



GENEALOGY.

Descendants of John White.

1638.

1. JOHN White was of Salem in the Province of Massachusetts Bay, 1638. We have been unable to learn just when he came, the name of the ship he came on; or the maiden name of Joane, his wife. Oct. 28, 1784, Col. Jonathan White⁴ (150), of Leominster, told his son, Dea. James White⁵ (554), of Heath, Mass.; (and he made a note of it, with the date in his account book):

That his great grandfather came from the west part of England; that he had two sons, Thomas², who settled in Wenham, and Josiah², who settled on his father's estate in Lancaster, and his son, Josiah, Jr., lived on the same estate, and his son Jonathan in Leominster, and his sons, James and Asaph, then lived in Charlemont. It is signed James White, and he adds "This account I had from my father, this day."

It was copied from Dea. James White's account book by F. W. White⁷ (8085) in 1848.

Aug., 1639, John White was received an inhabitant of Salem, and granted 60 acres land, near Mr. Smith's farm.

Feb. 15, 1642, he was granted 6 acres meadow at Enon (Wenham) "which John Woodbury did apoynt him to mowe, which he hath mowed, these 2 or 3 years past."

Also 40 acres more of upland, and 4 of meadow to be laid out near the former.

"Jan. 30, 1643, He with Richard Prince, Sarah wife of Daniel Trumball, in the right of George Norton, are granted 4 acres meadow each, at Wenham, then in the possession of William Paine." (Salem book of Grants.)

The first saw and grist mill, in Wenham, was built by Robert Haws, upon the brook running through John White's grant of land. The farm is now owned and occupied by Mr. David Pingree, and his sister;

and is known as "White's Mills," although the mill has long since gone to decay.

In 1653, the Planters made the following:

His wife, Joane, was admitted to the first church in Salem, Feb. 26, 1642-3, where three of their children were baptized. His name does not appear upon the church roll. The children are baptized in the mother's name.

On the forming of the church in Wenham, Joane White was dismissed by letter from the Salem church, as shown by the following, copied upon the Town Book at Wenham.


"At a church meeting April 10, 1645.

The letters dismissive of Joane White from the church of Salem were read & accepted of, in case she gave satisfaction to ye church otherwise.


Heereupon ye church desired of her being present to make a declaration of ye worke of Grace on her soule w'ch was done, ye substance whereof was this:

She was brought up in a poore Ignorant place &c.

her 1st conviction was of ye sins of ye breach of ye sabbath & ye taking of Gods name in vayne, from Commandments 3 & 4th, her hearte

being drawne towards New England because good people came hither:— At last by a providence comeing over was shut up for a long space of time liveing far remote in ye woods from ye meanes, (of grace) & reading in Romans 10, Faith commeth by hearing: put her affections onward, towards ye desire of ye meanes:—afterwards at Ipswich, from, Es. 41—her consent & closure. * * * *

After other questions, her assent yealded to our Church confession & Covenant—ye Church referred her to next sabbath.

Apr. 13, 1645 — After ye sermon & singing, ye letters of dismission concerning Joane White were publickly read, and after that ye Church had by vote manifested their willingness to reach forth unto her ye right hand of fellowship: — she was admitted & pronounced an actual member of this Church."

THE COPY OF HER LETTER OF DISMISSION.

To ye Elder & Brethren of ye Church of Christ at Wenham; the church of Salem sendeth Greeting in our Blessed Saviour.

Reverend & Dearly Beloved, whereas Joane White a member of our Congregation, by reason of her abode with you, cannot so well partake with us in ye Ordinances: nor live under our watch, & hath therefore desired our Lrs. Dismissive unto you: Know you therefore yet we have consented thereto & request you to receive her in ye Lord, as becometh Scts. & watch over her, administering to her all ye holy things of his house yt she may be prsented blamelesse in ye day of Jesus Christ. To whose grace we commend you: & with ye desire of ye Communion of yo r prayers Rest

yor loveing Brethren in ye faith & fellowship of ye Gospell

Salem, 10, 2, 45.

In ye nw & wth ye consent of ye church.

Extract from the Church Record kept by the Rev. John Fisk, Pastor of the first Church in Wenham, Mass. (Organized Oct. 8th, 1644. O. S.)

It does not appear that John White ever lived in Salem proper. As all his grants of land were located in Wenham, it is conclusive that he lived there, as that town was in the jurisdiction of Salem until 1648—

the same as Beverly, until 1674—going under the general name of Salem.

JOHN White¹ is first mentioned in Lancaster, May 1, 1653, when he, with others, subscribed to "Rules for Proportion of Meadow." He had twenty acres of land allotted to him on the Neck, between the lots of James Atherton on the south and John Lewis on the north, and as the "Annals of Lancaster" state, his house stood on the east end of said lot, at or near where the house of Edward Houghton now stands, and direct descendants have resided there until the death of Dea. Samuel F. White,⁶ son of Dea. Joseph White⁵ (604), Mar. 15, 1843.

The house was burned first by the Indians in 1676, and again by accident in 1816; and rebuilt by Dea. Samuel F. White.⁶

Also, Nov. 20, 1653, John White¹ signed petition for the building of a "corne Mill" in Lancaster. In 1654 he drew land proportioned to £380:06:02. In 1655, 20 lots. June 26, 1658, he was granted seven acres "neare the still river." Feb. 5, 1659, granted lot No. 33. (Early records of Lancaster.)

Joane, his wife, died in Lancaster, May 18, 1654.

"WILL OF JOHN WHITE.

LANCASTER, MASS.

These present witnesseth the Last will and testament of John White of Lancaster in the countie of Middlesex in New England yeoman, being under the sensible decayes of nature and weake and low in Respect of the outward man, and the sensible symptoms of an aproaching change (togather with the advise of frends) hath moved thereunto to the setting his house in order to the dispossing of those outward blessings the Lord in mercy hath betrusted him with amongst his surviving children, for ye mutial Good & future peace.

And first in order to this his last will he hath & hereby doth commit & commend his soul to Almighty God that gave it him & his body to the common burying place here in Lancaster & after his body being ordly and decently interred and the charge thereof defrayed togather with all due debts as also the following legasies which are to be discharged out of the movable Estate; the housing and lands and Rest of the movable goods to be as followeth:—first, it is his will that his daughter Hanna have one hundred acres of his second devision of upland and part of it lying neare Ealsabet River, and all that part of his second devision of meadow that lyeth at Wataquadoke, togather with

commons and common Right due to one hundred pound Estate on the Town booke. And the house and barne and other out housing togather with all the Rest of the lands, meadows commons and common Rights within the bounds of Lancaster, both first and second devision aforementioned to be as aforesaid to his son Josiah, and his daughter Hanna, their heires and assignes forever.

And in Reference to his farm at Wenham, it is his Will hereby declared that his daughter-in-law Ruth White sometime wife to his late deseased son Thomas White, shall have and enjoy the said farme during the time of her natural life (one half of it) and the other halfe until her son Thomas White com to the age of twentie one years, and then he to enter possession of one halfe, and at the death of the said widow, the two daughters are to enter possession of the other half, to be to the said widow her son and daughters as aforesaid, theire heires and assignes forever. Provided always that if the said Widow change her condition by marriage, then the said farme to be the said childrens in proportion as aforesaid — And in Reference to his daughters Joane, Elizabeth, Marie and Sara, who are disposed of by marriage, and have Received portions: — Yet notwithstanding it is his will hereby declared that they have everie one twentie shillings; —

Hanna, his youngest daughter who hath lived with him from her childhood, and been a nurse to him in his old age, it is hereby declared to be his will that she have the bed shee useth, togather with all the furniture belonging to it.

The debts and Legasies aforesaid being fully discharged out of the movables estate as aforesaid by the aforesaid Josiah White, who is hereby willed and declared to be sole Executor, of this last will of his aforesaid father, to see this his said Father's will truly & faithfully performed in all due parts of it, the remainder of the afores'd moveables to be the s'd Josiah's. The fores'd John White, notwithstanding his great weakness, yet being of a competent measure of understanding & sound memory doeth hereby declare this to be his last will and Testament. And in witness hereof hath hereunto put his hand & seale this tenth day of March one thousand six hundred seventie two—three.

Roger Sumner & Ralph Houghton being witnesses to this Instrument deposed before me this 28 day of May 1673; that they saw John White deceased signe seale & declare this writing to be his last Will & Testament & that he was of deposing mind when he did the same & that they know of no other Will.



JOANNA² (3), b. in England, about 1630; m. in Wenham, about 1650, Capt. Thomas, son of Phineas and Sarah Fiske, b. in England about 1630. (The Fiske Genealogy of 1896, gives his children's mother as Peggy, but we find in the Salem Probate office a volume written by Mr. Perley Derby—The Family of Thomas Fiske—and an entry made later by Hon. Henry Fitz Waters⁸ (8886 a), that the name of his wife was Joanna White.

And Mr. Waters gives me his word that he had proof that he married Joanna White; and he is a descendant of their oldest child, Mary (Fiske) Perkins, wife of John Perkins. Joanna was living in 1673 when her father's will was written, but d. before 1695, as he m. (2) in Boston, May 14, 1695, Mrs. Martha Fitch of Boston.

The wife of Thomas Fiske, was presented in Court for wearing a tiffany hoode, Oct. 1652; and sentenced to pay ten shillings fine, and two shillings six pence fees to the court.

He held every office in the gift of his fellow citizens, town clerk over thirty three years, representative in the Great and General Court in 1671-'72-'78-'79-'80-'86-'94-'97. In a deposition in 1670, he calls himself about forty years of age.

There was laid out to Thomas Fiske sen. foure acres of meadow in the greate meadow, also in the right of John White late of Wenham to make good a grante of foure acres to him by Salem, dated 27, 12 mo., 1642.

Capt. Fiske, made his will, Apr. 24, 1705, proved Sept. 1, 1707 mentions, wife Martha, oldest son Thomas, son-in-law John Perkins, Ann Perkins, (grandau.), grandson Andrew Dodge, son-in-law John Dodge, and his four children, Phineas, Amos, Martha and Elizabeth, daughters Sarah Dodge and Elizabeth Brown.

Capt. Thomas Fiske, and his son Capt. Thomas, Jr., are buried in the old graveyard at Wenham, near the grave of Ruth, widow of Thomas White.²

ELIZABETH² (4), b. in England, about 1631; m. in Sudbury, Mass., Nov. 2, 1654, Capt. Henry, son of William and Ann Kerley, of Lancaster, Mass., where they lived. He was a soldier in King Phillip's

war. He, with the Rev. Mr. Rowlandson, had gone to the Bay (Boston) to see about having the town better fortified, when the Indians came upon Lancaster and burned and pillaged the place, Feb. 10, 1675-6. Capt. Kerley had left his wife and children in the Rowlandson Garrison house with her sisters, and in the massacre of that date she was shot by the Indians, when attempting to leave the house: and, falling back, was burned so bad, that her husband did not recognize her when he helped to bury the dead on his return.

Capt. Kerley m. (2) at Charlestown, Mass., Apr. 18, 1677, Mrs. Elizabeth (Ward) Howe, widow of John Howe of Marlboro, by whom he had two daughters, born at Marlboro. His will was written May 17, 1708; probated Jan. 27, 1713-14.

THOMAS² (5), b. in England, about 1633; m. before 1658, Martha—, who d. soon; m. (2) Ruth, dau. of Richard and Martha Haffield, b. in Sudbury, Suffolk Co., Eng., 1632; came with her parents and older sisters to Ipswich (Mass.), 1635, aged three years. She d. in Wenham, Dec. 10, 1713, and her gravestone is still standing in the old yard there. Thomas White was appointed guardian of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Martha Haffield of Ipswich, Jan. 15, 1666.

"April, 1668, Thomas White, deeds to Wm. Story, a dwelling house, once belonging to widow Haffield." "April 28, 1668:—Thomas White, wife Ruth, for £200 convey to Thomas Bishop, the farm, which was the late widow Haffield's, their mother; said farm containing 100 acres, lying at Chebaco (formerly Ipswich, now Essex.)"

"April 5, 1669, Thomas White,² as administrator to estate of Martha Haffield, late of Ipswich, dec'd, for £13, deeds to Nathaniel Wells, of Ipswich all my division lot, being a middle lot, laid out as the right belonging unto the farm of Martha Haffield. No. 56, in the town booke, located on Hog Island, by the side of the long hill."

His name often appears, upon the town book as serving on committees, in laying out highways and in building the church.

He d. in Wenham, Mass., Oct. 1, 1672. Inventory of his estate taken by Walter Fairfield and Charles Gott, June 27, 1673. Inventory, £130,02,04. Administration on his estate granted his widow, Ruth White, who made a statement in Court, July, 1675, respecting his inventory.

The estate of Mrs. Ruth White was settled in 1714, her son Thomas White administrator.



MARY² (6), b. in England, about 1635; m. in Lancaster, Mass., 1656, Rev. Joseph, son of Thomas and —— Rowlandson, of Ipswich. He was born in England, 1631; was the only graduate at Harvard College in 1652; began preaching at Lancaster, 1654; and was ordained in 1660, being their first settled minister. They were living in a garrison at Lancaster, which stood sixty rods northeast of the present residence of Hon. Nathaniel Thayer, and the site is marked by a large pine, when the Indians attacked the town and captured Mrs. R. and her children. (A full account will be found in her book, which is reprinted in an appendix to this volume.)

Mr. Rowlandson, after the ransom of his wife, lived for a short time, in Boston, then was settled in Wethersfield, Conn., where he d. Nov. 23, 1678, leaving widow Mary and two children. There is now in the Memorial Library at Lancaster, Mass., a sideboard, or cupboard, as it is called in the inventory of Rev. Mr. Rowlandson's estate at Hartford, Conn. It was brought by John White from England, 1638, and probably left in Wenham, with his daughter Joanna, or son Thomas, when he moved through the wood to Lancaster, in 1652-3. When Mary, their sister, after her captivity, "set up housekeeping with bare walls," in Boston, there is no doubt that they gave her this piece of furniture. It is said to have been in the Rowlandson family for one hundred and fifty years; and in 1876, was in the possession of Mr. J. W. Dunlap, of

South Hadley, Mass., who sold it to the Lancaster Memorial Library, for one hundred dollars.

Oct. 13, 1658, James, son of James and Ann Hosmer of Concord, who came in the ship Elizabeth from London, Eng., in 1635, aged 28, with wife Ann, aged 27. He was of Hawkhurst in County Kent. James, Jr., was born in New England, in 1637. When a child his father settled in Concord, and James, Jr., lived there until Mar. 31, 1676, when he was killed by the Indians at Sudbury Fight. His widow Sarah m. (2) Dec. 13, 1676, as his third wife, Samuel, son of Edmond and Thamazine Rice, who came from Barkhampstead, in Hertfordshire, England, and settled in Sudbury in 1639, took the freeman's oath May 13, 1640; was one of the first proprietors of Sudbury, and was rated the sixth in the number of acres granted him. He was selectman in Sudbury in 1644; chosen deacon in 1648. In May, 1656, he was a petitioner for Marlboro. He was frequently appointed by the General Court to locate grants of land and appears conspicuous in the transactions of his time. In 1662, he was empowered to marry. He was buried at Sudbury, May 3, 1663. Samuel Rice d. in Marlboro, Feb. 25, 1685. (Marlboro Records.)





Josiah White was a notable and prominent man in the history of the town, holding many of its chief offices, and frequently serving on some committee. HANNAH² (10), b. in Wenham, probably bapt, there (the church records have been carried away). She is mentioned in her father's will as his youngest daughter, m. Jan. 23, 1663. Ensign John Divoll who lived in Lancaster, and was killed by the Indians, Feb. 10, 1675–6, while in charge of the Rowlandson garrison house, his wife was taken prisoner and their children, either taken prisoner or killed, at the same time.

Mrs. Divoll, was ransomed from the Indians, May 12, 1676, and m. (2) before 1679, Samuel Lummus of Ipswich as his second wife, she d. before July 2, 1717, as at that date.

William Divoll and James Keyes both of Lancaster and Samuel Lummus, Jr. of Ipswich divide land and town right in Lancaster, formerly belonging to John White, late of Lancaster, as a full settlement of the estate of their late mother.

In 1721, Joseph Dodge, "Innholder," of Boston and wife Martha sold to Faithful Bartlett, shoreman of Marblehead for £430 the homestead in Wenham, where he formerly lived. In 1718, Joseph Dodge of Wenham, bought land at Portsmouth, N. H., and in June, 1723, he, "Innholder of Boston," sold the same to G. Warner, distiller of Boston. At a Boston town meeting in March, 1728, he was chosen one of sixteen constables and excused from serving. In the history of Nottingham, in Rockingham County, N. H., Joseph Dodge appears as one of 118 proprietors to whom a grant of that town was made May 10, 1722. By deeds recorded at Exeter, N. H., it appears that Joseph Dodge of Scarboro, Co. of York, District of Maine, Jan. 1, 1738, for £400 sold to Samuel Milliken, his son-inlaw and Martha, his wife, daughter of Joseph Dodge, his home lot of ten acres and 480 acres in Nottingham. He was a prominent citizen in town, filled the principal town offices, represented the town in the General Court, rose to the rank of Colonel in the militia, and

was one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace. He took an active part in the early Indian wars and was in a severe action at Lancaster.

He kept a public house in Marlboro, in 1696; and as his bond shows the spirit of the times, we will give the material portions of it, hoping it may afford some profitable hints to those who keep public houses at the present day.

"He shall not suffer or have any playing at cards, dice, lally, bowls, ninepins, billiards, or any other unlawful game or games in his said house, or yard or garden or backside, nor shall suffer to remain in his house any person or persons not being his own family on Saturday night after dark or Sabbath days, or during the time of God's Public Worship; nor shall he entertain as lodgers in his house any strangers, men or women above the space of forty-eight hours but such whose names and surnames, he shall deliver to some one of the selectmen or constable of the town, unless they shall be such as he very well knoweth and will ensure for his or their forth coming—nor shall sell any wine to the Indians, or negroes, nor suffer any children, or servant, or other person to remain in his house tippling or drinking after nine o'clock in the night—nor shall buy or take to preserve any stolen goods nor knowingly or willingly harbor in his house, barn, stable, or otherwise, any rogues, vagabonds, thieves, sturdy beggars or offenders whatsoever — nor shall any person or persons whatsoever—sell or utter any wine, beer, ale, cider, rum, brandy or other liquors by defaulting or by color of his license—nor shall entertain any person or persons to whom he shall be prohibited by law, or by any one of the Magistrates of the County, as persons of jolly conversation or given to tippling."



Nathaniel Wilder, some time of sd Lancaster Deceased, for and in consideration of the Sum, of Forty pounds. Hereby acquit exonerate & forever discharge our loving brother vis. Cornet Nathaniel Wilder of Lancaster."

Capt. John White was a cooper and blacksmith by trade. He was with Capt. Lovell at the killing of the ten Indians.

"Instructions to Captains Willard, White and Blanchard.

Sr. Having Commissionated you to Command a Company of Voluntiers against the Indian Enemy, you are hereby Directed to Exer-

cise and maintain good Discipline and Government among your Officers and Soldiers and to Suppress and punish all Disorders, Vice, and Immorality and to Keep up the Worship of God in your said Company. You must march to Pigwacket, unless you shall upon mature Consideration Judge any other tour more effectual for the service, withall Convenient Dispatch Joining such Companys of Voluntiers in the County of Middlesex as shall be ready to proceed with you and from thence march to such places where by your Intelligence may Judge it probable to meet with the Indian Enemy. If you Judge it necessary to keep the whole Body together in order to attack any Tribe or Settlement of Indians I shall approve of your so doing, othwise that Two Companys or halfe your Body proceed East w & the other halfe to proceed from Pigwacket to Strike over to Amrescoggin & Kennebeck River, endeavouring to get higher up the said Rivers then the places of the Indians Settlements one party of which to Come down Amrescoggin River to Fort George & the other down Kennebeck River to Richmond, and if your provision should fall short so as that the whole cannot be sufficiently furnish d for the march to Amrescoggin & Kennebeck Rivers, some of vour Feeblest men must Come into Berwick. The remaining part of the Body to go off to the North Westward in Quest of the Indian Enemy said to be there taking with them the Mohawks for their Guides. Let your Marches be with all the Secrecy & Silence as well as Dispatch, you are Capable of. You must Kill, Take & Destroy to the utmost of 'your power all the Enemy Indians you can meet with in your March, & Search for their Corn, destroying all you can find. And give Intelligence from time to time of every thing of Importance that may happen."

"Lancaster, May 9th, 1725.

May it please your Honour.

Being returned home I thought myself oblidged to Inform your Honour that on the 5th of April last, I went from Lancaster to Dunstable and the 8th Day of April from thence up Merrimack with 30 men, two of which came back in A short time, one of them being taken sick, and y^e other having scalt himself very badly. I marcht up Merrimack about 130 mile, and there discovered some signs of Indians, some old, which we Judged were made sometime this winter and one new track on the Bank of the River, weh we Judged had gone but a few days before I sent out scouts but could discover nothing further.

We then turned off to ye Westward towards Coos, marched 10 miles the 24th of April. Att evening one of our men viz Sam II Mossman of Sudbury being about Encamping, took hold of his Gun that stood among some Bushes drew it towards him with the muzzle towards him some twigg caught hold of the cock, the Gun went off, and shott him through, he died Imediately. We went across to Connecticutt River came down that to Northfield and from thence across the woods to Lancaster, we gott in yesterday. I have endeavoured faithfully to attend your Honours orders already recieved, and if your Honour has any further service for me I desire your Honour would let me know it. I have not as yet compleated my Journal, but hope to finish it in a short time that it may be Laid before your Honour. I am your Honours most obedient humble Servant

"Sir, I have the Account of vr March & Return by your Letter of the 9th Instant & Approve of your Proceedings, tho I am heartily grieved for the Death of the poor Man, & wonder that so many unhappy Accidents of this Kind have not been sufficient to warn our People of the Effects of such Indiscretion. The Season being now advanced for the Appearance of the Enemy, and it being more likely to meet with them now than before, I desire you would go out with the Same Number of Men & upon the same Establishm^t which will be allowd vou; I should be glad you could immediately proceed, & make up a Muster Roll for your two Marches upon your Return. For mch Time will otherwise be lost at this critical Juncture. However if you must first come to Town let there be no Delay; If any of your men are backward to go out again you must enlist others to make up your number. I shall not prescribe any Rout to you, you being best able to judge where the Enemy may be mett with: Carry out as much Provision as you can, That so you maynt be obliged to return very soon: Be very silent & watchful on your March & Ambushments. I heartily wish you Success, and am your Serv 1. W^m Dummer.

"In an appendix to an Address delivered in Bolton at the Centennial Celebration, July 4, 1876, by Reverend Richard S. Edes, is printed part of a diary 'found among the papers of the first clerks of the town.' The copyist adds, 'How old the book is, no one can tell.' It is a journal of the scout of Captains Lovell and White 'when the 10 Indians were killed,' February, 1724; probably written by one of the Lancaster soldiers there present. The minutes of the first eight days have been torn off."

- "9. We traveled 14 miles and camped at the norwest corner of winipisocket pond.
- 10. We traveled 16 miles, and camped at the north side of Cusumpe pond.
- 11. We traveled 6 miles N by E from Cusumpe and there camped—and sent out scouts, and some of our scouts thought they discovered smoke.
 - 12. We sent out scouts, and they discovered nothing.
- 13. We lay still and sent out scouts, and to strengthen us to go farther we sent home 29 men.
- 14. We traveled 10 miles toward Pigwackett, and then came upon a branch of the Saco river, and sent out scouts.
 - 15. We lay still and sent out scouts and discovered nothing.
- 16. We traveled 6 miles and came upon an Indian wigwam—the Indians being gone we left 16 men with our packs and the rest pursued them till dark and stayed there all night.
- 17. We followed their track till eight o'clock next day and then we came back to fetch our packs, traveled the remaining part of that day and the night ensuing six miles.
- 18. We traveled 20 miles and camped at the great pond upon Sawco river.
 - 19. We traveled 22 miles and camped at a great pond.
- 20. We traveled 5 miles and came to a wigwam where the Indians had been lately gone from, and then we pursued their track about 2 miles further, and discovered their smoke and then tarried till about two o'clock at night and then came upon them and killed 10 Indians which was all there was.
 - 21. We traveled 6 miles.
- 22. We lay still and kept scouts upon our back tracks to see if there would any pursue.
 - 23. We traveled 30 miles and Camped at Cocheco.

A tru journall of my travells began the 5 th of April, 1725 We traueld to Groten 12 milds and thear stayed by reson of foul wether

- 6 day we traueld to dunstabel 12 milds and thear Lay the night
- 7 day we Lay stil by reson of foull wether
- 8 day we mustared and went ouer the riuer to the hous of John Taylors about 3 milds
- 9 day we marcht up the riuer about 8 milds and then campt one of our men being taken uerey sik for he kold trauel no ferther, his name was Thomas Simson, Our Doctor Joseph Whetcomb that night set his fut into a Ketel of biling broth that he cold trauel no ferther
- 10 day was foul wether and we sent 2 men in to dunstabel with the sik and Lam men and (they) returned that night to us again
- 11 day we traueled about 13 milds and then campt about 3 mild aboue amoskeeg falls.
- 12 day we traueled 11 milds and then campt at the mouth of penekoock riuer.
- 13 day we traueled 7 milds and then campt at the iarish fort in penekook Enteruals that day it rayend uery hard all day.
- 14 day we trauel^d 10 milds and then Crost meremack riuer aboue the mouth of Contookock riuer and then Campt.
- 15 day we trauel^d 8 milds north west from Contockock to a litel stream that runs into meremack Riuer about 3 milds westard from meremack and then campt and sent out skouts
- 16 day we traueld 12 milds and Cam to a pond which was usry Long and we turned to the east sid of it and then campt, and then sent out skouts that day we lay about 3 milds westard of the mouth of Winepiseocket
- 17 day it raynd uere hard the fore part of the day and a litel before night it cleared up & we sent skouts but found northen
- 18 day we traueled 14 milds and that day we Crost 2 great streames that runs in to meremack, one of them comes out of a great pond which sum indens says it is 3 days jurney round it the Land is usrey full of great hils and mountains and usrey rockey abundance of sprus and hemlock and fur and sum bech and maple and we campt
- 19 day we traueld 11 milds and then campt at the Louar End of pemichewashet Lour Enteruals and sent out skouts.
- 20 day we lay stil by reson of foull wether and towards nit it Cleard up and we sent out skouts and found whear Cornol Tyng crost meremack.

- 21 day we traueld 12 milds up pemichewashet Riuer and found old sines of indens and we sent out skouts that night and found one new track and we lay that night by the riuer and mad new camps. The Land that lys by this riuer is uere rich and good the upland uere full of hils and mountains, uery bad traueling
- 22 day we traueld 2 milds and then sent out skouts ouer the river and up a stream that runs into the river but found northen
- 23 day we traueld up the riuer about 14 milds and that day we Crost 3 streames that runs into the riuer this riuer coms sheafly from the north west & then we campt
- 24 day we traueld 10 milds westward and that day we found old signs of indens whear they had bin this spring and in the winter, and sent out skouts but cold find now indens. This day Samil Moosman actidently kild himself with his own gun
- 25 day it rained uery hard and we lay stil that day til amost night it cleard up and we sent out skouts but found northen
- 26 day we traueld 18 milds and came upon Conetecut riner and one of our men was taken uere sik that night we campt by the riuer
- 27 day we traueld down the riuer and found a bark cannow which was of great saruis to our sik man & to us; that day we traueld about 18 milds and then campt.
- 28 day we traueld 19 milds and then campt This Riuer runs cheafly upon a south westerly pint this day we crost seural litel streams that runs into Conetecut riuer.
 - 29 day we traueld 20 milds and then campt.
- 30 day we traueld 17 milds and crost one litel riuer below the great falls and then campt

May the first we traueld 24 milds and came to the fort above north field and thare lay all night

- 2 day we traueld 10 milds and came to northfield and there stayed that night

- 4 day we set out for Lancaster a cros the woods and traueld about 12 milds and then campt.

The Petition of Eunice White Relict widow of Capt. John White late of Lancaster deced. Humbly Sheweth. That Whereas your Pet rs. sd husband in his life time in the years 1724 & 1725 as well as at other times performed sundry marches ag t. the Indian Enemy and did other services for the good of his Country & was active and vigorous

in the Defence thereof against those barbarous Salvages, not only hazarding his life but Expending good part of his substance therein, as is well known to many. Some few Instances whereof your Petr. would humbly ripresent to this Honble Court. Yor. Petrs. sd. husband altho he had divers times had the honour to bear command yet voluntarily Enlisted himself under the late Capt. Lovewell, and choose rather to go as an Under Officer at that time because he would do what in him lay to Encourage others to Enlist and marched with him at the time when they killed the Ten Indians, in which march they were out near Forty days. Then he performed a march to a place called Cohosse on Connecticut River thinking to meet with the Enemy there and came in at Fort Dummer, being out thirty four days, tho they missed of their desired Success; Then in about Eight days time he had a Company raised and went to Pigwacket to bury Capt. Lovewell which he performed in a very difficult season of the year. Then he went to Connecticut at his own cost and charge to get a Company of Mohege Indians in order to go down to St. François to take an Indian fort there, but failing of his aim, he returned home and then enlisted a Company of Voluntiers and marched designing for a Fort beyond Pigwacket, but was taken sick before he got there, returned home and dyed leaving your Petr. his bereaved widow with seven Children the Eldest about Fifteen years old and Four of them very young, & one she then went with who is now living; In all which Services your Petit rs. said husband cheerfully underwent many hardships and difficulties for the good of his country, and was at considerable Cost and Charge, by Supplying those that Enlisted under him with necessaries which could not be readily obtained elsewhere, purely to make dispatch.

Now Forasmuch as the Sickness of which your Pet rs. husband dyed was in all probability Occasioned by means of y c difficulties he underwent in the Publick Service, & that he never in his life time had an Opportunity of asking your Hon rs. Favour for his past Services but was taken away in the Strength and vigour of his life, without receiving anything from the Publick more than 2 s 6 d p day for the three marches he performed as afores d and in regard your Pet r. is left a disconsolate widow with several Fatherless Children to bring up who stand in daily need of relief and Support, your Pet r. finding it very difficult to provide for them. She therefore most humbly Implores your Honrs, pity and Compassion to herself & Children, and that as you have been pleased in like cases to reward those that have served

the Province, and the Representatives of those that have lost their lives in the Publick Service. So that she may Experience of the Bounty & Goodness of this Hono ble Court to her in her difficult Circumstances, and that you will be pleased to Grant her Two hundred and Fifty acres of the unappropriated Lands of the Province that she may dispose of the same for the Education and bringing up her afores^d. Children or that your Hon rs. would otherwise relieve her as in your Great Goodness & Compassion you shall see meet. And as in duty bound your Petit r. shall ever pray &c.

Waldron's & Mr. Peter Coffins, among wch wear the sons of Mr. Rolenson & of the widow Divel: which 2 Captives your petisioner was sent to redeem by the widow Wells of Salsbury who was sister to Mr. Rolenson: & when your petison' came there the Ransom of Mr. Rolenson's son was pay d by the Gentlemen of the place, so yo' petioner had only to do with the other (to witt) the widow divels son: for whose Ransom yo' petione gave his bill of four pounds to Mr. Coffin & afterwards Mr. Rolenson moved the Counsell about it who wear pleased to undertake the paying of the sd four pound."

On the same date Thomas Dodge, cooper of Brookfield, bought of the same grantor for one hundred and six pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, "silver money," (the lawful paper money of that day was in bad credit,) fifty acres more or less with buildings. On the same date each of the above grantees gives a mortgage to their cousin Francis Dodge to secure him as bondsman for one hundred pounds each. In September 1763, Capt. John Dodge, gent. of Brookfield for fifty pounds six shillings mortgaged to John Friend, gent. of Wenham forty acres and a house. In 1757 he and his wife Ruth, sold forty acres more or less lying in Wenham with buildings thereon to George Dodge of Ipswich. In March 1767, John Dodge, gent. renews the mortgage of the same land for the larger amount of one hundred seventeen pounds fourteen shillings and his wife Ruth signs the mortgage. He seems to have been a bricklayer for some years, but later a farmer. Capt. Dodge died November 23, 1778, while on a visit to Topsfield. November 13, 1733, he bought of Ebenezer Kimball and wife Elizabeth a house, barn and about thirty-five acres — with one fourth of a saw mill and one fourth of a corn mill. The land, house and barn lying in Ipswich and Wenham he and wife Sarah deed to his brother John White, August 1, 1740.

December 5, 1741, he and wife Sarah and Joshua Prime of Rowley deed to Joshua Jewett of Rowley, three fourths of a cow right in Rowley, descended to our mother, Sarah Prime, of Rowley, dec'd, as part of her portion in estate of her father, Cap. Joseph Jewett.

March 16, 1759, he deeds to sons Thomas and Haffield White of Wenham twelve acres of pasture land in Wenham.

Josiah White made his will December 3, 1760, proved February 16, 1761, names son Josiah, daughter Sarah Hammond, Elizabeth, sons Thomas, Haffield and Josiah, residuary legatees. Brother-in-law Nathaniel Brown, executor. In his inventory taken 1761, I find one negro woman, Deb, valued at sixteen pounds and one negro boy, valued at twenty-six pounds.

End from this date with lawful interest.

They settled in the Northeasterly part of the New Grant soon incorporated as Leominster on the shore of Chauloom pond, now Whalom Lake. I am unable to obtain the dates of their deaths. They are said to have been buried with several of their daughters in a small burial place where some of the early settlers were interred, now obliterated, situated near the present schoolhouse in District No. 3, in the northeasterly part of Leominster.

The following is an extract from a letter written April 7, 1859, by Hon. David Wilder of North Leominster to Hon. Joseph White of Williamstown, Mass.

"Through your kindness I have received a copy of The Historical Discourse delivered by you at Charlemont, June 11, 1855, and for numerous reasons, I beg you to accept of my sincere thanks for it. Martha, one of the sisters of Col. Jonathan White, was the third wife of my grandfather David Wilder of Lancaster. She was many years a widow, and in the habit of making an annual visit to my father's family in the days of my youth. She used to speak of Peregrine White, as her Ancestor; and it was from her I derived what I considered good traditionary testimony in the case. But it must be confessed that the written record in vour possession (from Dea. James White's account book) looks more like the facts: and I have made an entry to that effect in a copy of the His. of I. which I keep by me for such purposes. Mary, the eldest sister, married Thomas Wilder of the fourth generation from the Thomas who moved to Lancaster in 1659. was one of the early settlers here and the grandfather of the Abel Wilder who represented the town of Charlemont in the General Court in 1809. —— P. S. Should you meet any of my relatives, Butlers, Carters or others, you may tell them that in twenty-nine days more, my years will be four-score; and yet I read and write, by day and night, without the use of spectacles."

I found later on the probate records at Worcester, Mass., No. 65750, Feb. 6, 1771, Mary Wilder petitions that her sons Thomas and Joseph be appointed administrators of the estate of her late husband Thomas Wilder of Leominster.



In the French and Indian war he commanded a military company and was actively engaged in defending the town from the attacks of the savages. March 29, 1755, he was commissioned captain in the Worcester regiment of Col. Ruggles, which marched for Crown Point. On the march northward Capt. White was promoted and made major, and before the end of the campaign was made lieutenant-colonel. Col. White, with regiment, was present at the battle of Lake George, September 8, 1755, when Baron de Dieskan was defeated and taken prisoner. Col. White was ordered with his regiment to Lake Champlain. He served to the end of the war, was in many battles and won a high reputation as a gallant and capable officer. He was one of the earlier proprietors of Charlemont, was at a meeting January 17, 1753, and was chosen one of the officers. He cleared up a few acres, planted an orchard and built a house in the south part of what is now Heath, and which is believed to be the house where his son, Dea. James, lived and died. March 4, 1771, the town of Charlemont voted to accept of the land Col. Jonathan White gave for a burying-place. After he returned from the war he lived most of the time in Leominster, but often passed from one town to the other. On one of these journeys he was detained over Sunday at Deerfield. He went to meeting in the morning, in his homespun frock, and, as he passed up the aisle no pew-door was opened to welcome him; so he went to the wood-pile and got a block of wood; this he laid on the floor near the pulpit, seated himself on it and listened attentively to the long sermon. At the noon recess the people made his acquaintance, and, finding that his station in life was not so humble as they had at first supposed, treated him with great respect.

When the afternoon service began many doors were thrown open to receive him but he disregarded all invitations and took his seat of the morning.


Josiah and Tabitha White of Rockingham, Vt., had an interest in the estate of Mr. Taylor of Shrewsbury, Mass., in 1794.

Apr. 10, 1781, bought of Asahel Stebbins of Northfield for £16 two house lots, one joining on East River.

Mr. White built in Rockingham a frame house, which is now standing as a corn barn near the brick house built by his son Phineas in 1813 and afterward occupied by Phineas' sons, Luke and William White.

In the old church at Rockingham built about 1773, we find the pew once occupied by Josiah White and on the deeds we find the following:

"Know all men by these present that I, Josiah White of Rockingham in the County of Windham and the state of Vermont, for and in consideration of the sum of thirty-three dollars and thirty-three cts. curent money of the United States to me in hand paid before the delivery hereof to Levi Sabin of Rockingham, in the County and State aforesaid. The receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge have given, granted, bargained & sold and by these present do give, grant, bargain, sell, release, convey and confirm unto him the said Levi Sabin, his heirs and assigns forever, the Northeast corner Pew of the body Pews so called on the East side of the broad alley of the Rockingham Meeting house.

To have and to hold said granted and bargained premises with all the appertainanceses and privileges thereto belonging to him the said Levi Sabin, his heirs and assigns to his and their proper use and benifit forever. I hereby coventing and ingaging for myself, my heirs, Executors and administrators that at and until the release and delivery hereof I am the true and lawfull owener of the premises and have good sight to bargain and sell the same in manner afforsaid and that I will warrant and defend the same from the lawful claim of all person claim-

ing the same whomsoever. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 16 day of August, Anno Domini, 1803.



In the spring of 1841 he learned the trade of making sewed shoes of Thomas Holder of Berlin, and after working about a year at that place he returned home, and later began work of bottoming sewed shoes, taking out work (as was the practice) from some of the manufacturers in the neighboring towns. He employed at one time eleven men in a small shop. In 1844 he increased his business and had four gangs of men at work in as many small shops, located in the same school district. At this time he began to do pegged work and took his work from the shop of J. B. Kimball & Co., of Westboro, some eight miles distant; this he continued until 1845. The winter of 1845-6 he attended a school in Boston. The following spring he again worked at shoemaking, had a shop built about a mile from the center, and getting stock from shops in Millbury and Natick, he employed a large force. In 1847, with that business enterprise and energy which always attended him throughout his life, he built a new shop. About this time he began to manufacture shoes for himself, and was the first to employ Canadian Frenchmen in the shoe shops in that vicinity, and with never tiring energy he was constantly striving to improve and increase his business facilities. In 1852 he met with his first serious misfortune, having his shop with all its contents destroyed by fire.

Nothing daunted he removed to New York city and again started in the manufacture of shoes, and soon increased his business to immense proportions, and during the years of the war was running large shops in the prisons of Sing Sing, N. Y., Trenton, N. J., and Providence, R. I., the penitentiaries at Albany and Brooklyn, N. Y., also a large shop at Worcester, Mass. He organized the Bay State Shoe & Leather Co., of New York city, of which he was President for many years.

He was a man of great executive business ability; as a manufacturer he had no superiors and but few equals. A few years before his death he retired from active business life and turned his business over to his son, Charles E. He spent much of his time in travel and recreation, and while temporarily sojouring in Richmond, Va., he d. May 19, 1883, aged 60 yrs. His widow is living with her children in Brooklyn, N. Y. Securing control of the Worcester & Shrewsbury railroad, and a large portion of the real estate at Lake Quinsigamond, he began at once the wise development of both, and has already accomplished wonders in the development of the most lovely section of our state. As president of the railroad he at once provided steel rails, newer and better engines and cars, built a pretty station at the lake, and with car houses

and gradings expended thousands of dollars, every one of which, in no uncertain sense, resulting in positive good to the entire city. At the lake he has created the charming village of Lake View, and he has made it possible for any thrifty young man to own a house for himself and dear ones. While busy with these important enterprises, he kept others of equal magnitude well in hand. The Bullard Rifle Company of Springfield, Mass., is indebted to him for its establishment. Electric Power Company has him for a strong arm to lean upon, and the list might be extended greatly in the simple enumeration of the various interests that claim his care and attention. As a business man he has the proud record of achieving whatever he undertakes, and of never tiring or giving up until the end is reached and his purpose accomplished. As a man, the name of H. H. Bigelow will ever be associated with unceasing efforts to help his fellows, and with a persistent and unflagging purpose to stand by the unfortunate. The right to free speech is sacred in his eyes, and to maintain it in the person of one who was unjustly oppressed, he did not hesitate a moment to spend freely thousands of dollars. No man is more generous to a vanquished opponent, revenge never enters into his battle against wrong; it is that right should prevail he struggles; that attained, he holds out both hands in warm friendship. With Hon. Edward L. David he has given the city of Worcester one hundred and ten acres for a Lake Park, and is a generous supporter of all good enterprises.

He consummated the largest real estate purchase ever made within the city proper. The vast tract of land formerly used for railroad purposes lying east of Main, between Mechanic and Foster streets, and covering one hundred and fifteen thousand square feet, he bought and has held inviolate for the purpose of erecting thereon the finest building devoted to business purposes, not alone in this county or state, but in New England. With the purchase of this land there came into his hands the large building known as a skating rink. At that time this form of amusement was but little enjoyed. By a wise policy of low prices, band concerts and various attractions offered from time to time, he was able to furnish pleasant amusement to thousands at a cost that whole families could afford to pay. On the 22d of March, Wallcut concluded he could not keep up with Dodge and Proctor, although Dodge carried his pack of 35 pounds at the rate of about three shillings per one hundred miles, or twelve shillings to Philadelphia, but as they parted, Wallcut paid only nine shillings. The condition of the colony for two or three years after 1791 was very serious, and the heroism of the settlers was something very memorable. Mrs. Susanna Dodge is considered to have been a remarkable woman; she ministered largely to the comfort and success of the pioneer colony. She was actively useful, having a genius for finding means to serve useful ends. She taught the children before the first teachers were employed, and yet with all her cares she found time to keep a diary of the events of that isolated colony, and of the long struggle with hostile Indians. She is said to have so won the good will of many of the red men by her kindness and diplomacy; that the few whom she reached and whom she made friends, were once the means of saving the whole settlement near Beverly, O., from massacre at the beginning of the Indian War in 1789. WILLIAM B. Dodge⁷ (2633), b. in Rowley, Mass., Sept. 27, 1783; was educated in Dummer Academy at Byfield, Mass., and became a very successful teacher. In 1804 he opened a successful private school in Salem, Mass. He m. Apr. 9, 1807, Sarah Dole of West Newbury, Mass., b. Dec. 8, 1781. On the establishment of the North school in Salem, in 1807, he was invited to take charge of it, which he accepted, serving as master for twenty-seven years. While connected with this school he introduced the studies of geography and grammar, then taught for the first time in the public schools of Salem. In the war of 1812 he was elected captain of a company to guard the coast of Salem and vicinity, and was given the commission of major before it closed. Early converted, he lived an active Christian life, ready in every good word and work, and entered heartily into all the reforms as they successively claimed his attention and support. From his hospitable home sailed the first missionaries for Palestine from Salem; and here many of the temperance and anti-slavery agents found a refuge in a later day, and from here started many an oppressed slave on the underground railway for a land of freedom. About the year 1820, before any religious society had thought of such a thing, he, at the suggestion of a neighbor, opened the first Sunday School in Salem, in the North schoolhouse. The first reason of its existence was to stop Sunday walking among the young people, and a general lack of Sunday observance. The school was crowded and continued many years, though only as a summer school.

In 1827 he was appointed chaplain of the Salem almshouse, and thenceforward prepared and conducted two religious services in that institution every Sabbath, in addition to his usual labors. In 1842, he gave up all other employment to work as an anti-slavery agent, principally among the churches of Massachusetts. From his entrance into Salem, the condition of the colored people had excited his pity, and by sympathy, counsel and religious instruction, he had sought to comfort, encourage and elevate them. He gained their confidence and love, and when, in 1834, the colored school was opened, he resigned his position as principal of the North school, to accept a like position in it, which, considering his intense anti-slavery principles, was eminently proper, and his great success justified the change. In 1844, at the age of 61, he went to Milburn, Ill., and settled among his children, who had purchased property there.

It was a settlement of various nationalities and diverse religious views. A little band of Christians had organized themselves into a

Congregational church, having meetings as circumstances favored. Mr. Dodge was soon invited to preach for them. Proposing to spend the rest of his life in the ministry of the gospel, he asked and received ordination of the Fox River Association. In this church he labored till old age compelled him to resign in 1862. His life was one of loving service to his fellow-men, and at a ripe old age he died, sincerely mourned by the whole community. His time was employed more in work than study in his youth, although all his opportunities both day and evening were improved. In the winter of 1845-6 he attended the academy at Durham, N. H. In 1846 he entered Norwich University in Vermont and graduated in 1850. In 1851 he took his diploma from Capt. Partridge's military school in Norwich, and went immediately to Peru, Ill., where for a few months he was engaged in city and land surveys. He was employed in making the surveys for different railroads until 1854, when he moved to Council Bluffs, Iowa, and engaged in mercantile pursuits and freighting upon the plains, sending the first train through to Denver. In Council Bluffs he established the banking house of Baldwin & Dodge, later merged in the Pacific National Bank, of which he became president. After moving to Council Bluffs, he made a claim on the Elkhorn river in Nebraska and occupied it in February, 1855, but stayed there only six months, the Indians obliging him to return with his family to Council Bluffs. In 1856 he organized the Council Bluffs Guards and was elected captain, and at the breaking out of the war, tendered its services to the governor of Iowa, but the offer was declined because the governor deemed it best not to draw any troops from the western border of Iowa, but accepted his individual services and sent him to Washington to arrange for arming and equipping the State troops. In this mission he was remarkably successful. He was tendered a captain's commission in the regular army, which he declined, and was recommended in June, 1861, by Simon Cameron, secretary of war to Governor Kirkwood, for appointment as colonel of the Fourth Iowa Volunteers. At the celebrated battle of Pea Ridge, March 6, 7, and 8, 1862, three horses were killed and a fourth wounded under him, and he was seriously wounded. For his gallantry he was immediately made a brigadier-general upon the recommendation of Major-General Halleck.

After the fall of Vicksburg in July, 1863, "for gallant and meritorious services and for extreme fitness for command, corresponding to the increased rank," General Grant recommended him for promotion to

major-general of volunteers, and it was approved by H. W. Halleck, general-in-chief. Aug. 17, 1863, he was sent north on sick leave for sixty days. A history of his service for his country cannot be given here, but is found in her war records and can be read by all with great interest, also a more extended account of his labors may be found in the genealogy of the Dodge family of Essex county, Massachusetts, by Joseph Thompson Dodge, to which I am indebted for this brief sketch. At the close of the war he was serving as chief of ordnance of tenth army corps, upon the staff of Gen. A. H. Terry, having participated in more than fifty battles and skirmishes.

He was discharged Aug. 2, 1865, and re-entered the office of the Manchester Mirror as local reporter. In the spring of 1866, he removed to Colorado; after three months at mining, he began as compositor on the Golden Transcript, and later on the Denver Tribune, of which he soon became local and then managing editor, and part proprietor. He m. in 1870, Anna M. Koons of Denver. In 1871, he sold his interest in the Tribune, and purchased the Denver Daily Times, a small paper, which he carried forward with marked success. He has given much attention to the public schools, and has been prominent in connection with the Masonic fraternity. W. Pitkin, and is a regent of the State University by popular election.

DANIEL Dodge⁷ (3194), b. near Annapolis, N. S., Dec. 1, 1775. His father removed from Nova Scotia to Machias, Me., in 1776. mother was a very pious member of the Episcopal church, but soon embraced the Baptist faith. The son at eighteen was converted and united with the Baptist church of Woodstock, Vt., and soon felt called to preach the gospel. About this time he sailed for the West Indies, was taken by the French, stripped of all he had, and in a state of destitution he found his way to Baltimore, where he m. Jan. 15, 1799, Ruth A. Ragan, who d. Sept. 11, 1830, leaving no children. warmly received by Christian friends, he was induced to accept a license to preach from the First Baptist church, Rev. Mr. Richards, pastor; was ordained in 1801 in Maryland. At the commencement of his ministry he traveled much on horseback, success attending his labors. After a year or two spent in this manner he became pastor of the First Baptist church in Wilmington, Del. During the ten or twelve years at Wilmington, he enjoyed a remarkable revival of religion, extending through the place. He baptized 259 persons there. He next spent fourteen years at Piscataway, N. J., 1818 to 1832, with success. Urged by friends and a sense of duty, he went to Newark, N. J., in 1832, to heal the divided state of the church there. In six years of his ministry there he was very successful, but his success was the cause of his being called to the Second Baptist church, Philadelphia. He m. (2) Feb., 1831, Letitia Mankin, who d. Sept., 1876, in her 86th year in Belmont, Md. He completed a ministry of about fifty years, and d. May, 1851, beloved by all who knew him. Mr. Dodge was accustomed to read his Bible daily on his knees, and his whole life and conversation corresponded with that daily act. In the estimation of the writer, there existed nowhere a more perfect model of the Christian minister. In his will, July 16, 1849, he gave certain books to Gilead Dodge of Washington, Erie County, Pa., and all other property to his wife, Letitia Dodge. Child:

My brothers and sisters are scattered. Two brothers and two sisters live in Harpersfield, Ashtabula Co. I was out to see them last week. Two brothers and two sisters have gone to Pleasant, Van Wart Co., in western part of this state. The other two I know not where, as I have not seen some of them for six years. They are all married and some have large families.

"Religion, as it is called in these days, has been quite flourishing in this section for a few months past.

"The Campbellites, the Methodists and Baptists have increased in number if not in graces. I have baptized 17 in our church the year past, and five in the Mount Union church. The Salem church have bapt. 72.

"I am in low circumstances (as to money). I have been talking of coming to see you and I think I shall before long, as droveyours are going from here to your city every season. I shall try to obtain a chance to come with them.

"I expect a Brother Wilson from the church in Mt. Union, where I preach half the time; will call to see you before long.

"I am fully a Baptist of the old stamp. The Lord willing, I expect to live and die a Baptist, although unworthy the name. You will excuse my poor writing and worse spelling, as I have never enjoyed but three months schooling in my life. Yours in the hope of heaven and in the bonds of the Gospel.

JOHN A. Williams, A. M., LL. D.⁹ (3360), b. in Bourbon county, Ky., Sept. 25, 1824; m. 1848, Mary L., dau. of Philip Hathaway of Montgomery county, Ky., a representative of one of the early pioneer families of Virginia. The Williams family is of Welsh extraction, and, according to family tradition, descendants of Roger Williams of Providence, Rhode Island.

"Prof. Williams passed the opening years of his life at Paris, Bourbon county, where his earliest instruction was received, and at the age of fifteen entered Bacon College, then located at Georgetown, as a student. While in attendance at this institution it was removed to Harrodsburg, and subsequently became known as the Kentucky University, from which our subject graduated in 1843, under the presidency of Dr. James Shannon. He subsequently received the degree of A. M. from his Alma Mater, and later that of LL. D. from the Masonic University of La Grange, Ky. After leaving college he entered on the study of law with a view of adopting that profession, but was prevented from accomplishing that purpose by the development of a very decided taste for teaching and the discovery of serious needs in the educational system of the state. In 1848 he took charge of what was called Prospect Hill Seminary, a boarding school for young ladies and gentlemen near Mt. Sterling, an institution which became very prosperous under his management, and in which he obtained considerable distinction for his original methods and superior talents as a teacher. He soon after established a female college at North Middletown, in Bourbon county, known as the Bourbon Institute, in which he aimed to carry into full effect his advanced plans of education. In 1851 he was urged to and did establish his institution at Columbia, Missouri, the seat of the Missouri University. A liberal charter was granted by the state, and under the designation of Christian College it was formally organized in the spring of that year. His conduct of the school brought it into popular notice and universal popularity, filling it to overflowing with young ladies of the best families in the state. He presided over that institution until 1856, when ill health and a desire to return and labor in his native state induced him to resign. In that year he purchased, in connection with his father, the property at Harrodsburg, upon which is situated the celebrated Greenville Magnesian Springs, and established the Daughters College, which became one of the most successful institutions of its kind in the state. In 1865 President Williams was appointed to the chair of moral and mental philosophy in the Kentucky University, and afterwards to the presidency of the State College, and then to that of the College of Arts at Lexington. The State College was organized at Lexington in 1866, largely through the instrumentality of President Williams. The two former positions he accepted and filled, but declined the latter. In 1868 Prof. Williams resigned his position in the University at Lexington, and returned to his beloved pupils at Harrodsburg. Soon its halls were filled. He was one of the original movers in the organization of the State Teachers' Association, has contributed extensively to various literary and religious periodicals, and delivered many addresses. His life of Elder John Smith is a well known and standard volume. His most important work, however, will be the one on Christian Ethics, now in course of preparation. He has also occasionally been induced to occupy the pulpits of various churches, both in and out of his own denomination.

"He is a Mason of high degree, and of national reputation as a pleasant and orthodox expounder of the principles of the order. While resting from his arduous professional labors he was induced to accept the Grand Lectureship for the State of Kentucky, which position he filled for two years with much profit to the craft. He is a man of fine tastes, has a great fondness for poetry, literature and art; of genial and attractive presence, kindly nature and greatly esteemed and respected by his associates and pupils, as well as by the community at large."—From the Kentucky Craftsman.

VISIT TO A CENTENARIAN.—The 104th birthday of Mrs. Anah Goss of this place occurred today, but your correspondent knowing her great regard for the strictest observance of the Sabbath, paid her a birthday visit on Saturday afternoon. We found her sitting quietly by the fire in an easy chair, which she politely offered to vacate for us; her appearance being that of a "smart old lady of seventy," cheerful and happy. In conversation with her we found that her memory was good pertaining to events that transpired in her childhood and early womanhood, but failed to recall matters of recent date. In alluding to the snow storm, which at that time seemed undecided whether to yield to the sun or to continue in the mild way which had given us but three inches in twenty hours, she remarked that these storms were "not much like old-fashioned snow storms." She remembered one, some eighty-five years ago, "when her husband found the snow one morning above the top of the door, and nearly to the eaves of the house, and was obliged to tunnel through to the street." As an instance of her earliest recollections, she narrated very feelingly the circumstances of the death of her little brother, Stephen, ninety-eight years ago, she then being six years old and he some two years vounger. She remarked that "the dear little fellow would refuse to take his medicine except sister Anah brought it to him." She also remembered the circumstance of the death of her father, which occurred away from home, of small-pox, when she was quite young. He desired to go home, and a horse was brought to him and he mounted it, but was too weak to ride. She also remembers the collection of soldiers in 1775, as that year they marched so near her house with fife and drum.

Some days ago she called her daughter, Mrs. Wilcox, who lives with her and makes her every care and want her study, and said to her: "Now, Elizabeth, you know that my birthday this year comes on the Lord's day, and as His days are so much better than any of my days, I want you to write to our friends not to visit us on the Sabbath, but to come Saturday." Her daughter of course complied, quoting her mother's remarks, and the usual visit from friends upon the anniversary of her birth will occur probably to-morrow, the storm of Saturday

preventing it then, among whom are ex-Mayor P. C. Cheney and wife of Manchester, Mrs. Cheney being a granddaughter of this venerable woman.

The health of Mrs. Goss seems good, generally speaking, but she is growing constantly weaker and more inclined to sleep, while her mind has failed considerably the past year. She reads the newspapers some, preferring those with large type, though we noticed upon her table the Weekly Journal. She does not approve of female suffrage, and says she should not consider herself *old enough to vote* if she was allowed so to do.—From the *Boston Journal*.

The Amherst Cabinet says: "The 105th birthday of Mrs. Anah Goss of this town, now the oldest person in the state, was made the occasion of a family re-union on Monday, 1st. There were present, Mr. and Mrs. White, the latter a daughter of Mrs. Goss, aged 79 years; Mrs. Wilcox, a daughter who lives with Mrs. Goss; Hon. Person C. Cheney and wife of Manchester, the latter a granddaughter; Josiah Laselle, Esq., and wife of Manchester, Mrs. Laselle being a granddaughter; and Miss Elizabeth Whitney of Boston, also a granddaughter. Mrs. Goss, although gradually failing in mind and body, was able to be about the house and enjoy the visit of her friends. She sat at the table, saying grace, as is her usual custom. Her eyesight has failed considerably within the last year, so that she now reads nothing but her Bible, and occasionally the large type in the advertising columns of the papers."

"Death of a Centenarian.—Mrs. Anah Goss, the oldest person in the state, died at Amherst, N. H., on Saturday morning, March 20, at the venerable age of one hundred and five years, one month and nineteen days. Her decease was neither sudden nor unexpected. Some three or four weeks since she took a cold which affected her lungs considerably, but it was hoped that she might recover from it, though it so prostrated her that she could not rally.

"Mrs. Goss was the daughter of Stephen Bathrick of Lunenburg, Mass., where she was born Feb. 1, 1770. She came to Amherst in 1785, then being fifteen years of age, and one year later married Ephraim Goss, a soldier returned from the war, with whom she lived fifty-four years, till his decease in 1840, and by whom she had ten children, seven daughters and three sons, two daughters being still alive—Mrs. White, of Manchester, now being in her eightieth year, and Mrs. Wilcox, who has made her home with her mother, ministering to her

wants in her declining years. Three granddaughters survive her—one the estimable wife of Hon. P. C. Cheney of Manchester, who for years has left nothing undone that would contribute to the comfort or pleasure of the deceased; Mrs. Josiah Laselle of Manchester and Miss Elizabeth Whitney of Boston.

"The deceased retained her faculties in a remarkable degree until within a year or two, since which time her memory failed her, and also her eyesight, preventing her reading anything except her Bible, which she always made a daily study. She was for over four score years a member of the Congregational church in this town, and gave all her children to the Lord by baptism in their infancy. She was among the last Revolutionary pensioners in the country, her husband having been a fifer in that war."

In 1853 he became a member of the firm of Cheney, Hadley & Going.

Mr. Cheney early became interested in politics, and represented the town of Peterboro in the legislature in 1853 and 1854. He entered ardently into the events of 1860 and 1861, and zealously aided and promoted the preparation of his state for the great struggle to maintain

the Union. In due time he offered his personal services, and in August, 1862, he was appointed quartermaster of the 13th regiment, New Hampshire Volunteers, Col. A. F. Stevens. In January, 1863, he was seriously ill, and after three months' sickness was compelled to resign, but he sent a substitute to the service. He was railroad commissioner for three years. In 1866 he removed to Manchester, N. H., and became a dealer in paper stock and manufacturers' supplies. He also engaged in paper manufacture at Goffstown, N. H., in the firm of Cheney & Thorpe. He is now at the head of the P. C. Cheney Company.

Shortly after coming to Manchester he became prominent in the Republican party and was elected mayor in 1871, one of the marked features of his successful administration being the introduction of the fire alarm telegraph system. He declined a renomination, but was chosen governor in 1875 and 1876, wresting the state from the Democratic party. In 1872 he was elected a trustee of Bates College, and founded a scholarship in that institution. At the close of his gubernatorial service, Dartmouth College conferred upon him the degree of A. M. In Dec., 1892, he was appointed envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to Switzerland, at which post he remained until June 29, 1893. He was one of the directors of the Peterboro Bank, and has been president of the Peoples Savings Bank of Manchester since its organization in 1874. Child:

He married at West Plattsburg, Jan. 13, 1830, Ann Eliza Beckwith. To the Honourable Artemus Ward, Esquire, Greeting: We, reposing especial trust and confidence in your courage and good conduct, do by these presents constitute and appoint you, the said Artemus Ward, to be General and Commander-in-Chief of all the forces raised by the Congress aforesaid, for the defense of this and the other American colonies.

"You are therefore carefully and diligently to discharge the duty of a General in lading, ordering, and exercising the Forces in Arms, both inferior officers and soldiers, and to keep them in good order and discipline, and they are hereby commanded to obey you as their General. And you are yourself to observe and follow such orders and instructions as you shall, from time to time receive from this or any future Congress or House of Representatives of this Colony, or the Committee of Safety, so far as said Committee is empowered by their commission to order and instruct you for the defense of this and the other Colonies, and to demean yourself according to the military rules and discipline established by said Congress in pursuance of the trust reposed in you.

"The Honourable Artemus Ward, Esquire, took the oath appointed by the Congress of the Colony of the Massachusetts Bay to be taken by the General Officer and subscribed the same before me,

SAMUEL DEXTER, Justice of the Peace."

This commission did not authorize him to command the forces raised in the other Colonies, of which a considerable number arrived at Cambridge previous to the battle of Bunker Hill. A Continental

Congress assembled at Philadelphia in September, 1774, and on the 15th of June, 1775, made choice, unanimously, of George Washington, to command all the Continental Forces raised for the defense of American liberty; and on the 17th Artemus Ward, Esquire, was chosen first Major General. It is a fine part of the world to live in, it won't take you all the time get wood & feed your cattle, there is land enough to be had on good terms, if you will come, I will find you land to tend as long as you please to tend it. I will find you plenty to eat for one year. wife says come, the children say come & God saith come out from among them, you can make cotton a plenty, flax groweth well, sheeps wool is cheap; a fine place for peaches and apples; all kinds of garden truck groweth well, this part of the world is not more sickly than where you live. It is believed if any come to the southard, they will die. The reason is because, when they come they say the water is so bad for fear the water should make them sick they take so much ardent spirit that it kills some that & other dissipations, any person that believes in God, dare not say that he will punish anybody for going to any part of the world to get a comfortable living. I want you to write as soon as you get this & say you will come this fall. If you come by water to Savannah I will find some way to get you up the country, but if you don't like to come by water get you a little wagon one or two horses, you can come in six or seven weeks. Start the first of September, it will be a fine time for man & horses, take your bed and cloth, a small pot, a teakettle & coffee pot. Your wagon will sell for more here than it cost there, so you will get the loan of it for naught. If that part was as much better to live in as this is better than that I would take my bundle on my back & walk there. As I can't be with you, God be with you is the prayer of your brother,

They lived for a time in Wenham, but removed to Danvers, Mass., before 1787. He is therefore quoted in history as a native of Danvers. From the "Lexington Alarms, vol. 13, p. 38," I find Haffield White with rank of private on the Lexington Alarm roll of Capt. Billy Porter's company and Col. John Baker's regiment, which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, from Wenham, to which town the soldier belonged. In eight months service, "vol. 18, page 87," I find Haffield White with rank of second lieutenant on muster roll of Capt. Ebenezer Francis' company and Col. Mansfield's regiment, dated Aug. 1, 1775. Time of enlistment, April 26, 1775; time of service, three months and thirteen days. Belonged in Wenham. "Worcester Roll, vol. 50, file 1," Haffield White appears with rank of captain on muster roll of the field and staff officers of the 5th Massachusetts regiment, Col. Rufus Putnam, for January, 1781, garrison at West Point, appointed January 1, 1777, reported furloughed to April 1, 1781. The above is found on the Massachusetts Archives, in the State House, in Boston, with many other references to Maj. White, and in Hildreth's "Lives of the Early Settlers of Ohio," 1852, we find the following:—

"Maj. Haffield White, native of Danvers, Mass., (Wenham). A lieutenant in company of minute men, April 19, 1775, followed the retreating Britons from Concord, and fired on them from behind stone walls, lost, 8 killed from his company. Soon afterwards commissioned captain, raised a company of men and was a most efficient officer at the crossing of the Delaware, and at the battle of Trenton. Many of

his men being sailors and being useful in manning the boats to cross the army. He was with Gen. St. Clair at Ticonderoga and under Col. Francis fought manfully at battle of Hubbardstown, thereby checking the British troops and enabling the Americans to reach Stillwater and form the nucleus of that army which soon afterward conquered Burgoyne, and turned the tide of conquest. He was engaged in many of the battles preceding this overthrow, and shared in the glories and triumphs of Saratoga, Oct. 13, 1777. At the retreat from Ticonderoga he was pay-master of the regiment and in that disaster lost a large sum of money, which was not allowed by the United States.

"When Col. Pickering took charge of the commissary department of the army, being acquainted with the integrity and activity of Capt. White, living in the same town, he was selected for one of his assistants, and remained in that branch of the service until the close of the war, when he was made major."

We find Haffield White's name as one of the original members of the Society of the Cincinnati, on page 510 and page 540, in the "Memorial of the Massachusetts Society of the Cincinnati."

"At the formation of the Ohio company he became one of the proprietors, and was appointed by the directors, commissary and conductor of first detachment of pioneers which left Danvers in December, 1787.

"On their arrival at Marietta he was continued as their steward for the first year, when that office was no longer needed. His son Pelatiah was one of the 48 who landed from the 'Mayflower' at Marietta on April 7, 1788. In 1789 he engaged with Col. Oliver and Capt. Dodge (2614) in erecting mills on Wolf Creek. When war with the Indians began, he left and came to Marietta and remained until after the peace of 1795. He then resumed his possessions, a farm near the mills, now Waterford, and lived with his son until his death.

"In person Maj. White was below medium size, thick set and robust. Very active and brisk in his motions, prompt to execute business in most expeditious manner. Complexion florid, and sanguine temperament. A brave soldier, and a very useful and industrious citizen."

From "Pioneer History," by S. P. Hildreth, 1848.

"A party consisting of 22 men, under command of Capt. White, assembled at Danvers, Mass., in December, 1787. They included boat builders and mechanics. Toward last of January, 1788, Major White and party reached his destination on the Yohiogany River at

Sumrills Ferry, about 30 miles above Pittsburgh. The surveyor and remainder of the pioneers assembled at Hartford, Conn., early in January, 1788, and commenced their march under command of Gen. Putnam, aided by Col. Ebenezer Sprout. They arrived at Sumrills Ferry in the middle of February, and on account of the uncommon severity of the weather little progress had been made in building the boats. By April 2d the large boat was ready and the company left in the afternoon of that day. The 'Adventure Galley,' as she was called, was afterwards named the 'Mayflower.' She was 45 feet long and 12 feet wide, estimated burthen 50 tons. A flat boat and three canoes were added to the flotilla. Landed at Marietta, 7th April, 1788."

From the family of Major White I receive the following: -

Major Haffield White and his sons, Pelatiah and Josiah White, are among the 48 names inscribed on the granite monument which is located on the spot where it is supposed they landed at Marietta. Major Haffield White is buried at Bell Pre, which is about fifteen miles from Marietta. He once commanded the outposts there, and he, in his old age, lived on the farm near there, with his son Pelatiah, where he died Dec. 13, 1818. Children:

H.), the charter for which town was granted in 1727, to about one hundred persons, among the names of these grantees we find the name of Charles Stuart, Steward, or Stewart, and afterward where he drew land in the first division, lot No. 29, and in the 4th

division, lot No. 72, 11th range. And again, where he was chosen one of a committee to run out, or make division of land.

It does not appear that Charles Stewart ever settled in Chichester, though he might have left land there, which may have been the cause of his granddaughters, Mary (Stewart) White and Mehitable (Stewart) Green, settling in Pittsfield.

H., going through the woods by marked trees, with no other conveyance than an ox-sled and a pillion for his wife and five children. He took up his abode in the outskirts of an unbroken forest. Years of hard labor followed, which at length brought to him and his family the comfort of a rural home. He built the first mill in Pittsfield, and the place where it stood is now

H., Aug. 14, 1775. She was stepdaughter of Rev. Christopher Page, pastor of the first Congregational church, organized in Pittsfield, Nov. 17, 1789. Mr. White's father and mother, Josiah and Mary White, were among the original members, coming from the church in Hampton Falls, N. H. There were ten members who covenanted together at that time; their names stand today upon the beautiful tablet upon the walls of the present church. They appear deeply cut in enduring marble, the generous and filial gift of Hon. J. Wilson White of Nashua, a native of Pittsfield, and grandson of Josiah White, Sr. Josian White, Jr., was the first one in Pittsfield to take work and employ others in the making of shoes. Taking his work from Epping he employed his neighbors, who wished to do something else in connection with farming. As their pay came due, Mr. White would advante the money, expecting to receive it again from his employer, when he suddenly left the country, and Mr. White was obliged to mortgage his farm in order to pay his help, which, with his large family, kept him for many years in hard circumstances; but, though in humble life, he was ever an honorable, industrious and strictly temperate man, and very active even in his old age, working his tax upon the highway when eighty-four years old. Mrs. White was a descendant upon the paternal side of Robert Fletcher, who settled at Concord, Mass., in 1630, through his son William,2 who married Oct. 7, 1645, Lydia Bates of Concord, Mass., and in 1653 settled in Chelmsford, Mass. In the fall of 1813, the spotted fever appeared in Pittsfield, and Mr. White's family were very much afflicted by it, and the following was printed in a little book at that time:

"A faithful narrative of the sayings, or dying words of Eliza White, daughter of Mr. Jeremiah White of Pittsfield, aged six years, nine months and nineteen days, who departed this life April 20th, 1814, after an illness of three days of the spotted fever.

"The day before she died, she appeared to lie in a state of insensibility for some time, and it was thought by the bystanders that she never would speak again. At length, being aroused from that state, like one awakened from sleep, she called her friends, and addressed them severally in the following words:

"She asked Betsey Gerrish, who was standing by the bed, 'if she was willing to die.' To her brother Samuel, she addressed herself thus: 'You must die and I hope you will go to Jesus.' Taking him by the right hand, she said, 'I hope I shall meet you at the right hand of Jesus;' and told him 'not to mourn for her, for she should be better off than to be here.'

"To her Sir, she said: 'Do not mourn for me, mourn for yourself. I hope I shall meet you in Heaven;' and asked him 'if he felt willing to die,' and said, 'Sir, don't live wickedly;' and said 'she could, after her death, bear to have the nails driven upon her that is in her coffin.' To her mother, she said, taking her by the hand, 'Can you forgive me?

O ma'am, how I love you! Do not mourn for me, you have mourned enough for the others,' and would not let go her hand till her ma'am had promised she would not mourn more than she could help.

"To her aunt Molly: 'Do not mourn for me;' and asked her 'if she felt willing to die,' and said 'I trust I shall go to heaven. Death feels good to me when I think of it.'

"To her uncle William: 'Uncle, I am going to leave you. Your children have to die, and it will be but a little while before they will go. You must be willing to part with them. You and Sir must live in love, and have no hard thoughts of each other.'

"To her aunt Mary White: 'Do you feel willing to die?' Her aunt asked her if she felt willing to die. She answered, 'If it is God's will, I should be willing to die, and go through the hardest death, and do not care what I undergo here, if I could die and go home to glory.'

"She said to Mrs. Drake, 'I hope we shall go to Heaven together. I hope we shall all meet in Heaven. Death appears good to me.' To Joseph Gilman, she said: 'Are you prepared to die? Do not mourn for me, but mourn for yourself. I hope I shall meet you in Heaven.'

"To her uncle Josiah White: 'Do not mourn for me. I believe I am going home to glory, and hope I shall meet you in Heaven.'

"To her cousin Polly White, she said, 'Do not mourn for me, but mourn for yourself, for I am going home to glory, to that glorious Jesus, and I hope I shall meet you in Heaven.' To some others she addressed herself much after the same manner.

"She was asked if she would take some wine. She said 'she was going where there was wine enough,' and said 'she would drink with them now. Pray for me; I hope your prayers will be answered.' And said, 'We have all got to turn to dust, and all come on earth again at the great day of judgment.' To her Sir she said, 'I am going to dust, and it will be but a few moments before my eyes will be closed in death, and I shall go to that glorious Jesus, and I hope you will come where I am going.'

"When she was speaking, she several times held up her hands and said, 'Glory! glory! O, that glorious, happy place! Don't you want to go to that happy place?'

"We have given the above expressions in the child's own language, as she spoke them."

His opportunities for education during childhood were limited to a few months at a distant district school. At the age of fourteen he entered the Pittsfield Academy under the instruction of James F. Joy, a graduate of Dartmouth, remaining at the academy two and a half years. He, then in his seventeenth year, decided to prepare himself for mercantile and active business life. He went to Boston and entered into an apprenticeship in a drug store. Added to his other duties he began the study of medicine in all its branches, and continued it for several years after until he was qualified for, and if occasion had required, could have entered upon professional service. Finishing his engagement at Boston, he engaged as clerk to Luther Angier, postmaster and druggist at Medford, Mass., with the agreement that with proper notice, he could leave to engage in business for himself. Early in the summer of 1845, Mr. White believed that that time had arrived. He had never visited Nashua, N. H., but had heard of its reputation as a growing

manufacturing town. A few hours inspection settled the question, and before leaving, he hired the store which he afterwards occupied for nearly thirty years, as an apothecary. He was never idle. No man was more thorough and painstaking in the discharge of obligations to his customers. In many of the business enterprises of Nashua, Mr. White took an active and in some of them a prominent part, engaging in the transportation and sale of coal on his arrival; he has always been the leading dealer in the trade. After the close of the war he originated the project of and gave his attention to the construction of the large blocks of stores on Main street, known as the "Merchants Exchange," retaining for himself and son, the corner store. Early in 1875 he conceived the idea of establishing a new National bank, and in the April following obtained a charter. The people of Nashua and vicinity, believing in his financial ability, immediately subscribed for the stock and elected him president, a position he continued to hold until within a year of his death, when failing health compelled him to resign. At the same time he resigned for the same reason the treasurership of the Mechanics' Saving bank. From 1876 to 1891 he was prominently connected with the affairs of the Nashua & Lowell railroad as a director and treasurer. For many years this road had been connected and used by the Boston & Lowell railroad corporation and as Mr. White clearly saw on terms greatly to the disadvantage of the stockholders of the Nashua & Lowell company, he undertook to bring up the value of the stock. How well his measures succeeded was realized not only by every stockholder, but in all railroad circles throughout New England. In a word he was essentially a business man in the full sense of the term. In 1846 Mr. White was united in marriage with Caroline Graham, dau. of Caleb and Nancy (Underhill) Merrill, b. at Pittsfield, May 13, 1822. Mrs. White d. very suddenly of apolexy in 1880. HENRY W. Rowlandson⁸ (4857), b. in New York, Aug. 7, 1833. He left home at the age of twenty, and under an assumed name enlisted as a marine on board the United States steamship Vandalia, commanded by John Pope, and was only known by his assumed name, Charles F. Ellmore, up to the end of his life, while in public service and among his associates. During these eleven years' adventures and cruises he kept a full and interesting account of the same, beautifully written in his own handsome penmanship, and embellished them with maps and pictures, hand drawn and painted of what he saw

during these voyages. These books are in the possession of Rev. E. H. Rowlandson and much prized as a sort of family memento. He has kindly furnished me with the following extracts from Henry's diary:

"March 5, 1853, the steamer left the Port of Philadelphia for China touching at some 23 foreign ports on the voyage. 2nd day of August they were joined by the U.S. steamers Susquehanna, under the command of Commodore M. G. Perry who had already been to Japan to form a treaty with that secluded nation and had delivered a letter from the President of the United States to the Emperor of Japan and were to go for the answer to said letter in six months. February 13, 1854 the squadron—which the Vandalia joined sail'd to Japan for the answer to the President of the U.S. letter-all rendevoused at the Bay of Yeddo. The squadron consisted of U.S. steamers Susquehanna, Lexington, Powhattan, Vandalia, Mississippi, Macedonian. March 8, 1854—A great and imposing landing was made of officers, Marines and Sailors at Yokohama to settle all matters in question, and add to the pomp and importance of the occasion by a grand display of our forces. On the 31st the whole business was satisfactorily settled that opened this long exclusive nation to the friendship and commerce of the world. After many exciting adventures in the China seas, such as breaking up Nests of Pirates in surrounding Islands-protecting some parts of the Chinese nation from the inroads and Massacres of their own people—visiting the ports along the coasts until their term of enlistment ended as far as the U. S. ship Vandalia was concerned and started for home, having been on the cruise 3 years, 7 months, 25 days arriving home September 29th, having sailed 51,177 miles-20 persons having died on board the vessel during the cruise.

"April, 1857—I enlisted on the U. S. Steamer Niagara, which was then being fitted out by our government to lay the *Atlantic Cable* to sail in company with the U. S. Steamer Susquehanna, and the English Steamers Agamemnon, Leopard and Cyclops, leaving New York city April 22nd for Portsmouth to put in the cable machinery and all necessary fittings on board—when completed July 27, they sailed for Valencia Bay to land the shore end—after going back and meeting the other vessels in Mid-ocean, the Cable was spliced, some 200 miles of it laid—400 messages were sent through it. August 6th the Cable ceased to work—it had parted and all was over, the expedition was a failure—nothing else to do but return home. December 1st the Niagara went out of commission and crew discharged.

"February, 1858, I again joined the ship's Company of the Niagara to take part in laying the *Atlantic Cable* the second time. The vessel on the American side was the Niagara, Captain Hudson. On the English side, Steamers Agamemnon, Valorous, Porcupine and Gorgon. Niagara left New York city, March 9—The Vessels met in Mid-Ocean, July 25—and spliced the ends of the Cable—August 5, the shore end was safely landed at Trinity Bay, Newfoundland and the Cable working all right proved that this Expedition was a success."

It is well to state here that Henry was detailed to act as the Amanuensis of Mr. Cyrus W. Field, and that all the documents relating to cable matters in way of correspondence, etc., were written by my brother.

"August 11th the Niagara started for home arriving on 23—was put out of commission at once and crew discharged.

"September, 1858, I again enlisted on the U. S. Steamer Niagara, Captain John S. Chauncey, leaving Brooklyn Navy Yard, September 10th. This time the purpose of this cruise was an errand of mercy that any government might be proud of—to take from Charleston, S. C., a large number of Africans rescued from the slave ship Echo by U. S. steamer Dolphin, and return the poor creatures back to their own native land—Arriving at Charleston September 21st and took on board 228 Male—41 Females, adults and 2 Infant children. 271 in all (71 died on the voyage of 51 days) having landed the Africans in care of Mr. H. W. Dennis, agent of the American Colonization Society—left for home November 17th, arrived safely back to New York—Vessel was put out of commission and crew transferred to the Steamship North Carolina.

"I again joined the U. S. Steamer Brooklyn, Captain David G. Farragut with the rank of Master's mate, leaving New York city harbor, February 2, 1859. The object of this cruise was to ascertain the feasibility of establishing a coaling station for steam vessels at Port Royal, S. C. They stopped on the way at Port-au-Prince, Aux Cays, Porto Bello and Vera Cruz—Also they were if possible to form a new treaty with the Mexican Government then under the sway of the Juarez faction.

"United States Commissioner McLean was on board the Brooklyn to negotiate for the United States—November 14th the Treaty was signed, and forwarded to Washington per Mail Steamer Tennessee—on the 19th the Brooklyn sailed for home arriving at Quarantine, February 26, 1860—but returned again with the Commissioner to Vera

Cruz, March 15, while there learned July 10, that Congress had rejected the treaty—all then started back home landing at Old Point Comfort, Va., August 1, and then the cruise ended.

"I rejoined my old ship Vandalia, Captain S. P. Lee. The purpose of this expedition was to reinforce the East India Squadron. December 6, 1860, left New York and sailed to Porto Grande—Island of St. Vincent and the Cape Verde group—thence to Cape Town, Africa, arriving February 27, 1861, having sailed 3382 miles." In May the news reached them of the war between the North and South and immediately turned about homeward arriving at United States May 18th. Then many of the officers and crew resigned from the ship among whom was Henry—and thus ended this cruise as far as he was concerned.

"I went on board U. S. Steamer Alabama Captain E. Lauier, taking the position of Paymaster's clerk, the object in view was to join the North Atlantic Squadron and to blockade the entire hostile sea coast. Leaving New York, October 16, 1861, in company with U. S. Steamers—Wabash, Augusta, Ottawa, Florida, Seneca and Unadilla—While anchored off the battery on 6th the oath of allegiance was administered to all the officers and crews of squadron—on 28th near Charleston overhauled many strange vessels—November 4th captured Port Royal, on 25th captured a Prize vessel—December, captured and set fire to a schooner loaded with coffee.

"December 11th captured the British ship Admiral and anchored her off Port Royal though she was afterwards released—Blockading Charleston Harbor—March 12, 1862, Captured Fernandina—March 25, Captured an English steamer, a Blockade runner and destroyed the Blockade runner Steamer Catawba that run aground in Beach Inlet—September 23 Captured the Schooner Nellie, she was sent to New York and sold—September ordered home, October 9th reached Boston and the cruise ended.

"I again joined the U. S. Steamer Alabama as paymaster's clerk: the object of this cruise was to sail among the West India Islands she was commanded by Captain E. T. Nichols—After some accidents and sundry delays she got fully underway January 1, 1863. Recaptured the Brig J. P. Elliott from the Retribution which was in turn taken captive. February 20th captured the Steamer Peterhoff—Pursuing the cruise they passed by the Islands of Orchilla, Blanquilla, El Rogue, Buen Ayre, Curacoa, Trinidad, Martinique, Basse Terre, St. Kitts, Santa Cruz, Sombiero, Porto Rico, Antiqua, St. Eustatius, St. Bartholomew, St. Martin, St. Domingo, Havana—July 19, a case of yellow fever was dis-

covered on board and it began at once to spread with fatal effects—some 20 of the officers and crew died—July 27 ordered back to Boston in haste—August 2 arrived at Staten Island Quarantine. August 4 officers and crew were transferred to Steamer Magnolia—being furnished with new clothes &c."

They were obliged to leave all other things behind and here Henry was obliged to leave and to lose many valuable curiosities and articles of value collected from different parts of the world on previous trips.

"The Alabama was towed to Portsmouth, N. H. and on 26th officers were detached from ship and the cruise ended.

"I was appointed to the U. S. Steamer Rhode Island Admiral J. C. Lardner—taking the rank of master's mate—This steamer was to be a part of the West India Squadron. Myself with others of the Crew and Officers were sent by the Aspinwall Steamer to go on board the Rhode Island at St. Domingo and did so Oct. 12th—thereupon the Steamer R. I. sailed at once in search of suspicious rebel vessels, after touching at St. Thomas, Point-a-Petre, Cape Haytien, Marayuma, Nevassa and other Islands up to March, 1864, then needing repairs the Rhode Island was ordered home leaving St. Thomas March 19—Arrived at Boston March 28. April 21, the crew were all discharged.

"I joined the U. S. Steamship Alabama for the third time ranking as master's mate—the vessel was to join the North Atlantic Blockading Squadron under the Commands of Admirals Lee and Porter—The vessels that made up the fleet was the Ticonderoga, Shenandoah, Tuscarora, Juniata, Powhattan, Wabash, Colorado, Minnesota, New Ironsides, Brooklyn, Alabama, Emma, A. D. Vance, Cherokee, Tristram Shandy, Malvern, Vanderbilt, Mohican, Mahopac, leaving Brooklyn Navy Yard May 10, 1864. September 24 the Lynch and Hawk Blockade runners were destroyed—October 31 Captured the Blockade runner, Annie—December 25th Bombarded Fort Fisher without success siege was abandoned on 27th.

"January 14, 1865: The Bombardment of Fort Fisher was renewed and the next day the Fort was successfully taken by the Union forces with a loss of 12 officers and 107 men—45 officers and 490 men were wounded. After the battle the Alabama cruised up and down the coast. February 18, 1865, returned to Beaufort, S. C. March 3, Petersburg was taken. March 10, Lee and his forces surrendered. And then the Alabama started homeward—July 13 arrived at Philadelphia and soon after went out of commission."

After the taking of Fort Fisher by the Union Forces, Henry was sent with the Boats under his Command to find and take up Torpedoes in the James River and other streams near the Fort. The weather being extremely cold as he afterwards said, he was nearly frozen to death; this exposure and other hardships fastened upon his system Inflammatory Rheumatism of so violent a nature that he had to be sent to the Boston U. S. Hospital for medical treatment being there for six months and much of the time being obliged to be lifted in and out of bed by four of the hospital attendants. It was while lying in the Hospital as an invalid that he formed the acquaintance of Mrs. Mary A. Page. When he became well enough to travel she came with him to New York where they were married, April 18, 1866. He eventually recovered his health to a certain extent—though the effects of the hardships he had passed through remained in his system and finally resulted in kidney disease and other weakness which brought on his death Feb. 20, 1886, at the Soldiers and Sailors Home in Bath, Chemung county, N. Y., at which Institution he held the office of Pension Clerk.

"Mr. Hosmer possessing popular talents, he was early called to share the public duties of society. In the great events of the revolution he acted a conspicious part, always in favor of liberty. Whilst the preliminary measures were under discussion, one of his townsmen made a powerful speech in which he attempted to ridicule the doings of the 'sons of liberty.' Mr. Hosmer immediately replied in a strain of natural, unaffected, but energetic eloquence (for which he was afterwards distinguished), which particularly attracted public attention and introduced him to public favor. He was a militia officer on the 19th of April, 1775, and the first captain of the Concord Light Infantry company, and was afterwards promoted to major. He was representative five years and senator twelve, and was an active, influential member. He was appointed sheriff of the county in 1792, and sustained the office fifteen years. Major Hosmer was endowed by nature with strong, active powers of mind, and the character he formed enabled him to meet all events with that fortitude which is an assurance of success. He early made a public profession of religion. Ardent without rashness, bold without presumption, and religious without fanaticism. He was eminently a useful man."

THOMAS W. Wood⁷ (5204 u), b. in Montpelier, Vt., Nov. 12, 1823. Wandering portrait painters occasionally visited the town and perpetuated the likeness of its citizens for a small remuneration. One of these painters was the first to influence Thomas, who was full of undefined aspirations, and may be said to have started him in his career.

About the same time one of Thomas' friends returned from Boston with the elemental necessities of art—tubes of oil colors, brushes, palettes, and a few hand books. Both boys at once set to work, crudely but enthusiastically, to develop their tastes and talents. These efforts formed the oft-told story of unaided and patient toil, which however, tells in the end, and upon which, those who finally achieve success, like to look back. At last he found opportunity to study for a short time in the studio of Chester Harding, a portrait painter in Boston. September 24, 1850, he m. Minerva Robinson of Waterbury, Vt., b. at Grand Isle, Vt., Sept. 16, 1824. In 1850 he built on one side of the mountain gorge through which the road leads up to Northfield, Vt., a summer home, where he still goes every year. The following years he painted portraits in Canada, Washington and Baltimore, and by energy and thrift, he was able, in 1858, to take a trip to Europe. There he studied the masterpieces of ancient and modern art, in the galleries of London, Paris, Rome and Florence.

In the same year, he exhibited for the first time, at the National Academy of Design. His canvas was entitled "The Baltimore News-Vender." A curious story is connected with it. Through a mistake it was sold to two persons, J. C. Brune of Baltimore and Robert L. Stuart of New York.

The mistake produced a long and expensive law-suit, which was finally won by Mr. Brune.

Mr. Wood settled permanently in New York in 1866, and has occupied the same studio at No. 51 West Tenth street for many years. He became an Associate of the National Academy of Design in 1869, and an Academician in 1871. From 1878 until 1887, he was president of the American Water Color Society. Beginning in 1879, he served twelve years as vice-president of the National Academy of Design, becoming its president in 1891. This position he held until quite recently.

Mr. Wood is known entirely as a portrait and figure painter. Aside from their simple strength in composition and admirable technical execution, his paintings are important, because in them many Vermont types are reproduced. Besides choosing Vermont scenes and characters for his paintings, Mr. Wood has further identified himself with his birthplace, Montpelier, by establishing there a public gallery of paintings. During several visits abroad he has made admirable copies of many masterpieces, which he has presented to this gallery. Several of his own paintings also hang on its walls. In addition to these, Mr. Wood has secured, by exchange, examples of the work of other American artists. Such a gallery cannot fail to have an immense influence for good upon the art tastes of the community. As the minister of a church in Montpelier, to which Mr. Wood presented a copy of Murillo's "La Madonna del Rosario," well said: "You have made the great Murillo of the 17th century, our contemporary."

Mr. Wilder is a well-known humorist, being known in both England and America as "The Prince of Entertainers and the Entertainer of Princes." No one can read his book, "The People I've Smiled With," without feeling the heart in it, for there is a good and pleasant word for every one from beginning to end. In his book he says, "When I became old enough to want to select a life occupation I found myself in a serious quandary. All the callings to which boys at first naturally incline seemed closed against me.

"It occurred to me one day that there were a good many solemn people in the world, and none too many men who made a business of provoking their fellow-men to laugh. If I could persuade enough people to listen to me, I might make it my business to smile for revenue. Incidentally I might do some good; for if I, with the handicapping I was enduring, could smile and be merry, any big healthy fellow ought to go out into his own back yard and kick himself whenever he found himself becoming miserable.

"The more I thought over this plan the better I liked it. I already had some idea of how to do it, for I had 'tried it on a dog,' as the theatrical people say; that is, I'd told a great many jokes and sung

dozens of funny songs to men who couldn't laugh much easier than George Washington could tell a lie. I'd learned how to 'size up' a crowded house, for I had given a good many dramatic entertainments in our barn (price of admission, one pin), and the audience was generally discriminating and mixed.

"So I went into the 'humourous entertainment' business. I also succeeded—so other folks say. I did so well that people who heard and saw me always put on their most cheerful faces when afterward we met. As for me, no one ever heard me growl or grumble.

"When I started in my professional career as caterer to human risibilities I worked for nothing, and was glad of the chance, for opportunity to appear and become known was what I needed. As soon as I dared, however, I began to charge for my services. My first fee was fifty cents, but it made a great difference in the treatment I received, and, strange though it may appear, the higher my fee the greater is the courtesy and attention I receive."

We also find in Mr. Wilder's book his letter of introduction to President Cleveland, written by Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, which we think will be of interest here.

"DECEMBER 24, 1886.

PRESIDENT GROVER CLEVELAND:

DEAR SIR: Marshall P. Wilder desires an introduction to you, and since in his English career he has been received by the Prince of Wales, and is a favourite with nobles and commoners of high degree, he will feel honoured if you will receive him kindly. He asks nothing but the privilege of conferring pleasure. His entertainments are highly laughter-provoking and of an original character. He deserves great credit for making a brave struggle against difficulties that would have appalled others. He is a most worthy and respectable person, and his efforts in my church on sundry occasions have given very great amusement both to the children and to the grown folks.

I have never had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Wilder, and know him only through his book and his impressions upon other people. I find my thought of him beautifully expressed by the following extract from a tribute to Mr. Wilder:

MARY L. Wilder (5734), b. in Hartland, Conn., Aug. 7, 1800; m. Aug. 2, 1821, Lester, son of Childs and Rhoda (Bates) Taylor, b. in Hartland, Aug. 5, 1798. Soon after their marriage they started for their new home—a log house in the woods in Claridon, Ohio, and were four weeks on the road, with a pair of horses and a wagon. He had been there previously and taught school in the winter, in Mentor, in a log house. His ninety scholars were born in eleven different states, and had as many different school books. They lived in their log house seven years, till it was burned with nearly everything in it. He was colonel of the militia in 1828, and associate judge under the old state constitution. In 1830 the Ohio legislature chose him one of three commissioners to survey, appraise and sell sixty thousand acres of land

for the Western Reserve School Fund. He was sent to the legislature as representative in 1832 and 1834, and again in 1844–5, and to the senate in 1856–7. Was elected speaker *pro tem* of the senate, and served most of the time during the two sessions, as the lieutenant governor was absent much of the time. He called the senate to order the first time they met in the new state house. He was justice of the peace in 1845 and associate judge of the Court of Common Pleas from 1847 to 1850.

In 1882, fifty years after, he was a member of the house first. He was invited to Columbus as ex-member, and on his entrance to each branch the rules were suspended and he was publicly introduced from the speaker's stand and made a speech. Ten years later he again visited Columbus, when the same courtesies were shown him. He was a member of the Congregational church connected with the association of Congregational churches of Lake and Geauga counties, and was the presiding officer for fifteen years from its organization, and was three times sent as delegate to the national councils—to the first council in Boston in 1865, to Detroit in 1877, and to Minneapolis in 1895.

He was for many years president of the first agricultural society of the county, and is now the only living charter member. He was the first president, and still remains so, of the Pioneer Society, and never failed to be present at their meetings till 1895, but was able to preside as usual the next year. For years he was a favorite speaker at pioneer meetings in other counties as well as his own, often addressing thousands in the woods from the stump, in the city opera houses and public halls. He delivered a Fourth-of-July oration in 1820, and on July 3, 1897, after speaking for forty minutes at the Burton celebration in the forenoon, he went to Claridon and spoke for over half an hour in the afternoon, seventy-seven years later.

Making no claim to be a prophet or the son of a prophet, in introducing public speakers he three times named them as future presidents. At a convention in Chardon he introduced Mr. Hayes as the next governor and future president of the United States. Gen. Garfield was introduced by him at Chardon as the next representative in congress and future president, and at Burton in 1894 he introduced Mr. McKinley as the candidate for governor and the next Republican president, which he lived to see fulfilled.

He did not have a liberal education, only attending school winters till he was sixteen, and teaching several winters in Connecticut and Ohio. The farm where he first settled is still his home, and he intends to pass the remaining days of his life under the time-honored roof. Children:

HORACE Wilder⁷ (5735), b. in Hartland, Conn., Aug. 20, 1802. Graduated at Yale College in 1823; studied law while a private tutor in Virginia and was there admitted to practice. In 1827, he went to Ashtabula, Ohio, and continued the practice of his profession there till 1836, when he went to Conneaut, Ohio. He m. Oct. 26, 1833, Phebe Jerusha, dau. of Dr. Elijah and Phebe (Spencer) Coleman, b. in Ashtabula, Mar. 27, 1815; d. in Conneaut, Aug. 18, 1847. He returned to Ashtabula in the winter of 1862-3. Ranking with the ablest members of the Ohio bar, he was elected Judge of the Common Pleas and District Courts of the Ashtabula district, and in 1863, he became one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Ohio. He was colleague at the bar with R. P. Ranney, B. F. Wade and J. R. Giddings. His legal integrity is illustrated by an incident of stormy times. At a convention for nominating judge, it was proposed to pledge the nominee not to remand a fugitive slave back to his master, notwithstanding the United States Supreme Court had declared the law to be constitutional. Horace Wilder refused to pledge himself as to what his holding might be in any case before hearing it, agreeing with Lord Mansfield on a similar occasion, "that if a man gives a right sentence upon hearing one side only, he is a wicked judge, because he is right by chance only and has neglected taking the proper method to be informed."

In May, 1867, he retired from practice and went to Red Wing, Minn., where he resided with his brother Eli. The relations of these brothers was of rare and delicate amity. In an address before the council of the Episcopal church, Bishop Whipple said of him: "Hon. Horace Wilder of Christ church, Red Wing, was one who lived by the

prophet's rule—'to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with God. I never looked into his gentle face without thinking that in him, the hoary head was a crown of glory, for he was found in the way of Righteousness.'"

One of the oldest graduates of Yale College, he had won the highest honors in his profession, but his highest honor was that like Nathaniel of old: "he was a man in whom there was no guile." He d. in Red Wing, Dec. 26, 1889, aged 87. Children:

He returned to Connecticut, where he remained two years and then went to Painesville, Ohio, and commenced professional life as a member of the firm of Hitchcock & Wilder. A newspaper clipping says of him in a notice of his brother Horace: "Who, acquainted with the bar of Ashtabula, Lake and Geauga counties twenty years ago, does not remember them as among the foremost, and in some respects the foremost, of its able members?"

In 1856 he moved to Red Wing, Minn., where he now resides. "For over thirty years Eli T. Wilder has been an honored and most respected citizen of Red Wing, esteemed and beloved by her people for his public and private charities, and justly prominent in the state as a jurist, and one of the most active and influential of the lay members of the Episcopal diocese." Situated four miles north of Santa Cruz, natural advantages and Yankee ingenuity have made "Wilder's Dairy" one unexcelled on the coast. With 300 cows yielding an average of 275 pounds of butter daily, the buildings of the ranch resemble a small village. Water brought from a mountain reservoir 8,000 feet distant,

with 220 feet fall, furnishes power for the cream separators and various other machinery, beside running a one-hundred-light dynamo, by which all the buildings and yards are lighted. The raising of horses, swine and thoroughbred poultry is also an important adjunct. Children:

REV. ROYAL G. Wilder⁷ (6911), b. in Bridport, Vt., Oct. 27, 1816; moved with his parents when a child to Malone, N. Y., where he attended the district school in winter and was the first of his father's family to enter an academy, as he was the only one to enter a college. With a keen relish for reading, he devoured every religious book that came in his way, and even the papers of whatever date. His father's library was very small, but what it contained was not trash, and the young lad grew strong on such books as "The Pilgrim's Progress" and the "Saint's Rest." When he determined to seek an education, his father could give him no help. His time and a cow composed the curious capital which was Royal's only dependence; and in the academy at Malone it was the beef from that cow that kept him at school the first term. Many a time he cut in one day two cords of wood, to relieve his father's financial distress or his own. His first money he earned by selling melons at Malone, and the half dollar he got he kept his hand on, even in his pocket as he ran home, till a stumble compelled him suddenly to withdraw his hand, and away went the precious coin down a hole. Royal was not a boy to give up easily, and down he went on hands and knees, and dug away till he recovered his lost half-dollar. The incident was typical and prophetical of his future; only what he digged for was not silver or gold.

At thirteen years began his religious life as an intelligent, conscious experience. He had been brought up to pray, and on one occasion at least, had found the value of prayer. Going through the woods to find his brothers, and carry them dinner, he got lost and wandered about dazed and bewildered, coming back continually upon his old track. Then he knelt down and prayed for guidance; rose and determined to trust in God and go straight forward, following one direction; presently he emerged from the thicket, coming out into the very field where his brothers were at work. Here was another typical and prophetical incident. He got into many a tangled thicket afterward; but never did he forget Him who had led him out into life and safety, and in answer to prayer he was guided in every new experience of darkness and danger into a larger liberty and success.

Though he first consciously found Christ as a Saviour in time of revival, his religious life was singularly free from emotionalism. He had no sudden transitions nor violent revulsions of feeling. Mainly through an awakened conscience, a calm but quick sense of duty, and the study of the word of God, he came to accept Jesus as Saviour and Lord. At that time his sister Hannah joined the Baptists, as that sect prevailed in the neighborhood where the family lived; but he preferred the Presbyterian fold, and at sixteen united with Dr. Parmelee's church at Malone. Never but once had he uttered an oath, and he never forgot it. His religious frame, though always calm, was never cold; he was moved more by love and less by fear, more by deliberate judgment and choice than by sudden impulse or glowing enthusiasm. He knew he must found his whole Christian hopes upon the new nature regenerate in Christ; and believing that God had wrought in him the new creation, he enjoyed a quiet assurance seldom disturbed by doubts.

He studied by night by the light of pine knots, and worked by day to get the pine knots for his fire and the books for his study, until he entered Middlebury College, Vermont, in his twentieth year. When he left home, his capital in life was less than ten dollars, most of which he had saved, and a dollar of which his mother gave him the morning he left home for college. He walked the entire distance, working his way over the lake by helping in the loading and unloading of the boat, and going barefoot part of the way to save his shoes. The same habits of frugality and economy and bodily exertion followed him through life.

From first to last he was a patient *plodder*. So desirous was he of a training for a useful life that he was willing to work from five o'clock in the morning till breakfast, and from noon till school again opened; that he might pay his board, cutting hay in summer, and splitting wood in winter, to earn the right to be a full-grown and well-equipped man. In college it was the hand on the axe-handle and the bell-rope that helped him through. When he was graduated in 1839 he had worked his passage; but he had won deserved honors, for, with his classmate, Foote, he stood—they two at the head of the class, and, strangely enough, they two had been born on the same day.

When he turned from the flattering prospects of a high position at home to spend his life among the pagans of Asia, he left a path that might have led him where one of his schoolmates, Mr. Wheeler, afterward came—to the Vice-Presidency of the nation. Foote, his twin honor-man, said to him: "Wilder, why bury yourself among the heathen?" Mr. Wilder was singularly attached to Mr. Foote, and for

years they corresponded. Foote rose rapidly in his profession; very successful as a lawyer, he amassed wealth, and married a woman of unusual beauty. But death, in the midst of his prosperity, smote wife and daughter, and poor Foote blew out his own brains.

Mr. Wilder taught in Mississippi and Vermont, and then went to Andover for a theological course. There he found a missionary band, like the famous "Haystack band" of Williams, with the same constitution and covenant. Only twelve belonged to it, and even the professors seemed to feel little interest in it, but Royal Wilder became a member, heard Dr. Grant of Persia and Dr. Scudder of India, and others, speak on the great needs of a lost world, and so the missionary was preparing and maturing for his work. Here he had his first and last period of *doubts* about the divinity of Christ. They were incident to the transition period when the mind was budding into full independence. Henceforth he was to feel too much of the divine life of Christ in himself and see too much of the divine power of Christ in others, to doubt that He was the Son of God. He was graduated from Andover in 1845.

He married about 1846, Eliza J. Smith of West Rutland, Vt., and they immediately sailed for India. When his vessel was ready to sail, he departed from Malone, and his departure was the means of a revival in which many were added to the church. His father rejoiced to give up his son to such a great work as was before him; but his mother, to whom he had been particularly devoted, and for whose sake he had often walked from Middlebury to Malone to spend vacations, was dead. The vessel rounded the Cape of Good Hope and consumed one hundred and twenty-one days in the passage to Bombay. Mr. Wilder had given three months, at Newark, Del., to the study of Mahratta, and, after another three months in India, Mr. Valentine (upon being called away) asked him to preach. The invitation was a joke, but Mr. Wilder actually accepted it and did preach. The native Christians were astonished and said, "We prayed for him."

In Ahmednuggur, Mr. Wilder spent six years. For five years, he and his wife were many a time alone at communion service. She shared with him the anxiety of the first months at Kolapoor, where they went in 1852, when almost in despair of striking rock for the foundation of his church. She suffered with him the violence of the people, who one night hurled a large stone through the window pane across the cradle of their little girl. She was his companion in such experiences as meeting a snake in the parlor, finding a scorpion on her

son's coat, meeting a panther while on her morning walk, living for weeks in the mountains without seeing a white face. But she had also the joy of starting the first girl's school in a kingdom where not a respectable woman or girl could read, and of welcoming to the communion table, as the first native convert in Kolapoor, a woman. The city of Kolapoor was especially holy in Brahmin eyes, and never had been contaminated by the presence of missionaries. The day he got there the leading Brahmins petitioned for his banishment, but, undismayed, he got a foothold and worked five years for his convert. His school was the entering wedge of all his success. At the time of his coming he found in Kolapoor 44,000 inhabitants, and only one school, in a back street, with twelve boys in it. When he left, a college building, at government expense, costing \$200,000, had been built, and "Father Wilder" was asked to make the address at the opening. He was too busy to comply, but his associate, Mr. Seiler, made the address, and took as his theme "The Evidences of Christianity."

The property of the Kolapoor Mission he gave in 1871 to the Presbyterian Board, and in 1875 left the field of his labor, partly from considerations of health, and partly to educate his children Robert and Grace in this country. The time between his sailing for India and his resignation from the Board covered a period of nearly thirty-two years.

During those thirty years he had preached in more than 3,000 cities, towns and villages, had scattered over 3,000,000 pages of tracts, had gathered in schools over 3,300 pupils, 300 of whom were girls. In a parish of 4,000,000 of people, he and his wife were the only persons to take care of their souls. Beside all this work, he had been on committee for translation and revision of the Bible; and was one of the committee in the Mahratta language, spoken by 16,000,000 people. Up to the time he left India he had already written and published commentaries on three gospels, and had edited and translated many books.

His hand was not forgetful of its cunning, and his tongue did not cleave to the roof of his mouth. Every nail in the roof of his church building at Kolapoor he drove with his own hammer, and when the houses went up to shelter converts' families, he led in the work. In the early years of the mission, he wrote many articles for the press, chiefly on educational subjects; and it is said by those in high official position, that his anonymous letters in the Times of India influenced parliament in adopting measures for the education of the masses.

His whole policy in India was to watch for the opportunities to plant and support indigenous primary schools. He cared for no high colleges. His ruling passion was to lift up the masses. He graduated salaries of teachers according to the number and progress of their pupils, thus indirectly striking a blow at caste, by setting a premium on numbers and proficiency, without reference to the class from which pupils came. He encouraged only a *moderate* allowance to helpers, on the ground that natives could not support men who received large salaries. Like Wheeler on the Euphrates, he felt that by the tithe system ten believers might support a teacher or preacher who was willing to live on their level as to expense.

Whereas when he first went to Kolapoor there was not in the kingdom one respectable woman who could write or read, only recently they have sent to this country for a governess to go to the palace itself.

Of incidents, this one may illustrate the power of direct prayer: One day he had preached in some eight villages. Disputations and popular indifference had made him feel discouraged, and thus wearied he sat under a tree to rest. While here a coolie came from his home, bringing provisions, bread, etc., and also the overland mail. The mail was the most welcome. Among other letters was one from a dear friend in Philadelphia. It contained words of warm sympathy and encouragement, and more than all, this assurance: "Brother Wilder, we are praying for you by name every Wednesday evening." The effect of this letter and the blessing which came with it were immediate. He rose from under that "juniper tree" with fresh realization of nearness to God. He walked two miles to a large town. He went, as was his custom, directly to the Pahtil—the head man of the town. He was in his court-room, surrounded by some fifty clerks, but received him in a polite, cordial way, and upon learning his errand ordered all the clerks to drop their work and listen. After Mr. Wilder had talked about an hour they urged him to continue, and before he closed those learned men were wiping the tears from their eyes. This is one of the choicest experiences in his life, showing the power of the simple story of Christ's love. No wonder he believed in special objects for prayer and gifts.

His convictions of missionary methods, both at home and on the field, seem to have been rooted into his very nature by deep personal experience. This was so of his conviction that native churches should have native pastors; that native churches should be self-supporting; that native Christians should be trained to responsibility, and taught

to keep on a level with their neighbors, that they might win them, and show them that they had not become Christians to better their temporal condition. The prayer-meetings were largely reporters' meetings. From the Christians were expected accounts of services, interviews, discussions, etc. Sometimes he would call on them by name for their report of the week. These reports suggested very definite subjects for prayer. This was true also of the women's prayer-meetings conducted by Mrs. Wilder. Praying in meeting was a part of their Christian life.

Mr. Wilder was, so far as known, but once in peril of his life. On the outskirts of a village a mob gathered around him and demanded money. Though mounted on his horse, the leader of the gang had hold of the bridle; so, for a few minutes, the missionary seemed completely in the power of the fierce men. With seeming composure he entered into a conversation with them. Their interest increased; he held their attention until he noticed the grasp on the bridal gradually loosening. Watching a favorable moment he spurred his horse and with a bound was out of their reach.

On his return, in 1875, he himself crossed the continent and left his luggage and property to come by sea. Rounding the Cape of Good Hope, his goods were lost in the vessel's wreck. But among those lost effects was his whole manuscript on the Kolapoor kingdom, with full diary of his missionary work.

His later years were spent in Princeton, N. J., where in 1877, he started "The Missionary Review." He d. in New York city, Oct. 10, 1887, and is buried in the old cemetery at Princeton, N. J. On the 26th of November following, Mrs. Wilder in company with her daughter Grace sailed for Kolapoor, Western India. Denied the privilege of going back to her work, after twelve years' absence, in company with her venerated husband, she, after his death, begged to be allowed to go back with her daughter and resume active work there as a Bible reader, on her own charges.

We are indebted for the above to the biography of Mr. Wilder by Rev. A. T. Pierson, in "The Missionary Review" for January, 1888.

Mrs. Wilder and her daughter have been stationed most of the time near their old field of labor, Kolapoor. She has made but one visit to this country, coming in June, 1897, returning Jan. 14, 1899. Children:

At the age of eighteen taught his first school, attended the academy at Henniker two or three terms. He now determined to obtain an education, and after one year of close study he entered Dartmouth college, from which he graduated in 1848 at the head of his class. He went from college to Woodstock, Conn., taking charge of an academy and reading law at the same time. In 1851 he entered the Theological Seminary at New Haven, paying his expenses by teaching a private class of ladies in that city. In 1852 he was called to Dartmouth as tutor of Latin and mathematics. In 1854 was made professor of mathematics, and afterwards of astronomy and metereology. Was secretary of the Board of Education of New Hampshire from 1852 to 1862. Was elected to the legislature in 1862. Elected representative to Congress in 1863, and re-elected in 1865. Chosen United States senator in 1867, which position he held six years. Has traveled extensively in Europe, and his services are in frequent demand for lectures upon his foreign travels, and also before literary and scientific societies.

His powers of disputation and for argument began to unfold themselves when, in his boyhood, he took an active part in the debates in the town lyceum, where he was generally first in debate. In the United States senate he took high rank as an orator, not so much for the manner of speaking, but in the higher ranges of literature and statesmanship, his efforts at times attracting great attention. He having made a public profession of his faith at the old Congregational church in Madison, N. 

She united with the church in Heath, Mass., May 19, 1786, her husband being one of the original members from the church in Charlemont, when it was organized, Apr. 15, 1785. She d. in Heath, Nov. 10, 1811, and he m. (2) Martha —, who d. Dec. 21, 1836. He was a soldier in the French and Indian wars. one engagement he captured a French officer, who, upon his release, presented Mr. White with a very handsome tankard which was preserved in the family until some years after his death, when it was destroyed by fire at his old homestead in Irving, Mass., where he was one of the first settlers, moving there when it was known as Irving's Grant. At the time of the fire, the homestead was occupied by his only daughter Lucretia White and her brother Jonathan's orphan daughters. In it were destroyed many valuable family relics, the old family records and other valuable papers. In the Massachusetts Archives at Boston we find the Revolutionary record of Col. Asaph White. Apr. 22, 1775, as ensign in Capt. Sylvanus Rice's company; Apr. 22, 1776, he was chosen first lieutenant by election of company 5, 5th Hampshire County regiment, and commissioned May 3. She never married, but lived with her brother Jonathan's daughters, and they all unite in telling me that she was a most remarkable woman and one who all were proud to claim as a relative. She d. in Winchendon, Mass., Oct. 25, 1875, and the following from her pen seems worthy a place in these records:

AN UNFINISHED LETTER.

I've stood again upon that mountain brow,
After the lapse of half a century,
And gazed with wistful eyes around, above,
Below — a glorious vision truly.
'Twas the last day of summer,
And the clear, cool air of autumn
Had already come and painted
Its deep blue upon the sky and
Braced our frames and formed the medium through

Which alone Nature presents her fairest Type of beauty. Around us were The cultivated fields, and labourers Intent on gathering in the harvest. The mountain landscape dotted o'er with homes Of thrift and comfort, above the boundless Depths of ether teaching to us Infinity as naught else can, And round us now in deepest blue, Speaking of infinite purity as well, Till in the distance we descryed a bridge That spanned the Deerfield. Save that, no trace was Visible that ax, or saw, or hammer, Spade or hoe, had e'er been there. A favoring season had clothed the trees In most luxuriant foliage, And there, in solemn grandeur Of unequal height and varying green, The dense masses reared their heads to meet our gaze, Bringing to fancy's eye the Woods primeval, boundless and obscure, Through whose tangled depths no foot Of man had tracked, nor woodman's ax had rung. Then, as we glided down the western slope, Old Berkshire's mountains rose against the sky, With no scant claim to majesty, sublime. The Hoosac valley, with its winding stream, Lay cosily below, almost beneath our feet. The latter twirled a multitude of spindles, Bent the arrowy shuttle With the speed of thought Hither and thither Through the springing web, Kept all the needful adjuncts in due play, Till the completed fabric Lay in convenient folds upon The salesman's shelf ready for the By means like these a village Consumer. Fair had been built, such as is wont To grace New England's streams.

A little farther in its course It passed a workshop of a different stamp. No piles of wood or stone sunk in its course To elevate its flood and turn Its waters on some ponderous wheel Were there, for none were needed. In that establishment mind is the motive power, And mind receives the action. There A portion of our youth, guided by learned Lawyers, explore the mines of thought, Dig there the ore which, when transmitted, Furnished with powers to indicate the right To combat with error, to defend the truth, And then advance humanity along the road To excellence, its destined goal, The humblest schoolhouse in the land Gives pleasure to the thoughtful eye And sends a thrill of joy through every heart That beats with love of country and mankind. No marvel then that where these statelier Walls ascend, where grove and lawn And well-kept shrubbery, and graveled walk Form the surroundings, and within are garnered treasures From the earth and sea To interest and gratify the curious. No marvel that one lingers with delight Around these hallowed scenes, And well have this and kindred institutions Proved their worth in the terrific struggle To sustain a righteous government And wholesome laws against parricidal hands, Whose threat and purpose is to lay them in the dust. While disaffection showed its hideous front, Where least expected, these have been loyal to the core, And many a stripling from these cloistered halls Bared his young brow to the foeman's steel, Received the shaft aimed at his country's life, And he's embalmed for aye in the vast mausoleum Which now holds such countless multitudes Our noblest and our best. Alas! 'tis still

Receiving. O Thou who didst arrest
The patriarch's uplifted arm
When but one life was perilled by its fall.
Stay the monster sacrifice, we plead, ere
Thousands on thousands more lie
With upturned faces on the gory sod;
Or, worse, far worse, pine in these dismal prison pens,
Deprived of needful food and uncontaminated air
Till life itself is torture, and manhood's
Distinctive and ennobling features
Are crushed out before the breath departs.

But I have wandered strangely from The peaceful classic vale I had begun to praise; Yet not the less is felt its soothing Influence, its power to charm, So great that all would seem at rest, But that the storm of war still sweeps across the land. Yet Vicksburg, Gettysburg, and others like With clear conviction of a righteous cause Have placed a bow of promise on the darkened cloud That's sure to be redeemed. So, patiently, Yea, hopefully, we wait to see what means Our God hath vet in store to save This favored land and hush discordant Elements to peace. The mountain side is now accomplished And the query comes perhaps? Is this view Most glorious of all New England boasts, Are there not other heights of greater interest? No, not for me, for back of all I saw In mem'ries canvas was a picture drawn— The panorama of a century, enrolled And filled with forms most dearly loved That long have slept. To attain these heights We passed up the Deerfield, then lying in Its bank calm as a cradled infant; But full well we knew it was not always thus. Capricious stream! Running its early course, Parallel with this mountain range,

And receiving from its eastern slope
The rushing torrents that stay, not
To fertilize the earth. It would sometime
Seem as if heaven's windows had indeed
Been open, or an avalanche of waters
Descended on its bed.

At one such time

As this a daring youth came on its banks Desiring much to reach the other shore. Not prone to giving up a purpose formed, And conversant with danger by swollen streams. With fearless eye he scanned the boiling flood, Then launched his frail canvas and steered across. Yet ere he had reached the opposing bank He met a current which Goliah's arm Could not have stemmed; which bore him downward With resistless force. In his course there rose a rock Which since that perilous hour has borne his name. Viewing that rock at ordinary tide, It seems a myth it e'er should be submerged. Yet over it he and his craft were borne, Upset and buried in the surge below. With tenacious grasp he clung to the frail thing, Through all the evolutions which it made In that tremendous vortex ere a smoother Spot was gained, where he could right his shallop And to some extent control its movements. His peril had been witnessed, and Sympathizing men and women Ran along the bank anxious to give aid. One good old woman called at top of voice, "Paddle and pray, paddle and pray." Not unwise. A volume of theology Compressed in three short words, teaching That strenuous effort with the means that God has given, should e'er accompany Our cry to Him for aid. The prayer was heard, The aid was given, the rash young man was saved. For long and active life and o'er these heights

And through the mountain gorges made his way, With ax in hand to chip the trees that were To guide his course in future explorations.

Some two miles down the stream, There dwelt a maiden in her father's house. Gladly would I portray her as she was: But none live now who saw her then. I knew her well in middle life. And from the data thus obtained May in all likelihood approximate The truth. Above the medium height And lithe of limb, With flaxen hair, full blue eyes and skin That bade defiance to sun or wind To change unless 'twere scorched. Of cheerful mood, Delighting much in social intercourse And joining with a will the ringing laugh That followed a keen repartee or jest, Yet changing on the instant were a note Of sadness introduced. A tear drop In another's eye was sure to bring the twin into her own. She said, in her expressive phrase, She wept when others did, whether she grieved or not. Inured to toil, for in those early days Brief childhood was allowed. Soon as the frame Attained sufficient size to reach, or hand To grasp the needful implements, Their tasks commenced. And her's was e'en beyond the common lot. Her sire and eldest brother went with those Who, led by Johnson, would turn back the French And Indian hordes from off our borders. Her elder sisters were conducting households of their own. A feeble mother, an orphaned baby niece With two young brothers, formed the household band To whom she was to minister as best she might And execute the feeble mother's plans. Yet as the years wore on and strength increased, And peace came not to send back to their home

The needed sire and son, necessity Required her to produce as well as save. And well she knew to turn the wheel And throw the shuttle and by various arts Add to the common store. Child of New England, she had passed Her earliest years within its sunniest nook, And but of late exchanged Shetucket for The Deerfield when New England's winter came Athwart in all its rigor. Storm after Storm piled high the roads with snow, Obliterated fence and wall and left clear Sweep for the clear, biting wind. The horse and ox were safe from toil. They could not stir abroad, and man himself, When dire necessity compelled to seek His fellow-man, must own indebtedness To the rude savage, borrow for his foot The bended hickory, interlaced With toughened leather thongs, safe in proportion To its spread from sinking in the snow, But in the same proportion rendering The movement difficult, the progress slow And wearisome. Equipped with these, Unto her father's door there came a man Forlorn and sad, for in a solitary Cottage on the Hoosac, he had left a sick, Most like a dying wife. What man could do he'd done. Strong affection Had put in requisition all his powers of gentle nursing, All his medicinal lore; yet no improvement followed. Female tact he thought was needed. Her gentle hand Might yet assuage the pain, Her ready wit concoct a healing Draught would tell upon that wasting frame. So, leaving some half-grown boys to tend the fire And hand the gruel, he had sallied forth In hopes to find in no far distant home The strength and courage equal to the task. He'd sought in vain. The needful help

Was nowhere to be found, and hope was dying out. She listened to the tale, bound to her foot The indispensable snow shoe and followed In his wake. The weary miles at length were Overcome, the mountain height was gained, And He who notes with a complacent eve All sacrifices, made our kind to save. All efforts made the sufferers to relieve. Added to his blessing, and the vital flood Which had been coursing at a rapid and Unequal pace, subsided to its calm And measured move. The eve relumed. The aspect changed for good, and all gave hope That the wife and mother, joy and comfort Of the lone abode would yet remain To supervise her little realm.

So one pleasant morn, With blessings on her head and gladness in her heart, She took the footpath down the mountain side And reached at length the base where a few dwellings Stood in such proximity as to give The convenient comfort and security Of neighbourhood. By united effort In ordinary times they kept an open road Where two could move abreast. There kindly voices guided her and said Stay but a little, we'll prepare a team And bear you to your home. Nay! Nay! Thanks for your kindness, but reserve your aid For those who need, I've no such claim, So glad am I to stand once more among The abodes of men and feel that sympathy In joy or sorrow are ready to my hand, So buoyant and so light of heart, I could walk on to Deerfield yet to-night, Nor feel fatigue.

JOSEPH, Jr.⁷ (8083), b. in Charlemont, Mass., Nov. 18, 1811; m. Hannah Danforth. His father was a farmer on a small scale, but his chief business was carding wool and fulling cloth. The mill which he owned was located on a brook near their dwelling, in the central village of Charlemont. When about fourteen or fifteen years of age his father, in a confidential way, said to him that he himself was getting old, and now that he, Joseph, must take his place in the management of things, and as it was now the time for him to lay in his yearly stock of drugs and dyes for the mill, he must go to Greenfield in his stead and purchase them. "I never felt so big in my life," said he, "as then. My father could trust me."

When he was leaving home for Bennington, Vt., to begin his studies preparatory for college, his mother followed him to the door, and taking his hand at parting, left a silver dollar in it, saying, "Here, Joseph, take that, it's all I have, I wish it were more." "I took it," said he, "but poor as I was I did not spend it; it is among my keepsakes yet; I would not part with it for a thousand dollars."

He was then about eighteen years old, and making about as large a venture as a young man can well make; a country lad setting out to get an education—preparatory, college and professional; poor, and knowing that in some way, he knows not how, he must find the pecuniary means for a course of seven or eight long years. To begin with, he arranged with Mr. James Ballard, the principal of the Bennington seminary, who was a townsman of his, to carry him forward in his preparatory studies, and gave him the opportunity to pay his bills in part by teaching younger classes. This, with teaching winter schools in the neighborhood, was all he had then to depend on.

I was living then in that neighborhood (it is now some sixty years ago) and young White came to teach our winter school. I was a mill hand, and boarding in the house of my employer. The teacher must board around, and so for some weeks he was with us. The family were Scotch Gordons, very intelligent, genial, social, especially the lady of the house, as was also the teacher, and very soon he found himself at home with us all.

At times he and I had pleasant talks together, comparing notes as to our past lives, our boyhood homes, experiences, etc. From him I

first learned anything about Charlemont and its people. Our acquaintance, of course, was brief, and I think mutually pleasant. Then for some two years we pretty much lost sight of each other.

In the autumn of 1832 we both entered Williams college as freshmen. Our first meeting in the recitation room was a surprise to us both; though to him more than it was to me. For I knew he expected to enter college; but the mill hand, with whom he had a brief boarding house acquaintance, how surprising it was to meet him then and there! But greetings over, the acquaintance was speedily renewed, and soon ripened into a friendship that has continued to the last, unclouded by a single shadow.

In college Mr. White, like myself and some others of the class, was at first at a disadvantage for want of thorough preparation to begin with. But he was assiduous and persevering in his studies, and notwithstanding we had some strong men among us, he very soon took rank with the first. While in college he was highly esteemed by all, both as a scholar and as a man, correct and dignified in his deportment, a pleasant companion, and always on the side of right. He graduated with honor, having the first English oration.

Leaving college he went back to the Bennington seminary and taught there several months. In 1837 he began the study of law in Troy, N. Y., and in due time was admitted to the bar. He returned again to college and served as tutor nearly two years. In 1840 he took up his residence in Troy and practiced law seven or eight years with good success. In 1848 he gave up his law practice and removed to Lowell, Mass., and was engaged as agent of the cotton mills of the Massachusetts Corporation, one of the largest establishments of its kind in New England, continuing there some ten years. In 1857 he was elected and served as a member of the Massachusetts senate. In 1858 he was appointed bank commissioner; held that office until he resigned in 1860, and the same year was appointed secretary of the State Board of Education, and for nearly sixteen years continued in the discharge of the very exacting duties of that office. He served also as a member of the legislature in 1875, and was chairman on the joint committee on education.

About the time he went to Lowell, in 1848, Mr. White was elected trustee of Williams college, and held that office to the close of his life, a term of office extending over 42 years, a length surpassed by only three trustees since the death of Dr. Hopkins.

Mr. White delivered the master's oration at commencement, when he took that degree in 1839. In 1855, by request, he delivered an oration before the society of alumni, commemmorative of Col. Ephraim Williams, the founder of the college, who, just one hundred years before, was killed in an ambush of French and Indians, near Lake George, in 1755. By request of the society the oration was published.

In March, 1859, Mr. White was elected treasurer of the college, and served as such till, admonished by the growing infirmities of age, he resigned in 1886, a period of 27 years. On accepting that office he removed to Williamstown, purchased for himself a beautiful home, with some sixty acres of farm land adjoining, where he has resided, and where he closed his long and useful life.

He was influential in his town affairs, took an active part in the management and was often moderator of the town meeting, having the fullest confidence of his fellow townsmen of all parties. He had a like standing and interest in church matters, a devout member of long standing and for a number of years deacon of the Congregational church, active and useful, and almost to the close of his life, a teacher of a large adult class in the Sunday school. From all this it is evident that the life of Mr. White was not one of sloth or easy indulgence, nor was it one of mere self-seeking. He was a busy man, modest and retiring, but self reliant and industrious. Few men during the course of a long life have held so many and important positions and of such varied character, filling them all with ability and credit, exerting on each an influence, helpful and lasting. He was a man of fine presence, of fair and genial countenance, and in his old age venerable, with hair silken white — one who might well be called "a gentleman of the old school." He had accumulated a large and valuable library, that is especially rich in material relating to New England and its people. He prized his books as loving companions, and was never more at home than when leisurely perusing them. This valuable library, or at least the bulk of it, it is understood is left to his native town, Charlemont.

The old house in which he was born and grew up to young manhood, with the lot nearly an acre of land in the center of Charlemont village, he deeded to the town, as a place for a town hall, library and other offices. The erection of the building which he expected would be worthy of the place and its uses, he left to his cousin, Mr. Orlando B. Potter of New York, with whom he had some understanding about the whole matter. Mr. White was to give the lot and the library.

Mr. Potter was to put up a suitable building. Mr. White and Mr. Potter, through their mothers, were great grandsons of Capt. Moses Rice, one of the very first settlers or founders of Charlemont, and was killed by Indians in 1755. With all Mr. White's varied duties he found time to make an effort to collect the history and genealogy of his family, and his widow very kindly gave me what material he had collected. I am indebted for the above facts in a great degree to his memoir by his college classmate and friend, R. Crawford, D. D., delivered at Deerfield, Feb. 24, 1891, at the annual meeting of the P. V. M. A. Mr. White d. in Williamstown, Nov. 1, 1890.



He was representative to the General Court from Charlemont and a member of the Provincial Congress at Watertown in February and April, 1775. He held the rank of captain in the militia during the Revolutionary war; served three months at Dorchester Heights in 1776. In July, 1777, his company was ordered again and went under Gen. Lincoln to reinforce Gen. Schuyler in New York. They were absent thirty-eight days, for which he received fifteen pounds. His commission as Justice of the Peace, dated 1777, was signed by Samuel Adams, clerk of the court. As a justice, he performed the ceremony, when his mother was married the second time, which gave rise to the story told the young people, that a man in Buckland married his own mother. He was one of the first members of the Congregational church which was formed in October, 1785, and served as chorister and deacon. He was a constant attendant while his strength lasted. In 1790 he erected the first saw mill at what is now called the "Mill Yard." Mar. 6, 1686, aged 89. John White,² b. in England about 1628; m. about 1652, Elizabeth, dau. of Thomas and Alice Goblee of Charlestown and Concord, Mass. They lived in Sudbury, where he d. in 1668, aged 40, leaving several children. She m. (2) Thomas Carter before 1682. Daniel White,3 fourth child and third son of John and Elizabeth, b. about 1658, as he is called eight years old when his father's estate was settled in 1676. He remained with his mother until nineteen years old, as she testifies in the final settling of the estate, as found in "Wyman's Estates of Charlestown." We next find him at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), where his name appears upon a tax list in 1696. He was constable in 1713 and 1714. He must have been a man of some dignity of character, for in seating the meeting house in 1731 he was placed in the second seat below. He m. Mary —, who d. and he m. (2) Hannah —. His will, 1738, mentions wife Hannah, sons Joseph, John, Stephen and Samuel, and daughters Sybil Mansfield and Sarah Locke. Joseph White, 4 b. Apr. 17, 1704; m. about 1728, Hannah ——. She d. Apr. 7, 1731, and he m. Mary ——. He lived in Lexington, where he d. Aug. 4, 1777. There was found in the Bible of his grandson, Nathaniel White, a certificate of administration granted by John Winthrop, Esq., judge of probate in county of Middlesex, within the province of Massachusetts Bay, in New England, on the 28th day of October, Anno Domini 1777, to Joseph White, on the estate of Joseph White, late of Lexington. His widow Mary d. Oct. 20, 1780. Joseph White, 5 b. in Lexington, Oct. 11, 1737; m. Lucy — and settled in Gerry, now Phillipston, Mass. The following anecdote of Joseph White is given us by one of his granddaughters: "Immediately succeeding the Revolutionary war the United States government offered a reward for the apprehension and conviction of parties who were making and passing

counterfeit money. The advertisement was printed in the 'Worcester Spy.' Joseph White, then living in Gerry, had reason to suspect some men that he found meeting in an old schoolhouse. He caused their arrest and they were taken to Worcester for trial, and convicted. White then sent to Washington for the reward, but the government put him off with the plea that it was too poor to pay it at the time. After Joseph White's death, his son Nathaniel took the matter up, but papers containing necessary information could not be found, and although the debt was acknowledged to be a just one it has never been paid." Joseph White d. in Gerry, Dec. 3, 1795. His widow Lucy d. Jan. 22, 1815, aged 82. After his marriage, Nathaniel White moved to Westford, Vt., and during the war of 1812 drew wood and provisions across Lake Champlain for the army, and received a land warrant in payment for the work. While living there he lost four children, with scarlet fever, within one month. He returned to Massachusetts, living in Phillipston, New Salem, Petersham and Athol, until 1833, when he settled in Plainfield, Mass. He d. June 12, 1857, aged 82. His wife Elizabeth d. I should be glad, if you are not afraid of the small-pox, & incline to continue longer in the service than you lately talk'd of, if you would remove to Boston tomorrow or next day, & take upon you the command and direction of matters there,



The Preface to the

READER.

1675 - 6

It was on Tuesday, Feb. 1, 1675, in the afternoon, when the Narrhagansets quarters (in or toward the Nipmug Country, whither they are now retyred for fear of the English Army lying in their own Country) were the second time beaten up by the Forces of the united Colonies, who thereupon soon betook themselves to flight, and were all the next day pursued by the English, some overtaken and destroyed. But on Thursday Feb. 3. The English having now been six dayes on their march, from their hed quarters at Wickford, in the Narrhaganset Country, toward and after the Enemy, and provision grown exceeding short, in so much that they were fain to kill some Horses for the supply, especially of their Indian friends, they were necessitated to consider what was best to be done; And about noon (having hitherto followed the chase as hard as they might) a council was called, and although some few were of another mind, yet it was concluded by far the greater part of the Council of War, that the Army should desist the pursuit, and retire: the Forces of Plimouth and the Bay to the next Town of the Bay, and Connecticut Forces to their own next Towns: Which determination was immediately put in execution. The consequent wereof, as it was not difficult to be foreseen by those that knew the causless enmity of the Barbarians, against the English, and the malicious and revengefull spirit of these Heathen: so it so proved dismall.


The Narrhagansets were now driven quite from their own Country and all their provisions their hoarded up, to which they durst not at present return, and being so numerous as they were, whereby both the one and other were now reduced to extream straits, and so necessitated to take the first and best opportunity for supply, and very glad, no doubt of such an opportunity as this, to provide for themselves, and make spoil of the English at once; and feeling themselves thus dis-

charged of their pursuers, and a little refreshed after their flight, the very next week on Thursday Feb. 10. they fell with mighty force and fury upon Lancaster: which small Town remote from aid of others and not being Gerisoned as it might, the Army being now come in and as the time indeed required (the design of the Indians againts that place being known to the English some time before) was not able to make effectual resistance: but notwithstanding utmost endeavour of the Inhabitants, most of the building, were turned into ashes; many People (Men Women and Children) slain and others captivated. most solom and remarkable part of this Trajedy, may that justly be reputed, which fell upon the Family of that Servant of God Mr. Joseph Rowlandson the faithfull Pastor of Christ in that place, who being gone down to the Councill of the Massachusets to seek aid for the defence of the place, at his return found the Town in flames, or smoke, his own house being set on fire by the Enemy, through the disadvantage of a defective Fortification, and all in it consumed: his precious yokefellow and dear Children wounded and captivated (as the issue evidenced, and following Narative declares) by these cruel and barbarous Salvages A Sad Catestrophe: Thus all things come alike to all: None knows either love or hatred by all that is before him. It is no new thing for Gods precious ones to drink as deep as others, of the Cup of common Calamity: Take just Lot (yet captivated) for instances beside others. But it is not my business to dilate on these things, but only in few words introductively to preface to the following Script, which is a Narrative of the wonderfully awfull, wise, holy, powerfull, and gracious providence of God, toward that worthy and precious Gentlewoman the dear Consort of the said Reverend Mr. Rowlandson, and her children with her, as in casting of her into such a waterless pit, so in preserving, supporting, and carrying thorow so many such extream hazards unspeakable difficulties and disconsolateness, and at last delivering her out of them all and her surviving Children also. It was a strange and amazing dispensation, that the Lord should so affect his precious Servent and Handmaid. It was as Strange if not more, that he should so bear up the spirits of his Servant under such bereavements and of his handmaid under such captivity travels and hardships (much too hard for flesh and blood) as he did and at length deliver and restore. But he was their Saviour, who had said, When thou passest through the Waters, I will be with thee; and through the Rivers they shall not overflow thee; When thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burnt; nor shall the flame kindle upon thee Isa 43 ver. 2 and again

He woundeth and his hands make whole He shall deliver thee in six troubles, yea in seven there shall no evil wound thee: In Famine he shall redeem thee from Death, and in War from the power of the sword Job 5. 18, 19, 20. Methinks this dispensation; doth bear some resemblance to those of Joseph, David and Daniel: yea and of the three Children too, the Stories where of do represent us with the exclent texture of devine providence, curious peices of devine work: and truly so doth this, and therefore not to be forgotten, but worthy to be exhibited to and viewed and pondered by all, that disdain not to consider the opperation of his hands.

The works of the Lord (not only of Creation but of Providence also especially those that do more pecularly concern his dear ones, that are as the Apple of his Eye, as the Signet upon His Hand, the Delight of his Eyes; and the Object of his tenderest Care) and great sought out of all those that have pleasure therein. And of these verily this is none of the least.—This Narrative was penned by the Gentlewoman her self to be to her a memorandum of Gods dealings with her, that She might never forget, but remember the same & the several circumstances thereof, all the days of her life. A pious scope which deserves both commendation and imatation: Some friend having obtained a sight of it, could not but be so much affected with the many passages of working providence discovered therein, as to judge it worthy of public view, and altogather unmeet that such works of God should be hid from present and future Generations: And therefore though this Gentlewoman would not thrust it into the Press yet her gratitude unto God made her not hardly persuadible to let it pass, that God might have his due glory, and others benefit by it as well as herself I hope by this time none will cast any reflections upon this Gentlewoman on the Score of this publication of her afflictions and deliverance. If any should, doubtless they may be reconed with the nine lepers, of whom it is said, Were there not ten cleansed where are the nine? but one returning to give God thanks. Let such further know that this was a dispensation of publick note, and of universall concernment, so much the more, by how much the nearer this Gentlewoman stood related to that faithfull Servant of God, whose capacity and employment was publick in the house of God, and his name on that account of a very sweet savor in the Churches of Christ, who is there of a true Christian spirit, that did not look upon himself much concerned in this bereavement, this Captivity in the time thereof, and in his deliverance when it came yea more then in many others; and how many are there, to whom so con-


cerned, it will doubtless be a very acceptable thing to see the way of God with this Gentlewoman in the aforesaid dispensation thus laid out and pourtrayed before their eyes. To conclude whatever any coy phantasies may deem, yet it highly concerns those that have so deeply tasted, how good the Lord is, to enquire with David. What Shall I render to the Lord for all his benefits to me: Psal. 116. 12. He thinks nothing too great: yea being sensible of his own disproportion to the due praises of God he cals in help. Oh magnify the Lord with me, let us exalt his Name togather Pls. 34. 3. And it is but reason, that our praises should hold a proportion with our prayers: and that as many hath helped together by prayer for the obtaining of his Mercy, so praises should be returned by many on this behalf; And forasmuch as not the general but particular knowledge of things make deepest impressions upon the affections, this Narrative particularizing the several passages of this providence will not a little conduce thereunto. And therefore holy David in order to the attainment of that end, accounts himself concerned to declare what God had done for his soul. Psm. 66, 16. Come and hear all ye that fear God; and I will declare what God has done for my soul ie for his life. See ver. 9, 10. He holdeth our soul in life, and suffers not our feet to be moved; for thou our God hast proved us. thou hast tryed as silver is tryed. Life mercies, are heart affecting mercies of great impression and force, to enlarge pious hearts in the praises of God, so that such know not how but to talk of God's acts and to speak of and publish his wonderfull works. Deep troubles when the waters come in unto thy soul, are wont to produce vowes: vowes must be paid, It is better not vow, than vow and not to pay; I may say, that as none knows what it is to fight and pursue such an enemy as this, but they that have fought and pursued them: so none can imagine what it is to be captivated, and enslaved to such atheisticall proud, wild, cruel, barbarous, brutish (in one word) diabolicall creatures as these, the worst of the heathen; nor what difficulties; hardships, hazards, sorrows, anxieties and perplexities do unavoidably wait upon such a condition, but those that have tried it No serious spirit then (especially knowing any thing of this Gentlewoman's piety) can imagine but that the vows of God are upon her. Excuse her then if she comes thus into publick, to pay those vows. Come and hear what she hath to say. — I am confident that no Friend of devine Providence will ever repent his time and pains spent in reading over these sheets, but will judg them worth perusing again and again. -Hear Reader, you may see an instance of the Soveraignty of God, who





doth what he will with his own as well as others; and who may say to him What dost thou? Here you may see an instance of the faith and patience of the Saints, under the most heartsinking tryals; here you may see the promises are breasts full consolation, when all the world besides is empty, and gives nothing but sorrow: That God is indeed the supream Lord of the world, ruling the most unruly, weakening the most cruel and salvage, granting his People mercy in the sight of the unmercifull, curbing the lusts of the most filthy, holding the hands of the violent, delivering the prey from the mighty, And gather together the out casts of Israel. Once and again you have heard, but hear you may see that power belongeth unto God; that our God is the God of salvation, and to him belong the issues from Death That our God is in Heaven, and doth whatever pleases him, Here you have Sampson Riddle examplified, and that great promis, Rom. 8. 28, verified, of the Eater comes forth meat, and sweetness out of the strong: worst of evils working together for the best good. How evident is it that the Lord hath made this Gentlewoman a gainer by all this affliction, that she can say, 'tis good for her yea better that she hath been then that she should not have been, thus afflicted Oh how doth God shine forth in such things as these? Reader, if thou gettest no good by such a Declaration as this, the fault must needs be thine own Read therefore, Peruse, Ponder and from hence lay up something from the experience of another against thine own turn comes, that so thou also through patience and consolation of the Scripture may yet have hope

A Narrative Of The Captivity And Restauration Of Mrs. Mary Rowlandson.

On the tenth of February, 1675, came the Indians with great numbers upon Lancaster: their first coming was about sunrising; hearing the noise of some guns, we looked out; several houses were burning, and the smoke ascending to heaven. There were five persons taken in one house, the father and mother, and a little child they knocked on the head, the other two they took and carried away alive. There were two others, who being out of their garrison upon occasion, were set upon; one was knocked on the head, the other escaped: there was who running along was shot and wounded, and fell down; he begged of them his life, promising them money (as they told me) but they would not hearken to him, but knocked him on the head, stripped him naked and split open his bowels. Another seeing many of the Indians about his barn, ventur'd and went out, but was quickly shot down. There were three others belonging to the same garrison who were killed; the Indians getting up upon the roof of the barn, had advantage to shoot down upon them over their fortifications. these murtherous wretches went on burning and destroying all before them.

At length they came and beset our house, and quickly it was the dolefulest day that ever mine eyes saw. The house stood upon the edge of a hill: some of the Indians got behind the hill, others into the barn, and others behind anything that would shelter them; from all which places they shot against the house, so that the bullets seemed to fly like hail, and quickly they wounded one man among us, and then another, then a third. About two hours (according to my observations in that amazing time) they had been about the house before they prevailed to fire it (which they did with flax and hemp, which they brought out of the barn, and their being no defence about the house, only two flankers at two opposite corners, and one of them not finished) they fired it once, and one ventured out and quenched it, but they quickly fired it again, and that took. Now is the dreadful

hour come, that I have often heard of (in time of the war as it was in case of others) but now mine eyes see it. Some in our house were fighting for their lives, others wallowing in blood, the house on fire over our heads, and the bloody heathen ready to knock us on the head if we stirred out. Now might we hear mothers and children crying out for themselves and each other, "Lord, what shall we do! I took my children (and one of my sisters took her's) to go forth and leave the house: but soon as we came to the door, and appeared, the Indians shot so thick, that the bullets rattled against the house, as if one had taken a hand full of stones and threw them, so that we were forced to give back. We had six stout dogs belonging to our garrison, but none of them would stir, though at another time, if an Indian had come to the door they were ready to fly upon him and tear him down. The Lord hereby would make us the more to acknowledge his hand, and to see that our help is always in him. But out we must go, the fire increasing, and coming along behind us roaring, and the Indians gaping before us with their guns, spears, and hatchets to devour us. No sooner were we out of the house, but my brother-in-law (being before wounded in defending the house, in or near the throat) fell down dead, whereat the Indians scornfully shouted and hallooed, and were presently upon him, stripping off his cloaths. The bullets were flying thick, one went through my side, and the same (as would seem) through the bowels and hand of my poor child in my arms. One of my elder sister's children (named William), had then his leg broke, which the Indians perceiving, they knocked him on the head. Thus were we butchered by those merciless heathens, standing amazed, with the blood running down to our heels. My eldest sister being yet in the house and seeing those woeful sights, the infidels hauling mothers one way and the children another, and some wallowing in their blood; and her eldest son telling her that her son William was dead, and that I myself was wounded, she said "Lord, let me die with them": which was no sooner said but she was struck with a bullet, and fell down dead over the threshold. I hope she is reaping the fruit of her good labours, being faithful to the service of God in her place. In her younger years she lay under much trouble upon spiritual accounts, till it pleased God to make that precious scripture take hold of her heart, 2 Cor. 12, 9. And he said unto me My grace is sufficient for thee. More than twenty years after, I have heard her tell how sweet and comfortable that place was to her. But to return: The Indians laid hold of us, pulling me one way, and the children another, and said

"Come go along with us": I told them they would kill me; they answered, If I were willing to go along with them, they would not hurt me. Oh! the doleful sight that now was to behold at this house! Come behold the works of the Lord, what desolation has he made in the earth. Of thirty-seven persons who were in this one house, none escaped either present death, or a bitter captivity, save only one, who might say as in Job 1, 15. And I only am escaped alone to tell the news. There were twelve killed, some shot, some stabbed with their spears, some knocked down with their hatchets. When we are in prosperity, Oh the little that we think of such dreadful sights, to see our dear friends and relations lie bleeding out their hearts-blood upon the ground. There was one who was chopt in the head with a hatchet, and stript naked, and yet was crawling up and down. It was a solemn sight to see so many christians lying in their blood, some here and some there, like a company of sheep torn by wolves. All of them stript naked by a company of hell-hounds, roaring, singing, ranting and insulting, as if they would have torn our hearts out: yet the Lord by his almighty power, preserved a number of us from death; for there were twenty-four of us taken alive and carried captive. I had often before this said that if the Indians should come, I should chuse rather to be killed by them than taken alive: but when it came to the trial, my mind changed; their glittering weapons so daunted my spirit that I chose rather to go along with those (as I may say) ravenous bears, than that moment to end my days. And that I may the better declare what happened to me during that grievous captivity, I shall particularly speak of the several Removes we had up and down the wilderness.

The First Remove.

Now away we must go with those barbarous creatures, and our bodies wounded and bleeding and our hearts no less than our bodies. About a mile we went that night, up upon a hill within sight of the town, where we intended to lodge. There was hard by a vacant house, (deserted by the English before, for fear of the Indians), I asked them whether I might not lodge in the house that night? to which they answered, "What, will you love Englishmen still? This was the dolefulest night that ever my eyes saw. Oh the roaring, and singing, and dancing, and yelling of those black creatures in the night, which made the place a lively remembrance of hell: And miserable was the waste

that was there made, of horses, cattle, sheep, swine, calves, lambs, roasting pigs and fowls (which they had plundered in the town) some roasting, some lying and burning, and some boiling, to feed our merciless enemies: who were joyful enough, though we were disconsolate. To add to the dolefulness of the former day, and the dismalness of the present night, my thoughts ran upon my losses and sad berieved condition. All was gone, my husband gone, (at least separated from me, he being in the Bay: and to add to my grief, the Indians told me they would kill him as he came homeward), my children gone, my relations and friends gone, house and home, and all our comforts within door and without, all was gone (except my life) and I knew not but the next moment that might go too.

There remained nothing to me but one poor wounded babe, and it seemed at present worse than death, that it was in such a pitiful condition, bespeaking compassion, and I had no refreshing for it, nor suitable things to revive it. Little do many think, what is the savageness and brutishness of this barbarous enemy, those even that seem to profess more than others among them, when the English have fallen into their hands.

Those seven that were killed at Lancaster the summer before upon a sabbath day, and the one that was afterward killed upon a week day, were slain and mangled in a barbarous manner, by One-eyed John, and Marlborough's praying Indians, which Capt. Mosely brought to Boston, as the Indians told me.

The Second Remove.

But now (the next morning) I must turn my back upon the town, and travel with them into the vast and desolate wilderness, I know not whither. It is not my tongue or pen can express the sorrows of my heart, and bitterness of my spirit, that I had at this departure: But God was with me in a wonderful manner, carrying me along and bearing up my spirit, that it did not quite fail. One of the Indians carried my poor wounded babe upon a horse; it went moaning all along, "I shall die, I shall die," I went on foot after it, with sorrow that cannot be exprest. At length I took it off the horse, and carried it in my arms till my strength failed, and I fell down with it. Then they set me upon a horse, with my wounded child in my lap, and there being no furniture upon the horse's back, as we were going down a steep hill, we both fell over the horse's head, at which they like inhuman creatures laughed,

and rejoiced to see it, though I thought we should there have ended our days, overcome with so many difficulties. But the Lord renewed my strength still, and carried me along, that I might see more of his power, yea so much that I could never have thought of, had I not experienced it.

After this it quickly began to snow, and when night came on, they stopt: and now down I must sit in the snow, by a little fire, and a few boughs behind me, with my sick child in my lap, and calling much for water, being now (through the wound) fallen into a violent fever.

My own wound also growing so stiff, that I could scarce sit down or rise up, yet so it must be, that I must sit all this cold winter night, upon the cold snowy ground, with my sick child in my arms, looking that every hour would be the last of its life; and having no christian friend near me, either to comfort or help me. Oh I may see the wonderful power of God, that my spirits did not utterly sink under my affliction; still the Lord upheld me with his gracious and merciful spirit, and we were both alive to see the light of the next morning.

The Third Remove.

The morning being come, they prepared to go on their way, one of the Indians got upon a horse and they sat me up behind him, with my poor sick babe in my lap. A very wearisome and tedious day I had of it: what with my wound, and my child being so exceeding sick, and in a lamentable condition with her wound, it may easily be judged what a poor feeble condition we were in, there being not the least crumb of refreshing that came within either of our mouths from Wednesday night to Saturday night, excepting only a little cold water. This day in the afternoon, about an hour by sun, we came to the place where they intended to stop, viz; an Indian town called Wenimesset, northward of Quabaug. When we came there, Oh the number of Pagans (now merciless enemies) that there came about me, that I may say as David, Psal. 27, 13, I had fainted unless I had believed, &c. The next day was the sabbath; I then remembered how careless I had been of God's holy time: how many sabbaths I had lost and misspent, and how evilly I, had walked in God's light; which lay so close upon my spirit, that it was easy for me to see how righteous it was with God to cut off the thread of my life, and cast me out of his presence forever. Yet the Lord still shewed mercy to me, and helped me; and as he wounded me with one hand, so he healed me with the other. This day there came to me one Robert Pepper, (a man belonging to Roxbury), who was taken at Capt. Beer's fight; and been now a considerable time with the Indians, and up with them almost as far as Albany to see King Philip, as he told me, and was now very lately come with them into these parts. Hearing, I say, that I was in this Indian town, he obtained leave to come and see me. He told me he himself was wounded in the leg at Capt. Beer's fight; and was not able some time to go, but as they carried him, and that he took oak leaves and laid them to his wound, and by the blessing of God, he was able to travel again. Then took I oak leaves and laid to my side, and with the blessing of God, it cured me also; yet before the cure was wrought, I may say as it is in Psal. 38, 5, 6. My wounds stink and are corrupt, I am troubled, I am bowed down greatly, I go mourning all the day long. I sat much alone with my poor wounded child in my lap, which moaned night and day, having nothing to revive the body, or cheer the spirits of her; but instead of that one Indian would come and tell me one hour, your master will knock your child on the head, and then a second and then a third, your master will quickly knock your child on the head.

This was the comfort I had from them; miserable comforters were they all. Thus nine days I sat upon my knees, with my babe in my lap, till my flesh was raw again. My child being even ready to depart this sorrowful world, they bid me carry it out to another wigwam; (I suppose because they would not be troubled with such spectacles;) whither I went with a very heavy heart, and down I sat with the picture of death in my lap. About two hours in the night, my sweet babe like a lamb departed this life, on Feb. 18, 1675, it being about six years and five months old. It was nine days from the first wounding in this miserable condition, without any refreshing of one nature or another, except a little cold water. I cannot but take notice, how at another time I could not bear to be in a room where a dead person was, but now the case is changed; I must and could lie down with my dead babe all the night after. I have thought since, of the wonderful goodness of God to me, in preserving me so in the use of my reason and senses, in that distressed time, that I did not use wicked and violent means to end my own miserable life. In the morning when they understood that my child was dead, they sent me home to my master's wigwam. (By my master in this writing must be understood Quannopin, who was a Sagamore, and married King Philip's wife's sister; not that he first took me, but I was sold to him by a Narraganset Indian,

who took me when I first came out of the garrison.) I went to take up my dead child in my arms to carry it with me, but they bid me let it alone. There was no resisting, but go I must, and leave it. When I had been a while at my master's wigwam, I took the first opportunity I could get, to go look after my dead child. When I came I asked them what they had done with it? they told me it was on the hill; then they went and showed me where it was, where I saw the ground was newly digged, and where they told me they had buried it; there I left that child in the wilderness, and must commit it and myself also in this wilderness condition, to Him who is above all, God having taken away this dear child, I went to see my daughter Mary, who was at the same Indian town, at a wigwam not very far off, though we had little liberty or opportunity to see one another; she was about ten years old, and taken from the door at first by a praying Indian, and afterwards sold for a gun. When I came in sight she would fall a weeping, at which they were provoked, and would not let me come near her, but bid me be gone; which was a heart-cutting word to me. I had one child dead, another in the wilderness, I knew not where, the third they would not let me come near to: Me (as he said) have ye bereaved of my children: Joseph is not, and Simeon is not, and ye will take Benjamin also, all these things are against me. I could not sit still in this condition, but kept walking from one place to another. And as I was going along my heart was even overwhelmed with the thoughts of my condition, and that I should have children, and a nation that I knew not ruled over them. Whereupon I earnestly entreated the Lord that he would consider my low estate and shew me a token for good, and if it were His blessed will, some sign and hope of some relief. And indeed quickly the Lord answered in some measure, my poor prayer; For as I was going up and down mourning and lamenting my condition, my son came to me and asked me how I did? I had not seen him before, since the destruction of the town; and I knew not where he was, till I was informed by himself, that he was amongst a smaller parcel of Indians, whose place was about six miles off. With tears in his eyes he asked me whether his sister Sarah was dead? and told me he had seen his sister Mary; and prayed me that I would not be troubled in reference to himself. The occasion of his coming to see me at this time was this: There was, as I said, about six miles from us a small plantation of Indians; where it seems he had been during his captivity; and at this time, there were some forces of the Indians gathered out of our company, and some also from them (amongst whom,

was my son's master) to go to assault and burn Medfield: In this time of his master's absence, his dame brought him to see me. I took this to be some gracious answer to my earnest and unfeigned desire. The next day the Indians returned from Medfield; (all the company, for those that belonged to the other and smaller company came through the town that now we were at). But before they came to us, Oh, the outrageous roaring and hooping that there was! They began their din about a mile before they came to us. By their noise and hooping they signified how many they had destroyed; which was at that time twenty-Those that were with us at home were gathered together as soon as they heard the hooping, and every time that the other went over their number, these at home gave a shout, that the very earth rang again. And thus they continued till those that had been upon the expedition were come up to the Saggamore's wigwam; and then, Oh, the hideous insulting and triumphing that there was over some Englishmen's scalps that they had taken (as their manner is) and brought with them. I cannot but take notice of the wonderful mercy of God to me in those afflictions, in sending me a Bible. One of the Indians that came from Medfield light, and had brought some plunder, came to me, and asked me if I would have a Bible, he had got in his basket? I was glad of it, and asked him if he thought the Indians would let me read? He answered yes; so I took the Bible, and in that melancholy time, it came into my mind to read first the 28 chap. of Deuteronomy, which I did, and when I had read it, my dark heart wrought on this manner, that there was no mercy for me, that the blessings were gone, and the curses came in their room, and that I had lost my opportunity. But the Lord helped me still to go on reading till I came to ch. 30, the seven first verses; where I found there was mercy promised again, if we would return to him, by repentance: and though we were scattered from one end of the earth to the other, yet the Lord would gather us together, and turn all those curses upon our enemies. to live to forget this scripture, and what comfort it was to me.

Now the Indians began to talk of removing from this place, some one way and some another. There were now besides myself nine English captives in this place, (all of them children except one woman). I got an opportunity to go and take my leave of them, they being to go one way and I another. I asked them whether they were earnest with God for deliverance? They told me they did as they were able, and it was some comfort to me that the Lord stirred up children to look to him. The woman, viz: goodwife Joslin told me she should never see

me again, and that she could find in her heart to run away by any means, for we were near thirty miles from any English town, and she with a child in her arms two years old, and bad rivers there were to go over, and we were feeble with our poor and course entertainments. I had my Bible with me, I pulled it out, and asked her whether she would read; we opened the Bible, and lighted on Psal. 27, in which Psalm we especially took notice of that verse, Wait on the Lord, be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart, wait I say on the Lord.

The Fourth Remove.

And now must I part with the little company I had. Here I parted with my daughter Mary (whom I never saw again till I saw her in Dorchester, returned from captivity) and from four little cousins and neighbours, some of which I never saw afterward, the Lord only knows the end of them. Among them also was that poor woman before mentioned, who came to a sad end, as some of the company told me in my travel: She having much grief upon her spirits about her miserable condition, she would be often asking the Indians to let her go home; they not being willing to that, and yet vexed with her importunity gathered a great company together about her, and stripped her naked, and set her in the midst of them; and when they had sung and danced about her (in their hellish manner) as long as they pleased, they knocked her on the head, and the child in her arms with her. When they had done that, they made a fire and put them both into it, and told the other children that were with them, that if they attempted to go home they would serve them in like manner. The children said she did not shed one tear, but prayed all the while. But to return to my own journey: We traveled about half a day, or a little more, and came to a desolate place in the wilderness, where there were no wigwams or inhabitants before; we came about the middle of the afternoon to this place; cold, wet and snowy, and hungry, and weary, and no refreshing for man, but the cold ground to sit on, and our poor Indian cheer.


Heart-aching thoughts here I had about my poor children, who were scattered up and down among the wild beasts of the forests. My head was light and dizzy (either through hunger or bad lodging, or trouble, or all together). My knees feeble, my body raw by sitting double night and day, that I cannot express to man the affliction that lay upon my spirit, but the Lord helped me at that time to express it to himself.

I opened my Bible to read, and the Lord brought that precious scripture to me Jer. 31, 16. Thus saith the Lord, refrain thy voice from weeping, and thine eyes from tears, for thy work shall be rewarded, and they shall come again from the land of the enemy. This was a sweet cordial to me; when I was ready to faint, many and many a time have I sat down and wept sweetly over this scripture. At this place we continued about four days.

The Fifth Remove.

The occasion (as I thought of their removing at this time, was the English army's being near and following them: For they went as if they had gone for their lives, for some considerable way; and then they made a stop, and chose out some of their stoutest men, and sent them back to hold the English army in play whilst the rest escaped; and then like Jehu they marched on furiously, with their old and young; some carried their old, decriped mothers, some carried one, and some another. Four of them carried a great Indian upon a bier; but going through a thick wood with him they were hindered, and make no haste; whereupon they took him upon their backs, and carried him one at a time, till we came to Bacquag river. Upon Friday, a little after noon we came to this river. When all the company was come up and were gathered together, I thought to count the number of them, but they were so many and being somewhat in motion, it was beyond my skill. In this travel, because of my wound, I was somewhat favoured in my load: I carried only my knitting-work, and two quarts of parched meal. Being very faint, I asked my mistress to give me one spoonful of the meal, but she would not give me a taste. They quickly fell to cutting dry trees, to make rafts to carry them over the river, and soon my turn came to go over. By the advantage of some brush which they laid upon the raft to sit on, I did not wet my foot (while many of themselves at the other end were mid-leg deep), which cannot but be acknowledged as a favor of God to my weakened body, it being a very cold time. I was not before acquainted with such kind of doings or dangers. When thou passest through the waters I will be with thee, and through the rivers they shall not overflow thee. Isai. 43, 2. A certain number of us got over the river that night, but it was the night after the Sabbath before all the company was got over. On Saturday they boiled an old horse's leg (which they had got) and so we drank of the broth as soon as they





thought it was ready, and when it was almost all gone they filled it up again. The first week of my being among them, I hardly eat anything; the second week I found my stomach grow very faint for want of something, and yet it was very hard to get down their filthy trash; but the third week (though I could think how formerly my stomach would turn against this or that and would starve and die before I would eat such things, yet) they were pleasant and savoury to my taste. I was at this time knitting a pair of white cotton stockings for my mistress, and I had not yet wrought upon the Sabbath day. When the Sabbath came they bid me go to work; I told them it was Sabbath day, and desired them to let me rest, and told them I would as much more work to-morrow; to which they answered me they would break my face. And here I cannot but take notice of the strange Providence of God in preserving the heathen: They were many hundreds, old and young, some sick and some lame; many had Papooses at their backs; the greatest numbers at this time with us were Squaws, and they traveled with all they had, bag and baggage, and yet they got over this river aforesaid; and on Monday they sat their wigwams on fire, and away they went; on that very day came the English army after them to this river, and saw the smoke of their wigwams and yet this river put a stop to them. God did not give them courage or activity to go after us. We were not ready for so great a mercy as victory and deliverance; if we had been, God would have found out a way for the English to have passed this river, as well as for the Indians with their Squaws and children, and all their luggage. Oh that my people had hearkened unto me, and Israel had walked in my ways, I should soon have subdued their enemies, and turned my hand against their adversaries. Psal. 81, 13, 14.

The Sixth Remove.

On Monday (as I said) they set their wigwams on fire, and went away. It was a cold morning, and before us there was a great brook with ice on it. Some waded through it up to the knees and higher, but others went till they came to a beaver-dam, and I amongst them, where, through the good Providence of God, I did not wet my foot. I went along that day mourning and lamenting (leaving farther my own country, and traveling farther into the vast and howling wilderness) and I understood something of Lot's wife's temptation, when she looked back. We came that day to a great swamp, by the side of which we

took up our lodging that night. When we came to the brow of the hill that looked toward the swamp, I thought we had come to a great Indian town, (though there were none but our own company) the Indians were as thick as the trees; it seemed as if there had been a thousand hatchets going at once. If one looked before one, there was nothing but Indians, and behind one nothing but Indians; and so on either hand; and I myself in the midst, and no christian soul near me, and yet how hath the Lord preserved me in safety! Oh the experience that I have had of the goodness of God to me and mine!

The Seventh Remove.

After a restless and hungry night there, we had a wearisome time of it the next day. The swamp by which we lay, was as it were a deep dungeon, and an exceeding high and steep hill before it. Before I got to the top of the hill, I thought my heart and legs and all would have broken, and failed me. What through faintness and soreness of body, it was a grievous day of travel to me. As we went along. I saw a place where English cattle had been, that was a comfort to me, such as it was. Quickly after that we came to an English path, which so took me, that I thought I could there have freely lien down and died. That day, a little after noon, we came to Squaheag, where the Indians quickly spread themselves over the deserted English fields, gleaning what they could find; some picked up ears of wheat that were crickled down, some found ears of Indian corn, some found ground-nuts, and others sheaves of wheat that were frozen together in the shock, and went to threshing of them out. Myself got two ears of Indian corn, and whilst I did but turn my back, one of them was stole from me, which much troubled me. There came an Indian to them at that time, with a basket of horse-liver. I asked him to give me a piece: What (says he) can you eat horse-liver? I told him I would try, if he would give me a piece, which he did; and I laid it on the coals to roast, but before it was half ready, they got half of it away from me; so that I was forced to take the rest and eat it as it was, with the blood about my mouth, and yet a savory bit it was to me; for to the hungry soul every bitter thing was sweet. A solemn sight methought it was, to see whole fields of wheat and Indian corn forsaken and spoiled, and the remainder of them to be food for our merciless enemies. That night we had a mess of wheat for supper.

The Eighth Remove.

On the morrow morning we must go over Connecticut River to meet with King Philip; two canoes full they had carried over, the next turn myself was to go; but as my foot was upon the canoe to step in, there was a sudden out-cry among them, and I must step back; and instead of going over the river, I must go four or five miles up the river farther northward. Some of the Indians ran one way, and some another. The cause of this rout was as I thought, their espying some English scouts, who was thereabouts. In this travel up the river, about noon the company made a stop, and sat down, some to eat and others to rest them. As I sat amongst them musing on things past, my son Joseph came to me. We asked of each others welfare, bemoaning our doleful condition, and the change that had come upon us; We had husband and father, and children, and sisters, and friends, and relations, and house and home, and many comforts of this life; but now we might say as Job. The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away, blessed be the name of the Lord. I asked him whether he would read? he told me he earnestly desired it. I gave him my Bible, and he lighted upon that comfortable scripture, Psalm 118, 17, 18. I shall not die but live, and declare the works of the Lord; The Lord hath chastened me sore, yet he hath not given me over to death. "Look here mother (says he) did you read this?" And here I may take occasion to mention one principal ground of my setting forth these lines, even as the Psalmist says, to declare the works of the Lord, and his wonderful power in carrying us along, preserving us in the wilderness, while under the enemy's hand, and returning of us in safety again; and his goodness in bringing to my hand so many comfortable and suitable scriptures in my distress.

But to return: We traveled on till night, and in the morning we must go over the river to Philip's crew. When I was in the canoe, I could not but be amazed at the numerous crew of Pagans that were on the bank on the other side. When I came ashore, they gathered all about me, I sitting alone in the midst: I observed they asked one another questions and laughed, and rejoiced over their gains and victories. Then my heart began to fail and I fell a weeping; which was the first time to my remembrance that I had wept before them; although I had met with so much affliction, and my heart was many times ready to break, yet could I not shed one tear in their sight, but rather had been all this while in a maze, and like one as on ished; but now I may say as Psal. 137, 1. By the river of Babylon, there we sat

down, yea we wept, when we remembered Zion. There one of them asked me why I wept? I could hardly tell what to say; yet I answered, they would kill me: No, said he, none will hurt you. Then came one of them, and gave me two spoonfuls of meal (to comfort me) and another gave me half a pint of peas, which was worth more than many bushels at another time. Then I went to see King Philip: he bid me come in, and sit down; and asked me whether I would smoke it? (a usual compliment now a days among the saints and sinners); but this no ways suited me. For though I had formerly used tobacco, yet I had left it ever since I was first taken. It seems to be a bait the devil lays to make men lose their precious time. I remember with shame how formerly, when I had taken two or three pipes, I was presently ready for another; such a bewitching thing it is. But I thank God he has now given me power over it; surely there are many who may be better employed, than to sit sucking a stinking tobacco pipe.

Now the Indians gathered their forces to go against Northampton. Over night one went yelling and hooting to give notice of the design. Whereupon they went to boiling of ground-nuts, and parching corn (as many as had it) for their provision; and in the morning away they went. During my abode in this place, Philip spake to me to make a shirt for his boy, which I did; for which he gave me a shilling. I offered the money to my mistress, but she bid me keep it, and with it I bought a piece of horse-flesh. Afterward he asked me to make a cap for his boy, for which he invited me to dinner; I went and he gave me a pancake, about as big as his two fingers; it was made of parched wheat beaten and fried in bear's grease, but I thought I never tasted pleasanter meat in my life. There was a Squaw who spake to me to make a shirt for her Sannup: for which she gave me a piece of beef. Another asked me to knit a pair of stockings, for which she gave me a quart of peas. I boiled my peas and beef together, and invited my master and mistress to dinner; but the proud gossip because I served them both in one dish, would eat nothing, except one bit that he gave her upon the point of his knife. Hearing that my son was come to this place, I went to see him, and found him lying flat on the ground; I asked him how he could sleep so? he answered me, that he was not asleep, but at prayer; and that he lay so, that they might not know what he was doing. I pray God he may remember these things now he is returned in safety. At this place (the sun now getting higher) what with the beams and heat of the sun, and the smoke of the

wigwams, I thought I should have been blinded. I could scarce discern one wigwam from another. There was one Mary Thurston of Medfield, who seeing how it was with me, lent me a hat to wear; but as soon as I was gone, the squaw that owned Mary Thurston came running after me, and got it away again; Here was a Squaw who gave me a spoonful of meal, I put it in my pocket to keep it safe, yet notwithstanding somebody stole it, but put five Indian corns in the room of it; which were the greatest provision I had in my travel for one day.

The Indians returning from Northampton brought with them some horses, and sheep and other things which they had taken: I desired them that they would carry me to Albany upon one of those horses, and sell me for powder; for so they had sometime discoursed. I was utterly helpless of getting home on foot, the way that I came. I could hardly bear to think of the many weary steps I had taken to this place.

The Ninth Remove.

But instead of either going to Albany or homeward, we must go five miles up river and then go over it. Here we abode a while. Here lived a sorry Indian, who spake to me to make him a shirt; when I had done it, he could pay me nothing for it. But he living near by the river side, when I often went to fetch water, I would often be putting him in mind, and calling for my pay; at last he told me if I would make another shirt for a Papoos not yet born, he would give me a knife, which he did, when I had done it. I carried the knife in, and my master asked me to give it him, and I was not a little glad that I had anything that they would accept of and be pleased with. When we were at this place, my master's maid came home; she had been gone three weeks into the Narragansett country to fetch corn, where they had stored up some in the ground. She brought home about a peck and a half of corn. This was about the time that their great Captain (Naonanto) was killed in the Narragansett country.

My son being now about a mile from me, I asked liberty to go and see him, they bid me go, and away I went; but quickly lost myself, travelling over hills and through swamps, and could not find the way to him. And I cannot but admire at the wonderful power and goodness of God to me, in that though I was gone from home and met all sorts of Indians, and those I had no knowledge of, and there being no christian soul near me, yet no one of them offered the least imaginable mis-

carriage to me. I turned homeward again, and met with my master, and he showed me the way to my son. When I came to him, I found him not well; and with all, he had a boil on his side, which troubled him much. We bemoaned one another a while, as the Lord helped us, and then I returned again. When I was returned, I found myself as unsatisfied as I was before, I went up and down mourning and lamenting, and my spirit was ready to sink, with the thoughts of my poor children. My son not well; and I could not but think of his mournful looks, having no christian friend near him, to do my office of love to him, either for soul or body. And my poor girl, I knew not where she was, nor whether she was sick or well, alive or dead. I repaired under these thoughts to my Bible (my great comforter at that time), and that Scripture came to my hand, Cast thy burthen upon the Lord, and he shall sustain thee.

But I was fain to go look after something to satisfy my hunger; and going among the wigwams, I went into one and there found a Squaw who shewed herself very kind to me, and gave me a piece of bear. put it into my pocket and came home; but could not find an opportunity to broil it, for fear they should get it from me; and there it lay all the day and night in my stinking pocket. In the morning I went again to the same Squaw, who had a kettle of ground-nuts boiling: I asked her to let me boil my piece of bear in the kettle, which she did, and gave me some ground-nuts to eat with it, and I cannot but think how pleasant it was to me. I have sometimes seen bear baked handsomely amongst the English, and some liked it, but the thoughts that it was bear, made me tremble. But now that was savoury to me that one would think was enough to turn the stomach of a brute creature. One bitter cold day, I could find no room to sit down before the fire: I went out, and could not tell what to do, but I went into another wigwam, where they were also sitting around the fire: but the Squaw laid a skin for me, and bid me sit down, and gave me some ground-nuts, and bid me come again; and told me they would buy me if they were able; and yet these were strangers to me that I never knew before.

The Tenth Remove.

That day a small part of the campany removed about three quarters of a mile, intending to go farther the next day. When they came to the place where they intended to lodge, and had pitched their wigwams, being hungry, I went again back to the place we were before at,

to get something to eat; being encouraged by the Squaw's kindness, who bid me come again. When I was there, there came an Indian to look after me; who when he had found me, kicked me all along. I went home and found venison roasting that night, but they would not give me one bit of it. Sometimes I met with favours, and sometimes nothing but frowns.

The Eleventh Remove.

The next day in the morning they took their travel intending a day's journey up the river; I took my load at my back, and quickly we came to wade over a river, and passed over tiresome and wearisome hills. One hill was so steep, that I was fain to creep up upon my knees, and to hold by the twigs and bushes to keep myself from falling backward. My head also was so light that I usually reeled as I went. But I hope all those wearisome steps that I have taken, are but a forwarding of one to the heavenly rest. I know, O Lord that thy judgments are right, and that thou in faithfulness hast afflicted me. Psalm 119, 75.

The Twelfth Remove.

It was upon a Sabbath day morning, that they prepared for their travel. This morning I asked my master whether he would sell me to my husband? he answered nux; which did much rejoice my spirit. My mistress, before we went, was gone to the burial of a Papoos, and returning she found me sitting, reading my Bible; she snached it hastily out of my hand and threw it out of doors; I ran and catcht it up, and put it into my pocket, and never let her see it afterwards. Then they packed up their things to be gone, and gave me my load; I complained it was too heavy, whereupon she gave me a slap on the face, and bid me begone. I lifted up my heart to God, hoping that redemption was not far off; and the rather because their insolence grew worse and worse.

But thought of going homeward (for so we bent our course) much cheered my spirit, and made my burden seem light, and almost nothing at all. But (to my amazement and great perplexity) the scale was soon turned; for when we had got a little way, on a sudden my mistress gave out she would go no farther, but turn back again, and said I

must go back again with her, and she called her Sannup, and would have had him go back also, but he would not; but said he would go on and come to us again in three days. My spirit was upon this (I confess) very impatient, and almost outrageous. I thought I could as well have died as went back. I cannot declare the trouble I was in about it; but back again I must go. As soon as I had opportunity, I took my Bible to read, and quieting scripture came to my hand Psalm 46, 10. Be still and know that I am God. Which stilled my spirit for the present: but a sore time of trial I concluded I had to go through. My master being gone, who seemed to me the best friend I had of an Indian, both in cold and hunger, and quickly so it proved. Down I sat with my heart as full as it could hold, and yet so hungry, that I could not sit neither; but going out to see what I could find, and walking among the trees, I found six acorns and two chesnuts, which were some refreshment to me. Towards night I gathered me some sticks for my own comfort, that I might not lie cold; but when we came to lie down, they bid me go out, and lie somewhere else, for they had company: (they said more than their own): I told them I could not tell where to go, they bid me go look: I told them, if I went to another wigwam they would be angry, and send me home again. Then one of the company drew his sword, and told me he would run me through if I did not go presently. Then was I fain to stoop to this rude fellow, and go out in the night, I knew not whither. Mine eyes hath seen that fellow afterwards walking up and down in Boston, under the appearance of a friendly Indian, and several others of a like cut. I went to one wigwam, and they told me they had no room. Then I went to another, and they said the same. At last an old Indian bid me come to him, and his Squaw gave me some groundnuts; she gave me also something to lay under my head, and a good fire we had. Through the providence of God, I had a comfortable lodging that night. In the morning another Indian bid me come at night and he would give me six ground-nuts, which I did. We were at this place and time about two miles from Connecticut River. We went in the morning (to gather ground-nuts) to the river, and went back at night. I went with a great load at my back (for they when they went, tho' but a little way, would carry all their trumpery with them); I told them the skin was off my back, but I had no other comforting answer from them than this, that it would be no matter if my head was off too.

The Thirteenth Remove.

Instead of going towards the Bay (which was what I desired) I must go with them five or six miles down the river, into a mighty thicket of brush, where we abode almost a fortnight. Here one asked me to make a shirt for her Papoos for which she gave me a mess of broth, which was thickened with meal made of the bark of a tree; and to make it better, she had put into it about a handful of peas, and a few roasted ground-nuts. I had not seen my son a pretty while, and here was an Indian of whom I made enquiry after him, and asked him when he saw him? He answered me, that such a time his master roasted him, and he himself did eat a piece of him as big as his two fingers, and that he was very good meat. But the Lord upheld my spirit under this discouragement: and I considered their horrible addictedness to lying, and that there is not one of them that makes the least conscience of speaking the truth.

In this place, one cold night, as I lay by the fire, I removed a stick which kept the heat from me, a Squaw moved it down again, at which I looked up, and she threw a handful of ashes in my face; I thought I should have been quite blinded and never have seen more: But lying down, the water ran out of my eyes, and carried the dirt with it, that by the morning I recovered my sight again. Yet upon this, and the like occasions I hope it is not too much to say with Job, Have pity upon me, have pity upon me, O ye my friends, for the hand of the Lord has touched me. And here I cannot but remember how many times sitting in their wigwams, and musing on things past, I should suddenly leap up and run out, as if I had been at home, forgetting where I was, and what was my condition, but when I was without, and saw nothing but wilderness and woods, and a company of barbarous Heathen, my mind quickly returned to me, which made me think of that, spoken concerning Samson, who said, I will go out and shake myself as at other times, but he wist not that the Lord was departed from him.

About this time I began to think that all my hopes of restoration would come to nothing. I thought of the English army, and hoped for their coming, and being retaken by them, but they failed. I hoped to be carried to Albany, as the Indians had discoursed, but that failed also. I thought of being sold to my husband, as my master spake; but instead of that my master himself was gone, and I left behind, so that my spirit was now quite ready to sink. I asked them to let me go out and pick up some sticks, that I might get alone and pour out

my heart unto the Lord. Then also I took my Bible to read, but I found no comfort here neither, yet I can say, in all my sorrows and afflictions, God did not leave me to have any impatient work towards himself, as if his ways were unrighteous; but I knew that he laid upon me less than I deserved. Afterward, before this doleful time ended with me, I was turning the leaves of my Bible, and the Lord brought to me some scripture which did a little revive me, as that, Psa. 55, 8. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are my ways your ways, saith the Lord. And also that Psalm 37, 5. Commit thy ways unto the Lord, trust also in him, and he shall bring it to pass.

About this time they came yelping from Hadley, having there killed three Englishmen, and brought one captive with them, viz. Thomas Read. They all gathered about the poor man, asking him many questions. I desired also to go and see him; and when I came he was crying bitterly, supposing they would quickly kill him. Whereupon I asked one of them, whether they intended to kill him; he answered me they would not. He being a little cheered with that, I asked him about the welfare of my husband; he told me he saw him such a time in the Bay, and he was well, but very melancholy. By which I certainly understood (though I suspected it before) that whatever the Indians told me respecting him, was vanity and lies. Some of them told me he was dead, and they had killed him. Some said he was married again, and that the governor wished him to marry, and told him that he should have his choice, and that all persuaded him I was dead. So like were these barbarous creatures to him who was a liar from the beginning.

As I was sitting once in the wigwam here, Philip's maid came with the child in her arms, and asked me to give her a piece off my apron, to make a flap for it; I told her I would not, then my mistress bid me give it, but I still said no. The maid told me, if I would not give her a piece she would tear a piece off it; I told her I would tear her coat then; with that my mistress rises up, and takes up a stick big enough to have killed me, and struck at me with it, but I stept out, and she struck the stick into the mat of the wigwam. But while she was pulling it out, I ran to the maid and gave her all my apron; and so that storm went over.

Hearing that my son was come to this place I went to see him and told him his father was well, but very melancholy. He told me he was as much grieved for his father as for himself. I wondered at his speech, for I thought I had enough upon my spirit, in reference to myself, to

make me mindless of my husband, and every one else, they being safe among their friends. He told me also, that a while before, his master (together with other Indians) were going to the French for powder, but by the way the Mohawks met with them and killed four of their company, which made the rest turn back again; for which I desire that myself and he may ever bless the Lord; for it might have been worse with him, had he been sold to the French, than it proved to be in his remaining with the Indians.

I went to see an English youth in this place, one John Gilbert, of Springfield. I found him lying without doors upon the ground. I asked him how he did; he told me he was very sick of a flux with eating so much blood. They had turned him out of the wigwam, and with him an Indian papoos, almost dead, whose parents had been killed, in a bitter cold day, without fire or clothes. The young man himself had nothing on but his shirt and waistcoat. This sight was enough to melt a heart of flint. There they lay quivering in the cold, the youth round like a dog, the Papoos stretched out, with his eyes, nose, and mouth full of dirt, and yet alive, and groaning. I advised John to go and get some fire; he told me he could not stand, but I persuaded him still, lest he should lie there and die. And with much ado I got him to a fire, and went myself home. As soon as I got home, his master's daughter came after me to know what I had done with the Englishman? I told her I had got him to a fire in such a place. Now had I need to pray Paul's prayer, 2 Thess. 3, 2. That we may be delivered from unreasonable and wicked men. For her satisfaction I went along with her, and brought her to him; but before I got home again, it was noised about, that I was running away and getting the English youth along with me. As soon as I came in, they began to rant and domineer, asking me where I had been, and what I had been doing? and saying they would knock me on the head; I told them I had been seeing the English youth, and that I would not run away. They told me I lied, and getting up a hatchet they came to me, and said they would knock me down if I stirred out again; and so confined me to the wigwam. Now may I say with David, 2 Sam. 24, 14. I am in a great strait. If I keep in, I must die with hunger; and if I go out I must be knocked on the head. This distressed condition held that day and half the next; and then the Lord remembered me, whose mercies are great. Then came an Indian to me with a pair of stockings which were too big for him, and he would have me ravel them out, and knit them fit for him. I showed myself willing, and bid him ask

my mistress if I might go along with him a little way? She said yes I might: I was not a little refreshed with that news, that I had my liberty again. Then I went along with him, and he gave me some roasted ground-nuts, which did again revive my feeble stomach.

Being got out of her sight, I had time and liberty again to look into my Bible, which was my guide by day, and pillow by night. Now that comfortable scripture presented itself to me: Isa. 45, 7. For a small moment have I forsaken thee, but with great mercies will I gather thee. Thus the Lord carried me along from one time to another, and made good to me this precious promise, and many others. Then my son came to see me and I asked his master to let him stay a while with me, that I might comb his head, and look over him for he was almost overcome with lice. He told me when I was done, that he was very hungry, but I had nothing to relieve him, but bid him go into the wigwams as he went along, and see if he could get anything among them, which he did, and (it seems) tarried too long, for his master was angry with him, and beat him and then sold him. Then he came running to tell me he had a new master, and that he had given him some ground-nuts already. Then I went along with him to his new master, who told me he loved him, and he should not want. So his master carried him away, and I never saw him afterward, till I saw him at Piscataqua in Portsmouth.

That night they bid me go out of the wigwam again. My mistress's Papoos was sick, and it died that night: and there was one benefit in it, that there was more room. I went to a wigwam and they bid me come in, and gave me a skin to lie upon, and a mess of venison and ground-nuts, which was a choice dish among them. On the morrow they buried the Papoos; and afterward, both morning and evening, there came a company to mourn and howl with her: Though I confess I could not much condole with them. Many sorrowful days I had in this place; often getting alone, like a crane or a swallow, so did I chatter; I did mourn as a dove, mine eyes fail with looking upward. O Lord I am oppressed, undertake for me. Isa. 38, 14. I could tell the Lord as Hezekiah, Ver. 3, Remember now O Lord I beseech the, how I have walked before thee in truth. Now had I time to examine all my ways. My conscience did not accuse me of unfaithfulness towards one or another; yet I saw how in my walk with God, I had been a careless creature. As David said, Against thee only have I sinned. And I might say with the poor publican, God be merciful to me a sinner. Upon the Sabbath days I could look upon

the sun, and think how people were going to the house of God to have their souls refreshed, and then home and their bodies also; but I was destitute of both, and might say as the poor prodigal, He would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the swine did eat, and no man gave unto him. Luke 15, 16. For I must say with him, Father I have sinned against Heaven and in thy sight. Vers. 21. I remember how on the night before and after the Sabbath, when my family was about me, and relations and neighbors with us, we could pray and sing, and refresh our bodies with the good creatures of God, and then have a comfortable bed to lie down on; but instead of all this, I had only a little swill for the body, and then like a swine, must lie down on the ground. I cannot express to man the sorrow that lay upon my spirit, the Lord knows it. Yet that comfortable scripture would often come to my mind. For a small moment have I forsaken thee, but with great mercies will I gather thee.

The Fourteenth Remove.

Now must we pack up and be gone from this thicket, bending our course toward the bay-towns. I having nothing to eat by the way this day, but a few crumbs of cake, that an Indian gave my girl, the same day we were taken. She gave it to me, and I put it into my pocket: There it lay, till it was mouldy (for want of good baking) that one could not tell what it was made of; it fell all into crumbs, and grew so hard and dry, that it was like little flints; and this refreshed me many times, when I was ready to faint. It was in my thoughts when I put it to my mouth, that if ever I returned I would tell the world, what a blessing the Lord gave to such mean food. As we went along, they killed a deer, with a young one; they gave me a piece of the fawn, and it was so young and tender, that one might eat the bones as well as the flesh, and yet I thought it very good. When night came on, we sat down; it rained, but they quickly got up a bark wigwam, where I lay dry that night. I looked out in the morning, and many of them had lien in the rain all night, I saw by their reaking. Thus the Lord dealt mercifully with me many times, and I fared better than many of them. In the morning they took the blood of the deer, and put it in the paunch and so boiled it: I could eat nothing of that though they eat it sweetly. And yet they were so nice in other things, that when I had fetched water, and had put the dish I dipped the water with into

the kettle of water which I brought, they would say they would knock me down, for they said it was a sluttish trick.

The Fifteenth Remove.

We went on our travel. I having got a handful of ground-nuts for my support that day. They gave me my load and I went on cheerfully (with the thoughts of going homeward) having my burthen more upon my back than my spirit. We came to Baquag river again that day, near which we abode a few days. Sometimes one of them would give me a pipe, another a little tobacco, another a little salt, which I would change for victuals. I cannot but think what a wolvish appetite persons have in a starving condition; for many times, when they gave me that which was hot, I was so greedy, that I should burn my mouth, that it would trouble me many hours after, and yet I should quickly do the like again. And after I was thoroughly hungry, I was never again satisfied. For though it sometimes fell out that I had got enough, and did eat till I could eat no more; yet I was as unsatisfied as I was when I began. And now could I see that scripture verified, there being many scriptures that we do not take notice of, or understand till we are afflicted, Mic. 6, 14. Thou shalt eat and not be satisfied. Now might I see more than ever before, the miseries that sin hath brought upon us. Many times I should be ready to run out against the heathen, but that scripture would quiet me again, Amos 3, 6. Shall there be evil in the city, and the Lord hath not done it. The Lord help me to make a right improvement of His word, and that I might learn that great lesson. Mic. 6. 8, 9. He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good, and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and love mercy, and walk humbly with thy God? Hear ye the rod, and who hath appointed it.

The Sixteenth Remove.

We began this remove by wading over Baquag River. The water was up to our knees, and the stream very swift, and so cold, that I thought it would cut me in sunder. I was so weak and feeble, that I reeled as I went along, and thought there I must end my days at last, after my bearing and getting through so many difficulties. The Indians stood laughing to see me staggering along, but in my distress, the Lord gave me experience of the truth and goodness of that promise.

Psa. 43, 2. When thou passest through the waters I will be with thee, and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee. Then I sat down to put on my stockings and shoes, with the tears running down my eyes, and many sorrowful thoughts in my heart. But I got up to go along with them. Quickly there came up to us an Indian who informed them that I must go to Wachuset to my master, for there was a letter come from the council to the Saggamores about redeeming the captives, and that there would be another in 14 days, and that I must be there ready. My heart was so heavy before, that I could scarce speak, or go in the path; and yet now so light I could run. My strength seemed to come again, and recruit my feeble knees, and aching heart; yet it pleased them to go but one mile that night, and there we stayed two days. In that time came a company of Indians to us near thirty, all on horse-back. My heart skipt within me, thinking they had been Englishmen, at the first sight of them; for they were dressed in English apparel with hats, white neck-cloths, and sashes about their waists, and ribbons upon their shoulders: But when they came near, there was a vast difference between the lovely faces of Christians and the foul looks of those heathen, which much damped my spirits again.

The Seventeenth Remove.

A comfortable remove it was to me, because of my hopes. They gave me my pack and along we went cheerfully; but quickly my will proved more than my strength; having had little or no refreshment, my strength failed, and my spirits were almost quite gone. Now may I say as David, Psal. 109, 22–24. I am poor and needy, and my heart is wounded within me. I am gone like the shadow when it declineth: My knees are weak through fasting, and my flesh faileth of fatness.

At night we came to an Indian town, and the Indians sat down by a wigwam discoursing, but I was almost spent, and could scarce speak. I laid down my load, and went into the wigwam, and there sat an Indian boiling of horse-feet (they being wont to eat the flesh first, and when the feet were old and dried, and they had nothing else, they would cut off the feet and use them). I asked him to give me a little of his broth, or water they were boiling in: He took a dish and gave me one spoonful of samp, and bid me take as much of the broth as I would. Then I put some of the hot water to the samp, and drank it and my spirits came again. He gave me also a piece of the ruffle or ridding of the small guts, and I broiled it on the coals, and now I may say

with Jonathan, see I pray you, how mine eyes are enlightened because I tasted a little of this honey. 1 Sam. 14, 20. Now is my spirit revived again; though means be never so inconsiderable, yet if the Lord bestow his blessing upon them, they shall refresh both soul and body.

The Eighteenth Remove.

We took up our packs, and along we went. But a wearisome day I had of it. As we went along. I saw an Englishman stripped naked and lying dead upon the ground, but knew not who he was. Then we came to another Indian town, where we stayed all night. In this town, there were four English children captives, and one of them my own sister's. I went to see how she did, and she was well, considering her captive condition. I would have tarried that night with her, but they that owned her would not suffer it. Then I went to another wigwam, where they were boiling corn and beans, which was a lovely sight to me, but I could not get a taste thereof. Then I went into another wigwam, where there were two of the English children: The Squaw was boiling horses' feet, she cut me off a little piece, and gave one of the English children a piece also. Being very hungry, I had quickly eat up mine; but the child could not bite it, it was so tough and sinewy, but lay sucking, knawing and slabbering of it in the mouth and hand, then I took it of the child, and eat it myself, and savory it was to my taste. That I may say as Job, 6, 7. The things that my soul refuseth to touch, are as my sorrowful meat. Thus the Lord made that pleasant and refreshing, which another time would have been an abomination. Then I went home to my mistress' wigwam, and they told me I disgraced my master with begging, and if I did so any more, they would knock me on the head: I told them I had as good do that as starve to death.

The Nineteenth Remove.

They said when we went out, that we must travel to Wachuset this day. But a bitter weary day I had of it travelling now three days together, without resting any day between. At last after many weary steps, I saw Wachuset hills, but many miles off. Then we came to a great swamp, through which we travelled up to our knees in mud and water, which was heavy going to me tired before. Being almost spent, I thought I should have sunk down at last, and never got out, but I

may say as in Psal. 94, 18. When my foot slipped thy mercy O Lord, held me up. Going along, having indeed my life, but little spirit, Philip (who was in the company) came up, and took me by the hand, and said, "Two weeks more and you shall be mistress again." I asked him if he spake true? he answered, "Yes and quickly you shall come to your master again," who had been gone from us three weeks. After many weary steps, we came to Wachuset, where he was, and glad was I to see him. He asked me when I washed me? I told him not this month; then he fetched me, some water himself, and bid me wash, and gave me a glass to see how I looked, and bid his Squaw give me something to eat. So she gave me a mess of beans and meat, and a little ground-nut cake. I was wonderfully revived with this favor showed me. Psal. 106, 46. He made them also to be pitied of all those that carried them away captive. My master had three Squaws, living sometimes with one and sometimes with another. Onux, this old Squaw at whose wigwam I was, and with whom my master had been these three weeks. Another was Wettimore, with whom I had lived and served all this while. A severe and proud dame she was; bestowing every day in dressing herself near as much time as any of the gentry of the land; powdering her hair, and painting her face, going with her necklaces, with jewels in her ears, and bracelets upon her hands. When she had dressed herself, her work was to make girdles of wampum and beads. The third Squaw was a younger one, by whom he had two Papooses. By that time I was refreshed by the old Squaw, Wettimore's maid came to call me home, at which I fell a weeping. Then the old Squaw told me to encourage me, that when I wanted victuals, I should come to her and that I should lie in her wigwam. Then I went with the maid, and quickly I came back and lodged there. The Squaw laid a mat under me, and a good rug over me; the first time that I had any such kindness shewed me. I understood that Wettimore thought, that if she should let me go and serve with the old Squaw, she should be in danger to lose (not only my service) but the redemption-pay also. And I was not a little glad to hear this; being by it raised in my hopes, that in God's due time there would be an end of this sorrowful hour. Then came an Indian and asked me to knit him three pairs of stockings, for which I had a hat and a silk handkerchief. Then another asked me to make her a shift, for which she gave me an apron.

Then came Tom and Peter with the second letter from the Council about the captives. Though they were Indians, I took them by the hand, and burst out into tears; my heart was so full that I could not

speak to them; but recovering myself, I asked them how my husband did? and all my friends and acquaintances? they said they were well, but very melancholy. They brought me two biskets, and a pound of tobacco, the tobacco I soon gave away. When it was all gone, one asked me to give him a pipe of tobacco, I told him it was all gone; then he began to rant and threaten; I told him when my husband came, I would give him some; "Hang him, rogue," said he, "I will knock out his brains, if he comes here." And then again at the same breath, they would say, that if there should come an hundred without guns they would do them no hurt. So unstable and like mad-men they were. So that fearing the worst, I durst not send to my husband, though there were some thoughts of his coming to redeem and fetch me, not knowing what might follow; for there was but little more trust to them, than to the master they served. When the letter was come, the Saggamores met to consult about the captives, and called me to them, to enquire how much my husband would give to redeem me. When I came I sat down among them, as I was wont to do, as their manner is. Then they bid me stand up, and said, they were the general court. They bid me speak what I thought he would give. Now knowing that all we had was destroyed by the Indians, I was in a great strait. I thought if I should speak of but a little, it would be slighted, and hinder the matter; if of a great sum, I knew not where it would be procured; yet at a venture, I said twenty pounds, yet desired them to take less; but they would not hear of that, but sent that message to Boston, that for twenty pounds I should be redeemed. It was a praying Indian that wrote their letters for them. There was another praying Indian, who told me that he had a brother, that would not eat horse, his conscience was so tender and scrupulous, though as large as hell for the destruction of poor christians; then he said he read that scripture to him, 2 Kings 6, 25. There was a famine in Samaria, and behold they besieged it, until an ass's head was sold for four-score pieces of silver, and the fourth part of a kab of Dove's dung, for five pieces of silver. He expounded this place to his brother, and shewed him it was lawful to eat that in a famine, which it is not at another time. And now says he, he will eat horse with any Indian of them all. There was another praying Indian, who when he had done all the mischief that he could, betrayed his own father into the English's hands, thereby to purchase his own life. Another praying Indian was at Sudbury fight, though as he deserved he was afterwards hanged for it. There was another praying Indian, so wicked and cruel, as to wear a

string about his neck, strung with christian fingers. Another praying Indian when they went to Sudbury fight, went with them, and his Squaw also with him, with her Papoos at her back. Before they went to that fight, they got a company together to powow: The manner was as followeth:

There was one that kneeled upon a deer-skin, with the company round him in a ring who kneeled, striking upon the ground with their hands, and with sticks, and muttering or humming with their mouths. Besides him who kneeled in the ring, there also stood one with a gun in his hand. Then he on the deer-skin made a speech, and all manifested assent to it, and so they did many times together. Then they bid him with the gun go out of the ring, which he did; but when he was out, they called him in again; but he seemed to make a stand. Then they called the more earnestly, till he turned again. Then they all sang. Then they gave him two guns, in each hand one. And so he on the deer-skin began again; and at the end of every sentence in his speaking, they all assented, and humming or muttering, with their mouths, and striking upon the ground with their hands. Then they bid him with the two guns, go out of the ring again; which he did a little way. Then they called him again, but he made a stand, so they called him with great earnestness; but he stood reeling and wavering, as if he knew not whether he would stand or fall, or which way to go. Then they called him with exceeding great vehemency, all of them, one and another. After a little while he turned in staggering as he went, with his hands stretched out in each hand a gun. As soon as he came in, they all sang and rejoiced exceedingly awhile, and then he upon the deer-skin, made another speech, unto which they all assented in a rejoicing manner; and so they ended their business and forthwith went to Sudbury fight.

To my thinking, they went without any scruple but that they should prosper, and gain the victory. And they went out not so rejoicing, but they came home with as great a victory. For they said they killed two captains, and almost an hundred men. One Englishman they brought alive with them, and he said it was too true, for they had made sad work at Sudbury; as indeed it proved. Yet they came home without that rejoicing and triumphing over their victory, which they were wont to show at other times; but rather like dogs (as they say) which have lost their ears. Yet I could not perceive that it was for their own loss of men; they said they lost not above five or six; and I missed none, except in one wigwam. When they went they acted as if the

devil had told them that they should gain the victory, and now they acted as if the devil had told them they should have a fall. Whether it were so or no, I cannot tell, but so it proved; For they quickly began to fall, and so held on that summer, till they came to utter ruin. They came home on a Sabbath day, and the pawaw that kneeled upon the deer-skin, came home, I may say without any abuse, as black as the devil. When my master came home, he came to me, and bid me make a shirt for his Papoos, of a Holland laced pillowbeer. About that time there came an Indian to me, and bid me come to his wigwam at night, and he would give me some pork and ground-nuts. Which I did and as I was eating, another Indian said to me, he seems to be your good friend, but he killed two Englishmen at Sudbury, and there lie the cloathes behind you; I looked behind me, and there I saw bloody cloathes, with bullet-holes in them; yet the Lord suffered not this wretch to do me any hurt, yea instead of that, he many times refresh'd me. Five or six times did he and his Squaw refresh my feeble carcase. If I went to their wigwam at any time, they would always give me something, and yet they were strangers that I never saw before. Another Squaw gave me a piece of fresh pork, and a little salt with it, and lent me her frying-pan to fry it; and I cannot but remember what a sweet, pleasant, and delightful relish that bit had to me, to So little do we prize common mercies when we have them this day. to the full.

The Twentieth Remove.

It was their usual manner to remove, when they had done any mischief, lest they should be found out; and so they did at this time. We went about three or four miles, and there they built a great wigwam, big enough to hold an hundred Indians, which they did in preparation to a great day of dancing. They would now say among themselves, that the governor would be so angry for his loss at Sudbury, that he would send no more about the captives, which made me grieve and tremble. My sister being not far from this place, and hearing that I was here, desired her master to let her come and see me, and he was willing to it, and would come with her; but she being ready first, told him she would go before, and was come within a mile or two of the place. Then he overtook her, and began to rant as if he had been mad, and made her go back again in the rain; So that I never saw her till I saw her in Charlestown, but the Lord requited many of their ill-doings, for

this Indian her master, was hanged afterwards at Boston. They now began to come from all quarters, against their merry dancing day. Amongst them came one good-wife Kettle. I told her my heart was so heavy that it was ready to break: "So is mine too," said she "but yet I hope we shall hear some good news shortly." I could hear how earnestly my sister desired to see me, and I earnestly desired to see her; yet neither of us could get an opportunity. My daughter was now but a mile off; and I had not seen her for nine or ten weeks, as I had not seen my sister since our first taking. I desired them to let me go and see them, yea I entreated, begged and persuaded them to let me see my daughter; and yet so hard hearted were they, that they would not suffer it. They made use of their tyrannical power whilst they had it, but through the Lord's wonderful mercy, their time was now but short.

On a Sabbath-day, the sun being about an hour high in the afternoon, came Mr. John Hoar (the council permitting him, and his own forward spirit inclining him) together with the two fore-mentioned Indians, Tom and Peter, with the third letter from the council. When they came, I was abroad; they presently called me in, and bid me sit down, and not stir. Then they catched up their guns and away they ran, as if an enemy had been at hand, and the guns went off apace. I manifested some great trouble, and asked them what was the matter? I told them I thought they had killed the Englishman, (for they had in the mean time told me that an Englishman was come) they said no; they shot over his horse, and under, and before his horse, and they pushed him this way and that way, at their pleasure, shewing what they could do. Then they let him come to their wigwams. I begged them to let me see the Englishman, but they would not; but there was I fain to sit their pleasure. When they had talked their fill with him, they suffered me to go to him. We asked each other of our welfare, and how my husband did, and all my friends? He told me they were all well, and would be glad to see me. Among other things which my husband sent me, there came a pound of tobacco, which I sold for nine shillings in money: for many of them for want of tobacco, smoked hemlock and ground-ivy. It was a great mistake in any who thought I sent for tobacco, for through the favor of God, that desire was overcome. I now asked them whether I should go home with Mr. Hoar? They answered no, one and another of them, and it being late, we lay down with that answer. In the morning Mr. Hoar invited the Saggamores to dinner; but when we went to get it ready, we found they

had stolen the greatest part of the provisions Mr. Hoar had brought. And we may see the wonderful power of God, in that one passage, in that when there was such a number of them together, and so greedy of a little good food, and no English there but Mr. Hoar and myself, that it was a wonder they did not knock us on the head, and take what we had; there being not only some provisions, but also some trading cloth, a part of the 20 pounds agreed upon. But instead of doing us any mischief, they seemed to be ashamed of the fact, and said it was the Matchit Indians that did it. Oh that we could believe that there was nothing too hard for God. God shewed his power over the heathen in this, as he did over the hungry lions, when Daniel was cast into the den. Mr. Hoar called them betime to dinner, but they eat but little, they being so busy in dressing themselves and getting ready for their dance; which was carried on by eight of them, four men and four Squaws; he was dressed in his holland shirt, with great stockings, his garters hung round with shillings, and had girdles of wampom upon his head and shoulders. She had a kersey coat covered with girdles of wampom from the loins upward. Her arms from her elbows to her hands were covered with bracelets, there were handfuls of necklaces about her neck, and several sort of jewels in her ears. She had fine red stockings and white shoes, her hair powdered, and her face painted red, that was always before black. And all the dancers were after the same manner. There were two others singing and knocking on a kettle for their musick. They kept hopping up and down one after another, with a kettle of water in the midst, standing warm upon some embers, to drink of when they were dry. They held on till night throwing out wampom to the standers-by. At night I asked them again, if I should go home? they all as one said no, except my husband come for me. When we were all lain down, my master went out of the wigwam, and by and by sent an Indian called James the printer, who told Mr. Hoar, that my master would let me go home to-morrow, if he would let him have one pint of liquor. Then Mr. Hoar called his own Indians, Tom and Peter, and bid them all go and see if he would promise it before them three; and if he would he should have it, which he did and had it. Philip smelling the business, called me to him, and asked me what I would give him, to tell me some good news, and to speak a good word for me, that I might go home tomorrow? I told him I could not tell what to give him, I would any thing I had, and asked him what he would have? He said two coats, and 20 shillings in money, half a bushel of seed corn, and some

tobacco. I thanked him for his love, but I knew that good news as well as that crafty fox. My master after he had his drink, quickly came ranting into the wigwam again, and called for Mr. Hoar, drinking to him and saying he was a good man, and then again he would say, "Hang him a rogue." Being almost drunk, he would drink to him, and yet presently say he should be hanged. Then he called for me; I trembled to hear him, and yet I was fain to go to him; and he drank to me shewing no incivility. He was the first Indian I saw drunk, all the time I was among them. At last his Squaw ran out, and he after her, round the wigwam, with his money jingling at his knees, but she escaped him; but having an old Squaw he ran to her, and so through the Lord's mercy, we were no more troubled with him that night. Yet I had not a comfortable night's rest; for I think I can say I did not sleep for three night's together. The night before the letter came from the council, I could not rest, I was so full of fears and troubles; yea at this time I could not rest night nor day. The next night I was overjoyed, Mr. Hoar being come, and that with such good tidings. The third night I was even swallowed up with the thoughts of going home again; and that I must leave my children behind me in the wilderness; so that sleep was now almost departed from mine eyes.

On Tuesday morning they called their General Court (as they stiled it) to consult and determine whether I should go home or no. And they all seemingly consented that I should go, except Philip who would not come among them.

But before I go any farther, I would take leave to mention a few remarkable passages of Providence, which I took special notice of in my afflicted time.

1. Of the fair opportunity lost in the long march, a little after the fort fight, where our English army was so numerous, and in pursuit of the enemy, and so near as to overtake several and destroy them; and the enemy in such distress for food, that our men might track them by their rooting the ground for ground-nuts, whilst they were flying for their lives: I say, that then our army should want provisions, and be obliged to leave their pursuit, and return homeward, and the very next week the enemy came upon our town, like bears bereft of their whelps, or so many ravenous wolves, rending us and our lambs to death. But what shall I say? God seemed to leave his people to themselves, and ordered all things for his own holy ends. Shall there be evil in the city, and the Lord hath not done it? They are not grieved for the

affliction of Joseph, therefore they shall go captive. It is the Lord's doing, and it should be marvellous in our eyes.

- 2. I cannot but remember how the Indians derided the slowness and the dulness of the English army in its setting out. For after the desolations at Lancaster and Medfield, as I went along with them, they asked me when I thought the English army would come again? I told them I could not tell. It may be they will come in May, said they; thus they did scoff at us, as though the English would be a quarter of a year getting ready.
- 3. Which also I hinted before when the English army with new supplies were sent forth to pursue after the enemy, and they understanding it fled before them till they came to Baquag River, where they forthwith went over safely; that the river should be impassable to the English. I cannot but admire to see the wonderful providence of God in preserving the Heathen for further affliction to our poor country. They could go in great numbers over, but the English must stop: God had an overruling hand in all those things.
- 4. It was thought, if their corn were cut down, they would starve and die with hunger; and all that could be found was destroyed and they driven from that little they had in store, into the woods in the midst of winter; and yet how to admiration did the Lord preserve them for his holy ends, and the destruction of many still among the English! Strangely did the Lord provide for them, that I did not see (all the time I was among them) one man, woman or child die with hunger. Though many times they would eat that, that a hog or a dog would hardly touch; yet by that, God strengthened them to be a scourge to his people.

Their chief and commonest food was ground-nuts, they eat also nuts and acorns, artichokes, lily roots, ground beans, and several other weeds and roots that I know not.

They would pick up old bones, and cut them in pieces at the joints, and if they were full of worms and maggots, they would scald them over the fire, to make the vermin come out, and then boil them and drink up the liquor, and then beat the great ends of them in a mortar, and so eat them. They would eat horses guts, and ears, and all sorts of wild birds which they could catch. Also bear, venison, beavers, tortoise, frogs, squirrels, dogs, skunks, rattlesnakes. Yea, the very bark of trees; besides all sorts of creatures, and provision which they plundered from the English; I can but stand in admiration to see the won-

derful power of God, in providing for such a vast number of our enemies in the wilderness, where there was nothing to be seen, but from hand to mouth. Many times in the morning, the generality of them would eat up all they had, and yet have some farther supply against they wanted. But now our perverse and evil carriages in the sight of the Lord, have so offended him, that instead of turning his hand against them, the Lord feeds and nourishes them up, to be a scourge to the whole land.

5. Another strange thing that I would observe is, the strange providence of God in turning things about when the Indians were at the highest, and the English at the lowest. I was with the enemy eleven weeks and five days, and not one week passed without their fury and some desolation by fire or sword upon one place or other. They mourned for their own losses, yet triumphed and rejoiced in their inhuman and devilish cruelty to the English. They would boast much of their victories; saying, that in two hours time they had destroyed such a captain and his company, in such a place; and such a captain and his company in such a place; and boast how many towns they had destroyed, and then scoff, and say, they had done them a good turn, to send them to heaven so soon. Again they would say, this summer they would knock all the rogues on the head, or drive them into the sea, or make them fly the country; thinking surely, Agag-like, The bitterness of death is past. Now the heathen begin to think all is their own; and the poor Christian's hopes fail (as to man) and now their eyes are more to God, and their hearts sigh heaven-ward, and they say in good earnest, Help Lord, or we perish. When the Lord had brought his people to this, that they saw no help in anything but himself, then he takes the quarrel into his own hand; and tho' they had made a pit, as deep as hell for the Christian that summer, yet the Lord hurled themselves into it. And the Lord had so many ways before to preserve them, but now he hath as many to destroy them.

But to return again to my going home; where we may see a remarkable change of providence. At first they were all against it, except my husband would come for me; but afterward they assented to it, and seemed to rejoice in it: Some asking me to send them some bread, others some tobacco, others shaking me by the hand, offering me a hood and scarf to ride in; not one moving hand or tongue against it. Thus hath the Lord answered my poor desires, and the many earnest requests of others put up unto God for me. In my travels, an Indian came to me, and told me, if I were willing he and his Squaw would run

away, and go home along with me. I told them no, I was not willing to run away, but desired to wait God's time that I might go home quietly, and without fear. And now God hath granted me my desire. O the wonderful power of God that I have seen, and the experiences that I have had. I have been in the midst of those roaring lions, and savage bears, that feared neither God, nor man, nor the devil, by night and day, alone and in company; sleeping all sorts together, and yet not one of them ever offered the least abuse of unchastity to me, in word or action. Though some are ready to say, I speak it for my own credit; but I speak it in the presence of God, and to his glory. God's power is as great now, as it was to save Daniel in the lion's den, or the three children in the fiery furnace. Especially that I should come away in the midst of so many hundreds of enemies, and not a dog move his tongue. So I took my leave of them, and in coming along, my heart melted into tears, more than all the while I was with them, and I was almost swallowed up with the thoughts that ever I should go home again. About the sun's going down, Mr. Hoar, myself, and the two Indians, came to Lancaster, and a solemn sight it was to me. There had I lived many comfortable years among my relations and neighbors: and now not one Christian to be seen, or one house left standing. We went on to a farm house that was yet standing, where we lay all night; and a comfortable lodging we had, though nothing but straw to lie on. The Lord preserved us in safety that night, and raised us up again in the morning, and carried us along, so that before noon we came to Concord. Now was I full of joy, and yet not without sorrow: Joy, to see such a lovely sight, so many Christians together, and some of them my neighbors: There I met with my brother, and my brother-in-law, who asked me if I knew where his wife was? poor heart! he had helped to bury her, and knew it not; she being shot down by the house, was partly burnt, so that those who were at Boston at the desolation of the town, came back afterward and buried the dead, did not know her. Yet I was not without sorrow, to think how many were looking and longing, and my own children among the rest, to enjoy that deliverance that I had now received; and I did not know whether ever I should see them again. Being recruited with food and raiment, we went to Boston that day, where I met with my dear husband; but the thoughts of our dear children, one being dead, and the other we could not tell where, abated our comfort in each other. I was not before so much hem'd in by the merciless and cruel heathen, but now as much with pitiful, tender hearted and compassionate Chris-

tians. In that poor and beggarly condition, I was received in, I was kindly entertained in several houses. So much love I received from several (many of whom I knew not) that I am not capable to declare But the Lord knows them by name; the Lord reward them sevenfold into their bosoms of his spirituals, for their temporals. The twenty pounds, the price of my redemption, was raised by some Boston gentlewomen, and Mr. Usher, whose bounty and charity, I would not forget to make mention of. Then Mr. Thomas Shepard of Charlestown received us into his house, where we continued eleven weeks; and a father and mother they were unto us. And many more tender-hearted friends we met with in that place. We were now in the midst of love, yet not without much and frequent heaviness of heart, for our poor children and other relations, who were still in affliction. The week following, after my coming in, the governor and council sent to the Indians again, and that not without success; for they brought in my sister, and goodwife Kettle. Their not knowing where our children were, was a sore trial to us still: and yet we were not without secret hopes of seeing them again. That which was dead lay heavier upon my spirits, than those which were alive among the heathen: thinking how it suffered with its wounds, and I was not able to relieve it; and how it was buried by the heathen in the wilderness from among all Christians. We were hurried up and down in our thoughts, sometimes we should hear a report that they were gone this way and sometimes that: and that they were come in, in this place or that, we kept inquiring and listening to hear concerning them, but no certain news as yet. About this time the council had ordered a day of publick thanksgiving, though I had still cause of mourning; and being unsettled in our minds, we thought we would ride eastward, to see if we could hear any thing concerning our children. As we were riding along between Ipswich and Rowley, we met with William Hubbard, who told us our son Joseph, and my sister's son, were come into Major Waldren's; I asked him how he knew it? he said the major himself told him so. So along we went till we came to Newbury; and their minister being absent, they desired my husband to preach the thanksgiving for them; but he was not willing to stay there that night, but he would go over to Salisbury, to hear farther, and come again in the morning, which he did, and preached there that day. At night when he was done, one came and told him that his daughter was come into Providence; Here was mercy on both hands. Now we were between them, the one on the east, and the other on the west; our son being nearest, we went to him first, to

Portsmouth, where we met with him, and with the major also, who told us he had done what he could, but could not redeem him under seven pounds, which the good people thereabouts were pleased to pay. The Lord reward the major, and all the rest, though unknown to me, for their labor of love. My sister's son was redeemed for four pounds, which the council gave order for the payment of. Having now received one of our children, we hastened toward the other. Going thro' Newbury, my husband preached there on the Sabbath-day, for which they rewarded him manifold.

On Monday we came to Charlestown, where we heard that the governor of Rhode Island, had sent over for our daughter, to take care of her, being now within his jurisdiction; which should not pass without acknowledgements. But she being nearer Rehoboth than Rhode Island, Mr. Newman went over and took care of her, and brought her to his own house. And the goodness of God was admirable to us in our low estate, in that He raised up compassionate friends on every side, when we had nothing to recompence any for their love. The Indians were now gone that way, that it was apprehended dangerous to go to her; but the carts which carried provision to the English army, being guarded, brought her safe; blessed be the Lord for it. Her coming in was after this manner: She was travelling one day with the Indians, with her basket at her back; the company of Indians were before her, and gone out of sight, all except one Squaw; she followed the Squaw till night, and then both of them lay down, having nothing over them but the heavens, nor under them but the earth. Thus she travelled three days together, having nothing to eat or drink but water and green hirtle-berries. At last they came into Providence, where she was kindly entertained by several of that town. The Indians often said, that I should never have her under twenty pounds, but now the Lord hath brought her in upon free cost, and given her to me the second time. The Lord make us a blessing indeed to each other. Thus hath the Lord brought me and mine out of that horrible pit, and hath set us in the midst of tender hearted and compassionate Christians. 'Tis the desire of my soul, that we may walk worthy of the mercies received, and which we are receiving. Our family being now gathered together, the South church in Boston hired a house for us. Then we removed from Mr. Shepard's (those cordial friends) and went to Boston, where we continued about three quarters of a year, still the Lord went along with us, and provided graciously for us. I thought it somewhat strange to set up housekeeping with

bare walls, but as Solomon says, money answers all things; and that we had through the benevolence of Christian friends, some in this town, and some in that, and some from England, that in a little time we might look and see the house furnished with love. The Lord hath been exceeding good to us in our low estate, in that when we had neither house nor home, nor other necessaries, the Lord so moved the hearts of these and those towards us, that we wanted neither food nor raiment for ourselves or ours, Pro. 18, 24. There is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother. And how many such friends have we found, and now living among us! And truly such a friend have we found him to be unto us, in whose house we lived, viz. Mr. James Whitcomb, a friend near at hand and far off.

I can remember the time, when I used to sleep quietly without working in my thoughts, whole nights together; but now it is otherwise with me. When all are fast about me, and no eye open, but his who ever awaketh, my thoughts are upon things past, upon the awful dispensations of the Lord toward us, upon his wonderful power and might in carrying of us through so many difficulties, in returning us in safety, and suffering none to hurt us. I remember in the night season, how the other day I was in the midst of thousands of enemies, and nothing but death before me. It was then hard work to persuade myself, that ever I should be satisfied with bread again. But now we are fed with the finest of the wheat, and (as I may say) with honey out of the rock. Instead of the husks we have the fat calf. The thoughts of these things in the particulars of them, and of the love and goodness of God towards us make it true of me, what David said of himself, Psal. 6, 6. I water my couch with my tears. O the wonderful power of God that mine eyes have seen, affording matter enough for my thoughts to run in, that when others are sleeping mine eyes are weeping.

I have seen the extreme vanity of this world. One hour I have been in health and wealth, wanting nothing, but the next hour in sickness, and wounds and death, having nothing but sorrow and affliction. Before I knew what affliction meant I was ready sometimes to wish for it. When I lived in prosperity, having the comforts of this world about me, my relations by me, and my heart cheerful, and taking little care for anything; and yet seeing many (whom I preferred before myself) under many trials and afflictions, in sickness, weakness, poverty, losses, crosses, and cares of the world, I should be sometimes jealous lest I should have my portion in this life. But now I see the Lord had his

time to scourge and chasten me. The portion of some is to have their affliction by drops, but the wine of astonishment, like a sweeping rain, that leaveth no food, did the Lord prepare to be my portion. Affliction I wanted, and affliction I had full measure, pressed down and running over. Yet I see when God calls persons to never so many difficulties, yet he is able to carry them through, and make them say they have been gainers thereby, and I hope I can say, in some measure, as David, It is good for me that I have been afflicted. The Lord has shewed me the vanity of these outward things; that they are vanities of vanities and vexation of spirit. That they are but a shadow, a blast, a bubble, and things of no continuance. If trouble from smaller matter begin to rise in me, I have something at hand to check myself with, and say, "Why am I troubled?" It was but the other day, that if I had had the world, I would have given it for my freedom, or to have been a servant to a Christian. I have learned to look beyond present and smaller troubles, and to be quieted under them, as Moses said, Exod. 14, 13. Stand still and see the salvation of the Lord.

In a pamphlet prepared by Hon. Henry S. Nourse for the annual meeting of the American Antiquarian Society in Worcester in 1898, we find this map of Mary Rowlandson's Removes and an outline as nearly as is now possible of the general trend of the Indian trails over which the captive journeyed to and from the valley of the Ashuelot River. And it gives approximately the site of the various camps. Mr. Nourse has very kindly given us permission to use the same for the benefit of our readers.

The First Remove.—Thursday, February 10, 1675–6. George Hill in South Lancaster.


The Second Remove.—Friday, February 11. On the Indian trail to Quabaug, now Brookfield, probably in the western part of Princeton.

The Third Remove.—Saturday, February 12, to Sunday, February 27. Wenimesset *alias* Menameset, a swamp stronghold of the Quabaugs on what is now known as the Ware River, in the extreme northern angle of New Braintree.

The Fourth Remove.—Monday, February 28, to March 3. Probably in Petersham, about half way between Ware and Miller's Rivers.

The Fifth Remove.—Friday, March 3 to March 5. In Orange, on Miller's River, near the Athol line.

The Sixth Remove.—Monday, March 6. At the Great Swamp in Northfield, beside which ran the Indian trail between Nichewaug and Squakeag.

The Seventh Remove.—Tuesday, March 7. At Squakeag, now in Northfield, near Beer's Plain.

The Eighth Remove.—Wednesday, March 8. At Coasset on the Connecticut River in South Vernon, Vermont.

The Ninth Remove.—March ——. In the Ashuelot Valley.

The Tenth Remove.—March ——. In the Ashuelot Valley.

The Eleventh Remove.—March ———— to April. Probably in Chesterfield, New Hampshire.

The Twelfth Remove.—Sunday, April 9 (?) In the same locality.

The Thirteenth Remove.—April ——. Probably in south part of Hinsdale.

The Fourteenth Remove.—April ——. On the homeward march through Northfield. This move was probably about April 20. When the news of Canonchet's capture by the English on April 2 reached the Connecticut River Indians they deserted Philip, and even threatened to kill him. The Nipnets and Nashaways left for Wachusett about April 10, and Quanopin and Philip accompanied them; but their squaws remained awhile in the neighborhood of the Pocomtuck villages.

The Fifteenth Remove.—April ——. At Miller's River in Orange.

The Sixteenth Remove.—April ——. One mile south of Miller's River, probably in Athol.

The Seventeenth Remove.—April ——. Probably at Nichewaug.

The Eighteenth Remove.—April ——. At an Indian settlement, probably on Ware River near Menameset, perhaps at that on Barre Plains.

The Nineteenth Remove.—April ——. On the west side of Wachusett in Princeton.

The Twentieth Remove.—Friday, April 28 to May 2. Between the mountain and lake near Redemption Rock in Princeton.
