### PREFACE.

In 1887 a genealogy of two of the sons of Samuel, oldest son of the Rev. Thomas Carter, first minister of Woburn, Mass., was published by Mrs. Clara A. Carter of Leominster, Mass., and Mrs. Sarah A. Carter of Fitzwilliam, N. H. This publication was designed to be merely a contribution to the history of the Carter Family, and was collected and arranged for the Carter Family Association, an organization formed at the general Reunion of the Carter Family at Woburn, Mass., in 1884. This Association unfortunately was not maintained, but the present volume is also issued as a further contribution to the history of another branch of the same family, namely, Thomas 3 Carter, son of Thomas 2 Carter, youngest son and child of Rev. Thomas 1 Carter.

It is to be regretted that a complete record of the descendants of the other sons of Thomas <sup>2</sup> Carter could not have been included in this volume, but the preparation of such a work by the present writer has been entirely out of the question.

He has, however, gathered and preserved all facts concerning the descendants of the other sons which have come under his notice, and most of them are herewith presented. It is to be hoped that at no distant day a complete genealogy of the descendants of the Rev. Thomas Carter may be prepared, and that then these partial records may be perfected and incorporated into a general history of the family. It is known that a large amount of additional material for such a work has been collected by different individuals, chiefly descendants of Samuel<sup>2</sup>, since the publication of the book referred to above in r887, and all who are interested in the family history should without delay write down in permanent form family records or facts of interest with which they may be familiar before they are forgotten or it may be lost forever.

In the present volume only the briefest account of the various individuals has been given, and without doubt many errors, especially

in the matter of dates, will be found, for as is usual in such cases, statistics of the same family furnished by different individuals do not agree with each other or with the records of the town or church. The writer will be grateful, however, to have his attention called to such or any other errors that may be detected, and a careful record of them will be kept.

To the many correspondents and others who have given aid and encouragement in the preparation of this book, the compiler would return heartiest thanks; merely to have made the acquaintance of many of them by correspondence, so to say, has been in a large measure compensation for the labor involved in the undertaking, and it has been a privilege indeed to meet personally some who but for this work would doubtless have remained strangers still. To all who bear the name or inherit the blood of the common ancestor, the compiler extends warmest greetings.

Special acknowledgment is due to the skillful and accomplished genealogist, Miss L. Belle Hamlin, at present Librarian of the Historical and Philosophical Society of Ohio at Cincinnati, for assistance in various ways, and particularly for establishing the ancestry of Thomas 3 Carter (N. E. Hist. and Gen. Reg., Vol. LV, p. 223), and for tracing the line of his second wife, Sarah Gilbert. Miss Hamlin is a great-granddaughter of Major Lorenzo Carter (48), one of the first settlers of Cleveland, O.

But more than to all others combined, the compiler is indebted to his wife, Mrs. Nellie Russell Cordis Carter, without whose constant and unfailing aid and encouragement during all the years, the work would never have been carried to completion.

In making acknowledgments, the care and patience of the printers, Messrs. C. B. Fiske & Co. of Palmer, Mass., should be mentioned, and there is no doubt but the excellence of their work, as also that of the James B. McKinnon Photo Engraving Company of Springfield, Mass., and of the binder, Mr. W. J. Eldred, also of Springfield, will be appreciated by all judges of good bookmaking.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE.

The general plan of this Genealogy is as follows: It includes, so far as ascertained, (a) all persons bearing the name of Carter of this line; (b) the names of all persons who have married these Carters, with the names of their parents; (c) the names of all children of Carter females, with the record of their families carried out, when known, at least one generation. Great pains has been taken to give exact date and place of all births, marriages and deaths, but without doubt many errors and omissions occur. Humanum est errare; particularly so, it would seem, in matters genealogical.

As to the details of the plan:—The emigrant ancestor, Rev. Thomas Carter, is numbered 1. At the left of the names of his children (pp. 17 and 18), as in all similar cases throughout the book, the Roman numerals, i, ii, iii, etc., indicate the order of birth.

The Arabic numerals, 2, 3, 4, etc., which also appear at the left of *some* names of children, indicate that such child married, and an account of that family will be found under the corresponding number on a subsequent page. The small superior figures denote the generation, the emigrant ancestor being reckoned as the first.

Thus Thomas <sup>2</sup> Carter, the son of the emigrant, appears on page 18 as the eighth child of his father, Rev. Thomas <sup>1</sup> Carter, and the number 2, prefixed to his name, shows that he is taken up again. On the same page below, under the heading, "Second Generation," his history is given, and prefixed to the name of his second child, Thomas, the number 3 appears.

Turning forward to page 19, we find the history of Thomas<sup>3</sup> Carter under the number 3. And so on with his children as found on page 27. To trace one's ancestral line backward, the process above described is simply reversed. It should be noted that all the descendants of the five sons of Thomas<sup>2</sup> Carter,—Thomas<sup>3</sup>, Eleazer<sup>3</sup>, Daniel<sup>3</sup>, Ebenezer<sup>3</sup> and Ezra<sup>3</sup>,—are given by themselves, the descendants of Thomas<sup>3</sup> being finished before those of the next oldest brother are taken up.

The ordinary abbreviations are used, as follows: b., born; d., died; m., married; unm., unmarried; ae., aged; dau., daughter; res., residence or resided; T. S., tombstone; J. P., Justice of the Peace; Reg., New England Historic Genealogical Register.



## REV. THOMAS CARTER.

The birthplace and the parentage of the Rev. Thomas¹ Carter, first minister of Woburn, Mass., cannot be stated with certainty, but there is no reasonable doubt that he was a native of Suffolk County, England, and there is ground for the belief that he was the son of James Carter, yeoman, of Hinderclay, Suffolk County, whose will, dated August, 1625, proved Oct. 1, 1625, is on file at Bury St. Edmunds. For a full discussion of this matter, the reader is referred to an article contributed by the writer to the Boston Evening Transcript, June 1, 1904.

Early genealogists not unnaturally assumed that the Rev. Thomas Carter was identical with the Thomas Carter who embarked at London April 2, 1635, on board The Planter, Nicholas Trerice, master, with a number of others from St. Albans, Hertfordshire, bound for New England. Later investigations, however, show quite conclusively that the Thomas Carter who came over in the Planter settled in Salisbury, Mass., although his age as given in the record of the Planter, twenty-five, corresponds exactly with that of the Rev. Thomas Carter as calculated from the record of his death, Sept. 5, 1874, "in the 74th year of his age."

This statement, however, like many early records of age at time of death, is very likely incorrect, but it is an unfortunate fact for the investigator that there were among the early settlers no fewer than four Thomas Carters,—three of them in New England,—all arriving about the same time and all of about the same age. These are: (1) Rev. Thomas Carter, first minister of Woburn, Mass.; (2) Thomas Carter of the Planter, who settled in Salisbury, Mass.;

(3) Thomas Carter, eldest son of Thomas Carter, blacksmith, of Charlestown, who deposed, 1662, that he was about fifty-two years old, and hence born about 1610; and (4) Thomas Carter, aged

twenty-five, who embarked from London in the Safety, Aug. 10, 1635, for Virginia, on which ship also came John Carter, aged twenty-two, by many supposed to be the ancestor of the so-called "Virginia Carters" It may be here remarked that this Thomas Carter is not heard of later in Virginia, and there are some grounds for believing that John and Thomas Carter, who came to Virginia in 1635, if not brothers, were related, John, being a strong supporter of the Church of England, remaining in Virginia, while Thomas, the Puritan from Cambridge University, went to New England.

Among the reasons for believing that John and Thomas Carter of Virginia were in some way related are the following:—

- (1) Among early descendants of the Rev. Thomas Carter is found the same coat of arms as that claimed by the Virginia Carters.
- (2) There was frequent communication between Virginia and Massachusetts in the early days. For example, at the time of the installation of Rev. Thomas Carter at Woburn, 1642, the Rev. Mr. Knowles, assistant pastor of the church in Watertown, from which Mr. Carter came, "was absent on a special mission to preach the gospel in Virginia."
- (3) As before remarked, no more is heard of Thomas Carter, who came to Virginia in the Planter.

But returning to accepted facts, we find that the Rev. Thomas Carter was matriculated a sizar of St. John's College, Cambridge University, April 1, 1626, at which university he took the degree of Bachelor of Arts in January, 1629/30, and that of Master of Arts in 1633. In June, 1900, while the writer was on a visit to Cambridge, the following entry was found among the old records of St. John's College. It occurs in a list of students who secured scholarships at the university, and is dated Nov. 5, 1628:

"Ego Thomas Carter Suffolciensis admissus sum discipulus hujus collegij pro magistro Spaldinge." (I Thomas Carter, of Suffolk, am admitted as a student of this College on the Spalding scholarship.)

The Spalding scholarship was founded by William Spalding, yeoman, of Tamwarth, in Suffolk, who gave £60, and stipulated that the scholar was to be chosen from Bury St. Edmunds Grammar School, an institution founded by King Edward VI in 1550.

According to the Bursar of St. John's College, Mr. R. F. Scott, who very courteously made search and discovered the above entry,

the record proves that the holder of the scholarship was not only a resident of Suffolk at the time, but that he was also a native of the county. A comparison of photographic copies of the pages of the Cambridge University Record book showing the signatures of Thomas Carter when he took the degree of B. A. in 1629, and of M. A. in 1633, and of the above entry, with similar copies of manuscript known to be in the handwriting of the Rev. Thomas Carter of Woburn, Mass., is interesting as going to prove the identity of the writer.

It may here be remarked that further and careful search of the records at Cambridge, and at Bury St. Edmunds, by Mr. Vincent B. Redstone of Woodbridge, Suffolk, secretary of the Suffolk Archæological Institute, and a genealogist of wide reputation, failed to discover additional information concerning the subject of this sketch.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the Rev. Thomas Carter was for several years (1628–1633) a fellow student at Cambridge University with the Rev. John Harvard, the founder of Harvard College, and that both afterward came to America and were settled in neighboring communities. It is more than probable that these young men were well acquainted while at the university. It is certain that a similarity of tastes and inclinations led them to emigrate to New England at about the same time, both entering the ministry. Both were made freemen of the Colony of Massachusetts in the same year, 1637.

So far as the writer knows, the next authentic knowledge of Mr. Carter is the fact of his being admitted a freeman of Dedham, Mass., March 9, 1636/7, (April 25, 1637, O. S.) being "presented" by Philemon Dalton. (Dedham Records.)

His residence here, however, was brief, for previous to the formation of the church in Dedham, 1638, John Allin, afterwards chosen first minister of Dedham, "moved to ye Pastour of watertowne yt seeing divers of ther members lived with us & mr. Carter one of them had exercised some good time ther & knew ye people better than I, that therefore it would please ther church to dismisse mr Carter & such other of ther members as they judged meete to prepare with us such as should be thought fitt for ye laying of ye foundation of a church society amonst us, but for some reasons he did not judge it either needfull or according to

order to dismisse any but unto a settled church & so refused ye request." From the above and other records it would appear that Thomas Carter had "exercised" his spiritual gifts already in Dedham, and at this time was filling the office of Elder in the church at Watertown, for the church records of Dedham, a year or two later, refer to "ye elders of Watertowne in a letter subscribed by mr Philip pastour; mr Carter mr How elders, testifying yt ye church ther" gave power to certain of their members residing in Dedham to unite with the Dedham church.

In Watertown Thomas Carter was granted a homestall of ten acres and, in 1642, a farm of 92 acres and a lot in the town plot.

The estimation in which he was held in Watertown may be inferred from the fact that it is noted in the Woburn Town Records that he had not been applied to sooner because "it had been doubted whether Watertown would be willing to part with him."

Mr. Carter preached in Woburn for the first time Dec. 4, 1641, this being the second service of public worship ever held in the new town, and took for his text a passage in Gen. xxii, of which sermon the town record says, "incouraging to trust in the Lord for the Means." This discourse or his previous reputation seems to have made a favorable impression upon the people of Woburn, for the Town Records state:

- "1641, Dec. 19. They now all at Mr Carter, who was very backward to promise anything, but only to bee helpfull to them at sum tims which was very seldom."
- "1642, March 1. They went to Mr. Carter, who was very shy in promising helpe constantly."
- "April 11. Some now went to Mr. Philips, (minister of Watertown) who did not incouridge them about Mr. Carter."
- "April 14. Mr. Carter was intreated to spend a day of humiliation amongst them, after the which they had sum good encouragement, and he helped them too Sabbath days together after it."
- "May 4. They moved for a dismission from Charlestown church upon sum hope they had of Mr. Carter's help."
- "Aug. 14. A Church gathered at Woburn. Mr. Knowles, (assistant pastor of Watertown) Mr. Allen, (pastor of Dedham) Mr. Symes, Mr. Carter and divers other godly and faithful ministers of

Christ held out the wright hand of fellowship in the name of the other Churches."

After much persuasion, Mr. Carter finally yielded a reluctant consent and became the first minister in Woburn, being ordained November 22, 1642.

In Winthrop's "History of New England from 1630 to 1649," is given the following account of the ceremony:—

"The village at the end of Charlestown bounds, was called Woburn when they gathered a church, and this day Mr Carter was ordained their pastor with the assistance of the elders of other Churches; some difference ther was about his ordination; some advising in regard they had no elder of their own, nor any members fit to solemnize such an ordinance, they would desire some of the elders of the other Churches to have performed it; but others supposing it might be an occasion of introducing a dependancy of Churches, etc., and so a presbytery, would not allow it, so it was performed by one of their own members, but not so well or orderly as it ought."

Capt. Edward Johnson, one of the principal founders both of the church and the town, was present on this occasion, and thus describes the manner of the ordination in his "Wonder Working Providence" (published in 1654):

"After he (Thomas Carter) had exercised in preaching and prayer the greater part of the day, two persons in the name of the Church laid their hands upon his head and said, We ordain thee Thomas Carter to be Pastor of this Church of Christ: then one of the elders present, desired of the Church, continued in prayer unto the Lord for his more especial assistance, of this his servant in his work, being a charge of such weighty importance as is the glory of God and the salvation of souls, that the very thought would make a man to tremble in the sense of his own inability to the work."

At his ordination, the town presented him with a house, which they built for his use, and also engaged to give him a salary of £80 annually, one-fourth of which was to be in silver, the remainder in various necessaries of life, at current prices.

This compensation was increased in 1674 by the grant of twenty cords of wood annually, to be delivered at his door.

From the time of his ordination, Mr. Carter ministered constantly to this people without aid for thirty-six years, when the Rev. Jabez

Fox was chosen assistant pastor. He continued in the service with Mr. Fox for six years more until his death in 1684, thus making the entire period of his ministry at Woburn more than forty-two years.

As to the personal characteristics of the Rev. Thomas Carter, Johnson, in his "Wonder Working Providence," above quoted, speaks of him as a "reverend Godly Man, apt to teach the sound and wholesome truths of Christ;" and one who had "much encreased with the encreasings of Christ Jesus."

Sewell, in his History of Woburn, says: "Mr. Carter appears to have lived secluded in great measure from the world; and hence he is seldom if ever named in history among the eminent clergymen of his day. Still there is abundant evidence that he was a very pious, exemplary man, an able and sound preacher of the gospel, and one whom God honored and prospered in his work. Under his ministrations, the church was greatly enlarged and built up, and the town flourished, and was for the most part in peace." By another it is said of him: "During his ministry, which was prolonged more than forty-two years, there appears to have been the greatest harmony between him and the society." In the following lines addressed to him in the "Wonder Working Providence," Mr. Carter is represented as a plain, but faithful and successful minister; a pastor of distinguished humility and meekness, and in gentleness toward his flock, as rather exceeding than otherwise:

"Carter, Christ hath his wayes thee taught, and thou Hast not witheld his Word, but unto all With's word of power dost cause stout souls to bow, And meek as lambs before thy Christ to fall: The antient truths, plain paths, they fit thee best, Thy humble heart all haughty acts puts by; The lowly heart, Christ learns his lovely hest, Thy meekness shews thy Christ to thee is nigh. Yet must thou shew, Christ makes his bold to be As lions, that none may his truths tread down; Pastoral power he hath invested thee With; it maintain, leest he on thee do frown. Thy youth thou hast in this New England spent, Full sixteen years to water, plant and prune Trees taken up, and for that end here sent; Thy end's with Christ; with's saints his praises tune."

Mr. Carter died September 5, 1684, and from the fact that his

will, which is on record in the Middlesex Probate Office, is nuncupative, — that is, verbal, not written, — it is conjectured that his last sickness must have been very sudden and brief, and two items in the bill for his funeral expenses suggest that it may have been some malignant disease. The bill was presented to the selectmen October 6, 1684, and at a general meeting of the inhabitants on the same day, by unanimous vote, it was ordered paid. It was also voted that the rate for Mr. Carter's salary should "be compleated and payd for this yeare as formerly." The bill follows:

As witness my hand Jabez ffox

Sept. 6th. 1684.

There is little doubt that Mary, wife of the Rev. Thomas Carter, was Mary Parkhurst, daughter of George Parkhurst Sr. of Watertown and Boston, and that she was baptized in Ipswich, Suffolk County, England, August 28, 1614. If so she was daughter of Phebe, the first wife of George Parkhurst. Among the reasons for this belief are the following:

- (1). She is associated in the Ruth Dalton deed with known children of George Parkhurst. Reg. xxvii, p. 364.
- (2). George \* Parkhurst had a daughter, Mary, baptized in Ipswich, England, Aug. 28, 1614, where he had eight other children baptized and the names of six of the baptized children appear in the Dalton deed,—that is, the Christian names are the same.

She died at Woburn, March 28, 1687. (Reg. xvii, p. 51.)

No record of the marriage of Rev. Thomas Carter and Mary Parkhurst has been found, but their first child, Samuel, was born in Watertown, Aug. 8, 1640.

### SECOND GENERATION.

2. Thomas <sup>2</sup> Carter (*Rev. Thomas* <sup>1</sup>) was born in Woburn, Mass., June 8, 1655. The exact date of his death is not known, but he was living at least as late as Sept. 21, 1722, when he and his wife, Margery, acknowledged a deed originally given by them in 1688. He is described in deeds as "husbandman," and was evidently possessed of considerable lands, some of which were given him by his father. In September, 1713, he deeds to son Eleazer a dwelling house, barn, etc., and 25 acres of land with garden and orchards bounded by land of "my brother, Timothy Carter." Other deeds are recorded (as under Thomas Carter) but no will has been found.

He married in 1682, Margaret (or Margery) Whittemore, (or Whitmore), b. Sept. 9, 1668, d. Oct. 5, 1734, dau. of Francis Whittemore of Cambridge and his wife, Margaret Harty (or Hartz).

#### THIRD GENERATION.

3. THOMAS <sup>3</sup> CARTER (*Thomas*, <sup>2</sup> Rev. Thomas <sup>1</sup>) was born in Woburn June 13, 1668. In 1710 his father conveyed land to him on "Reading Line," the deed being signed also by his mother, "Margaret Carter." In a deed dated 1611 he is called "Thomas Carter of Reading, Wheelwright."

He married (1) at Reading, Feb. 19, 1713, Abigail Locke of Woburn. Feb. 19, 1720/21, Thomas Carter "owned ye covenant" in Weston, Mass., and his three children, Thomas, Abigail and Elizabeth, were baptized. Two other children, Anna and Benjamin, were also baptized in Weston later.

Thomas Carter's brother Daniel was living in Weston in 1723,—perhaps earlier,— and had several children born there.

Oct. 20, 1726, William Smith of Weston sells to Thomas Carter of Weston, land in Hebron, Ct., and Dec. 12, 1726, Thomas Carter and wife Abigail "of Hebron" convey land and house in Weston, Mass. From the above and other records, it would appear that Thomas Carter removed from Reading to Weston about 1718 or 1719, where he remained until 1726, when he removed to Hebron, Ct. (Middlesex, Mass., Co. Records, vol. 44, p. 140; Hebron, Ct., Land Records, vol. 2, p. 48.)

April 10, 1729, Abigail (Locke) Carter died leaving five children, and Dec. 9, 1730, Thomas <sup>3</sup> Carter married (2) Sarah <sup>4</sup> Gilbert, dau. of Samuel <sup>3</sup> Gilbert (Samuel, <sup>2</sup> Jonathan <sup>1</sup>) and Mercy, dau. of Isaac and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner.

Jonathan<sup>1</sup> Gilbert, great-grandfather of Sarah<sup>4</sup> (Gilbert) Carter, was the well-known Jonathan Gilbert who was so prominent in the affairs of the Colony of Connecticut from 1645 until his death in 1682. He was collector of customs at Hartford, deputy to the General Court, marshal of the colony, and often engaged in negotiations of importance with the Indians, with whose languages he was well acquainted. He was also chief inn-holder of Hartford,

and in his house the General Court usually met when they did not sit at the meetinghouse.

He was a man of large wealth for the day and acquired extensive tracts of land in different settlements, some by government grant for important service rendered, which lands he subsequently divided among his children.

He married (1) Mary, daughter of Elder John White, and (2) Mary, daughter of Hugh Welles, brother of Gov. Thomas Welles, and one of the founders of Hartford.

Samuel<sup>2</sup> Gilbert was the son of the second wife, Mary Welles, a woman remarkable for her prudence and energy.

Jonathan<sup>1</sup> Gilbert died Dec. 10, 1682, aged 64, and his second wife, Mary Welles, died July 3, 1700, aged 74. They lie side by side in the ancient burial place in the rear of the Center Church in Hartford.

"Thomas and Hugh Welles were sons of Thomas Welles, a zealous Puritan and wealthy merchant of London, of the Welles family of the County of Essex. Incurring the suspicion of the Commissioners, he escaped to this country when about 60 years old and was soon followed by a numerous family of sons." (Reg. vol. iv, p. 343.)

Samuel<sup>2</sup> Gilbert lived in Hartford until 1707, when he removed to Colchester, Ct., where he lived until about 1824, when he again removed to Lyme, Ct., where he died Aug. 5, 1733, ae 70. (T. S.) Mary Rogers, his wife, died Sept. 30, 1756, in 91st year. This part of Lyme is now in the town of Salem, not far from the Colchester line.

Samuel<sup>2</sup> Gilbert was commissioned Ensign of the Train Band in Hartford by the General Court in 1798, and was confirmed captain of the Train Band in Colchester in May, 1707. In 1711 Capt.

Samuel Gilbert was in command of a company in an expedition against Canada. (Col. Records of Conn., p. 358.)

No will or settlement of the estate of Samuel<sup>2</sup> Gilbert has been found, and it has been conjectured that these papers may have been among the records of the New London probate office which were so largely destroyed by the British during the Revolutionary war. Deeds of gift to his sons, made at various times during his lifetime, are, however, on record.

Samuel<sup>3</sup> Gilbert (Samuel,<sup>2</sup> Jonathan<sup>1</sup>) father of Sarah<sup>4</sup> (Gilbert) Carter, was born in Hartford Feb. 5, 1687/8. He married, (date unknown; marriage proved by deed of land and Hist. of Hadley), Mercy<sup>4</sup> Warner, born at Deerfield, Mass., Sept. 25, 1785, daughter of Isaac3 and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner. Isaac3 Warner was the son of Andrew2 Warner of Cambridge, Mass., Hartford, Ct., and Hadley, Mass., who died Dec. 18, 1684. His first wife is unknown, but he m. (2) Esther, (d. 1693), widow of Thomas Selden of Hartford. Andrew<sup>2</sup> Warner was son of John<sup>1</sup> Warner of Hatfield, Gloucester, Eng. Isaac3 Warner, born about 1645, died in Deerfield, Mass., 1690/1; married May 31, 1666, Sarah, daughter of Robert and Mary (----) Boltwood. Robert Boltwood was from Essex County, Eng.; in Connecticut, 1748; lived in part of Wethersfield now included in Glastonbury; removed to Hadley, Mass., where he died April 6, 1684. His wife, Mary Warner, died May 14, 1687. (Warner Gen.; Hist. of Hadley; Memo. Hist. of Hartford.)

Samuel<sup>3</sup> Gilbert died May 1, 1760, and is buried in the Gilead, Ct., cemetery, as is also his wife, Mercy Warner, who died Oct. 31, 1759. It is supposed by some that after his marriage he lived for some time in Colchester, and it has been stated, on what original authority the writer does not know, that some of his children were born there, particularly his son, Samuel,<sup>4</sup> whose birth is given as at Colchester, Oct. 16, 1711. But no such entry is to be found on the town records of Colchester.

The following entries are, however, found in the ancient records of Lebanon, Ct., and seem to prove that at this time at least, he was living within the limits of that town, and that the son Samuel was born there in 1712:

"Abilena Gilbert Daughter of Sam<sup>II</sup> & Mercy Gilbert was Born March the 10th A. D. 1710.

Sarah Gilbert was Born March the 10th 1710. Samuel Gilbert was born May the first A. D. 1712,"

Another son, John, was baptized there Nov. 21, 1713/14, also Elisha, Feb. 16, 1716/17, although he is said to have been born in Hebron. The towns adjoined. About this time the family seems to have removed to Hebron, as the other children are said to have all been born there, probably in Gilead parish, where the family of Thomas<sup>3</sup> Carter resided.

The other children of Samuel<sup>3</sup> and Mercy (Warner) Gilbert are: Mary, b. 1719; Hannah, b. 1722; Ezra, b. 1726; Mercy, b. 1728; Ebenezer, b. 1732.

The will of Samuel<sup>3</sup> Gilbert is found at Colchester, and in it he names his five sons as above, but merely refers to his "five daughters," not mentioning any of them by name.

The names of the daughters as given above, and their husbands, are all found, however, in the will of their brother, Lieut. John Gilbert, which is on record at Andover, Ct. Lieut. John Gilbert died Jan. 19, 1794, in "80th year," and is buried with his wife, Abigail 4 Carter, (5), in Gilead cemetery.

Much interesting information concerning the Gilbert family may be found in the New Eng. Hist. and Gen. Reg., vol. iv, p. 229 et seq., and p. 339 et seq., and in a pamphlet published in 1902, entitled: "One of the Gilberts of New England, A Descendant of Jonathan Gilbert of Hartford, Ct." See also Champion Gen.

Sarah Gilbert Carter died in Warren in 1796, and her tombstone is found in the cemetery there. The inscription reads:

In memory of
Mrs Sarah Cart
er wife of Tho
mas Carter who
Departed this life
July the 12th 1796
in the 88th year of
her age.

Her husband lies near her, and his epitaph is as follows:

In memory of
Mr Thos Carter
Died Nov. 18, 1772
AE. 88
All nature must
Return to dust.

After a residence of some 25 or more years in Hebron, Thomas Carter, with nearly all his numerous family, some of them already married, together with several related families from Hebron and vicinity, migrated soon after 1750 to what was then the northeastern part of the town of Kent, in Litchfield county, and took up a large part of what later became the town of Warren. Rough, wild and mountainous much of it is now and always has been, and to these early pioneers it must have presented difficulties which only stout hearts and strong arms could overcome. But it is doubtless to these very obstacles which faced these and other pioneers of New England towns, that the world is indebted for those splendid specimens of manhood and sturdy character which is typified by the stern and rugged aspect of the lands which they subdued, and in many cases made to "blossom as the rose."

There is a tradition that one of the early Carters came first to Warren, then practically a wilderness without paths or roads, and selected a spot for a clearing. He then returned to Hebron and came back with the family, but so wild was the country that for some time they were unable to find the site which had been selected. The Carters settled in the north part of the town and never lived to any extent in the southern part, and there was always considerable rivalry between the north and the south. When the church was built each section tried to see which could bring the biggest corner stone. It is said that the "south" won in the contest.

The church of the "Society of East Greenwich (now Warren) in the town of Kent" was formally organized Sept. 22, 1756, and as the name of Thomas Carter is first on the list of those who "owned the Covenant" on that occasion, it is believed that a copy of that first covenant will be of interest to many, and it is given herewith:

"We whose Names are underwritten being united in the Belief of the Christian Religion as taught in the Holy Scriptures, an excellent summary whereof is contained in the Westminster Shorter Chatechism, And being united in Love and Charity towards one another, Do now give up ourselves to God through Jesus Christ to be forever the Lord's, to love him and walk in his ways, keep his Commandments, seeking his glory ———. And do mutually covenant and engage from this day and forward untill regularly dismissed, to live

together as a Church of Christ according to the rules of the Gospel, to attend publick worship and sealing ordinances together, to walk in the same faith, to maintain brotherly love, to be in subjection to the Government and Discipline Christ has established in his Church.

In the Presence of God the Searcher of hearts we do now make this covenant, hoping in his mercy thro Jesus Christ to keep it in perpetual remembrance, we have hereunto set our names and do now before all this Congregation publickly ratify and confirm the same.



As already indicated, Thomas<sup>3</sup> Carter died Nov. 18, 1772, at the ripe age of 88, and his tombstone may be seen near the entrance of the Warren cemetery. His will, recorded in the probate office at Litchfield, Ct., is as follows:

In the Name of God Amen.——June 1st, 1768. I Thomas Carter of Kent in the County of Litchfield and Colony of Connecticut in New England being advanced into years but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God therefor, —Calling to mind the mortality of my Body and that it is appointed for all Men once to Die — Do make and Ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say primarily and first of all I commit my Soul to God That gave it and I recommend my Body unto the earth, to be Buried in

decent and Christian Burial. According to the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall Receive the Same by the Mighty power of God. And as touching Such Worldly Estate as it has pleased God to bless me with in this Life I dispose of in the manner following:

First I Give and bequeath to my Dearly Beloved Wife, Sarah, after my just Debts and Funeral Charges are paid I Give her the use of one half of the Dwelling House I now live in and also the use of one third part of my Barn, and the Improvement of one third part of the farm that I now live on during the time she Remains my Widow, and also one Horse & Side Saddle & Bridle And two cows and ten Sheap and all my Household furniture to dispose of as she thinks fit.

And also I Give to my well beloved Son Thomas Carter five pounds Lawful Money toghther with what I have already given him.

And also I give to the heirs of my Son Benjamin Carter Deceased four Pounds Lawful Money. And also I give to my Son Joseph Carter the farm that I now live on and all my cattle Sheape & Hogs and Horses but those that I gave to my Wife, and also all my outdoor movables and one half of my House and one third part of my Barn that I gave to my Wife when she has done with them with his paying all my just Debts & funeral Charges and all the Legacies above & hereafter mentioned in this my last Will and Testtament. And also I Give to my son Samuel Carter two pounds Lawful Money, and I also Give to my son John Carter one pound Lawful Money, and also I Give to my son Eleazer Carter Nine pounds five shillings and six pence Lawful Money. And I Give to my Son Isreal Carter Six pounds four Shillings Lawful Money. And also I Give to my son Benoney Carter Four pounds ten shillings and Six pence Lawful Money— And also I give to my Daughter Abigail Gilbert Two pounds Lawful Money—.

And also I Give to Darius Swetland Son to my Daughter Elizabeth Swetland, Deceased one pound Lawful Money— And also I Give to Jonathan Hutchason Son to my Daughter Anne, deceased, one pound Lawful Money— And also I Give to my Daughter Sarah Finney five pounds Lawful Money— And also I Give to my Daughter Mercy Curtis five pounds Lawful Money— All the above Legacies to be paid within five years after my Decease— and last of all I make Constitute and ordain my Loving Wife Sarah Carter & my Son Joseph Carter to be the sole Executers of this my last Will and Testament and I do hereby uterly Disolve Revoke and disanul all & every other Will, Testaments, Legacies, Bequaths and Extrs. by me in any ways before named Willed & Bequathed ratify and Confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal the Day and Year above mentioned.

4. THOMAS 4 CARTER (Thomas, 3 Thomas, 2 Rev. Thomas 1) b. Reading, Mass., 1715; d. Warren, Ct., Aug. 28, 1774; m. Hebron, Ct., April 2, 1747, Sarah Sawyer, b. 1717, d. Warren, Sept. 11, 1774, "aged 57 years," dau. of Moses and Ruth (Luis) Sawyer (probably).

He removed to Warren (Kent) apparently about the same time as the other members of his family, and resided there until his death in 1774. The following entry, found among the town records of Warren, was not clearly understood by the writer until a poem loaned by Miss Jerusha S.7 Carter of Phelps, N. Y., (1898), made it evident that six members of this family of fourteen (including children and

grandchildren) were swept away by an outbreak of fever or some epidemic at that time. The record is as follows: "Departed this life in the year 1774, viz. — Benjamin Carter, July 29th sone to Thomas Carter then seignor, Thomas Carter Junior Died August 21 AD 1774. Thomas Carter Seignor & Adoniram Carter's Infant child Died August 28th 1774. Adoniram Carter Died Sept. 5, AD 1774. Sarah Carter Died the 11th September 1774 wife to Thomas Carter Seignor."

The poem, which is exceedingly quaint and interesting, certainly from a genealogical point of view, and as illustrating the spirit of the age, was written by Joel Finney and was apparently dedicated to Cloa Barnum, widow of Adoniram<sup>5</sup> Carter, who with their only child, "scarce six weeks old," was among the victims of this terrible visitation. Or he may have had in mind Anna (Hopkins) Carter, widow of Thomas<sup>5</sup> Carter (17). The "Poem" consists of thirty stanzas of four lines each, some of which are reproduced below:

### A POEM.

Composed on the Sickness and Deaths, which happened in the Family of THOMAS CARTER, in Kent, in the Summer, A. D. 1774.

I.

To strains of woe, I tune the mournful lyre, While dying numbers groan across the wire; In deepest sable hung, my viol plays Sad notes of grief in undissembling lays.

#### II.

Urania's bold assistance I must crave, While I view death and the dark silent grave, And try to paint a grievous tragic scene, Which in the town of Kent has lately been.

#### III.

In seventeen hundred seventy-four, we see, A raging sickness seiz'd the family Of Thomas Carter, as you now shall hear, Which filled the place with dread and awful fear.

#### IV.

The fever rag'd to that extremity, Of fourteen persons six, we see, must die, And change this life for that which is to come, Their earthly ones for their eternal home.

#### V.

Muse, view the house amidst this awful gloom, See spirits take their flight to hear their doom, While every corner's filled with dolorous moans, And doleful shrieks mingle with dying groans.

#### VI.

The aged parents both resign their breath, Embraced in the icy arms of death, With their three eldest sons in youthful bloom, Take up their lodgings in the narrow tomb.

### VII.

With one grandchild an infant daughter dear. Must leave this world before her judge t' appear, Scarce six weeks old, by this we plainly see, From death's arrest no age nor rank is free.

#### VIII.

The eldest of these sons, a widow left With two small children fatherless bereft; Methinks I see her with her children stand Lamenting sore with one in either hand.

### IX.

Where can I go, she cries, to find redress Or comfort in my present sharp distress; The answer's plain you sure must go to God, Submit to him and own his righteous rod.

Behold the widow of the second son, Husband and child her earthly all is gone, Thus by herself she stands, o'erwhelm'd with grief, And thinks her case admits of no relief.

#### XVI.

Now the third son, although he had no wife To mourn his early exit from this life Yet there is one who was betroth'd to him, Whose parting seems like tearing limb from limb.

### XIX.

I crave the leave to make a short address, To those four brothers who are fatherless; Your parents both are took away by death, When God commands, we must resign our breath.

### XXV.

This in particular I dedicate, To the fair lady thus bereav'd of late, At whose request these lines were first composed, An now, at length to public view disclosed.

### XXVII.

I credibly have been informed of late, You have reenter'd on a married state: I hope that you a happy life may lead, And be in bands of wedlock blest indeed.

By comparing the references in the above lines with the records of the family below, the facts are made clear.

Nov. 19, 1774, Heman Swift Esq. of Cornwall was appointed administrator on estate of Thomas Carter Jr. "late of Kent;" Joseph Carter, administrator on estate of Thomas Carter Ir., "late of sd Kent," and Ebenezer Man of Kent on estate of Adoniram Carter "late of Cornwall." Jan. 16, 1775, inventories of the estates of Thomas Carter, Thomas Carter Jr., and Adoniram Carter were presented, the two former "of Kent," Adoniram "of Cornwall." Also an allowance was made to "the widows & children of said Thomas Carter & Thomas Carter Jr.," and to the "widow & children of Adoniram Carter."

July 12, 1775, among the creditors of estate of "Thomas Carter of Kent," are Dr. Ebenezer Man, Dr. John Chamberlain of Amenia, (N. Y.,) Dr. Oliver Fuller of Kent, Dr. Joseph Perry of Woodbury, Dr. Seth Bird of Litchfield.

Other creditors were Bateman Wells and Phebe Carter of Hebron, (probably daughter of Lieut. Benjamin 4 Carter of Hebron), Thomas Russell of Cornwall, Abel Comstock, John Bliss Jr., Moses Case, Benoni Carter, Ward Eldred of Cornwall, and Daniel Lee of Kent.

Sept. 21, 1775, in the distribution of the widow's right, "Widow Anna Carter of sd Kent Relict of Thomas Carter Jung aforesaid, a piece of land in Cornwall bordering Housatonic River, 8 acres near land of John Millard and Samuel Sawyer."

His will, drawn Jan. 17, 1793, proved Feb. 6, 1794, is on record at Andover, Ct., and it is an interesting fact that from his will are supplied the names of his five sisters, (one of whom was Sarah, second wife of Thomas 3 Carter), and their husbands, the father, Samuel 3 Gilbert, in his will merely referring to his "five daughters."

He was known as "Lieut." John Gilbert, and in his will mentions no children but leaves a large estate to various relatives, including his wife, Abigail, and his "five sisters," Sarah Carter, Mary Dart, Abileana Saxton (deceased), Mary Curtis (deceased), Hannah Mann (deceased).

He lived in Gilead parish, Hebron, to which society he bequeathed in his will "The sum of two hundred pounds to be paid at the end of one year after my decease to be appropriated to the support of a regular Gospel Minister who shall be settled and ordained in and over said Parish and the same shall be continued as a pepetual fund and the interest thereof annually paid into the treasury of said Society and by the Committee of said Society for the time being applied in part payment of the Salary of said minister which shall be due."

In her father's will, dated 1768, he speaks of Elizabeth as "deceased," and in the probate records at Litchfield, Ct., vol. iii, p. 154, dated Nov. 14, 1773, the residue of the estate of "Darius Sweatland" is ordered paid to "William Sweatland, the natural

Father and only Heir of said Darius." Hence Elizabeth (Carter) Swetland must have died previous to 1768, and at this time evidently, no other child was living. The Swetlands apparently came to Warren with the Carters.

He was an officer in the French and Indian war, being 1st Lieut. in the Twelfth Co., 1st Regiment, Campaign of 1759. In 1760 he was appointed 1st Lieut. of the 8th Co., 2d Regiment.

In the old cemetery near Hebron Center the writer found (1907) the gravestone of Phebe, wife of Lieut. Benjamin Carter, but no stone of her husband or any child. Mrs. Carter's headstone is a fine one, and there was also a footstone.

Ruth (Curtis) Carter is buried in the Warren cemetery and her husband is buried near her, but his grave is not marked by a stone.

Capt. Joseph Carter was a man of much prominence in the affairs of the town, was chosen first selectman when Warren was set off from Kent in 1786, and repeatedly was elected to offices of trust and responsibility.

In the French and Indian war he served as private in Capt. Samuel Dunham's Co. in the Alarm to relieve Fort William Henry in Aug., 1757. He was appointed by the General Court in 1767, Ensign of the 2d Company, or Train Band, in the town of Kent: Lieutenant of the same in 1770, and Captain in 1772. He was Captain in the 13th Reg. of Militia at New York in 1774, and marched with the same company, in which two of his brothers were also officers, for the relief of Danbury in 1777. He was also Captain in the 13th Reg., Sept., 1779, at Peekskill. (Conn. Colonial Records; Rev. Rolls and Lists, and Conn. Hist. Society Collections, vol. ix.)

He was representative from Kent in 1777, 1778, and 1779. He resided, at least in his later years, on what is known as "Above All" in Warren, and was living with his father or near him at the time of the latter's death in 1772.

The late Martin Strong of Warren (b. 1809) remembered Capt. Carter well and described him to the writer as of moderate height,

rather thick set and with the "Carter Look," of quiet temperament and one greatly respected in the community.

He was present at the dedication of the present Warren church in 1820, as was his brother, Lieut. Samuel Carter (11), the former then being 88 and the latter 86 years of age.

The third son of Josiah and Sarah (Carter) Finney, Sylvester, was the father of President Charles Grandison Finney of Oberlin College, the famous Evangelist.

Nov. 19, 1773, an inventory of the estate of Josiah Finney was presented by his wife Sarah, administratrix, and on the same day Joseph Carter is appointed guardian of Josiah Finney, aged about 18, and of Sylvester Finney, aged about 15, both sons of "Josiah Finney late of Kent." Nov. 29, 1773, Sarah Finney is appointed guardian of Zenas, Cyrus, Sarah, Lucinda and Laviny, "minors and children of Josiah Finney," late of Kent.

In the distribution of the property Josiah is called "oldest son," Zenas 2d, Sylvester 3d, and Cyrus 4th. Sarah Finney "oldest daughter, Lucinda 2d, Laviney 3d." (Litchfield, Ct., Probate Records.)

Mr. Finney began the study of law in 1818, but having become converted in 1821, studied theology and was licensed to preach by the Presbyterian church in 1824. He labored as an evangelist with great success in various cities, and in 1832 the Chatham street theatre in New York was bought for him, and the "Evangelist" established as an advocate of the revival. In 1834 he became pastor of the Broadway Tabernacle, which had been built especially for him. In 1835 Mr. Finney accepted the professorship of theology at Oberlin, which had just been founded by his friends, and from 1851 to 1866 he was president of that institution. Besides acting much of the time as pastor of the Congregational church in Oberlin, he frequently preached in New York and other places, and also spent three years in England as a revivalist. In his revival work he relied mainly on doctrinal preaching as opposed to animal excitement, and his sermons are plain, logical and direct. He is generally regarded as one of the greatest revivalists that America has produced.

He represented Warren in the General Assembly in 1788 and 1797. He and his brother, Capt. Joseph Carter, were often chosen as two of the three selectmen of the town. He was also a private in the Eighth Co., (Capt. Samuel Elmore) 2d Regt., French and Indian war, campaign of 1762. (Conn. Hist. Soc. Collections, vol. x, p. 337.)

John Carter lived apparently on or near the Cornwall line, as did several other members of the family. Probably his legal residence was Cornwall, as is indicated by the following records: "Feb., 1778, John Carter, Elijah Hopkins and Reuben Fox, all of Cornwall are annexed to the society of East Greenwich in Kent."

He served in the Revolutionary war, enlisting from Cornwall, as did also two of his sons, John and Jirah. He was also Corporal in the 4th Co., (Capt. Whiting) 2d Regt., French and Indian war, campaign of 1762, and had probably served previously as private in a company raised in Hebron, Ct. (See Conn. Hist. Soc. Collections, vols. X and XI.)

also with Joseph Carter (9) in the alarm to relieve Fort William Henry in 1757. He was a representative several times to the General Court and in 1788 was a member of the convention that ratified the Constitution of the United States at Hartford. He was appointed Ensign of the 2d Company or Train Band of Kent, 1770; Lieutenant of same, 1772; Capt. of the 7th Co., 4th Regt., 1775; and Major of one of the six battalions which were raised by the state in 1778.

Major Curtis was in the battle at Danbury, and caught General Wooster as he fell from his horse in that battle. He was also present at the surrender of Burgoyne in 1777, an interesting account of which he gives in a journal kept by him and still preserved by a descendant, Wallace K. Curtiss, residing (1909) in Torrington, Ct. The article was published in the Hartford Courant Aug. 12, 1908.

Abel Comstock was one of the first deacons in the Warren church. Benoni Carter lived a little north of the church in Warren, nearly opposite the cemetery. He owned a large amount of real estate, and was interested in several manufacturing enterprises in Warren. In company with Rev. Peter Starr and Capt. Justus Sackett, he built the first grist mill there. About 1794 he sold his property in Warren and removed to Salisbury, Ct., where he resided in what is known as the "Weatogue" district, his home being near

the site of the residence of the late Robert Little. In 1799 he bought land in Norfolk, Ct., which he deeded to his sons Adoniram and Seth. He was on the committee which built the Congregational church in Salisbury, 1799, for which services the town passed a vote of thanks Jan. 13, 1800.

Benoni Carter was sergeant in the company commanded by his brother, Capt. Joseph Carter, 13th Regiment of Militia, at New York 1776; also at Danbury when the British made their raid in 1777, and at Peekskill, 1779. He died during the great epidemic of 1812-13, and is buried with his wife and other relatives in what is known as the "Weatogue" Cemetery, Salisbury, Ct.

Other evidence corroborates the statement that the older of the two sons was named "Thomas Pelidus" or

Mrs. Charlotte C. Chaffee, daughter of Howard Carter, (91) contributes the following: "After Erastus Carter was married to Lois Fuller and their three oldest children were born, Howard, Ruthalia, and Lois, he became very tired of working on his New England farm and decided, with five other young men, to see what Ohio was like. So they shouldered their knapsacks and started. This was in 1803. One turned back, one reached Canfield, Ohio, and there earned enough money to take him home; but only Erastus Carter went through to their destination. Returning to Connecticut, he disposed of his farm and prepared to move his family. Several others were of the company, as well as his fatherin-law, Howard Fuller, and his wife. There was a general meeting of the neighborhood to see them off. The parson came, prayers were offered, farewells spoken and tears shed. No one ever expected to see them again. Their route was through Newburg, N. Y., Harrisburg, and Pittsburg, Pa., traveling slowly in emigrant wagons drawn by horses and ox teams. Part of the way a path had to be cut through, and burnt trees marked their course many times. They stayed for a short time in Johnson, Trumbull Co., then moved to Rayenna, O., where nearly all of them spent the rest of their lives. The first year they raised one acre of wheat and threshed it by tramping the ground with their feet and beating the grain with a flail. Many were the perils they endured and terrible the fear of the Indians during the war of 1812. Erastus Carter's cousin, Lorenzo Carter, was the first white settler in Cleveland, Ohio. All the boys except Miles settled on farms which their father gave them, and lived on them until they died."

Jemima (Carter) Bates, the mother of Desire Bates, came from a branch of the Carter family sometimes called the "Killingworth (Ct.) Carters," said to be descended from Robert Carter, a shipbuilder who came from Bristol, Eng., about 1700 to Guilford or Killingworth, Ct. He is said to have had children, John, Benjamin, Samuel, Joseph, William, Marv and Nathaniel,—the youngest, and the only one born in Connecticut, so far as the records of Guilford and Killingworth show. Nathaniel, born in Killingworth April 27, 1717, married there Nov. 8, 1739, Sarah Bennett, to whom were born in Killingworth, Jemima, (May 2, 1742), Mary, Nathan, Sarah, Elizabeth and Nathaniel. In the spring of 1759 Nathaniel Carter bought land in the town of Cornwall, Ct., not far from the Warren line, where he lived until the spring of 1763, when he again removed with some other families to a new settlement in what is now Pike County, Pa., taking with him three or more children. Jemima had recently married Isaac Bates and was not of the party, and it is supposed that Nathan also remained behind. Mary died 1759.

In the autumn of the same or following year, the entire family excepting Sarah, Elizabeth and Nathaniel, were massacred by Indians. The two girls were later ransomed and returned to their friends in Cornwall, but the boy, Nathaniel, in some way got into the Cherokee Nation, where he married and had several children, one of whom, David, later by a strange coincidence attended the famous mission school at Cornwall, Ct., his father's old home. He there met his relatives, but would not remain after finishing his course at the school. He returned to his home and became Chief Justice of the Cherokee Nation, Delegate to Congress, and died at Talequah, I. T., Jan. 6, 1867, leaving a family of eleven children.

Five of his sons served in the Confederate army, two as officers. Richard organized and was elected Captain of an independent company for the Confederate forces in May, 1861, in which position he remained until the close of the war in 1865. Benjamin W. was made Captain of a company, 1st Cherokee Regt., in 1863, which position he held until the close of the war. All of the children

attained honorable positions in life and their descendants are widely scattered. Hon. Charles David Carter, now (1909) a representative in Congress from Oklahoma, is a great-grandson of Nathaniel Carter, who was captured by the Indians.

The daughter, Elizabeth, married Benjamin Oviatt of Goshen, Ct., and became the mother of a large family, many of whom and their descendants have been of much prominence both in Connecticut and in the West. Theodore G. Carter Esq., for many years connected with the Chicago and Northwestern R. R., is a descendant of the son Nathan.



Major Lorenzo Carter stands out as a conspicuous character among the early settlers of what afterward became the city of Cleveland. Coming from Rutland, Vt., in the spring of 1797, the year after the town was laid out, he built a large log cabin near the mouth of the Cuyahoga river, in which he at once began to entertain travelers and others, and also kept in connection with the tavern a stock of goods for general trade, thus becoming the first landlord and the first merchant in Cayahoga county after its settlement by the whites. Mr. Carter was an extremely active, enterprising man, and gained a wonderful influence over the Indians, who were constant neighbors and frequent visitors. He was a tall, strong man and well knew when and how to use his strength to the best advantage. The Indians feared him more than any other settler, (it is said even more than his Satanic majesty himself!) Carter's commanding figure and prodigious strength, coupled with a remarkable audacity and fearlessness of spirit, giving the aboriginees abundant reason for this. His influence over the Indians was so great that he was always called upon to settle disputes between the whites and the Indians, and frequently between the Indians themselves. In fact, to such an extent was Major Carter the governmental head of the newly-organized settlement, that for a period it has been said that there was no law in Cleveland but Major Carter, and he probably did as much to make the settlement of Cleveland a permanent success as any one of the first settlers. In 1804 he was elected captain of the local militia company and a little later he was chosen major of the regiment, thus receiving the title by which he was known the remainder of his life. He was prosperous in business and acquired extensive holdings of land in what are now the limits of Cleveland, some of which is still (1909) said to be in the possession of his descendants.

In spite of the peculiar disadvantages of his earlier years, and the hardships and privations of pioneer life which he encountered, Maj. Carter was a man of much culture and was more of a student than would be supposed. Among other things, his choice of reading matter, as is shown by the records of Cleveland Library, is proof of this.

The first school in Cleveland "Village" was kept in his house 1802, by Miss Anne Spafford.

C. B. Colman (260) writes: "The first time I ever saw Adonijah Carter was in the early summer of 1848. He passed my cabin or place of residence in the woods of Sheboygan County, Wis., with his family and personal property as follows: About 25 cows with about the same number of calves, yearlings and two-yearolds; 3 double wagons with white sails so as to be comfortable for living, two of the wagons drawn by oxen, the third by a good pair of horses, - all facing eastward and bound for Sheboygan, a town about 20 miles east of my place, where he intended to buy a home near the city and establish a milk route there. In less than two months I learned that Mr. Carter had left Sheboygan and returned straight back to Plymouth, where he purchased a half section of land and made a good farm for himself. Himself and his wife now sleep in the graveyard of that city. On the occasion above referred to I had but a short talk with Mr. Carter, and did not then learn that he was a relative of my mother, nor did I then see his oldest daughter, Emma, whom I afterward married in Plymouth, and brought home to my farm in Greenbush to be my companion and helper until about two years later, when a fatal fever overtook her and carried her to the better land."





Mr. Carter had been a resident of Morgan Co., Ill., since 1834, making the trip overland from Warren, Ct., in that year. He was a man of unostentatious manner but a keen observer of nature, and in his early life was an extensive dealer in horses and cattle. He had the New England pioneer spirit that under adverse circumstances was able to win success, and out of the undeveloped West he wrought and worked, his efforts being rewarded until he became one of the men of means of his time.

His interests were varied, and during his business career he was engaged not only in farming and stock raising, but at one time controlled a large flour mill, also a saw mill, and after moving from Waverly to Jacksonville was engaged in the manufacture of brick. He was at one time also a member of the firm of Starr & Carter in the conduct of a general store.

During the Mexican war Mr. Carter was employed by the government and was persuaded by the army officials to go to Carmago, Mexico, where he had charge of the forage arrangements and the army horses and mules, his experience as a horseman making his services of great value. Mr. Carter was a member of Westminister Presbyterian church and possessed a strong and abiding Christian faith. Although a man of such varied and long-continued activity, he never sought the lime light or honors at the hands of his fellows, but contented himself with attention to the details of his private business and the duties of citizenship.

Mr. Carter was one of a family of twelve children, nine of whom lived to be over 63, and at the time of his death he was survived by three brothers aged 92, 91 and 78 years respectively. After reaching the age of 95 Mr. Carter drove his own horse and cared for him, and was as active as many men of 70. In his 98th year he was still in remarkably good health, and aside from a slight deafness was in full possession of his faculties. He was a man whose life showed the effects of good habits, sterling integrity and courteous conduct towards all men. (Extract from Jacksonville Journal.)

voice. There was a quality of tone in her voice that moved and held those who heard her. By one critic her voice was even compared favorably with that of Jennie Lind." It is interesting to note that a granddaughter of Mrs. Pope has developed unusual musical ability at a comparatively early age.

Dr. Abel Carter Benedict was one of the most prominent surgeons of Syracuse. Though skilled in other branches of his profession he made surgery a specialty, his experience in army life being of great value to him in this line. He was a graduate of the Yale Medical School, 1860, and on the breaking out of the rebellion was commissioned assistant surgeon of the 1st N. Y. Vols. He continued in this office until 1863, when he was commissioned by Pres. Lincoln assistant surgeon of U. S. Vols., and later promoted to be surgeon of the same.

In June, 1865, he was brevetted Lieut. Col. by Pres. Johnson; was later in charge of the general army hospital at Beaufort, S. C., and was mustered out of service in Dec., 1865. In the late years of the war he was on the staff of General Devlin, 24th Corps, and of General Turner, Tenth Corps. After the close of the war he settled in Waverly, Ill., where he remained until 1875, when he moved to Syracuse. He was a member of the N. Y. State Med. Society; Onondaga Med. "Rev. Edwin Carter, or Prof. Edwin Carter, as he was more commonly known, came to Constantine from the East about the year 1838. He was a Baptist minister, and frequently held religious services and preached to the small congregation of that denomination then resident there. He taught the first select or classical school in the village of Constantine. Afterward Prof. Carter worked

at the carpenter trade, and built a house, still (1897) standing, mainly by his own labor, near the present site of the Congregational church. After the big flouring mill was erected he became a flour packer and worked at it for a long time. Later he took up the business of making or building a kind of flat boat, called "arks," for the transportation of the flour down the river to Lake Michigan. While yet engaged in ark building, he was taken sick and died. Mr. Carter was a very industrious, hard-working man, preaching at times to the few Baptists in the community, while actively engaged in other occupations. He was a shifty, ingenious, industrious Yankee, a very useful man in the new country."





Mr. Williams, as he says, "was raised in the wilds of Michigan. I have lived in this county (Branch) sixty-one years this month (1897). I was but ten years old when I came here. Then there were more Indians than white folks; more wolves than sheep now; plenty of deer and some bears; plenty of wild turkeys and other game. I well understand the hardships of pioneer life. I have eaten salt and potatoes when salt was \$12 per barrel and potatoes \$2.50 a bushel; flour \$8 per hundred pounds; oats \$2.50, and 25 cents for sending a letter."

"Although she never had children of her own, Mrs. Williams did not lose her mother love from her heart, and many a boy and girl, once an inmate of her home, called her "mother" with sincere affection. All helpless things appealed to her humanity. She was a model housekeeper and her home was the favorite resort of many friends and relatives. A firm friend to the poor, she sensibly advised and proved a reliable helper in time of need. There were no complaints during her long illness, and, like a tired child, sweetly and gently she sighed her life away to begin an eternal Happy New Year. Covered with blossoms she so well loved, she was laid to rest, but in memory and deeds she still lives."



Both Dr. and Mrs. Beauchamp have been of much service to the compiler in the preparation of this book. Few correspondents have been more intelligent or interested regarding the history of the family. Through their thoughtfulness and painstaking, an exceedingly interesting record of the pioneer experiences of Mrs. Beauchamp's father and grandfather, Howard Carter (91) and Erastus Carter (28), in their Ohio home, has been preserved, being carefully taken down from the lips of the pioneers themselves. The record would make a volume of considerable size and is well worthy of publication. It is to be regretted that the plan of the present work did not admit of extended quotations from it.

When but eight years of age Mr. Carter's father died, leaving his mother and four small children, and it was then that David Carter began to work, and he never ceased until sickness compelled him to stop. At the age of 16 he "went sailing" on the lakes for the first time, and there are men alive now who knew him when an ordinary seaman on a ten-tonner. He kept on sailing in various capacities, and at the age of 20 he went on the "Forest City" in the capacity of clerk. The Detroit Free Press says, in an article published in 1899:

"The history of the great Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Co. is practically the history of the past forty-eight busy years of David Carter's life. All of his energies have been directed toward the upbuilding of an immense transportation business, and the magnifi-

cent line of steamers stands as a monument to his patient industry and ceaseless toil. When David Carter came to Detroit in 1852 he engaged as clerk on the steamer Forest City, the pioneer of the D. and C. line, and in that capacity worked for ten years. He then became agent for the line at Detroit and has since had exclusive control of its interests. Away back in the sixties he had faith in the possibilities of the line. The splendid results achieved since show that his faith was justified. He has during the past year brought every power of mind and body to bear to place the D. & C. line in the van as regards the vital essentials of safety, speed and comfort. Owing to the hard work of the general manager, the name "D. and C." is known wherever boats sail, and it may be truthfully said that the name of David Carter, if nailed to the masthead of every ship, could be no better known than it is now."

In 1899 the directors of the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Co., in recognition of Mr. Carter's remarkable services to the company for nearly half a century, honored him with the title of Commodore and presented him with a regulation Commodore's pennant. Mr. Carter was one of the most enthusiastic and loyal supporters of the attempt to trace out the family record, and gave much aid and encouragement to the compiler of this work.

LeGrand Carter had just entered upon his 20th year when he enlisted at Darien, Wis. He had gone down there from his home for the purpose of going to school, but caught the war fever and, with some friends and cousins, enlisted in Co. K, 2d Wis. Cavalry. He was a non-commissioned officer, and at the time of his death was Duty Sergeant. In the spring of 1864 he came home on furlough, married as above and was killed within a few weeks after his return to the army. He was in command of a scouting party sent out to get some horses which had been left by bushwackers at a place some 20 miles west of Rolla, Mo. While proceeding with a part of the force to find a second bunch of horses he was waylaid and, with the four men with him, captured, and according to all the evidence the entire party were taken into the woods and murdered in cold blood. The bodies of all were recovered, LeGrand's having five balls in it. He was ever faithful in the discharge of every duty and a favorite in the company, endeared to all by reason of a

generous heart and pleasant disposition. No man in the company could have been more missed.



"Judge Andrews has often and fitly been cited as a fine illustration for the younger men of what chances there are for those who have the sense and ability to improve their opportunities. He started as a poor and unknown boy and he reached our highest and most honored offices by doing as well as he could what came upon him to be done, and by avoiding nothing that did come. His name has become a part of the history of the state, and he has had no small part in guiding its development and shaping its laws."



In the Middletown Land Records Ezra Carter is described as of Middletown in October, 1725, and from the fact that he married there in 1724, it is probable that he had been a resident for some time previously. In an agreement dated as above, 1725, he rented from Thomas Miller Jr., for ten years, a home lot, etc., with grist mill. Miller agrees to "teach and learn said Carter his art of Milling, that is to make and grind meal well & to manage a mill, etc."; and also "to teach said Carter the art of turned wooden ware." The rent was to be one-half of the "tole or gains by grinding", and in addition, Carter was to clear a lot. This lease was made void by the parties to the contract, June 27, 1726, "for reasons best known to ourselves."

Feb. 23, 1731/2, Ezra Carter sells his home lot on the west side of the Connecticut river in Middletown, North Society, with house and barn, situated near land of Joseph Whitmore deceased.

Another deed in Middletown, dated Jan. 8, 1724/5, records the sale by Thomas Carter, Clothier, of Woburn, Mass., of a lot of land in Middletown to Jonathan Yeomans, which land he bought of Robert Collins, said land being situated near land of Thomas Miller. William Whitmore was a witness to the deed.

Joseph and William Whitmore were probably own cousins of Ezra<sup>3</sup> Carter, being sons of Lieut. Francis Whitmore, brother of Margaret Whitmore, who married Thomas<sup>2</sup> Carter (2).

About 1733, Ezra Carter settled apparently in a part of Hebron, Ct., which later (1803) was incorporated in the town of Marlborough, Ct. Marlborough was formed in 1803 from parts of Hebron, Colchester and Glastonbury.

Ezra and Jerusha Carter were among the original members of the church in Marlborough parish, and Ezra Carter was one of the committee appointed in 1749 to construct a meeting house. It may be interesting to note that this building was completed in 1803,—54 years after it was begun,—and the laying of the foundation stone was the last work to be done on it!

He was prepared for college, at least in part, by Rev. Timothy Edwards of East Windsor. He was graduated at Yale College, 1747; received honors from Harvard, Yale, Dartmouth and Princeton; was a famous classical scholar; pastor in Grafton, Mass., 1750–1772; went to Pomfret, Vt., 1774, preached in Woodstock, Pomfret and Hartford, Vt.

"He was a man of strong natural powers, and in particular was distinguished for his extraordinary memory; he is said to have been able to repeat the entire New Testament and to have performed often the whole pulpit service without opening a book.

"During his long ministerial career it is said that he was prevented from preaching by ill health but two Sabbaths, one of which was the Sabbath before his death."

He was the author of several printed pamphlets.

He had ten children, five sons and five daughters. The eldest son, Aaron, b. Oct. 3, 1755, d. 1843, was graduated at Harvard, 1770; lawyer in Lebanon, N. H. Another, Titus, the youngest son, b. 1771, was a graduate of Princeton, 1794; a lawyer in Woodstock, Vt., and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Vermont 1830-33; d. 1857.

# APPENDIX A.

Concerning the parentage of Mary, wife of the Rev. Thomas Carter.

On page 17 it is stated that Mary, wife of the Rev. Thomas Carter, was in all probability a daughter of George Parkhurst Sr., of Watertown and Boston. Some of the facts leading to that conclusion are here given more in detail.

On the Parish Registers of Ipswich, Suffolk County, England, are found the following baptisms:—

In the so-called "Dalton Deed" (Reg. xxvii, p. 364), Ruth, widow of the Rev. Timothy Dalton, conveys by deed dated March 22, 1663/4 certain property to her "constituted heir," Nathaniel Bacheller, he paying her a certain sum down, and agreeing to pay the sums mentioned below to the persons named, after her death:

The identity of the six names in the two lists is striking, but in addition to this, at least three of the persons mentioned in the Dalton deed are known to be children of George Parkhurst Sr.

Nathaniel Bacheller, the grantee above, had married Deborah, dau. of the above John and Deborah Smith. In 1669 George Parkhurst Jr. writes Bacheller concerning the money coming to him from "my aunt Dalton," which letter Bacheller endorses as from "my uncle, George Parkhurst."

Joseph Parkhurst also wrote Bacheller about the money coming to him from "my aunt Dalton." Hence George, Joseph and Deborah must have been children of George Parkhurst Sr.

As to Ruth Dalton, wife of Rev. Timothy Dalton, from all the facts known to the writer it would seem that she was not a sister of George<sup>1</sup> Parkhurst, but was more likely a sister of his first wife, Phebe. No record of the first wife is found in America, though he again married, about 1643, Susanna, widow of John Simpson.

Unfortunately no record of the marriage of Rev. Thomas Carter and his wife Mary has been found, and the same is true of the marriage of George Parkhurst and his wife Phebe, as also of Rev. Timothy Dalton and his wife, Ruth.

Another fact, although perhaps not of great weight in proving the identity of Mary, wife of Rev. Thomas Carter, is that four of her eight children had the same names as those of children of George Parkhurst Sr., who it should be remembered was a resident of Watertown, where the Rev. Thomas Carter was located at the time of his marriage. A fifth child was named *Thomas*, probably for the father, thus leaving only three children whose names, so to say, are unaccounted for. Further, it may be stated that there is no birth or other record of a Mary Dalton, dau. of Philemon, brother of Rev. Timothy Dalton.

## APPENDIX B.

Rev. Thomas Carter.

In view of the fact that comparatively few who may see this volume will be able to see the copy of the Boston Transcript of June 1, 1904, in which was published the article referred to in the first paragraph of page 9, it has been thought best to reproduce the article entire, although some parts of it have been incorporated into this work. There is also given with it a portion of an article contributed to the Woburn (Mass.) Daily Times of September 26, 1908, by William R. Cutter Esq., librarian of the Woburn Public Library, to whom and to his assistant, Mr. Arthur G. Loring, the compiler is indebted for many suggestions and courtesies in the preparation of this work.

Note \*568. Carter. Rev. Thomas Carter, first minister of Woburn, Mass., 1642, died Sept. 5, 1684 (Woburn Records), in the seventy-fourth year of his age and the forty-second of his ministry. According to the record, Mr. Carter was born about 1610. Most unfortunately for those interested in the genealogy of the Carter family, there seem to have been in and about Boston in the early days not only several men bearing the name of Thomas Carter, but apparently two or three of them were born about 1610. The writer has spent considerable time and money within the last few years in trying to locate the English home and parentage of Rev. Thomas Carter, and now proposes to give a few facts which have been discovered in the hope that others interested may be able to throw some further light on the subject.

It seems to be accepted by early genealogists (on what original authority I do not know) that Rev. Thomas Carter was matriculated a sizar at St. John's College, University of Cambridge, England, April 1, 1626. Had he entered the university less than four years later, Jan. 21, 1629–30, all questions as to his home, parentage, etc., would have been known, for on the above date, the following order was issued by the master of St. John's College:

"That the register of the college should have a booke provided him, wherein he should from time to time write and register the names, parents,

country, school, age and tutor of every one to be admitted into the college before their enrolling into the buttery tables; and shall receive of each of them for his pains as the head lecturers and deans do, for their admission."

In accordance with the above order, such entries as the following thereafter appear:

"James Parkinson, Son of James Parkinson, rector of Weeley, Essex; born at Weeley; school, Colchester (Mr. Kemp) for 2 years; admitted sizar, surety Mr. Thurston, 17, Oct. aet. 16. (pd)."

Early investigators not unreasonably assumed that Rev. Thomas Carter was identical with the Thomas Carter who embarked at London April 2, 1635, on the Planter, Captain Trerice, with a number of others from St. Albans, as "servant" to George Giddings, bound for New England. Later investigations show quite conclusively that the Thomas Carter who came over in the Planter settled in Salisbury, Mass., although his age given in the record of the Planter, twenty-five, corresponds exactly with that of Rev. Thomas Carter of Woburn. It may be noticed here also that in the list of passengers who embarked from London for Virginia in the Safty, Aug. 10, 1635, are the names of John Carter, aged twenty-two, and Thomas Carter, aged twenty-five. Another Thomas Carter, born about 1610.

From the fact that early searchers took it for granted that Rev. Thomas Carter of Woburn was identical with the Thomas Carter of the Planter, 1635, who is said to be of St. Albans, Hertfordshire, some forty or more years ago, Mr. George R. Carter of Leominster, Mass., employed Mr. Pavor, an English genealogist, to search the parish registers of St. Albans and of Watford, Hertfordshire, the latter being the parish in which is situated the manor of Garston, seat of Richard Carter, lord of the manor of Garston, from whom some have supposed that both John Carter of Virginia and Rev. Thomas Carter of Woburn are descended. Mr. Pavor's search was unsuccessful, and from a discovery made by the writer at Cambridge University in the summer of 1900, it seems certain that Rev. Thomas Carter was not a native of Hertfordshire at all, but of Suffolk.

Through the courtesy of Mr. R. F. Scott, Bursar of St. John's College, Cambridge, who very kindly made search among the old records of the college, the following entry was discovered. It occurs in a list of students who secured scholarships at the university, and is dated Nov. 5, 1628:

"Ego Thomas Carter Suffolciensis admissus sum discipulus hujus collegij pro magistro Spaldinge."

The Spalding scholarship was founded by William Spalding, yeoman, of Tamworth, in Suffolk, who gave £60, and the scholar was to be chosen from Bury St. Edmunds Grammar School, a school founded by King Edward VI in 1550.

According to the Bursar, Mr. Scott, the above entry is evidence not only that the holder of the scholarship was a resident of Suffolk at the time, but that he was also a native of the county.

I might here mention the fact that photographic copies of the pages of the Cambridge University Record book showing the signature of Thomas Carter when he took the degree of A. B. in 1629, and of A. M. in 1633, may be seen at the Woburn Public Library, Woburn, Mass. I have also deposited at the Woburn Public Library photographic copies of manuscript known to be in the handwriting of Rev. Thomas Carter, all of which prove conclusively that the student of St. John's, Cambridge, and the first minister of Woburn were one and the same individual. With these is also a photograph, among others, of a deposition referred to in the "Pioneers of Massachusetts" as made by Rev. Thomas Carter, which by comparison is seen conclusively not to be his work. The deposition referred to is dated 17 (10) 1662, and was undoubtedly made by Thomas Carter of Charlestown, son of Thomas Carter, blacksmith, of Charlestown, who died 1652. In the deposition he gives his age as "about fifty two," so that we have here a fourth Thomas Carter who was born about 1610. Three in New England and one in Virginia unless, as some believe, the Thomas Carter who embarked for Virginia in the Safty, 1635, came later to Massachusetts and became the first minister of Woburn. Certainly nothing further is heard of this Thomas Carter in Virginia and there are some good reasons for believing the above supposition to be true.

After learning that in all probability Rev. Thomas Carter was a native of Suffolk and a graduate of Bury St. Edmund's School, I employed Mr. Vincent B. Redstone of Woodbridge, Suffolk, who is secretary of the Suffolk Archæological Institute and a genealogist of wide reputation, to prosecute the search for me in this county.

In the course of these investigations Mr. Redstone made careful search at Cambridge University, at Bury St. Edmund's and among the records of the county found at London as well as among the files and parish registers found in various parts of Suffolk County itself. Nothing further of particular value was found at Cambridge or at Bury or in London, and the results of the search in Suffolk were not conclusive, but facts were brought to light which may be of value in reaching a definite conclusion later on.

By the will of James Carter of Hinderclay, County Suffolk, Yeoman (see Register vol. xxxix., page 335), at Somerset House, London: "Memorandum that James Carter late whilst hee lived of Hinderclay in the County of Cuffolk yeoman deceased upon Saterday the Eighth day of September one thousand six hundred fifty and five beinge by misfortune wounded in Body of which he afterwards died but in goode and perfect minde and memory with a full intention to settle and dispose of his Estate did make his last will and Testament nuncupative in manner and forme following or of the very same or like effect. That is to say I give unto the children of my brother Thos. Carter who now is in the New England to every one of them Ten pounds a peece as conveyinently as the same may be raysed out of my parsonall Estate I give unto the two sonnes of my brother William Stubbs of Harleston by his late wife who was my sister Twenty pounds And to his two daughters which he had by her Ten pounds a peece I

give unto Frances Edwards my wifes kinswoman and now my servant the sum of Five pounds and I give my wife her dwellinge in the Parlor of my dwellinge house dureing her life. And one hundred of wood yearely for her fryeinge which words or the like effect he so did speake in good memory in the presence and heareinge of severall witnesses whose names are hereunto subscribed:

"Witnes Thomas Whitwood Joane Whitwood her mark Admon. granted 24 October 1655 to Mary, relict.

"P. C. C. Aylett, fol. 391."

What Thomas Carter was this whose children were in New England in 1655? What a pity he did not mention their names.

Will of Gregory Carter of Hinderclay, senior, July 26, 1606. Wife, Alice. Sons, Robert, Humphrey, James, Thomas, Edmund. Daughters, Anne, Margaret, Elizabeth. Grandchildren, Thomas, son of Humphrey, two children of James; the children of Thomas, viz., Thomas and Elizabeth. Also to his wife's four children, Richard, Nicholas, Anne and Margaret. Executors, Giles Browninge and son Robert. His son, Thomas, supervisor.

Proved April 4, 1608.

James Carter of Hinderclay, yeoman, by will dated August, 1625. To wife, Mary—Parlor, parlor chamber and little chamber at east end of parlor. To son, Thomas — Wood and grove in Thelvetham and lands purchased of Gregory Carter. To daughter Mary—Lands in Thelvetham. To eldest son, James — Lands to pay his brother Thomas every year until said Thomas shall attain his twenty-first year, an annuity from lands at Hinderclay.

Sole executor, Richard Williamson of North Lopham.

Proved Oct. 1, 1625.

Comparing the three wills above noted, there seems to be no reasonable doubt that the Gregory Carter who made the will in 1606 was the father of James Carter who died 1625, and that the latter was the father of the James whose will is dated Sept. 8, 1655, in which he refers to his brother Thomas Carter in New England.

Gregory Carter, in his will of 1606, speaks of two children of his son James, while James in 1655 mentions a sister and a brother, Thomas, making three children, because Thomas was not born at the time the will of the elder James was drawn, or at his death, January, 1607.

Another will found at Bury St. Edmund's is that of Nicholas Carter of Hinderclay, dated 1600; wife, Alice; son, Gregory; daughter, Alice; sister, Marion, late wife of Bearte of Garboldsham. Lands in Hopton, Wattlysfield and Barningham. Witnesses, Thomas and James Carter.

This was in all probability the Nicholas Carter who married Alice Spurgeon in 1586, and it also seems probable that he was brother of Gregory Carter, who died 1607, but this cannot be affirmed from the records given. Several points make the construction of a pedigree difficult. Gregory Carter, senior, who died January, 1607, has children of the same name as Gregory Carter,

junior. And besides the oft-repeated names of children, we have Alice and Mary as wives' names for several; and as the register only gives the father's name, the entries are confusing.

We come now to the question as to which of the Thomas Carters who emigrated to New England in the early days is referred to in the will of James Carter, 1655. And in the first place we note that the names of the children of all the early Carters about Boston are remarkably unlike the names of the Carters of Hinderclay. Gregory, Nicholas, James, Edmund, Robert, Humphrey, Jonathan, Jacob, Dorothy, scarcely occur among the children of the first Carters, while we have instead Thomas, Mary, Samuel, John, Martha, Joseph, and in the case of Rev. Thomas Carter of Woburn, Judith, Abigail, Theophilus, Deborah and Timothy. In fact the children of Rev. Thomas seem to have almost purely Bible names; the oldest son is Samuel; the oldest daughter, Judith; the third child and second son, Theophilus, while not until the fourth son and seventh child is born is a son named for his father, Thomas.

Coming now to the question of which Thomas Carter was brother of James of Hinderclay, we note first, that the Thomas Carter who came over in the Planter, 1635, and afterwards settled in Salisbury, was from St. Albans, Hertfordshire, according to the ship's entry; was twenty-five, hence born in 1610 and, so far as known, had no connection with the Carters of Hinderclay or of Suffolk at all. It will be noticed from the Register of Hinderclay that Thomas Carter, brother of James, was baptized July 3, 1608, and there really seems no probability whatever that Thomas Carter of Salisbury was the brother of James of Hinderclay.

Next consider Thomas Carter, blacksmith, of Charlestown, who died in 1652. He had children, mentioned in will, Thomas, eldest son, Samuel, Joseph, John; daughters, Hannah, Mary.

Now the eldest son, Thomas, deposed in 1662, that he was about fifty-two years old, so he must have been born about 1610, and his father (deceased 1652) must have been born before 1600, and therefore could not have been the brother of James, and of course the son, Thomas of Charlestown, although born at nearly the right date, 1610, cannot possibly be the man, for his father's name was Thomas.

We come then to the only man left who seems at all likely to be the Thomas of the will, and that is Rev. Thomas Carter, first minister of Woburn, and so far as I now see, only two circumstances appear to oppose the theory. First his age at death, 1684, is given as seventy-four. If this is correct, he must have been born in 1610.

But as is well known, "age at death" is very often incorrectly given. A case in point is that of Thomas Carter, grandson of Reverend Thomas, who is buried in Warren, Conn., died Nov. 18, 1772, "AE. 88" (tombstone). He was son of Thomas and Margery Whitmore Carter, and according to Woburn Records, was born June 13, 1686. Especially frequent were errors of this kind in the early days. So that this objection is not serious.

The other objection to the theory is the fact that the names of Rev. Thomas Carter's children are so very unlike the names of the Hinderclay Carters. But as we have seen, this is found to be true of all other Carters of early New England, and so cannot be said to forbid the supposition. I might here remark that the statement made in the "Pioneers of Massachusetts" about Řev. Thomas Carter of Woburn, "born about 1608, as he deposed 17 (10), 1662," is an error of subtraction, as well as of fact. The deposition has already been referred to above, and was made by Thomas Carter of Charlestown, son of the blacksmith. Other circumstances which seem to point to the truth of the theory that Thomas Carter, brother of James, was also the first minister of Woburn, are that his father's will, 1625, indicates a man of moderate means, such as a "sizar" at Cambridge often was; again Hinderclay is near Cambridge University, at which place Rev. Thomas Carter was graduated; the grandfather and other relatives were certainly people of more than ordinary means and such as would be likely to favor a college training.

However, I do not consider the evidence conclusive, and it is to be hoped that further investigations may be carried out, and the question as to which Thomas Carter is referred to in the will of James Carter, 1655, may be definitely settled.

I will add that Mr. Redstone, who made the search for me, has already examined a large number of records in various parts of Suffolk, but there are still other sources of information which have as yet not been examined, and which might yield the facts desired.

If anyone knows of facts which add to the information here given concerning the questions raised about the early Carters, it is much to be desired that they be made public, and the writer would be happy to co-operate with anyone interested, and give all the facts in his possession.

Mr. Julian H. Tuttle, the assistant librarian of the Massachusetts Historical Society, while examining the copy of an old volume in the Boston Public Library, about three years ago, found pasted in the binding of the book the fragments of an elegy, which he supposed possessed some interest. The authorities of the Boston Public Library had the cover taken off and as much saved of the fragments as possible.

The volume, which was small, was printed in 1685, presumably in Cambridge, Mass,, and the elegy was used to strengthen the back. The elegy was a sheet in the form of a handbill, or a "broadside."

The restoration of the handbill was not so complete as was wished; the most important part being destroyed the entire length of the back of the book into whose binding it was incorporated. The presumption is that it was an elegy on the death of the Rev. Thomas Carter, first pastor of the First

Church of Christ in Woburn, published in 1684, the year of his death. If so, here was an important discovery and the matter was referred to the present writer.

I have not satisfied my mind as to the correctness of its identification, but Mr. Howard Williston Carter of Norfolk, Conn., after having seen the fragments of the elegy at the Boston Public Library, to which I called his attention, thinks there is no question about its reference to Mr. Carter, and one or two other points about it are of special interest. "One is the statement that he deceased in the 77th year of his age (1684). This may not be true, but it is a definite statement by one who evidently was intimately acquainted with the Woburn minister, and an educated man. The date of the birth in this case would be 1608."

## APPENDIX D.

## Warren, Connecticut.


Warren, Connecticut, which has been the home, or the ancestral home, of so many Carters of this line, was set off from the town of Kent in May, 1786, receiving its name from the gallant General Warren who fell at Bunker Hill. Although it has always been one of the smaller towns of the state, it has a most honorable record, both as regards the prominent men it has raised up, and also as regards the number and character of the sturdy pioneers who have gone out from its borders. Many went to Vermont; a large number settled in New York and "New Connecticut"; the towns of Talmadge, Edinburgh, Ruggles and Canfield in Ohio, and Waverly, Illinois, were largely settled from this place.

It is stated in the printed half-century sermon of the Rev. Peter Starr, that 2837 persons had emigrated from the town during his ministry, and history records that wherever they went they were found among the foremost in every good work.

The following pages will be of interest to many, containing as they do, the autographs of more than a hundred of the early pioneers and first settlers of Warren, who contributed at this time, 1790, nearly \$4000 toward a permanent church fund.

The fine old town of Warren will have a "Home-Coming" to-morrow, the 21st, which will reach over into Sunday, when there will be appropriate exercises in the old church on the hill where Dr. Horace Bushnell used to attend service every summer and sometimes to preach. The town stands fourth from the bottom of the list as regards population among the towns of the state. It had 432 inhabitants according to the last census. Mariboro with 322, Andover with 385 and Union with 428 came below it. Three others, Bolton with 457, Salem with 468 and Scotland with 471, also had less than 500 people each. There are forty-four towns with each less than 1000 of population. But size and number of people do not make the history of the town. Warren has been the home of a splendid lot of citizens, and men of eminence through the country have been—and now are—proud to trace their lineage back to the thrifty and high-minded folk who tilled the unwilling soil and breathed the pure air of that choice corner of Litchfield county. It is absolutely country—not a factory in its limits, possibly in these days not even a store. But it is a good deal nearer to heaven than some places that make more pretensions.
