admitted in 1840 to practice in the County courts, and subsequently in all the courts of N. Y. The continued confidence of his fellow citizens is manifest in his repeated election as supervisor and treasurer of L., in his regular nomination by the Whigs of Niagara Co., for the office of County judge, and by his election to the Legislative assembly of N. Y., of which body he is now a respected member.

Page 53, No. 5, 15th Line. (Omitted as Note No. LV 1-2.)

John Morse, of Rock Island, was from his youth of a grave and placid temper, fond of sentimental books and natural science; averse to light reading, frivolous amusements, and vile company. With only common advantages he acquired a thorough English education, and established a character for integrity, "unquestioned and unquestionable." In 1827, he engaged in mercantile business in Newyork. Here, in 1830, he united with the Presbyterian church, Rev. Dr. Spring, pastor, and subsequently evinced the efficiency of the faith he had embraced. His contributions to the American Education Society, and other charitable institutions, were worthy of imitation by men in better circumstances; and attest how dear to his heart the spread of the Gospel had become. In 1836, he removed to Rock Island, Ill., not like many, "leaving their religion behind," but bearing it in meekness and love before all he met. "He came a stranger

* Among the chief instruments of slavery are chains, superstition, and carbon; and carbon is the best, because it allows the master to prove, and the slave to believe, that he is free, and when he can no longer work he goes *home* and dies. Surely, if the slaveholders would take a lesson from the Cotton-mill, they might abolish legal slavery, and keep all their slaves.

among strangers, and was by strangers beloved. None could meet him in the house of God, or in the common walks, without feeling that *he* was seeking a better country. At the organization of the Presbyterian church he became a member and elder, and was the superintendent, and for years the life and soul of the Sabbath school. His communications were uniformly courteous and kind. As a man and consistent Christian he was universally respected; and by the members of the church, he was cherished as a brother *peculiarly* and *emphatically* beloved." He fell in the meridian of life; but that life is long which answers life's great end.

ADDENDA AND ERRATA.

To Note XXVIII, Lines 5-10. This was the site of the house of Nicholas Wood, built 1652, and first inherited by his son Jona. Capt. M., about 1672, built 33 rods south of it, where Walter Barbour's house now stands, and where public worship was first set up in Sherborn, prior to the erection of their meeting-house. He subsequently received a grant of forty acres for accommodating the congregation. About 1710 he, with Capt. Jos. Ware, built the first grist-mill three-fourths of a mile above, on Sewall's brook, and soon after sold out to W., whose descendants now occupy the privilege. Page 5, 2d Line. Capt. M. was delegated by S. to the general court to urge her petition for a grant of lands west of Mendon, which led to the acquisition of Douglass, first called New Sherborn. He took the freeman's oath May 15, 1672. Page 1, 15th Line.—Erase "*fathers*." Nicholas Wood, who attained his majority about 1630-32, d. Feb. 7, '69-70, leaving £1,049 in lands and houses at Bogistow, Boston, Roxbury, Milton, Watertown, and in 88 *bushels of wheat* at 4s. 6d. *per bushel*; Indian corn at 3s. do.; 12 oxen, at £60; 4 horses and a colt, at £15; 11 cows, at £36; 12 young cattle, at £24; 12 swine, at £7½; 13 sheep and 3 lambs, at £6; 2 carts and 2 *tumbrells*, 7 sickles, 6 scythes, *hemprake*, &c. In his will, Jan. 16, '69-70, he speaks of having been "for some considerable time under the afflicting hand of God; as having most and chiefest care of his soul; and as trusting, through the mercy of Jesus Christ, that after death he should immediately inherit life and glory." He married Mary, probably Williams, and sister of Robert W., of Roxbury, by whom he had 1. Jonathan, 2. Eleazer, and 6 daughters. 1. Jona., killed by Indians, left only Silence, (posthu.), great-great-grandmother of Amos Twitchell, M. D., of Keene, N. H. 2. Eleazer, scalped and left for dead, by do., had only daughters, and was the ancestor of Rev. Dr. Ware, late of H. U., Judge Asher Ware, of Me., Rev. Dr. Park, Pres. of Theological Seminary, Andover.

The relation of Joseph Morse to the service in the campaign of 1756 is variously reported. Could he have been a mere sutler? To N. S. he was attended by gentlemen who must have known his history, and there he was always understood to have been Commissary General. Instead of having been recaptured on his way to France, he was carried to Bordeaux and there detained a prisoner until ransomed, either by government or by Lord Amherst. While in captivity he contracted the small-pox, and not having medical aid, his constitution was so affected that for the seven remaining years of his life, he was compelled to subsist upon frog broth and milk, throwing up again every particle not absorbed by his system. Prior to his return he was introduced at Court, furnished with a physician, with whom, at the expense of Government, he made the tour of the three kingdoms. Having lost at the capture of Oswego eight barrels of dollars, besides other property to a great amount, the Government gave him a most valuable tract in and around Fort Lawrence, and upwards of 50,000 acres now in N. B. and N. S., and probably continued him in office. He built one of the forts at Fort Lawrence, and a large house in which he had *worship on the Sabbath*. In him Government reposed great confidence. He was the first man of his day in all that part of the provinces. He spoke the French and Indian languages fluently; all depended upon him, and no man could have been more respected. Among his acts of benevolence still remembered, was the establishment, at his own expense, of a free school, to which all were invited to send. And by officers in the service who knew him well in N. S., he was represented as well informed on all subjects, a perfect gentleman in his manners, and one of the most just, honorable, kind, and amiable of men.

RICHARD SANGER.

Richard Sanger,¹ of Hingham, was early with the planters of that town, who came originally from Hingham, in Norfolk, England. He was doubtless a follower of Rev. Robert Peck, of whom Bloomfield says in his History of Norfolk, "he was a man of a very violent schismatical spirit, he pulled down the rails and levelled the altar and the whole chancel a foot below the church, but being prosecuted for it by Bp. Wren, he fled the km. and went over into New England with many of his parishoners, who sold their estates for half their value, and conveyed them to that new Plantation; erected a Towne and Colonie by the name of Hingham where many of their posterity are still remaining. He promised never to desert them, but hearing that the Bishops were deposed, he left them all to shift for themselves and came back to Hingham in 1646; * and after ten years of voluntary banishment, he resumed his rectory."

Richard Sanger¹ must have been a true Puritan. If betrayed and deserted, he had the firmness and self-denial to abide by the principles which he had espoused; and he remained in New England to inculcate these upon his race; no one of whom for 215 years has to my knowledge been seen squinting towards Rome, or manifesting any peculiar disposition to think in leading-lines. Though himself a humble man, circumstances ascribe to him a moral greatness which ought to render his memory conspicuous and grateful to his latest posterity.

The first planters of Hingham arrived in 1634. Richard Sanger,¹ with others, had lands formally assigned him in 1636 and 1637; and in April, 1638, "his servant embarked for New England at South Hampton." He subsequently drew lands, as other allotments were made, and he evidently lived respected and fraternized by that vigilant and devoted colony until his death, Jan. 25, 1661. He is supposed to have left only one son, 1. Richard.²

1. Richard Sanger,² having with his father, been "left to shift for himself," settled as a blacksmith at Sudbury, 1646, took the oath of fidelity 1647,† removed 8, (9mo.) 1649, to Watertown, where he died Aug. 20, 1690, leaving an estate, the inventory of which, though humble in amount, shows that he had, for his day, the ordinary comforts and conveniences of life. To him and his two adult sons, with three others, was intrusted, during Philip's war, the charge of guarding the mill at Watertown.

 shop. After passing the customary year of probation, he was
 approved as a good and wholesome inhabitant, and presented, by a
 vote of the proprietors July 1, 1689, with "20 acres of land and
 town rights in future with themselves; he to bear proportionable
 charges with them in the town, having no power to sell, let, or give
 said land for the space of 7 years." He subsequently, and at
 different times, drew other lots. July 5, 1690, Edward West gave
 him a deed of 31 acres, i. e. 12 of meadow received by his wife from
 her father Daniel Morse, (jun.), and 19 of upland received from the
 town. This tract was bounded N. by West's land which separated it
 from Rev. D. Gookin's; "W. by the road (from the plain), to the
 Meeting house in part: S. by Jon^a. and Nath'l. Morse's, and by
 common lands on all other parts." This includes the site of Elbridge
 Sanger's buildings. By common lands must be included for
 burying-ground which formed a part of the West boundary; for
 Eleazar Morse in 1722 deeded to "Richard Sanger³ $\frac{3}{4}$ acres bounded
 E. by Richard's own land," and "N. with the common land reserved
 or set apart for the burying place,"* (see Mid Reg. of Deeds, Lib.

*Richard Sanger³ having become the proprietor on three sides of this Reservation, probably inclosed it with his own land, as in it few interments had yet been made. The town being interested in two older grave yards, and having no record of the reservation, neglected to fence it, until it came to be regarded as private property. The late Capt. Samuel Sanger so regarded it,

32), "W. by the highway leading from the Plain to the S. part of Sher. and S. by Wm. Barron's, the said land being near the Meeting house." Richard's³ estate at his death was inventoried at £706, not including town rights and allotments at Douglas. He seems to have been a useful and respected citizen and an exemplary member of society. To him was committed the sacred charge of taking care of the Meeting house, to which his was much the nearest dwelling. His children were:—

id. 7 Richard⁴ was a remarkable man. He inherited the combative, mirthful, acquisitive, and persevering characteristics of his mother's race, and excelled them in enterprize. He was brought up to the business of his father, and continued to be styled blacksmith until thirty years of age. Soon after attaining his majority, he purchased of Rev. Daniel Baker, two acres on the west side of the road, opposite his father's land, bounded south and west by Baker, and north by James Coolidge; and the next year commenced building the north two story half of the *Old Sanger House*, now occupied by Joseph Sanger. At the age of 23 he m. Deborah, dg. of Hn. William Rider, by wf. Deborah Morse, (see "Mem. of Morses," p. 3,) and at the next town meeting received a certificate of his marriage in the customary form of an election to the office of hogreeve. About this time he seems to have come into possession of the five acre building lot of Rev. Daniel Gookin, now in the first lot on the east side of the way upon the plain north of the meetinghouse, and for some time to have lived in the Gookin house. This house stood upon an eminence near the north side of the lot, and about twenty rods east of the road. His shop stood between the house and highway. On the death of his father, two thirds of his real estate was assigned to him and his brother David, whom he, in 1735, bought out. He soon after took down the Gookin house, and reerected and adjoined it to the south end of the tenement he commenced in 1729. This part of the house was built in 1679, and is 171 years old. Near it may still be seen in the rear of Eldridge Sanger's house, the Old Gookin Barn, having by repeated demands for sound tenants to new sills, lost half of its lower story.

and repeatedly offered to give the land, if the town would inclose it. But they disregarded the offer, and he, for the sake of decency, inclosed the portion containing monuments, and used it as a private burying place; and it has since, in opposition to the wishes and efforts of his heirs, been sold and subjected to profane trespass.

In 1733, he purchased, for £63, of Edmond Quiney and William Brattell, commissioners for the sale of lands formerly given by the town to Rev. D. Baker, seven acres south of his own land, east of the road from the meetinghouse to the south end, north of the farm road, and Nathaniel Holbrook's land, and west of N. Holbrook's.

In 1734-5, he bought, of Rev. Wm. Cooper and Judith his wife, (pr. the dg. of Chief Justice Sewall), 200 acres, or one half of the Hull Farm; Capt. Joseph Ware purchasing at the same time the other half.

In 1737, he opened a store, which he seems to have left in the hands of another in 1747, when he removed to Boston, and for a short time did a large and lucrative business. The climate disagreeing with the health of his lady, he returned the next year to S., purchased the Phipps' farm and mansion, and there traded extensively in merchandize, lumber, and real estate. He was at that day concerned in land speculations in Maine. He accumulated a large fortune, which he divided among seven children, without reserving enough for protracted old age.

Between 1740 and '67, he served the town ten years as selectman, and often acted as moderator at town meetings. He was a good whig, served on committees to provide for the poor of Boston, in the time of the war, and to report on the services of soldiers employed by S. In 1776, he was the first man placed on the committee of safety with President Locke.

His wife, the daughter of the accomplished surveyor and clerk, William Rider, and the neice of Rev. Joseph Morse of Stoughton, was a lady of uncommon dignity and excellence. Her library consisted of such works as Willard's Divinity, Flavel's and Tillotson's works, &c.

From the markings in these volumes, I infer that she kept a theological school in the nursery, doubtless from the conviction that doctrine is the only foundation of correct practice. She died Aug. 15, 1789, aged 79, but her influence survives to this day.

4. [3.] Capt. Samuel Sanger,⁵ sen^r, was distinguished for his athletic frame, personal dignity, moral integrity, courage, independence, and energy. During a long period of active life, he bore a conspicuous part in the civil transactions of Sherborn, and was eminently serviceable during the great conflicts for our liberties and the maintainance of the constitution against the rebellion of '87. Then it was, that his appeals, from the moderator's chair, were wont to rouse his townsmen to enthusiasm in their country's cause; so that no town of its size in this patriotic commonwealth, went before S. in the number of volunteers for the public service, or in promptness in furnishing supplies. To him Pomologists owe the discovery and first cultivation of the incomparable Porter apple. He inherited the ancient Sanger house, kept a small store and tavern, and once entertained Gen. Washington. As a landlord he did much to discourage idleness and excess. No man dared roll at his ninepins between one holiday and another. Gross offenders against decency and good order would hide from his presence, and feel more terror at his rebuke, than at all the fulminations of the pulpit. On the sabbath his bar was locked, and a key of gold could not open it; yet his rooms were open and fires free during the interim of divine service, while a solemnity befitting the day, reigned throughout the house, and no discourse was entered upon which could interrupt him in his uniform practice of reading the Bible.

Whether his double share of Morse blood secured him an innate propensity to mirthfulness, is unknown. If so, he probably suppressed it, as incompatible with dignity; for his gravity was marked and uniform, and his presence produced in common minds a feeling of awe. Of this he was sensible and often turned it to a good account.

Once the town was thrown into great excitement; the citizens assembled in town meeting, became tumultuous, so that reason could not utter her voice. Hearing of the disgraceful scene, the first perhaps, of the kind, that had ever *then* occurred in S., he, though more than 80 years old, hastened to the right of the moderator, where his act of uncovering himself to speak, like a magician's wand, hushed the tumult of voices into breathless and attentive silence.

But never, in a life of 87 years, did this patriarch ever appear in such true dignity, as when, at the age of 3, with a mind scarcely impaired, and with joyous, yet solemn steps, he came forth from the world to testify his faith in a crucified Redeemer.

Hon. Calvin Sanger,⁶ of Sherborn, one of the most distinguished citizens who ever lived in this ancient town, was not born to an independency, nor favored with academical advantages above the youth of his day in the country. His constitution was naturally feeble, and his health too precarious to justify hopes of success in the toilsome pursuits of agriculture, then the only pursuit towards which the emulation of his associates was directed. Under circumstances thus adverse, he passed his minority without any regular initiation for either mechanical, mercantile, or professional employments. But not more wisely adapted to beneficent ends, are nature's irregularities in the physical world, than are the dispensations of Providence to develope talent when and where it is needed. Sherborn would soon want a leader. Her aged counsellor and guide, Daniel Whitney, Esq., was advanced in years. Her social and civil order, which had been preserved with scarcely a temporary interruption, from the arrival of Nicholas Wood and his colony in 1652, would be in danger. Her inhabitants, being an intelligent, strong-minded, and independent yeomanry, would furnish numerous aspirants, with equal claims to office ; the political sophistries, and base appeals of Jefferson's pen, to the vilest passions and prejudices, were being circulated ; men

were taking sides ; the political conflict was coming on ; and some man of master spirit would soon be needed for the good of all. Such a man could not be expected from abroad. There was nothing to allure him. One must be raised up among them,—a man of patriotism, honesty, and responsibility, of intelligence, modesty, and good address ; and above all, one who could give the strongest reasons.

Young Sanger was endowed with the natural gifts, and, in consequence of feeble health, subjected to the right discipline, to fit him for the service which his fellow citizens would require. Besides possessing the rare gift of an uncommon share of common sense, he had an active and discriminating mind, a tenacious memory, and a remarkably sound judgment. He was fond of books. He treasured up facts in history and political economy, and investigated the political questions of the day, which enabled him to form and defend correct opinions. He acquired so much knowledge of law, as made him the Lawyer and draftsman of his community ; and had he devoted himself to the legal profession, his judgement was so good, and his memory so capacious and ready, he could hardly have failed of eminence.

As his health was improved by travelling, he was much abroad in distant states, and often in cultivated society, to which he owed, among other acquisitions, easy and polished manners, and the use of happy colloquial terms. By intercourse with senior and maturer minds, he escaped every symptom of that vanity, which, is so liable to sprout in situations admitting few comparisons. Thus was he formed ; and in 1806, as soon as Sherborn had need, they almost by acclamation placed him at the head of her public affairs.

When a company of cavalry was first raised in S. and vicinity, he was elected Capt. and subsequently Col. of cavalry.

In 1806, he was chosen to represent S. in the General Court, and for 30 years after, re-elected almost without opposition, as often as he would consent to be a candidate, until he was advanced to the Senate ; and the records of the Legislature attest the high and continued confidence of that body in his wisdom and fidelity.

He was appointed a magistrate about 1806, and acted in that capacity until his death.

For more than 40 years he served the town in various minor offices, freely devoting a large amount of time and labor. He was Town Clerk in 1800, and for 25 years he kept her books in a model style. The plainness of his chirography, considering its range, will enroll him as a favorite with antiquarians. In his care for the public, he was vigilant, self-denying, and persevering, consulting the interest of the future as well as of the present. His earliest efforts at trade were directed to the purchase of soldiers' rights, choice tracts of land in Western N. Y. and the township of Sangerville, and a part of Garland in Maine. In 1805, he opened a store in Sherborn, and for a series of years, did an extensive business, and established a high reputation for honesty, fairness, and responsibility. During this period, above 30 farms in S. beside others in conterminous towns, passed through his hands ; and never, during this time,

nor, on inquiry, since, have I been able to hear of those who ever charged him with fraud, or any act inconsistent with fair and honorable traffic.

With him originated the first cotton manufactory in Framingham; and other enterprises, in the benefits of which, individuals and the public have largely participated. In all business transactions his honesty and judgment were universally acknowledged. Such confidence was reposed in him, that he was wont to be the first chosen to arbitrate differences at home and abroad, and he was sometimes associated in such courts with the most eminent lawyers in Mass., where immense sums were in dispute.

Col. Sanger possessed a large and liberal spirit; he never forgot the imperfect rights of the unfortunate, nor waited for their cries to pain him to action. He anticipated their wants, sympathized with their feelings, and gave without ostentation, not in stinted measures, but heaped, and in proportion at least to his ample means. His history supplies no argument for agrarianism. All had reason to rejoice that he was rich, and all, honorably dismissed from his employ, were his fast friends. The old adage that familiarity breeds disgust is founded in the fact, that human nature is so corrupt, that it loses more than it gains by inspection. But in reference to Col. Sanger, it is evident that those who knew him best, esteemed him most; and none but an envious man can deny him great benevolence and extensive usefulness. In his domestic relations, he was true, affectionate, indulgent, and kind. He left a widow still living, and eight children, six of whom survive in honorable prosperity, testifying by their refinement and beneficence to the wisdom and care of a father in their nurture and education. He had




















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
