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















INTRODUCTION.

THIS work was not undertaken with the desire or expectation of showing any marked distinction in the Kinsman family, as History, which notes the progress of events, has never recorded the name prominently in its annals; neither was it undertaken with any hope of sharing in some great estate which might be found without a claimant in the Fatherland, as has been intimated; nor has the idea of compensation for the work, when completed, ever had a moment's consideration: on the contrary, the expenses from the beginning have been incurred with the expectation of pecuniary loss in carrying out the plan, and the result has more than justified this anticipation.

The writer, at a very early period of his life, had a strong desire to know something of his genealogy, and in fact began this work when a boy visiting relatives in Lisbon, Conn., by copying from their old Family Bible the record of his own branch, which extended back to Robert Kinsman, the third of that name in America. This desire was revived and strengthened in after years by an examination of Felt's "History of Ipswich," a book in which frequent mention is made of early members of the family.

Having decided to pursue the inquiry more thoroughly, but living in Ohio, at a distance from where the investigation should begin, the writer first opened a correspondence with Mrs. Louisa Kinsman Holmes, of Ipswich, Mass., and afterwards visited that town, a place of the greatest interest to the Kinsman family, as having been the spot where their first ancestor in America settled on his arrival from England, as well as the home of so many generations of his descendants. Mrs. Holmes was much interested in the subject, and, with her assistance and efficient efforts, so much of the early history of Robert Kinsman of Ipswich, and of his descendants in America, was brought to light, that a short sketch and limited record of the family was prepared, being designed for publication in the "New England Historical and Genealogical Register." This was in the year 1868, and at that time the writer, having become acquainted with Mr. William Low Kinsman, of Salem, Mass., interested him also in the work, and he has rendered valuable aid in its prepara-Having been strongly advised to such a course, we then determined not to publish the Record at that time, but first to have investigations made in England, with the hope of finding there a lineal connection for our emigrant ancestor. Robert Kinsman.

Accordingly Miss Harriet A. Bainbridge, now Mrs. H. A. de Salis, of London, Eng., was employed to make the necessary researches, and the result of her labors will be found in the English Record with which this book commences, and in the Pedigree following. These researches were continued at intervals, with varying prospects of success, during several years, ending only in 1873; but we have finally been compelled reluctantly to abandon the idea of obtaining at present the absolute proofs necessary to establish a positive connection for our ancestor, Robert Kinsman, who emigrated in 1634. This result, in view of the importance of the object sought, as well as of the time and labor expended and the expense incurred, is of course a great disappointment; but

we are in a measure compensated for it by the remarkably full and excellent Pedigree which we have obtained, dating back to the year 1337.

A careful examination of this, in connection with the English Record, will show that we have found two Roberts, one in Wiltshire and one in Northamptonshire, at the right period of time, each being of the proper approximate age, and both of them apparently unaccounted for in England after 1634; either of whom therefore may have been, and one or the other of whom we believe must have been, the Emigrant whose ancestral line we have endeavored to discover. Although unable to decide positively between the two claimants, and therefore leaving it for each reader to choose for himself, we yet consider the preponderance of evidence, as given in the English Record, to be clearly in favor of the Wiltshire Robert.

Pending the investigation by Miss Bainbridge in England, we concluded that our American Record might be much enlarged and improved by proper effort, and that the attempt ought to be made. We found in the person of Miss Lucy W. Stickney, of Salem, Mass., the energy and experience required, and accordingly she was engaged to carry out this work and prepare the Record for publication. Through her successful efforts it has been greatly extended, and, as far as possible, perfected and completed.

In connection with the Record, we have introduced some interesting historical extracts relating to the times and surroundings of our ancestor at the period of his arrival in America, showing also who were his companions on the voyage from England, and how and where they were finally located; and also giving an idea of the state of public sentiment, and the trials and embarrassments encountered by emigrants, at that time and subsequently.

We do not expect that the Record will be found entirely

free from errors, as the collection and transferrence of so many names and dates, from such various sources, render the liability of mistake necessarily great; besides which, in some instances, words and figures in the letters sent us have been so indistinct that they may have been incorrectly recorded. Believing, however, that it is substantially correct, we hope this work may fill the place for which it was designed, and prove to be a genealogical record by which all the descendants of Robert Kinsman of Ipswich can trace a perfect line back to that worthy ancestor.






To all those who have aided in our labors we tender our sincere thanks, hoping that they may find their reward in the completeness of the work that has been accomplished through their assistance.

ENGLISH RECORD.

HE family of Kynesman, Kinnesman, Kingesman, and Kinsman, as it is variously spelled, is of very ancient origin in England.

By reference to the Pedigree, it will be seen that the earliest record found was in 1337, and that there was a continuous line of the family in Northamptonshire, where the main branch flourished, for nearly four hundred years, or till the close of the seventeenth century, when apparently it became extinct.

In Essex, however, a family of Kinsmans flourished till the eighteenth century, and doubtless this family came from the same original stock. As early as 1522, a John Kinnesman lived at Tolleshunt, in that county, and from his Will it is inferred that he was a rich and important man.

In the seventeenth century we find a branch of the Northampton family settled in Devonshire, and their descendants are still living.

From Wills proven at Salisbury and at the Principal Registry, Doctors-Commons, we find a branch of the Kingsman family also in Wiltshire, with records from 1504 to 1647; but owing to the destruction of Registers, the pedigree of their line is not so full and clear as that of the Northampton branch. The Probate Court Records of Salisbury have been well searched, but little has been verified from them, as the Records are not fertile in Kingsman Wills. There are people of the name still living in Wiltshire, but we have failed to obtain from them any information of value.

Our American ancestor left England in 1634.

We begin with the Kynesman family of Northamptonshire. From Simon Kynesman of Loddington, who married Margaret Zouch, to Robert Kynesman, who married Elizabeth Woodville, there is some uncertainty as to the direct descent or succession, and this is denoted on the Pedigree by the dotted lines. A generation may have been transposed, or missed entirely.

Robert, who married Elizabeth Woodville, is mentioned in the following interesting document:—

"Robert Kynnesman, Inquisitio Post Mortem at Northampton, 28 June, 1 Henry VII (1486). He died 23 Jan. 1 Richard III (1484-5), and William Kynnesman was found to be his heir and aged 8 years 'et amplius.' Held Manor of Lodyngton of William Catesby, Esquire, as of his Manor of Lodyngton, and of William Catesby, Esquire, as of his Manor of Bukley by knights service, which said William Catesby, after the death of Robert Kynnesman, held the Manor and the guardianship of William his son and heir. The said William Catesby granted to Sir William Stoke the wardship of the said William Kynnesman, son and heir of Robert Kynnesman, and of his brother and sister. The said Sir William Stoke granted to Elizabeth, relict of Robert Kynnesman, the charge of the body of the said William Kynnesman, and of his brother and sister."

Of the son William, above mentioned, the following Indenture is found, viz. —

"Indenture recites between William Kynnesman, on the one part, and Maurice Osborne of Kelmarsh, Northamptonshire, of the other part, dates Aug. 16, 9 Henry VIII (1518), agreeing that Mary Poulton, daughter of said Maurice, should after marriage between her and the said William Kynnesman, have the Manor of Lodyngton," etc.

"Also Indenture dated 28 Nov., 13 Henry VIII (1521), between John Ashefelde of Heythorpe, County Oxford, Esquire, of the one part, and the said William Kynnesman on the other part, it was agreed that Robert Kynnesman, son of William Kynnesman, and Cicely, wife of Robert Kynnesman and daughter of the said John Ashefelde, should have sundry messuages," etc.

And the following: "William Kynnesman, Inquisitio Post Mortem at Northampton Castle, 4 Nov., 24 Henry VIII (1532). IIe died 6 July last (1532), and Robert Kynnesman was found to be his son and heir and aged at his father's death 25 years."

Of George Kinsman, son of William and Alice, of Loddington, the following: —

"19 Nov. 1619, George Kinsman, late of Lodington, Northamptonshire, gentleman, was seized of a messuage etc. in Lodington, and standing in need of, made request to Tristram Bucke and Thomas Asburye als Gascoigne (both being near friends and of alliance unto ye said orator), means to procure the sum of £300, and themselves together with Ferdinand Baud, Esquire, became bound to one Samuel Rubancke." "Purport of the suit is a charge of forcible entry

into the premises against certain persons named. Complainant speaks of his wife and children, and of himself, as living in Derbyshire, forty miles away from Lodington."

Frances Kynnsman, born in 1613, the daughter of Harold and Elizabeth, made the following Will, dated 16 Dec. 1639. No proof.

- "Fraunces Kynnsman, of Clipston, Northamptonshire, Spinster."
- "My mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Kinsman, to see me buried at Broughton near my father."
- "To my brother John Kynnsman, £50, and more if need be to set him out of debt."
 - "To my sister Anne Pettie, a ring."
 - "To my nephew Henry Collopp, a ring of 10/."
- "To Katherine Collopp, and Elizabeth Collopp, my nieces, 20/each."
 - "To my brother Pettie, for a pair of gloves, 12d."
 - "To my cozen Katherine Kynnsman, 40/."
 - "To Johan Goodman, 20/."
- "To 6 maids to carry me to church, each a pair of white gloves and white favours."
 - "To my sister Buswell's servants."
- "Residue to my good mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Kynnsman, and make her sole executrix, entreating her to remember my sister Buswell's children."
- "Witnesses John Heselden, William Buswell, Katherine Hulle, Marie Alderman."

Frances Kinsman, in her Will, makes no mention of brothers Richard and Robert. We know that she had such brothers, from the records of Broughtou, and Richard was living in Broughton after her Will was made, as will be seen by the following extract from the Royalist Composition Papers, Vol. 35 (2 S.), No. 575:—

"Richard Kinnesman, of Broughton, Northamptonshire, His delinquency . . . that he did assist the gentleman. forces raised against the Parliament, and was comprised within the Articles of Exeter, as by the General's certificate. Since weh he hath been beyond the seas. That he petitioned here the 25th Jan. 1648, whereby he craves the Articles of Exeter. That he is seized of an estate in fee to him and his heirs of a messuage and cottage in Broughton, of the yearly value of £68, whereout is issuing £40 a year, bequeathed by the last will and testament of Harrold Kynnesman the Compounder's father to Elizabeth Kynnesman his mother during her life, as by the s'd Will dated 2 Sept. 1631 appears, wch said Elizabeth is still living. There will remain and come unto him and his heirs, after the dece of the s'd Elizabeth his mother, a messuage etc. in Broughton and other lands in Pitchley of the yearly value of £56. 27 Jan. 1648."

Same volume, No. 581, "a certificate signed by Fairfax, stating that Auditor Kynesman was resident and abiding in Exeter seven months before the surrender of that city and that he ought to have the benefit of the Articles of Exeter," etc. Dated 18 Jan. 1648 [O. S.].

Same volume, No. 583, "Other certificates of Kynesman's residence in Exeter, signed by Jos. Martyn, Jnº Colleton, John Wyott, Henry Croone."

Vol. 22 (1 S.), No. 734.

"Richard Kinsman, of Broughton, in Northamptonshire, Gentleman, bound to the sayd Treasurers in £50 ye 10 of February 1648. With condition to pay £27.10/ when the debts for which the sayd fine of £27.10/ was sett, should be recovered. He hath paid £15 in full — 28 Nov. 1649."

About 1644, the civil war between Charles the First and his Parliament began in England. During this struggle, which proved so unfortunate to the monarch, Virginia adhered to the royal cause.

Sir Thomas Fairfax commanded the Parliamentary forces. He blockaded Exeter, and compelled it to surrender upon According to Hume, "The soldiers, determs, Feb. 1646. livering up their horses and arms, were allowed to disband, and received twenty shillings apiece, to carry them to their Such of the officers as desired it, had respective abodes. passes to retire beyond sea; the others, having promised never more to bear arms, paid compositions to the Parliament and procured their pardon." "These compositions were different, according to the demerits of the person; but, by a vote of the house, they could not be under two years' rent of the delinquent's estate. Journ. 11th of August, Whitlocke, p. 160." 1648.

In "A Perfect Description of Virginia, Printed for Rich'd Wodenoth, at the Star under Peter's Church in Cornhill, London, 1649," which book was reprinted in the Collections of the Massachusetts Historical Society (see Vol. 9, Second Series, page 118), mention is made of a "Richard Kinsman who had resided in Virginia for three or four years, a farmer, and remained in Jamestown in March of 1648."

He was, possibly, the Richard Kinsman of Broughton, who, it will be seen by the certificate of Lord Fairfax before mentioned, was residing in Exeter in July, 1645, and was assisting the forces against the Parliament; and, on its surrender, received a pass "to retire beyond sea," as he mentions that he has "been beyond the seas" in his petition of Jan. 25, 1648 [O.S.], when he returned to Broughton, and craved

¹ Both Richard of Virginia and Robert of Ipswich may have been of the Broughton family, or both may have been of the Wiltshire family. But Robert's case is not dependent on Richard's.

the Articles of Exeter, and recovered his estates, paying, as will be seen, the fines imposed.

A certificate of the baptism of Robert, the son of Harold and Elizabeth (Golborne) Kinsman, has been received, as follows, the record being an extract from the Register of Baptisms in the Parish of Broughton for the year Sixteen Hundred and Seven:—

"Roberte y' Sonne of Harold Kinsman was baptised y' sixteenth day of Maye 1607."

"I, Granville H. Forbes, Rector of Broughton in the County of Northampton, do hereby certify that the above is a true copy.

Witness my hand this eighteenth day of Decr 1872.

GRANVILLE H. FORBES."

"The Kynesman family of Northamptonshire," writes Mrs. de Salis, "was of high standing, as may be inferred from the following facts. Simon Kynesman of Loddington, Northamptonshire, was a member of Parliament in 1420. The same year he obtained a license from the Bishop to celebrate Mass in his own mansion. He was also Sheriff of Northamptonshire in the 9th of Henry V (1422). Harold Kynnesman, baptized at Broughton, Northamptonshire, April 3, 1570, was Vice-Treasurer at Arms in the Irish Wars in the time of Elizabeth, and for his fidelity was recalled to the same office

¹ Mrs. de Salis, *née* Bainbridge, in her efforts to trace Robert Kinsman, the ancestor of the Kinsmans of America, offered a reward for a copy of his baptismal register and of his marriage register, in every parish of Northampton, Wiltshire, Somerset, Warwick, and Berkshire, also in Essex, Middlesex, Suffolk, Norfolk, Herts, Oxford, and Lincoln. There were many returns, but this was the only one of any special interest, as approximating the probable age of the emigrant.

by King James. Still later, Richard Kinsman, baptized at Broughton, Northamptonshire, Jan. 16, 1602, was Auditor of the Counties of Northampton, Devon, and Cornwall. Another evidence is that the Kinsmans married into the families of the first people in Northampton and the adjacent counties, and bore Coat-Armor from an early period, as it is found described and tricked in Heralds' Visitations."

The Northamptonshire line bore a shield quartering the Arms of three families, as given in the Visitation of 1564: the first quarter, Per pale azure and gules, three saltires argent; the second, Gules, three bulls' heads cabossed argent; the third, Gules, a cross fleury argent; the fourth, the same Crest, A buck proper, lodged in fern vert. as the first. The second and third quarterings are the Arms of families with which the Northamptonshire Kinsmans were allied in marriage. The first and fourth quarterings alone, the latter being but a repetition of the first, and the crest, belong to the Kinsmans. No Grant of this coat-of-arms has been found, so that, undoubtedly, it belonged to the family before the College-of-Arms was incorporated (in 1483), and was in existence as far back as 1420, in the time of Simon Kynesman of Loddington, who is styled Armiger, or one entitled Our plate of the Kinsman Arms is copied to Coat-Armor. from a seal now owned by a Kinsman of Cornwall in England, who is doubtless a descendant of John Kinsman of Broughton, brother of Richard the Auditor and of Robert.

A description of this shield, interpreting the language of Heraldry, might be given thus: The shield is divided by a perpendicular line into two equal parts (per pale), the color of the first half, which would be at the bearer's right hand, being blue (azure), and that of the second half being red (gules); the figures thereon are three crosses of the pattern called St. Andrew's (saltires), and are represented as being of silver (argent). The crest is a buck, represented in its

natural color (proper), and lying down or kneeling but with the head erect (lodged), in a bed of green (vert) fern.

The Kingsman family of Wiltshire was a branch of the Northampton family, as will be seen by the following Will of one of the Fitzakerlys, or Fazakerlys, who were related, by marriage, to the Northampton Kynesmans.

"In the name of God, Amen. I Rychard Fazakerly, of Warmington, County Northampton, bein of perfett mynde though weak and ill in bodye, and about to goe a jorney to see myne relaçons, doe make this my last Will and Testament in maner and ffourme followynge.

First. I desire that my bodye shal be buryed in Xtian buryiall wher it pleasath Almyhtie God that I shal departe this lyfe, and for my sepulture and braking of the grounde in the churche I will and bequethe 6/8, and I bequethe to the high awlter of the churche of Warmynton 4/7, and also the some of 6/8 for to synge a dirige for the welth of my soule, and I also bequethe to the said churche the some of 6/8 for diryges to be song for the welth of the soules of my fader and moder.

Item. I will and bequethe to Robert my brother, my goblet of siluer and 5 spougnes of siluer.

Item. I will and bequethe to my saide brother Robert, a cup of siluer parcell guilt and a salt of siluer parcell guilt, with couers to them, and 2 paire of ye best sheres.

To my syster Helen ye wyf of my saide brother Robert, 5/7 to buy her a rynge.

Item. I will and bequethe my best gowne to my kinsman Robert Kingesman, of Lodynton, and my dublet of lether to my kinsman John Kingesman, of Sowt Newtone.

Item. I doe also will and bequethe that my kinswoman Isabel Kingesman shal have my ringe with sardonox, as a

remembrannce of her gret kindnesse to me a poore synnore when I was in sor afflicon.

And for the residues of any monye I have and my howse-holde stuff and my goods movable and unmovable, I will to be equally divided amonge my base childrens, and I do alsoe will and bequethe to my servant Tho. Radleye, 1/.

And I constitute and ordain my kinsman ROBERT KINGES-MAN and his broder John my kinsman, to be executors of this mee last Will and Testamt. Signed and sealed by me Ric. Fazakerlie this last daye of Septembre in the yere of oure Lorde God one thowsand five hundreth and fower, in the presense of Rob. Wydvile, Maister Sayer, John Howes with other."

From this Will it is clear that Richard Fazakerly calls as "kinsman" not only the Robert Kynesman of Loddington, Northamptonshire, who married Isabel Fitzakerly, his niece, but also Robert's brother John Kingesman, of South Newton, Wiltsihre. This John left the following Will:—

"In the name of God, Amen. In the yere of our lord 1522, the 16 day of Februarie, I John Kyngesman, of South Newton in the countie of Wiltes, being in my perfitte mynde and in good remembrannee, doe make my testament in this maner and fourme.

ffirst and formoste I bequethe my sowle unto Almighty God, to our Lady, and to all the Saintes in Hevyn. My bodie to be buried in the churche of St. Andrewe in South Newton.

Also I bequethe to the Cathedrall churche of Sarum, 3/4.

Item. To the parish churche of St. Andrewe, 5/.

Item. To the high awlter within the same churche, 6/8.

Item. To our lady light, within the same churche, two ewes.

Item. To the parish churche of Wyscheford, 6/8.

Item. To the churche of Stepelforde, 6/8.

Item. To the churche of Wodeforde, 6/8.

Item. I bequethe to the blake freres and to the graye, to every order of them within the citie of Sarum, a quarters whete, for to synge masse and dirige for my soule at the day of my buryinge.

Item. I bequethe to my son Robert, £6.8.4.

To Amye my daughter, £3.6.8.

To Thomas my son, £6.8.4.

To Christian my daughter, £3.6.8.

To Agnes my daughter, £3.6.8.

To Edith my daughter, £3.6.8.

To Anne my daughter, £3.6.8.

To Elizabeth the lady, my daughter, £3.6.8, and that William my sonne shall have the guyding of it to her profite.

Item. to every godchilde that I have, a bushel of barley.

I bequethe to my son Robert 200 shepe to remayne to his moder at the two yeres ende, and she to annser the stock to my Lady. Also that Alyn my servannt a kowe and 20 shepe, half vethers, half ewys. To Edith Stork, a kowe and 5 shepe.

To William Kyngsman, a bullock.

Item. To the Monestery of Whilton, 10/-5/ of it to the Reparaçons of the churche and the oder 5/ to be devided to the Ladyes at the will of my Lady Abbess, for a dirige and a masse to be songe for the welthe of my soule.

Item. I give the residue of my goodes movable and unmovable, I give and bequethe to Johanne my wyffe, whom I doe make my hole and true executrix, to disposse for the welth of my soule at hir arbitrement and will.

Also I constitute and ordeyn Sir William my sonne, to be Superuisor of this my Will and Testament, to whome I give and bequethe £6.8.4, for his labour.

Witnesse. Thomas Maister, . . . Martyn, Sir Thomas

Wellys, John Blak of Stoverd, Edmund Herford, with other."

Robert Kingsman of Overton, Wiltshire, the son of this John of South Newton, also left a Will, of which the following is a copy, viz. —

"In the name of God, Amen, the 25 day of Aug. in the yere of oure lord God 1592, and in the 34 of hir Mai'ties raigne. I Robert Kingsman, of Overton in the county of Wilts, yeoman, being of perfitte mynde (the lord be praised therefore) doe make, ordaine this my last Will and Testament, in maner and fourme following.

First. I bequethe my soule into the handes of my lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who hath redeemed it, and my bodye to be buried in parish churche of Overton.

Item. I give and bequethe Robert Kingsman my 2d sonne, all the goods, chattells, stocks, stores, cattle, implements whatsoever, being, going or feedynge now, uppon the houses, barnes, stables, edifices, landes, meadowes, pastures, and feedinges of the tenement in East Kennett, which I had by lease from Mr. Skillinge.

Also I will and bequethe to said Robert that in respecte of all the wheate growen uppon the said tenement in East Kennett, was brought to Overton, therefore that Richard my oldest sonne shall eare and sowe withe good seede corne, all the grounde which lieth for the next season parcell of the said Robert, as well all the seede of all the wheate as of the barley.

Also I will to the saide Roberte — "various bequestes as to amounts on the tenements of Hoyble in the parish of Calne." He bequeathes also to him "all timber and boards lying about his house at Overton."

To Thomas his youngest son, who was under age, he

bequeathes £13; mentions Thomas Smithe of West Kennett, his brother-in-law, and his son-in-law William Griffin of Belhampton — they to hold some lease for a reasonable sum.

"To Margaret his daughter, £4 of money."

"To Elizabeth his daughter, £3."

"To his loving wife Agnes, and to Robert his sonne, and Richard his eldest sonne, all his debts owing to him, between them to be equally divided."

Also "to his loving wife £100."

Robert Kingsman of Overton, Wiltshire, the second son of Robert and Agnes, above, also left a Will, from which the following items are extracted:—

"Robert Kingsman, of Overton, the elder, yeoman, sicke in body, but in good and perfitt mynde, the 6 day of Aprill, 1647"... "desires to be buried in the church of Overton, to which he bequethes 16/."

"To children of my son Richard Kingsman, 20/ apiece."

"To Robert, the sonne of my sonne Robert, the sum of £20 when he shall come to lawful age."

"To children of my son Philip, 20/ apiece."

"To children of my son-in-law Edward Carpenter, 20/apiece."

"To children of my son-in-law John Newman, 20/apiece."

"To children of my son-in-law Nathaniell Poole, 20/apiece."

"To children of my son-in-law Henry Fisher, 20/ apiece."

"To daughter of my son Thomas, and to the child unborn of my son Thomas, 20/ apiece."

"Robert Kingsman to be executor . . . "my kinsman Robert Kingsman, of Overton, yeoman, and Thomas Stevens my kinsman, of Lockbridge, to be overseers." Will proved 26 July, 1647.

From this Will we know that Robert Kingsman of Overton, the second Wiltshire Robert, who died in 1647, left a son, the third Robert; and that the latter had also a son, the fourth Robert, who had not "come to lawful age" in 1647. We also know from other sources that Robert the Emigrant had a son Robert, who was born in 1629, and whom we find at a later date in Ipswich, Massachusetts, as a prominent man. We have no dates at all for the third Wiltshire Robert, nor for the Emigrant previous to his leaving England; but the approximate age of the fourth Wiltshire Robert corresponds very closely with that of the Emigrant's son, who must have been seventeen or eighteen years of age in April, 1647, the date of the Will just given. Again, we know from this Will that there was a "son-in-law John Newman," who, being therefore a brother-in-law of the third Wiltshire Robert. might naturally have accompanied him if he went to America. Now, among the fellow-passengers of the Emigrant Robert, there were four Newmans, viz. Thomas, two Johns, - one of them the son of Thomas, and the other probably his brother, -and Robert.

As passengers in the "Mary and John," with Robert Kingsman, are also found Thomas Parker, James and Nicholas Noyes, John Woodbridge, Henry Lunt, Richard Kent and others, prominent among the early Puritans of New England. Of Parker, Savage¹ makes the following note: "Thomas Parker, a learned theologian, pupil of the great Archbishop Usher, having passed a short time at Magdalen College, Oxford, . . . finished his preparation for the pulpit at Leyden, and had a school at Newbury in Berkshire, where also he preached; was a bachelor, but stood in place of a father to many divines of the succeeding generation."

Rev. James Noyes and his brother Nicholas were cousins

of Parker; Rev. John Woodbridge was his nephew; and these four men we know to have been natives of Wiltshire. William Elliott, a passenger by the "Hereules" at about the same time, was also from Wiltshire. Parker seems to have been the leader of the company by the "Mary and John," more or less of whom were also from that county, evidently, as is shown by the following extract from "Hubbard's General History of New England":—

"The reverend and learned Mr. Parker was at first called to Ipswich, to join with Mr. Ward; but he choosing rather to accompany some of his countrymen that came out of Wiltshire in England, to that new place, than to be engaged with such as he had not been acquainted withall before; therefore removed with them thither, and settled at Newbury..."

Felt, in his History of Ipswich, also has a record of "Rev. Thomas Parker and company out of Wiltshire," arriving at Agawam in May, 1634.

George Smith, M. D., in his "History of Delaware County, Pennsylvania," published in 1862, in the list of early settlers and eminent men, mentions that a "John Kinsman from Fifel in the County of Wilts, England, was settled in Chichester as early as 1684, and was married to Hannah, the daughter of John Sintcock, the same year. He was an active member of Chichester Friends' Meeting, and the Monthly Meeting was sometimes held at his house. As a citizen, he held a respectable position in the community. His children were Elizabeth and Hannah, the former of whom married John Dutton in 1704. He died about the year 1701."


It is worthy of notice here that only the Wilts branch of the family spell their name Kingsman (the Northampton line not using a g), and in the list of passengers the Emigrant Robert's name is spelled Kingsman, although he dropped the g after coming to America. There is, also, a noticeable

repetition among the American descendants of the Emigrant, for many generations, of some of the old Christian names of the Wiltshire branch. These various facts would seem to furnish strong presumptive evidence that our American ancestor, Robert Kinsman, came from Wiltshire, and was the son of the Robert who died there in 1647. Should future investigation prove this theory, our pedigree is traced to the Northamptonshire family of the fourteenth century, who bore the coat-of-arms already described.




THE ENGLISH PEDIGREE.

The English Pedigree has been obtained from the following sources: Visitations and Grants of Arms at the College of Arms; the Heralds' Visitations at the British Museum in the Harleian Manuscripts, Numbers 1553, 1118, 1138, 1187, 1184, and 1094, and additional manuscripts; the Lansdowne and Egerton Manuscripts; Chancery Proceedings; Close-Rolls; Subsidy Rolls; the Fine Rolls; Escheats; Post-Mortems; Inquisitions) Wills at Principal Registry, Doctors-Commons, including Herts and Essex Wills which are now in that office; the Probate Court Records of Salisbury and North-ampton; Parish Registers; State Papers; Royalist Composition Papers; Admiralty Documents; County Histories, both in print and in manuscript; and by correspondence with members of the Kinsman family in England.



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ROBERT KINSMAN, THE EMIGRANT.

OBERT KINSMAN, or Kingsman, the first of the name known in New England, was a passenger in the ship "Mary and John," of London, Robert Sayres master, sailing from Southampton, England, in March, 1634, and arriving in

Boston the following May.

The following highly interesting documents, referring to the passengers in this vessel, were published in the "New England Historical and Genealogical Register" for July, 1855, having been communicated by Hon. George Lunt, of Boston, who received them through Mr. Cleveland, of Salem. "They will supply a gap, long bewailed, in the early history of Newbury, by giving us the name of the vessel, in which her first settlers came to this country, in 1634. The list of passengers by the "Mary and John" comprises many well-known names of residents of Newbury and its vicinity, and which also are well known to have been borne by the original planters of that ancient settlement. It will be seen by the Order in Council, that the emigrants were at first 'made staye of, untill further order from their Lordshipps'; who eventually let them go, upon certain condi-

tions, some of which seemed harder to them, perhaps, than they would be now considered."

Extracts from the Records of the Orders in Council: -

"New England — At Whitehall the last of February 1633. Present.

Whereas by a Warr^t bearing date 22nd of this Present the sev^rall ships following bound for New England & now lying in the River of Thames were made staye of untill further order from their L'opps Viz^t. the Clement & Job, The Reformation, The True Love, The Elizabeth Bonadventure, The Sea Flower, *The Mary & John*, The Planter, The Elizabeth & Dorcas, The Hercules & the Neptune.

For as much as the Masters of the said ships were this day called before the Board & several Particulars given them in charge to be performed in their said Voyage, amongst which the said Masters were to enter into several Bonds of One Hundred Pounds a piece to His Maj*tys use before the Clarke of the Councell attendant to observe & cause to be observed & putt in Execucion these Articles following viz^t.

1. That all & every Person aboard their Ships now bound

for New England as aforesaid, that shall blaspheme or profane the Holy name of God be severely punish't.

- 2. That they cause the Prayers contained in the Book of Common Prayers establisht in the Church of England to be said daily at the usual hours for Morning & Evening Prayers & that they cause all Persons aboard their said Ships to be present at the same.
- 3. That they do not receive aboard or transport any Person that hath not Certificate from the Officers of the Port where he is to imbarke that he hath taken both the Oathes of Alleigeance & Supremacy.
- 4. That upon their return into this Kingdom they Certify to the Board the names of all such Persons as they shall transport together with their Proceedings in the Execuc'on of the aforesaid Articles Whereunto the said Mⁿ have conformed themselves It was therefore & for divers other Reasons best known to their Lo^{ppa} thought fitt that for this time they should be permitted to proceed on their Voyage, and it was thereupon Ordered that Gabriel Marsh Esq^r. Marshalle of the Admiralty & all other His Maj'tys Officers to whom their said Warr¹ was directed should be required upon Sight hereof to discharge all & every the said Ships & Suffer them to depart on their intended Voyage to New England.

In regard to the dates in the preceding records, as well as those which follow, it is important to bear in mind that they are Old Style. "Before 1752 the year was, by the legal method of computation, held to begin on the 25th of March, Lady Day, or Annunciation; in reckoning the months, March was called the first, February the twelfth month, etc." So that the 24th day of March, 1633, according to Old Style, was the last day of that year, and the day following was the first day of the new year, and called the 25th of March, 1634.

To show something of what transpired about the time these emigrants arrived in America, we quote from "Winthrop's

History of New England," by Savage, Vol. I, pp. 158 to 162:—

"The week the court was, [kept at Boston, May 1634,] there came in six ships, with store of passengers and cattle. Mr. Parker, a minister, and a company with him, being about one hundred, went to sit down at Agawam, and divers others of the new comers."

"These ships, by reason of their short passage, had store of provisions left, which they put off at easy rates, viz. biscuit at 20s. the hundred; beef at £6 the hogshead, etc."

"The last month (June 1634) arrived here (Boston) fourteen great ships, and one at Salem.

"Mr. Humfrey and the lady Susan, his wife, one of the Earl of Lincoln's sisters, arrived here. He brought more ordnance, muskets, and powder, bought for the public by moneys given to that end; for godly people in England began now to apprehend a special hand of God in raising this plantation, and their hearts were generally stirred to come over.

"Among others, we received letters from a godly preacher, Mr. Levinston, a Scotchman in the north of Ireland, whereby he signified, that there were many good Christians in those parts resolved to come hither, if they might receive satisfaction concerning some questions and propositions which they sent over. Likewise, Mr. Humfrey brought certain propositions from some persons of great quality and estate, (and of special note for piety,) whereby they discovered their intentions to join with us, if they might receive satisfaction therein.

"It appeared further, by many private letters, that the departure of so many of the best, both ministers and Christians, had bred sad thoughts in those behind of the Lord's intentions in this work, and an apprehension of some evil days to come upon England. Then it began now to be apprehended

by the archbishops, and others of the council, as a matter of state, so as they sent out warrant to stay the ships, and to call in our patent; but, upon petition of the shipmasters, (alleging how beneficial this plantation was to England, in regard of the Newfoundland fishing, which they took in their way homeward), the ships were at that time released."

"Divers of the ships lost many cattle; but the two which came from Ipswich, of more than one hundred and twenty, lost but seven. None of the ships lost any passengers, but the Elizabeth Dorcas, which, having a long passage, and being hurt upon a rock at. Scilly, and very ill victualled, she lost sixty passengers at sea, and divers came sick on shore, who all recovered, (through the mercy of God,) except

"Mr. Humfrey brought sixteen heifers² given by a private friend, viz. Mr. Richard Andrews, to the plantation, viz. to every of the ministers one, and the rest to the poor, and one half of the increase of the ministers' [part] to be reserved for other ministers."

Of these emigrants, the learned English antiquarian, the Rev'd Mr. Hunter, says, that they "consisted very much of persons who though not of the very first rank were yet men of substance and good alliances, will-making families, families high in the subsidy-books, while some of them, as the Winthrops, were among the principal gentry of the country."

ROBERT KINSMAN, with his fellow-passengers of the "Mary and John," made his way to Agawam, or Ipswich, and his name is found recorded there in 1635.

A grant of land was made to him in 1637, as is shown by

the following, taken from the old records of Ipswich of 1637, called the Commoners' Record.

"Granted to Robert Kinsman by the company of freemen, one house lot, one acre of ground having a house lot now in the possession of Richard Lumpkin on the South, a house lot now in possession of William Avery, on the southeast, John Jackson on the west, the high road leading to the river, on the east end. Also a planting lot six acres lying on the great hill commonly called 'Heartbreak Hill,' having a planting lot of Richard Haffield on the east, a planting of Allen Perley's on the west, a planting of Robert Andrews at the north-east, at the south end the high road leading to Jebaquo (Chebacco). Also thirty-four acres meadow and upland, having Jebaquo river on the east, on the south the land of - Graves, and the west Daniel Clarkes land. To enjoy all the saide layndes to him, his heirs, and assigns, forever. July 25, 1637."

These land grants were made, subject to the following order, passed May, 1635:—

"No dwelling-house shall be built above a half-mile from the meeting-house in any new plantation, without leave from the Court, except mills and farm-houses of such as have their dwellings in town."

Robert Kinsman's house stood near the place where the South Church of Ipswich now stands.

Of the first settlement of Agawam, or Ipswich, we get the following from Winthrop:—

Jan. 17, 1632-33. "It was agreed, that a plantation should be begun at Agawam, (being the best place

in the land for tillage and cattle,) least an enemy, finding it void, should possess and take it from us.

"The governour's son (being one of the assistants) was to undertake this, and to take no more out of the bay than twelve men; the rest to be supplied at the coming of the next ships."

March, 1633. "The governour's son, John Winthrop, went, with twelve more, to begin a plantation at Agawam, after called Ipswich."

August 4, 1634. "At the court, the new town at Agawam was named Ipswich, in acknowledgment of the great honor and kindness done to our people which took shipping there, etc.; and a day of thanksgiving appointed, a fortnight after, for the prosperous arrival of the others, etc."

Felt gives this record, in his History of Ipswich: -

"1634, May. Rev. Thomas Parker and company out of Wiltshire, being about one hundred, and other new settlers, take up their abode here [Agawam]."

And "Hubbard's General History of New England" states also:—

"The plantation at Agawam was from the first year of its being raised to a township, so filled with inhabitants, that some of them presently swarmed out into another place, a little further eastward."

The following extract is from the Colonial Records: -

"May 6th, 1635. Quascacunquen is allowed by the court to be a plantation, and it is referred to Mr. [John] Humphrey, Mr. [John] Endicott, captain [Nathaniel] Turner, and captain [William] Trask, or any three of them, to set out the bounds of Ipswich and Quascacunquen, or so much thereof as they can, and the name of the said plantation shall be changed, and shall hereafter be called Newberry.

"Further it is ordered, that it shall be in the power of the court to take order that the said plantation shall receive a sufficient company to make a competent towne."

A settlement was commenced that month, and the first emigrants to Newbury from Ipswich are described by Coffin, in his History of Newbury, as going by water through Plum Island Sound, and up the river Quascacunquen [now river Parker]. Thomas Parker, John Woodbridge, James and Nicholas Noyes, and eight or nine more of the "Mary and John" passengers, were among that company. Nicholas Noyes is mentioned as making the first landing.

Robert Kinsman seems to have chosen to remain in Ipswich; but we find no further note of him, until his death. He died in Ipswich, Jan. 28,1664 [O.S.]. His Will is found on file in the Essex Registry of Probate, and is recorded in Book 1, page 213; the following is a copy of the original:—

"These presents declareth that I, Robert Kinsman of Ipswich, in the county of Essex, being at present sick and weake of Body, but through God's mercy inioyeing my understanding and memory doe make this my last will and testament. first. I doe give my soule into the hands of Jesus Christ, my body to be desently buried in Ipswich burying place. And for my outward estate, I dispose as followeth.

Item. I doe give and bequeath unto my sonn Robert, my Meddow land att Chebacho which he doth now improve to the halfes, payeing unto Isaack & Sarah Ringe, the chilldren of my daughter Mary, ten pound apeece when they come to age, & if either of them dye before they come to age, the surviver to inioy the whole twenty pound.

Item. I give unto my daughter Mary the wife of Usuall Wardell, ten pounds, and to her foure elder children, twenty shillings apeece, Viz't Daniell, Roger, Mary and Susan Ringe.

Item. I give unto my daughter Sarah the wife of Samuell Younglove, my foure acre lott which I exchanged with Samuell Ayres, and to her child or children, which shall be then liveing after her decease.

Item. I give unto my Daughter Hanah, the some of forty pounds.

Item. I give unto my daughter Martha, the wife of Jacob ffoster, the some of thirty pounds.

Item. I give unto my daughter Tabitha Kinsman, my dwelling house and apertenances & land about it, payeing out of it twenty pounds within two years after my decease, also I give unto hir my sayd daughter Tabitha my houshould stufe.

Item. I give unto my coussen Richard Nicolls, ten pounds to be payd by my sayd daughter Tabitha, part of the twenty pounds and the other ten pounds to be payd unto my daughter Hanah, by my sayd daughter Tabitha, as part of the forty pounds before given unto her.

Item. I give unto my five daughters each of them a cow and I give unto Mary my daughter ffosters child, my heifer. And I Apoynt my sonn Robert Kinsman and Robert Lord, Sen'r to be my executors of this my last will to see it performed.

SECOND GENERATION.

1. ROBERT KINSMAN, son of Robert, born in 1629; married, time not known, Mary Boreman, daughter of Thomas (who was Deputy to the General Court in 1636), and Margaret Boreman, of Ipswich.

He "came into full communion" with the church in Ipswich, Feb. 22, 1673; was admitted a Freeman, March 11, 1673-4; chosen a Selectman in 1675; Tithingman 1677; took the Oath of Allegiance, Dec. 11, 1678; Quartermaster, Jan. 1, 1684.

From — Hull's Account Book, kept in 1675-6, it appears that "Robert Kinsman" received £3 for his services in the Narraganset Wars and from the "Records of the Proprietors of Narraganset Township, No. 1, now the Town of Buxton, York County, Maine," by the late Capt. William F. Goodwin, published in 1871, the following is gleaned of the Narraganset War, and of the land bounties given to the descendants of those who served in it:—

"The Narraganset war, under the subtle leadership of King Philip, the ambitious and heroic sachem of Mount Hope, suddenly bursting upon the eastern colonies, in 1675, brought indescribable terror and affliction upon the infant settlements. It is impossible to understand, and much less to describe, in any adequate manner, the misfortunes which

this merciless warfare visited upon the feeble settlers of the The confederated savages, in the secret conclaves of the forests, under the inspiration of their powerful and relentless chief, had organized the bloody design to utterly extinguish the colonies, and, though defeated in their terrible purpose of extermination, they so far put their sanguinary work into execution, in the brief space of a year, as to have clothed all New England in mourning. Estimates, drawn from official records, show that no less than six hundred of the inhabitants, the flower and strength of the country, either fell in battle, or were murdered by the enemy; and that there were few families, or individuals, who had not lost some near relative in the savage strife. . . . Bancroft, in his account of the 'Narraganset Fort Fight,' says, 'It was resolved to regard the Narragansetts as enemies; and a little before the winter solstice (Dec. 18), a thousand men, levied by the united colonies, and commanded by the brave Josiah Winslow, a native of New England, invaded their territory. After a night spent in the open air, they waded through the snow from daybreak till an hour after noon; and at last reached the cluster of wigwams which a fort protected. Davenport, Gardner, Johnson, Gallop, Siely, Marshall, led their companies through the narrow entrance in the face of death, and left their lives as a testimony to their patriotism and courage. Feeble palisades could not check the determined valor of the white men; and the group of Indian cabins was soon set on fire.'

"When the army was mustered on Dedham plain, in 1675, preparatory to the march against the stronghold of King Philip, a proclamation was made to the troops, in the name of the Government, 'that if they played the man, took the fort, and drove the enemy out of the Narraganset country, which was their great seat, that they should have a gratuity in land besides their wages.'

"The message which the House sent up to the Council urging the claims of these soldiers, and which brought the Board into their views, in 1731, is a state paper of extraordinary dignity and power, presenting the whole merits of the case in language of the greatest dignity and propriety. It sets forth the hardships and perils incurred in storming the fort in the depth of winter, and the pinching wants they afterwards underwent in pursuing the Indians that escaped through a hideous wilderness, famously known throughout New England ever afterwards as 'the Hungry March'; and that until this brave though small army did thus 'play the man' and take the fort, the whole country was filled with distress; and the inhabitants trembled even in the capital Boston itself.

"These Narraganset officers and soldiers, who, in the language of the message already mentioned, are characterized as . . . the best men of the province, the fathers and sons of some of her greatest and best of the families, commenced effort to secure the promised land bounty, as early as 1685."

"The list [of claimers] was, in due time, finally completed, and in April, 1733, presented, numbering eight hundred and forty; and thereupon it was ordered that five additional townships be granted under the same conditions as in the case of the two already bestowed. This order passed without controversy between the House and Council, and received the signature of Governor Belcher."

"The grantees, eight hundred and forty in number, met on Boston Common, in the autumn of 1733, according to order of the Court, and entered into due organization. Seven independent associations, each embracing one hundred and twenty members, were formed; and a Joint Committee of twenty-one members, three from each sub-division, was appointed to assign the townships."

The grants were assigned Oct. 17, 1733, and Narraganset,

Number One, (now Buxton, Me.,) on Saco River, was assigned to Philemon Dane and one hundred and nineteen others, the Company from Ipswich and vicinity.

From the Massachusetts Court Record, Feb. 11, 1733, is taken the following "Action of the General Court on the Plats of two Narraganset Townships between Saco and Presumpscut rivers: - Plats were presented by a Committee of the General Court of two Townships for the Narraganset Soldiers, contiguous to each other, lying between Saco River and Pesumpscot River, each of the Contents of Six Miles Square with an allowance to that next Saco River of thirteen hundred acres for Ponds & of Seven hundred Acres formerly granted to Hill & others and with an allowance to that next Pesumpscot River of twelve hundred acres for Ponds, & of Five hundred acres formerly granted to Tyng & others; Which Tracts are bounded as follows; viz, BEGINNING at Saco River at the Head of Biddeford, & running North East by the Needle twelve Miles by the Head of Biddeford, Scarboro' and Falmouth till it comes to Pesumpscot River, & then bounded by Pesumpscot River, & running up the same till it makes seven miles & one quarter of a Mile on a strait Course North 33° 00' West, then running nine miles & fifty rods South West till it comes to Saco River, & then bounded South Westerly by Saco River till it comes to the Head of Biddeford afore Said; the dividing Line between the two Townships, begins on the Line next on the Head of the Townships seven miles & one quarter of a Mile to the North East of Saco River and runs North 33° 00' West by the Needle, & extends seven miles and one Quarter of a Mile.

"In the House of Represent^{ves} Read and ORDERED that these Plans be accepted, & that the Lands set forth in the Plat Number One be and hereby are confirmed unto One hundred and twenty of the Original Grantees, their Heirs and assigns: viz, That Society of them of which Philemon. Dane & others were appointed a Committee for regulating Ipswich Society &c. so called at a General meeting of the Grantees in Boston, the Sixth of June last, as by the Grantees Votes and Orders may appear Provided the Plat contains no more than the Contents of Six miles Square of the unappropriated Land (exclusive of the former Grants & allowances within mentioned) & that it does not interfere with any former Grant:—In Council; Read and Concur'd;—

"Consented to, J. Belcher —"

"At a Leagal meeting of the Narraganset Soldiers belonging to a Township Caled No. 1 Laying on the East Side of Saco River in the County of York," Aug. 1, 1733: "m^r Philemon Dain Was Chosen Colector to Gather the money that is to be Paid by the Grauntees or their Representatives: claiming in Ipswich List... and m^r Jonathan Fellows of Ipswich, Treasurer."

It was also "Voted that Each Grauntee or there Leagal Representative Shall Pay ten Shillings towards defraying the Charges that have allready arisen or that may hereafter arise in bringing forward the Settlement of Said Township," etc.

March 19, 1734-5, a Committee was "Chosen and Impowared to Lay out one hundred and Twenty three Lots in Said Township no Lot to Exceed Twenty acres and to make Return of their doings on or before the middle of June Next

"at the above Sd meeting Voated that Each Propriator pay Twenty Shillings to the Colectors Chosen at the Last meeting & by them paid to the Treasurers belonging to Sd Propriators

"at the above Sd meeting Voated that the Treasurers pay fifty pounds to the Comittee Chosen to Lay out Said Lots to Inable them to prosceed in that Service and take their Recept their for" Persuant to the Vote of the Narraganset Propriators belonging To the Township Called No 1 Laying on the East Side of Saco River—We the Subscribers have laid out one hundred & Twenty three Lots in Said Township and Laid out ways to Each Lot as by the Plan herewith Exhibited may at Large apear. . . .

"Joseph Kinsmon on the Right of his father Robert Kinsmon — No. 19 on a Raing of Lots known by the letter D."

"The Lots Known by the Letter D are Twenty Rods wide and the ways Running Southeast and North West are Eight Rods wide."

July 19, 1738, "Pelatiah Kinsman" was, with others, "fully Impowared to prosecute any person or persons that Shall Cut or Carrey of any wood or Timber from any of Said Propriators undevided Land."

Oct. 13, 1738, a Second Division of Lots was made, and Joseph Kinsman, on the original Right of Robert Kinsman, drew a lot on Range D. No. 16.

On the 1st day of Feb. 1742-3, an appointed committee "Sold the original Right of one Joseph Kinsman unto one John Kinsman at a Publick Vendue as Said Kinsman was the highest bidder Said Right was Sold for thirty Pounds (old tenor)"

Narraganset Township Number One, in the County of York, was incorporated July 14, 1772, as the Town of Buxton.

As this Robert Kinsman took a prominent part, being one of the Selectmen, in the resistance of Ipswich, in August,

1687, to the arbitrary and unlawful taxes imposed by Andros, an account of that controversy may prove interesting.

Sir Edmund Andros had returned to America, after an absence in England of nearly six years, arriving at Boston December 19, 1686, and bearing a commission from King James, as Governor of all New England; the Charter of Massachusetts having been declared vacated, October 23, 1684. Being thus clothed with full powers, he at once inaugurated a series of measures of the most obnoxious and oppressive character.

Palfrey says:—"From the earliest period of New England, towns had their executive magistracy; they held meetings as often as occasion arose for deliberation on matters of common concern; they taxed themselves, and made other orders, for the maintenance of their roads, their schools, and their poor; and, when a Colony tax was imposed by the General Court, each town, having received notice of the proportion which it was to contribute, proceeded, by its municipal officers, to assess the sum on its inhabitants. There was now no General Court; the Governor in Council imposed taxes; and the first act of his administration required a compulsory assessment of them by Commissioners and Selectmen.

"It was not to be expected that privileges so important and so long enjoyed should be withdrawn without creating dissatisfaction and disturbance. At length the time arrived, that had been specified in the Act for its provisions to go into effect. A warrant came from the Treasurer for each town to choose a Commissioner to act with the Selectmen, in assessing upon its citizens the sum at which the town was rated. Several towns of Massachusetts, including every town but three in Essex County, refused to proceed to the election which was ordered.

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"The proceedings of the government against Ipswich, then perhaps the second town in the Colony, attracted particular attention at the time, and will serve for a specimen of the encroachments of the Governor and Council, on the one hand, and of the course and the consequences of resistance to it, on the other."

The following is an extract from an old pamphlet (without date) entitled "A Narrative of the Miseries of New England, By Reason of an Arbitrary Government Erected there":—

"Sir Edmund Andross caused a Tax to be leavied of a Penny in a Pound on all the Towns then under his Government: And when at Ipswich and other places, the Select Men (as they are there stiled) voted, That in as much as it was against the Common Priviledges of English Subjects, to have money raised without their own Consent in an Assembly or Parliament; That therefore they would petition the King for liberty of an Assembly before they made any Rates; the said Sir Edmund Andross caused them to be Imprisoned and Fined, some 201. some 301. and some 501. as the Judges, by him instructed, should see meet to determine; Yea, and several Gentlemen in the Country were Imprisoned and bound to their Good Behaviour, upon mere suspition, that they did Incourage their Neighbours not to comply with these Arbitrary Proceedings."

Palfrey adds: "So vigorous a course of proceeding as this, was decisive. Unless the country was prepared for violent measures of redress, submission was unavoidable. Men who possessed the confidence of their fellow-citizens, and were fit to take the lead in public movements, could not be expected to persevere in a course of opposition, at once fruitless to the public, and ruinous to themselves. The towns succumbed."

But this submission was not final; after suffering under the tyranny of Andros for more than two years, the people finally revolted, and succeeded in effecting the bloodless overthrow of his government, in April, 1689, and in February of the next year, he was sent to England, a prisoner.

1689, Dec. 24th. Ipswich votes, "That the Rev. John Wise and the Selectmen draw up the town's abuses with respect to the rates taken and the calumnies cast upon the town and persons, who have suffered by the late Government in Sir Edmund Andros' rule, and present them to the town next lecture-day after lecture."

In "The Revolution in New England Justified," printed in 1691, we find the following Affidavits:—

"Complaints of great wrongs done under the Ill Government of Sir *Edmund Androsse* Governour in *N. E.*, in the year 1687.

"We John Wise, John Andrews, senior, Robert Kinsman, William Goodhue, junior, all of Ipswich in New England, in the County of Essex, about the 22d day of August, in the year above named, were with several principal Inhabitants of the Town of Ipswich met at Mr. John Appletons, and there discoursed and concluded that it was not the Towns Duty any way to assist that ill method of raising Money without a general Assembly, which was apparently intended by abovesaid Sir Edmund and his Council, as witness a late Act issued out by them for such a purpose. The next day in a general Town-Meeting of the Inhabitants of Ipswich; We the above named John Wise, John Andrews, Robert Kinsman, William Goodhue with the rest of the Town then met (none contradicting) gave our assent to the vote then made.

The ground of our trouble, our crime was the Copy transmitted to the Council, viz. At a Legal Town meeting August 23. Assembled by vertue of an Order from John Usher, Esq: Treasurer for choosing a Commissioner to join with the Select men, to assess the Inhabitants according to an Act of his Excellency the Governour and Council for

laying of rates; the Town then considering that the said Act doth infringe their Liberty, as free born English Subjects of His Majesty by interfering with the Statute Laws of the Land, by which it was Enacted that no Taxes should be Levied upon the Subjects without consent of an Assembly chosen by the Freeholders for assessing of the same, they do therefore vote that they are not willing to choose a Commissioner for such an end without said priviledge; and moreover consent not that the Select-men do proceed to lay any such rate until it be appointed by a general Assembly concurring with the Governour and Council. We the complainants with Mr. John Appleton and Thomas French all of Ipswich were brought to answer for the said vote out of our own County, thirty or forty miles into Suffolk, and in Boston kept in Goal, only for contempt and high misdemeanors as our Mittimus specifies, and upon demand, denied the priviledge of an Habeas Corpus, and from Prison overruled to answer at a Court of Oyer and Terminer in Boston aforesaid. Judges were Mr. Joseph Dudley of Roxbury in Suffolk in New-England, Mr. Stoughton of Dorchester, John Usher of Boston, Treasurer, and Edward Randolph. He that officiates as Clerk and Attorny in the case is George Farwel.

The Jurors only twelve men and most of them (as is said) Non-freeholders of any Land in the Colony, some of them Strangers and Forreigners, gathered up (as we suppose) to serve the present turn. In our defence was pleaded the repeal of the Law of Assessment upon the place. Also the Magna Charta of England, and the Statute Laws that secure the Subjects Properties and Estates, &c. To which was replied by one of the Judges, the rest by silence assenting, that we must not think the Laws of England follow us to the ends of the Earth, or whither we went. And the same person (John Wise abovesaid testifies) declared in open Council upon examination of said Wise;

Mr. Wise you have no more priviledges left you, than not to be sold for Slaves, and no man in Council contradicted. such Laws our Trial and Trouble began and ended. Dudley aforesaid Chief Judge, to close up the debate and trial, trims up a speech that pleased himself (we suppose) more than the people. Among many other remarkable Passages, to this purpose, he bespeaks the Jury's obedience, who (we suppose) were very well preinclined, viz. I am glad, says he, there be so many worthy Gentlemen of the Jury so capable to do the King service, and we expect a good Verdict from you, seeing the matter hath been so sufficiently proved against the Criminals. Note, the evidence in the case as to the substance of it, was that we too boldly endeavored to persuade ourselves we were English Men, and under priviledges; and that we were all six of us aforesaid at the Town meeting of Ipswich aforesaid, and as the Witness supposed, we assented to the foresaid Vote, and also that John Wise made a Speech at the same time, and said we had a good God, and a good King, and should do well to stand for our Priviledges—Jury returns us all six guilty, being all involved in the same Information. We were remanded from Verdict to Prison, and there kept one and twenty days for Judge-There with Mr. Dudley's approbation, as Judge Stoughton said, this Sentence was passed, viz.

"John Wise, suspended from the Ministerial Function, fine fifty pound, money, pay cost, a thousand pound bond for the good behaviour one year.

"John Appleton not to bear Office, fine 501. money, pay cost, a thousand pound for the good behaviour one year.

"John Andrews not to bear Office, fine 30l. money, pay cost, five hundred pound bond for the good behaviour one year.

"Robert Kinsman not to bear Office, fine twenty pound money, pay cost, five hundred pound bond for the good behaviour one year.

"William Goodhue not to bear Office, fine twenty pound money, pay cost, five hundred pound bond for the good behaviour one year.

"Thomas French not to bear Office, fine 151. Money, pay cost, 500l. bond for the good behaviour one year.

"The Total Fees of this case upon one single Information demanded by *Farewell* abovesaid, amount to about a hundred and one pound seventeen shillings, who demanded of us singly about sixteen pound nineteen shillings six pence, the cost of Prosecution, the Fines added made up this, *viz.* Two hundred eighty and six pounds seventeen shillings, money.

Summa Totalis 2861. 17s.

"To all which we may add a large account of other Fees of Messengers, Prison charges, Money for Bonds and Transcripts of Records, exhausted by those ill men one way and another to the value of three or fourscore pounds, besides our expence of time and imprisonment.

"We judge the Total charge for one Case and Trial under one single Information involving us six men abovesaid in expense of Time and Moneys of us and our Relations for our necessary Succour and Support to amount to more, but no less than 4001. Money.

"Too tedious to illustrate more amply at this time, and so we conclude. John Wise, John Andrews, Senior, William Goodhue, Junior, Thomas French, these four persons named, and Robert Kinsman.

"These four persons first named appeared the twentieth day of *December*, and *Robert Kinsman* appeared the one and twentieth day of *December*, 1689, and gave in their Testimony upon oath before me *Samuel Appleton* Assistant for the Colony of the *Massachusetts* in *New-England*."

Felt says: "This narration was drawn up at the request of the government, which succeeded that of Andros, so that it might be sent to England among the charges against him. Several years afterwards, the town made up the loss which the narrators incurred, as previously described. . . .

"No town was probably more glad than Ipswich, that Andros was constrained to relinquish his authority by the threatening attitude of the people in Boston and the vicinity. The occasion of so sudden a change was, that news arrived, that the Prince of Orange had landed in England to put down the sway of James II, whose officers in Massachusetts had rendered themselves obnoxious to most of the colonists. Had William failed in this enterprise, there would probably have been a reaction upon our fathers as oppressive, as what they experienced after favoring Cromwell and then falling into the hands of restored and avenging Royalty."

Although by their sentence, the complainants were condemned not to bear office, yet the good people of Ipswich, after the recall of Andros, elected John Wise as a Deputy to the General Court in 1689, and Robert Kinsman in 1692.

Robert Kinsman was confirmed as Quartermaster in Capt. Thomas Wade's Company in 1691; and he had a seat appointed to him "at the table" in the meeting-house, 1700.

Quartermaster Robert Kinsman, of Ipswich, gives by Deed of Gift dated March 21, 1698-9, to his son Joseph, "his now dwelling house, out-houses, barne, stable, orchard, yard and half his common right on ye commons of Ipswich, and ye feild about ye house or home lott, about 14 acres of tillage and mowing ground, be it more or less as bounded one end by ye common, ye south side by John Brown's land, the other end by pasture land, and the other side of the highway yt. leads to Chebaccho... also pasture land about twenty acres more or less... also all the lower field and marsh belonging to it bounding East on Haffills Creek, except 4 acres of tillage land lying next to Mr Rogers' land

... Except what preveledges s'd parent hereby reserves during his natural life and the life of his wife, that he may leave at his decease yt. part of his building called ye old house, upper and lower room, providing for a wife if he should marry again," etc. etc.

To his son Robert Kinsman, he gives "the one half of his comonages and common rights in and on the commons of Ipswich, also about 40 acres of pasture, mowing and marsh ground, bounded easterly by Haffills Creek . . . also four acres of tillage land in ye lower field (before excepted) . . . also about 10 acres of salt marsh ground called ye low marshes . . . also a parcell of marsh ground and upland at Chebaccho, containing about 14 acres more or less as bounded southerly by Chebaccho river . . . Half ye common right — except a reserve during his present life and the life of his widow." — [Essex Deeds 13: 129-131.]

Robert Kinsman, senior, of Ipswich, yeoman, gives by Deed of Gift dated April 15, 1701, to his two grandsons, the sons of his son Thomas Kinsman, of Ipswich, deceased, viz. Stephen and Thomas Kinsman, "a certain parcel of upland and meadow, with a dwelling house, in Ipswich, bounded Northerly and Westerly by land of Isaac Fellows, and South-Easterly by ye common, and Southerly by land that Thomas Kinsman abovesaid, late deceased, bought of ye town of Ipswich.... after they arrive to 21 years.... Stephen paying to his eldest sister, Elizabeth Kinsman, £20 at or before three years after he becomes 21 years of age, and Thomas paying to Mary Kinsman, their youngest sister, £20 at or before he is 21 years of age."—[Ibid 14:117.]

In the ancient Burial-Ground of Ipswich is a gravestone bearing the following inscription:—

"Here lieth buried ye body of Quarter Master Robert Kinsman who died February ye 19, 1712. Aged 83 years." He left a Will, which is found on file in the Essex Registry of Probate, and is recorded in Book 10, page 260; the following is a copy of the original:—

"In the Name of God, Amen. I, Robert Kinsman, Senr. of Ipswich, in ye County of Essex in New England, Glazier, being aged, & not knowing how soon it may please God to take mee out this world, yet thro' God's Goodness of perfect mind & memory, & being willing to settle yt small estate yt I have not yet Disposed off by Deed of Gift to my two sons, Joseph & Robert, & my Grand sons, ye sons of my son Thomas Kinsman Dec^d, I make & ordaine this & no other to be my Last Will & Testament, & Dispose of my person & estate in manner & fforme, following.

I give & comend my soul to God, who gave it mee, hopeing & beleiving yt thro' ye meritts of Christ Jesus my blessed Saviour, to obtaine a Glorious Resurrection to Life Eternall, and my Body to be Decently buryed att ye Discretion of my Executors & Overseers hereafter named. As to my outward estate, I will yt all my just & honest Debts & funerall charges be payd & Discharged by my Executors hereafter named in convenient time after my Decease. I give to my two sons Joseph & Robert Kinsman, all my Glazeing Tools, Husbandry, and Carpenter Tools, of all sorts, to be equally Divided between them. I also give them my ffowling peice, & all with what they already have had by Deed, to be their portion, and they, equally to pay all my Debts & ffunerall Expences.

I give to my Daughter, Sarah Perkins, who stayed longest with me, my Bed in ye great chamber, with all ye furniture belonging to it.

I give to my Daughter, Unice Burnam, my chest of draws.

I give to my five Daughters, Mary, Sarah, Joanna, Mar-

garett & Unice, all my moveable estate of household goods & Debts yt shall be due att my Decease, and all my quick stock of all sorts & kinds whatsoever, as cattle, sheep, & horse kind, except what I hereafter in this my will, shall be Disposed of, & also my crane, tramells & hooks, equally to be Divided among them five.

I give to my son Pelatiah, but ten shillings beside what I have given him already.

Item. I give unto my maid Eliza Dingey, five good sheep if shee abide with mee till my Decease, otherwise I give but three good sheep.

Item. In consideration, my son Joseph Kinsman haveing had many priviledges & advantages which my son Robert hath not had, I see cause to give him no more, but I give my son Robert twenty pounds out of what he was to pay after my Decease, & to be Deducted from his sisters equally.

Item. I constitute, ordaine & appoint my said two sons Joseph & Robert Kinsman to be Joynt Executors, to this my Last Will & Testament, & I desire my well respected ffreinds, Deacon Nath'll Knowlton, & Daniel Rogers of Ipswich, to be Overseers, to see this my Will fullfilled.

In confirmation that this is my Last Will and Testament, I ye above said Robert Kinsman, Doe hereunto sett my hand & seale, this twenty fourth day of August, Anno Dom. 1710, in ye ninth of her Majesties Reigne Anne of Great Brittaine, &c Queen.

In the old Burial-Ground of the First Parish of Ipswich, stands a stone to her memory, bearing the following inscription: "Here lyes Buried the

Body of Mrs. Susanna Kinsman, wife to Lieut. Joseph Kinsman, who departed this Life, Nov^r 9th Ann^o Dom⁷ 1734. Ætatis Suæ 60."

He married, second, SARAH PEABODY, of Boxford, April 27, 1736.

May 8, 1705, Joseph Kinsman, of Ipswich, glazier, buys of his brother Robert Kinsman, Jr., of Ipswich, farmer, 4 acres of land in Ipswich, the home field of his farm. [Essex Deeds, 17:104.]

For his father Robert Kinsman's services in the Narraganset War, 1675, there was granted to Joseph, as his heir, Nov. 24, 1735, land in Narraganset Number One, now Buxton, Me., which he sold, Feb. 1, 1742-3, to his son John Kinsman.

His Will is on file in the Essex Registry of Probate, and is recorded in Book 24, page 232; the following is a copy of the original:—

"In the name of God, Amen. The twenty eight day of November Anno Dom: 1737. I, Joseph Kinsman of Ipswich, in ye County of Essex, Within his Majesties Provience of ye Mass^{tts} Bay in New England, Yeoman, Being now growen into years and under some decays of body, but yet through ye Mearcy and goodness of God, of sound & disposing minde and memory, and calling to mind ye Mortality of my body, and ye uncertainty of this transitory life, and knowing not how soon God shall call mee hence by death; and therefore desireous according to my duty to sett things in order before I go hence; Do make this my Laste Will & Testament in maner & form following. That is, first and principally, I committ my soul to God that gave it mee, hopeing for, & expecting ye free pardon & remission of all my sins, through ye death & sufferings and merrits of Jesus Christ my only Saviour & Redeemer, and to obtain an inheritance amoungst those that are sanctified. And my body I committ to ye earth att death, to be decently buried at ye discretion of my executors herein after mentioned. And touching my worldly estate, which it hath pleased God to bless mee with I dispose of it in ye following manner.

Imperimis My Will is that all my just debts to any pearsons due togather with my funeral charges shall first be paid and discharged in convenant time after my decease, by my executors.

Item. My Will is that Sarah my loveing wife shall have fivefty pound paid to her out of my estate by my executors after my decease according to the contract I maide with her before Marraige, and also all ye houshould stuffe that she brought with her which was hers before I had her, and all her plate, and also all her bonds, bills or book debts that were due or owing to her before I had her, or have become due since by vertue of the same: Furthermore my Will is that all and every peart of ye contract before mentioned maide with my wife before Marraige, be fullfiled by my executors according to ye true intent and meaning of the same.

I give and bequeath to John Kinsman my son, all ye land whereon the house & barn standeth, with ye house and barn thats now in his possession, with all ye land that I bought of my brother Robert Kinsman. That is to be understood, his homestead with all ye common rightes adjoyning to it, that did belonge to a south eaight so called and allso a nine accor right lying in a pastor called Browns & Kinsmans pastor. The which right also belonged to a south eaight, and hes to enjoy ye same according to ye quite clames that wee' alredy given to each other, and also all my righte and interst that I have in Wilderness hill pastor so called, ye which also belonged to a South Eaight, and also three accors and one halfe of ye salt meadow, lying and being att an island called Hoveys Island, and also another pearsell of salt meadow lying in Argilly so called, ye same salt meadow that I bought of Capt. John Choate Esq^r. And allso all my righte and interest in Jefferys Neck, ye same that I bought of Fitts, Fellows and Perkins; and also one third pearte of my low salt meadow, and also one third pearte of my thach lots, and also one third peart of my wood land that lyes on ye southarly side of Jabaco ponds. And also all ye wood standing or lying on booth my lower islands, That I bought of my brother Robert Kinsman. The which wood hee shall and may have liberty to take off from ye said land, hee or his heirs, att his or their owen pleasuer, and ye above said premises that are given to my son John Kinsman are free to him or to his assigns, hee or his heirs or administrators paying ye several sumes hereafter mentioned in this my last will, for him to pay his pearte off.

Item. I give and bequeath to Pelatiah Kinsman my son, The one halfe of my now dwelling house, and also ye one halfe of my barnes, and also ye one halfe of my homestead, and also ye one halfe of all my lands and meadows & woodlands within ye townshipe of Ipswich (That I have not given to my son John Kinsman), all ye above said premises that I have given in this my last Will to my son Pelatiah Kinsman are free to him or to his assigns. Hee or his heirs, or administrators, paying ye several sumes hereafter mentioned for him to pay his pearte off.

Item. I give and bequeath to Benjamin Kinsman my son the one halfe of my now Dwelling House; and also ye one halfe of my Barn, and also ye one halfe of my homestead, and also ye one halfe of all my lands and meadows & wood lands within ye Townships of Ipswich (That I have not given to my son John Kinsman) all ye above said premises that I have given in this my last Will to my son Benjamin Kinsman, are free to him or to His assigns, Hee or his hiers or administrators, paying ye several sumes hereafter mentioned for him to pay his pearte off.

Item. I give and bequeath to John Kinsman & to Pelatiah Kinsman & to Benjamin Kinsman, my three sons all my stock of cattel & other creatures, and all my husbandry tools and also all my Bonds, Bills, or Book debts or any other debt thats dew or owing to mee att my decese to be equally divided amongst them three.

Item. I give and bequeath to Nathaniel Kinsman my son ye full and just sume of two hundred and fivefty pounds in money in or as Bills of this Provience now passing. To be paide to Him or to his hiers or assigns within the terme of ye time of three years after my decease, by my executors hereafter to be mentioned.

Item. I give and bequeath to Susannah How & to Eunice Wells and to Sarah Wells and to Elizebeth Brown & to Hannah Wallis & to Martha Denies my six daughters, or to their heirs, all my houshould stuff, within doors, that I have not allredy given away in this my Laste Will to be equally divided amoungst them, or amoungst theire heirs.

Item. I give and bequeath to Susannah How, and to Eunice Wells, & to Sarah Wells & to Elizebeth Brown, & to Hannah Wallis and to Martha Denies my six daughters or to theire heirs, the full and just sume of five pounds to each of my six daughters, To be paid to them or to theire heirs in or as bills of this Provience now passing of ye Ould Tenour. Besides what I have already given to them, to be paid to them by my executors in six years time after my decease and not before.

Furthermore in this my Last Will and Testament I do constitute and appointe & ordain John Kinsman & Pelatiah Kinsman & Benjamin Kinsman my three well beloved sons to be ye soul executors of this my last will and testament; and my Will is that if Devine Providence shall call mee out of this life before Benjamin Kinsman my youngest son shall arive to ye age of twenty one years, Then, and if it should so happen, my Will is and I do appionte John Kinsman and

Pelatiah Kinsman my two sons to be overseers to Benjamin Kinsman, to act and do for him as overseers in all things, and for him in and about ye trust in him and them reposed, untill he arive to ye age of twenty one years: My will is that my three sons whome I have named executors for this my Last Will and testament, Do each of them pay thiere equal pearte of ye sevriel Legacies and sumes mentioned in this my Last Will for them to pay.

And I do hereby utterly, disallow, revoke and disannul all and evrey other former Testaments, Wills, Legacies and Bequests & Executors by mee in any ways before named, willed and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and seal ye day and yeare above written.

9. ROBERT KINSMAN, son of Robert and Mary (p. 50), born in Ipswich, May 21, 1677; married Lydia Moore, of Boston, April 3, 1700. She died without issue. He married, second, Rebecca Burley, June 28, 1705. She was born March 29, 1683, the daughter of Cornet Andrew and Mary (Conant) Burley, of Ipswich, and great-grand-daughter of Roger Conant, one of the earliest settlers of Massachusetts, 1624.

Feb. 18, 1720-1, he is of Ipswich, yeoman, and, with wife Rebecca, sells to his brother Joseph Kinsman, Sen'r, of Ipswich, yeoman, his house and lands in Ipswich. [Essex Deeds, 40:17.] Oct. 28, 1721, he is of Norwich, Ct., with wife Rebecca. [Ibid. 73:25.]

He removed with his family to what was then called Norwich, Ct., and settled in that part of the town known as Newent Society in Lisbon. Miss Caulkins, in her history of Norwich, says, "Robert Kinsman was admitted an inhabitant Dec. 5, 1721. He was one of the Selectmen in 1725 and 1728. He died June 7, 1761, and his wife died Nov. 11, 1775."

He left a Will, of which the following is a copy: -

"Know all men by these presents that I, Robert Kinsman, of Norwich, in the county of New London, and Colony of Connecticut in New England, considering the mortality of my body . . . have thought fit now in my right understanding and memory to settle and dispose of my worldly goods and estate by this my last will and testament in the following manner and form:

Imprimis. My just debts and funeral charges being paid, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Rebeckah Kinsman, one third part of my personal estate to be hers forever, and over and above that I further give to her one of my horses or mares which she shall choose, and tackling suitable and the value of eighty pounds old tenor, out of my personal

estate and the improvement of one half of my dwelling house during her widowhood and the improvement of one third part of my real estate during her widowhood, and the value thereof if she shall find it necessary for her comfortable subsistence during her natural life.

Item. I give to my daughter Mary Little twenty five pounds to be paid to her out of my estate.

Item. I give and bequeath to my grandchildren (viz.) Benjamin Burnam, Susannah Burnam, Joanna Burnam and Ester Burnam, the children of my Daughter Mary Little, one hundred and sixty pounds (old tenor) that is to say Forty pounds to each of my said grandchildren above named to be paid to them by my two sons Robert and Jeremiah equally.

Item. I give to my daughter Margaret Marsh to be hers forever one hundred and twenty five pounds (old tenor) the which with what I have already given to her, I judge to be the full of her portion of my estate, and to have it paid to her by my two sons abovenamed equally within two years after my decease.

Item. I give and bequeath to my two sons (viz.) Robert and Jeremiah, all my lands and buildings, to them, their heirs and assigns forever (they allowing to my said wife Rebeckah the improvement as above willed unto her, and also paying the legacies to my children, and grand children, as is above willed to them), which lands and buildings are to be equally divided to and between them my two sons, the which with what I have already given to them by deed in lands which they possess, I judge to be the full of their portion of the estate.

Item. My will is that all the legacies above given by this my last will shall be paid in old tenor, bills of credit, or equivalent, and further my will is and I do order it so, and it must be observed that if either of my grandchildren above

named shall die and leave no heir of his or her body lawfully begotten before he or she hath received the portion above given, that then such childs portion shall be equally divided to and among the survivors of my grandchildren above named.

Finally. I do make, constitute, and appoint my beloved and faithful wife Rebekah, sole executrix of this my last will and testament. I do hereby solemnly revoke, make null and void, all other and former wills, testaments, and bequests by me heretofore made, Ratifying and allowing this and no other to be my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seal, the sixth day of September in the year 1750.

He was a member of the New North Church in Boston (founded March, 1712), and in 1720 remonstrated against the settlement of Peter Thacher as Pastor. He probably withdrew with others and founded the Society at the New Brick. [See "History of Boston," by Samuel G. Drake, p. 546.] Will of Pelatiah Kinsman, of Boston, in New England, mariner, dated Jan. 6, 1715–16; proved May 22, 1727. "Calling to mind the dangers of the seas," he gives all his property to his "dearly beloved wife Sarah Kinsman," and appoints her executrix. [Suffolk Probate Files.]

His widow, Sarah Kinsman, was married in Boston, by the Rev. Peter Thacher, to Zechariah Hubbard, May 18, 1732.

It appears from this grant that there was an earlier one, which, not fully securing the grantees in their rights and shares therein, was returned: the one on file being a substitute for the first." On this list appears the name of "Benjamin Kinsman."

She was born in Marshfield, Mass.; was a sister of Gen. John Thomas, one of the first generals appointed by the Continental Congress, and a descendant of John Thomas, who in 1635 came to Plymouth in the ship "Hopewell," a boy fourteen years of age, and remained in the family of Gov. Edward Winslow until after his majority.

She died Sept. 23, 1798.

Captain Kinsman was a farmer of Lisbon, Ct.; prominent as a business man; active in all works of public interest. Among many public movements that engaged his attention was the building of the Old Newent Church. The Society resolved to build a new meeting-house about the year 1770, and secured a subscription for that purpose. He, as principal manager of the enterprise, commenced the work, and finding

it at the time extremely difficult to procure suitable lumber in the vicinity, and money being very scarce, collected a quantity of farm products from the subscribers, such as pork, beef, grain, etc., and shipped it to Maine in charge of Robert Avery, as supercargo, to exchange for pine lumber.

Avery performed his mission with satisfaction, and returned to Norwich, landing his cargo of lumber, which was conveyed, by farmers and others having teams, to the place of destination, and the church was in due time completed.¹

Of this church, an extract is given from Miss Caulkins' "History of Norwich."

"He (Rev. Levi Nelson) preached his half-century sermon in 1854. Only one of the thirty-eight members who received him as their pastor in 1804, was then living; but of the ordination choir, four were present and united in singing again the same hymns that formed a part of the original The old Kirtland² Church was then extant, seated service. in decaying dignity upon gently rising ground, with its barrack-like row of sheds spread out at the side like wings. The outside of the edifice had been covered and re-covered, as the wear and tear of years demanded, but no tool or painter's brush, under pretence of improvement or repair, had invaded the interior since it was first completed. impression produced on the mind upon entering, was that of homely, stern solemnity. The pulpit was high and contracted, with a sounding-board frowning over it, and a

¹ The Rev. David Hale was ordained, June, 1790, and occupied this church until 1803. He was a brother of the accomplished and chival-rous Capt. Nathan Hale, who was executed as a spy on Long Island, by order of Sir William Howe; and father of David Hale, so well known as proprietor and editor of the "Journal of Commerce."

² Should be *Benedict*, I think, as the Rev. J. Benedict was the first divine that occupied it. The old Kirtland Church was situated some distance south of this location.

seat for the deacons in front of it, below. The pews were square, with high partitions; the galleries spacious, with certain seats more elevated than others for the tything-men or supervisors of behavior. This venerable structure is believed to be the last specimen of the old New England sanctuary that lingered in the nine-miles-square. It was demolished when about eighty-eight years of age, and its place supplied by a new church, dedicated Sept. 15, 1858."

Miss Caulkins names Jeremiah Kinsman, with others, as the leading patriots of the town of Norwich in 1767.

He died June 24, 1811, leaving a Will, of which the following is a copy:—

"I, Jeremiah Kinsman of Lisbon, in the county of New London, & state of Connecticut, being of perfect mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner following.

Imprimis. I give and bequeath to my son John Kinsman, his heirs & assigns forever, all my land with buildings thereon standing, which I purchased of Samuel Starr and Samuel Clift situate on the south-casterly side of the highway or county road leading by my house to Canterbury. I also give my said son John, Fifty pounds lawful money to be paid by my executor hereinafter named, in six months after my decease.

Item. I give and bequeath to my son Jeremiah Kinsman and his heirs & assigns forever, all my lands & real estate situate in the town of Plainfield, & also a lot of land in Canterbury, situate on the easterly side of Quinabaug River, which my brother Robert Kinsman purchased as part of the estate of Charles Davenport & which my s'd brother died seized of. I also give my said son Jeremiah, thirty pounds

lawful money, to be paid by my executor hereafter named, within six months after my decease.

Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter Joanna Fanning, one hundred & ninety pounds lawful money, to be paid by my executor hereafter named, in six months after my decease.

Item. And lastly I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Kinsman & to his heirs & assigns forever, all the residue of my estate both real & personal which I shall die possessed of, and order him to pay the aforesaid sums of money to my other children, out of the estate given him by this will, and my will is that in case a negro man named Prince, who was owned by my brother Robert Kinsman in his life time, shall ever become chargable, so that any part of my estate, disposed of by this will, should by law be liable for the support of s'd Prince, it is my will that my three sons before mentioned should jointly defray the expense thereof, so that my sons John & Jeremiah shall pay one half the expense thereof, & my son Thomas the other half thereof.

And I do hereby constitute my son Thomas Kinsman sole executor of this my last will & testament, and I also order and direct, as part of my last will & testament, that my debts & funeral expenses be paid by my said executor, out of that part of my estate given to him, so that the legacies given my other children be not diminished by the payment thereof.

Signed, sealed, published & delivered this 23d day of October, A. D. 1798, by the said Jeremiah Kinsman, as his last will & testament in presence of us.

But there seems to be no John Kinsman, in our Record, who will answer for a husband to either the Mary, or Martha, or Hannah above; so that, if these names and dates are correct, they must refer to one or more Johus, of whom we have no other account.

May 7, 1784, he, with wife Margaret, sells land, etc., to Moses Kinsman of Ipswich. [Ibid. 142:173.]

He died in Ipswich, June 2, 1785, aged 48. [Gravestone.] His Will, dated May 14, 1784, proved July 4, 1785, is on file, and recorded Essex Probate, 57: 246; by it he gives all his property to his wife Margaret. 47. JOHN KINSMAN, son of Jeremiah and Sarah (p. 75), born in Norwich (now Lisbon), Ct., May 7, 1753; married Rebecca Perkins, Oct. 4, 1792. She was born Sept. 29, 1773, the daughter of Capt. Simon and Olive (Douglas) Perkins, of Lisbon, Ct.¹

At the age of 23 years, on a call from Gov. Trumbull for nine regiments, in 1776, he is found enrolled as an Ensign in a company of Connecticut Militia, marching to New York, to take position under General Washington, in the defence of his country.

His company, being a part of Col. Jedediah Huntington's regiment, was soon mustered into service, and took an active and prominent part in the great Battle of Long Island. He was there, with many of his companions in arms, taken a prisoner of war, and placed in the hands of the Hessian soldiers. Thrust into prison in the prison-ships (of which history gives a detailed account), he remained for some time

in close confinement, suffering from filth, vermin, and hunger, nearly to starvation, by which his health became impaired, and he never entirely recovered. By some means he and two of his companions, Charles Fanning and Anthony Bradford, were released from the prison-ship on parole, and allowed to mess together in a room in the city of New York. From the "Independent Chronicle," printed at Boston, Sept. 19, 1776, is taken the following: "A List of the Names of the Officers that are Prisoners with the Enemy, and have by Flag of Truce, sent for their Baggage and Cash." "Of Col. Huntington's Regiment, Ensign Kinsman." And from the "Continental Journal and Weekly Advertiser," printed at Boston, May 8, 1777: "Fish-Kill, April 20. To the Printer. Head Quarters, Morris-Town, April 10, His Excellency General Washington desires that the following gentlemen may be informed through your paper, that they are exchanged, and at liberty to enter into the service again. I am &c. G. Johnston, A. D. C." Among the gentlemen mentioned, was "Ensign John Kinsman."

While in New York, he acquired a knowledge of the hatting business, that induced him, immediately on his release and return home, to embark in that business. He at once established a shop, placed in it an experienced workman, Mr. Capron, as foreman, purchased a stock of goods, and devoted his time to the care of the store, furnishing the shop, and making sales of the products. He supplied the army largely with hats, and the trade generally proved to be successful, and was continued in Connecticut, with his farm, until after the war.

In 1797 he was elected a Representative to the State Legislature, where he was continued three years. In that connection, he became acquainted with the officers and stockholders of the Connecticut Land Company, and made extensive purchases of those lands.

In 1799 he first went to Ohio, to explore his lands; subsequently he fixed upon a township (16,600 acres) which he had purchased (with other lands), now known as Kinsman, in Trumbull County, Ohio, then a wilderness, for his future residence; built houses, store, and saw-mill, and moved his family to that location in 1804, and cleared and occupied a large farm.

He was a man of great energy and activity in business, was appointed a Justice of the Peace under the Territorial Government, and an Associate Judge under the State Government, and was also prominent in the County organization. He was one of the main projectors and the largest subscriber to the stock of the "Western Reserve Bank," the first bank established in Northern Ohio.

His life and business were marked by great activity and toil; he rode often on horseback to Connecticut and to Philadelphia, to purchase goods, and over many parts of the Connecticut Western Reserve, to look after the new settlements, and the sale of his land; frequently camping out at night, with nothing but an extra blanket to cover him.

His time was so constantly devoted to the progress and improvement of the early settlements, that he exerted himself beyond the powers of endurance, and sank under the care and fatigue of a life too laborious for his constitution, and died Aug. 17, 1813, aged 60 years. He died intestate, leaving a large estate, which was administered upon by his brother-in-law, Gen. Simon Perkins.

Mrs. Kinsman died May 27, 1854, aged 80 years. She was a devoted Christian, a member of the Congregational Church, gave largely of her means during her widowhood to the educational and religious enterprises of the day, and contributed to the building of a house of worship for the church in Kinsman, of which she was a member, giving a parsonage, with land, and a liberal endowment.

"The deceased, being identified with the early settlement of the Western Reserve from his youth, and possessed of much energy and capacity as a business man, soon became connected with many of the public and benevolent enterprises of the day, and devoted much of his time and means to the development of the resources of the country, administering largely by advice and means to the wants of those around him.

"In his extensive business, large credits were freely given to relieve the wants of the early settlers, at a time when such credits were deemed almost indispensable to their success. His position in society has been one of much prominence and usefulness, and his loss will be deeply felt by his numerous and devoted friends."

The fine quality of its soil, well-watered by springs and spring-brooks, its good timber, and well-arranged farmbuildings, made his farm one of the most attractive in the State. It was mostly under fine cultivation; a part being devoted to dairy purposes, the number of cows ranging from sixty to eighty each year; the balance to promiscuous

farming. His large and well-bred Durham herd constituted at all times a prominent and attractive feature of his business. He died April 26, 1875. His widow survives him.

The following is from an obituary written at the time: -

"Died, of paralysis, in Kinsman, Ohio, April 26, 1875, Mr. Thomas Kinsman, in the 71st year of his age.

"Judge Kinsman, his father, was the original proprietor of the township that bears his name, to which place he removed from Lisbon, Connecticut, with his family, in 1804. The deceased was the first of the family born in Ohio. life, as a citizen of the town, numbers more years than any one that has preceded him, and at his death he was the oldest native inhabitant. His life, from childhood to old age, has been peculiarly marked by kindly relations with all with whom he had to do. Buoyant in spirits, with a strong mind abounding in wit and humor, he drew around him a circle of friends; while his marked integrity, consistent Christian character, and a modesty that withheld him from any aspirations for fame or official position, rendered him prominent as a counsellor and adviser with his neighbors and friends, and in every work of progress or benevolence. He was eminently social and hospitable, easily approached, while his genial presence cheered every one who came under its influence. He was an affectionate and faithful husband and father, loving and devoted as few husbands and fathers are; alike true to his Christian professions and the church of which he was a devoted member and constant attendant."

Obituary notices of her life and character were published at the time in several of the papers. The following, dated Feb. 20, 1873, and copied from the "Cleveland Herald," expresses the universal sentiment, and is a just and truthful tribute to her memory:—

"'Death loves a shining mark.' Never was the truth of this saying more fully exemplified than in the death of Mrs. Cornelia Pease Kinsman, wife of Judge Frederick Kinsman, of Warren, who died very suddenly of apoplexy, on Tuesday morning, 18th inst. . . .

Mrs. Kinsman was the youngest daughter of the late Judge Calvin Pease, of Warren...

"In all the relations of life, public as well as private, the deceased may be regarded as a woman of inestimable worth. She was a devoted wife, a loving, faithful mother, a stead-fast friend, a warm-hearted, earnest Christian, a leader in the best society, of a cultivated and intelligent mind, great refinement of taste, always exerting her wide-spread influence in behalf of all that was true, beautiful, and good.

"For many years Mrs. Kinsman has been a communicant and leading member of Christ Church, Episcopal, of Warren, and in her death the church has been sadly bereft of

one of its brightest jewels. Whether as chief officer of the Church Aid Society, as teacher in the Sunday School, or in the discharge of any other of the multifarious Christian duties she assumed, she was ever at her post, earnest, faithful, never discouraged, self-denying, proving her faith by her good works, and setting an example well worthy of imitation. Truly may her sisters in Christ say, in the language of their beautiful service for the dead, 'We do give thee thanks, Almighty God, for the good example of this thy servant, who, having finished her course in faith, doth now rest from her labors.'

"But not within church circles alone were this estimable lady's good works confined. Her charity was as broad as community itself. Standing as it were at the head of Warren society, her influence was felt in every direction, and always for good. Possessed of wealth, it was freely devoted to offices of charity, and in the majority of cases she was her own almoner, being indefatigable in her efforts to search out and by personal visitation alleviate the wants of the poor and the needy. Every charitable and worthy project found in her a warm supporter.

"Especially during the present inclement winter, have her sympathies been enlisted in behalf of suffering humanity. The continued severity of the weather had made more needy than usual that unfortunate class of persons who always, more or less, depend upon charity. This fact seemed to arouse more keenly than ever the sympathies of this benevolent lady, so that, being to a great extent confined to her home by poor health, she converted that charming home into society work-rooms, and gathering there her lady friends, day after day was spent in making up bedding and all kinds of garments for the needy poor. The humbler classes of Warren have lost in this lady a generous friend, and if there was ever one in our midst whom they may 'rise up and call

blessed,' surely it was she. That one so full of goodness, one whose daily life was so fragrant with the incense of unselfish deeds of love, should be stricken down in the full tide of usefulness, is one of those inscrutable providences which prove indeed that

"God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform.'

"The funeral services, very sad and solemn, were conducted by the Rev. Samuel Maxwell, of St. John's Church, Youngstown; the Warren rector, Rev. Mr. Taylor, being absent from home. The interment took place in the beautiful family mound, at Oakwood Cemetery, on Thursday afternoon."



Butler's office in Boston, and was admitted to the bar, but remained several years at Cambridge, engaged in editing law works, besides publishing one of his own on "Municipal Law and the Rights and Duties of Municipal Officers"; went into a successful practice in Boston, and continued it until the breaking out of the Rebellion. He entered the service as a volunteer Aide-de-Camp on the staff of General Butler, without commission or pay; and served in that capacity at Fortress Monroe, Ship Island, and New Orleans, as First Lieutenant, but without pay or rank, until, for meritorious services at the taking of Forts Jackson and St. Philip, President Lincoln, unsolicited, commissioned him a Lieut.-Colonel in

the Regular Army. For his successful expedition and capture of the city of Thibodeauxville, in southwestern Louisiana, and the rescue of its Union citizens; his expedition from New Orleans to Mississippi, and capture of the noted Rebel steamer "Gray Cloud," afterward renamed the "Kinsman"; also for his discovery and capture of \$800,000 in silver from the enemy, he was promoted to be Colonel, Brigadier-General, and Major-General of Volunteers. Was Provost Judge at New Orleans, and also filled the laborious and responsible position of Commissioner of Sequestration of Rebel estates and property.\(^1\) After leaving New Orleans he was actively engaged in other service, and since the War has been employed by Government in different capacities at home and abroad. Is unmarried.



Mr. Kinsman, as a ship-master, was distinguished for his nautical skill; as a merchant, for his shrewdness, honor, and mercantile talents. These qualifications marked him out as eminently qualified to take the lead of a mercantile house in a foreign country, and the house of Wetmore & Co., of Canton, invited him to become their partner. For a limited term he consented to leave his country and engage in this partnership. But the disease with which he had previously been visited, again attacked him, and proved fatal. Like his brother, he has died in a foreign clime, and quickly followed his interesting little daughter, who died on her passage home. In his death, our city has sustained the loss of one of her most honorable, honest, and amiable citizens, and his family an irreparable calamity."

His widow married Joseph Grinnell, of New Bedford, Sept. 19, 1865.

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


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
