

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#### PREFACE

This volume gives the results of the first attempt to compile and publish a complete genealogy of all the Stone descendants of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone, a founder of New England in 1635; and it also gives the results of extended research in England for his ancestry.

During the last half century, brief genealogies (mostly mere vital statistics) have been printed, in over a score of New England town histories, concerning various branches of the descendants of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone; and three small pamphlets on different branches of descendants have been compiled and published.

This genealogy has been produced under the auspices of the Stone Family Association, which was organized in Boston in 1897 with one hundred and twenty members, on the initiative of the late Sarah Adaline (Johnson) Stone, second wife of the late John Livingston<sup>10</sup> Stone of Marlborough, Mass. The officers of this Association have been elected as follows:

During the last twenty years the Association has held a regular annual winter meeting in Boston, and usually a field day each summer when some place of historical interest to the family has been visited. The Association has also all these years had in view the compilation and publication of genealogies of the old New England Stone families, descended from several pioneer founders. To this end the Association printed and circulated ancestry blanks, on which Stone descendants filled out and returned to the Association their ancestral lines. These blanks were admirable for that purpose, but were of very little value in securing data for a genealogy, as they give but one child in each generation and nothing but mere vital records. In 1902 the Association printed a ninetytwo page catalogue of its members and other Stone descendants. giving their ancestral lines, which had been carefully and accurately edited by the corresponding secretary, Miss Agnes W. Lincoln, from the returns made on the above named ancestry blanks. The Association also printed in 1897 a twelve-page pamphlet entitled "The English Ancestry of Simon and Gregory Stone," making public valuable data which had been secured of their ancestry at Great Bromley, County Essex, after twenty years of investigation by Mr. William E. Stone of Cambridge, Mass. The Association also printed in 1907 a twenty-two page pamphlet giving data from manor court rolls concerning the Stones of Ardleigh, County Essex, England, which had been secured by Miss Agnes W. Lincoln from Rev. Reginald H. Grubbe, vicar of Ardleigh since 1902. Other activities of the Association include the installation, by subscription of several of its members, of a beautiful stained-glass window in Great Bromley Church, in memory of Dea. Simon1 and Dea. Gregory1 Stone; and the placing of a memorial tablet to Dea. Gregory Stone in the Cooper-Austin House on Linngan Street, Cambridge, Mass., built in 1657 by his step son, Dea. John Cooper.

In January 1914 the Association appointed the following members a committee on publication for the compiling and publishing of genealogies of the descendants of Dea. Gregory¹ Stone and Dea. Simon¹ Stone: †William E. Stone of Cambridge, Mass., chairman; \*Charles Augustus Stone of Boston (now New York); †Daniel Clifford Stone of Medford (now Newton Center), Mass.; \*Miss Katharine H. Stone of West Medford, Mass.; \*Miss Agnes W. Lincoln of West Medford, Mass. The funds in the treasury of the Association were placed at the disposal of this committee, and Mr. William E. Stone, the chairman, headed a subscription list of patrons for the work, and financial co-operation was secured from

the following members of the Association, viz.: \*Charles Augustus Stone of Boston (now New York); †Galen L. Stone of Brookline, Mass.; †Miss Eleanor S. Parker of Boston; †Nathaniel H. Stone of Milton, Mass.; \*Miss Agnes W. Lincoln of West Medford, Mass.; and †Albert Stone of Boston.

The committee engaged the author to compile and edit the genealogies. Under his direction about eight thousand genealogical blanks and circulars were mailed in the Spring of 1914 to all Stone addresses found in five hundred United States city directories. From February 1914 to June 1915 the author was in England, occupied on several professional commissions, during which time the Stone research there was completed. Returning to America, he was authorized on 1 Dec. 1915 to start compiling material for both the Gregory Stone and Simon Stone genealogies, on which he was steadily occupied until 1 Mar. 1917; and from 1 Mar. 1917 to 1 Mar. 1918 he has been engaged in preparing for the printer a finished manuscript of this Gregory Stone Genealogy, and in supervising its publication.

The American families have been compiled from vital statistics, records, biographies and genealogies in printed books, from data obtained by extensive researches in original vital, probate and land records in the New England States, and from returns of filled-in genealogical blanks secured by correspondence with all living descendants whose addresses have been ascertained. A work of this character requires for completion the hearty cooperation of all the present living descendants, who must furnish the records of the present and last two generations, especially of families who have left New England during the last century and whose records, therefore, cannot otherwise be readily secured. It is gratifying that nearly all the present descendants have manifested a pride and interest in having their lines and families included in the volume, and so a high percentage of returns have been received from persons applied to for information.

The author has always maintained that a family genealogy should be a biographical and historical work, and not a mere compilation of dates; so in addition to the vital statistics he has endeavored to present data on all persons as to their residences, migrations, occupations, civil and religious offices, and military services, and to give extended biographies of the most prominent members of the family. The volume contains records of over five thousand descendants of Dea. Gregory¹ Stone, born of the name, and probably of as large a number of descendants of Stone daughters bearing other names. The volume includes nearly ninety-

nine per cent of the descendants of Dea. Gregory Stone, born of the name before 1800, and nearly ninety per cent of those born since 1800. The records of families have been carried down to 1 Jan. 1917 whenever possible; since that time the entry of America into the great world war has of course made many changes in details on present families, only a few of which have been received.

As a general rule the accounts of married Stone daughters give full data on them and their husbands and the names and birthdates of their children; but the history and descendants of the latter are not generally further pursued, as it is considered that their history properly belongs in genealogies of their respective family names. But exceptions have been made to this rule in the cases of members of the Stone Family Association whose direct descent from the Stone name is more remote.

No genealogical work of this scope can be made entirely complete or wholly free from small errors, especially in dates. Often there is a disagreement in dates in the same particular family as supplied by its different members, which dates may also disagree with official town records; so some discrepancies in dates are unavoidable. Among several thousand correspondents, careless or illegible handwriting is frequently met with, which presents difficulties and liability to misreading. But every care has been taken to make the work as complete as possible and as free as possible from errors, even in trivial details; and all the lines of descent and assignments of civil and military services may be fully relied on as accurate.

The descendants of Dea. Gregory Stone have been continuously a race of solid and substantial worth. Their history reveals the best of the qualities of the old New England Puritan stock which has been the predominant element in the development of the Northern and Western States. In peace and in war they have borne well their part in American history; and among the members of the family there have been numerous individuals of eminence in professional life, commercial activities, military achievements,

and public service.

It is hoped that this biographical and genealogical history covering six centuries will realize the expectations of the descendants of Dea. Gregory Stone, who for twenty years have been looking forward to its publication; and it is also hoped that the descendants of Dea. Simon Stone will arrange for the editing and publishing of a companion volume of his ancestors and descendants from material already collected for it.

# ANCESTRY OF GREGORY STONE A PIONEER OF NEW ENGLAND IN 1685

#### THE ENGLISH SETTLERS OF NEW ENGLAND

At the period of the settlement of New England (1620-1640), the population of England was a homogeneous race amalgamated in the course of centuries from several races which in the remote past had successively invaded and overspread the country.

A thousand years before Christ, the ancient Iberian aborigines of the Stone Age in the British Isles were overwhelmed by the Celtic Britons, the vanguard of the Aryan invasion from Asia through Central Europe, who overran and populated the islands. During the first four centuries of the Christian era, the Britons of England were under the military sway of the Roman Empire, although not much Roman blood was infused into the native population. After the withdrawal of the Roman legions about A.D. 420, England was gradually overspread by hordes of Angles, Saxons, and Jutes, Gothic tribes from Schlesweg and vicinity in Germany, who in the course of a century exterminated or expelled into Wales and Brittany the majority of the Britons, reduced the remainder to serfdom, and by about A.D. 550 constituted probably over four-fifths of the blood of the population, and indelibly impressed on the country their language and characteristics which prevail in the English race to this day. For five centuries the Anglo-Saxons dominated England; and while toward the close of their régime there was considerable Danish settlement in the country, particularly in Yorkshire and Lincolnshire, yet in A.D. 1066, probably nearly three-fourths of the blood of the then two million population was Anglo-Saxon. In this year the Norman conquest extinguished the rule of the Anglo-Saxons in England and stripped them of all ownership of the land, reducing them to artisans, laborers, and serfs of the soil; and although the Norman invaders comprised probably but one-sixth of the population, the establishment of the feudal system securely founded a powerful

Norman landed aristocracy, which by means of the custom of primogeniture has endured over eight centuries. For a few generations after the Norman conquest there was a sharp caste distinction between the Normans and Anglo-Saxons; but gradually a welding together of the general mass of the population took place and from the very great numerical preponderance of the Anglo-Saxons, their tongue became by far the predominant element in the evolution of the modern English language, which became well established in its present general form during the reign of Henry VI (1422-1461).

At the time of the settlement of New England, in the blood of the English nobility the Norman strain was still strongly preponderant; but it is generally considered that of the blood of the great mass of the then five million population of England (the yeomanry, craftsmen, laborers, etc.) nearly two-thirds was Anglo-Saxon, the remainder being chiefly Norman, Danish, Briton, Roman, and Iberian, in amounts decreasing in the order named. Moreover this preponderance of Anglo-Saxon blood pertained especially to Suffolk and Essex whence were derived over half of the twenty-five thousand English colonists who settled New England between 1620 and 1643, among whom were the brothers Simon and Gregory Stone, founders of the largest and most prominent of the Stone families in America.

Besides Gregory Stone and his brother Simon Stone, there were over a dozen other Stone colonists from England who appeared in New England during the seventeenth century. Among them were: Daniel Stone of Kittery, Me., in 1669; Elias Stone of Charlestown, Mass., in 1686; Hugh Stone of Andover, Mass., in 1667; Hugh Stone of Warwick, R. I., in 1666; John Stone of Salem, Mass., in 1636; John Stone of Lynn, Mass., in 1648, later of Hull, Mass.; John Stone of Guilford, Conn., in 1639; Nicholas Stone of Boston in 1651; Richard Stone of Kittery, Me., in 1653; Robert Stone of Weymouth and Salem, Mass., in 1651; Rev. Samuel Stone of Cambridge, Mass., in 1683, later of Hartford, Conn., and William Stone of Guilford, Conn., in 1639 (brother of John of Guilford) All of these colonists (except John Stone of Lynn and Hull, Richard Stone, and Rev. Samuel Stone) have left numerous descendants of the name. None of these colonists, except the brothers Gregory and Simon Stone and the brothers John and William Stone of Guilford, are known to have been related to one another. It is known that Gregory and Simon Stone were born in County Essex, and that John Stone of Lynn and Hull came from Somersetshire and Rev. Samuel Stone from Hertfordshire.

#### FAMILY NAMES

Among the ancient Briton and Saxon inhabitants of England. hereditary family surnames were unknown, and individuals had but a single given name. With the Norman conquest in 1066 a change in family nomenclature was introduced into England as the great feudal barons of Normandy bore as hereditary family surnames the names of the places of their lordships; as William de Warrenne, later Warren (William [Lord] of Warrenne), Roger de Beaumont, William d'Albini, Roger de Montgomerie, Hugh de Beauchamp, etc.; and when they settled in England they and their male descendants retained their Norman family names, the "de" in course of time disappearing. In general, names of parishes, hamlets, and towns in England were not changed by the Norman conquest, and the Norman lords of the manors held by knights fee of the great feudal barons, took for hereditary family surnames the Saxon names of their manors, as Everard de Boxted, Thomas de Coggeshall, Anketill de Messings, Robert de Horkesley, etc., etc. The great mass of the population, owning or holding no land, and mostly of the old Anglo-Saxon and Danish blood, bore no hereditary family surnames until about the period of the reign of Edward I (1272-1307), when as civilization advanced and the population increased, it became necessary to have a general systematic means of family and personal identity. Therefore, during the latter part of the thirteenth century hereditary family surnames gradually came into general use among the mass of the English population (but in Wales the custom was not well established until the sixteenth century).

Family names in England were derived principally from seven sources:

I. Places in Normandy and England as before described.

II. Localities: Walter at-the-stone became Walter atte Stone, later Stone; John at-the-wells became John atte Wells, later Wells; William at-the-wood became William atte Wood, later Wood; in like manner originated Hill, Dale, Field, Croft, Leigh, Lea, or Lee, Brook, Downs, Ford, Heath, Lane, Marsh, Fenn, Gates, Park, Pond, Tower, Styles, Church, etc., etc.

III. Patronymics in three forms:

(a) The Saxon form: John the son of William became John Williamson, Williams, or Wilson; Robert the son of Richard became Robert Richardson, Richards, Dickson, or Dixon; likewise were derived Johnson, Jones and Jackson; Davidson, Davis, and Dawes; Thompson, Tomson, and Tompkins, etc. (b) The Norman form: Roger fils or fitz [son of] Gilbert became Roger Fitz Gilbert; and in like manner were derived Fitz Herbert, Fitz Payne, etc.; but this form came into but little use.

(c) The Welsh form: John ap [son of] Ryce became John Price; in a similar way evolved ap Hugh into Pugh, ap Owen into Bowen, ap Richard into Prichard, ap Howell into Powell, etc.

IV. Occupations: John le Smith became later John the Smith and finally John Smith; likewise were adopted Carpenter, Mason, Baker, Barber, Taylor, Cooper, Carter, Chapman, Miller, Shep-

herd, Wright, etc., etc.

V. Offices: King, Prince, Duke, Earl, Baron, Knight, Lord, Marshall, Constable, Squire, Summoner (or Sumner), Burgess, Bailiff (or Bailey), Bishop, Abbot, Priest, Clerk or Clark, Forrester or Foster, Parker, Woodward (or Woodreve or Woodruff), Hayward, etc., etc.

VI. Personal Characteristics: Long, Tallman, Bigg, Gross, Short, Lowe, Little, Small; White, Gray, Brown, Black, Read [Red]; Clement, Savage, Gay, Grave, Sweet, Goode; Meane, Rich,

Poor, Hardy, Strong, Armstrong, Swift, etc., etc.

VII. Animals, Birds, and Fishes: Wolf, Bull, Fox, Lyon, Lamb, Doe, Hare, Leverett, Hind, Badger, Hogg, etc.; Bird, Fowle, Hawke, Wrenn, Partridge, Swallow, Martin, Swan, Crane, Drake, etc.; Fish, Fiske, Salmon, Herring, Crabb, Haddock, Ray, Sturgeon, etc. Persons given these names doubtless had in many cases some real or fancied physical or mental characteristics of these creatures; in other cases probably had used them for a sign or device.

#### THE FAMILY NAME OF STONE

The family name of Stone is derived from two sources; first, from residence in parishes, villages, or hamlets named Stone, and secondly, from residence near some prominent ledge or boulder sufficient in size to be a local landmark. There are eleven parishes, villages, or hamlets in England named Stone, scattered in eight different counties, viz.: 1. Stone, a parish in Stafford. 2. Stone, a parish in Bucks. 3. Stone, a parish in Gloucester. 4. Stone, a hamlet in Hants. 5. Stone (near Dartford), a parish in Kent. 6. Stone (in Oxney), a parish in Kent. 7. Stone-next-Faversham, a parish in Kent. 8. Stone, a parish in Worcester. 9. Stone, a hamlet in the parish of Chew Magna in Somerset. 10. Stone, a hamlet in the parish of East Pennard in Somerset. 11. Stone, a hamlet in the parishes of Firbeck and Maltby in York.

It is noteworthy that with one exception (Stone in Yorkshire), all the above places named Stone are located in the southerly half of England; and according to Guppy's "Homes of Family Names in England," the Stone families are most common in the following counties, all of which are in the southerly half of England, viz: Berks, Bucks, Cornwall, Devon, Dorset, Essex, Herts, Kent, Somerset, and Surrey. Stone families are in fact rare north of a line from Chester to Lincoln.

From the origin of the name, it is evident that persons named Stone are not all of a single origin, but that there are various families of the name, derived from different places and localities, who assumed the name at some period prior to the fourteenth century.

#### EARLY RECORDS OF STONES IN ENGLAND

The earliest mentions of the family name Stone are found with the prefixes "de" or "atte" in connection with places or localities named Stone. A few of such early mentions before the reign of Edward II (1307-1327) are appended. They extend from 1253 to 1307 and show Stones in twelve different counties, all in the southern half of England.

William de la Stone had a bakery in Hereford bounding on land there of Mock of Hereford, a Jew, according to a writ directed to the sheriff of Hereford, to enquire thereon, dated 8 July 37 Henry III (1253). (Chancery Inquisitions, Miscellaneous, File 8 [20].)

Sir Gilbert de Stone was one of the witnesses to a confirmation charter, dated at Bury St. Edmunds, co. Suffolk, 9 Feb. 51 Henry III (1266/7), whereby Geoffrey de Upton granted to William Giffard lands in Upton, Waldrigg, and Hamden [all in co. Bucks]. (Charter Rolls, 51 Henry III, m. 8.)

Walter de Stone appears in a list of persons to whom was granted 30 June 51 Henry III (1267) a safe conduct to come to the King's court to treat for their peace, until St. Peter's Chains [1

Aug.]. (Patent Rolls, 51 Henry III, m. 13.)

John de Stone, imprisoned at Canterbury for killing William le Mouner, was admitted to bail, as it was shown he acted in self-defence. Writ directed to the sheriff of Kent, 31 Aug. 10 Edward I (1282). (Close Rolls, 10 Edward I, m. 2.)

Roger atte Stone was a customary tenant of some of the lands assigned as dower of Ela, widow of John de Meriet, of Meriet, co. Somerset. Inquisition dated 28 May 13 Edward I (1285). (Close Rolls, 13 Edward I, m. 8.)

Robert de Stone petitioned for a chantry in the chapel of Stone. Inquisition ad quod Damnum taken in 13 Edward I (1285). (Cal-

endar of State Papers, Henry III and Edward I. p. 363.)

Philip atte Stone appears as a creditor for 11d. at Little Hormede [co. Herts], in the Inquisition Post Mortem after the death of Walter de Nevile, held at Hertford on Friday after St. Lukes, 14 Edward I (25 Oct. 1286). (Inquisitions Post Mortem, Edward I, File 62 [7].)

Robert de Stone was a witness to a grant, dated 4 Apr. 19 Edward I (1291), at Berkeley, co. Gloucester, by Roger le Bygod, Earl of Norfolk, to the King, of certain manors in Norfolk, Suffolk,

and Essex. (Close Rolls, 19 Edward I, m. 5 d.)

Agatha de la Stone was tenant of lands in Exton [co. Somerset], the rents and services of which were assigned 12 Jan. 20 Edward I (1291/2) as part of the dower of Avice, widow of Robert le Blund. (Close Rolls, 20 Edward I, m. 12 d.)

William de la Stone held half a fee and a third of a fee in La Stone, co. Devon, assigned as part of the dower of Eleanor, widow of Hugh de Courtenay; Inquisition dated 8 July 20 Edward I

(1292). (Close Rolls, 20 Edward I, m. 4.)

Robert atte Stone and Geoffrey atte Stone, et als., men of John de Insula [de Lisle], are ordered to go with him from Winchester for Wales, in the King's service. Writ dated 12 Nov. 22 Edward I (1294). (Close Rolls, 22 Edward I, m. 1.)

Thomas de Stone of co. Worcester was one of forty-eight jurors summonsed to determine a portion of the boundary line between co. Stafford and co. Salop. Writ dated 17 July 25 Edward I (1297).

(Close Rolls, 25 Edward I, m. 12 d.)

Robert atte Stone is mentioned 4 Jan. 29 Edward I (1300/1), as late a bailiff of Queen Eleanor of lands in Hautboys and Scothowe

[co. Norfolk]. (Close Rolls, 29 Edward I, m. 17.)

Paulinus at Stone, aged forty-four years, was one of the witnesses at an inquisition taken at Langedon, co. Essex, 4 May 29 Edward I (1801), to prove the age of Katharine, daughter and heir of James de Langedon, who had married Robert de Kynbanton. The witnesses report she was born at Langedon on the Eve of the Feast of St. Augustine, 13 Edward I [25 May 1285]. (Inquisitions Post Mortem, Edward I, File 103 [8].)

By writ of 1 Apr. 35 Edward I (1307), the sheriffs of Kent, Oxford, and Bucks were ordered to take for the King all lands and goods late of Stephen de Stone, who had received a great sum of money from the wardrobe of Edward, Prince of Wales, for divers provisions for the Prince's use, for which account had not been rendered; and they were ordered to retain same until the heirs or

executors of said Stephen should fully account in the wardrobe. (Fine Rolls, 35 Edward I, m. 6.)

Robert atte Stone and Ralph atte Stone appear as tenants of the Manor of Upton, co. Leicester, on roll dated 28 June, 35 Edward I (1307). (Close Rolls, 35 Edward I, m. 4 and m. 3.)

Lands in Kydermenstre, co. Worcester, of Thomas atte Stone, a tenant at 7s. 5d., and of William atte Stone, a tenant at 8s., were assigned as part of the dower of Katharine, widow of John Byset. (Close Rolls, 35 Edward I, m. 2.)

#### HERALDRY

About the time of the First Crusade (A.D. 1100), the practice became established in western Europe for knights to depict certain devices on their shields to identify their bearers, who completely encased in the metal armor of the age could not otherwise be recognized in battle. This was the origin of coats-of-arms, and soon the custom became established for one particular device to be borne hereditably in one particular family; and later in England the right to bear a hereditary coat-of-arms became an honor and privilege issuing from the Sovereign, under the supervision of the Earl Marshal.

With no especial regulations in the matter difficulties arose, among them that of two families claiming the same arms; a remarkable case of this kind was the celebrated "Scrope vs. Grosvenor Cause at Arms" which commenced in A.D. 1385 before the Earl Marshal and continued for five years, being finally decided in A.D. 1390 by the King, to whom the case had been appealed. To organize and regulate heraldry which had gradually become a science, the College of Arms (or Heralds College) was formally instituted as early as A.D. 1464 and later incorporated; the Earl Marshal is the head of this college solely in which is vested the right to grant or confirm arms and legally certify pedigrees in connection therewith, etc.

To properly enroll the gentry entitled to bear coats-of-arms and to prevent the use of arms by persons without right to them, the College of Arms commenced about A.D. 1580 to hold county "visitations," in which the heralds of the College would visit the various counties, secure from the nobility and gentry information as to their pedigrees from verbal statements and family documents, settle their claims to coats-of-arms, and publish lists of persons who had assumed arms without right. These visitations were held irregularly about once in a generation down to about A.D. 1670,

after which time that custom ceased; but the College with all its authority still continues. At the visitations the custom of the heralds seems to have generally been, that if a gentleman could prove that the arms he claimed had been borne or used by his lineal male ancestors for three generations or over a century, his right to the arms was acknowledged; if he did not prove this, his right to the arms was respited [withheld] until he should do so.

The completed results of these visitations were copied and enrolled in the archives of the College of Arms; but the heralds often retained personally their original manuscripts, a large number of which are now in the libraries of Cambridge University, Oxford

University, and the British Museum.

For persons of English descent the right to bear arms must be

derived from one of the following three sources:

I. A new creation and personal grant by the College of Arms. This can be secured only by a British subject possessing certain qualifications of property, etc., on payment of fees of £76-10-0.

II. Proof of descent in an unbroken lineal male line from an ancestor to whom personally a coat-of-arms was granted or con-

firmed by the College of Arms.

III. Proof of descent in an unbroken lineal male line from a family line recorded in a visitation by the heralds of the College of Arms, which was acknowledged by them to be entitled to bear arms.

As when arms have been granted, confirmed, or acknowledged to certain individuals, the right to their use descends to all their lineal male descendants of the name forever, it is immaterial to the right of such use whether or not said descendants are British subjects, or where they reside, or whether or not all the intermediate generations of their ancestors have availed themselves of their

privilege.

Various coats-of-arms have been used by various Stone armorial families in England from very early times, these arms appearing in visitation pedigrees, on records of grants and confirmations by the College of Arms, in monumental inscriptions, and on seals, etc. There are two most usual forms of ancient Stone coats-of-arms; one is Argent, a lion passant sable, with variations in the tinctures and in details as to the lion; the other is, Argent, three cinquefoils sable, a chief axure, with variations in the tinctures and in charges on the chief. The Stone family of Blackmore, co. Essex, are credited in Burke's "General Armoury" with these arms: Argent, three cinquefoils sable, on a chief axure a sun or.

While the manorial gentry as a class were considered armorial and entitled to bear coats-of-arms and did use them, the yeomanry (or copyhold farmers) as a class were not considered armigerous and did not make pretensions to coats-of-arms. The ancestors of the brothers Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon Stone, colonists of New England in 1685, are clearly established as yeomen in Ardleigh and Great Bromley, co. Essex, as far back as the fourteenth century. Nothing has been found to show that any of these ancestors claimed or used any coat-of-arms or were considered armorial. The College of Arms has not granted or confirmed arms to any Stone individual or acknowledged as armorial any Stone family, known to be descended from the Stones of Ardleigh and Great Bromley. Nor is there any evidence or reason to believe that these yeoman Stones had sunk in position and were descended in some junior line from any ancient armorial Stone family of the twelfth or thirteenth century.

We therefore conclude the evidence available indicates that Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon Stone were not of armorial descent; and we do not recommend to their descendants a claim to any Stone coat-of-arms.

#### ORIGIN OF THE ENGLISH YEOMAN

For about two hundred and fifty years following the Norman conquest of 1066, the Norman-descended lords of the manors of England had on their lands three classes of agriculturists:

First, a small percentage of free tenants, mostly of Norman origin, who held parcels of land for which they paid fixed rentals, generally in commodities; these tenants were usually liable for military service under their lords, but were ordinarilly free from rendering labor on the lord's own lands and other special dues to him; they could also generally alienate their rights in their hold-

ings, and were not bound to the manor.

Secondly, a very large percentage of villeins, mostly descended from the old Anglo-Saxon and Danish population; they were practically serfs of the soil, as, although they were not bought and sold, they could not remove from the manor, their children remained villeins from birth, and their persons were largely subject to the lord's will. Villeins occupied cottages and had small allotments in the common lands of the manor which they worked for themselves; but they were obliged to work on the lord's lands about two-thirds of the days in the year, had to render various other services to him, and were also subject to numerous payments to the lord, like merchet (on marriage of a daughter), and heriot (or best beast) on the death of the villein.

Thirdly, a very small percentage of bondsmen whose condition

was practically that of slaves to the lord of the manor.

But in the early part of the fourteenth century, the condition of the villeins commenced to greatly improve, and was enhanced rapidly after about 1350 by the shortage of labor caused by ravages of the Black Death which carried off about half of the population of England. This change in the status of villeins was brought about in the fourteenth century by gradual and general establishment of copyhold leases, whereby the villeins became tenants of certain specified lands for which they rendered certain specified payments and rentals to the lord; their old feudal obligations to labor without compensation on the lord's lands and render him other services were commuted into money payments, and the condition of being bound to the manor from birth became obsolete. These copyhold leases became conveyable by their holders to their descendants or others, by transfers through the lord recorded on the court rolls of the manor.

Thus the feudal villein became generally transformed during the fourteenth century into the yeoman, which word from the fourteenth to the eighteenth century meant in its broad sense a man who farmed for his own benefit, by his own labor and that of hired laborers, lands which he held by copyhold leases of manorial lords. It is probable that ninety per cent of the twenty-five thousand founders of New England were derived from the yeoman class, whose origin has been above described. As previously stated, the yeomanry as a class were not considered armorial and did not make pretensions to coats-of-arms.

#### THE STONES OF ARDLEIGH AND GREAT BROMLEY, CO. ESSEX, ENGLAND

Dea. Gregory Stone and his brother Dea. Simon Stone, pioneers of New England in 1635, were descended from a family of yeoman rank. Their ancestors, bearing from about 1300 the surname Stone in the lineal male line, were located for generations in the adjacent rural parishes of Little Bentley, Ardleigh, and Great Bromley in Tendring Hundred, co. Essex, about fifty-five miles northeast of London. The place of importance nearest to these parishes is the borough of Colchester, founded in Roman times, which lies about four miles to the southwest, and has now a population of about forty thousand.

While it is of course impossible to be certain of the particular racial origin of the ancestors of Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon

Stone, yet it is known that migration about England of the agricultural class was limited, prior to the seventeenth century; and it is also known that the yeomen and their predecessors the villeins were descended mainly from the old Anglo-Saxon and Danish stock conquered by the Normans. Probably the great majority of the various ancestral lines of Dea. Simon and Dea. Gregory Stone had lived in Essex and adjoining Suffolk from a period in Saxon times long prior to the Norman conquest. While this region was under Danish domination for a generation (about 885 to about 915), the Danish settlement there was very small, their great strongholds of population being Yorkshire and Lincolnshire. The racial differences between Yorkshire-Lincolnshire and Suffolk-Essex are striking; the strong Danish element of the former region and the preponderating Anglo-Saxon element of the latter region being even still apparent in physical characteristics, local rustic dialect, and nomenclature. It therefore seems evident that Anglo-Saxon blood was by far the predominating racial element in the ancestry of Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon Stone, the colonists of New England.

For over three centuries prior to the emigration to New England in 1635 of Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon Stone, their ancestors named Stone had lived in Little Bentley, Ardleigh, and Great Bromley, in Tendring Hundred, co. Essex. The earliest mention that has been found of the name there is in 1302 under the form of "atte Stone," and this form of the name continued in use until about 1450, when the "atte" disappears. It therefore seems obvious that this particular Stone family derived their name from the fact that a remote ancestor in the thirteenth century assumed or was termed "atte Stone" from residing at or near some promi-

nent stone landmark in that region.

The earliest record that has been discovered of a Stone in Tend-


ring Hundred, co. Essex, is as follows:

Writ to the Sheriff of Essex, dated at Westminster, 26 Oct. 30 Edward I [1802]. Inquisition before the sheriff of Essex and William de Hanyngfeild, held at Colchester on Saturday after the Feast of St. Lucy, 31 Edward I [15 Dec. 1802]. Philip atte Stone, late servant of Robert de Vere, Earl of Oxford, and others (named) forcibly entered the park of the said earl at Great Bentleye and hunted therein against his will; also Thomas de Molendine of Dedham fished in the preserve of the said earl, within said park. (Miscellaneous Chancery Inquisitions, File 61 [23].)

The de Veres, Earls of Oxford, were large landowners in capite in Essex, possessing Colchester Castle and Hedingham Castle, and

many manors appendent to them.

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#### THE ENGLISH ANCESTRAL LINE

1. WALTER' ATTE STONE of Little Bentley, co. Essex, born probably as early as 1285 in the reign of Edward I, is the earliest member of the Stone family from whom we shall claim descent for Dea. Simon and Dea. Gregory Stone. It is possible that he may have been the first of the line to assume the name; but more likely it was his father or grandfather who did so. Possibly he may have been a son of Philip atte Stone, accused of poaching in Great Bent-

ley in 1302, as before related. (See ante, p. 11.)

Of the yeomanry of the fourteenth century but few records are preserved, the principal sources giving their names being the court rolls of the manors where they resided and the subsidy rolls (or tax lists of grants made to the Sovereign by Parliament). Unfortunately only few manor court rolls (except fragments) prior to about 1500 are preserved. While subsidies were levied about once every ten years between about 1320 and 1400, and rolls were made, arranged by counties and parishes, naming the persons assessed, the majority of these rolls do not now exist; for a few of the counties a large part of the rolls are still preserved; but nearly all of these fourteenth century rolls covering Tendring Hundred in Essex are now lost.

From the mists of antiquity but two records of Walter<sup>1</sup> atte Stone have been gleaned; his name appears at Little Bentley, co. Essex, as taxed 18½d. on a subsidy of 13 Edward II (1320), and as taxed 14½d. on a subsidy of 1 Edward III (1327). (Lay Subsidies, 107-10 and 107-12, Public Record Office, London.)

In the subsidy of 1 Edward III (1327), thirty-one names appear in Great Bromley, thirty-two in Ardleigh, and thirteen in Little Bentley. As an interesting example of family nomenclature six centuries ago, a full list of these names is appended:

Walter atte Stone probably came of age at about the beginning of the reign of Edward II (1307), and he lived through this sovereign's twenty years of inefficient rule, the most prominent feature of which was the great defeat in 1314 of the English army at Bannockburn by the Scots under Robert Bruce. Walter atte Stone also lived during the earlier part of the long and prosperous reign of Edward III (1327-1377). The most noteworthy internal features of this reign were the general transformation of the villein population into copyhold yeomanry, and the terrible ravages of the Black Death 1348-1350; in foreign affairs the reign was successful in wars against Scotland and in the brilliant exploits of the English armies in France, particularly at the battles of Crécy (1346) and Poitiers (1356).

The year of the decease of Walter atte Stone has not been learned, and no records of his family have been found. During the nearly ninety years from 1327 to 1415, only two mentions of Stone have been found in Tendring Hundred, viz: Henry atte Stoone was admitted a burgess of Colchester in 3 Richard II (1379-80), and Henry atte Stone appears on a release there made in 3 Henry IV (1401-2). (Oath Book of Colchester, pp. 72 and 86.) There were many burgesses of Colchester who came from or resided in the surrounding parishes; so doubtless this Henry atte Stone was a later member of the same Stone family as Walter atte

Stone before named, perhaps a grandson of the latter.

Unfortunately the numerous subsidy rolls made for Tendring Hundred between 1327 and 1524 are lost, nor are there known to be existing any manor court rolls of this period for Great Bromley or Little Bentley. Walter atte Stone was probably ancestor of the



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Stones who appear a century after him in Ardleigh, co. Essex, among whom the name Walter was common; but after Walter atte Stone, there is a gap in the line of two generations which remain buried in oblivion. We then come to

2. WILLIAM<sup>4</sup> ATTE STONE (————<sup>3</sup>, ————<sup>2</sup>, Walter<sup>1</sup>), born about 1865, probably a great-grandson of Walter<sup>1</sup> atte Stone. From this William<sup>4</sup> atte Stone the line of descent is traced down through seven recorded generations to Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon Stone, the colonists of New England in 1635. As William<sup>4</sup> atte Stone is the earliest member of the family found located in Ardleigh, where some of his descendants resided for over two centuries, it is well to present here a short description of this parish.

Ardleigh is a rural parish in Tendring Hundred, co. Essex, about four miles northeast of Colchester and about fifty-five miles northeast of London, with a railway station on the main Great Eastern line from London through Colchester to Ipswich. The parish is about three miles in length and about two and a half miles in width, covers about five thousand acres, and has now a population of about fifteen hundred. Agriculture, as for centuries, is still the occupation of nearly all the inhabitants, the chief crops being wheat, barley, oats, and hay. The parish church, dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin, is a fine structure of stone in excellent condition, consisting of chancel, nave, and aisles, all rebuilt in 1883, and an ancient south porch and an embattled tower with six bells, restored at the same time, which were originally built about 1450. The parish registers are preserved from 1555. The parish existed in Anglo-Saxon times and its name was derived from the Anglo-Saxon words "ardh" (high) and "leigh" (pasture). There are four ancient manors in the parish, which were in the fees of four Norman feudal barons after the conquest, as appears by the Domesday survey of 1086, viz: Roger de Ramis, Hugh de Gournay, Robert Gernons, and Geoffrey de Magnaville. These four manors about a century later became known respectively as Pigotts, Bovills, Moyse Hall, and Martells, from the names of the manorial families who possessed them. At a later period several of the farms in these manors became known by the names of the yeoman families who leased and occupied them from the fourteenth century, in some cases for several generations.

The court rolls of the Manor of Bovills in Ardleigh are preserved for the following fifty years during the period of two hundred and forty years from 1359 to 1599, viz: 1359, 60, 61, 62, 77, 79, 83, 84, 87, 98, 99; 1410, 12, 15, 16, 47, 51, 59, 64, 66, 67, 77, 78, 87, 92, 99; 1501, 13, 15, 16, 18, 19, 20, 23, 29, 30, 32, 33, 37, 39, 42, 48, 51, 54,

56, 84, 85, 86, 88, 89, and 99.\*

Only three records of William' atte Stone have come to light, the first in a lawsuit in 1898, the next as a juror at a court held in 1415, and the last in a court roll record after his death in 1431.

In Michaelmas 22 Richard II (1898), William atte Stone of Ardeley, co. Essex, was summonsed to answer John Hunte atte Wode of said Ardeley in a plea of debt of £2-8-4, which was due to be paid at Midsummer Day last past. (Common Pleas Roll,

Mich. 22 Richard II, m. 186.)

At a court baron of the Manor of Bovills, held on the day of Mars next after the Feast of Holy Trinity, 3 Henry V [Tuesday 28 May 1415]: An inquisition taken and sworn on the oath of William Meller, John Eccle, Thomas Baker, John Huntte senior, John Huntte atte Wode, William Burstalle, William Atte Stone, William Nevard, and John Clerk, who say on their oaths that the tenants of the land and tenement of Gunnoteland, the tenants of the land and tenement of Paynesland (late of Walter Badeley), William Stansor, Robert Robyn for a rood of land at the church, John Huntte atte Mersh, Robert Nee, John Brook, and the tenants of the land and tenement formerly of William Robyn, all owe suit to the court and have defaulted. They were all fined 3d. except John Brook who was fined 6d.

William atte Stone lived in the reigns of Edward III (1327-1377), Richard II (1377-1399), Henry IV (1399-1413), Henry V (1413-1422), and Henry VI (1422-1461). The most interesting historical episodes during his lifetime were Wat Tyler's Peasant Rebellion in 1381, the attempted reforms in the Roman Church by John Wycliffe, the literary productions of Geoffrey Chaucer, the coup d'état of Henry IV in seizing the throne in 1399, and the famous victory of Henry V at Agincourt in 1415. William atte Stone died in 1430 or 1431, when his son Walter atte Stone suc-

ceeded to his copyhold in Ardleigh.

The name of the wife of Williams atte Stone is unknown, and records have been found of only one

\*Rev. Reginald H. Grubbe, who has been vicar of Ardleigh since 1902 and is much interested in the history of the parish, has made and possesses a complete and indexed copy of the above rolls; and through his kindness all the Stone entries in them, and also in the parish registers from their commencement in 1555, have been secured.



court baron of the Manor of Bovills held on the day of Jove after the Feast of St. Andrew the Apostle, 4 Henry V [Thursday, 3 Dec. 1416]: Inquisition taken and sworn on the oaths of John Gile, William Burstalle, WALTER ATTE STONE, John Clerk, John Huntte atte Mersh, William Huntte, Thomas Huntte, Gilbert Huntte, Thomas Baker, Robert Rykke, William Raulyn, John Huntte atte Wode, Walter Whytyng, and Richard Meller, who say on their oaths that Gilbert Dedham occupied lands and tenements with appurtenances called the East House in the village of Dedham, after the death of William Dedham his father, which premises he let to William Sturton at a rent of 33s. 4d., as they understand. Which rent the said William paid to the said Gilbert before the latter went beyond the seas with our Lord the King, and there died beyond the seas, seized of the aforesaid lands and tenements. And they further say that one John [Dedham] is son and heir of the said Gilbert his father, and is fourteen years of age, etc. Evidently Gilbert Dedham went in the army of King Henry V to France in August 1415, and probably fell, either at the capture of Harfleur in September 1415 or at the famous battle of Agincourt 25 Oct. 1415.

The only other record discovered of Walters atte Stone is in a volume of fragmentary abstracts of reliefs, fines, etc., from court rolls of various manors in Essex and Suffolk under the jurisdiction of the Honour of Clare.

Court of the Manor of Bovills held on Saturday next after the Feast of Corpus Christi, 9 Henry VI [2 June 1431]: To this court came Walter atte Stone, and made fealty to the lord for a tenement and garden adjacent, held by copy of court roll, which late was of William atte Stone, his father. (Court Rolls, Honour of Clare, 123-1859.)

Walters atte Stone lived in the reigns of Richard II (1377-1399), Henry IV (1399-1413), Henry V (1413-1422), and Henry VI (1422-1461). During his early manhood took place the brilliant English victory of Henry V at Agincourt in 1415, the capture of Rouen in 1419, and the conquest of the northern part of France; later came the noted exploits of Joan of Arc, followed by the gradual expulsion of the English from the continent.

Walter atte Stone died after 1431, but the exact time has not been learned. The name of his wife is unknown, and the loss of the Ardleigh manor court rolls from 1416 to 1470 (except for six scattered years) precludes positive legal proof as to the name of even his eldest son and successor. But cumulative circumstantial evidences indicate that he was father of at least one

Carrentle

This place called "Barons" evidently derived its name from a family named Baron who occupied it in the fourteenth century. In the subsidy of 1327 a Walter Baronn appears who may have become the first copyhold tenant of this place and so have given it its name. (See ante, p. 13.) At a court of the Manor of Bovills held 34 Edward III (1360), Geoffrey Baron was presented for pasturing his cattle on the heath, for which offence he was fined 8d. A century later, at a court held in 37 Henry VI (1458-9), the lord let to Geoffrey Doryvall two crofts of land and an alder grove, with appurtenances, called "Barronysland" [i.e., Baron-his-land] to be held for a period of ten years at a [quarterly] rent of 10s. 9d. from Michaelmas next ensuing; and he rendered fealty and a fine of one chicken. The court rolls are missing for the period when the above lease expired in 1468-9; but evidently the copyhold of Barons was then next secured by John<sup>6</sup> Stone.

In Trinity term, 18 Edward IV [1473], John Deryfall, yeoman, of Ardeley, co. Essex, was summonsed to answer John Stone of same, yeoman, for debt for use of part of a croft of land, parcel of Barones in said Ardeley. And said John Stone complains that said John Deryfall, by indenture made on the day after the Feast of St. Matthias the Apostle, 12 Edward IV [25 Feb. 1471/2], agreed to pay 12s. 6d. for use of part of said croft for one year from the Feast of the Annunciation of our Lady [25 March] next ensuing; and upon said feast the said John Deryfall entered on said premises and occupied same for the space of one year, but has not paid for its use to the loss of the said John Stone, etc. (Common Pleas

Roll, Trinity, 13 Edward IV, m. 159.)

During the lifetime of John's Stone (or atte Stone), the use of the prefix "atte" before the family surname went out of general use. He died in 1487, as at a court of the Manor of Bovills held on the day of Mars next after the Feast of the Conception of the Blessed Virgin, 3 Henry VII [Tuesday 11 Dec. 1487], Walter Stone appeared at the court and made fealty to the lord for two crofts and a garden adjacent called Barons, held by copy of court roll which late was held by [blank] his father.

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Burons in Andleigh

John Stone lived in the reigns of Henry VI (1422-1461), Edward IV (1461-1483), Edward V (1483), Richard III (1483-1485), and Henry VII (1485-1509). In his youth and early manhood took place the expulsion of the English from France (1430-1453), started by the inspiration and achievements of Joan of Arc. These reverses, the general incapacity of Henry VI, and political ambitions of the nobility finally led to civil war in England. In 1450 arose a second Peasants' Rebellion, led by Jack Cade, a Kentish demagogue of the modern Bolshevik type; under his leadership a large mob invaded London and commenced to plunder the city, but the rebellion was soon suppressed. This insurrection was quickly followed by the famous Wars of the Roses, or struggle for the English crown between the royal Houses of Lancaster and York, which raged intermittently from 1455 to 1485, and which nearly exterminated the ancient feudal nobility of England.


The name of the wife of John Stone has not been learned; they


were married about 1445.

#### Children:

- i. Walten<sup>7</sup>, b. abt. 1445; was eldest son, and doubtless named for his grandfather; on the death of his father in 1487, he succeeded to the two crofts and garden called "Barons" in Ardleigh, as shown by the court roll of 11 Dec. 1487, above given. Apparently this estate of Barons before long passed into the tenure of William Moyse, as at the courts held in 5 and 7 Henry VIII (1513 and 1515), he was ordered to clean the ditch called Barons, and at the court held in 11 Henry VIII (1519), William Moysee leased, through the lord of the manor, to Richard Warre, the two crofts and the grove called Baronsland. Walter<sup>7</sup> Stone probably d. before 1500, without male issue.
- 5. ii. SIMON, b. abt. 1450, ancestor of the Stones of America.

- 5. SIMON' STONE (John', Walter', William', \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, Walter'), was born in Ardleigh, co. Essex, about 1450. The earliest mention found of him is in the fragmentary remains of the court rolls of the Manor of Bovills which record his name in the list of the homage at the court held in 7 Henry VII (1491-2). At the court held in 16 Henry VII (1500-1), Simon Stone sent his essoin [excuse] for non-attendance by William Moyes. He held an estate of the Manor of Bovills in Ardleigh called "Walles," and an estate in the adjoining parish of Great Bromley called "Goodenes" where he settled and resided. Henceforth for five generations and during nearly a hundred and fifty years the ancestors of the Stones of America lived in Great Bromley.

Great Bromley, also anciently termed Much Bromley or Bromley Magna, is a parish in Tendring Hundred, co. Essex, adjoins Ardleigh on the southeast, and is served by the Ardleigh railway station. The parish has rural characteristics similar to those of Ardleigh already described, but is smaller in size, covering an area of about three thousand acres and having now a population of only about five hundred. The parish existed in Saxon times, and its name is derived from the Anglo-Saxon words "brom" (the plant) and "leigh" (pasture). The general features of the region are similar to the country towns of Essex County, Mass.; but hedges, instead of stone walls, bound the fields, the roadbeds are superior to those in New England, and the old farmhouses have generally white plaster walls and thatched roofs instead of being clapboarded and shingled. The church, dedicated to St. George, is a fine and ancient structure, built of mixed rubble, brick, and flint, and mainly in the Perpendicular style of architecture erected during the fifteenth century. The fabric consists of chancel, clerestoried nave, two aisles, a small south chapel, a south porch, and a pinnacled western tower in which hang six bells. The registers of baptisms and marriages commence in 1559; but those of burials are lost prior to 1725. The living is a valuable one, being worth about £700 per year in commuted tithes, besides the use of ninety acres of glebe and a rectory. Within the venerable walls of this shrine, Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon Stone, the colonists of New England, were baptized; and four generations of their ancestors were christened there and had sepulture in its churchyard. On 29 Apr. 1904, a beautiful stained glass window, in memory of Simon and Gregory Stone, was unveiled and dedicated in the church. funds for its execution and installation having been raised among their descendants in America, through the Stone Family Associa-The memorial is located in the window of the north aisle nearest the chancel. The three principal panels contain figures representing St. Gregory the Great, St. Mary the Virgin with infant Christ, and St. Simon the Apostle: the smaller main panels under each illustrate a notable incident in the life of each, viz: St. Gregory accosting the captive English children in the Market Place in Rome, the Annunciation of the Virgin, and the call of St. Simon by Christ. In small panels at the top, a seventeenth century vessel occupies the centre, suggesting the emigration to America; on one side is the seal of Massachusetts, and on the other that of Essex County, England, Over all in a topmost panel is a dove, representing the Holy Spirit. The inscription on the window reads: "Secula præterita in Secula ventura." (The Generations pass into the coming Generations.) A metal plate below the window is inscribed: "To the Glory of God and to the Memory

of Simon and Gregory Stone, Brothers, who were born in this Parish, baptized in this Church, and emigrated to Massachusetts in New England in 1635, this Window is erected by American Descendants." An illustration of this window forms the frontis-

piece of this volume.

Simon Stone lived in the reigns of Henry VI (1422-1461), Edward IV (1461-1483), Edward V (1483), Richard III (1483-1485), and Henry VII (1485-1509). During periods of the first thirty years of his life, the Wars of the Roses nearly exterminated the old feudal families of England; but after the Battle of Bosworth Field and accession of Henry VII in 1485, civil disturbances practically ceased. The Wars of the Roses, while disastrous to the nobility and landed gentry, were not generally detrimental to the yeomanny and the middle and lower classes; agriculture and foreign commerce flourished, manufacturing greatly increased, and taxes were low; as a result, rebuilding in England was extensive in the latter half of the fifteenth century, particularly of rural churches and farmhouses. But during this period the morale of the Roman Church became increasingly unspiritual and corrupt, which decadence resulted in the next century in the Reformation.

Simon' Stone lived to an age of about fifty-five years, dying between 12 May 1506 and 10 Feb. 1510/11, the dates of the making and probating of his will. This original will is in the Stowe Collections in the Manuscript Department of the British Museum in

London, and a complete verbatim copy is appended.

"In the name of god Amen The xij day of may the yere of ower lord God a MCCCCC vj I Symond Stone of moche Brymley of the dio" of london beyng in hole mynde make my testamet and last wyll in this forme followyng. Fyrst I bequeth my soule to god allmygthy to ower lady sent mary and to alle saynts and my body to be beride in the chirche of moche Brymley foresaide. Itm I bequeyth to the hye awter there for my tithes negligentely forgotyn a cowe or ellys vj s. viij d. for yt. Itm I bequeth to the warke of poulys\* xij d. Itm I orden and make myn executors Elizabeth my wyf Davy my son and John Bradfyld and Sr Willm Fareway parson of Brymley aforesaide supervisor of this my testament and last wyll. Also I wyll that Davy Stone my son have my tenamet called Godewyns wt alle the appertenaunce to the same belongyng to hym his heyrs and assignes for evyrmore after this condicion that the saide Davy shall pay to his moder duryng her lyf yerely vi s. viii d. and after her disses I wyll that he kepe or cause to be kept a yerely obyte by the space of xx yers to the valure of x s. by yere for the welth of my soule my wyfys soule and alle cristen soules. Also I wyll that Water my son have my tena-

ment in Ardeleigh called Walles to hym and to his heyrs or assigns. for evyr paying yerely to his moder iij s. Also I wyll that Mihyll my son have ij keyn or ellys xiiij s. for them v yowen and v lambys. Itm I wyll y' Willm my son have ij keyn or ellys xiiij s. for them. Itm I require and charge my coffefys that they delyvr a sufficient astate according to my wyll when so evyr they be required. The residewe of alle my goods not bequethed I gyf and bequeth to Elizabeth my wif and to Davy Stone my son to dispose as they thynk most pleasor to god and helth to my soule. Theys wytnes John Stone John Newman and William Litylbery and the forsaide parson with other moo."

The will is endorsed as probated on 10 Feb. 1510 [1510/11], be-

fore John Asshewell, Commissary of the Bishop of London.

The context of the above will indicates that Simon' Stone was a prosperous and substantial yeoman, and his direction that he be buried in the *church* is significant of his superior local position, as only the landed gentry and the very wealthiest of the yeomanry secured sepulture within the rural church edifices, all others being buried in the churchyards.



Children born in Great Bromley:

8. i. Davide, b. abt. 1480; ancestor of the Stones of America.

ii. Walter, b. abt. 1483; evidently named for his uncle Walter' Stone; was given by his father's will in 1506 an estate in Ardleigh called Walles where he settled, as he appears numerous times on the court rolls of the Manor of Bovills from 1518 to 1534. His name is on the lists of homage at the courts held on 14 Dec. 1513, 28 July 1515, 27 July 1518, 14 Dec. 1520, 12 Mar. 1522/3, 16 Dec. 1523, 6 Dec. 1529, 28 Oct. 1530, and 28 Jan. 1531/2. At the courts held 6 Jan. 1519/20 and 19 Aug. 1533, he is among those offering essoin, or excuse for absence. At the court held on Saturday after the Feast of St. Ann, mother of Mary, 7 Henry VIII [28 July 1515], the jurors state that a stray horse of black color, worth 6s. 8d. has remained with Walter Stone for over nine months, and has been thrice cried at Colchester market.

At the court held on the day of Venus in the Octave of St. Thomas the Martyr, 11 Henry VIII [Friday 6 Jan. 1519/20] the jurors report that Agnes Deth has alienated and sold to Walter Stoon and his heirs a tenement called Churchgate House. A summons is issued to said Walter to appear at the next court to receive said tenement from the hands of the lord of the manor and to make his fealty and pay his fine. At the next court held on the day of Venus next after the Feast of the Conception, 12 Henry VIII [Friday 14 Dec. 1520], Walter Stone came to the court and made fealty for a tenement with lands called Churchgate House, formerly of William Hunt, rendering to the lord a fine of 2s. 10d. [The Hunts lived in Ardleigh several genera-

tions in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, and were designated Hunt at the Wood, Hunt at the Marsh, and Hunt at the Church, according to their residences. The record of the acquirement of this old estate of the Hunts by Walter<sup>8</sup> Stone is important, as it later passed to Simon<sup>9</sup> Stone, evidently nephew of Walter<sup>8</sup> Stone, and is mentioned as "Hunts" in the will of Simon<sup>9</sup> Stone in 1557.]

At the court held on 16 Dec. 15 Henry VIII (1528), the lord granted to Walter Stone one croft of one and a half acres of land, parcel of Barons, to hold at the will of the lord at an annual rent of 6 s. and suit of court; entry fine 12 s. [His uncle Walter? Stone and grandfather John<sup>6</sup> Stone had in previous times held copyholds in "Barons." See ants, pp. 18 and 19.] In a survey of lands held of the Honour of Clare, made temp Elizabeth, among the lands held of the Manor of Bovills in Ardeley were twenty acres formerly in the tenure of Walter Stone and twenty-four acres formerly in the tenure of William Stone. (Rentals and Surveys; Duchy of Lancaster, bundle 2, No. 2.) After 1533 no record of Walter Stone has been found either in Ardleigh or Great Bromley, and perhaps he moved into St. Nicholas parish. Colchester, where a Walter Stone appears on a list of inhabitants swearing fidelity in 1534. (Red Book of Colchester, p. 88.)

 MICHAEL, b. abt. 1486; mentioned in his father's will in 1506; no further record of him has been found.

9. iv. WILLIAM, b. abt. 1488.

6. JOHN' STONE (John', Walter', William', \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, Walter'), was born in Ardleigh about 1455. The earliest mention of his name occurs in 1478, when at a court of the Manor of Bovills held in 17 Edward IV, the jurors present John Newman of Ardeley, husbandman, and John Stone of Ardeley, weaver, for hunting and taking pheasants in the lord's warren without license; therefore they are in mercy, etc. Newman was fined 6d., but Stone was probably acquitted, as no fine is recorded against him. John Stone later settled in Great Bromley at "The Tie" |a close or croft|. On 12 May 1506, he and John Newman were witnesses to the will of his brother Simon' Stone (see ante, p. 22); and on 23 Feb. 1514/15, as "John Stone at The Tie" he was made executor of the will of this John Newman of Great Bromley, probably his youthful poaching companion of forty years before. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Francys 53.)

The name of the wife of John' Stone is unknown, and records have been found of only one probable child:

i. JOHN<sup>3</sup>, b. abt. 1480; was a weaver like his father and dwelt at "The Tie" and later on an estate in Great Bromley called "Carringtons." He was assessed 4d. on goods [personal property] of 20s. at Great Bromley in a subsidy of 16 Henry VIII (1524). (Lay Subsidy 108-178.) He d. in 1534. The will of "Jhon Ston weyvar of Myche Bromley in Essex," dated 28 Apr. 1534. My messuage called Carringtons to my wife Jone for life, with remainder to my son Robte. My messuage called Stephankyngs to wife Joan for life, with remainder to Willyam Peyne and his wife of Little Bentley. Executors, my son Robte and John Estwood. Witnesses: Thomas Parker, Wyllyam Peyn, Jhon Stone of Gernens [Goodenes?] Jhon Coolle. Proved 25 Sept. 1534. (Commissary of London for Essex and

Herts, original will.)

He m. abt. 1505, JONE ———. Her will dated 27 Nov. 1545, mentions no relationships whatever, but gives bequests to the following persons: Jane Revell, Jane Payne, John Stone the younger, Agnes Stalwode, Margaret Payne, Jone Stone, Annes Vesey, Jordan's wife, Robert Stone, Jeffray Cole, Denes Spede\*, Bassell Davye, Jone Dane, John Dane the younger, Rose Vardon, Agnes Eaton, Jone Edwey, Agnes Wrighte, Jone Vesey the younger, Jone Ladbrook,† Ann Payne, Margaret Ston, and Margaret Ambrose. Executors, William Payne and Robert [Stone]. Witnesses, Sir John Tull, priest, and John Dane. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Sargant 106.)

1. JANE"; m. WILLIAM PAYNE of Little Bentley.

2. Robert, b. abt. 1510; was an executor of the will of his father in 1534, as above given, and was a witness to the will of Jone Munte of Much Bromley, widow, dated 25 Apr. 1538. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Sargant 8.) He later appears in Great Bromley on three subsidies; was assessed 2s. 4d. on goods in 34 Henry VIII (1542), 4s. on goods in 37 Henry VIII (1545/6), and 3s. on lands in 1 Edward VI (1547). (Lay Subsidies, 108-255, 109-297, 109-302.) An inventory of the church goods of Great Bromley was taken in 6 Edward VI (1552), by Robert's Stone and [his second cousin] Symond's Stone, church wardens of the parish.

7. GEORGE' STONE (John's, Walter's, William's, \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, Walter's), born about 1460, settled in Weeley, co. Essex, a parish a few miles southeast of Great Bromley and separated from it by the parish of Little Bentley. That he was a brother of Simon' Stone of Great Bromley seems evident from the fact that William's Stone of Great Bromley (son of Simon') in his will in 1533 gave a bequest to "John's Stone of Weeley" (son of George'), doubtless because they were cousins. (See post, p. 28.) The will of "George Stone of Wiley, co. Essex," dated 6 Aug.

1510, names his eldest son John Stone, other sons Richard and "See will of her father John Speed, dated 10 Sept. 1554. (Post, p. 27.) †See will of her father Edmund Lodbroke, dated 8 Sept. 1554. (Post, p. 38.)

William Stone, and daughter Joanna Stone. Wife Agnes to be executrix, and father-in-law John Stalworth to be overseer. (Archdesconry of Colchester, Clerke 171 b.)

He married AGNES STALWORTH, daughter of John Stalworth.

## Children:

i. John<sup>3</sup>, b. abt. 1485; was assessed at Weeley on three subsidies; in 16 Henry VIII (1524), paying 18d. on goods [personal property] of 60s.; in 34 Henry VIII (1542), paying 4d. on goods: and in 36 Henry VIII (1544), paying 2d. on goods. (Lay Subsidies, 108-178, 108-255, 109-261.) In 1533 he was a legatee of the will of William<sup>8</sup> Stone of Great Bromley, doubtless his cousin. (See post, p. 28.) In 1545 he moved from Weeley into the adjoining parish of Little Bentley (which also adjoins Great Bromley), and as John Stone, Sen., was assessed in Little Bentley 4s. on lands in 37 Henry VIII (1545/6), 8d. on lands in 38 Henry VIII (1546), and 4s. on lands in 1 Edward VI (1547). (Lay Subsidies, 109-297, 110-320, 109-302.) The name of his wife has not been learned.

 JOHN<sup>9</sup>, b. abt. 1510; resided in Little Bentley and had a family.

2. WILLIAM; resided in Little Bentley and had a family.

ii. RICHARD<sup>5</sup>, b. abt. 1487; perhaps ancestor of the Stones of Great Oakley, co. Essex (about three miles east of Little Bentley), where a Richard Stone appears on several subsidies between 1542 and 1567, and descendants continued there several generations.

10. iii. WILLIAM, b. abt. 1490.

iv. JOANNA.

8. DAVID' STONE (Simon', John's, Walter's, William's, -, Walter'), was born probably about 1480 in Great Bromley, co. Essex. It is possible that he was a godson and namesake of David Mortimer who was lord of the Manor of Great Bromley from 1475 to 1494. As eldest son and termed "Davy Stone" he was an executor of the will of his father, dated 12 May 1506, and inherited the latter's estate in Great Bromley called "Goodenes." As "David Ston" he was a witness (together with William Estwood and John Estwood) to the will of "Robert Baynyng of Moche Bromley," dated 22 Sept. 1523. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Francys 154.) On the subsidy of 16 Henry VIII (1524), as "Davy Stone" he was assessed 4d. on goods [personal property] valued at 20s. in Great Bromley. (Lay Subsidy, 108-178.) He has next been found as "Davy Stone" as a witness to the will of "John Hubberde of Mytche Brumley," dated 7 Feb. 1586/7. (Commissary of London for Essex and Herts, original will.) About 1540 he removed from

Great Bromley to Kirby-le-Soken, a parish about six miles to the eastward, where he appears as "Davye Stonne" on the subsidy dated 20 Oct. 34 Henry VIII (1542), paying 2s. 4d. on moveables [personal property]. (Lay Subsidy, 108-255.) This is the last mention found anywhere of David Stone, and he probably died in 1543, as on the next subsidy, taken 13 Oct. 36 Henry VIII (1544), his place on the subsidy roll at Kirby-le-Soken is taken by "Symonde Stone," evidently his son, who was assessed 16d. for goods there. The assessments made in 1544 were invariably about half those of 1542; so the assessment of 16d. on Symonde Stone in 1544 clearly replaced that of 28d. in 1542 on Davye Stone, evidently his father.

David Stone was born at the very end of the reign of Edward IV and also lived in the reigns of Edward V (1483), Richard III (1483-1485), Henry VII (1485-1509), and Henry VIII (1509-1547). In the efficient although autocratic reign of Henry VII the country became prosperous with the ending of the civil wars of the past generation, light taxes, and the great increase of manufacturing and foreign commerce; and the despotic and avaricious rule of Henry VIII was marked by the breaking away from the Church of Rome in the Act of Supremacy in 1534, soon followed by the dissolution of the monasteries and the confiscation of their estates by the Crown. During the last half of the reign of Henry VIII the Reformation made rapid progress in England, and despite persecutions by imprisonments and burnings, the great majority of the population became converted to Protestantism, which became legally established as the State Church soon after the accession of Edward VI in 1547.

Unfortunately no will of Davids Stone can be found. If he died in Kirby-le-Soken in 1543, as seems likely, and left a will, it would have been proved in the Peculiar Court of The Sokens, which jurisdiction covered the parishes of Kirby-le-Soken, Thorpe-le-Soken, and Walton-le-Soken. From Saxon times The Sokens enjoyed special internal privileges, and were possessed by the Dean and Chapter of St. Pauls, London; but in 1538 they were seized and appropriated to the Crown by Henry VIII. In 1551 his successor, Edward VI, granted the manors in the three parishes of The Sokens to Sir Thomas Darcy; and in 1553 Queen Mary annexed the parishes as a peculiar of the ecclesiastical jurisdiction of the Bishop of London. Wills proved in the Peculiar of the Sokens from 1579 are still preserved at Ipswich; but the earlier records of this court are lost.

As no will of David<sup>8</sup> Stone can be found, parish registers do not commence until a period after his decease, and the court rolls of the manors in Great Bromley are lost, the names of his children can be determined only by careful analysis of circumstantial evidences. But the evidences available indicate beyond a doubt that he was father of at least sons John and Simon, and probably of Thomas and Matthew. The name of his wife is unknown.

3, Walter<sup>4</sup>), was born in Great Bromley, co. Essex, about 1488, and by the will of his father in 1506 was left two kine. By marriage about 1512 to Joane Stevens, he acquired an estate of twenty-four acres in Ardleigh called "Masons." At a court of the Manor of Bovills held on Tuesday next after the Feast of St. Nicholas the Bishop, 21 Henry VIII [6 Dec. 1529], on the list of homage appear William Stone and John Stevin [evidently his brother-in-law]. (Court Rolls, Honour of Clare, 123-1859.) In a survey of lands held of the Honour of Clare, made tmp. Elizabeth, among the lands held of the Manor of Bovills in Ardeley were twenty-four acres, formerly in the tenure of Wil-

liam Stone. (Rentals and Surveys, Duchy of Lancaster, bundle 2, No. 2.) His acquirement of this property is revealed by records of

a suit in chancery, given below.

On 11 July 1513, William Stone and Johane his wife complain that John Stephen of Ardeley, now deceased, was seized in his demesne of a messuage [dwelling house], two gardens, seven crofts of land, and one acre of fen, containing in all twenty-four acres. lying in Ardeley, co. Essex, commonly called Masones tenement; and being so seized the said John in his lifetime demised and let said premises to one Thomas Browne from year to year. And afterward said John by his last will gave said premises called Masons to his daughter, the said Johane, and to her heirs, and gave all the residue of his lands and tenements to his son and heir John Stephen. And afterwards the said John the father died, and his feoffees were seized of said premises called Masons to the use of the said William Stone and Johane his wife, in right of said Jone, and of the heirs of said Jone. But the said deeds of feoffment of the property have come into the hands of John Stephen the younger, who refuses to give them up, and who claims that divers of said crofts are "Coletts" and purchased by himself and are not parcel of said messuage of Masons, and he has entered into two of said crofts, all contrary to good conscience. The complainants ask for a writ of subpoena to said John Stephens the younger to answer the complaint. (Early Chancery Proceedings, bundle 679, No. 1.) It is evident that William Stone and his wife were successful in the suit, as they held the estate of "Masons" at the time of his death.

William Stone later moved into the adjoining parish of Great Bromley, where he secured estates called "Martins" and "Mablotts"; and he died there in 1533, at the age of about forty-five

vears.

The will of William Stone of Much Bromley, co. Essex, husbandman, sick in body, dated 9 Dec. 1533. To be buried in the churchyard of Much Bromley. To William Mannyng a doublet. To John Stone of Weeley my best coat except one. To wife Jane my lands and tenements in Much Bromley and Ardleigh, to keep my children; if she die before my son William come of age, then John Monte shall have the disposing of said lands and tenements to keep my children until of age. Also after the decease of my said wife, my said son William Stone to have my said lands and tenements when he come of age, he to pay each of his five sisters 26s. 8d. in installments. If my said son William die without issue before he be of age, then my daughter Elizabeth to have my tenement called Masons in Ardleigh, and to pay her sisters as above, in installments; also my daughter Jane shall have my tenements

called Martyns and Mablotts in Much Bromley, she to pay to her sisters Margaret and young Jane £3 each in installments. My wife Jane and John Monte, tailor, to be executors. All residue to my wife Jane, to pay my debts, bring my body honestly to the earth, and dispose for me in deeds of charity, to the pleasure of God and health of my soul and all Christian souls. Witnesses: Sr. William Boylerstaf, John Stanewen, William Manning, John Solle, John Davy. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Francys 151.)

- 11. JOHN' STONE (David's, Simon', John's, Walter's, William's, , Walter'), was born in Great Bromley, co. Essex, about 1505. His father Davids Stone had inherited from his father Simon Stone an estate in Great Bromley called "Goodenes"; and when Davids Stone went to Kirby-le-Soken about 1540, he probably left his eldest son John's Stone in charge of this estate, to which he soon succeeded on the death of his father David<sup>8</sup> Stone about 1543. The will in 1534 of John<sup>8</sup> Stone of Great Bromley (John', John', Walter's, etc.), own-cousin of David's Stone, was witnessed by John Stone of Gernens [?]; but this name is partially illegible, and may be meant for Goodenes; so the witness was probably this John Stone. The latter was also a witness to the will of John Deryfall of Bromley Magna, dated 4 Dec. 1544. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Roberts 61.)



John's Stone appears at Great Bromley on three subsidies: on the one dated 20 Oct. 34 Henry VIII (1542), he was assessed 2s. 8d. on goods; on the one dated 10 Feb. 37 Henry VIII (1545/6), he was assessed 4s. 8d. on goods, and on the one of 1 Edward VI (1547), his assessment was 4s. 8d. on goods of £7. He must have died during this year, as his widow was remarried and again a widow by June 1550.

He married about 1535, MARGERY —; she married secondly, about 1548, as his second wife, WILLIAM HARDEN, who died in June 1550, and she died about 1568, as proved by the following

two wills:

To my father Robert Harden, my brother Robert Harden, and my sister Elizabeth, my term in the parsonage of Elmested. To my sister Alice my kine in Wyley. To my brother Randall Harden a farm in Moche Bromeley. To my servant William Browne 40s. To my wife's three daughters twenty-one kine and twenty-one sheep. My houses in Wyley and Little Bromeley to be sold, and from the proceeds £40 to my sons Thomas and Weston Harden and my daughter Agnes Harden, when they be of age. Residue to my executors, my brother Randall Harden and William Moreton. Overseer, Clement Cucock. Witness, John Gyne, writer thereof. Proved in June 1550. (Commissary of London for Essex and Herts, original will.)

The will of Mergerie Hardinge of Moche Bromley, co. Essex, dated 14 Oct. 1565. For mending the highway between Stode cross and my gate in Moche Bromeley 20s. To the poor of said parish 13s. 4d. To my daughter Jone 40s., a bed and bed coverings, a brass pot, a kettle, and six pieces of pewter. "Itm. I give unto Gregorie my sonne my tenement called Horsepetts with viij acres of land thereto belonging, lying in Stanwaie, to him and his heires forever." All residue to my said son Gregorie, executor. Witnesses: William Church, John Holland. Proved 17 Jan. 1568/9. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Hore 74 b.)

Probably the testator was born in or came from this place.



He was probably given by his uncle Walters Stone the estate called "Churchgate" or "Hunts," which for several generations had been held by a family termed Hunt-at-the-Church, and which Walter<sup>8</sup> Stone acquired by purchase in 1520 as previously related. (See ante, p. 22.) This estate called "Hunts" is mentioned in the will of Simon' Stone. He evidently accompanied his father David<sup>8</sup> Stone in the latter's removal about 1540 from Great Bromley to Kirby-le-Soken; as after the death of Davids Stone about 1543, "Symonde Stone" succeeded him at Kirby-le-Soken in the subsidy of 13 Oct. 36 Henry VIII (1544), being assessed 16d. on goods [personal property] there. (Lay Subsidy.)

But the next year Simon' Stone disappears from Kirby-le-Soken, and appears in Great Bromley, where he was assessed on three subsidies and continued to reside about twelve years until his death in 1557. He evidently acquired considerable landed property in Great Bromley, as his subsidy assessments there were on lands; in subsidies a householder was not taxed for both lands and goods [personal property], but in each individual case was assessed on the form of property which, at the rates established, would bring the largest return to the Crown. On the subsidy dated 10 Feb. 37 Henry VIII (1545/6), as "Symond Stone" he was assessed 6s. for his lands in Great Bromley; on the one in 38 Henry VIII (1546), he paid 12d. on his lands there valued at £3; and on the one of 1 Edward VI (1547), he paid 6s. on his lands there valued at £3. (Lav Subsidies, 109-297, 110-320, 109-302.) Symond Stone and John Lodbroke were the executors of the will of "Edmund Lodbroke of Myche Bromley, smythe," dated 3 Sept. 1554, which left the latter's estate to his children John, Mary, Ellen, Elizabeth, Adry, and Johan\* Lodbroke, (Commissary of London for Essex and Herts, original will.)

Simon Stone and his second cousin Robert' Stone were church-wardens of Great Bromley in 6 Edward VI (1552), as in that capacity they made and signed the inventory of church goods of the parish taken that year. (Essex Archæological Society's Transactions, New Series, vol. 1.) The office of churchwarden was always a mark of local distinction; and his holding of this position, his assessments on subsidies (to which only the wealthier minority of householders were liable), and the property disclosed by his will, all indicate that Simon's Stone was a yeoman of substantial estate and esteemed position in the community where he

lived. He died in 1557, at the age of about fifty years.

Simon\* Stone's life was passed during the reigns of Henry VIII (1509-1547), Edward VI (1547-1553), and Mary (1553-1558). In his youth the great religious Reformation had its birth under Martin Luther in Germany, and he lived amid its steady growth among the masses of England. He witnessed the mental regeneration of the people; the growth of steadfast purpose, in spite of persecution, to secure freedom from the superstitions and corrupt thraldom of Rome; the Act of Supremacy in 1534 separating the church in England from Papal authority, and the suppression and confiscation of the monasteries in 1539; the legal establishment of the Protestant Church of England in 1552 and the temporary renewal of Catholic power under Mary (1553-1558) with its perse-

cution of Protestants, of whom thousands were imprisoned and over three hundred paid the supreme sacrifice of death at the stake in steadfast devotion to their beliefs. A few months after the death of Simon<sup>o</sup> Stone, the death of Mary and accession of Elizabeth on 17 Nov. 1558, terminated the inquisition and permanently

abolished in England the power of the Roman Church.

Abstract of the will of "Symond Ston of Moch Bromeley in the Countie of Essex," dated 28 July 1557. My body to be buried in the churchyard of Moche Bromeley. To Agnes my wife my lands called Hunts, both copy and free, for the term of her life: and after her decease I give them to John Ston, my eldest son, to him and to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten; and the said John Ston my son shall pay unto Davy his brother £15 within seven years after the decease of Agnes his mother. If the said John die without issue of his body lawfully begotten, then my said lands called Hunts, with their appurtenances, shall remain wholly to Davy Stone, his brother, and to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten, the said Davy Ston paying to Richard his brother £15 in like manner within seven years after the decease of Agnes his mother. To Agnes my wife five acres of land called the Leez for term of her life, with remainder to Richard my son, to him and his heirs forever. John my son, when his mother "leveth upp" my farme, shall have three cows, five sheep, three seams of wheat, and two calves. Also to John my son, two flock beds, a transom, a pair of blankets, and a covering, to be delivered to him at the day of his marriage. Also at the "levyng upp" of my farme, unto Davy my son, a cow, eight sheep, two calves, and a seam of wheat. Also to Davy my son, a flock bed, a transom, a pair of blankets, and a covering, to be delivered at the day of his marriage. In like manner I will to Richard my son, a cow, five sheep, two calves, and a seam of wheat. Also I give to the said Richard my son, a flock bed, a transom, a pair of blankets, and a covering, to be delivered on the day of his marriage. Residue of goods to Agnes my wife; and if she die in her widowhood, then the residue of my goods to be distributed among my three children. And I ordain and make executors, Agnes my wife and John my son. And I give to said John for his painstaking in that behalf, 6s. 8d. And John Holland to be supervisor, and I give him for his pains, 5 s. Witnesses: Water Crane, John Munte the elder, Mihell Weleshe, William Rand. [No probate endorsed on the will, which is filed in a bundle marked 1558.] (Commissary of London for Essex and Herts, original will.)

Simon' Stone married about 1533, AGNES ———, who survived him. The will of "John Leper of Moche Bromeley," made in 1558, gave bequests to numerous persons; among the legacies, he

gave to "Annys Stone, wedowe, ij kene that be in John Broker's hands, & he to have them for oon yere, paying iiij s., which iiij s. I will shall remain to the iij chyldren of the said Annys Stone & to John Owtelawe." (Commissary of London for Essex and Herts, original will.)

He inherited most of his father's lands in Great Bromley, and succeeded him there on the subsidy rolls, being taxed there 5s. on goods worth £5 on the subsidy of 9 Elizabeth (1567). He also held a messuage in Great Bromley called "Morants," as appears by the will of William Littlebury of Dedham, co. Essex, dated 20 July 1571. (Prerogative Court of Canterbury, Pyckering 52.) In Easter Term, 4 James 1 (1606), Nathaniel Heckford, querant, acquired this same described property of Richard Stone and Margery his wife deforciants; consideration £80 sterling. (Feet of Fines, Essex.)

The court rolls of the Manor of Bovills in Ardleigh contain several mentions of Richard<sup>11</sup> Stone. At the courts held 10 Aug. 1584, 16 Aug. 1586, 4 Aug. 1589, 8 Aug. 1599, and 7 Jan. 1605/6, he appears on the list of the homage. At the court held 10 Aug. 1584, Richard Stone did fealty to the lord for a messuage and 14 acres of land, held of the manor, which he had bought of John Byrd of Colchester and previously belonging to Benjamin Clere. [This was evidently part of the property referred to in the above fines.] At the court held 30 Sept. 1606, the jurors report that Richard Stone hath sold his lands called "Newmans" to Nathaniel Heckford, etc.

14. DAVID¹¹º STONE (Simon³, David³, Simon³, John⁵, Walter⁵, William⁴, \_\_\_\_\_, Walter¹), born in Great Bromley, co. Essex, about 1540, received £15 and certain farm stock and household goods, according to the will of his father in 1557, as previously given. He resided in Great Bromley, where he was living as late as 1597; but as the burial registers of this parish are lost, and he left neither will nor administration, the time of his decease has not been learned.

Except for the mentions of him in his father's will and in the parish registers of Great Bromley, but one other record of David<sup>10</sup> Stone has been brought to light, viz: a conveyance by him in 1591 of property in Great Bromley, by the following fine:

Final concord made in the Queen's Court at Westminster, on the Morrow of All Souls, 33 Elizabeth [3 Nov. 1591], between John Richards and Michael Sallowe, querants, and David Stone, deforciant, of one messuage, sixteen acres of arable land and twenty-eight acres of pasture, all in Great Bromley; whereof a plea of covenant was summoned between them, that is, the said David acknowledges the said premises to be the right of the said John and Michael, as of his gift, and warrants, for himself and his heirs, the said John and Michael and their heirs therein, against the said David and his heirs, forever. For which fine, acknowledgment, etc., the said John and Michael give the said David £80 sterling. (Feet of Fines, Essex, Michaelmas Term, 33-84 Elizabeth [1591].) The considerations stated in transfers by fine are nominal, the amounts given varying by custom in different counties; so the

actual value of property thus conveyed is not apparent.

David Stone was born toward the close of the reign of Henry VIII (1509-1547), and also lived in the reigns of Edward VI (1547-1553), Mary (1553-1558), and Elizabeth (1558-1603). In his youth took place the religious revolution in England legally establishing the Protestant Church of England in 1552, which was followed by the temporary relapse of the country in Mary's reign into the power of the Roman Church, with accompanying persecution and imprisonment of thousands of Protestants and burning of over three hundred martyrs to their cause, of whom no fewer than a score were from Colchester and the surrounding parishes and perished at the stake in a field near Colchester Castle. Doubtless the Stone family were acquainted with some of these martyrs, and possibly even related to one or more of them. Among these Colchester martyrs were William Munte, aged sixty-one years, his wife Alice Munte, aged forty-one years, and his step-daughter Rose Allen, aged twenty years, all of Great Bentley; they were certainly related to John Munte who was a witness to the will in 1557 of Simon Stone of Great Bromley, father of David Stone. (See ante, p. 34.) But most of the life of David 10 Stone was passed in the brilliant reign of Elizabeth (1558-1603), when freed from the blighting control of the Roman Church, a sudden and phenomenal progress took place in England, both in the mental development of the population and in the material prosperity of the country. Agriculture, manufactures, and trade flourished at home, wealth poured into the country from foreign commerce, the daring English navigators sailed over every ocean, and after the defeat of the Spanish Armada in 1588, England became mistress of the seas, a position since held continuously for over three centuries. The standards of culture and comfort and luxury in living were raised among all classes, and the period witnessed a general rebuilding throughout England of mansions of the nobility, manor houses of the landed gentry, farm messuages of the yeomanry, and cottages of the husbandmen. This also was the golden age of English literature, made illustrious by Shakespeare, Bacon, Spenser, Jonson, and Sidney.

David Stone married first, at Great Bromley, 10 July 1566, ELIEABETH HEWIT, who died about 1582, having had seven

children.

He married secondly, about 1584, URSULA ———, by whom he had four children.

Children by first marriage, born in Great Bromley:

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## DESCENDANTS OF GREGORY STONE A PIONEER OF NEW ENGLAND IN 1635

Of the childhood and youth of Dea. Gregory¹ Stone, no memorials have been discovered; but he secured enough education to be able to read and write, accomplishments acquired by only a minority percentage of the yeomen and husbandmen of his time; and presumably he passed his early years in his native parish, learning the arts of husbandry as practiced by his ancestors for many generations. But after his baptism at Great Bromley in 1592, no record has been found of him until twenty-five years later, when he was married in 1617 at Nayland, co. Suffolk (a parish about eight miles northwest of Great Bromley), where he afterwards resided until his emigration to New England in 1635, the registers of Nayland containing the baptisms of seven of his children between 1618 and 1633.

Religious conditions and environment were the main factors in raising Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone out of the family obscurity of his accestors, and making him an historical character as founder of a race in the New World. His emigration resulted from causes

which had been developing for over a century and may be briefly summarized. About A.D. 1500, under a general awakening in knowledge in Europe, the Reformation, or revolt from the Church of Rome, was started in Germany by Martin Luther and others, and soon spread to England during the reign of Henry VIII (1509-1547), resulting in the conversion of the majority of the population, the dissolution of the monasteries and confiscation of their estates to the crown, and finally the Act of Supremacy, terminating papal authority in England and establishing the Protestant Church of England. During the reign of Philip and Mary (1554-1558) the papal power was temporarily restored and an attempt was made to crush out Protestantism; the dungeons were crowded with victims and nearly three hundred martyrs endured the frightful doom of the stake in their devotion to their belief. But on the accession of Elizabeth in 1558 the Protestant religion was permanently restored to power, the Catholics dwindled in numbers, and an era of great prosperity for England set in.

During the latter half of the reign of Elizabeth (1558-1603) there grew and spread among some of the Protestants a spirit of asceticism and a desire for simpler forms of religious worship; these dissenters became known as Puritans and in spite of persecutions to enforce conformity to the Established Church, the Puritans increased rapidly in numbers, principally among the best element of the great middle class, and particularly in Essex and Suffolk. Under James I (1603-1625) and Charles I (1625-1649) the persecutions of the Puritans became so obnoxious as to induce an emigration, between 1630 and 1643, of some twenty-five thousand of them to the wilds of New England where they might enjoy their religious beliefs unmolested; of these colonists nearly two-thirds were from Suffolk and Essex and the adjoining counties, among them the brothers Dea. Gregory and Dea. Simon 1 Stone, ancestors of the largest part of the Stone families in America. But to secure religious freedom was not the sole cause of this epochal emigration; most of the land in England was owned by a small landed class, descended from the Norman feudal nobility and manorial lords, of whom the yeomen were obliged to take leases at high rentals; a corrupt and incompetent government and profligate court had brought the country to great industrial distress, poverty among the masses, and crushing taxation, including the obnoxious ship-money tax; and the spirit of democracy was rising against the "divine right of kings." So it is certain that many of the founders of New England left their native land, not only for religious liberty, but also with the idea of establishing civil democracy and of eventually securing improvement in material conditions. In 1643 the Puritan party secured control of the English government, their persecution ended, and the ensuing civil war established the English Commonwealth; so general emigration to New England practically ceased in 1643 until after the close of the American Revolution in 1783.

During the early manhood of Dea. Gregory¹ Stone, Puritanism became paramount in Essex and Suffolk, and persecution of its adherents resulted in the great Puritan emigration to New England, started in 1630 under the leadership of Gov. John Winthrop of Groton, co. Suffolk, a parish only five miles north of Nayland. That Dea. Gregory¹ Stone was acquainted in England with Gov. Winthrop is apparent from a letter written by the latter at Charlestown, Mass., 23 July 1630, to his son John Winthrop junior at Groton, England, in which the Governor directs, "Demand of Stone and Bragg of Neyland, £15. You have bond for it." (Winthrop's "History of New England," vol. 1, p. 375.)

At the present day, it seems most remarkable that our ancestors should willingly endure any hardships for adherence to their convictions on what now seem unessential points in religious controversies; but the main irreconcilable point of ritual dissension between the Puritans and the authorities of the Church of England was the refusal of the former to receive communion while kneeling before the altar, they demanding that it be administered to them while seated or standing. During the reigns of James I and Charles I, the annual church wardens' presentments to the archdeacons or bishops contain in all thousands of entries against Puritans who refused to conform by kneeling to receive communion. In the Diocesan Registry at Norwich is still preserved the visitation of the Archdeaconry of Sudbury (western Suffolk) for 1629; and the following parishioners of Nayland were then presented for refusing to kneel to receive communion: John Warren, John Firmyn, Christopher Scarlett, John Kent and Gregory Stone; a few years later all of these nonconformists (except Scarlett) are found in New England. From this record it is evident that Dea. Gregory Stone, brought up amid Puritan influences, had embraced with fervid and uncompromising conviction the Puritan faith of the founders of New England; and within a few years he joined the throng who left their beloved ancestral homes and braved the perils of the deep and endured the hardships of a wilderness infested with hostile savages, to establish a nation in the New World.

While records have been preserved showing that Dea. Simon<sup>1</sup> Stone, brother of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>, brought his family to New England in the ship *Increase* in the Spring of 1635, the name and date of sailing of the vessel which brought Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>

Stone and his family hither remain unknown. But he came sometime in 1635, bringing his second wife Lydia, six children, John, Daniel, David, Elizabeth, Samuel and Sarah Stone, and two step-children John and Lydia Cooper. At first he located with his brother Simon in Watertown, Mass., where the town records give his possessions as follows:

#### GREGORY STONE

 Three Acres of upland by estimation bounded the North & West w<sup>th</sup> William Paine & the South w<sup>th</sup> Thomas Hastings, granted to him.

2. Forty Acres of upland by estimation being a great Divident in the

first Division & the Eighteen lott, granted to him.

3. Two Acres of Meddow by estimation in Rockmeddow bounded the North w<sup>th</sup> Cambridge line the South w<sup>th</sup> John Biscoe & the East w<sup>th</sup> the brooke, granted to him.

4. Ten Acres of Plowland by estimation in the farther Plaine bounded the East w<sup>th</sup> Thomas Brookes the West w<sup>th</sup> John Stowers the North w<sup>th</sup> Commonland & the South w<sup>th</sup> the highway, granted to him.

5. Ten Acres of remote Meddow by estimation in the Seventy eight

lott, granted to him.

(Watertown Records, Lands, Grants, and Possessions, printed vol. 1, p. 86.)

The first "Great Divident" of land in Watertown was made 25 July 1636, among the hundred and twenty "townsmen then inhabiting," in four divisions of thirty each; Gregory Stone drew lot 18, of forty acres, in the first division. (*Ibid.*, p 3.)

On 28 Feb. 1636/7, grants of plowlands at "Beverbroke Planes" were made to one hundred and six "townsmen then inhabiting"; in this division Gregory Stone drew lot 54, of ten acres. (Ibid.,

p. 7.)

On 26 June 1637, grants of the "Remote or Westpine Meaddows" were made to one hundred and thirteen "townsmen then inhabiting"; Gregory Stone drew lot 78, of ten acres. (*Ibid.*, p. 10.)

This last record in 1637 gives the latest date at which Dea. Gregory! Stone is mentioned as "inhabiting" in Watertown, and later in that year he removed to Cambridge (then called Newtowne). On 30 Sept. 1639, he sold his Watertown lands to Nathaniel Sparhawk, agent of Thomas Boylston of London, whose son Thomas came from England and settled on these lands.

The earliest mention of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone to be found in Cambridge Records is on 6 Feb. 1636/7, when was granted "Unto Gregorie Stone halfe an ac . . . ." (Cambridge Town Records, printed vol., p. 26.) On 21 Sept. 1637, he bought of Mr. Roger Harlackenden a homestead consisting of a house and "five" acres of land situated on the westerly side of the present

Garden Street, opposite the end of the present Shepard Street, whither he soon removed from Watertown. By grant and purchase he later acquired large tracts of land totalling over four hundred acres, particularly in Cambridge Farms (now Lexington and Lincoln) where his two younger sons David and Samuel Stone later settled.

In a list of houses and lands in Cambridge, dated 6 Sept. 1642, his possessions are given as follows:

#### GREGORY STONE

Impr. on the Comon one dwelling house wth outhouses and fyve Acr of land more or lesse, Thomas Parrish southeast, An Crosby northwest, Susan Bloget southwest, the Comon northeast.

Itm. In the new west field Two Acr more or lesse, Thomas Parrish southeast, John French northwest, Thomas Marret northeast, highway

to the great swampe southwest.

Itm. In the Oxpasture towards menotamye Eight Acr and halfe more or lesse, Edward Winship south, John Cooper north, Charlestowne lyne east, the highway to menotamye west.

Itm. beyond the freshpond, forty Acr of upland & meadowe more or lesse, Nathaneell Sparrowhauke southeast and northwest, Watertowne

lyne southwest, Comon swampe northeast.

Itm. In the Freshpond meadow, fyve Acr more or lesse, Richard Champuyes northeast, Elisabeth Sherbone southwest, the river southeast and northwest.

Itm. In the Oxpasture toward menotamy six Acr more or lesse, Edward Winship north, An Crosby south, highway to menotamy west. Charlestowne lyne East.

(Proprietors' Records of Cambridge, p. 88.)

At this time (1642), Charlestown included the present city of Somerville; so the easterly boundary line of Cambridge was the present line between Cambridge and Somerville. Towards the northwest, Cambridge also included the present towns of Arlington, Lexington, Bedford and Lincoln, and towards the southwest Brighton and Newton; and two years later Cambridge was granted "Shawshin," which was largely settled by Cambridge families, and in 1655 was established as a new town of Billerica. Part of the lands of Dea. Gregory Stone in Cambridge were bounded southwesterly by lands in Watertown of his brother Dea. Simon Stone.

Under date of 11 Oct. 1647, appears the following grant to Dea Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone of two hundred acres at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington and Lincoln).

Granted by the Towne of Cambridge unto Grigory Stone a proell of land about 200 acr more or lesse Abutt uppon the Heade of the (8) mile line towards Concord. It is to run upon a preendicular line to ye (8) mile line unto a greate Rocke stone being ye Bounds betw Edward Goffe & him, & from thence in a straite line to ye Brooke, & Crossing the Brooke, still to Run allong By Another Brookside, running on ye west side of a plaine, untill he Come to the end of ye pla, & from thence he is to run along By the further side of the meadows that ly about a greate pine Hill, & soe to Continue until he Com to a marked white Oake nere Concord [illegible] from thence a line to be drawn being a paralell [illegible] the other west End opposite unto the same, until he Come unto the eight mile heade line.

(Cambridge Town Records, printed vol., p. 63.)

In the division of the "Shawshine Lands" (Billerica and Bedford), 4 June 1652, "The Towne do give to Gregory Stone adjoyneing to his Farme one Hundred acres." This was laid out in what is now Lexington and Lincoln, instead of in Billerica. (Cambridge Town Records, printed vol., p. 98.) On 12 Feb. 1662/3, he was granted twelve additional acres adjoining the above grant, which had been surveyed by Thomas Danforth and John Fessenden. (*Ibid.*, p. 141.) On 27 Feb. 1664/5, in a division of land and cow commons, Gregory Stone drew lot 48, of thirty-five acres, and four commons. (Cambridge Proprietors' Records, printed vol., p. 146.)

Dea. Gregory¹ Stone must have joined the Watertown church soon after his arrival there, as on 25 May 1636 he was admitted a freeman of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, and at that time church membership was a requisite to become a freeman. Only freemen could vote and hold office; so it was carefully arranged that only "orthodox" persons should have any part in the government. The earliest church records of Cambridge preserved in print were compiled in Jan. 1658/9, by the third pastor, Rev. Jonathan Mitchell, who gives the appended account of Dea.

Gregory Stone and his family:

"Gregory Stone, Deacon of this Ch: & Lydia his wife in f. C. [full communion] Whose children, John, Daniel, David, Elizabeth, Samuel, Sarah, Also John Cooper Son of the forsaid Lydia and Lydia Fiske her daughter; being all of them through the Rich Grace of Christ come into full Communion with his people; they will be mentioned afterwards in their places, all save, John Stone now joyned member of the Church of Xt at Sudbury, Lydia Fisk now deceased, Elizabeth Stone now Potter living at Ipswich, Sarah Stone now Miriam Joyned to ye Ch. at Concord." (Records of the First Church in Cambridge, p. 4.)

At just what time Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone became deacon is not known; but he is mentioned as deacon as early as 1643 and held the office at least thirty years, until his death on 30 Nov. 1672.

On 6 Sept. 1638, Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone appears as one of the three deputies for Cambridge to the Massachusetts General Court; it was at the previous session of 2 May 1638 that the name of the town was changed from Newtowne to Cambridge. (Massachusetts Colony Records, vol. 1, pp. 236 and 228.) This seems to have been the only regular civil town or colony office ever held by Dea. Gregory Stone; but from his first settlement in Cambridge to almost the very close of his life, a period of thirty-five years, he was continually elected and served on numerous committees appointed to manage special town affairs. The following two instances were in his old age: On 16 Jan. 1670/1, Deacon Stone and Edward Oakes were assigned "for the Cattichising of the youth at the farmes"; this would indicate he was then living there with one of his sons; also on 29 May 1671, Deacon Stone was appointed on a committee to make a contract for the building of a stone wall on the Watertown line. (Cambridge Town Records, printed vol., pp. 188 and 195.) The clear common sense of the deacon and his wife appears from the fact that they were among the signers of a certificate in behalf of Winifred Holman, accused of witchcraft, stating that they "never knew anything in her life concerning witchery." ("History of Cambridge," p. 364.)

But the most noteworthy committee on which Dea. Gregory's Stone served was in 1664, when he and three other Cambridge men presented to the General Court a memorial signed by them and about one hundred and forty other residents of Cambridge, protesting against the then proposed government of New England by a Royal Commission, as an arbitrary government of a Council or Parliament in which they were not represented, and contrary to the intent of the original patent of the Colony. This was the first muttering of the spirit which over a century later was heard in full tones in the Declaration of Independence of 1776. The Colony Records thus describe this occurrence:

"19 Oct. 1664. The Court being mett together & informed that severall persons, inhabitants of Cambridge, were at the doore, & desiring liberty to make knowne theire errand, were called in, & Mr. Edward Jackson, Mr. Richard Jackson, Mr. Edw: Oakes, & Deacon Stone, coming before the Court, presented a peticon from the inhabitants of Cambridge, which was subscribed by very many hands," etc., viz:

"To the honoured Generall Court of Massachusetts Colonie. The humble representation of the inhabitants of the towne of Cambridg.

For as much as we have heard that theire have beene representations made unto his Maiesty conserning divisions among us and dissatisfactions about the present government of this colonie; we whose names are under written, the inhabitants and householders of the towns above mentioned, doe hearby testify our unanimous satisfaction in and adhearing to the present government so long and orderly estableshed, and our earnest desire of the continuance their and of all the liberties and

privileges pertaining theirunto which are contained in the charter granted by King James and King Charles the First of famous memory, under the encouredgment and security of which charter we or our fathers ventered over the ocean into this wildernesse through great hazards, charges, and difficulties; and we humbly desire our honored General Court would addresse themselves by humble petition to his Maiesty for his royall favour in the continuance of the present estableshment and of all the previleges theirof, and that we may not be subjected to the arbitrary power of any who are not chosen by this people according to their patent. Cambridg the 17th of the 8:1664.

As Dea, Gregory Stone was thus prominent among the first to protest in Massachusetts against government without representation by the governed, so a little over a century later are all his descendants found united in resisting taxation without representation; their convictions were as steadfast in that political crisis as had been those on theology of their ancestor Dea. Gregory Stone a century and a half earlier. Of Capt. Parker's little band of sixty men who stood on Lexington Common on the morning of April 19, 1775, and offered the first organized armed resistance of the American Revolution, at least twentyfive (including Capt. Parker himself) had in their veins the blood of Dea. Gregory Stone; and the Revolutionary Archives of Massachusetts show a total of four hundred and thirty-five soldiers named Stone from the then ninety-five towns of that state, the majority of whom were descendants of either Dea. Gregory or Dea. Simon! Stone.


About 1657, Dea. John Cooper, stepson of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone, built a house on what is now Linnæan Street, Cambridge, which was owned and occupied by his descendants named Cooper, Frost, Austin, and Kuhn for two hundred and fifty-five years, until 1912, when it was purchased by the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities, to be kept as a permanent example of early New England architecture. In this ancient dwelling the Stone Family Association in 1913 placed a tablet

For a half century it has been claimed that the original homestead of Dea. Gregory¹ Stone in Cambridge was located on land owned since 1841 by Harvard University and occupied by the Observatory. But the author's investigations establish that the original so-called "five-acre" homelot of Dea. Gregory¹ Stone was situated below the southerly corner of the present Bond and Garden Streets, with a frontage on Garden Street of about four hundred feet extending down to a point opposite the end of the present Walker Street. The lot extended back from Garden Street across the present Concord Avenue about nine hundred feet, narrowing to a rear width of about two hundred and fifty


feet, and really covered nearly seven acres.

Until 1725 Cambridge Common reached as far northwest as the present Linnsean Street, covering the area between the present Garden Street and Massachusetts Avenue; this part of the Common northwest of the present Waterhouse Street was generally termed the "Cow Common." Until about 1760 the present Garden Street was known as "the highway to Fresh Pond" or as "the highway to the Great Swamp"; then until after the Revolution it was often termed "the road to the brick kilns"; after the Botanic Gardens were established in 1807, it was long called "the road to the Botanic Gardens"; and about 1835 was named Garden Street. Until 1754 the boundary line between Cambridge and Watertown was on the line of the present Sparks Street, and until after 1800 the present Mason and Brattle Streets were termed "the highway to Watertown."

On 4 Aug. 1634, lots were granted in the "West End"; and in October 1635 twelve proprietors recorded lands in that part of the "West End" bounded by the present Garden, Mason, Brattle, and Sparks Streets, as far northwest as the present boundary line running from the northerly corner of the Observatory grounds. The twelve grants covering this area as recorded total fifty acres, evidently only an *estimate* for the whole area which really covers about sixty-five acres; therefore each grant actually averaged some twenty-five per cent larger than originally recorded. There were no cross streets over this area

until 1803 when Concord Avenue was built.

In September 1642 a complete schedule was compiled of all the buildings and lands in Cambridge held by the proprietors; this schedule is recorded on pages 72-116 of the Proprietors' Records (printed volume). The above bounded section of the "West End" was then held by twelve persons, approximately as shown on the map on the opposite page, and described as follows:

No. I. Golden Moore holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house and outhouses and 4½ acres of land, bounded by Edmund Frost n.w., John Bridge s.w., the highway to Watertown s.e., the Common n.e.

(Cambridge Proprietors' Records, printed volume, p. 92.)

[The above lot was originally granted to Thomas Scott, having then 5 acres; he soon sold it to Richard Champney (unrecorded); the latter sold it in 1637 to his brother John Champney who sold ½ acre of it (No. II) to Edmund Frost. John Champney died about 1640 leaving a widow Joanna who married Golden Moore who thus secured the rest of the estate of 4½ acres. (*Ibid.*, pp. 17, 57, 79.) In 1650 Golden Moore sold it to John Bridge who sold it in 1672 to Pyam Blowers; the latter's son Thomas Blowers sold it in 1711 to Abraham Hill, and the Hill family held part of it until 1830.]

No. II. EDMUND FROST holds in Sept. 1642, on the Common a house and ½ acre of land, bounded by Golden Moore s.e. and s.w., George

Willows n.w., the Common n.e. (Ibid., p. 79.)

[The above lot was originally part of No. I as above stated.]

Nos. III and IV. John Bridge holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house with barn and outhouses with 12 acres of land, bounded by the highway to Watertown s.w., the Common n.e., Abraham Morrill, Thomas Parish, and Robert Daniel n.w., Golden Moore and George Willows

s.e. (Ibid., p. 85.)

[Lot III of 4 acres was originally granted to Thomas Judd who sold it about 1687 to John Bridge. (Ibid., pp. 34 and 55.) In 1672 Solomon Prentice bought part of the Garden Street side of this lot where he and his descendants lived several generations. In 1759 John Vassall, Jr., came into possession of a part of this lot on Brattle Street where he built the famous Vassall-Craigie-Longfellow house. Lot IV was originally granted in two parts; a northerly strip of 3 acres to Christopher Caine (or Kene), and a southerly strip of 5 acres to John Barnard who soon secured Caine's strip (unrecorded) and sold the whole 8 acres about 1637 to John Bridge. (Ibid., pp. 23, 34, 55.) In 1759 John Vassall, Jr., came into possession of the westerly part of this lot.]

No. V. GEORGE WILLOWS holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house and ½ acre of land, bounded by Edmund Frost s.e., John Bridge

s.w. and n.w., the Common n.e. (Ibid., p. 103.)

[The above lot was originally part of No. III, and was sold about 1639 by John Bridge to Thomas White who at once sold it to George Willows. (*Ibid.*, pp. 60, 65.)]

No. VI. Thomas Parish holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house with out houses and four acres of land, bounded by Gregory Stone, n.w., Gilbert Crackbone and John Bridge s.e., Abraham Morrill s.w., and

the Common n.e. (Ibid., p. 95.)

[The above lot was originally granted to Jonathan Bosworth and Robert Day (2 acres each); from them it passed to William Witherell (unrecorded), who sold it about 1687 to Thomas Parish. (*Ibid.*, pp. 30, 34, 62.) In 1654 Thomas Parish sold it to Thomas Oakes; and on 30 Apr. 1680, the latter's heirs sold it to John Wyeth, described as 4½ acres and house, bounded by John Stone n.w., the Common n.e.,

Nicholas Wyeth s., and Walter Hastings w. (Middlesex Deeds, vol. 9, p. 489.) John Wyeth was succeeded by his son Jonathan Wyeth in 1706, grandson Jonathan Wyeth in 1743, and great-grandson Jonathan Wyeth in 1767.)

No. VII. GILBERT CRACKBONE holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house and outhouse and 1/2 acre of land, bounded by Thomas Parish n.w. and s.w., Robert Daniel s.e., and the Common n.e. (Proprietors'

Records, printed vol. p. 97.)

[The above lot was originally granted to Edmund Hunt, who sold in 1636 to Joseph Isaac, who sold it in 1687 to Gilbert Crackbone. (Ibid.,

pp. 23, 40, 62.)]

No. VIII. ROBERT DANIEL holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house with outhouses and ½ acre of land, bounded by Gilbert Crackbone n.w., John Bridge s.e., Thomas Parish s.w., and the Common n.e. (Ibid., p. 102.)

[The above lot was formerly in possession of Thomas Blodgett who sold it about 1639 to Robert Daniel. (*Ibid.*, p. 61.) In 1645 Robert Daniel sold it to Nicholas Wyeth. (*Ibid.*, p. 119.) In 1680 it passed to

the latter's son William Wyeth.]

No. IX. ABBAHAM MORRILL holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End 2 acres of land, bounded by John Bridge s.e., Susan Blodgett n.w., Thomas Parish n.e., and the highway to Watertown s.w. (*Ibid.*, p. 113.)

[The above lot was originally granted to Joseph Eason who sold it to Abraham Morrill about 1637. The latter sold it in July 1645 to John Bridge. (*Ibid.*, pp. 33, 48, 118.) It was part of the estate to which

John Vassell Jr. succeeded in 1759.]

No. X. Susan Blodgett [widow of Thomas] holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End 2 acres, bounded by Abraham Morrill s.e., Ann Crosby n.w., Gregory Stone n.e., and the highway to Watertown s.w. (*Ibid.*,

p. 101.)

[The above lot was bought by Thomas Blodgett in 1637 from Jonas Austin to whom it was probably granted in 1685 (unrecorded). From Thomas Blodgett it passed in 1639 to his widow Susan Blodgett. (*Ibid.*, pp. 59, 101.) About 1645 she sold it to Dea. Gregory Stone (unrecorded).]

No. XI. GREGORY STONE holds in Sept. 1642, on the Common a house with outhouses and 5 acres of land, bounded by Thomas Parish s.e., Ann Crosby n.w., Susan Blodgett s.w., the Common n.e. (*Ibid.*, p. 85.)

[The above lot was originally granted 4 Aug. 1634 to John Maynard who built a house (probably a log cabin) on it where he lived about a year and a half; he then sold it in 1636 to Roger Harlackenden (unrecorded); the latter sold it in 1637 to Dea. Gregory Stone who settled there. (Ibid., pp. 35, 57.)]

No. XII. ANN CROSEY holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End 8 acres of land, bounded by Gregory Stone and Susan Blodgett s.e., John Gibson, and the highway to the west fields [Watertown line, now Sparks Street] a.w., the highway to Watertown s.w., and the cow common n.e. (Ibid.,

p. 90.)

The above lot was originally granted to Samuel Greenhill who soon

sold it to Ralph Hudson (unrecorded); the latter sold it about 1637 to Simon Crosby who died in 1639. It then passed to his widow Ann Crosby who sold it about 1645 to Dea. Gregory Stone (unrecorded). (*Ibid.*, pp. 17, 58, 68.)]

No. XIII. John Gibson holds in Sept. 1642, in the West End a house and 9 acres of land, bounded by Ann Crosby s.e., the Common n.e., Watertown line [Sparks Street] s.w., Andrew Belcher n.w. (*Ibid.*, p. 95.)

[The above lot was originally two grants, the northwesterly strip of 6 acres to John Gibson, and the southwesterly strip of 8 acres to Edward Elmer. In 1687 John Gibson bought out Edward Elmer, and held the whole until his death in 1694. The estate then passed to his son Samuel Gibson who died in 1710; and the latter's widow Abigail and daughter Elizabeth sold it (then called 10 acres) on 4 May 1711 to Jacob Hill (great-grandson of Dea. Gregory Stone) who had already succeeded to Lots X, XI, and XII left by the latter. (Ibid., pp. 35, 62; also Middleser County Deeds, vol. 16, fols. 190 and 561.)]

Thus as above shown, Dea. Gregory' Stone first bought Lot XI of so-called five acres in 1637, and about 1645 secured two adjoining lots, X of so-called two acres, and XII of so-called eight acres; and his will in 1672 mentions his homestead of fifteen acres. (See post, p. 59.) It is evident, however, that these lots actually totalled over twenty acres. On the death of Dea. Gregory Stone in 1672, this whole homestead came into possession of his eldest son Elder John's Stone who occupied it until his death in 1683. (See post, pp. 60, 68.) The latter's youngest daughter Sarah' (Stone) Hill and her husband Jacob' Hill then secured the whole homestead, buying out the interests of the other heirs of Elder John's Stone. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 16, fol. 190.) Jacob<sup>2</sup> Hill died in 1690; and on 23 Apr. 1711 one of his sons, Jacob3 Hill, born in 1690, succeeded to the whole homestead, buying out the interests of his mother Sarah (then wife of Samuel Jones), and of his brothers John, Nathaniel, and Abraham Hill, and his sister Tabitha wife of William Warland. (Ibid., vol. 16, fol. 561.) Jacob' Hill at once extended the homestead towards the northwest, by purchasing on 4 May 1711 the adjoining Gibson property [Lot XIII] from widow Abigail Gibson and her daughter Elizabeth, described as ten acres with house, bounded on the town common low Garden Street northeast. said Jacob Hill southeast, Watertown line [now Sparks Street] southwest, and Solomon Prentice northwest. (Ibid., vol. 16, fol. 561.) This purchase increased the homestead to nearly thirty-one acres; and Jacobs Hill owned and occupied it nearly sixty years until his death in 1768. On 28 Nov. 1763, he conveyed to [his nephew] Jonathan' Hill a house and half an acre and twenty-five rods of land, bounded 51/2 rods on a town way Inow Garden Street | northeast, 21 rods on Solomon Prentice northwest, 4½ rods on said Jacob Hill southwest, and 21 rods on said Jacob Hill southeast. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 67, fol. 419.) This little jog [No. XIV on plan] contained the old Gibson house, and was located on the northerly corner of the

present Observatory grounds and Garden Street.

All of the children of Jacob' Hill died during his lifetime; and by his will of 5 Jan. 1768, he left the life-use of his homestead to his widow Susanna, with remainder to Mary and Sarah Snow, children of his daughter Mary (Hill) Snow, deceased. The inventory valued the mansion and well at £60, the barn at £20 and the homestead land of thirty acres at £400. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 11442.) By indenture dated 17 Aug. 1770 and legal camouflage termed "common recovery," the widow Susanna Hill and Mary and Sarah Snow, spinsters, heirs of Jacob' Hill, for £533-6-8 conveyed to John Vassall [Jr.] of Cambridge the homestead of said Jacob Hill of about thirty acres, bounded as follows: beginning at the northeast corner of the house late of Jonathan Wyeth, deceased, and running north [i.e., northwest] and bounded east [i.e., northeast] on the town road leading to the brick yards [Garden Street] until it comes to Jonathan Hill's land; thence running west [i.e., southwest] and bounded [northwest] by land of said Hill and of Daniel Prentice, Dea. Henry Prentice, and John Batherick until it comes to the road to Fresh Pond [Sparks Street]; thence running south on said road until it comes to land of said John Vassall; thence running east and bounded south on land of said Vassal; thence running south and bounded west on land of Jonathan Hastings until it comes to land of Jonathan Wyeth; thence running east and bounded south on land of said Jonathan Wyeth to the northeast corner of his house first mentioned. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 71, fols. 65-69.) On 15 Apr. 1772, John Vassall Ur. | bought of Jonathan Hill and Lydia his wife for £133-6-8, the little jog with the old Gibson house [No. XIV on plan], described as about three-fourths of an acre of land with dwelling house and barn, bounded on said Vassall south and west [i.e., southeast and southwest], Daniel Prentice north [i.e., northwest], and the town road to the brick-kilns [Garden Street] east [i.e., northeast]. (Ibid., vol. 78, fol. 188.)

John Vassall's two purchases of nearly thirty-one acres described above, added to the sixteen adjoining acres he previously owned on the northerly side of Brattle Street, gave him a homestead estate of about forty-seven acres. He was an ardent Tory, and accompanied the British army evacuating Boston in the spring of 1776, sailing to Halifax and thence to England where he died in 1797. His homestead and other property in Cambridge

were confiscated in 1778; and on 28 June 1781 James Prescott, Joseph Hosmer, and Samuel Thatcher, commissioners for selling forfeited estates, conveyed Vassall's homestead of forty-seven acres (and other property) to Nathaniel Tracy, then a wealthy merchant and capitalist of Newburyport. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 82, fol. 367.) Within a few years he lost his great fortune, and on 13 Oct. 1786 conveyed the Vassall homestead of forty-seven acres to Thomas Russell, a rich merchant of Boston. (Ibid., vol. 94, fol. 383.) The latter in turn conveyed the property on 1 Jan. 1792 to Dr. Andrew Craigie. (Ibid., vol. 110, fol. 406.)

Dr. Craigie suffered heavy reverses during the War of 1812. but occupied the Vassall homestead of forty-seven acres until his death in 1819, and his widow lived there until her death in 1841. His heirs were the children of his sister Mary Craigie, wife of Bossinger Foster. Concord Avenue had been constructed in 1803 through the property, which was cut up into lots and sold to various parties. On 6 Oct. 1841, Mary Foster, widow of Andrew Foster, Samuel C. Foster, James Foster, and George Foster, all of New York City, sold to Harvard University about eleven and a quarter acres lying between Concord Avenue and Garden Street. (Ibid., vol. 408, fol. 317.) Harvard University reserved and set off the northwesterly five acres for the Observatory Grounds by constructing Bond Street across their purchase, and cut up the remaining southeasterly six acres into twenty-two building lots, three of which at the corner of Garden and Bond Streets were sold on 6 July 1847 to Epes Sargent Dixwell, who built a house and resided there. (Ibid., vol. 510, fol. 143.) This property is now (1916) owned by Alberta M. Houghton. The next three lots on Garden Street were bought by Theophilus Parsons and are still (1916) held by his heirs. The original so-called five-acre home lot of Dea. Gregory Stone No. XI on map occupied nearly four hundred feet of the frontage on Garden Street of the present Houghton and Parsons estates. and extended back across the present Concord Avenue nearly nine hundred feet, narrowing to a rear width of about two hundred and fifty feet, and actually covering nearly seven acres.


When Dea. Gregory¹ Stone bought this lot in 1637 there was a house on it which had been built in 1634 by the original grantee John Maynard; and this was doubtless the dwelling which Dea. Gregory Stone at first occupied. But most of these original houses were probably log cabins; so within a few years Dea. Gregory¹ Stone probably built a substantial frame dwelling which was owned and occupied over a century by himself, his son Elder John² Stone, granddaughter Sarah² (Stone) Hill, and great-

grandson Jacob Hill, until the latter's death in 1768. It seems evident that Dea. Gregory Stone built this frame house after he had acquired the Crosby lot about 1645, and that it was located on Garden Street, at the extreme northeast corner of the Crosby lot, on the present Observatory Grounds and about halfway between the present Bond Street and a point opposite the end of the present Linnsean Street. On an old map of Cambridge made about 1750\* a house is shown in this location which must have been the house then occupied by Jacob Hill. The house passed with the sale of the estate in 1770 to John Vassall, Jr., who about a dozen years previously had built the famous Vassall-Craigie-Longfellow house on Brattle Street where he resided. In 1772 he renovated and added new rooms to the old Stone-Hill house for occupancy by Rev. Winwood Sarjeant, the Tory rector of Christ Church, who had previously resided on the present Waterhouse Street. In a letter of 7 Oct. 1772, Mr. Sarjeant writes, "we hope to move into our new house in a fortnight's time"; and on 4 Jan. 1773 he writes, "we are got into our new house; moved the day after I arrived at home and seem to like it pretty well; it is more convenient and much warmer than the other house; we do not yet make use of the new apartments, as the plaster is not thoroughly dry." Mr. Sarjeant, like the other Tories, removed from Cambridge early in 1775. The old house passed with the rest of the Vassall homestead through Nathaniel Tracy and Thomas Russell to Andrew Craigie in 1792, s previously related; the latter's inventory in 1819 mentions "a farm house and two other houses and appurtenances situated on the lane leading to the botanick Garden." (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 5303.) One of these three houses was the old Gibson-Jonathan Hill house; the second was the old Stone-Jacob Hill house; and the third was the Jonathan Wyeth house which was located at the extreme northeast corner of Lot VI, this property also having been acquired by Andrew Craigie. The second and third of these houses are shown on a plan made in October 1841 at the time Harvard University bought the property from the Fosters, the heirs of the Craigie estate; they had previously sold the first of these three houses (the Gibson house). But on a plan made of the Observatory Grounds early in 1845, just before the Observatory buildings were built, no house appears on the plan, nor on later plans; so apparently the old Stone-Hill house was taken down or removed between 1841 and 1845, after an existence of probably nearly two centuries.

The plan of 1841 shows the main block of this house to have been forty feet long on the street and twenty feet deep, with a lean-to about fifteen feet square behind the northwesterly corner; the plan also shows a twelve by twenty-five foot extension from the northerly end, probably built in 1772 by John Vassall Jr. for the benefit of his tenant Rev. Winwood Sarjeant. In plan and front appearance the old main house was doubtless similar in general to the Cooper-Austin house built in 1657, previously referred to and illustrated. (See ante, p. 49.) The house was evidently of two stories and had a central entrance



door into a small square stair-hall with winding stairs, behind which was a huge chimney in the center of the house with large fireplaces on its two sides in both stories; on one side of the stair-hall was "the hall" [or living room] about fifteen feet wide and extending back the twenty-foot depth of

the house; on the other side of the stair-hall was a similar "parlor" [bedroom]. This was the usual plan of most seventeenth and eighteenth century New England farmhouses of the substantial families.

While the old mansion, which for over a century sheltered Dea. Gregory Stone and his descendants, thus passed out of existence some seventy-five years ago, one living memorial of the long-distant past still survives on his original home lot. At the Garden Street corner of the present Houghton and Parsons estates still struggle for life the massive trunk and a few branches of a mammoth American elm; the girth of the trunk of this dying forest monarch is over fifteen feet, exceeding in size the famous Washington Elm still standing on Cambridge Common. This once magnificent shade tree, judging from its present great size and dying state, is doubtless over two centuries old and so was evidently seen by Sarah' (Stone) Hill, granddaughter of Dea. Gregory Stone, who after her marriage always resided on the old homestead. The photogravure opposite this page shows this tree as it appeared in 1885 at the zenith of its size and beauty. About 1700 a row of six elm trees was set out upon the westerly border of the Cow Commons, now Garden Street, viz.: 1, the famous Washington Elm at the corner of the present Mason Street; 2, the Whitefield Elm (where the great revivalist preached in 1740) at the corner of the present Waterhouse Street; 8, an elm at the corner of the present Concord Avenue; 4, an elm opposite the present Walker Street; 5, the Stone Elm; and 6, an elm opposite the present Linnsean Street. All of this row were magnificent trees in 1870; but only the Washington and Stone elms remain in 1918.

The records found of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone reveal a fine type of the Puritan of his day; a man of vigorous physique and vitality; of uncompromising convictions and strict integrity; fearing nothing but his God; unambitious for wealth and power, but by thrift acquiring a comfortable estate and always ready to serve his fellow men in local affairs in which they looked to him for probity, good judgment and impartiality; a devout, honest and esteemed member of his community.

He must have continued in vigorous health almost to the end of his life, as in 1671, in his eightieth year, he served on committees as previously related. On 22 Nov. 1672, a week before his decease, evidently realizing his end was near, he settled

his affairs by the following will:

In the name of God, — Amen. I Gregory Stone of Cambridge in New England, being through the Lord's favor of sound Judgment and memory, do make & ordeine my last will & testam' in manner following, viz., my imortall soul I do freely resigne into the armes & mercyes of God my maker, Jesus Christ my only redeemer, and to the holy spirit, to carry mee on & lead mee forever, my body to be decently interred at the discretion of my Xian friends. And for outwards state I do dispose thereof as followeth, i. e.

To my daughter Elizab. Potter I do give ten pounds to be pd within halfe a years after my decease. To my grandchild Lidea Fiske I do give two acres of land lying in Westfield between ye lands of Jnº Holmes & Thomas Oakes, to enjoy it as soone as it shall be free of ye come sowne before my decease. To my grandchild Jnº Stone sonne of David Stone, I do give my little cow called mode, & my little young colt, or five pounds, provided he live with my wife one year after my decease, & do her faithful service according to his best ability, during which time my wife, shall find him his meat, drink, and cloathing, & at the end of the year deliver him the above named cow & colt. To my dearly beloved wife Lidea Stone, I do leave my dwelling house & lands thereunto adjoyneing, & Pastures, come lands, meadows, & wood lands, and all the appurtenances thereof, as also my household goods & other moveable estate not above bequeathed (excepting only my wearing cloathes to Jn? Stone & David Stone my sonnes). And it is my will that my wife shall enjoy the whole during her life, provided always if shee do marry againe, then at her marriage shee shall resigne the houses & lands adjoining with the appurtenances to those of my children to whom I shall bequeath the same, and while she enjoys them it is my will that the houses & lands shall in all respects be kept in good repayre, by her, and so left when shee shall leave them. And to my three sonnes, John Stone, Daniel Stone & David Stone, I do bequeath my dwelling house, barne, & lands adjoyneing, being by estimation fifteen acres more or less, also the wood lotts, & priviledges of the comons belonging there-unto, & fifty acres of land lijng at my farme, being the halfe p' of one hundred acres yt I had there; the other fifty acres I dispose of to my sonnes Samuel Stone & Joseph Meriam. And some addition made mee by the Towne

between it and my farme by Isaac Sternes, wah 2 parcells I do order to my sonne David Stone for ten pounds toward his share, and this he shall enjoy imediatly after my decease. Also I do give to my said three sonnes the Tables, formes, bedsteads, & copper that are in the dwelling house. And it is my will y' when my said sonnes shall come to possess the aboves houses & lands, whether at my wife's death or mariage. w'h shall first happen, my will is that it shall be in the liberty of my sonne John Stone to possesse the whole, he paying to his other brothers thirty pounds apeece, i.e., to Daniel thirty pounds, & to David twenty pounds, the ten pounds above mentioned being by mee appoynted to make up the thirty. Or if he my sonne John like not so to do, then I do order that they Joyntly sell ye whole, & divide ye pay, to Jn° the one halfe p' & to my sonnes Daniel & David the other halfe. And the remainder of my estate in lands, cattell, chattels, moveables, debts, moneys, or wever, after my deare wife's decease, I do give and bequeath ye same to my three youngest children, to be equally divided between them, viz' to Elizab. Potter, Samuel Stone, & Sarah Miriam. And I do ordeyne my sonnes John Stone and Samuel Stone, Executors of this my last will & testam', to whome I do comitt the care for their deare mother, my wife. And in testimony that this is my last will, (renouncing all former wills by mee made) I do hereunto put my hand & seale, this 22th of Novemb' 1672.

Mem. before the divission be made as above, I do give & bequeath to Jn Cooper ten pounds, & to Lidea Fiske ten pounds, and the remainder to be divided as above is declared.





Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone died at Cambridge, 30 Nov. 1672, aged eighty years, and was buried in the old Cambridge Cemetery. A simple footstone bearing the initial; "G. S." was the only mark of his resting place until recent years, when a descendant, the late James Sullivan<sup>3</sup> Stone of Boston, erected a monument, suitably inscribed.

He married first, at Nayland, co. Suffolk, England, 20 July 1617, MARGARET GARRAD, baptized there 5 Dec. 1597, daughter of Thomas Garrad, who married at Nayland, 10 June 1591, Christian Frende who was buried 31 Jan. 1626/7. Thomas Garrad was baptized there 14 Mar. 1561/2, son of John Garrad who was buried 29 Nov. 1601. Mrs. Margaret (Garrad) Stone had four children and was buried at Nayland, 4 Aug. 1626.

He married secondly, about 1627, perhaps at Dedham, co. Essex, England, Mrs. Lydia (——) Cooper; by her first husband she had two children, John and Lydia Cooper; by her second husband she had three children; she accompanied her second husband to New England in 1635, survived him, and died at Cambridge, 24 June 1674.

2. ELDER JOHN'S STONE (Dea. Gregory), born in Nayland, co. Suffolk, England, and baptized 31 July 1618, when about eventeen years old accompanied his father to New England in 1635, and presumably spent the remainder of his minority with the latter in Watertown and Cambridge, Mass. On becoming of age in 1639 he married, and was evidently then advanced by his father a portion of his patrimony with which he established himself in the new town of Sudbury, Mass. The site of his homestead has been located; but the only traces now remaining of any building there are a few fragments of crudely made brick, probably remnants of a chimney or hearth. The house was situated in the present town of Wayland (formerly East Sudbury), on a nine-acre lot on the northerly side of the main highway from Watertown, first called the "Watertown Trail," later termed "East Street" and "North Street," and at a point about a quarter of a mile west of Pond Brook. His adjoining neighbors were Henry Curtis on the east and Nathaniel Treadway on the west. John2 Stone lived here about seven years. The Sudbury Records mention in 1640 three grants of meadow, in what is now Wayland, to John Stone; on 22 Feb. 1689/40, two acres; on 20 Apr. 1640, four and a half acres; and on 18 Nov. 1640, nine acres; he also shared in divisions of uplands and

In 1646 he sold all his property in Sudbury to John Moore, and in 1647 removed up the Sudbury River into the then princeval wilderness, and built a house at Otter Neck in what is now Framingham, being the first settler within the limits of what later became this town. This whole region for the next thirty years was inhabited by less than a dozen families, and was legally within no town; but the inhabitants attended Sudbury Church and are mentioned in the records of that town. After the close of King Philip's War (1677), the population mpidly increased, and in 1700, Framingham was incorporated as a town.

From 1640 to 1700, the territory of Framingham was considered province land, and numerous large grants were made to various individuals by the General Court, viz.: to Mrs. Elizabeth Glover, in hundred acres in 1640; to Thomas Mayhew, three hundred acres in 1648; to Richard Wayte, three hundred acres in 1658; to Elijah Corlett, two hundred acres in 1659, and to Thomas Danforth about fourteen thousand acres in 1662. Other grants were made later.

At the time John<sup>2</sup> Stone first settled at Otter Neck in 1647, he simply squatted on the land with no written title either from the Colony government or from the Indians. But on 15 May

1656, he secured a deed from the Indians of about a dozen acres of land in what is now Saxonville, which was at once confirmed by the General Court which also granted him fifty additional acres adjoining. On 13 Dec. 1661, he bought the Corlett farm of two hundred acres; on 15 Sept. 1666, he and Nathaniel Treadway, executors and residuary legatees of the will of Edward Howe, were deeded by Thomas Mayhew his three hundred-acre grant, to cancel a debt to Howe; and by various other purchases John<sup>2</sup> Stone acquired in all nearly a thousand acres covering much of the present Saxonville. In 1658 he built a new house near the location of the present Saxonville railroad station, and later he built houses for his sons in that vicinity. He also built, about 1658, a dam and gristmill on the falls of the Sudbury River, where the Stone family owned the mill privilege for several generations. It thus appears that John's Stone was a successful and prosperous farmer, and by industry and frugality acquired an extensive landed estate and well established a large family of children.

Living in an unincorporated region during the twenty-five most important and active years of his life (1647-1672), John<sup>2</sup> Stone was not prominent in the public affairs of Sudbury, the town with which he was associated, except that he served as town clerk in 1655 and was for some years one of the deacons in the Sudbury Church. After the death of his father in 1672, he removed to Cambridge, inheriting his father's homestead there; and in 1682 and 1683 he was chosen a deputy for that town to the Massachusetts General Court. On 15 Nov. 1682, he was elected one of the two ruling elders of the Cambridge Church, a mark of the high esteem in which he was held by his fellow townsmen. He died at Cambridge, 5 May 1683, in his sixty-fifth year, and was buried in the old Cambridge Cemetery, where his gravestone bears the following inscription:

Memento te esse Mortolem

Here lyeth ye body of Elder John Stone
Aged 64 years

Who departed this life ye 5th day of May
1683

Abstract of the will of John Stone of Cambridge, aged about 64 years, dated 16 Apr. 1683. To wife Ann Stone, for life, the house where I now dwell, all moveables, six cows, a mare, swine, and poultry; also rents from my houses and lands at Sudbury, now occupied by my son Daniel Stone; at her death my dwelling house in Cambridge to go to my daughters Hannah Bent, Mary Fox, Elizabeth Stowe, Margaret Brown, Tabitha Rice, and Sarah Hill, and the remainder she leaves to be equally divided among all my children. All my outlands in Sudbury to be equally divided among my sons Daniel, David, and Nathaniel Stone, they to

pay to my above named daughters £100. My dwelling houses and lands thereto belonging in Sudbury, I give to my son John Stone, for life, to be improved for his maintenance by my son Daniel Stone, with remainder to my said son Daniel Stone or his heirs. Wife Ann Stone to be executrix, and brethren John Cooper, Sen., and Samuel Stone, Sen., to be overseers, and executors after the decease of my wife. Proved 12 June 1683.

(Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21596.)

Elder John<sup>2</sup> Stone married in 1639, ANNE TICHE, who had ten children and survived him. For over a half century there has been much speculation as to her parentage. She and Nathaniel Treadway (her next-door neighbor in Sudbury) were the principal and residuary legatees (with no named relationship) of the will in 1644, of Edward Howe of Watertown, Mass., who was baptized 1 Jan. 1587/8 at Boxted, co. Essex, England, directly across the Stour River from Nayland, co. Suffolk, and married there, 16 Aug. 1610, Margaret Wells; so it has been generally claimed that Anne wife of John Stone and Suffrana wife of Nathaniel Treadway were sisters, and daughters of Edward Howe. These ideas are erroneous, as it has been proved that Nathaniel Treadway married in New England, in 1639, Suffrana Haynes, daughter of Walter Haynes, who came from Wiltshire in 1638, and she had no sister named Anne; and there is no evidence that Edward Howe had any surviving children. English origin of Nathaniel Treadway has not been discovered; but the writer has found this rare family name only in Essex and Herts. The registers of Boxted are lost from 1617 to 1640, so data on the Howes there are incomplete. From what evidences are yet available, it seems likely that Anne, wife of John? Stone, was a sister of Nathaniel Treadway, and that their mother was probably a sister of Edward Howe, thus making them niece and nephew of the latter.

The first four children of John<sup>2</sup> and Anne Stone were doubtless born in Sudbury, the last six probably in what is now Framingham. The records of Sudbury give the births of seven children.

3. DR. DANIEL<sup>2</sup> STONE (Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), baptized at Nayland, co. Suffolk, England, 15 Aug. 1620, when a lad of about fifteen years was brought to New England by his father in 1635, and for the next few years doubtless lived with him in Watertown and in Cambridge where he was living when admitted freeman 10 May 1643. In 1645 he was granted three and a half acres west of Menotomye River, and received fifty acres in the Shawshine (Billerica) division of 9 June 1652. His homestead in Cambridge was on the northeast corner of Dunster and Mount Auburn Streets, which place he sold on 23 Nov. 1657 to Samuel Andrews, after his removal to Boston. He became a "chirurgeon," probably practicing both as a physician and surgeon, and remained in Cambridge until about 1656 when he removed to Boston, where he resided over thirty years until his death 20 Mar. 1686/7, as is noted in the diary of Judge Samuel Sewall.

- 4. DAVID<sup>2</sup> STONE (Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), baptized at Nayland, co. Suffolk, England, 22 Sept. 1622, came to New England with his father in 1635 and probably lived in the latter's household in Watertown and Cambridge until after he was of age. He learned the cooper's trade and on 26 May 1647, he was admitted a freeman of the Massachusetts Colony.

On 7 Jan. 1643/4, he was granted ten acres of land, in the Shawshine division of 4 June 1652, he drew lot 31, of fifty acres,

in the town grant of 27 Feb. 1664/5, he drew ten acres and four cow commons, and in 1683 he received a grant of six acres beyond the eight-mile line towards Concord. (Cambridge Town and Proprietors' Records.)

After his marriage he lived a few years in Cambridge-town near his father; but on 2 Feb. 1653/4, he sold this homestead to William Towne. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 1, p. 94.) About this time he removed to Cambridge Farms to develop the land there granted to his father and himself. This land lay about seven miles from Cambridge Church, in both of the present towns of Lexington and Lincoln. About 1653, he built a house on the southwesterly portion of this property in what is now Lincoln, which was owned and occupied by himself and his direct descendants for nearly two hundred and twenty years, until it was sold out of the family in 1870. This ancient house still remains in excellent preservation, and was visited by the Stone Family Association on 20 June 1914, as the guests of Mr. Daniel C. Stone, six generations of whose direct ancestors lived there. This house was built on land originally owned by Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone, as appears by the following deed of gift by the latter to his son David2 Stone:

To all people to whom these presents shall come, Greeting. Know ye that I, Gregory Stone of Cambridge in the County of Middlesex in New England, for sundry good considerations me hereunto moving, have given, granted, enfeoffed, and confirmed, and by these presents do fully, clearly, and absolutely grant, bargain, sell, alien, enfeoffe, and confirm unto my sonne David Stone of this same place, husbandman, Two parcels of land, being a part of my farm, granted unto me by the above named towne: One parcel thereof conteyning by estimation twenty and eight akers, more or less, and is that on which his dwelling house standeth, being bounded by Joseph Mirriam north, common south and west, and Joseph Cutler east. The other parcel is meadow, conteyning by estimation two acres more or less, and is part of that meadow called wall meadows, bounded by David Fiske west and Samuel Stone east. To have and to hold all the above granted and bargained premises with all the privileges and appurtenances to the same appertaining or in anywise belonging, unto him the said David Stone, his heirs and assigns forever, to his and their only proper use and behooffe. In witness whereof, I, the said Gregory Stone (as also Lidea my wife in acknowledgment of her free consent in this my act and deed) have hereunto put our hands and seals this 22th day of June Anno Domi 1665. Gregory Stone, Lidea Stone.

By his father's will in 1672, David<sup>2</sup> Stone also received (together with his brothers John and Daniel) fifty more acres at "The Farms"; apparently David eventually secured all of this by arrangement with his two brothers. Thus by grants to himself

by the town, by gifts from his father, and by purchase, David's Stone eventually secured about one hundred and fifty-six acres at Cambridge Farms, most of it located in the present town of Lincoln. In 1699 he deeded about sixty-two acres of the easterly portion of this farm to his son Samuel's Stone; the remaining ninety-four acres and the mansion house passed to his son Daniel's Stone and to the latter's descendants until 1870, when the estate was sold out of the family. It is now (1916) known as Oak Hill Farm, Lincoln, and is owned and occupied by The Farrington Memorial, an endowed vacation home for the benefit of young working girls. Suitable sanitorium buildings have been built on the estate, and the ancient Stone mansion house is used as a residence for the manager of the farm.

David<sup>2</sup> Stone was not prominent in public affairs, holding no important office and being mentioned only a few times in the town records. On 12 Mar. 1670/1, he was appointed "to looke after the yooking and ringing of the swine" at "The Farms"; and on 7 Nov. 1673, he was granted "liberty to fell sume hoope poles for his trade." (Cambridge Town Records, pp. 189, 218.)

The records of the Cambridge Church, first drawn up by Rev. Jonathan Mitchell in Jan. 1658/9, thus record the family of David Stone:

"David Stone (the sonne of Gregory Stone above mentioned) & Dorcas his wife both in full Communion. Their children: David, Daniel, Dorcas, John, Samuel, Nathaniel, all borne & baptized in this church." (Cambridge Church Records, printed vol., p. 23.)

As early as 1682 the inhabitants of Cambridge Farms petitioned the General Court to be set off as a distinct parish, on account of their distance from the old Cambridge Church; but their efforts were unsuccessful until 15 Dec. 1691, when an act of incorporation of a separate parish was passed; and the next spring a meeting-house was built and Rev. Benjamin Estabrook became their first pastor. The parish continued within the civil jurisdiction of Cambridge until 20 Mar. 1712/13, when it was incorporated into the new town of Lexington, which then also included a part of the present town of Lincoln which was set off 19 Apr. 1754. In the first tax-rate for the ministry, dated 1 May 1692, appear fifty-four names, rated from 6s. up to £2-2-0, a total of £41-12-6; average rate about 15s. each. There are eight Stones on this list, as follows: David Stone 8s. 6d.; Samuel Stone sen. £2-2-0 (the largest rate in the parish); John Stone "of the west," 13s. 6d.; Samuel Stone "east," 13s.; John Stone "east," 16s. 3d.; Samuel Stone "west," 18s.; Joseph Stone, 9s. 6d.; and Daniel Stone, 8s. 6d.

David<sup>2</sup> Stone seems to have been a plain and retiring man, and doubtless had the qualities of industry, frugality and integrity which have marked the family in general. He died at his home at Cambridge Farms (now Lincoln), 16 Jan. 1703/4, aged eightyone years, leaving no will; and no administration on his estate was taken out, so doubtless all his property had been divided among his children during his lifetime.

He married about 1648, Dorcas -; she died at Cam-

bridge Farms, 13 July 1704.

- 5. DEA. SAMUEL<sup>2</sup> STONE (Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Nayland, co. Suffolk, England, and baptized 4 Feb. 1630/1, when a child of four years was brought to New England by his parents in 1635 and was taken by them to Watertown and Cambridge. The next mention found of him is in Oct. 1654, when he served as a trooper in a force of sixty men under Maj. Simon Willard, sent in a sixteenday expedition into Rhode Island against Ninigret, sachem of the Niantic Indians. On 6 May 1657 he was admitted a freeman of the Massachusetts Colony.

\*This child is recorded as son of David and Elisabeth Stone; but a careful study of the matter indicates that the name of the wife here given was a clerical error.

†A David Stone of Middlesex County was a trooper under Capt. Thomas Prentice at the Narragansett fight. (See Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's War," pp. 82-3.) But in 1782, David Stone of Framingham (John?, Gregory!), b. in 1646, claimed a Narragansett right for service in that expedition, so apparently he was the trooper under Prentice. (See post, p. 85.)

About the time of his marriage (1655) he settled at Cambridge Farms (Lexington), on some of the land there granted by the town to his father, who eventually deeded it to him. He also received a share of the estate left by his father in 1672, according to the latter's will. His farm was located to the east of that of his brother David<sup>2</sup> Stone, and his house (not now existing) was situated about a mile from the latter's, and near the junction of the present Lincoln and Weston Streets in Lexington. The house built about 1655 by Dea. Samuel<sup>2</sup> Stone remained until 1820 in possession of his descendants of the name, seven generations of whom were born in it. In 1820 this old house passed to Jonathan Simonds whose executors razed it about 1847, after an existence of nearly two centuries.

From his first settlement at "The Farms," he seems to have been the most prominent and active man in that neighborhood. He was the moving spirit to have the region made a separate parish, and signed the original petition for that purpose in Oct. 1682, which was unsuccessful; but by continued agitation the purpose was finally accomplished 15 Dec. 1691. In the following spring he and David Fiske were the largest subscribers (£2-10-0) toward the erection of the new meeting-house, and they were appointed the committee that settled arrangements with Mr. Benjamin Estabrook to become the first minister. Judge Sewall's diary mentions his attending Mr. Estabrook's ordination and dining at the house of Mr. Stone. On the first ministerial tax rate, dated 1 May 1692, among fifty-four parishioners rated from 6s. upward, Samuel<sup>2</sup> Stone paid £2-2-0, the highest assessment made. On the formal organization of the Lexington Church on 21 Oct. 1696 he was chosen its first deacon. In Apr. 1711, he was one of the largest subscribers (10s.) toward a fund to purchase lands near the meeting-house for a public common. He was also active in the long agitation to have "The Farms" made into a new town, and lived to see the incorporation of Lexington on 20 Mar. 1712/13.

Besides his prominence in religious matters, he also was long active in civil affairs, and besides serving on many committees and in various minor offices, he was chosen selectman of Cambridge in 1673, 1681, 1688 and 1692, and assessor in 1694, 1697 and 1698. On the records of Cambridge and of the precinct of "The Farms" he is variously termed "senior," or "deacon," or "east," to distinguish him from the other contemporary Samuel Stones. By his industry, energy and good judgment, he accumulated an estate of nearly £1000, a large property for that period, and he seems to have been at his decease the wealthiest resident of Lexington. He died 27 Sept. 1715, aged eighty-four years.

Abstract of the will of Samuel Stone of Lexington, yeoman, dated 15 Feb. 1713/14. To wife Abigail £40 and maintenance by my son Samuel. To daughter [daughter-in-law] Sarah Waitt 20s. To cousin Abigail Baldwin wife of Henry Baldwin of Woburn, £5. All real estate formerly mine which my son Joseph died seized of, I give to his heirs. To my son Samuel all my lands in Lexington (except thirty acres between Benjamin Muzzy and Capt. Reed, and the land south-east of the road from my house). Rest of lands to be divided as follows: one-fourth to children of son John Stone, one-fourth to daughter Lydia Bowman, one-fourth to children of son Joseph Stone, and one-fourth to children of daughter Sarah Converse alias Hills. To son Samuel all farming implements. Son Samuel Stone to be executor. [Signed] Sam1 Stone. Witnesses: John Meriam, Robert Miriam, John Meriam Jr. On 24 Oct. 1715, the executors brought the will into court, and Francis Bowman. John Merry [sic] and Tho: Cutley [sic], some of the kin, appeared to object to the will; but after hearing their "slender observations," the court allowed the will. The inventory taken by Matthew Bridge, Joseph Brown, and William Munroe, totalled £736-14-2, of which the homestead in Lexington was £319-0-0, other lands there £79-0-0, lands in Weston £200; other items were books £1-10-0, cattle and sheep £21-10-0, etc. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21712.)

Dea. Samuel<sup>2</sup> Stone married first, at Watertown, 7 June 1655, Sarah Stearns, born there 22 Sept. 1635, daughter of Isaac and Mary (Barker) Stearns; she had eight children and died at

He married secondly, Mrs. Abigail (Carter) Fowle-Walker of Woburn, born there 24 Apr. 1648, daughter of Capt. John and Elizabeth (——) Carter, and widow successively of Lieut. James Fowle and Dea. Samuel Walker; after the death of her third husband, Dea. Stone, she returned to Woburn where she died 11 May 1718, and was buried in the Woburn cemetery. No children by this marriage.

6. DEA. DANIEL<sup>3</sup> STONE (Elder John<sup>2</sup> (2), Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Sudbury, Mass., 31 Aug. 1644, when a young child went with his parents in their removal up the Sudbury River into the adjoining wilderness, which remained an unincorporated region mtil established as the town of Framingham in 1700. Here he passed his long-extended life, and by gifts and inheritance from his father and by various purchases he acquired a large landed estate in what is now the Saxonville district of Framingham.

About the time of his marriage in 1667 his father built for him a dwelling house near the falls of the Sudbury River; and throughout his life he was interested in the mills at these falls, succeeding to the gristmill built there by his father, and later himself erecting both a sawmill and a fulling mill. He was a member and descon of the Sudbury Church, and was among the remonstrants in 1698 to the proposal that year for the incorporation of a proposed new town, the objectors stating "they had been for a long time united to Sudbury in civil and sacred rights and privileges, and many of us would be thereby removed half as far again from a public meeting house for the worship of God, than we now are." But two years later Framingham was incorporated as a town; and at the first town meeting held 5 Aug. 1700, Dea. Daniel Stone was chosen one of the members of the first board of selectmen. In a tax rate made 27 June 1710, to raise £10 for a town stock of ammunition, Dea. Daniel Stone was assessed 2s. 2d. He died in Framingham about Mar., 1718/19.

On 9 Apr. 1719, John<sup>4</sup> Stone of Framingham was appointed administrator of the estate of his father Dea. Daniel<sup>3</sup> Stone, deceased, intestate. Samuel Graves and Caleb Johnson of Sudbury bound with him in £300. The inventory taken 1 Apr. 1719 by David Rice, Nathaniel Stone, and Edward Goddard mentions houses and lands, one-fourth interest in a mill stream, dam, fulling mill and saw mill and in appurtenances of a grat mill wrecked by a late flood; also a right of £155-10-0 in sundry

lands which stand charged for the maintenance of John<sup>3</sup> Stone, brother of deceased; also £43 for two mares, two pair of steers, one pair of oxen, two cows, and three swine. An agreement was made by Samuel Graves, David Haines, James Rice, Jonas Rice, Joseph Livermore, and John Sherman, that "our brother" John<sup>4</sup> Stone shall pay the widow £20. Above six sons-in-law gave receipts for £49-1-4 each as part of portions of moveable estate, 18 Apr. 1719; and [the widow] Ruth Stone gave final receipt for £28-3-0, for her full part of the estate. The administrator John<sup>4</sup> Stone died 26 Nov. 1719, before completing the settlement of the estate, and, on 8 Apr. 1720, administration of the remainder was granted to his eldest son John<sup>5</sup> Stone. The accounts mention as still living John<sup>3</sup> Stone, son of John<sup>3</sup> Stone and uncle of the deceased administrator John<sup>4</sup> Stone, whom said John<sup>5</sup> Stone bound himself to maintain for the rest of his life. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. £1554.)

Dea. Daniel<sup>3</sup> Stone married first, in Sudbury, 22 Nov. 1667, Mes. Mary (Moore) Ward, born there about 1641, daughter of John and Elizabeth (Whale) Moore and widow of Richard Ward of Sudbury; she died, probably in Framingham but recorded in Sudbury, 10 Jan. 1702/8, having had eight children.

He married secondly, at Boston, the famous Rev. Cotton Mather, D.D., officiating, 8 Feb. 1703/4, ABIGAIL WHEELER, born in Lancaster, 2 Mar. 1683, daughter of Abraham and Tabitha (——) Wheeler; she died in Framingham 28 Oct. 1711; no children.

7. DAVID'S STONE (Elder John's (2), Dea. Gregory'), born in Sudbury, Mass., 31 Oct. 1646, when a few months old was taken by his parents in their removal into the then wilderness region which in 1700 became the town of Framingham. Here he received from his father about twenty acres south of the falls of the Sudbury River, and on 17 Apr. 1683, bought of Samuel Gookin and Samuel Howe a tract of two hundred acres, being a portion

of a large grant they had secured a year before from the Indians. This land adjoined other land of David's Stone, and included what during the nineteenth century was known as the Bennett-Leland farm.

David Stone appears as a trooper from Middlesex County in Capt. Thomas Prentice's troop of horse which served in the Narragansett Expedition in King Philip's War and took part in the Great Swamp Fight, 19 Dec. 1675. (Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's War," p. 83.) That this soldier was David's Stone of Framingham, appears to be established by the following deed: On 13 May 1732, David Stone, sen., of Framingham, yeoman, for love and good will conveys to his son (sic., means grandson) Zedekiah Stone of Framingham, his right in the wilderness tract of land to be granted by the General Court to the soldiers in the Narragansett Expedition. (Worcester County Deeds, vol. 16, p. 15.)

David Stone was one of the signers to the first unsuccessful petition to the General Court for the incorporating of Framingham on 2 Mar. 1692/3; was assessed 2s. 2d. on a tax rate made 27 June 1710 to raise £10 for a town stock of ammunition; and in 1713 was a selectman of Framingham where he died, probably

shortly before 1 Apr. 1737, aged ninety years.

Abstract of the will of David Stone of Framingham, dated 10 Dec. 1721. To wife Susanna my part of the homestall for life, and all my livestock, household goods, money, and bonds, for life. To eldest son Samuel Stone a tract of land bounded by land of his own which I deeded him, Deer Swamp, my son Thomas' land, and the river; also my part of black oak meadow. My lands on west side of river to be equally divided between my sons Samuel and Thomas. After the decease of my wife, my present part of the homestall to descend to my younger son Thomas. All money and bonds remaining after my wife's decease, to be equally divided among my four children, Samuel, Thomas, Susanna, and Mary; and household goods and livestock remaining to be equally divided between said two daughters. [Signed] David Stone. Witnesses: John Adams, John Bent, David Bent. Will consented to 1 Apr. 1737. by John and Susanna Noyes and Ephraim and Mary Curtis, children of deceased. Inventory taken 9 June 1737 by John Bent, Micah Stone, and Daniel Stone, all of Framingham, showed £1052-0-3; items include his part of homestall and meadow £300; outlands £600, silver plate £27-13-0, etc. No executor being named, son Thomas was appointed administrator of will. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21562).

8. NATHANIEL' STONE (Elder John' (2), Dea. Gregory'). was born 11 May 1660, in the then unincorporated wilderness region which in 1700 became the town of Framingham, the record of his birth being entered at Sudbury, the nearest town. He was given lands and a house by his father near the modern Saxonville Mills in Framingham, within the limits of which town he apparently always resided until his death. He was one of the objectors in 1698 to the incorporation of Framingham as a new town, which however was effected two years later. In a rate made 27 June 1710, in Framingham, to raise £10 for a town stock of ammunition, he was assessed 4s. 6d. On 11 June 1711, this Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> Stone and his sons Nathaniel, Jun., Ebenezer, and John, were among sixteen signers to a petition to Gov. Joseph Dudley for liberty to buy four thousand acres of land at Magunkook from the Natick Indians. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 31, p. 84.) This petition was unsuccessful; but a few years later, in 1715, this property was acquired by the trustees of the estate of Gov. Edward Hopkins of Connecticut, and in 1724 became the town of Hopkinton. Nathaniel Stone was a selectman of Framingham in 1706, 1707, 1715 and 1726, and died there between 23 June and 3 Nov. 1732, aged seventy-two years.

Abstract of the will of "Nathanel Ston of Framingham, yeoman," dated 23 June 1732. To wife Sarah all household goods, a young mare, and two cows: also one room at her choice in my dwelling house and maintenance with food, raiment, physic, and firewood, for life, and maintenance for her mare and cows: all of which to be done by my young-

est son Hezekiah Stone. I have settled by deed of gift on the heirs of my eldest son Nathaniel Stone, deceased, their portion of my estate. To my son Ebenezer Stone my right in "Wait meadow" near Framingham meetinghouse, on south side of the river; also to him £30. My third son Jonathan Stone being deceased, I leave fifty acres of land to his heirs, to be distributed among them by his widow Abiel Stone; or my executors may sell same and divide proceeds among the said widow and his children. To sons Isaac and John Stone and daughters Mary Coggin and Sarah Carter, £10 each, they already having had the rest of their portions. To my youngest son Hezekiah Stone my homestead, and all lands and meadows unbequeathed above, and all husbandry tools and stock, he to maintain his mother and pay above legacies. Executors, Des. Matthew Stone and John Rice. [Signed] Nathanel X Ston [mark]. Witnesses: Matthew Stone, Daniel Gregory, and Micah Stone. Citation to heirs dated 3 Nov. 1732. The executors named refusing to serve and the widow declining to administer, on 12 Nov. 1732, administration on the will was granted to the son Hezekiah Stone of Framingham. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21699.)

9. DANIEL<sup>3</sup> STONE (David<sup>3</sup> (4), Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Cambridge, Mass., in 1651, when a small child was taken by his parents in their removal to that part of the town called "The Farms," which in 1691 became a separate parish, in 1713 the

town of Lexington, and in 1754 the present town of Lincoln. When a young man he was a soldier in King Philip's War, being credited to the town of Cambridge 24 Jan. 1676/7, £1-1-4 for military service. (Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's War," p. 448.)

Daniel<sup>3</sup> Stone doubtless passed his whole life in Cambridge Farms (later Lexington and Lincoln), and in 1704 succeeded to part of the homestead of his father, including ninety-four acres and the mansion house built about 1653 and situated in what is now the town of Lincoln. This homestead passed to his descendants until 1870 when it was sold out of the family. Apparently at that time a collection of Stone family papers, comprising sixty documents relating to Daniel<sup>3</sup> Stone and five generations of his descendants, was found at the house, and by some fortunate means were assembled together and later given to the library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society in Boston, where they are still preserved. These valuable papers include many original deeds and other original documents, some never recorded; also copies of several recorded wills. Some of the unrecorded papers prove points of interest heretofore unestablished in the genealogies printed of this branch of the family. Among them is a deed dated I Dec. 1684, by which Daniel' Stone of Cambridge, planter, bought of Pyam Blowers and wife Elizabeth of same, thirty acres in Cambridge bounded by Watertown line south, Ephraim Flint west, Isaac Sterns, Samuel Stone and Nathaniel Patten north, and the highway east. Probably Daniel' Stone lived on this property before he succeeded to his father's homestead in 1704; it being on the Watertown line accounts for his connection with that church, in which on 19 June 1687 his wife Joanna owned the covenant and was baptized, and at the same time her three eldest children were baptized, and on 17 Mar. 1688/9, Daniel Stone and his wife Joanna were both admitted to full communion in the Watertown Church. (See Watertown Records, printed vol. 4, pp. 121 and 123.)

When "The Farms" was ecclesiastically set off from Cambridge to form a new parish in 1691, Daniel Stone appears as a subscriber of £1-0-0 towards the new meeting-house; and on the first ministerial tax rate made 1 May 1692, he was assessed 8s. 6d. In a public subscription for Lexington Common he gave

8s. ("History of Lexington," vol. 1, pp. 32, 33, 40.)

The following four original documents are among those preserved among the family papers before mentioned:

In Feb. 1714/15 (1 George I.), Daniel Stone of Lexington, with consent of his daughter Dorcas Gibens, apprenticed his granddaughter Betty Allin, daughter to said Dorcas Gibens, to Joseph Fassett of Lexington, to serve the latter for seventeen years.

On 18 Feb. 1715/16, Daniel Stone of Lexington, husbandman, and wife Joanna, for £10 conveyed to Joseph Pearce of same, ten acres of land in Lexington.

On 2 Apr. 1726, Daniel Stone of Lexington, husbandman, and wife Joanns, for £80 conveyed to [son] Gregory Stone of same, eleven acres

in Lexington.

On 24 Apr. 1729, Daniel Stone of Lexington, husbandman, conveyed to his son Gregory Stone of same, husbandman, a mansion house, barn, and fourteen acres of land in Lexington, bounded south by Samuel Cutler, south-east by the highway, north-east by land of said Gregory Stone and of the heirs of Samuel Stone, north-west by Nehemiah Abbott, and elsewhere by said Gregory Stone; also two acres of woodland. [This was the transfer of the homestead, built by David<sup>2</sup> Stone about 1653 and still standing and occupied.]

Daniel Stone was a substantial yeoman, but a man of retiring disposition and of no activity in public affairs. He died at his home in Lexington (now Lincoln), 13 Sept. 1730, in his eightieth year. He apparently advanced portions to his two eldest sons, Daniel and David, when they married, with which they established themselves in that part of Dorchester later (1726) Stoughton; and in his old age he deeded his homestead in Lexington (now Lincoln) to his youngest son Gregory Stone. He left no will; but it is evident that before he died he arranged for the sum of £80 to be divided among his surviving children (a double share thereof to the eldest son, according to law), to be paid to the others by his son Gregory Stone, as appears from the following original and unrecorded document, preserved among the family papers, previously mentioned:

On 2 Dec. 1731, Gregory Stone of Lexington, co. Middlesex, husbandman, gave bonds in £160 to Daniel and David Stone of Stoughton, husbandmen, Cornelius Camell of Boston, smith, and Thomas Manley of East Town [Easton], all in County Suffolk, for the payment to them of £80 with lawful interest on or before 2 Dec. 1733, saving unto the mid Gregory Stone the sixth part of said sum of £80 which is his right in mid money. [Endorsed], "Gregory Stones bond to his brethren."

Daniel Stone married about 1678, JOANNA PARKER, born at Cambridge Village (now Newton), 16 Jan. 1653/4, daughter of John and Joanna (———) Parker. She seems to have been his only wife, and to have died at Lexington 17 Jan. 1727. The will of John Parker of Newton dated 7 Sept. 1686, named his daughter Joanna Stone, to whom he bequeathed £5. (Suffolk County Probate Records, vol. 11, p. 38.)

\*Printed accounts of Daniel\* Stone state he had a second wife Sarah who was mother of his three youngest children; but the records we have given appear to show he had only a wife Joanna.

10. JOHN<sup>3</sup> STONE (David<sup>2</sup> (4), Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Cambridge, Mass., in 1654, doubtless at "The Farms" (now Lexington and Lincoln), where his father built a house and settled about 1653. In the records of "The Farms" precinct and later of Lexington he is termed John Stone "west" to distinguish him from his cousin Corp. John<sup>3</sup> Stone (Dea. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), who is styled "east." When a youth he evidently lived in Cambridge town in the household of his grandfather, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone, who left him, by will of 22 Nov. 1672, a cow, a colt and £5, provided he continue in service one year with the wife of testator. (See ante, p. 59.) Later he settled at "The Farms," which became a parish in 1691 and the town of Lexington in 1713.

In a subscription list of 1692 for the new meeting-house at Cambridge Farms, as "John Stone, west" he appears for £1-10-0; in the first ministerial tax list of 1 May 1692, as "John Stone of the west" he was assessed 13s. 6d.; and on the subscription list of Apr. 1711, for Lexington Common, as "John Stone west" he gave 5s. ("History of Lexington," vol. 1, pp. 32, 33 and 40.) On 25 June 1699, the wife of "John Stone in the west" was received into full communion in the Cambridge Farms (now Lexington) Church; and on 31 Oct. 1703 he also became a member.

John<sup>3</sup> Stone presumably passed the remainder of his life in Cambridge Farms and Lexington, but the exact time of his decease is uncertain. A deed made by his son Benjamin<sup>4</sup> on 20 Sept. 1733 mentions a deed made by his father, John<sup>3</sup> Stone, on 16 Nov. 1727. The Lexington Records give the death of a John Stone on 2 Mar. 1750; if this record belongs to John<sup>3</sup> Stone, he was ninety-five years old at his decease.

He married Mary —, who was admitted to full communion in the Cambridge Farms (Lexington) Church, 25 June

1699.

This deed was acknowledged by them at Littleton 4 Jan. 1783/4. On 20 Sept. 1733 he and his wife, late of Lexington, deed land which his father had deeded 16 Nov. 1727; acknowledged at Littleton 26 June 1736. Perhaps he lived some years in Littleton and later in Acton; a Benjamin Stone who had come from Acton was warned from Bolton, Mass., 1 Apr. 1765. [The Church Records of Chelsea, Mass., give the burial of a Benjamin Stone on 1 July 1766, aged 66 years.]

11. SAMUEL¹ STONE (David¹ (4), Dea. Gregory¹), born in that part of Cambridge Farms now Lincoln, 19 June 1656, resided in his native town until his death. He was a farmer, and in 1699 was deeded by his father about sixty-two acres of land, being the easterly portion of the latter's homestead and situated near the present Lincoln and Lexington boundary line. In the Cambridge Farms precinct and church records he is called "Samuel son of David," or Samuel Stone "east," to distinguish him from his cousin Dea. Samuel³ Stone (Dea. Samuel³, Dea. Gregory³), who is termed "west."

Samuel<sup>3</sup> Stone was a soldier in King Philip's War, serving in Capt. Thomas Brattle's company in the Mount Hope expedition in the summer of 1676, for which he is credited £1-2-10. (Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's War," p. 265.) As "Samll Stone davids son," he appears as a subscriber of £1-0-0 to the new meeting-house at Cambridge Farms in 1692; and on the first ministerial rate dated 1 May 1692, as "Samuel Stone East" he was assessed 13s. ("History of Lexington," vol. 1, pp. 32 and 33.) He died 2 Jan. 1703/4.

On 21 Feb. 1703/4, administration on the estate of Samuel Stone, son of David Stone of Cambridge, was granted to his widow Hannah; bondsmen, Daniel Stone and Robert Miriam, both of Cambridge. Inventory showed £142-8-0. Account dated 19 Mar. 1708/4, by widow Hannah, mentions payment to father and mother Stone of £3-4-0, and to brother Daniel Stone for house and land £5-0-0; also other debts. Net estate £119-10-0. On 23 Oct. 1720, agreement for division made between Abigail Stone, widow of Nathaniel Stone, deceased, Hannah Stone, widow of Samuel Stone deceased, and her daughters Tabitha Stone and Hannah Stone (the latter being non compos mentis). On 23 Dec. 1720. John Merriam, Thomas Merriam Jun., John Leighton, John Mason, and Samuel Stone, all of Lexington, were appointed to appraise the real estate of Samuel Stone and set out one-third to the widow Hannah and divide the residue into four parts; two parts to Abigail Stone, only child of Nathaniel Stone, deceased, the only son of said Samuel Stone; and one part each to Tabitha and Hannah, daughters of said Samuel Stone. Appraisal of real estate £307-10-0; division approved 22 Sept. 1721. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21711.)

Samuel<sup>3</sup> Stone married, about 1689, Hannah ——; she subscribed 2s. 6d. for Lexington Common in 1711, and died at Lexington 22 Feb. 1729.

The will of Hannah Stone of Lexington, widow, dated 4 Sept. 1727. To Abigail Stone, daughter of son Nathaniel Stone, 5s. To daughter Tabitha Meriam, wife of Thomas Meriam, all residue of estate in consideration of her care of me in my widowhood and of my daughter Hannah Stone, lately deceased, who for the last ten years was bereft of her reason. Executor, said Thomas Meriam. Witnesses: Benjamin Meriam, Ebenezer Meriam, and William Meriam. Proved 23 Mar. 1729. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21608.)

12. DEA. SAMUEL'STONE (Dea. Samuel' (5), Dea. Gregory'), born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), Mass., 1 Oct. 1656, is next found on record as a soldier in King Philip's War, serving in Capt. Thomas Prentice's troop of horse in the Narragansett expedition and being wounded at the Great Swamp Fight, 19 Dec. 1675. He was credited for service £4-10-0, and in 1735 was one of the grantees of Narragansett Township No. 6 (now Templeton, Mass.) (See Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's

War," pp. 82, 83 and 435.)

About the time of his marriage, Samuel' Stone settled on a farm, partly in the extreme westerly part of Cambridge Farms (now Lincoln) and partly in the adjoining town of Concord, near which latter town the house was evidently located; as the births of all his children are recorded in Concord, he attended church there, and he is called of Concord when admitted a freeman of Massachusetts, 24 May 1682. (Massachusetts Colony Records, printed vol. 5, p. 541.) When Cambridge Farms became a separate parish and precinct in 1692, Samuel' Stone and his wife soon joined the new church, and he appears on the parish and precinct records of Cambridge Farms as Samuel Stone "west" to distinguish him from the other Samuel Stones. In 1692 he subscribed £1-0-0 towards the new meeting-house, was assessed 18s. on the first ministerial rate of 1 May 1692, and in 1711 he subscribed 6s, towards the establishing of Lexington Common. ("History of Lexington," vol. 1, pp. 32, 33 and 40.)

By his father's will he inherited the latter's homestead, situated near the junction of the present Lincoln and Weston Streets in Lexington, to which estate he removed after the death of his father in 1715. He was selectman of Lexington in 1714, 1715 and 1723; and on 17 Nov. 1715 was chosen a deacon of the Lexington Church to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of his father, which office he held over twenty-seven years until

his death 17 June 1743, in his eighty-seventh year.

Thus during a century, from 1643 to 1743, Samuel<sup>2</sup> Stone, his father Samuel<sup>2</sup> and grandfather Gregory<sup>1</sup>, held the office of deacon for over seventy-five years, viz., 1643-1672 and 1696-1743. Furthermore, Samuel<sup>3</sup> Stone was succeeded as deacon in 1743 by his nephew John<sup>4</sup> Stone, who held the office until his death in 1762; and in 1766, Jonas<sup>4</sup> Stone, grandson of Samuel<sup>3</sup> Stone, was chosen deacon and held the office until 1787, these two tenures totalling forty years. So during the one hundred and forty-four years from 1643 to 1787, the office of deacon in Cambridge and Lexington was held by five generations of the Stone family for a total period of one hundred and fifteen years.

Dea. Samuel Stone evidently divided all his property among his children during his lifetime, as he left no will and no administration was taken out on his estate.

He married at Cambridge, 12 June 1679, DORCAS JONES, born in Concord 29 May 1659, daughter of John and Elizabeth (——) Jones. She was admitted to the Cambridge Farms (Lexington) Church from the Concord Church in 1698, and died in Lexington 24 Sept. 1746.

Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), 12 May 1663, passed his life in farming in his native town, where on the parish and precinct records of "The Farms" he is styled "corporal" and "east" to distinguish him from his cousin John<sup>3</sup> Stone (David<sup>3</sup>) who is termed "west."

John<sup>5</sup> Stone was corporal in the Cambridge Farms military company as early as 1692, as he is so designated on the list as a subscriber of £1-10-0 toward the new meeting-house at "The Farms" that year. As "John Stone, East," he was assessed 16s. 3d. on the first rate for the support of the ministry, made 1 May 1692. ("History of Lexington," vol. 1, pp. 32 and 33.) On 18 Jan. 1708/9, he and his wife were admitted to full communion in the Cambridge Farms (now Lexington) Church. He died there 3 Feb. 1711/12.

Abstract of the will of John Stone Jr. of Cambridge, husbandman, dated 19 Jan. 1711/12. To wife Rachel Stone two cows, a horse, six sheep, and six swine during widowhood; also half the crops raised on my land until my youngest daughter Ruth be nineteen, said wife to maintain my three daughters Anna, Rachel, and Ruth until each be of that age or married. Also to my said wife all my moveable household stuff during widowhood, she paying to said three daughters £6 each when eighteen. Also to said wife during widowhood one-half my dwelling house, with sufficient firewood, and one-third of the crops on my land, after my youngest daughter Ruth be nineteen. To daughter Mary Stone £50, and to daughters Anna, Rachel, and Ruth Stone £44 each when eighteen, to be paid to them by my executor. To Joseph Watkins 40s. if he live until he be sixteen with my son John Stone. All residue of estate, real and personal, and reversion of widow's portion, to my son John Stone, he to be sole executor. My brother Samuel Stone and Des. John Miriam to be overseers. [Signed] John X Stone (his mark). Witnesses: Matthew Bridge, John Miriam, and Matthew Bridge, Jr. Proved 10 Mar. 1711/12. 14. JOSEPH<sup>3</sup> STONE (Dea. Samuel<sup>2</sup> (5), Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), Mass., in 1670, was deeded by his father a portion of the latter's lands there, as appears by the will of his father, previously given. (See ante, p. 80.) On the first ministerial rate at Cambridge Farms, made 1 May 1692, Joseph Stone was assessed 9s. 6d. ("History of Lexington," vol. 1, p. 33.) On 6 Mar. 1698/9, he and four others were granted liberty to build seats for their wives in the meeting-house there. He died 17 Jan. 1702/3.

Administration on the estate of Joseph Stone of Cambridge [Farms] was given to his widow Sarah. On 13 Dec. 1705, she rendered an account showing a net personal estate of £82-12-9, which the court ordered divided as follows: To said widow Sarah £27-10-11; to eldest son Isaac Stone a double portion, £15-14-9; and to the other children Lydia, Joseph, Abigail, Sarah, and Tabitha Stone, £7-17-5 each. On same date Francis Bowman of Cambridge [Farms] was made guardian of the children, Lydia aged twelve years, Isaac aged ten years, Joseph aged nine years, Abigail aged seven years, Sarah aged five years, and Tabitha aged three years. 15. DANIEL<sup>4</sup> STONE (Dea. Daniel<sup>5</sup> (6), Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born 22 Nov. 1668, in the unincorporated region adjoining Sudbury which in 1700 became the town of Framingham, Mass., and he resided here throughout his comparatively short life. When a young man of twenty-one years, he served in the Sudbury company in Sir William Phips' disastrous expedition against Quebec in 1690. In 1737 the survivors of this company and the heirs of its deceased soldiers petitioned the Massachusetts government for a grant of a township of land for their services and sufferings in this expedition, and Micah<sup>5</sup> Stone, as heir of Daniel<sup>4</sup> Stone, appears as claimant for his father's right. But it was over thirty years later, in June 1768, before the township was granted, which later became the town of Bethel, Me.; and Daniel<sup>4</sup> Stone's right descended to his grandson Hon. Josiah<sup>8</sup> Stone. ("History of Bethel, Me.," pp. 19-23.)

About the time of his marriage, Daniel Stone was given lands by his father, and in 1702 he bought of his father-in-law, Maj. Thomas Brown of Sudbury, a tract of one hundred and fifteen acres in Framingham, originally part of the Glover grant. He was chosen a selectman and town treasurer of Framingham in 1702, and died there 20 Dec. 1702, at the early age of thirty-four

years, leaving a good estate.

On 1 Mar. 1702/3, administration on the estate of Daniel Stone of Framingham, husbandman, was granted to his widow Patience. The inventory taken 12 Feb. 1702/3 totalled £345-16-0; among the items appear his homestead and lands £250, "trooping furniture" £4, and books £2-10-0. Among the debts was one of £16 due to "Father Browne" on payment for lands. Net estate £316-6-10. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21551.)

He married about 1692, PATIENCE BROWN, born in Sudbury 26 Feb. 1671/2, daughter of Maj. Thomas and Patience (Foster) Brown; she married secondly, at Sudbury, in Dec., 1704, NATHANIEL RICE, and died there 13 Nov. 1722.

Abstract of the will of John Stone Jun., of Framingham, yeoman, dated 23 Nov. 1719. Estate to be divided among my wife Anne and my children Daniel, John, James, Uriah, Abner and Abijah, as an intestate

estate would be divided, except I give my two sons Daniel and John £10 apiece more, when twenty-one. My wife may sell my estate and buy elsewhere with the consent thereto of my brothers Jonas Rice of Worcester and John Swift of Framingham. Wife Anne sole executrix. [Signed] John Stone. Witnesses: Joseph Buckminster, Edw: Goddard, and Jonathan Lamb. Proved 15 Jan. 1719/20. Widow Anna Stone presented inventory on 11 Mar. 1719/20; real estate £360-0-0, personal £305-19-0. She later became "crazed" and her son Daniel Stone became administrator. On 6 July 1733, a commission revalued the real estate at £856-15-0, which was all assigned by agreement to the eldest son and administrator Daniel Stone, he to pay £160-6-7\frac{3}{6} each to his brothers and sister [sic], James, Uriah, Abner and Abigail [sic.; an error for Abijah]. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21625.)

He married at Framingham, 31 Jan. 1706/7, Anne Tilestone, born at Dorchester, Mass., 7 Dec. 1681, daughter of Timothy and Sarah (Bridgeman) Tilestone, and sister of Sarah Tilestone, wife of Rev. John Swift, first pastor of Framingham. In 1721 she bought three hundred acres of land in the "County Gore" adjoining Oxford in Worcester County, on which her fourth son Uriah Stone later settled. She became "crazed" in 1729, and died in Framingham, 25 Mar. 1733.

On 21 Sept. 1783, administration on Worcester County real estate of Anna Stone of Framingham was granted to her son Daniel Stone of Framingham; bondsmen, Micah Stone of same and James Stone of Boston, housewright. The land in Worcester lay in the "County Gore" and was assigned to James Stone and Uriah Stone, they to pay to their brothers Daniel, Abner and Abijah Stone £66-13-4, of which Daniel to have a double share as eldest son. He received by deed from his father a part of the latter's lands in Framingham, and a further portion on his father's death in 1737, according to the latter's will. His estate was a part of what was known during the nine-teenth century as the Bennett-Leland farm.

In the rate made 27 June 1710, to raise £10 for a town stock of ammunition, Samuel Stone was assessed 1s. 4d. On 24 Mar. 1712, Samuel Stone and six others were appointed a committee to regulate disorders in the public meeting-house. During the summer of 1725, several military expeditions were sent into the wilderness, scouting for Indians; among these was a company of forty-four troopers from Framingham and Sherborn, commanded by Capt. Isaac Clark of Framingham, of which company Samuel Stone of Framingham was clerk. This company was in active service from 21 Aug. to 18 Sept. 1725. ("History of Framingham," p. 188.) In his later years Samuel Stone became blind,

and divided his property among his children, the son Joseph receiving the homestead; and he died about 1750, leaving no will and no estate requiring administration.

18. THOMAS' STONE (David' (7), Elder John', Dea. Gregory'), was born 11 Mar. 1687/8, in the then unincorporated region adjoining Sudbury (where his birth is recorded), which in 1700 became the town of Framingham, Mass. After his marriage he was deeded some lands in Framingham by his father, and on the death of the latter in 1737 he succeeded to the paternal homestead according to his father's will, this estate being a portion of the property known during the nineteenth century as the Bennett-Leland farm.

On the rate made 27 June 1710, to raise £10 for a town stock of ammunition, Thomas Stone, then a young unmarried man,

was assessed 10d. He was a "sentinel" (private) in the scouting expedition of troopers under Capt. Isaac Clark from 21 Aug. to 18 Sept. 1725, of which company his brother Samuel' Stone was clerk, as previously mentioned. (See ante, p. 103.) In 1728, Edward Goddard, Thomas Stone and Peter Clayes were chosen trustees of Framingham's share of £382-15-0 of a Massachusetts Province emission of bills of credit of £60,000. The records of Framingham show that Thomas Stone also served on other committees, and was a selectman in 1726, 1727, 1730, 1731 and 1733. He died in Framingham, 6 Jan. 1757.

On 24 Jan. 1757, Thomas Stone, yeoman, was appointed administrator of the estate of his father Thomas Stone of Framingham, at the request of the widow of deceased. Bondsmen: Hezekiah Stone and Samuel Stone, yeomen, of Framingham. Inventory taken 15 Feb. 1757, shows real estate £600 and personal property £77-3-3. The division of the lands on 28 Nov. 1757, names widow Elizabeth, eldest son Thomas, youngest son Abner, and daughter Mary wife of Isaac Clark. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21735.)

19. NATHANIEL STONE (Nathaniel (8), Elder John, Dsa. Gregory), was born 15 Oct. 1685, in the then wilderness region adjoining Sudbury, which in 1700 was incorporated as the town of Framingham, Mass. About the time of his marriage, his father assigned to his use a part of his lands in Framingham, on which Nathaniel Stone settled; but he died 9 June 1729,

at the early age of forty-three years. As no legal conveyance of these lands had then been made, on 20 June 1732, his father Nathaniel's Stone conveyed and confirmed these lands to James' and Joseph's Stone, only children of Nathaniel's Stone, deceased, as their share of his estate. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 37, p. 389.) This deed is referred to in the will of Nathaniel's Stone, dated 23 June 1732. (See ante, p. 87.)

On 15 Oct. 1729, administration the estate of Nathaniel Stone Junce Framingham, was granted to his widow Mary Stone; bondsman, John Stone of Framingham, husbandman. The inventory taken 8 July 1729, shows houseing and lands worth £408, and personal estate of £87-19-0. In 1740, Mary Stone, widow of Nathaniel Stone of Framingham, deceased, petitioned for her dower to be set off; she states her husband left but two children, James and Joseph, and that the latter sold his interest to his brother James who agreed to maintain petitioner for life; but her said son James has recently died and his widow Sarah is unable to carry out the agreement. On 3 Sept. 1740, a board of commissioners set off the dower lands of Mary Stone, widow of Nathaniel Stone. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21698.)

Nathaniel Stone married at Concord, 10 Aug. 1711, MARY CUTTER of CUTLER of Sudbury, who was living in 1740.

From his father he inherited by deed and will various lands in Framingham, and in 1783 he bought of his father-in-law Joseph Pratt a fifty-acre farm which he made his homestead; this property was known as the Hastings farm during the nineteenth century. On 17 Sept. 1726, Ebenezer Stone and his wife were admitted to full communion in the Framingham Church. He died in April 1739.

On 1 Feb. 1741/2, administration on the estate of Ebenezer Stone of Framingham was granted to his widow Prudence Stone; bondsmen, John Adams and Ezekiel Rice. The inventory taken 22 June 1789 by John Adams, Ezekiel Rice and David Pratt, totalled £644-0-0. By settlement of estate on 15 Aug. 1743, one-third was set off to the widow Prudence, and two-thirds to the eldest son Ebenezer Stone, he to pay to his brother Silas and sisters Prudence, Sarah and Hannah, £40-12-2 apiece. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21572.) On 14 Mar. 1742/3, Hezekiah Stone was appointed guardian to the three youngest children, Prudence, Sarah and Hannah. (Ibid., No. 21573.)

ten years later became the town of Framingham, Mass. He resided in Framingham, probably on some of the lands of his father, who survived him nearly ten years. He died before 17 Nov. 1723, when his widow Abial was admitted to the Framingham Church.

He left no will, and no administration was taken out on his estate; but his four children were given fifty acres of land by the will of their grandfather Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> Stone in 1732; so to secure their rights in this legacy, three of these sons, Jonathan Stone in his eighteenth year, Reuben Stone in his sixteenth year, and Simeon Stone in his fifteenth year, on 12 Mar. 1733/4, all chose Micah Stone of Framingham, husbandman, for their guardian; and the youngest son, Levi Stone, on 1 Jan. 1738/9, aged about sixteen years, chose Daniel Stone of Framingham, miller, for his guardian. (Middlesex County Probate Records, Nos. 21653 and 21652.) The births of his children are not recorded, but they were all baptized together, after the decease of their father.

22. LIEUT. ISAAC<sup>4</sup> STONE (Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> (8), Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Framingham, Mass., on 3 Sept. 1697, according to a family record compiled about 1875 from family documents by his great-granddaughter Sophia Knowlton<sup>7</sup> (Stone) Holland of Newfane, Vt. He learned the trade of cordwainer (shoemaker), but was principally engaged in farming during most of his life. On 1 Sept. 1726, Issac Stone of Framingham, cordwainer, conveyed to John Stone of same [his brother] his interest in a grist mill, a saw mill, and a fulling mill in Framingham; the deed mentions their father Nathaniel Stone.

In 1727, Isaac Stone removed to Shrewsbury, Mass., where he afterwards resided and became prominent in town affairs. He held the offices of selectman sixteen years between 1727 and 1763, assessor five years between 1729 and 1741, and town clerk nine years between 1731 and 1761. From 1737 to 1741 he is termed "lieutenant" on the town records. In 1735 he was offered but declined the office of deacon. He settled his property on

his children during his lifetime, and died in Shrewsbury, 22 Apr. 1776, in his seventy-ninth year, leaving no will and no estate re-

quiring administration.

At that time, this was an office of distinction. He also was chosen deacon in the church 18 Oct. 1736, held various town offices, and was much employed in surveying. 24. CAPT. HEZEKIAH' STONE (Nathaniel' (8), Elder John', Dea. Gregory'), born in Framingham, Mass., 5 Mar 1710/11, was the residuary legatee and administrator of his father's estate, and in 1732 succeeded to the latter's homestead in Framingham according to the will of his father. He continued to occupy this estate until about 1762, and then removed to Oxford, Mass., where on 25 Nov. 1761, he bought a large farm in that part of the town which in 1778 was set off as the town of Ward, the name of which was changed in 1837 to Auburn.

While in Framingham, Hezekiah Stone appears as clerk of Capt. Jeremiah Belknap's company in Col. Joseph Buckminister's regiment, on a militia list dated 26 Apr. 1757, of men in that town between the ages of sixteen and sixty. (Massachusetts Archives.) When chosen a selectman of Framingham in 1759 and 1760, he is styled captain. After his removal to Oxford he served as a selectman and assessor of that town in 1764, 1766, 1767, 1769 and 1770; and he died there 18 July 1771, aged sixty years.

The will of Hezekiah Stone of Oxford, gentleman, dated 2 May 1771, mentions wife Ruth, sons Eliphalet, Jesse, Israel, and Hezekiah, and daughters Hepzibah Belknap, Ruth Eames, Sarah Davis and Lois Stone. Friend Jonathan Stone of Worcester, sole executor. Will allowed 9 Sept. 1771. The inventory totalled £545-15-8. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56625.)

25. DANIEL4 STONE (Daniel3 (9), David2, Dea. Gregory1), was born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), Mass., about 1679, and was baptized in the Watertown Church 19 June 1687. About 1706 he settled on the Indian Reservation in that part of Dorchester which in 1726 became the town of Stoughton (now Canton), and in 1725 he had recorded a deed of forty acres of land he had acquired from the Indians. His house was located on the southerly side of the present Chapman Street in Canton. A few years later he removed to the Ponkapoag village of Stoughton (now Canton), where he acquired the farm which in 1882 was occupied by the poet Thomas Bailey Aldrich. The proof of his parentage appears in a bond dated 2 Dec. 1731, by which Gregory Stone of Lexington agreed to pay to his brother Daniel Stone of Stoughton two-sixths of £80, evidently the latter's share of their father's estate. (Original unrecorded bond in Library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society; see ante, p. 89.) He died in Stoughton, 2 May 1762, aged about eighty-four

On 14 May 1762, Henry Stone of Stoughton, innholder, was appointed administrator of the estate of his father Daniel Stone of same, yeoman, deceased. The inventory taken 11 June 1762 showed real estate of

£214-5-0 and personal property of £71-12-9. (Suffolk County Probate Records, No. 12953.)

26. DAVID<sup>4</sup> STONE (Daniel<sup>5</sup> (9), David<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), Mass., about 1682, and was baptized in the Watertown Church, 19 June 1687. When a young man he settled on the Indian Reservation in that part of Dorchester set off in 1726 as Stoughton (now Canton); in 1725 he had recorded eighty-six acres he had acquired of the Indians, situated on the northerly shore of Reservoir Pond, being the farm owned by Edwin Wentworth toward the close of the nineteenth century. He was one of the founders of the Stoughton Church and died 26 May 1733. His parentage is established by a bond of 2 Dec. 1731, by which his brother Gregory Stone of Lexington agreed to pay him one-sixth of £80, evidently his share of their father's estate. (See ante, p. 89.)

The will of David Stone of Stoughton, husbandman, dated 10 Apr. 1733. To wife Sarah Stone all household goods and maintenance during widowhood by my executor. To daughter Sarah Stone maintenance for life unless she marry. To son David Stone certain specified lands in Stoughton. To son Samuel Stone the homestead, all remainder of lands in Stoughton, and all farm stock and implements. To daughters Submit, Sarah, Deliverance, and Abigail Stone, £20 each when eighteen years of age. All residue to son Samuel Stone, sole executor, he to pay all debts

27. GREGORY STONE (Daniel (9), David, Dea. Gregory), was born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington and Lincoln), Mass., about 1692, and was baptized in the Cambridge Farms (Lexington) Church in November 1700. On 18 Aug. 1713, he purchased of Eli Wardell a tract of land near his father's farm, and in Apr. 1714, he bought of Wardell, an additional parcel. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 23, p. 164.) On 9 Feb. 1725, he bought land in Weston of Joseph Waite. (Ibid., vol. 37, p. 239.) By deed of 24 Apr. 1729, Gregory Stone received from his father Daniel<sup>3</sup> Stone, the latter's homestead farm in Lexington (now Lincoln), including the house built about 1653 by David Stone which is still (1917) standing in good preservation in Lincoln. (This original deed is still preserved in the Library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society; see ante, p. 89.) Gregory Stone owned this homestead of his father and grandfather, but a few years, as he died there in the autumn of 1734.

Administration on the estate of Gregory Stone of Lexington (now Lincoln) was granted 4 Nov. 1784 to his widow Mary Stone; bondsmen, Judah Clark of Lexington and Joseph Brooks of Weston. The inventory exhibited 3 Feb. 1734/5 totalled £1243-19-5, including the mansion house, barn and mill house, and ninety-four acres of land. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21597.)

On 15 Dec. 1749, Jonathan Heywood and wife Sarah of Concord for £400 conveyed to Gregory<sup>5</sup> Stone of Lexington all their right in the estate of her father Gregory<sup>5</sup> Stone; and on 26 Apr. 1755, Aaron Brooks and wife Mary of Lincoln for £400 made a similar release to Gregory<sup>5</sup> Stone.

28. CAPT. SAMUEL' STONE (Dea. Samuel' (12), Dea. Samuel', Dea. Gregory'), was born at Cambridge Farms (now Lincoln), Mass., 12 Aug. 1684. For a few years after his marriage he lived in Concord, probably on some of the property formerly occupied by his father. About 1713 he removed from Concord to Sudbury (now Wayland), where he acquired a farm on what was known as "Pelham's Island," where he built a house which is still in use and is still shaded by a pair of magnificent elms planted by him. This estate was later acquired by the Heard family and became known as "Heard's Island," and is now owned and occupied as a summer estate by Mr. Edmund H. Sears of Boston. "Mr. Samuel Stone of Sudbury," appears in a list in 1728 of the subscribers to Rev. Thomas Prince's "Chronological History of New England."

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House built in 1713 by Capt Samuel Stone on Heard's Island, Wayland . Mass.

Samuel Stone was one of the early proprietors of Rutland, Mass, where he secured nearly nine hundred acres of land on which he established his sons.

About 1740 he returned from Sudbury to Lexington to take charge of the ancestral estate of his aged father to which he succeeded on the death of the latter in 1743. He was a selectman of Lexington in 1741 and 1742, captain of militia, and died in Lexington, 5 Apr. 1769, in his eighty-fifth year.

The will of Samuel Stone of Lexington, gentleman, dated 13 May 1760. To my three sons Samuel, Jonas, and Isaac Stone all my lands in Sudbury and Rutland, Mass., and in Winchester, N. H., equally divided. To son Jonas all husbandry utensils. To grandchildren John Stone, Israel Stone, Sarah Stone, Eunice Bellows, Beulah Stone, Elizabeth Stone, and Hepzibah Stone, children of my daughter Elizabeth Stone deceased, a silver spoon apiece, which with what their mother had is their full portion. To wife Abigail the use of all residue of my estate for life, with remainder to my nine children Samuel, Jonas, and Isaac Stone, Abigail Perry, Tabitha Noyes, Mary Bent, Susanna Bent, Eunice Reed, and Sybil White, and the heirs of my son Nathan Stone, deceased, equally divided. Sons Samuel, Jonas, and Issac to be executors. [Signed] Sam Stone. Witnesses: Jonas Meriam, Samuel Meriam, Ebeneser Cutter. Heirs cited 18 Apr. 1769, returnable 2 May 1769. On 2 May John Stone Jr. of Rutland for himself and the other children of testator's lenghter Elizabeth Stone, objected to the will; but it was proved on that date. Inventory of personal estate totalled £778-17-3. Account dated 31 Oct. 1771 shows £76-12-9 paid to each of the nine living children; £12-15-51/2 paid to each of the children of Nathan Stone, deceased, viz., Nathan, Jeduthan, Lois, and Rebecca Stone, Mary Rice, and Thankful Savage; and silver spoons to each of the children of Elizabeth Stone deceased. (Middleser County Probate Records, No. 21716.)

Executor, son Samuel Stone. [Signed] Joseph Stone. Witnesses: Samuel Meriam, Joseph Abbet, and Gregory Stone. The son Samuel Stone declined executorship, and on 21 May 1753, it was granted to son Ephraim Stone of Stow, cordwainer. On 6 June 1753, a quitclaim release was made to said Ephraim Stone by Joseph Stone of Brookfield, James Stone of Weston [sic, means Western, now Warren], William Keyes and wife Mary and Benjamin Stow and wife Dorcas of Harvard, Benjamin Samson and wife Elizabeth of Leominster, Samuel Stone of Lexington, Jonas Stone and wife Sarah of same, and Josiah Shattuck of Cambridge. Upon his marriage he settled in Lexington, Mass., and he continued to reside in Lexington until about 1726 when he acquired property in Watertown to which he removed, and he died there 8 Dec. 1729, aged thirty-nine years.

On 2 [sic] Dec. 1729, administration on the estate of Jonathan Stone Jun. of Watertown was given to his widow Chary Stone; bondsman, Joseph Adams of Cambridge, yeoman. The inventory taken 7 Jan. 1729/30, includes a Negro boy at £90, homestead of one hundred acres £1660, forty acres of pasture £300, a right in "Turkey Hills" [Townsend and Ashby] £80, a right in Concord Village £25, an orchard £40, etc. By settlement dated 16 Feb. 1746/7, the eldest son Jonathan got two-thirds and the widow one-third of the lands in Watertown and Waltham, and Samuel and Josiah got the rights in lands in Townsend; Jonathan to pay his brothers Samuel and Josiah £196-11-8 each, and his sisters Dorcas, Margaret, and Rebecca Wellington, and Love Stone £346-11-8 each. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21650.)

31. ENS. JOSEPH' STONE (Joseph' (14), Dea. Samuel', Dea. Gregory1), was born at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington) in 1697, and is first found on record on 13 Dec. 1705, when at the age of about nine years he was placed under the guardianship of Francis Bowman. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21658.) He learned the blacksmith's trade and seems to have been a man of industry and energy, as soon after becoming of age in 1719 he bought a hundred and fifty acre tract in Framingham to which he removed; this estate was the southerly part of what is known as Indian Head Farm. On this property he built about 1720 the house which during the first half of the nineteenth century was the home of Capt. Abner Wheeler. Joseph Stone was ensign of one of the Framingham military companies, is recorded as a selectman of Framingham in 1732, 1742, 1748 and 1755, was on the committee for raising the second meeting-house in 1735, and died about 1780. He evidently deeded his property to his children during his lifetime, as he left no will.

He married at Weston, Mass., 11 Apr. 1723, Lydia Parkhurst, born there 21 July 1701, daughter of Dea. John and Abigail (Morse) Parkhurst; the date of her decease has not been found.

Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Framingham, Mass., in 1699, and was but three years old when his father died in 1702. His mother was soon married to Nathaniel Rice of Sudbury, who was appointed his guardian on 26 Jan. 1709. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21558.) In childhood and youth he doubtless lived with his stepfather in Sudbury; but on becoming of age, he succeeded to the ancestral farm and mills in the Saxonville district of Framingham, where he settled. He is called ensign in 1733 when appointed on a town committee, later was promoted to lieutenant, was selectman in 1732, 1733, 1735 and 1736, and served as representative to the General Court in 1734 and 1735. On 29 Nov. 1724, he and his wife joined the Sudbury West Parish Church. In 1737 he was claimant for his father's right, in a petition for a township grant to the Sud-



bury soldiers in Phips' expedition against Quebec in 1690. He inherited a substantial property which he augmented by industry and good judgment, so left a handsome estate at his death, 13 Oct. 1738, in his fortieth year.

Administration on the estate of Lieut. Micah Stone of Framingham was granted 20 Nov. 1738 to his widow Abigail Stone; bondsmen, Samuel Stone and Josiah Brown, gents., of Sudbury. Inventory taken 13 Nov. 1738, showed real estate £3460, personal estate £526-18-4. Final division of estate dated 27 June 1748; one-third of real estate to widow Abigail Stone, and two-thirds divided among sons Josiah, Daniel, and Micah Stone, they to pay to their brothers as follows; Josiah to pay to Micah £223-1-2, to John £343-1-2, and to Moses £288-0-2; Daniel to pay to Moses £55-0-11 and to Eliab £343-1-2. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21679.)

On 12 Mar. 1742/3, Josiah and Daniel Stone, children of Lieut. Micahistone of Framingham, deceased, chose Lieut. Thomas Winch as guardian; and the court appointed Daniel Stone of Framingham, miller, guardian to the other children, Micah, John, Moses, and Eliab Stone. (Ibid., Nos.

33. DEA. DANIEL'S STONE (John's (16), Dea. Daniel's, Elder John's, Dea. Gregory's), was born in Framingham 21 Oct. 1707. His father died when he was twelve years old; and in 1733 an agreement was made by which he succeeded to all the landed estate of his father by purchasing the rights of his four brothers for £641-6-6. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21625.) This estate was located in the Saxonville district of Framingham, and included farming land and a half interest in the mills at the falls of the Sudbury River, which he operated successfully many



years. He was a selectman in 1740, long a deacon in the church, and as Dea. Daniel Stone appears on the alarm list dated 26 Apr. 1757, of males between sixteen and sixty years in Capt. Jeremiah Belknap's company. His house was destroyed by fire. He died 15 May 1783, in his seventy-sixth year.

Abstract of the will of Daniel Stone of Framingham, yeoman, dated 17 Aug. 1780. To wife Martha £40 and the goods she brought at our marriage, as per contract dated 13 Nov. 1761. To my two sons Elijah and Abner Stone £183-6-8, and my farming tools. To my daughter Beulah £80. To my three daughters, Anne Haven, Beulah Stone and Eunice Stone, all household goods. 34. URIAH STONE (John (16), Dea. Daniel, Elder John, Dea. Gregory1), was born in Framingham, Mass., 16 May 1718. His father died when he was six years old, and later his widowed mother bought for investment, in 1721, three hundred acres of land located in that part of the "County Gore" of Worcester County which later became part of the town of Oxford, Mass. Upon the death of his mother in 1733, this land was assigned to her sons Uriah and James Stone; and later Uriah bought out his brother's right and before 1739 removed to Oxford and settled upon the property. Besides improving this farm, Uriah Stone was engaged in the manufacture of potash, built a dam on the theam near the Leicester line where he erected and conducted saw mill, and also from 1752 to 1783 he kept a public house. In 1769 he and his son-in-law William Campbell bought the old "Elliot" saw and grist mill, which they sold two years later to John Stone, son of Uriah.

On 3 Aug. 1757, Gen. Montcalm with a force of ten thousand French and Indians suddenly invested Fort William Henry on Lake Champlain, which was held by an American colonial force of less than three thousand men under Col. Munroe, who was obliged to surrender on August 12. Meanwhile the militia forces of Massachusetts had been hurriedly mustered and dispatched to the garrison's relief, but were unable to get there in time. Uriah<sup>5</sup> Stone was in this expedition, serving as private in Lieut. Joshua Merriam's company of Col. John Chandler's regiment, which marched for the relief of Fort William Henry from Charlton to Sheffield, ninety-eight miles, serving from 10 Aug. to 18 Aug. 1757. (Massachusetts Archives.)

Uriah Stone is listed in the United States Census of 1790 as bead of a family in Oxford North Gore of three males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years, and three females. He was one of the largest taxpayers of Oxford; but at his death on 24 Oct. 1797, he left no will and no administration was taken out on his estate, so evidently he had divided his property among his children.

Uriah Stone married at Oxford, 22 Nov. 1739, MARY BLUNT, born about 1721, died there 1 Sept. 1792. Her ancestors resided in Andover. Mass.

35. SERGT. ABIJAH's STONE (John's (16), Dea. Daniel's, Elder John's, Dea. Gregory's), was born in Framingham, Mass., 17 June 1719, only five months before the death of his father; so on 19 Nov. 1731, his kinsman Lieut. Micah's Stone was appointed his guardian. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21626.) He learned the housewright trade, and on becoming of age received about £200 in cash as his share of the estates of his parents, with which he established himself in the adjoining town of Hopkinton. In a muster roll dated 26 Apr. 1756 of Capt. John Jones' Hopkinton military company, Abijah Stone appears as sergeant. (Massachusetts Archives.) He died in Hopkinton 6 Nov. 1758, in his fortieth year.

Administration on the estate of Abijah Stone, late of Hopkinton, was granted 20 Aug. 1759 to his widow Anne Stone; bondamen, John Jones, Esq., and John Jones Jun., both of Hopkinton. Inventory of personal

estate showed £59-5-81/2. On 19 Oct. 1778, the administratrix Anne Stone, now Saltmarsh, rendered account. On 27 May 1806, the widow being dead, all the real estate, valued at \$555, was settled by agreement on two of the grandchildren, Elijah and Simpson Birby, they to pay to John Stone \$88.75, to the children of Abijah Stone \$88.75, to Mary Clark \$88.75, and to their brothers and sisters, children of Anne Birby, deceased, their shares in \$88.75. (Middleser County Probate Records, No. 21531.)

He married at Hopkinton, 20 Oct. 1789, ANNE JONES, born in that part of Framingham later Hopkinton and now Ashland, 15 Nov. 1720, daughter of Col. John and Elizabeth (Simpson) Jones; she married secondly about 1769, as his second wife, CAPT. THOMAS SALTMARSH of Watertown.

- 36. CAPT. AND HON. ZEDEKIAH' STONE (Samuel' (17), David', Elder John', Dea. Gregory'), was born in Framingham, Mass., 4 Mar. 1709/10, and on 13 May 1732 was deeded by his grandfather David's Stone the latter's "right in a wilderness tract of land to be granted to the soldiers in the Narragansett expedition," in which he had served as a trooper under Capt. Thomas Prentice at the Great Swamp Fight 19 Dec. 1675. (Worcester County Deeds, vol. 16, p. 15.) Where this grant was located has not been learned; but about 1786 Zedekiah Stone became one of the early settlers of "Nichewong," a tract of land which was granted in 1783 to certain soldiers who had served

about 1725 in scouting expeditions against the Indians, and which was incorporated in 1754 as the town of Petersham. He was one of the founders of the Nichewoog Church in Oct. 1738.

Zedekiah Stone lived in Nichewoag (Petersham) about thirty years until 1766, and was active in local civil matters and in military affairs. He appears as sergeant in Capt. Samuel Willard's company serving from 25 June to 16 Oct. 1748, at Nichewoag, Poquage (Athol), and New Rutland. From 19 Apr. to 30 Nov. 1757, with the rank of lieutenant, he was in command of a company engaged in scouting between the Connecticut and Merrimack rivers in New Hampshire. (Massachusetts Archives.) Two years later he was captain of another scouting. expedition, as appears from the following order of the General Court passed 10 Apr. 1761: Ordered the sum of 40 shillings paid to Zedekiah Stone of Petersham on his petition, that being captain of a ranging company on the western frontier, in pay of the Province, he drew off to his men sixty gallons of rum, for which the collector of excise recovered against him £17-10-10. (Acts and Resolves, Province of Massachusetts Bay, printed vol. 16, p. 734.)

Among numerous deeds recorded of him in Worcester County are the following: On 11 Feb. 1753, Zedekiah Stone of Nichewoag, Esq., for £18 conveyed land there to David Stone [his brother]. On 10 Apr. 1767, Zedekiah Stone of Petersham, Esq., and wife Martha, for £240 conveyed land there to John Chandler. On 12 Oct. 1771, Zedekiah Stone of Windsor, co. Cumberland, N. Y. [now Windsor County, Vt.], Esq., for £30 conveyed to Caleb Stone [his son], of same, yeoman, land in Petersham. (Worcester County Deeds, vol. 33, p. 347, vol. 58, p. 108, and

vol. 67, p. 61.)

While commanding the scouting expedition in 1757, between the Connecticut and Merrimack rivers, Capt. Zedekiah Stone doubtless passed over and was favorably impressed with some of the then wilderness land west of the Connecticut River, as he was one of the original patentees in the charter for Windsor, Vt., granted by Gov. Wentworth of New Hampshire on 6 July 1761. At the first meeting of the proprietors, held at Winchester, N. H., in August or September 1761, Capt. Stone was chosen on the committee to survey and lay out the town. From 1740 to 1777, the jurisdiction over all the territory between the Connecticut River and Lake Champlain was claimed by both New Hampshire and New York, resulting in great difficulties and bitter controversies, terminating only when the region became the new state of Vermont in 1777. To prevent conflicting grants by the government of New York, the proprietors of Windsor, on 9 Oct.

1766, conveyed all their lands to Col. Nathan<sup>6</sup> Stone as feoffee, who on 28 Mar. 1772 secured a patent of them from the government of New York, and then reconveyed them back to the proprietors. Among the grantors to Col. Nathan Stone were Zedekiah and Martha Stone [his parents], and David, Samuel, Joel, and Caleb Stone [his brothers]. Capt. Zedekiah Stone and his sons were also charter grantees of Reading, Vt., 6 July 1761, and of Rutland, Vt., on 7 Sept. 1761, but soon disposed of their interests in these grants.

The settlement of Windsor, Vt., commenced in 1764, and in 1766 Capt. Zedekiah Stone and his children removed thither from Petersham, Mass. On 16 July 1766 he was appointed a justice of the peace and assistant justice of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas for Cumberland County. In 1786 he is listed on a school tax in the East Parish of Windsor. His name erroneously appears in the United States Census of 1790, as "Hezekiah" Stone, head of a family in Windsor, Vt., consisting of one male over sixteen years, no males under sixteen years, and two females. Capt. Zedekiah Stone survived to the advanced age of ninety years, dying at Windsor 10 Sept. 1800; his gravestone erroneously gives his age as ninety-two years.

He married about 1732, MARTHA ——; she was born about 1711 and died at Windsor, Vt., 20 Jan. 1794, in her eighty-third year according to her gravestone. The births of their children were recorded in an old prayer book.

Joel. b. in Petersham, 18 Feb. 1741/2, was an original grantee, with his father and brothers, of Windsor, Reading, and Rutland, Vt., in 1761, and in 1766 settled in Windsor where in that year he was among the proprietors who deeded their lands to his brother Col. Nathan Stone as feoffee to secure a patent from the governor of New York. His further history has not been traced. (A Daniel Stone appears in the United States Census of 1790 at Windsor, Vt., as head of a family of one male over 16 years, two males under 16 years, and four females. This Daniel Stone cannot be identified or placed, and the record may be an error for Joel.)

"A Zedekiah Stone was one of the proprietors of Windsor, N. C., in 1765, became a wealthy merchant and planter and a state senator. His eldest son, Hon. David Stone, b. in Hope, N. C., 17 Feb. 1770, was a member of Congress 1799-1801 and 1811-1818, a United States senator 1801-1807, and governor of North Carolina 1808-1810. In recent years his descendants have claimed descent from Capt. Zedekiah's Stone of Windsor, Vt. (b. 1710, d. 1800). While the names in this North Carolina family are suggestive, and there is a gap in 1740 in the birth-list of the children of Capt. Zedekiah's Stone, no svidence has been found that the latter had a son Zedekiah's Stone, Junior.

37. LIEUT. SAMUEL<sup>5</sup> STONE (Samuel<sup>4</sup> (17), David<sup>3</sup>, Elder John', Dea. Gregory'), born in Framingham, Mass., about 1714, seems to have resided most of his life in his native town; but in 1748 he and his wife were admitted to the church at Nichewoag (Petersham), and on 16 Mar. 1747 were dismissed from there to the Framingham Church, so probably they lived a few years in Nichewoag where his brothers Zedekiah and David had already located. His name appears on the alarm list of Framingham in Capt. Henry Eames' company, roll dated 22 Apr. 1757; and from 25 Apr. to 30 Nov. 1757, he served in the company of rangers commanded by his brother Capt. Zedekiah Stone, scouting between the Connecticut and Merrimack rivers. He was one of the original grantees in 1761 of Windsor, Vt., but soon disposed d his interests there. Later he held the office of lieutenant, and he died in Framingham between 24 Nov. 1786 and 12 Mar. 1787, aged about seventy-two years.

The will of Samuel Stone of Framingham, gentleman, advanced in age, dated 24 Nov. 1786. To my wife Rebeckah, for life, all household funiture and two cows, with reversion to my six daughters Bathsheba Hemenway, Susanna Ward, Sarah Fiske, Mary Moore, Rebecca Eaton, and Anne Trowbridge. To my said wife, for life, the west end of my dwelling house and one-fourth of the produce of the whole farm which I have deeded to my son Windsor Stone. To my sons Jason and Samuel Stone all residue of estate. Executor, Thomas Stone of Framingham, roman. [Signed] Samuel Stone. Witnesses: William Dunn, Daniel

Haven, and Zenas Wheeler. Executor declined to serve on 12 Mar. 1787, and on same day the widow Rebecca requested that her youngest son Windsor Stone be appointed executor, her two older sons residing outside the state. Heirs cited 14 Mar. 1787 and will proved 5 Apr. 1787 by son Windsor Stone. Inventory taken 15 May 1787 showed personal property of £106-10-10; but the estate was insolvent. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21717.)

The will of David Stone of Petersham, yeoman, dated 24 Feb. 1796, mentions wife Sarah, gives son David the land where he dwells in Petersham, and provides for invalid daughter Hannah and daughter Susanna Pierce. All residue to daughters Zerviah and Anne Stone, they and Hutchins Hapgood to be executors. All the executors declined to serve, so Rev. Festus Foster was appointed administrator of the will, 19 May 1808. Inventory \$346.92. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56587.)

He first appears in the army on a muster roll dated 25 Sept. 1755, of the company of his kinsman Capt. Josiah Stone, Col. Josiah Brown's regiment; served from 15 Sept. to 16 Dec. 1755 in an expedition against Crown Point, N. Y. On 22 Apr. 1757, he was enrolled in the alarm list of Capt. Henry Eames' Framingham company. In 1758 he served in an expedition to Lake George, the record of which is not preserved. On 23 Mar. 1759, aged thirty-seven years, he enlisted in Col. John Jones' regiment for expedition against Canada; reported served in expedition of 1758 at Lake George; on 30 Apr. 1759, appointed sergeant in Capt. John Nixon's company of Col. Ruggles' regiment and served in Crown Point expedition to 2 Dec. 1759. He also served as sergeant in Capt. Silas Brown's company from 18 Nov. 1761 to 1 July 1762, and in Capt. Gideon Parker's company from

1 July 1762 to 14 Nov. 1762. (Massachusetts Archives.) He died in Framingham before 1770, leaving neither will nor administration.

42. JAMES STONE (Nathaniel (19), Nathaniel, Elder John, Dea. Gregory1), was born in Framingham, Mass., 2 July 1712. On 20 June 1732, he and his brother Joseph Stone were deeded by their grandfather Nathaniel Stone certain lands in Framingham which had been occupied by their father Nathaniel Stone. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 37, p. 389.) James Stone settled on this property and soon bought out for £200 the interest of his brother Joseph Stone who removed from town, as on 16 May 1740 Joseph Stone of Rutland, Mass., confirmed to Sarah Stone, widow of his brother James Stone of Framingham, and their children Nathaniel, Thomas, and Sarah, all his half-interest in the lands formerly occupied by their father Nathaniel Stone, for which his said brother James had paid him £200. (Ibid., vol. 40, p. 675.) On 27 Feb. 1739/40, James Stone also bought from his brother Joseph the latter's right in one hundred acres north of Rutland, originally laid out to John Farnsworth. (Ibid., vol. 41, p. 389.) James Stone died between 27 Feb. 1739/40 and 16 May 1740, the dates of the two deeds above mentioned.

On 28 July 1741, administration on the estate of James Stone of Framingham was granted to Josiah Richardson of Sudbury, on petition of the widow Sarah and several creditors. Inventory taken 13 Oct. 1740 totalled £425-19-11 including homestead £246 and one hundred acres of wild land north of Rutland £55-0-0. On 26 Oct. 1741, Edward Goddard, Thomas Winch, Timothy Stearns, Daniel Stone, and Hezekiah Stone, as a committee, made a final setting off of the respective dower thirds of Sarah Stone, widow of James Stone, and of Mary Stone, widow of Nathanicl Stone and mother of said James Stone. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21610.)

44. SILAS STONE (Ebenezer (20), Nathaniel, Elder John. Dea. Gregory1), was born in Framingham, Mass., 29 Apr. 1728. When he was about eleven years old his father died; and the latter's estate was settled in 1743, whereby the widow and eldest son Ebenezer Stone received all the real estate, the latter paying to his brother Silas Stone and his three sisters £40-12-2 apiece. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21572.) Thus inheriting no real estate, Silas Stone on becoming of age found it advantageous to emigrate from his ancestral, native town, all the desirable land of which had been taken up and improved by a prolific population, while the then frontiers of western Massachusetts and of New Hampshire offered large areas of undeveloped land at low prices. After his marriage in 1750, Silas Stone lived about three years in Sudbury and about twelve years in Natick: but in 1765 he removed to Dublin, N. H., where he bought a large farm consisting of the easterly half of lot No. 5 in the first range. on which he resided the remainder of his life.

In the Spring of 1757, elaborate preparations were made in New England for the invasion of Canada by way of Lake Champlain; and as a preliminary the whole male population between sixteen and sixty years, capable of bearing arms, of each town in Massachusetts, was organized in two classes: first, the trained troops for active service made up largely of the younger and unmarried men, and second, a reserve or "alarm list" composed mostly of the older and married men with families. At this time Silas Stone was living with a wife and five children in Natick, Mass., where he was enrolled on the "alarm list" dated 19 Apr. 1757, in Capt. John Coolidge's company of that town. (Massachusetts Archives.)

During the Revolution, Silas Stone performed active service

in the American army, although then in his fiftieth year. At the critical time of Gen. Burgoyne's invasion of New York from Canada, Silas Stone enlisted 9 May 1777, in Capt. Samuel Blodgett's company, Col. Nathan Hale's Second New Hampshire Regiment, which joined the northern American Continental Army under Gen. Gates, and served through the Saratoga campaign, resulting in the decisive triumph of the American arms in the surrender of Gen. Burgoyne's army at Saratoga on 17 Oct. 1777, the turning point of the American Revolution. About s week later, while in a portion of the American forces returning from Saratoga to Albany, Silas Stone died in the army at Lansingburg, N. Y. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 1, p. 634.)

Abstract of the will of Silas Stone of Dublin, N. H., yeoman, dated 28 Apr. 1777. To wife Elizabeth one-third of all real and personal estate. Of the residue, to my son Silas Stone twice as much as to my other sons. to my other sons twice as much as to my daughters, and to my daughters an equal share each. Friend Joseph Greenwood, Esq., of Dublin, to be sole executor. Witnesses: Josiah Greenwood, Moses Greenwood, and Sarah Greenwood. Proved at Walpole, N. H., 9 Dec. 1777. The inventory taken 27 Nov. 1777 showed besides real estate, personal estate of £65-12-2; the executor showed payments of £82-3-3; deficit due to

him £16-11-1.

On 15 Oct. 1779, Amos Emery, David Townsend, William Greenwood, and James Chamberlain, the committee appointed to appraise and divide the real estate of Silas Stone, rendered their report. The real estate was valued at £1000; one-third was set off to the widow; the remainder valued at £666-13-4 was assigned to the eldest son Amos Stone, he to pay £94-16-0 to Silas Stone, £47-8-0 each to Ebenezer, John, Jeduthan, and Eli Stone, and £23-14-0 each to Elizabeth Johnson, Judith Stone, Anna [Juliana] Stone, Mary Stone, and Prudence Stone; also to Elizabeth Stone, widow of deceased, £200, and to the executor Joseph Greenwood, Esq., £16-11-1. (Cheshire County, N. H., Probate Records.)

Silas Stone married at Sherborn, Mass., 25 Jan. 1749/50, ELIZABETH RUSSELL, born there 7 Oct. 1730, daughter of Dea. Jonathan and Mary (Coolidge) Russell; in her old age she lived with her eldest son Amos Stone at Shoreham, Vt., where she died in 1816 at the advanced age of eighty-six years. Her father was selectman of Sherborn ten years, and deacon of the church there for seventeen years.

51. LIEUT. NATHANIEL<sup>5</sup> STONE (Lieut. Isaac<sup>4</sup> (22), Nathaniel<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Shrewsbury, Mass., 11 Apr. 1732. His name appears enrolled in a troop of horse commanded by Capt. Benjamin Eager in the 3d Middlesex and Worcester regiment; muster dated at Shrewsbury 28 Mar. 1757. From 23 May to 10 Dec. 1759, he served as lieutenant in Capt. Aaron Fay's company in the expedition of that year against Crown Point. (Massachusetts Archives.)

Nathaniel<sup>5</sup> Stone removed in 1764 from Shrewsbury, Mass., to New Ipswich, N. H., where he bought land as appears from the following deed: On 6 Jan. 1764, Nathaniel Stone of Shrewsbury, gent., for £120 bought of Joseph and Elizabeth Stevens of New Inswich, sixty acres there, being the northerly part of lot No. 35. (New Hampshire Province Deeds, vol. 88, p. 99.) He was a soldier in the Revolution, serving five days in the company of Capt. Thomas Heald which marched from New Ipswich to Cambridge, Mass., on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775. On 21 Sept. 1776, he enlisted in Capt. Abijah Smith's company. Col. Nahum Baldwin's regiment, which marched to New York to reinforce Gen. Washington's army, took part in the Battle of White Plains 28 Oct. 1776, and continued in service until December 1776. He also enlisted 28 Sept. 1777, in Capt. Edmund Bryant's company, Col. Daniel Moore's regiment, which marched to reinforce Gen. Gates' army in New York, and took part in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's army at Saratoga, the turning point of the war; discharged from service 25 Oct. 1777. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 1, pp. 34 and 421, and vol. 2, p. 356. He was otherwise active in New Ipswich in the patriot cause, as on 29 May 1775, he was chosen a member of the Committee of Safety and on 10 Mar. 1777, elected on the Committee of Inspection, Safety, and Correspondence. ("History of New Ipswich," p. 106.) In 1767 and 1773 he was a selectman of New Ipswich, and on 9 Dec. 1778, was representative for the town in the New Hampshire Legislature, during the Revolution.

About 1785 Nathaniel<sup>5</sup> Stone removed from New Ipswich to Alstead, N. H., where he is listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family comprising three males over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and three females. Soon afterwards he removed to Reading, Vt., and later to Pittsfield, Vt. The time and place of his death are unknown.

He married first, at Shrewsbury, 17 Dec. 1760, THANKFUL MORSE, born there 22 Sept. 1742, daughter of Jonathan and Phebe-

(Keyes) Morse. She had nine children.

He married secondly, at Petersham, Mass., 11 Feb. 1793, MBS. RHODA (GODDARD) GODDARD, born in Shrewsbury, 25 Feb. 1739/40, daughter of Edward and Hepzibah (Hapgood) Goddard, and widow of Rev. 52. CAPT. JOHN<sup>5</sup> STONE (Dea. John<sup>4</sup> (23), Nathaniel<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Rutland, Mass., 18 Dec. 1732, and passed his life in his native town. When a young man he bought a tract of land bounded on the northwest corner of Muschopauge Pond, originally laid out to Lieut. Simon Davis, which he settled on and improved. He was a man of energy and thrift, acquired a substantial estate, and also was prominent in the public affairs of Rutland, serving many years as selectman, assessor, and town clerk, and as representative to the General Court in 1806. In the United States Census of 1790 he is enrolled as head of a family in Rutland comprising two males over sixteen

years, one male under sixteen years, and four females.

During the Revolution he performed considerable service as a militia officer. When the war broke out he was lieutenant of Capt. Thomas Eustis' company of Rutland minutemen which marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775, to Cambridge, serving twelve days. On 6 Apr. 1776, he was commissioned second-lieutenant of Capt. Phiness Walker's company, Col. Nathan Sparhawk's regiment of Massachusetts militia: translerred to Capt. John Boynton's company of same regiment, which served from 27 July to 10 Aug. 1777 in a force commanded by Col. Job Cushing on an expedition to Bennington, Vt. He also appears as first-lieutenant of Capt. Josiah Wilder's company in Col. Sparhawk's regiment, in a force commanded by Maj. Daniel Clap, from 4 July to 15 July 1778, on service at Rutland Barracks; also as lieutenant of Capt. Jotham Houghton's company, Col. Samuel Denny's regiment, Gen. Fellows' brigade, in service from 24 Oct. to 1 Dec. 1779, at Claverack, N. Y. On 22 hme 1780, he was commissioned captain of the 4th company of Col. Grout's 7th Worcester County regiment of Massachusetts militia. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 102.)

Capt. John<sup>5</sup> Stone distributed his estate among his children during his lifetime, and died at Rutland 30 July 1819, in his eighty-

eventh year.

On 3 Mar. 1823, Alpheus F. Stone of Greenfield, physician, John Stone, Einsbeth Clap, Hezekish F. Stone, and Hannah B. Howe, children of John Stone of Rutland, gentleman, deceased, and Lucy Stone his widow,

petitioned that said Alpheus F. Stone be appointed administrator. Inventory of real estate mentions only a pew in church worth \$50; personal effects \$166.63. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56678.)

53. ISRAEL<sup>5</sup> STONE (Dea. John<sup>4</sup> (23), Nathaniel<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Rutland, Mass., 15 Apr. 1749, on the death of his father in 1776 succeeded to the latter's farm there on the shore of Muschopauge Pond. He was a soldier in the Revolution, serving twelve days in Capt. Thomas Eustis' (Rutland) company of minutemen which marched to Cambridge on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775; also served eleven days in Capt. David Bent's company, Col. Nathan Sparhawk's regiment, which was detached 20 Aug. 1777, and marched from Rutland, Mass., to Bennington, Vt., on an alarm. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 97.)

In 1786 Israel<sup>6</sup> Stone sold the old Stone homestead, and moved to the King farm which he leased for three years to make preparations to remove to the then "Far West." In February 1789 he scattered his family temporarily among neighbors in Rutland, and started in a pung for Ohio to prepare a new home for his family, selecting a tract of land on the Ohio River in what became the township of Belpre, in Washington County. Here he erected a log cabin, started to clear and plant some land, and was joined in the summer by his second son Jasper Stone who came with the Dana family; and in September 1790 his eldest son Sardine Stone brought the rest of the large family from Rutland to Belpre in a large party emigrating under the leadership of Gen. Rufus Putnam. The journey took eight weeks and was made in ox-carts to the Youghiogheny River in Westmoreland County, Penn.,

where they embarked on flat-boats on which they journeyed down through the Monongahela and Ohio Rivers to Belpre, arriving there in November 1790. A few weeks later the massacre of the settlement at Big Bottom by Indians caused the Belpre pioneers to fortify their settlement with blockhouses, and for over four years they lived in constant alarm of attacks and under great hardships in improving their farms. Israel<sup>5</sup> Stone died at Marietta, O., 3 July 1808.

He married first, at Rutland, 12 July 1768, Lydia Barrett of Paxton, born in Rutland 24 May 1751, daughter of Stephen and Elizabeth (Hubbard-How) Barrett; she followed her husband to Ohio in the autumn of 1790, and survived the hardships of pioneer life but two years, dying at Belpre, 30 Oct. 1792.

H., where he resided the remainder of his life, purchasing and settling on the farms near Stone Pond, owned about 1880 by Clark Hill and Curtis F. Hunt. In the United States Census of 1790, Eliphalet Stone is listed as head of a family in Marlborough, N. H., comprising two male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and four females.

When a young man, Eliphalet<sup>5</sup> Stone was a soldier in several campaigns in the French and Indian Wars. On his first enlistment he served from 30 Aug. to 13 Dec. 1755, in the company of Capt. Benjamin Wood of Hopkinton, on an expedition against Crown Point, N. Y.; allowance for twelve days' travel Albany to Boston; roll dated 5 Mar. 1756. He next served two weeks

from 15 Aug. 1757, in Lieut. Jesse Rice's company which marched from Marlborough, Mass., as far as Westfield, Mass., for the relief of Fort William Henry, N. Y. His name also appears, with residence as Westborough, Mass., on the muster roll dated 17 Feb. 1759, of Capt. Stephen Maynard's company in Col. Williams' regiment raised for the reduction of Canada; served from 10 Apr. to 8 Nov. 1758, including eleven days' travel; roll

dated 17 Feb. 1759. (Massachusetts Archives.)

After settling in Marlborough, N. H., Eliphalet Stone built a fulling mill at the outlet of Stone Pond, the first mill for dressing cloth in the town; and for many years he carried on both his farm and this mill, being succeeded in the mill by his son Calvin Stone. He also became an active leader in the civil, military and religious affairs of the town. In 1773 he was chosen clerk and treasurer of the proprietors of Monadnock No. 5, in 1774 was chairman of the committee to secure a town charter, was elected a selectman of Marlborough in 1775, 1776, 1777, 1786 and 1789, and was representative for Marlborough and Dublin in 1775-76 to the 5th Provincial Congress of New Hampshire, held at Exeter. In 1776 he was commissioned lieutenant of one of the town militia companies, and served in Capt. James Lewis' company of Col. Enoch Hale's regiment which marched 29 June 1777, to reinforce the garrison at Fort Ticonderoga, N. Y.; but after five days' march the company was dismissed from service, as the American army had abandoned the Fort on the advance of General Burgoyne's army. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 2, p. 102.) On 19 Jan. 1774, Eliphalet Stone was chosen chairman of a committee to secure a minister, and the records of Marlborough also show that Lieut. Eliphalet Stone was chosen 6 Aug. 1778, on a committee to arrange with Rev. Joseph Cummings to settle there. On 8 July 1790, Eliphalet Stone was chosen a deacon of the Marlborough Church and held this office over a quarter of a century until his death, 9 Feb. 1817, aged eighty-one years.

59. DAVID'S STONE (David' (26), Daniel', David', Dea. Gregory'), was born 11 Nov. 1709 in that part of Dorchester, Mass., which in 1726 became Stoughton, and was baptized in the church at Cambridge Farms (now Lexington), 5 Mar. 1710/11. By the will of his father in 1738, he inherited certain lands in Stoughton whence he removed about 1750 to the northeast corner of Easton, Mass., where he afterwards resided. He was a cordwainer by trade, but was engaged principally in farming.

David Stone appears on the muster roll dated 7 Apr. 1757, of the train-band in Easton commanded by Capt. Eliphalet Leonard. (Massachusetts Archives.) On 27 Aug. 1759, David Stone, yeoman, of Easton, was made guardian to his children James, Lois, Eunice and Mindwell Stone, all over fourteen years of age, grand-children of James Priest late of Waltham. (Bristol County Probate Records, File 126, 98-101.) In the United States Census of 1790, David Stone is enrolled in Easton as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and one female. He died in Easton, 25 Sept. 1794, in his eighty-sixth year, according to his gravestone in Easton.

He married first, at Watertown, 19 Sept. 1784, MINDWELL PRIEST, born there 27 June 1708, daughter of James and Sarah (Treadway) Priest; she died in Easton before 1758, leaving five children.

He married secondly, at Stoughton, 30 Oct. 1758, Mrs. Thank-FUL (Daniels) Fisher, born in Medway, Mass., 3 July 1715, daughter of Ebenezer and Mary (Harding) Daniels, and widow of Timothy Fisher of Stoughton who had died in a Crown Point expedition 29 Nov. 1756. Gregory'), was born 31 Oct. 1712, in that part of Dorchester, Mass., which in 1726 was set off as Stoughton, and was baptized in the church at Lexington 10 July 1713. By the will of his father in 1733 he inherited the latter's homestead in Stoughton which he occupied until 1743, when he sold it as appears by the following deed: on 7 Jan. 1743, Samuel Stone of Stoughton, husbandman, and wife Dorothy, for £600 convey to Zebediah Wentworth of Stoughton a house and seventy-two acres of land there. (Suffolk County Deeds, vol. 75, p. 245.) He later removed to the northeast corner of Easton, Mass., where on 22 Dec. 1743, he bought of Praisever Littlefield of Easton for £350 thirty-five acres of land and an interest in a saw mill there. (Bristol County Deeds, vol. 48, p. 409.) His name appears on the muster roll dated 7 Apr. 1757, of the Easton train-band commanded by Capt. Eliphalet Leonard. (Massachusetts Archives.) He died in Easton in 1776.

61. GREGORY<sup>5</sup> STONE (Gregory<sup>4</sup> (27), Daniel<sup>3</sup>, Daniel<sup>3</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Lexington (now Lincoln), Mass., 12 Jan. 1729/30, in the old house built about 1658 by his greatgrandfather David<sup>2</sup> Stone. His father died intestate when he was but four years of age; and as he was the only son, when he attained manhood he bought out the interests of his two sisters and so became possessed of the whole of this ancient ancestral homestead of about ninety-six acres. (See ante, p. 116.) This farm was located in that part of Lexington which in 1754 was set off into the new town of Lincoln. Gregory<sup>5</sup> Stone passed his whole life on this old homestead, dying in Lincoln on 10 Apr. 1782.

Gregory<sup>5</sup> Stone appears as private in Capt. Eleazer Melvin's company in service from 1 Aug. to 30 Aug. 1748. His name is also found on the muster roll dated 19 Apr. 1757 of the Lincoln military company commanded by Capt. Ebenezer Cutler. (Massachusetts Archives.)

The will of Gregory Stone of Lincoln, yeoman, dated 4 Apr. 1782. To my wife Hepzibah, one-third of all real estate and farm stock and implements, for life, all household goods, and my chaise. To my son Joshua Stone £95 in three installments. To my son Daniel Stone my land in New Ipswich, N. H.; also £25 when twenty-one and £10 more at death of my wife. To my daughters Hepzibah and Lydia Stone £70 each, in three installments. All residue of estate and reversion of my wife's dower, to my son Gregory Stone, he to pay all debts and legacies, and to be sole executor. [Signed] Gregory Stone. Witnesses: Samuel Hoar, Daniel Harrington, and Joseph Abbott Jun. Proved 9 May 1782. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21598.)

Gregory<sup>5</sup> Stone was a substantial and prosperous farmer, of a quiet and retiring disposition, and of the worthy character possessed by the Stone family in general. In Nov., 1755, he and his wife together joined the Lincoln Church by profession of faith.

He married at Concord, Mass., 13 June 1750, HEPZIBAH BROOKS, born there 28 Dec. 1727, daughter of Dea. Joshua and Lydia (Wheeler) Brooks; she died in Lincoln 22 Apr. 1783.

62. SAMUEL<sup>5</sup> STONE (Capt. Samuel<sup>4</sup> (28), Dea. Samuel<sup>5</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Concord, Mass., 8 Dec. 1708, when four years old was taken by his parents in their removal to "Pelham's Island" in Sudbury, where he grew to manhood. His father, Capt. Samuel<sup>4</sup> Stone, was one of the early proprietors of Rutland, Mass., where he became possessed of nearly nine hundred acres of land which he utilized to establish his sons in life soon after they became of age. Samuel<sup>5</sup> Stone therefore removed about 1780 to Rutland to take up and develop a part of this property on which he resided until his death, probably about 1776.

Administration on the estate of Samuel Stone of Rutland was granted 9 Apr. 1777 to Elijah Stone of same. The inventory of the personal estate totalled £42-10-1½; after paying debts a balance of £27-17-2½ was ordered divided as follows: to Mindwell Stone, widow of deceased, £9-5-9; to the heirs of Samuel Stone, deceased, son of deceased, £6-14-2; and to Elijah Stone, Stephen [sic.; means Stevens] Stone and Easter Bryant, the other children of deceased, £3-7-1 each. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56896.)

63. DEA. JONAS<sup>5</sup> STONE (Capt. Samuel<sup>4</sup> (28), Dea. Samuel<sup>5</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Concord, Mass., 3 Dec. 1710, when two years old was taken by his parents in their removal to the farm called "Pelham's Island" in Sudbury, where he lived during his minority. On becoming of age he was established in life by his father on part of a large tract of land the latter acquired in Rutland, Mass. Jonas<sup>5</sup> Stone removed thither about 1731 and continued in Rutland about twenty years; he then moved to Lexington, Mass., to assume the management of the old ancestral homestead there of his father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, to which he later succeeded and which he occupied the remainder of his life. His name appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Lexington consisting of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years, and two females.

Dea. Jonas<sup>5</sup> Stone was a man of local mark and influence in his generation. In 1738 he held the office of constable and in 1741 that of town treasurer of Rutland. In Lexington he was assessor in 1759, 1761, 1763 and 1767-1772; selectman 1756, 1759, 1761-1771 and 1773; and town treasurer 1755-1778. During the critical period of the Revolution he was especially prominent in the patriot cause, serving as representative for Lexington in the General Court 1771-1777, as a member of the Committee of Correspondence in 1773 and 1776, and as delegate to the first three Provincial Congresses in 1774 and 1775. He was also on the Lexington committees appointed 21 Oct. 1765 and 21 Sept. 1768 to draw up resolutions against arbitrary taxation by the

English government, without representation. His activity in the patriot cause led him even to volunteer for military duty at the outbreak of the Revolution, although then in his sixty-fifth year, as the records show that Dea. Jonas Stone served from 16 to 20 May 1775, in Capt. Edmund Munroe's company stationed at Cambridge. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 104.) On 2 Oct. 1766, he was admitted to full communion in the Lexington Church by letter from the Rutland Church, and from 1766 to 1787 he held the office of deacon. He died in Lexington 29 Oct. 1790 in his eightieth year.

In 1775, 1776 and 1777, he was a member of the Oakham Committee of Correspondence, Inspection and Safety. He was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Oakham, comprising two males over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and three females.

Capt. Isaac Stone, while a resident of Rutland, was an officer

in the French and Indian Wars. He served as lieutenant in Capt. Peter Davis' company, Col. Ruggles' regiment, which marched from Rutland 9 Aug. 1757, to Kinderhook, N. Y., for the relief of Fort William Henry; service nineteen days, with two hundred and fifty miles travel. In October 1761 he was commissioned captain of the 2nd Rutland company in the 3rd Worcester County militia regiment commanded by Col. John Murray. (Massachusetts Archives.) He died at Oakham, 3 Dec. 1794, aged sixty-four years.

Gregory, was born in Cambridge Farms (since 1714 Lexington), Mass., 20 Nov. 1708, and learned the trade of cordwainer, but engaged principally in farming during most of his life. When a young man he located in Stow, Mass., and bought of Samuel Lummus fifty-eight acres of land in Harvard, Mass. On 22 June 1737, he bought of William Whitcomb a house and fifty-five acres of land in Lancaster, and on 29 Dec. 1737, he bought of William Sawyer, Jr., additional land in Lancaster, lying on Long Hill. - 68. COL. JAMES<sup>5</sup> STONE (Joseph<sup>4</sup> (29), Dea. Samuel<sup>3-3</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Lexington, Mass., 7 Aug. 1722, probably lived there until about the time of his marriage in 1749, when he settled in the new town of Western, Mass., the name of which was changed in 1834 to Warren. The church records of Lexington give the dismissal of James Stone on 22 Oct. 1749 to the church at "Westorn." Here he became a prosperous and substantial

farmer, and was the most prominent man of his generation in the civil and military affairs of the town. In 1765 he also established a tavern in Western which he successfully conducted

for many years.

In October 1761, he was commissioned lieutenant of Capt. Thomas Hale's troop of horse in the 3d Worcester County regiment commanded by Col. John Murray, and in June 1771 was promoted to captain of this company. (Massachusetts Archives.) He also was an officer in the Revolution. On 31 Jan. 1776, he was commissioned lieut.-colonel of a Worcester County regiment and served in the siege of Boston until 1 Apr. 1776. He also served as lieut.-colonel of Col. Holman's regiment of volunteers which marched in September 1777 from Western to Saratoga to reinforce Gen. Gates' army and took part in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's forces: service one month and two days; warrant for pay dated 9 Oct. 1778. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, pp. 98-99.) He was a selectman of Western (Warren) in 1761, 1763-1765, 1767-1773, 1777 and 1783; town treasurer 1766-1768; moderator in 1781, 1783 and 1785; and representative to the General Court in 1780, 1783 and 1784.

On 21 Mar. 1775, James Stone of Western, gentleman, for £50 purchased of Samuel Moore of Lancaster, a tract of land in Murrayfield (Hampshire County Deeds); in 1783 the name of this town was changed to Chester. Col. James Stone deeded this land to his eldest son, William H.<sup>5</sup> Stone, who settled there. Col. Stone also bought land in Ware, Palmer, and New Marlborough. In the United States Census of 1790, James Stone appears as head of a family in Western, Mass., comprising four males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years, four females, and one slave. He died in Western (now Warren), Mass., 2 Dec. 1800, aged seventy-eight years.

The will of James Stone of Western, gentleman, dated 20 Dec. 1796. To wife Hannah Stone, certain maintenance. To sons Bartholomew and Daniel Stone lands in Ware and Palmer. 69. JONATHANS STONE (Jonathans (30), Dea. Samuel -1, Dea. Gregory'), was born in Lexington, Mass., 14 Mar. 1794/5, and the next year was taken by his parents in their removal to Watertown, Mass., where his father bought a large farm where he died three years later. In the settlement and division of his father's estate on 16 Feb. 1746/7, Jonathan Stone took all the real estate in Watertown and Waltham (except his mother's dower thirds), by paying £196-11-8 to each of his two brothers and £346-11-8 to each of his four sisters. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21650.) He continued on this homestead during the next twenty years, but in 1769 disposed of this property and removed to Shrewsbury, Mass., where in that year he and his wife were admitted to the church from the Watertown Church. He bought an extensive farm in Shrewsbury on which he passed the remainder of his life, dying there 3 Oct. 1805, aged eighty years. He is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Shrewsbury consisting of one male over sixteen years, no males under sixteen years, and three females. He was a thrifty and substantial yeoman, and held no public offices.

Administration on the estate of Jonathan Stone of Shrewsbury was granted 1 Apr. 1806 to Daniel Stone of same [his son]. Account of 11 May 1809 showed a balance of \$224.68 to be divided among the twelve children (or their representatives) of the deceased. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56695.)

He married at Cambridge, Mass., 21 May 1747, MARTHA CUTTER, baptized there 31 Mar. 1731, daughter of Dea. John and Lydia (Harrington) Cutter; she died in Shrewsbury 25 Oct. 1807. The births of their first ten children are recorded in Watertown; when they removed to Shrewsbury in 1769, these births were also recorded there; and the two youngest children were born in Shrewsbury and also recorded there.

For about twelve years following his marriage he resided in Lexington, Mass.; but in 1765 he removed to Townsend and settled on his property there which two years later became included in Ashby. While

fiving in Lexington, Samuel<sup>5</sup> Stone and his wife Martha joined the church in Menotomy (now Arlington) on 17 Mar. 1754, and their five eldest children were baptized there; but on 1 Sept. 1765, they were dismissed to the church in Townsend.

Maj. Stone built the first tavern in Ashby, and was one of the town's most prominent citizens of his generation. His homestead was near the Townsend line, the house being the one occupied by Francis S. Wheeler toward the end of the nineteenth century. Besides conducting his farm and tavern he also engaged in brick manufacture, and built and carried on a saw and grist mill. In 1773, 1774, 1775, 1777, 1778 and 1781 he was a selectman, and in 1776 was delegate for the town in the Provincial Congress, the records showing he was paid on 31 Mar. 1777, £3-12-0 for attending eighteen days at 4s. per day. His name appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Ashby of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years, and one female.

During the Revolution, Maj. Stone was an active patriot, both in civil affairs and in the field. In 1772 he was commissioned captain of one of the Ashby military companies, in Col. William Prescott's regiment, and marched with his minutemen on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775, serving one month around Boston. On 14 Feb. 1776 he was commissioned a major of Col. Jonathan Reed's 6th Middlesex County regiment of militia. On 26 Sept. 1777, he enlisted as private (as did Col. William Prescott of Pepperell and other militia officers) in a company of sixty-six volunteers from Ashby and vicinity under Capt. James Hosley, which company marched to Saratoga, N. Y., to join Gen. Gates' army and assisted in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's invading force; service one month and fifteen days. On 28 June 1780, he was appointed major of Col. Cyprian How's Middlesex County regiment which marched to Rhode Island to reinforce the Continental Army; discharged 30 Oct. 1780; service four months and nine days; one hundred miles travel home. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, pp. 117 and 120.) Maj. Stone died in Ashby 15 Dec. 1806, aged seventy-nine years.

He married first, about 1752, MARTHA EARLE, born in Boston 2 Feb. 1782/S, daughter of John and Mary (Booker) Earle; she

died in Ashby 16 Jan. 1783, having had six children.

71. JOSIAH STONE (Jonathan (30), Dea. Samuel Dea. Gregory1), born in Watertown, Mass., 10 Nov. 1729, in the settlement of his father's estate on 16 Feb. 1746/7, received £196-11-8 in money and a half-interest in a tract of land in Townsend, Mass., which interest he later disposed of to his brother Maj. Samuel<sup>5</sup> Stone. On becoming of age Josiah Stone located in Lexington, Mass., where he remained until April, 1761, and then moved into Watertown, Mass., where on 23 Mar. 1762, the selectman issued a caution against the legal residence there of "Josiah Stone, wife Abigail, and four children, Abigail, Elizabeth, Josiah and Richard\* who came from Lexington last April." (Bond's "History of Watertown," p. 945.) On 31 Aug. 1755, he and his wife joined the church at Menotomy (now Arlington), where their two eldest children were baptized, and afterwards joined the Lexington Church where the next two children were baptized. About 1762, he removed from Watertown, Mass., to Temple, N. H., where he resided the remainder of his life. In a military census of Temple, taken 28 Oct. 1775, Josiah Stone appears as head of a family consisting of no male between sixteen and fifty years not in the army, no male above fifty years, one male in the army [himself], two males under sixteen years, and four females; also one gun. ("History of Temple, N. H.," p. 101.) He was killed in battle in the Revolution 19 Sept. 1777.

Josiah Stone was a soldier in both the French and Indian Wars and the Revolution. He appears on a muster roll dated 16 Sept. 1755 of Capt. William Read's Lexington company, Col. William

Evidently an error for Rachel.

Brattle's regiment, in the Crown Point expedition of that year. (Massachusetts Archives.) In the Revolution, he first appears in the Temple company of minutemen which marched to Cambridge, Mass., on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775. On 1 May 1775, he enlisted in Capt. Ezra Towne's company, Col. James Reed's regiment, and fought in the Battle of Bunker Hill 17 June 1775; service three months and eight days. On 12 July 1776, he enlisted in Capt. Joseph Parker's company to serve five months, and joined the Northern Army at Ticonderoga 18 July 1776. On 13 Mar. 1777, he enlisted for the town of Temple for three years' service in the Continental Army joining the 6th company of the 3d New Hampshire regiment; this company was commanded by Capt. William Ellis and later by Capt. Isaac Frye. During this term of service, Josiah Stone was killed in battle 19 Sept. 1777. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 1, pp. 35, 91 and 334, and vol. 3, pp. 857 and 26.) Massachusetts Archives also record his service, as "Josiah Stone of Temple; private; aged 45 years; stature, 5 ft. 7 in.; complexion, brown; eyes, gray; occupation, farmer; birthplace, Watertown; enlisted 1 May (or 15 May) 1775, in Capt. Ezra Town's company, Col. James Read's regiment; list dated 4 Aug. 1775." ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 110.)

72. HON. JOSEPH<sup>5</sup> STONE (Ens. Joseph<sup>4</sup> (31), Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Framingham, Mass., 27 Aug. 1731, on becoming of age was termed "Joseph Stone 3d" to distinguish him from his father (who was termed "Joseph Stone Senior"), and from his kinsman Sergt. Joseph<sup>5</sup> Stone (Samuel<sup>4</sup>, David<sup>3</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in 1721, who was termed "Joseph Stone Junior."

Joseph's Stone 3d was a soldier in the French and Indian War, serving as clerk from 12 Aug. to 13 Dec. 1755, in the company of Capt. Benjamin Wood of Hopkinton, in an expedition against Crown Point, N. Y. On 22 Apr. 1757, he was enrolled on the train-band, or active, list of Capt. Henry Eames' company of Framingham militis. (Massachusetts Archives.) Prior to the Revolution he settled in Harvard, Mass., where he is listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and two females.

Joseph Stone became one of the most prominent men in Harvard of his generation. He was an original member and the first deacon of the Baptist Church in Harvard which was organized 27 June 1776, and he continued as deacon until 1 Jan. 1808. when he was expelled from the church on the charge of being too friendly with Rev. Isaiah Parker who had been dismissed from the church in 1802. Dea. Joseph Stone and Col. Josiah Whitney were chosen delegates for Harvard to the Massachusetts Constitutional Convention of 1780, one representing each denomination. They were also delegates to the county conventions held from 1782 through 1786, which resulted in The Shays Rebellion. In 1791, 1792 and 1793 Joseph<sup>5</sup> Stone was a selectman, in 1784 and 1797-1800 he was representative to the Massachusetts General Court, and in 1787 he was a member of the State Senate. In 1809 he was commissioned a justice of the peace, which is the latest record of him that has been found. The time and place of his decease have not been learned.

He married at Bedford, Mass., 13 Jan. 1758, REBECCA MERRIAM, born there 28 Sept. 1731, daughter of John and Abigail (Hayward) Merriam; she died in Harvard 23 Oct. 1819, aged eighty-eight years. The record of their family has not been secured.

During the Revolution, Nathan<sup>5</sup> Stone appears as private in Capt. Joseph Morse's company, Col. Samuel Bullard's regiment, which marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775; service four days. He also served from 28 July to 7 Aug. 1780 as sergeant of Capt. Joshua Fiske's company, Col. Abner Perry's regiment, which marched to Rhode Island on an alarm. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 113.) He later became lieutenant of militia and died at Natick 3 July 1793.

Administration on the estate of Nathan Stone of Natick was granted to his widow Eunice Stone 12 Nov. 1793. Inventory taken 9 Nov. 1793 shows real estate of £440-0-0, including the homestead of seventy-seven acres with buildings, one-third of a right in eastward lands, and twenty-six acres bought of Daniel Lealand. Personal estate totalled £303-10-5. William, and Daniel Loring, minor children of Mary Loring, deceased; Nancy wife of Samuel Fiske; Joseph Stone; Eunice Stone; and Lucy wife of William Farris. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21692.)

75. CAPT. AND HON. JOSIAH<sup>6</sup> STONE (Lieut. Micah<sup>5</sup> (32), Daniel<sup>5</sup>, Dea. Daniel<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Framingham, Mass., 23 Dec. 1724. He succeeded to a considerable portion of the estates in the Saxonville region of the town, including a half-interest in the mills on the Sudbury River, which had been in the family during four generations. He was an energetic and successful business man, and by skilful management of his farms and grist and saw mills, he acquired a good estate.

During the last thirty years of his life, Captain Stone was one of the leading and most useful men of Framingham in the civil and military affairs of the town, holding all the important town offices. He was a selectman 1756-1758 and 1763-1778, town clerk 1769-1775, town treasurer 1769-1776, representative to the Massachusetts General Court 1771-1776, member of the State Provincial Congress 1774-1776, member of State Council 1777, delegate to the Constitutional Conventions 1783-1785, and member of the Massachusetts Senate in 1780 and 1781. From 13 July to 12 Oct. 1749 he served in Capt. John Catlin's company of rangers, scouting between the Merrimac and Connecticut rivers in New Hampshire. Later he was commissioned captain of one of the Framingham military companies and was in active service with his company from 15 Sept. 1755 to 14 Jan. 1756 in Col. Josiah Brown's regiment in an expedition against Crown (Massachusetts Archives.) He was accidentally killed in his sawmill, 12 Apr. 1785.

Administration on the estate of Hon. Josiah Stone of Framingham was granted to his widow Anne Stone 4 May 1785. Inventory taken 24 May 1785 showed personal estate of £618-16-4, and real estate of £912-10-0, consisting of farm of one hundred and ten acres and buildings and a half interest in a saw and grist mill; in addition he had a half-interest in a two-hundred-acre farm in Fitzwilliam, N. H., and a tract of wild land in Sudbury Canada, near the Androscoggin River. [This latter tract was the right derived from the service of his grandfather Daniel' Stone, in the grant (which became Bethel, Me.) made in June 1768 to the descendants of the soldiers in the expedition against Canada

in 1690.] On 30 Aug. 1785 the real estate was divided; the widow's dower being set off, and the son Luther Stone of Fitchburg, yeoman, and the daughter Abigail Adams having had their portions in their father's lifetime, the remainder was set off to the sons Josiah Stone and Micah Stone. He held the office of selectman in 1767 and 1776, and in the Revolution was on the town Committee of Correspondence in 1775.

From 23 Sept. to 27 Oct. 1746, Daniel Stone of Framingham served as clerk of Capt. Josiah Brown's troop of horse, called out on an alarm. Later he became an officer of the first company of Framingham militia, being commissioned second lieutenant, 5 Mar. 1766 and captain in August 1771. (Massachusetts

Archives.) He died in Framingham 3 Apr. 1813, aged almost eighty-six years.

The will of Daniel Stone of Framingham, gentleman, dated 4 Dec. 1805. To my three sons Nahum, John, and Daniel Stone all my farming tools, live stock, and wearing apparel, equally divided. He was a selectman in 1780, 1784 and 1785. In August 1771 he was commissioned lieutenant of the 1st Framingham company of the 3d regiment of Middlesex County militia, commanded by Col. John Noves, and later succeeded his brother Daniel Stone as captain. (Massachusetts Archives.) In the Revolution he was commissioned 7 Feb. 1776, as lieut.-colonel of Col. 79. REV. ELIABS STONE (Lieut. Micahs (32), Daniel, Dea. Daniel, Elder John, Dea. Gregory, was born in Framingham, Mass., 5 May 1737, and was baptized the next day in the Sudbury West Parish Church. In the division of his father's estate on 27 June 1748 he received £343-1-2, and with this inheritance he was able later to acquire a liberal education, graduating A.B. from Harvard College in 1758. During the next three years he taught school in Sudbury, studied theology there under Rev. William Cooke, and engaged in preaching. On 20 May 1761, he was ordained and settled over the Congregational Church in Reading, Mass., where he continued in office over sixty-one years until his death on 31 Aug. 1822, in his eighty-sixth year. In his half-century sermon delivered 19 May 1811, he stated he had beptized 876 persons, mostly children, had performed 380 marrisges, and attended 476 funerals. Throughout his long service he labored with zeal for the welfare of his parish, and he was a man of firmness and decision and an ardent patriot during the critical period of the Revolution. His name appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Reading of three males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and five females.

Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in the "North County Gore," Oxford, Mass., 17 May 1750. On becoming of age in 1771, he was deeded by his father Uriah<sup>5</sup> Stone and his brother-in-law Capt. William Campbell, the old "Elliot" saw and grist mill in Oxford which he operated for about seven years, and then sold in January 1778 to Anthony Sigourney. Later he removed to West Springfield, Mass., and before 1785 settled in Chesterfield, Mass., where he was listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years, and three females. He died in Chesterfield 19 Sept. 1804.

Administration on the estate of John Stone of Chesterfield granted to widow Elizabeth and Josiah White, 25 Sept. 1804. On 24 Nov. 1807, Aribert Leonard of West Springfield appointed guardian of Harriet, Aurelia, and Samuel Stone, minor children of deceased; on 1 May 1810 he had license to sell land; bondsman, John<sup>5</sup> Stone<sup>\*</sup> of Chesterfield, goldsmith. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in the "North County Gore," Oxford, Mass., 15 Sept. 1754, lived on the paternal farm and in 1792 purchased of his father the latter's homestead where he later built a new and large mansion house which still stands in good preservation. He was energetic and successful in business, built a tavern in Rochdale, and promoted the Worcester and New Haven turnpike. In 1807 he and his nephew Luther Stone built a new saw and grist mill, on the stream near the Leicester line, which they conducted in partnership until his death in Oxford, 23 May 1820.

Samuel Stone was a soldier in the Revolution. On 9 May 1775 he enlisted in Capt. Joel Green's company, Col. Ebenezer Learned's regiment, and served around Boston until Oct. 1775. He also served as private for thirty-eight days in Capt. Jeremiah Kingsbury's company, Col. Jonathan Holman's regiment; roll dated at Providence, R. I., 20 Jan. 1777. Jotham Houghton's company, Col. Josiah Whitney's regiment, in service from 31 July to 14 Sept. 1778 at Rhode Island; roll dated at Petersham. 87. COL. NATHAN<sup>5</sup> STONE (Capt. Zedekiah<sup>5</sup> (36), Samuel<sup>5</sup> David<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Framingham, Mass., 12 Dec. 1734, when less than two years old was taken by his parents in their removal to "Nichewoag" (now Petersham), Mass., where he resided for nearly thirty years. From 25 Apr. to 30 Nov. 1757, he was in the company of rangers commanded by [his father] Lieut. Zedekiah<sup>5</sup> Stone, scouting in New Hampshire between the Connecticut and Merrimack rivers. (Massachusetts Archives.)

Nathan<sup>6</sup> Stone and his father and brothers were among the original patentees from Gov. Wentworth of New Hampshire of the latter's grants in 1761 of the townships of Windsor, Reading, and Rutland, Vt., and in 1766 the Stones were among the early settlers of Windsor. During the controversy from 1740 to 1777

between New Hampshire and New York, as to their jurisdiction over the territory which in 1777 became the State of Vermont, Col. Nathan Stone became a very important figure. In 1766 the government of New York made large grants in Vermont to new patentees who attempted to oust the original settlers under the grants from New Hampshire. To protect their rights, the latter formed a military organization known as the "Green Mountain Boys," in which Col. Nathan Stone, his brothers, and his brother-in-law Lieut.-Col. Joseph Wait were prominent leaders. They strenuously defied the jurisdiction of New York, and seized and punished any intruders, vigorous applications of birch rods to them being so effective that the united and determined population accomplished their purpose with but little serious bloodshed. As a further measure of protection, the proprietors of Windsor under the Wentworth grant, on 9 Oct. 1766 conveyed all their lands, ostensibly in fee, but in reality in trust, to Col. Nathans Stone, who by skillful manipulation finally obtained on 28 Mar. 1772 a patent of these lands from the government of New York; and in November 1772 he reconveyed their shares back to the proprietors, who thus secured a double-barrelled tenure of their lands.

On 7 Apr. 1768 and 14 Apr. 1772, Col. Stone was appointed a justice of the peace and assistant justice of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas of Cumberland County, by the government of New York. From 16 July 1766 to 14 Oct. 1767 he was sheriff of Cumberland County. In 1786 he was taxed on a school rate in the East Parish of Windsor; and in the United States Census of 1790 he appears as head of a family in Windsor, consisting of four males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and two females. He held various town offices in Windsor, and died there 27 Oct. 1795.

He settled upon lot No. 13 in Range 5, and is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Fitzwilliam, N. H., of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years, and four females.

Samuel Stone was a soldier in the Revolution in the Massachusetts forces. He first appears as private in Capt. Micajah Gleason's company of Framingham minutemen which marched to Concord and thence to Cambridge on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775; service sixteen days. Later in this month Samuel Stone enlisted for eight months' service in a company of volunteers under Capt. Gleason, Col. Nixon's regiment, which took part in the Battle of Bunker Hill on 17 June 1775. From 28 Aug. to 29 Nov. 1777, he served as corporal in Capt. Joseph Winch's company, Col. Samuel Bullard's regiment, taking part in the Saratoga campaign which resulted in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's army. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 118; also "History of Framingham," pp. 278, 280, and 306.) On 6 Mar. 1833, Samuel Stone of Cheshire County, N. H., aged eighty-three years, was placed on the United States pension roll for services as private and corporal in the Massachusetts Continental Line. (New Hampshire Pension Roll, p. 84.) He died at the home of his son in Swanzey, N. H., 12 Dec. 1841, aged ninety-one years.

The will of Samuel Stone of Fitswilliam, dated 14 Mar. 1830, names

Ithamar Wright, which marched to Cambridge on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775; service twelve days. He then enlisted on 1 May 1775, probably for eight months, in Capt. Sylvanus Walker's company, Col. Timothy Danielson's regiment, and was at Roxbury on 2 Nov. 1775. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 110.) After removing to New Hampshire he served in the forces of that state. On 1 Oct. 1776 he enlisted in Capt. Josiah Russell's company of rangers and served two months in an expedition to Ticonderoga. Also he enlisted 27 June 1777 as corporal in Col. Jonathan Chase's regiment and served until 11 July 1777. (New Hampshire Revolutionary Rolls, vol. 4, p. 88, and vol. 2, p. 39.) He was probably the Samuel Stone

who was a soldier in the Revolution, enlisting 7 Aug. 1776 in Capt. Benjamin Wait's company of Maj. [Joab] Hoisington's 'regiment of rangers. (Vermont Revolutionary Rolls, p. 819.) Later he became captain of one of the Windsor militia companies. In 1794 he joined the Windsor Church, of which his wife had become a member previous to their marriage. 96. NATHAN' STONE (Sergt. Joseph' (39), Samuel', David', Elder John', Dea. About 1789 he located in Royalton, Vt., where he appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and two females. About 1835 he removed to Hanover, Jackson County, Mich., where he d. 16 Sept. 1840, aged seventy-six years.

97. THOMAS<sup>6</sup> STONE (Thomas<sup>6</sup> (40), Thomas<sup>6</sup>, David<sup>3</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Framingham, Mass., 26 Jan. 1760, is included under his father's listing there in the United States Census of 1790. He was a yeoman and succeeded to his father's homestead in Framingham, on which he always resided, and which he late in life sold to his son Ebenezer' Stone. He was a soldier in the Revolution, scrving from 28 July to 7 Aug. 1780 in Capt. Nathan Drury's company of Col. Abner Perry's regiment which marched to Rhode Island on an alarm. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 123.) He died in Framingham 1 July 1826.

Administration on the estate of Thomas Stone of Framingham, yeoman, was granted 13 Feb. 1827 to Ezra Hemenway of same, yeoman, on petition by the heirs-at-law, viz., Hannah Stone, widow, Thomas, Ebenezer, John, David, and Gilman Stone, and Nathan and Hannah Underwood. Bondsmen, Israel Stone and Aaron Stone, both of East Sudbury. Inventory showed a church pew as the only real estate; personal property totalled \$1622.50, including a note for \$1000 due from [his son] Ebenezer Stone. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21737.)

99. SILAS<sup>6</sup> STONE (Silas<sup>5</sup> (44), Ebenezer<sup>4</sup>, Nathaniel<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Natick, Mass., 5 Apr. 1755, when ten years old was taken by his parents in their removal in 1765 to Dublin, N. H., where he lived another ten years until the outbreak of the Revolution.

When news of the battle of Lexington reached Dublin, Silas<sup>6</sup> Stone at once hastened to Boston, and on 29 Apr. 1775, enlisted at Cambridge as private for eight months' service in Capt. Benjamin Bullard's company, Col. Jonathan Brewer's regiment. This company was made up mainly of men from Sherborn, Mass., and fought in the Battle of Bunker Hill, where the regiment lost seven killed and eleven wounded, its colonel and lieut.-colonel both being among the wounded. During the remainder of the year he continued in the American army besieging Boston, his name appearing on a roll of the company dated at Prospect Hill, 6 Oct. 1775. In 1776 (probably on 26 Sept.), he enlisted as fifer in Capt. Aaron Gardner's company, Col. Eleazer Brooks' regiment, which marched to Horse Neck, N. Y., joined Gen. Washington's army above New York, and took part in the Battle of White Plains, 28 Oct. 1776. In this battle Silas Stone was severely wounded;\* and in a roll of Capt. Gardner's company returned later in that year, Silas Stone was reported "wounded and in the country." But he was not permanently disabled by his wounds, as he served as private from 7 Sept. to 3 Oct. 1779, in Capt. Nathaniel Belcher's company on guard duty at Castle Island in Boston Harbor; his name on this roll is erroneously given as "Slone." He also served as private from 28 July to 11 Aug. 1780 in Capt. Joshua Leland's company, Col. Abner Perry's regiment, in an expedition to Rhode Island on an alarm. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 121 and vol. 14, p. 305.)

After leaving Dublin in April 1775, to join the army, Silas<sup>8</sup> Stone did not return there to live, but located in Sherborn, Mass., where he married and settled on the homestead of his father-in-law, Dea. Jonathan Twitchell, where he resided the remainder of his life. In the United States Census of 1790 he is listed as

"It was probably on account of his injuries received in this engagement, that Silas Stone was given a double share by his father's will made the next April. the head of a family in Sherborn, Mass., comprising one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and four females. In the United States Direct Tax of 1798 he was assessed on a house and eighty perch lot valued at \$500, and on twenty-four acres of land valued at \$504. He was a substantial yeoman, a naturally inventive and skilful mechanic, and a man well informed from extensive reading. He was a justice of the peace (then an office of distinction), a selectman of Sherborn in 1793, 1801, 1808, 1809, and 1814, and he died there intestate, 12 July 1820. His widow Caroline Stone and eldest surviving son, Royal Stone, renounced administration of his estate, and requested that his son Silas Stone be appointed administrator. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21728.)

He married first, at Sherborn, 9 Jan. 1781, JENNET TWITCHELL, born there 5 Nov. 1760, daughter of Dea. Jonathan and Deborah (Bullard) Twitchell, and niece of Capt. Benjamin Bullard in whose company he had first enlisted in the Revolution; she had ten

children and died in Sherborn 13 June 1816.

100. DEA. JOHN<sup>5</sup> STONE (Silas<sup>5</sup> (44), Ebenezer<sup>4</sup>, Nathaniel<sup>5</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Natick, Mass., 30 June 1761, and four years later was taken by his parents in their re-



moval to Dublin, N. H., where he lived until he became of age. In 1782 he appears among the early inhabitants of Cavendish, Vt.; and upon his marriage in 1786 he located in Shoreham, Vt., where he is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and three females. In 1792 the birth of one of his children (Silas) is recorded in the neighboring town of Leicester, Vt. A few years later he removed to Sangerfield, Oneida County, N. Y., and he finally located in Attica, Wyoming County, N. Y., where he died 25 Nov. 1831.

John<sup>6</sup> Stone was a soldier in the Revolution in the New Hampshire forces; but all of his service cannot be made out with certainty from the records. From 10 Aug. to 28 Aug. 1778 he served in the company of Capt. Samuel Twitchell of Dublin, Col. Enoch Hale's regiment of volunteers, in an expedition to Rhode Island. He also appears in a list dated 24 Apr. 1781 of men raised for the continental army by the town of Dublin. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 2, p. 536, and vol. 3, p. 505.) He was a farmer and held the office of deacon in the Baptist Church. His Bible, containing his complete family record, passed to his youngest daughter Thirza<sup>7</sup> Stone who gave it to her niece Mrs. Emeline<sup>8</sup> (Stone) Ralph of Kalamazoo, Mich. Mrs. Ralph and her cousin, Mrs. Olive B<sup>9</sup>. (Stone) Griswold of San Diego, Cal., have supplied most of the information secured of Dea. John<sup>8</sup> Stone and his descendants.

He married at Dublin, N. H., 23 May 1786 (20 Dec. 1786 in town record), Hannah Stratton, born in Sherborn, Mass., 29 Apr. 1767 (23 Apr. 1766 in town record), daughter of Elias and Milicent (Frost) Stratton; she died in Attica, N. Y., 5 Jan. 1831.

102. CAPT. FRANCIS' STONE (Jonathan's (45), Jonathan's, Nathaniel's, Elder John's, Dea. Gregory's), was born in Leicester, Mass., 13 Jan. 1740/1, and when fourteen years of age was apprenticed to Ebenezer Warren of Spencer to learn the tanner's trade. His father was killed in battle near Crown Point on 8 Sept. 1755; and on becoming of age in 1762 he succeeded to all of his father's homestead in Leicester by buying out the interests of his mother, brothers, and sisters. After his marriage he removed to New Braintree, Mass., where he was living at the outbreak of the Revolution in 1775; and he appears there in the

United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and two females. His farm was located in that part of New Braintree which in 1791 was annexed to Brookfield, and in 1812 was set off from Brookfield into the new town of North Brookfield. Besides carrying

on his farm, he also operated a tannery in Brookfield.

Francise Stone was born with a martial spirit, and from his early youth was engaged in military affairs. His first enlistment was made in the French and Indian War, at the age of fourteen years and seven months, the record showing that Francis Stone of Spencer, whose master was Ebenezer Warren, was a sentinel in Capt. Andrew Dalrymple's company from 9 Aug. to 17 Dec. 1755 in a Crown Point expedition. He continued in the same company in the next year's Crown Point campaign, being credited with service from 17 Dec. 1755 to 13 Mar. 1756 and from 13 Mar. 1756 to 16 Dec. 1756. He also enlisted 21 May 1758 in Capt, John Fry's company, Col. Timothy Ruggles' regiment, and served forty-one days in the Crown Point expedition of that year. (Massachusetts Archives.) Francis<sup>6</sup> Stone was also a soldier in the Revolution, his name first appearing on the roll of Capt. John Grainger's company of minutemen which marched to Cambridge on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775. On 31 May 1776 he was commissioned captain of the 12th company of Col. James Converse's 4th Worcester County regiment of Massachusetts militia. In August 1777 he marched with his company on the Bennington alarm. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 94.) He performed service at a later period in the war, the records of which are not preserved.

After the close of the Revolution in 1783, internal difficulties rapidly developed in Massachusetts, due largely to the prostration of industry by the long war, depreciation of the currency and consequent poverty among the masses, and hardships inflicted on thousands of debtors, who could be ordered to jail for debts of \$5 or more. Numerous public meetings and petitions to the Legislature failed to secure relief, and finally in September 1786 the agitation led to armed insurrection in Worcester County to suppress the holding of the courts. Capt. Daniel Shays became the nominal leader of the armed forces of the insurrection. which has thus been known as The Shays Rebellion; but it is claimed that Capt. Francis Stone was in reality the most capable leader of the rebels. After five months of disorder, a strong force of militia under Gen. Lincoln was sent from Boston into Worcester County and by February 1787 the rebel forces were dispersed and disbanded with but slight bloodshed. Several of the leaders.

including Capt. Francis Stone, were indicted for treason, and for safety fled to Vermont; but a few months later a general amnesty was granted, and Capt. Stone returned to his home in New Braintree. He was a man of strong convictions, and throughout his life he steadfastly justified the rebellion and his own course in it. He died in Brookfield 12 Dec. 1802.

The will of Francis Stone of Brookfield, gentleman, dated 7 Nov. 1800. To my wife Sarah Stone one-third of the income of my estate, for life. To sons Calvin and Francis Stone all my real estate and farm stock and utensils. To my son Luther Stone \$100, if he be living. To my daughter Sarah Barr of New Braintree two cows and six sheep. To my daughter Amy Stone \$40. Grandsons Rufus and Aaron Barr. My sons Calvin and Francis Stone to be executors. Filed 4 Jan. 1803. Calvin Stone declined to serve as executor, and Francis Stone gave bonds as sole executor. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56594.)

He married first, at Sutton, 11 Sept. 1760, MARTHA CHASE, born there 7 Nov. 1789, daughter of Dea. Abel and Sarah (-Chase; she had at least five children, and died in New Braintree. in August 1775.

103. RUFUS' STONE (Jonathan's (45), Jonathan's, Nathanish, Elder John's, Dea. Gregory's), born in Leicester, Mass., 12 Jan. 1745/6, was only nine years of age when his father was killed in battle near Crown Point, N. Y., 8 Sept. 1755. He is next found living with his mother Elizabeth Stone in Shrewsbury, Mass., when on 16 Mar. 1762 he enlisted in Capt. William Jones' company in which he continued in service until 25 Nov. 1762. (Massachusetts Archives.) A few years later he located in Brookfield, Mass., and is termed of that town when on 4 Apr. 1767 he bought of John Worthington of Springfield, gent., for £20, a tract of land in that part of "Township No. 3" which the next year was established as the town of Worthington. On 21 Mar. 1769, he sold six acres of this land to Thomas Bigelow for £1-16-0. (Hampshire County Deeds, vol. 10, p. 103.) Further history untraced.

He married at Brookfield, Mass., 29 Sept. 1766, SARAH WATT. Record of their family not obtained.

104. CAPT. JONATHAN' STONE (Jonathan' (45), Jonathan', Nathaniel', Elder John', Dea. Gregory'), born in Leicester, Mass., 4 Mar. 1752, when a youth was apprenticed to his brother Francis' Stone who settled in New Braintree, Mass. He learned the tanner's trade and also secured a good knowledge of surveying. When about twenty years of age he went on a whaling voyage

for two years, returning home shortly before the Revolution. He marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775, and served throughout the War for Independence. On 4 July 1789 he left Brookfield with his family in a party of emigrants for Ohio, and traveling two months by ox-teams to the Youghiogheny River in Westmoreland County, Penn., they there embarked on flatboats on which they passed down through the Monongahela and Ohio rivers to Belpre, Washington County, Ohio, where they settled. A few weeks later war broke out with the Indians, and for the next five years the settlement was constantly under arms and continually in danger of destruction; armed parties were kept scouting in the neighborhood, and most of the inhabitants resided in garrison houses. In 1795 peace was made, and the development of the country rapidly proceeded. Capt. Stone was one of the leading pioneers of Washington County of which he was treasurer from 1792 until his death at Belpre on 24 Mar. 1801.

Capt. Stone was an ardent patriot in the Revolution. He was a member of Capt. John Grainger's company of minutemen which marched from New Braintree to Cambridge on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775. On 26 Apr. 1775 he enlisted [for eight months] as sergeant in Capt. Grainger's company, Col. Ebenezer Learned's regiment of the Continental Army, appearing on rolls dated 1 Aug., 7 Oct., and 9 Nov. 1775, while taking part in the siege of Boston. From 1 Jan. to 31 Dec. 1776 he was ensign in the 8d Continental Infantry. On 1 Jan. 1777 he was commissioned paymaster, with rank of lieutenant, of Col. Rulus Putnam's regiment of the Continental Army, and on 22 June 1781 he was promoted to captain and continued in that rank. until retired 1 Jan. 1783, having completed nearly eight years of continuous service. During the course of this service he was in Gen. Gates' army at Stillwater and Saratoga, and also in the garrison stationed at West Point, N. Y. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, pp. 106, 107-8; also "Historical Register of Officers of the Continental Army," p. 523.) He was an original member of the Massachusetts Society of the Cincinnati. During The Shays Rebellion he commanded a company of Massachusetts militia guarding the arsenal at Springfield, Mass., at the same time that his brother Capt. Francis Stone was in Shays' forces.

He married in 1776, Susanna Matthews, born in Brookfield, 29 July 1756, daughter of Daniel and Huldah (Putnam) Matthews, and niece of Gen. Rufus Putnam. She appears as head of a family at Belpre, O., in the Census of 1810; but the date of her decesse

has not been ascertained.

Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Rutland, Mass., 10 Aug. 1752, succeeded to his father's homestead and passed his life in farming in his native town. His name appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Rutland, Mass., comprising two males over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years, and four females. He died there 23 Sept. 1846.

Jonas Stone of Worcester County, Mass., aged eighty-one years, was placed on the pension roll 29 Jan. 1833 for service in the Massachusetts militia during the Revolution. (Massachusetts Pension Roll, p. 328.) He also appears in the Census of Pensioners in 1840 as "Jonas Stone of Rutland, Worcester County, Mass., aged eighty-five years" [should be eighty-eight years]. He is said to have served four enlistments in the Revolution, but no records of them are found on the Massachusetts Archives.

Administration on the estate of Jonas Stone of Rutland was granted 19 Dec. 1846 to his son Sewall Stone, although the latter's sisters Sally Stone and Polly Wheeler had objected to his appointment. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56684.)

109. JONATHAN<sup>6</sup> STONE (Levi<sup>5</sup> (48), Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, Nathanie<sup>3</sup>, Elder John<sup>2</sup>, Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Sutton, Mass., 27 Apr. 1750, was a farmer in his native town where he appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and three females. About 1798 he removed to Somerset, Vt., where he afterwards resided and died.

Jonathan Stone was a soldier in the Revolution, first serving in Capt. James Greenwood's company of Sutton militia which marched to Roxbury, Mass., on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775. On 1 May 1775 he enlisted [for eight months] in Capt. Isaac Bolster's company, Col. Ebenezer Learned's regiment, and served in the siege of Boston, his name appearing on rolls dated at Roxbury 1 Aug. 1775 and 7 Oct. 1775. He also served twenty-one days in Capt. Gregory<sup>1</sup>), was born in Sutton, Mass., 31 May 1757, and lived there until after the close of the Revolution. On 2 May 1785, Clark Stone of Sutton for £18 sold to Ezra Putnam of same, land in Westminster. (Worcester County Deeds, vol. 96, p. 518.) He is next found in the wilds of Vermont, when he appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Stratton, Vt., consisting of two males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and one female. A few years later he returned to more fertile regions in Massachusetts, settling in Wendell, Mass., of which town he was representative in the Massachusetts Legislature in 1811. The time and place of his decease have not been learned.

Gregory, was born in Shrewsbury, Mass., 6 Mar. 1747/8, graduated at Harvard College, A.B. 1770, studied theology, and on 30 Oct. 1771 was ordained and settled as the second pastor of the First Congregational Church of Douglas, Mass. During his pastorate he had many trying difficulties in securing his salary from the town, due largely to the organization of Baptist and Quaker societies whose members after 1771 were exempt from ministerial rates for the support of the Congregational church. In spite of these difficulties, Mr. Stone served in his ministry with earnestness and fidelity and was regarded with affection and esteem by most of his parishioners. In the United States Census of 1790, he is enrolled as head of a family in Douglas, Mass., of two males over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and four females. After thirty-four years' service, further difficulties arose in the parish, finally resulting on 28 Oct. 1805 in Mr. Stone's resignation and dismissal. He continued to live in Douglas until 1817, when he finally went to reside with his son Dea. Luke Rice' Stone in Oxford, Mass., where he died 25 Feb. 1837, aged almost eighty-nine years.

Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Shrewsbury, Mass., 10 Sept. 1759, was a thrifty and prosperous farmer and always resided in Shrewsbury, at first on his father's homestead, and later on the estate originally granted to his wife's grandfather Rev. Job Cushing. He held the offices of assessor in 1815 and town treasurer in 1817, 1818, and 1819. He was a soldier in the Revolution, serving as private in Capt. Asa Rice's company, Col. Job Cushing's regiment which marched on the Bennington alarm 27 July 1777; discharged at Bennington, Vt., 29 Aug. 1777; service one month and nine days, including six days (130 miles) travel home; roll dated at Shrewsbury. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 111.) His death took place at Shrewsbury, 1 June 1820.

Administration on the estate of Josiah Stone of Shrewsbury was granted 22 June 1820 to Nathan Howe, Esq., of same, and to the widow Bridget Stone, the deceased leaving one daughter, and two sons under age. Here he resided the rest of his life, practicing his profession in Newfane and the surrounding towns, conducting a farm, and holding the offices of justice of the peace and town clerk for forty years. He died in Newfane, 19 Mar. 1839, in his seventy-eighth year.

At birth he was named Alpheus Stone and so recorded; but his name was changed to Alpheus Fletcher Stone on 27 Feb. 1807, by act of the Massachusetts Legislature, on his petition. opened an office in Greenfield and commenced practice by himself, and he continued actively in his profession for fifty years, becoming one of the most successful practitioners in Franklin County, especially in obstetrics. During his later years his consulting practice was also very extensive. In 1813 he was elected a member of the American Esculapian Society of New York, in 1814 became a fellow of the Massachusetts Medical Association, was a founder and the first president of the Franklin District Medical Society in 1851, and in 1825 received the honorary degree of M.D., from Williams College. In 1804 he was commissioned a surgeon's mate, and in 1812 a surgeon in the state militia. He was thorough and systematic in his work, of attractive personality and polished manners, and very popular among all classes of the community. He died in Greenfield 5 Sept. 1851, aged seventy-three years.

Gregory<sup>1</sup>), born in Western (now Warren), Mass., 14 Dec. 1766, when a four-year-old child was taken by his parents in their removal in 1771 to the then wild and unincorporated township called Monadnock, No. 5, which in 1776 became the town of Marlborough, N. H. Here he resided for the rest of his life, being deeded by his father a portion of the paternal homestead, on which he settled. He was evidently a popular presiding officer, as he was chosen moderator for thirteen of the annual town meetings in Marlborough between 1801 and 1821; he also was constable (or tax collector) for several years, and was chosen a member of the first School Committee in 1809.

Capt. Shubael<sup>6</sup> Stone was a youthful soldier in the Revolution, enlisting for the town of Danvers, Mass., on 1 June 1782, as private in Col. Benjamin Tupper's 10th regiment of the Continental Army, for a term of three years; served seven months. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 121.) Shubael Stone of Cheshire County, N. H., aged sixty-three years [sic, error for fifty-three years], was placed on the United States Pension Rolls 1 Nov. 1819 for service in the Massachusetts. Continental Line. (New Hampshire Pension Roll, p. 85.) About 1800 he became captain of the Marlborough militia company. During the War of 1812, a home-guard company of the older men of Marlborough was organized, of which Shubael Stone was chosen ensign. He died in Marlborough, 21 June 1823, aged fifty-six years.

142. GREGORY STONE (Gregory (61), Gregory, Daniel, David, Dea. Gregory, was born in Lincoln, Mass., 5 Feb. 1754, in the old family mansion built just a century earlier by his great-great-grandfather David' Stone. By the will of his father Gregory Stone, he succeeded in 1782 to this old homestead, on which he passed his days in the toilsome life of a New England farmer. But, like the rest of the descendants of Dea. Gregory Stone, he was no craven and soul-numbed peasant, but a sturdy and spirited yeoman of independent and unneutral thought, firm convictions, and sterling qualities of mind, characteristics transmitted to all his descendants. He had just become of age when the alarm of 19 Apr. 1775 summoned the fighting yeomen of Middlesex to Lexington and Concord; and he was at the historic bridge when the first shots of the Revolutionary War were fired, serving in Capt. William Smith's company of minutemen, Col. Abijah Pierce's regiment, taking part in the pursuit of the British troops back to Boston, and continuing in the service one month and two days. He next enlisted in January 1776 for two months' service in Capt. Asahel Wheeler's company, Col. John Robinson's regiment; and this was followed by an enlistment on 4 Mar. 1776, for five days' service, in Capt. John Hartwell's company, Col. Eleazer Brooks' regiment, engaged in fortifying Dorchester Heights, a procedure which forced the British army to evacuate Boston on 17 March 1776, and sail to Halifax. He again enlisted in July 1776 and served five months in Capt. Charles Miles' company, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, which marched to Ticonderoga, N. Y. In Sept. 1777 he served in a company under Capt. Miles which marched from Concord to convey stores to Boston. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors

in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 95, and vol. 10, p. 732;

also pension papers of Lucy, widow of Gregory Stone.)

Gregory Stone appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Lincoln, Mass., of three males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and three females. He was a selectman of Lincoln in 1793; and he died there 12 Apr. 1807.

Administration on the estate of Gregory Stone of Lincoln granted to John Hartwell of same 16 Apr. 1807, at the request of Lucy Stone the widow. Inventory taken 3 June 1807 showed real estate valued at \$4181.00, including thirty-three acres of pasture land in New Ipswich, N. H.; personal estate totalled \$829.48. A partial distribution dated 14 June 1810 mentions as heirs the widow Lucy, and children Lucy Hall, Gregory, Lydia, Abigail, Mary, Elizabeth, and Daniel Stone.

He married at Lincoln, 21 Feb. 1788, LUCY JONES, born in Shrewsbury, Mass., 23 Oct. 1764, daughter of Jonas and Abigail (Hartwell) Jones. On 29 June 1841, she applied for and was granted a pension by the United States Government for her husband's services in the Revolution. She died in Lincoln 23 June 1851, in her eighty-seventh year, and was buried there beside her husband.

143. REV. DANIEL STONE (Gregory 61), Gregory, Daniel, David, Dea. Gregory), was born 5 June 1767, in the ancient family mansion in Lincoln, Mass., built about 1658 by his ancestor David Stone. His father was a prosperous yeoman who died in 1782; and from his share of the paternal estate and his own exer-

tions, Daniel Stone was enabled to secure a liberal education, graduating from Harvard College in 1791 and then pursuing the study of theology. In 1794 he settled in Augusta, Me., and on 9 Nov. of that year he commenced preaching for the South Parish. This resulted in his settlement as pastor of this church on 21 Oct. 1795, and he continued in this office nearly fifteen years. During the latter half of his ministry, difficulties then common in churches throughout New England arose in his parish, which resulted in a division of the South Parish and finally in its dissolution and the dismissal of Mr. Stone by mutual consent, on 13 June 1809. At the time of this dismissal, a committee was chosen "to express the sincere regard the parish entertain for the Rev. Daniel Stone, the unshaken confidence they have in his integrity and his moral and Christian virtues, and to inform him they will ever cherish a cordial and affectionate wish that his future days may be useful and happy."

After thus retiring from the ministry, Mr. Stone devoted himself to the cultivation of his farm. He was a selectman of Augusta 1818-1820, several years assistant postmaster and county treasurer, and long a local trial justice and justice of the

peace. He died in Augusta 11 May 1834.

Jonas' Stone, settled about 1751 upon the ancestral homestead originally established in Lexington by Dea. Samuel' Stone. Upon the death of Dea. Jonas' Stone in 1790, Jonas' Stone succeeded to this old family estate. In the United States Census of 1790, Jonas Stone jun. is listed as head of a family in Lexington, Mass., comprising two males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and

four females. At the outbreak of the Revolution he was a member of Capt. John Parker's Lexington company which fired the first shots for American independence in the historic battle on Lexington Common, 19 Apr. 1775. (History of Lexington, vol. 1, pp. 422-3.) Jonas Stone was a man of retiring disposition. held no public offices, and died in Lexington 24 Apr. 1814.

Administration on the estate of Jonas Stone of Lexington was given 81 May 1814 to his son Samuel Stone, the widow Sarah Stone renouncing; heirs, said widow and son and daughter Elizabeth Fiske. Inventory of personal estate totalled \$846.74; real estate \$3400. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21645.)

John Crawford's company of Oakham minutemen which marched to Cambridge on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775. On 27 Apr. 1775 he enlisted for eight months in Capt. Simeon Hazeltine's company, Col. John Fellows' regiment, which was stationed at Roxbury during the siege of Boston. On 11 Mar. 1777, he enlisted for three years as sergeant in Capt. John Spurr's company, Col. Thomas Nixon's regiment; served in the northern army under Gen. Gates and was in the battles of Danbury, Conn., and Stillwater and Saratoga, N. Y.; discharged 11 Mar. 1780. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 96; and "Soldiers of Oakham," p. 143.)

On 30 May 1818, Isaac Stone of Worcester County, Mass., aged seventy-eight [sic] years, was placed on the United States pension roll for services as sergeant in the Massachusetts line. (Massa-

("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 83.) In his application for pension 22 Apr. 1818, he stated that most of his service was in New York State, was in the battles at Danbury and Kingsbury, and served throughout the campaign which resulted in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's army. ("Soldiers of Oakham," pp. 141-142.) On 30 May 1818, Alpheus Stone of Worcester County, Mass., aged seventy-seven years [sic, should be sixty-one years] was placed on the United States pension roll for service as private in the Massachusetts line. (Massachusetts Pension Roll, p. 305.)

Soon after retiring from the army, he married and settled on the farm in Oakham in recent years owned by Wallace Grimes; and he is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as "Adolphius Stone," as head of a family in Oakham, Mass., of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and seven females. He was town clerk in 1788 and selectman in 1789, 1790, and 1799. On 10 Nov. 1832, Jonas Stone of Worcester County, Mass., aged seventy-six years, was placed on the United States pension roll for service as private in the Massachusetts militia. (Massachusetts Pension Roll, p. 327.) Jonas Stone of Shrewsbury, Mass., aged eighty-two years, also appears as a pensioner in 1840. (Census of Pensioners in 1840, p. 36.)

After his marriage in 1781, Jonas Stone settled in Leicester, Mass., where he is listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years, and four females. On 13 Apr. 1790 he was commissioned by Gov. John Hancock a second lieutenant of a cavalry company in the Massachusetts militia. He resided in Leicester over twenty years, keeping a tavern and also serving some years as steward of Leicester Academy. He then removed to Boston where he kept the Lion Tavern, on the site of the present Bijou Theatre, from 1807 to 1816; and from 1816 to 1821 he was proprietor of a tavern on School Street, on the site of the present Parker House. In 1821, at the age of sixty-three, he retired from the tavern business and returned to Shrewsbury. Mass., where he purchased a farm on which he passed the remaining thirty years of his life, dying there 14 May 1851, at the advanced age of ninety-three years. He was the ancestor of a notable branch of the Stone family which has been unusually successful in professional and commercial life, and socially prominent in Boston, New York and Philadelphia.

He married first, at Shrewsbury, 4 July 1781, Lucy Cushing, born there 5 Jan. 1755, daughter of Col. Job and Lucy<sup>5</sup> (Stone<sup>5</sup>) Cushing, and granddaughter of Rev. Job and Mary (Prentice) Cushing; she died in Leicester, 6 Mar. 1782, leaving no children.

He married secondly, at Shrewsbury, 1 June 1784, LUCRETIA BALDWIN, born there 12 Nov. 1756, daughter of Henry and Abigail (Butler) Baldwin. In her girlhood she was noted for her beauty, and she lived in wedlock with her husband nearly sixty-three years, dying at Shrewsbury 21 Feb. 1847, aged ninety years.

158. SYLVANUS' STONE (Lieut. Joseph' (67), Joseph', Dea. Samuel, Dea. Samuel, Dea. Gregory'), born in Brookfield, Mass., 11 Jan. 1761, in youth was probably indentured to some resident of Worthington, Mass., as he was living there early in the Revolution. On 10 July 1777, he enlisted as private in the company of Capt. Ebenezer Webber of Worthington, Maj. Jonathan Clapp's regiment, and served in Gen. Schuyler's forces against Gen. Burgoyne's army until 12 Aug. 1777. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 123.) A few years later he settled in the adjoining town of Goshen, Mass., where he resided about thirty years and was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years, and two females. About 1812 he removed from Goshen to Williamstown, Mass., where he kept a hotel for many years; and he died there 27 Feb. 1852, aged ninety-one years.

159. LIEUT. WILLIAM HOLLOWAY STONE (Col. James) (68), Joseph, Dea. Samuel, Dea. Samuel, Dea. Gregory, born in Western (now Warren), Mass., 17 Apr. 1754, was the earliest born descendant of Dea. Gregory1 Stone to bear a double name, although he usually appears on records simply as "William Stone." In 1775 his father bought a large tract of land in Murrayfield (since 1783, Chester), Mass., on which William Stone soon settled, and later it was deeded to him by his father. William Stone served as private in Capt. James Black's (Chester) company, Col. David Moseley's regiment, from 12 June to 17 June 1782, on an alarm at Northampton. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 127.) Later he became lieutenant of militia, and as "Lieut. William Stone" he is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Chester, Mass., of one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and five females. In Aug. 1782 he was a member of the Murrayfield church committee and in 1783 was chosen sealer of weights and measures. On a rate at Murrayfield made 15 Nov. 1782, he was assessed for one poll, £1-9-0 on real estate, and £1-5-4 on personal property. He died in Chester 23 Apr. 1824, aged seventy years, "by a fall which broke his thigh bone," according to the death records of Chester. His gravestone in Chester terms him William H. Stone. On 13 July 1824, administration on his estate was given to his widow Roxanna Stone of Chester. (Hampshire County Probate Records.)

Gregory), born in Western (now Warren), Mass., 25 Oct. 1756, was a soldier in the Revolution, enlisting (probably for eight months) on 22 May 1775, in Capt. John Grainger's company, Col. Ebenezer Learned's regiment, and appearing on rolls dated 1 Aug. and 7 Oct. 1775. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 98.) On 8 Jan. 1834, James Stone of Worcester County, Mass., aged seventy-seven years, was placed on the United States pension roll for service as private in the Massachusetts militia. (Massachusetts Pension Roll, p. 329.) James Stone of Phillipston, Mass., aged eighty-three years, also appears on the census rolls in 1840. (Census of Pensioners in 1840, p. 38.)

James Stone was a tanner by trade, and after the Revolution he settled in Greenwich, Mass., where he appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years, and two females. After a residence in Greenwich of some thirty years, he removed to Phillipston, Mass., where he afterwards lived until his death 1 (or 14) Nov. 1844, aged eighty-eight years. His death record states he was born in Warren. On 13 Jan. 1845, Pliny P. Gould and Hannah Bronsdon, both of Phillipston, deposed that James Stone, a pensioner of the United States, died there on 14 Nov. 1844, leaving no widow and two children, James Stone and Nabby Baldwin. (Worcester County Probate Records, No. 56651½.)

161. MAJ. ELI STONE (Col. James (68), Joseph, Dea. Samuel, Dea. Samuel, Dea. Gregory), born in Western (now Warren), Mass., 29 Oct. 1760, was a soldier in the Revolution, first enlisting for six months on 1 July 1777, in Capt. Ebenezer Newell's company, Col. Danforth Keyes' regiment, in service in Rhode Island; probably discharged 4 Jan. 1778. He also enlisted for three months on 5 July 1780 in Capt. Timothy Paige's company, Col. John Rand's regiment, and served at West Point, N. Y., until discharged 10 Oct. 1780; 180 miles travel home allowed for; roll sworn to in Worcester County. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 92.) After the Revolution he settled in Stillwater, N. Y., where he was long a tavern keeper, and he was enrolled there in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years, and two females. He was successively commissioned adjutant in 1793, captain in 1794, and major in 1805, in the cavalry militia of Saratoga County, N. Y. (New York Council of Appointment, pp. 233, 296, and 788.) The time and place of his decease have not been learned, nor has the name of his wife been discovered.

No positively authentic record of the family of Eli<sup>5</sup> Stone has been obtained, and the only now (1916) living descendants who have been located are derived from two sons, James<sup>7</sup> and Warren<sup>7</sup> Stone. But the latter's descendants claim that he had at least eight brothers, most of whom lived in Albany, N. Y., and at least one in Batavia, N. Y. 165. JOHN's STONE (Jonathan's (69), Jonathan's, Dea. Samuel's, Dea. Gregory's), born in Watertown, Mass., 7 Mar. 1755, was a cooper by trade, but was engaged in farming during most of his life. When a young man he lived several years in Menotomy or West Cambridge (now Arlington), Mass.; but in 1782 he settled in that part of Charlestown which in 1842 was set off as Somerville. Here he acquired a large farm on the south side of Prospect Hill, bounded by the present Boston, Washington, and Bow Streets, and Vinal and Summit Avenues. Some of this land is still (1916) owned and occupied by his descendants. On 27 Aug. 1780 he joined the Menotomy Church; but after he settled on Prospect Hill in Somerville, he was connected with the First Church in Cambridge, where all his children (except the eldest) were baptized.

John Stone was a soldier in the Revolution, enlisting 6 July 1778 in Capt. Benjamin Edgell's company, Col. John Jacob's regiment, and serving until 1 Jan. 1779; sixty miles travel home included in service of five months and twenty-seven days; also appears on rolls of same company dated at Freetown 13 Sept. and 18 Oct. 1778. ("Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the War of the Revolution," vol. 15, p. 100.) He is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Charlestown, Mass., of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years, and five females. He died in Charlestown (now Somerville), 29 May 1819. An unusually complete record of his descendants has been secured through the interest and assistance of Mr. John S. Edmands of Somerville, whose wife is a great-granddaughter of John<sup>6</sup> Stone.

Administration on the estate of John Stone of Charlestown was given on 30 Aug. 1819 to Peter Tufts of Cambridge, at request of the heirs. Inventory of real estate in Charlestown, Lexington, Malden, Medford, and Heath, totalled \$6390; personal estate totalled \$1194.37; debts totalled \$4489.57, to pay which a part of the land was sold to son Nathaniel T. Stone for \$3220. The final division of estate on 12 Aug. 1823, names as heirs; Mary, wife of Philip Bonner; heirs of Nathaniel T. Stone; Lydia. wife of Robert Vinal; Hannah, wife of David Sanborn; Martha, wife of Robert Sanborn; Thomas Jefferson Stone; Daniel Stone; children of Elizabeth Grover, deceased; children of Lucy Bolles, deceased; John C. Stone. (Middlesex County Probate Records, No. 21639.)

Gregory, born in Framingham, Mass., 22 Feb. 1762, succeeded to the ancestral homestead in Saxonville and to the mills at the falls of the Sudbury River which were originally established by his great-great-greatgrandfather Elder John's Stone. He was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Framingham, comprising one male over sixteen years, and three males under sixteen years, and three females. In 1822 he sold to a syndicate the land and his interest in the mill rights around the falls which had been owned by the Stone family over one hundred and sixtyfive years and operated by them as grist, saw, and fulling mills; the syndicate also bought adjoining property of other parties and soon established large woolen factories which later under the able management of Michael H. Simpson and Nathaniel Francis were developed to enormous extent as the Saxonville Mills.

Here he built in 1815 a large colonial tavern which for a century has been maintained as a public house. From 1815 to 1820 and 1830 to 1833 he lived in and conducted the tavern himself, leasing it from 1820 to 1830. In 1833 he sold this property and settled on the place in later years occupied by his son-in-law Samuel Firth. 195. URIAH'STONE (Uriah' (82), Uriah', John', Dea. Daniel', Elder John' Dea. Gregory'), born in the "North County Gore" (now Oxford), Mass., 14 June 1794, when a young man settled in Worcester, Mass., locating in the old colonial house on Main Street, near Webster Sq., now occupied by his granddaughter Mrs. Ives. He was a farmer, and early acquired considerable land in Worcester which eventually greatly increased in value with the rapid growth of the town into an important city. He died at his homestead in Worcester, 11 Feb. 1880, in his eighty-fifth year.

Administration on the estate of Uriah Stone of Worcester was granted 16 Mar. 1880 to Lucian B. Stone. The latter managed the property for thirty years until his death in 1910, when a first and final account showed receipts of \$64,438.99, and payments of over \$24,000 in taxes and over \$38,000 to the heirs, W. U. Stone, George E. Stone, Erasmus H. Stone, Lucian B. Stone and Luvanne L. Bottomly. (Worcester County Probate Records No. 56963.)

He then took up medical studies under Dr. John B. Kittredge of Framingham, completing them at the Harvard Medical School where he received the degree of M.D. in 1824. Soon afterwards he settled in Walpole, Mass., where he practiced his profession over forty years, until within a short time of his decease, 13 Aug. 1869, in his seventy-second year.

Dr. Stone was a skilful, successful, and popular family physician,



and obtained an extensive practice in Walpole and the surrounding towns; and his high character, abilities, geniality, and sympathetic disposition secured for him the confidence, esteem, and affection of a large circle of patients. While assiduously and faithfully devoted to the duties of his profession, he was also much interested in education, labored for the improvement of the schools, and was one of the earliest open advocates of temperance during the first agitation on this subject in Massachusetts about 1830. He was a man of calm judgment, firm convictions, and scholarly tastes. In politics he was long a conservative adherent of the Whig party, and in religion was a consistent member of the Unitarian church and a constant attendant at its public worship. For some years he was a councillor of the Massachusetts Medical Society and president of the Norfolk District Medical Society.

Louisa (Clap) Trumbull resided here seventy years; and passing from the family after her death, the house was saved from destruction by her daughter, Susan Trumbull, who bought, moved, and rebuilt it in 1900, and deeded it to her niece, Mrs. Edwin Melville Roberts, its present owner. Fifteen births, nine marriages, and seven deaths of descendants of the Stone family have occurred in this house.

244. GEN. CHARLES POMEROY' STONE (Alpheus Fletcher's, M.D. (120), Capt. John's, Dea. John's, Nathaniel's, Elder John's, Dea. Gregory'), born in Greenfield, Mass., 30 Sept. 1824, graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1845, was commissioned a second lieutenant, and served with distinction in the Mexican War. He took part in the siege of Vera Cruz, was brevetted first lieutenant 8 Sept. 1847, for gallantry at the battle of Molino del Rey, and captain 13 Sept. 1847 for bravery at the battle of Chapultepec; and he also served in the assault and capture of the City of Mexico. He continued in the army until 17 Nov. 1856, when he resigned, and for the next four years was chief of an exploring expedition in the State of Sonora. Mexico.

On 1 Jan. 1861, he was appointed colonel of the militia of the District of Columbia, and soon after the outbreak of the Civil

War was appointed, on 14 May 1861, colonel of the United States 14th Infantry and three days later brigadier-general of United States Volunteers, in command of the defences of Washington. On 20 Oct. 1861, he was in command of a Union force at Ball's Bluff on the Potomac River, and during the night sent a part of his troops across the river, who were attacked at daybreak the next morning by a greatly superior force and defeated with great loss. This disaster caused a furore, but Gen. Stone continued in his command until 9 Feb. 1862, when he was suddenly arrested and kept in a military prison until 16 Aug. 1862, when he was released without any charges having been brought against him; so evidently his arrest was unjust, and was ordered for the purpose of making him the scapegoat of the Ball's Bluff reverse, the actual responsibility for which has never been established. On 3 May 1863, he was restored to duty and served for a year under Gen. Banks in the Department of the Gulf, taking part in the Port Hudson and Red River campaigns. On 14 Apr. 1864, he was honorably mustered out of service as brigadier-general of volunteers, and on 13 Sept. 1864, he resigned as colonel of the United States 14th Infantry.

For five years after the close of the Civil War, Gen. Stone was engaged in mining in Virginia, and then in 1870 went to Egypt, where the Khedive soon appointed him chief of staff of the Egyptian army which was reorganized under his direction; and for this service he received several decorations. In 1883 he resigned this post and returned to the United States, where he was engaged in important engineering operations until his death in New York

City, 24 Jan. 1887.

He resumed work in Boston and settled in Chelsea, Mass., where he continued to reside the remainder of his life. Soon after his return east, the Civil War broke out, and although he was beyond the military age of forty-five, he enlisted as corporal 16 Sept. 1862, in Co. 

281. DANIEL' STONE (Gregory's (142), Gregory's, Gregory's, Daniel, David, Dea. Gregory, was born 3 May 1805, in Lincoln, Mass., in the old ancestral farmhouse which had been built over one hundred and fifty years previously by his ancestor David? Stone, and which was owned and occupied over two centuries by six successive generations of the Stone name, and is still (1917) standing in excellent preservation. He received a good education in the public schools of his native town and at Lexington Academy, in early manhood was employed for about a year as a private teacher in South Carolina, and for about five years taught school in Waltham, Lincoln and Concord, Mass., and Augusta, Me. About 1831 he settled in Plymouth, Me., where he long engaged in business as a general merchant, and became prominent in the business, political, fraternal and social life of the town. For forty years he was postmaster of Plymouth, for over thirty years town clerk and a justice of the peace, and for several years a member of the school committee. He was a charter member of the Plymouth Lodge of Masons and its first master, was twice master of Pacific Lodge of Newport, Me., and high priest of Newport Chapter.

Mr. Stone was a public-spirited man of sterling integrity and kind and sympathetic disposition, and was highly esteemed and sincerely beloved by a large circle of friends and acquaintances in Plymouth and the neighboring towns. In his religious views he was broad and liberal, much in advance of his time, and he displayed throughout his life all of the best qualities of a true Christian and an honorable man. He died at his home in Plymouth,

Me., 28 May 1872.

307. HENRY BALDWIN' STONE (Lieut. Jonas' (157), Lieut. Joseph', Joseph', Dea. Samuel', Dea. Samuel', Dea. Gregory'), born in Leicester, Mass., 10 Apr. 1786, lived there during his childhood and youth, but about 1805 went to Boston, whither his

parents removed with their family. While a young man he became a bank clerk, and on the foundation in 1818 of the Suffolk Bank in Boston, he became its first teller, and a few years later secured a better position as cashier of the Eagle Bank. His great sbilities were soon recognized, and in 1825 he was chosen president of the Suffolk Bank and he continued to hold this position nearly a quarter of a century until his death, in Boston, on 14 June 1849.

When Mr. Stone became president of the Suffolk Bank in 1825, the banking system of Massachusetts, and in fact of the whole country, was in a chaotic condition, due for one thing to a lack of a clearing-house system among the various banks. This troublesome condition of affairs was relieved by the establishment by Mr. Stone of the famous "Suffolk Bank System" for the redemption of the bank-notes issued by banks outside of Boston. This system was inaugurated by forming a syndicate of all the banks in Boston, for all of which the Suffolk Bank acted as a clearing house in settling accounts with country banks. The Suffolk Bank maintained this system for over thirty years until the establishment of the Boston Clearing House in 1856 and the Bank of Mutual Redemption in 1858. At the time of the great financial panic of 1837, every one of the thirty-four banks in Boston were obliged to temporarily suspend specie payments, and about half of them failed; but the Suffolk Bank successfully weathered that storm and later financial panics, and continued in existence until about 1903, when it was absorbed by the Second National Bank of Boston.

Mr. Stone married in Boston, 15 Nov. 1821, ELIZABETH CLAPP, born in Turin, N. Y., 30 Aug. 1803, daughter of Ezra and Grace (Mather) Clapp; she died in Nahant, Mass., 21 Aug. 1894, aged almost ninety-one years.

In youth he was articled as a clerk to Amos Lawrence, the famous Boston merchant, financier and philanthropist, and soon became the latter's confidential secretary and cashier. In those days bank transfers were made in specie, and Mr. Stone often traveled alone by carriage and sleigh from Boston to other New England cities carrying large sums of cash, sometimes as much as \$50,000. About 1823 he joined with Lorenzo Draper in establishing, in Boston, the importing firm of Draper and Stone, which continued a few years, during the course of which he visited Europe in 1825. The next year he became a partner of William and Samuel Lawrence (brothers of Amos and Abbott Lawrence) in the firm of W. and S. Lawrence and Stone, importing merchants, and was also interested in establishing the Middlesex Company, the first woolen goods factory in Lowell. In 1842 William Lawrence retired from the firm which was continued by the other two partners as Lawrence, Stone and Co. In 1849 Mr. Stone again visited Europe, traveling extensively there with his wife and two of his daughters, and soon after returning to America he settled in New York City to establish there the firm of Lawrence, Stone and Co. In the panic of 1857 this company was forced to suspend; but Mr. Stone soon started the new firm of Stone, Bliss, Fay, and Allen, which was eminently successful. He continued at the head of this company until 1870, and then retiring from business he settled in Morristown, N. J., where he resided until his death, 13 Oct. 1885, in his eighty-seventh year.

Mr. Stone was a strong pillar of the Congregational Trinitarian church, and an influential member of the American and Foreign Christian Union and of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. He was also a trustee of the Massachusetts General Hospital and a governor of the McLean Insane Asylum. He strongly supported the work of Audubon, was a liberal patron of art and music, and was active in establishing

Central Park and the Mercantile Library in New York.

Mr. Stone was a merchant of keen judgment, great energy, and the highest integrity; was of benevolent and public-spirited disposition, and displayed a charming personality and courtly manner. The late Rev. Dr. Alexander McKenzie of Cambridge, stated of him, "He belonged in the Boston of the better days, and helped to make the city strong and honorable."

to Candor, where he carried on another tannery for three years until his house was burned. About 1833 he settled in Factory-ville (now Waverly) in Barton Township, Tioga County, N. Y., and in company with his brother-in-law, Isaac Rounds, bought a tannery built there by Jeremy Adams in 1825, which they successfully conducted. In 1842 new and larger buildings were erected which were burned in 1860; but the plant was at once rebuilt and Mr. Stone remained in the business until his death in 1866. His two sons continued the business about five years longer and then sold it to John A. Perkins.

Mr. Stone was enterprising and energetic in business, was an earnest worker in the Methodist church, and was a man of strong character and convictions. He became an ardent abolitionist, and his house was one of the stations of the "underground railroad" for assisting runaway slaves from the South to escape to Canada. His anti-slavery activities once caused his house to be raided by a mob from Athens, Ps., who intended to lynch an abolitionist speaker whom Mr. Stone was entertaining; and only the quick wit of Mr. Stone and his wife, who disguised the speaker as a female nurse of their baby, saved the man's life. Mr. Stone died in Factoryville (now Waverly), N. Y., 13 Aug. 1866.

Gregory), born in Boston, Mass., 28 June 1818, was educated at Phillips Andover Academy, and about the time of his marriage settled in Cambridge, Mass., where he resided most of the remainder of his life. After he became of age, he received considerable property from his father's estate, and as a young man was engaged for several years in the coal business in Cambridge. Like his older brothers, he was active in the anti-slavery agitation before the Civil War, and was a leader in the organizations of the Free Soil party in 1848 and the Republican party in 1856. During this period he formed an intimate friendship with Lincoln, Wilson, and Sumner, the latter of whom was one of the pall bearers at Dr. Stone's funeral. Although unambitious for political offices for himself, he was a member of the Massachusetts Legislature in 1855 and an internal revenue collector for Massachusetts during the Civil War. He was remarkably expert in stenography, a system then but little used, which he pursued as a pastime, but occasionally professionally; in one very important legal case he was retained by both sides at a fee of \$40 per hour. He died in Dorchester, Mass., 21 Aug. 1863.

Gregory1), born in Walpole, Mass., 10 Aug. 1838, graduated from the Harvard Medical School in 1860. Soon after the outbreak of the Civil War, he offered his services to the Union, and on 16 Sept. 1861 was commissioned assistant surgeon, with rank of first lieutenant, of the 23d Massachusetts Volunteer Regiment. He served in Gen. Burnside's successful expedition against North Carolina, and was present at the battles of Roanoke Island and Newbern. Here he contracted fever, was invalided home, and on 2 Sept. 1862 was honorably discharged for physical disabilities contracted in the service, from which he never entirely recovered.

For the next two years he held the posts of port physician of Boston and physician of the City Institution on Deer Island; and he then settled in his native town of Walpole in association with his father, Dr. Ebenezer' Stone; and on the latter's death in 1869 he succeeded to his father's practice in Walpole and vicinity which he successfully continued nearly a score of years until his own death, 29 Jan. 1887. Thus the continuous medical practice in Walpole of Drs. Ebenezer<sup>7</sup> and Silas E.<sup>8</sup> Stone extended over a

period of sixty years.

Dr. Stone was a man of superior judgment and intelligence, polished and genial manner, and cultured refinement; and was held in esteem by the community in which he lived. After the war his health was precarious, and for his relief he at times traveled extensively both in Europe and America. His strong sense of duty



and public spirit were shown in his decided stand in behalf of the employees of the large hair factory in Walpole, which compelled the owners to adopt disinfection of their materials to prevent charbon or anthrax, a distressing and then obscure disease on which his monograph was considered an authority at the time.

Mr. Stone is a member of the Somerset Club of Boston, the Oakley Country Club, the New England Kennel Club, and the Cambridge Boat Club; he is also a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, Cambridge Historical Society, Bostonian Society, Society of Colonial Wars, Sons of the Revolution, and the Bibliophile Society of Boston. He has traveled extensively in North and South America and has several times

From his early years, Mr. Stone has been enthusiastically interested in the genealogy of the Stone family and in the history of his ancestors. As early as 1880 he commissioned the late Col. Joseph L. Chester of London to endeavor to trace the English origin and ancestry of Dea. Gregory1 Stone; but Col. Chester died in 1882 before accomplishing anything on the matter. In 1883 the late Henry F. Waters was sent to England by the New England Historic Genealogical Society to make general research there for the ancestries of the founders of New England; and he was also retained by Mr. Stone to attempt to locate and trace the ancestry of Dea. Gregory Stone. During the year 1892, while Mr. Stone was on one of his trips to Europe, he secured from the parish registers of Nayland, co. Suffolk, the record of the first marriage of Dea. Gregory1 Stone and the baptisms of his children, entries which had been noted several years previously by Col. Horatio G. Somerby. In 1896 Mr. Waters reported to Mr. Stone his finding of the wills of Symond Stone in 1558 and Gregory Stone in 1610, both of Great Bromley, co. Essex; and the consequent examination of the registers of this parish established the ancestry of Dea. Gregory<sup>1</sup> Stone and Dea. Simon<sup>1</sup> Stone, for several generations there. These results of his persistent efforts were communicated by Mr. Stone to the Stone Family Association at its first meeting on 26 Jan. 1897. The Stone family of America is thus deeply indebted to Mr. William E. Stone for his perseverance in securing their English ancestry; in all the activities of the Stone Family Association, of which he is a life member, he has taken a prominent part for twenty years, being its vice-president 1897-1904 and president 1904-1909; and the compilation and publication of this volume are due mainly to his enthusiastic interest, efforts, and liberality.

stitution precluded discussion on the subject of slavery, he soon withdrew, and completed his theological studies under Rev. George Trask of Warren, Mass. On 23 Feb. 1842, he was ordained and settled over the Evangelical Congregational Church in Gardner, Mass., where he continued in service until August 1850, when he resigned on account of ill health, and was dismissed. At the request of his parents, he then retired from the ministry and went to West Brookfield, Mass., to reside upon and take charge of his father's homestead. He continued there the remainder of his life, engaged principally in farming, held several town offices and in 1873 was representative to the Massachusetts Legislature. He died in West Brookfield, 4 Feb. 1890.

His three wives were sisters. He married first, at Hardwick, Mass., 16 Feb. 1842, Phebe Williams Robinson, born there 12 Mar. 1813, daughter of Jonathan and Huldah (Woodward) Robinson; she had four children and died in West Brookfield,

Mass., 12 Nov. 1852.

Charles Pomeroy

Stone the distinction of being the only Stones of America given biographical notices in the "Encyclopædia Britannica." Her childhood and youth were passed on her father's farm in West Brookfield, where she grew up a healthy, strong, and vigorous woman, overflowing with mental and physical activity. While only a girl she commenced to feel resentment at the legal position of woman at that period, when a husband had absolute control over the person, earnings, and property of his wife, and sole authority over their children. Her father encouraged her brothers to secure collegiate educations, but discountenanced her desires in that direction; so when sixteen years of age she formed a resolution to work her own way through college. For nine years she labored with determined energy to this end, assisting her mother in the onerous duties of a farmer's wife, attending the public schools and Mt. Holyoke Seminary, and earning money by school teaching in which she was unusually successful. By 1843 she had accumulated savings sufficient to enable her to enter Oberlin College, Ohio, then the only college in the country admitting women, and she earned her way through the course by teaching in a preparatory school and doing housework in the women's boarding hall of the College. She graduated in 1847, and at once entered on her life work of agitation for woman's rights. Traveling all over the Northern States, she soon attracted wide attention and large audiences; and although in her early career she was often subjected to opposition and abuse, she won over her audiences by her intense, sincere earnestness, personal magnetism, and her natural eloquence delivered in a voice of exceptional musical sweetness and power.

In 1850 her name headed the call for the first annual National Woman's Rights Convention, which was held at Worcester, Mass., and for many years afterward she was a leader in organizing these annual conventions. In 1855 she married Henry B. Blackwell of Cincinnati, Ohio, a successful business man, ardent abolitionist, and enthusiastic advocate of woman's rights. At the time of their marriage, they drew up and signed a manifesto, protesting against the inequality before the law of husband and wife, which was widely published and became an important factor in securing amendments to the laws of many States for the betterment of woman's position. At the same time they agreed, upon eminent legal advice, that she should retain her maiden name, by which she continued to be always known. Throughout the rest of their lives, Lucy Stone and her husband Henry B. Blackwell, labored together indefatigably for the cause of woman's rights, organising and addressing conventions all over the country, preparing memorials to Congress and to State legislatures, and writing innumerable letters to newspapers. In 1870 they founded "The Woman's Journal" in Boston, of which Lucy Stone was editor-in-chief from 1872 until her death in 1893.

Having succeeded in generally establishing State laws securing adequate personal and separate-property rights for married women, Lucy Stone and her husband then vigorously pressed the cause of woman's suffrage; and she campaigned for woman's suffrage amendments to the laws in Kansas (1867), Vermont (1870), Michigan (1874), Colorado (1877), and Nebraska (1892.) With her great natural vitality and indomitable spirit, she was able to continue in the active service of the cause to which her whole life was devoted, until within a few months of her decease at her home in the Dorchester District of Boston, on 18 Oct. 1893, at the age of seventy-five years.

Lucy Stone may be justly considered one of the most remarkable women America has produced. No one did more to secure adequate legal rights in this country for married women, a cause she lived to see generally accomplished. Although her efforts for woman's political suffrage failed of accomplishment in her lifetime, this cause is now rapidly nearing consummation, just a cen-

tury after her birth.

She married at West Brookfield, Mass., 1 May 1855, HENRY Browne Blackwell, born in Bristol, England, 4 May 1825, son of Samuel and Hannah (Lane) Blackwell. He was brought to America in 1882 by his parents who soon settled in Cincinnati, Ohio. He attended Kemper College one year, while a young man became an enterprising hardware merchant in Cincinnati, and was early prominent in the anti-slavery agitation. After his marriage he engaged successfully for about twelve years in sugar refining and real estate in New Jersey, and assisted his wife in the various activities of the woman's rights movement, as previously stated, during this period residing in Orange, West Bloomfield (now Montclair), and Roseville, N. J. After their removal to Boston in 1870, he devoted all his means and attention to the cause of woman's rights and woman's suffrage, in association with his wife, financing and assisting in the editing of "The Woman's Journal," serving for years as secretary of the Massachusetts, New England, and American Woman's Suffrage Associations, and addressing conventions all over the country. He died in Boston, 7 Sept. 1909, aged eighty-four years.





462. GREGORY'S STONE (Daniel (281), Gregory's, Gregory's, Gregory', Daniel's, David', Dea. Gregory'), born in Plymouth, Me., 7 Mar. 1837, attended the public schools of his native town until seventeen years of age, served an apprenticeship of three years at the machinist trade in Bangor. Me., and worked at his trade in Winthrop and Bangor, Me., for about three years. On the outbreak of the Civil War he endeavored twice to enlist, but was disqualified physically. He then went to Boston, and on 1 Aug. 1861 entered the employ of the Campbell-Whittier Company. then the leading New England machinists, and in less than two years became their superintendent, a position he resigned a year later to enlist on 16 July 1864 in Co. H, 6th Massachusetts Volunteer Regiment, serving one hundred days, mostly on garrison and guard duty at Fort Smith, Va., and Fort Delaware, Del. During the remainder of the Civil War he was employed as a machinist on artillery construction at the arsenal at Watertown, Mass.

From 1865 to 1872, Mr. Stone was a quarterman (or division superintendent) at the Kittery, Me., Navy Yard, and for the next ten years superintendent of construction of the Campbell-Whittier Company of Boston, during which period he erected several of the largest power plants in New England. From 1882 to 1893 he was located in Brockton, Mass., installing power plants in place of hand machines for several of the shoe factories in that city. In 1893 he returned to Boston to install and conduct a new power plant for the Beebe Estate on Winthrop Square, a position he held until his death, 17 Feb. 1911, at Winthrop, Mass., where he resided during his final years.

Mr. Stone was recognized as an expert on practical mechanical construction, and his work was always characterized by absolute thoroughness. He was well read in literature and well informed on historical, public, and current events. In politics and religion he was independent and liberal, in the former supporting the policy and candidate he deemed most fitting, and in the latter believing more in a gospel of works than faith. In 1857 he joined Plymouth (Me.) Lodge of Masons, of which he continued a member for fifty-three years until his death. He was a charter member and past master of Brockton Lodge, Ancient Order of United Workmen, and was also a member of the Stone Family Association.

He was prominent in developing in Minnesota the efficiency of the profession, being one of the founders of the St. Paul Preparatory Medical School, later merged into the St. Paul Medical College, of which he was at one time the head. He was for many years editor of the Northwestern Lancet, the pioneer and leading medical journal of Minnesota; and for nearly ten years he served as surgeon-general of the Minnesota National Guard. He was a man of scholarly culture, high character, and tireless energy, was an eloquent public speaker, and enjoyed a wide popularity.

In 1866 he joined the New England Historic Genealogical Society of which he became a life member in 1870.







From 1846 to 1851 he was head draughtsman for the Essex Company of Lawrence, Mass., and designed numerous improvements in tools; from 1851 to 1858 he was engaged in the construction of machines and locomotives in Manchester, N. In 1861 Mr. Stone became a partner in the woolen machine construction firm of Davis and Furber of North Andover, Mass., and he continued a member of this firm for the rest of his life. Mr. Stone was the practical mechanic and inventive genius of this company which became very successful and the largest in the country in their speciality of woolen machinery. During this quarter of a century twenty patents were issued to Mr. Stone for inventions on improvements in machinery, half of which patented inventions became important and valuable and were largely utilized. He also designed a very large number of special machines and tools which were not patented, but were successfully used by his company. He died in North Andover 17 Feb. 1887.



The next year he went with his parents to Boston, Mass., where he attended the public schools until the family removed eleven years later to Brockton, Mass., where he graduated from the Brockton High School in 1889. For the next four years he was engaged on experimental electrical and photometrical work in developing incandescent electric lighting. at that time an industrial infant, and he then spent several months at sea on similar experimental work in the service of the International Mercantile Marine Company. In 1894 he became a commercial traveler in the tea, coffee, and spice trade, and has since continued zealously and successfully in that business nearly a quarter of a century. For several years he covered New England and New York State, and in 1916 secured an important assignment of Pennsylvania territory with headquarters at Scranton, representing the old Boston house of Dwinell-Wright Company, with which he has been connected since June 1905.

For many years Mr. Stone has been enthusiastically interested in his family history, and takes pride in having an ancestral representative in every American war from the time of the "First Encounter" of the Pilgrims with the Indians, 8 Dec. 1620, down through the Civil War of 1861-65. 

593. HENRY BALDWIN STONE (Joshua Clapp<sup>8</sup> (495), Henry Baldwin, Lieut. Jonas, Lieut. Joseph, Joseph, Dea. Samuel3, Dea. Samuel2, Dea. Gregory1), born in New Bedford, Mass.. 4 Sept. 1851, was prepared for college at Phillips Exeter Academy and graduated at Harvard College, A.B. 1873. For the next three years he was employed in a machine shop in Waltham, Mass., and in an ordnance foundry in South Boston, Mass., learning practical mechanics; and the knowledge thus acquired was supplemented by a course in mechanical engineering at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1876-77. In 1878 he started his business career as a foreman in the locomotive shops of the Chicago, Burlington, and Quincy Railroad. He rapidly rose in the service of this company, being promoted from post to post to the position of general manager on 1 May 1885, and finally being chosen second vicepresident on 1 Nov. 1888. He resigned a year later; and after a few months of travel, in 1890 he was elected president of the Chicago Telephone Company and of the Central Union Telephone Company, and later of the Bell Telephone Company of Missouri. On 1 July 1897 he resigned these positions, intending to take up in the following autumn a very important railroad position which offered greater opportunities for his organizing and administrative abilities in development. He immediately left Chicago for his summer estate at Nonquit, Mass., where he died 5 July 1897 from injuries received by an exploding bomb while celebrating the

Fourth of July with his family.

Mr. Stone was a man of remarkable adminstrative talents, indomitable perseverance and energy, and of the highest integrity of character; and his death at the early age of forty-five years was widely deplored. His keen perceptions and sound judgment enabled him to decide on momentous matters with celerity and uniform correctness. He was also a man of fearless courage; and in his bold and masterly handling of railroad labor strikes and riots in 1886 and 1888 he did more than any other man of his time to postpone for thirty years dictation by organized labor. During his administrative career in railroading, he took a prominent part in the work of the American Railway Association in establishing standard time and uniform rules for various details of operation throughout the country.

In 1891 Mr. Stone was elected a director of the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago held in 1895, and rendered invaluable assistance as chairman of the Committee on Grounds and Buildings, by his artistic taste and administrative genius. He was a member of the Chicago Club, the Harvard Club of Chicago, and of

numerous other business and social organizations.


