PREFACE

The senior compiler was led to take up the preparation of this work by an inquiry as to whether the family had been written up; and when he found so many interesting people of the New England stocks, residing in various parts of the Union, and no genealogy to memorialize the past and delight the present and future Hoopers and children of Hooper mothers, he undertook the work. More than twenty-five years' experience in such research and authorship gave him preparation for the undertaking. He had gone but little way, however, when he found the junior compiler in possession of a very full and workmanlike genealogy of the line of one of the pioneers, William, of Reading; and the enterprise was very greatly forwarded by this, as it enabled the searcher to assign the records he had concerning people of that branch. Mr. Thomas Hooper, moreover, generously placed what he had gathered through years of labor and wide correspondence entirely at Mr. Pope's disposal, and it is published as the First Part of the book. The records of English Hoopers given at the opening of Part Three and in the Appendix were gathered by Mr. Pope in England. The other parts were then made up by examination of the records at our State House and in many towns, and by the replies received from many kind correspondents over the land. That the book is imperfect goes without saying; fallible authors will make errors; and correspondents who give only part of the information asked or persons who fail to reply cannot expect to find the records of their particular families perfect, although a compiler sometimes makes up for such defects or errors by work in other channels.

But the book is a valuable one for every person of this name and for all students of personal history of Americans; that the compilers do not hesitate to affirm. For its faults and mistakes we ask indulgence in advance; for the honest effort to gather and present facts of great interest we are sure there will be growing appreciation.

PART ONE: THE READING FAMILY

I. WILLIAM HOOPER, "aged 18 years," came in the ship James from London, sailing July 13, 1635. He resided at Reading in 1644, as town records show; may have been there before. He was admitted a freeman of the colony May 10, 1648, which implied that he had previously joined the church; his wife Elizabeth was also a member. It has been conjectured that she was a sister of Captain Thomas Marshall, because William Hooper called Captain Marshall "brother;" and they may have been children of Thomas Marshall, Sen., of Lynn, 1638. He resided in the part of old Reading which is now included in Wakefield. He owned considerable land, and also carried on the business of a weaver. He married a second wife, named Ruth, of whose connections there is no intimation in the records.

In the company of Capt. Daniel Henchman, raised at Boston from that town and the neighborhood for service in the conflict with the Indians known as "King Philip's War," the name of William Hooper appears in 1675, and in the company of Capt. Wadsworth in 1676; as William Hooper, Senior, was about sixty years old at that time, we cannot suppose he was that soldier, but there is a probability that his son William was the person.

The town records show assignments of lands to him from time to time, and the county records show transfers of lands by him, one of them signed also by his wife Ruth in relinquishment of her dower, Dec. 14, 1664.

Before finishing his rather brief life in this new world he made his will, and we herewith present a copy of the document. As he had experienced the change of focus which threescore years usually bring, and as he had not, probably,

suitable glasses, he was obliged to depend on some friend to write the will, and he made his mark instead of writing his name, as we do not doubt he had formerly done. He died Dec. 5, 1678, "aged 61."

THE LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF WILLIAM HOOPER

of Reading, made the flift day of August. 1678 being in my perfect Memory.

ffirst I give my soule to god whoe gave it to mee. and my body to dust: from whence it came

It. I give halfe my land, upland and Meddow ground to my wife during her life and the other halfe of my land and Meddow. I give to my son William and his heirs for ever: And my will is. That hee shall improve it all. And his mother to have halfe the profitt during her life, and at her decease: hee my son William to have all my land and Meddow and Cattle: And to pay to my six children that are unmarryed ffive pounds apiece. as they shall come to age: But hee shall not pay any for two yeers after my decease. And my Will is that my two younger sons shalbe with their mother and my son William till they bee ffifteene veers of age to be helpfull to them And then my Will is That they may be sett to some Trade. And if either of them have amind to bee a weaver. Then I doe will to him to have my Loomes, and all my Tackling to them. And my household stuffe. I give it all to my wife to bee at her owne dispose. But if my wife should marry. All my lands and Cattle shalbe my son Williams, only the household goods: to bee my wifes, as is willed before as witnesse my hand

Sarah Hooper (Hawkes) m. second, Jan. 9, 1672-3, Samuel, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Wardwell, of Andover. He was charged with witchcraft in the fearful period of that delusion and executed Sept. 22, 1692. She was also tried and condemned and held in prison a long time; but was freed at the time of general delivery. His goods and lands were taken, to the value of 36 pounds, 15 shillings, for the payment of the expenses of the trials. By an act of the General Court June 30, 1703, the "attainder" was removed from her and other Andover sufferers. Her children were cared for by the town of Andover thus: Samuel Wardwell was placed with his uncle John Ballard, for one year; William Wardwell was placed with Corp. Samuel Fry to learn the trade of weaver; Eliakim Wardwell was put with Daniel Poor till his majority; Elizabeth (or Rebecca) Wardwell was placed with John Stevens till she should be 18 years of age. The sons petitioned for the removal of attainder and the insertion of her name

in the record of those freed Feb. 19, 1711-1712, she having died at some date previous.

2. WILLIAM² (William¹), born at Reading, Nov. 3, 1658; married Susanna [said to have been daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth Shed, of Billerica, born Dec. 28, 1662.]

He paid a tax of ninepence toward the Indian fund in 1686; gave two pounds, ten shillings toward the erection of the new meeting house in 1688; was taxed fifteen shillings, six pence for the minister's "rate" in 1692. Was selectman in 1685. His home was at North Reading. He died Aug. 8, 1692. He left an estate valued at ninety-two pounds and odd. John Dutton of Billerica and John Hooper of Reading, carpenter, gave bonds with the widow for her administration of his estate, jointly with John Ballard. The widow sold her rights in the estate to John Parker, Jr., Dec. 24, 1708. She married second, Benjamin Dutton, of Reading (his second wife).

3. Thomas² (William¹), born at Reading, April 2, 1668; married Elizabeth, "only daughter and heires of John Richards, late of Boston, who was grandson and legatee of John Reeves formerly of Salem."

He learned the trade of weaver and doubtless inherited the "loomes and Tacklinge" which his father willed should go to the son who chose that trade.

Residing at Medfield, "weaver," he and his wife Elizabeth sold her share of her great-grandfather's estate for thirty-one pounds, ten shillings, April 13, 1708. [Essex County Deeds.]

Examination of the records of the town church at Medfield fail to show the mention of the name Hooper from the foundation of the church in 1651 till long after the possible lifetime of this man. But the town records give the single item of a child's birth. Examination of early records of adjacent towns has yielded the names of two other persons whom we believe from numerous evidences to have been other children of this man.

4. John² (William¹), born at Reading, July 5, 1670; married (perhaps at Braintree) Sarah, daughter of John and Hannah Harden, born at Braintree, Dec. 3, 1679. She survived him and married second, Francis Woods. She died at Bridgewater, May 19, 1749.

He was residing at Reading in 1692 when his brother William died, and was one of the bondsmen of his sister-in-law at the settlement of the estate. He was a carpenter. John Hooper, Sen., was one of the appraisers of the estate, so-called, we may suppose, from a son John, then very young. He continued to reside at Reading several years. March 23, 1695, he sold to Thomas Damon, 8½ acres of land in Reading. May 23, 1705, he bought of Benjamin Orcutt 65 acres of land in Bridgewater for 65 pounds, bounded northerly and easterly by land of Benjamin Hayward, easterly in part also by land of John Hayward; southerly by the town river, westerly by land of Daniel Hudson. This was on the southerly slope of the Sprague Hill, southeast of the water works, near Hayward Street. He built a house there which was burned in 1708; at the fire he received injuries from which he died Jan. 9, 1708–9.

By some means a tradition came to be believed by some of the descendants of this John Hooper of Bridgewater that he was a native of England and came here as a fugitive from justice, having taken part in the rebellion of the Duke of Monmouth. It is true that a John Hooper was among the Monmouth prisoners, at Wells, Eng., Sept. 20, 1685, and that he, with others, was awaiting transportation to Barbadoes. It is also correct that a John Hooper arrived at Boston in the ship John and Dorothy, June 30, 1712, from Barbadoes; but this was seven years after John Hooper had bought land at Bridgewater; and the fact of two daughters of William Hooper of Reading coming to Bridgewater and making their home there after the purchase of land there by John Hooper, and the intimacy of the families, is a very strong evidence of the origin of John Hooper as son of William of Reading. The tendency of people during the last century to make wild fanciful guesses at genealogical history and the discovery of the records we have quoted by some friend of the Bridgewater Hoopers must account for this wild and erring tradition. Mr. Thomas Hooper, of Bridgewater, father of the writer, was so impressed with the tradition as to incorporate it in the memorial he set up to his ancestor; but abandoned that theory and became fully convinced of the descent from William of Reading.

Sarah, widow of John Hooper of Bridgewater, was appointed administrator of his estate June 23, 1709. On her son John's coming of age an agreement was entered into between himself on the one part and Francis Woods and Sarah Woods his wife, mother to the said John, on the other part, by which she received her third part, etc. He was appointed administrator, May 19, 1719. Francis Woods was surety on his bond together with Elizabeth Bridgham. Francis Woods was made guardian of the children Nathaniel, Sarah and James Hooper.

Resided at Hingham from 1723 certainly till 1730 or later. Removed to North Yarmouth (Maine), whence he and his wife gave deed of land in Hingham to Lydia Thorne, Feb. 24, 1735. "Elizabeth, wife of William Hooper," was baptized Sept. 3, 1758.

5 a. JOHN³ (Thomas, William), born at Medfield, Dec. 27, 1708; married* at Walpole, Dec. 19, 1732, Mary Hartshorn.

He became a "bloomer" or refiner of the bog iron ore which was found in Walpole and other towns adjacent. Resided at Walpole and afterwards at Stoughton. Sold land in Wrentham, his wife Mary joining in the deed, Dec. 31, 1735; bought and sold lands at Walpole.

He died before Jan. 8, 1762, when Jonathan Billings was appointed administrator of his estate. The inventory shows a house with 100 acres of land, furniture, utensils, etc., and "Iron oare & Coal." The account mentions expenses of nursing himself and his wife, and the mention of "two graves" indicates that both died at about the same time. Numerous claims swamped the estate. Heirs are therefore not mentioned in the papers.

5b. Thomas ³ (Thomas, ² William ¹), born about 1712; married at a place and time of which we have no record, a wife named Ann, of whose surname we have not been able to learn. He resided at or near Mendon for some years; but there is no record of any office he held in the town or of any property which he bought or sold.

Here nine children were born as the town records show; the church record gives us the name of a tenth, whose birth failed to get on the town record. It would appear that he resided in that part of Mendon which fell within the bounds of Milford when that precinct was set off, for it was the Milford church to which Ann was received and baptized Aug. 7, 1757, and where three children of "Thomas and Ann Hooper"—Lydia, Jonathan and Ezekiel — were baptized May 11, 1760.

Thomas Hooper did gallant service in the Colonial Wars.

Thomas Hooper, of Mendon, enlisted Dec. 24, 1747, and served till March 1, 1748, in the company of which Lieut. Elisha Hanley was acting captain, 11 weeks and 2 days, wages amounting to 4 pounds, 8 shillings, 2 pence, rated as "centinel;" roll dated at Boston Oct. 31, 1748, endorsed "Company at Fort Massachusetts." Also, "centinel" in the company of Capt. Ephraim Williams, Jr., having entered service June 10, 1748, and served until Sept. 10, 1748; roll dated at Boston, Nov. 2, 1748, time, 13 weeks, 2 days, wages £6; 12-10. [Mass. Archives, vol. 92. pp. 90½ and 143.]

He lived on at Mendon, his home toils kept up through the

troublous times till after the next great war period.

Then came a great event in the life of the family. Mr. Henry Evans, who seems to have resided at or near Sudbury, had been appointed by the authorities of Nova Scotia to act as agent for the town of Annapolis in that province. He formed a company of "Proprietors" who met at Framingham, April 6, 1760; he chartered at Boston, May 5th, a schooner named "The Charming Molly," Capt. Grow, and got together a company

of adventurous people from the towns near Framingham, who sailed from Boston the 23d day of that same month of May, 1760. In that company sailed, as the journal of Mr. Evans shows, "Thomas Hooper, wife, sons & 3 daughters." In a census of the residents of Annapolis 8 years afterward the number of persons in the family of Thomas Hooper is stated at 7, "Americans," "5 males and 2 females," which denotes some changes in the composition of the family; other sons had come to Annapolis, it may be believed, either Thomas, David or William, to make up the 5 in addition to the father and the two youngest sons. For in 1792 Jonathan and Ezekiel Hooper as well as the father Thomas were enrolled among tax-payers at Annapolis. Then some change had taken place among the women of the family, either death or marriage and entrance into new homes had lessened the number first reported at the time of the emigration. The loss of Annapolis records by fire some years ago deprives us of the means of clearing up these matters.

The census referred to above gives us the fact that Thomas Hooper had something to help carry on a farm: "4 oxen, 4 cows, 1 sheep, 1 hog" are mentioned. He and his sons cultivated the soil and made pleasant homes on the slopes of the hills which lie to the North and South of Annapolis harbor. We have no account of the death of either Thomas or Ann.

and to a namesake, John Hooper Palmer, of Woodstock, Vt., whether a relative or not is not known to us.

He died May 10, 1773.

The story has come down in the family that on the day of his funeral the coffin was placed out of doors, under an apple tree (according to a common custom of the time); the tree being full of blossoms and stirred by a gentle breeze, the white and pink petals covered the whole with a beautiful mantle.

He was a soldier of the Revolution; served in Capt. Jabez Colt's company in Col. Resseler's detachment of militia from Berkshire County for the service of the United States of America, July 29, 1777.

He was a man of strong family feeling; wrote many excellent letters to his brother Thomas which are on file; they are from Killingworth, Conn., in 1762, and from West Stockbridge afterward. They describe the hard times of those days and show a brave struggle against the difficulties of a frontier settlement. After repeated plans and disappointments about revisiting his old home he made a visit in 1775. He induced some of his brethren and others to come to the "new West" of that day, where there was a good deal of comfort and advancement in log cabins and rough conditions. A good spirit of patriotism and Christianity abounded.



r. Robert Hooper, of Marblehead, first appears in Massachusetts records as master of a shallop hired of Mr. Moses Maverick, a wealthy business man of the port, in the year 1663. A suit was brought in court by him to receive his rights in an affair with a neighbor, Henry Russell, who was the actual owner of the vessel. Testimony shows that when Captain Hooper was removing his property from the craft, preparatory to surrendering her to her owner, he was taking out a particular sail when Russell forbade his doing it, claiming that the sail was his. When the Captain persisted in taking what he regarded as his own, Russell struck him. Instead of going to brute war, Mr. Hooper quietly waited till Oct. 14, 1663, when the Court took testimony and gave him his case.

Robert Hooper was member of a coroner's jury in 1665. He had some responsibility for the wound of Abraham Allen's hand; we are not informed how the matter occurred, but the case was carried into court and the decision was that Hooper should pay "10 groats to the county, and pay for the healing of Abraham Alin's hand and charges of the constable." haps it was an accident to the man while in Mr. Hooper's service. The people of the colonies were like their old English contemporaries in their horror of slander, and Robert Hooper and his wife Elizabeth brought suit against a neighbor in 1677; but they must have compromised the case as it was not brought to trial. Even family life was not free from entanglements. November first, 1680, the good man brought suit against Edward Homan or Holman (both spellings being in vogue at the time) about a fence. The files of Essex County Court in this instance, also, reveal considerable of interest. Witnesses testified that when Edward was courting the daughter of Robert Hooper, the latter voluntarily promised the young man that he would give him a plot of ground to set his house upon, "if the match went forward." The marriage took place and time passed away. But when the father wished to build or rebuild a fence around his house adjoining that of the Homans', and had men doing the work, the son-in-law forbade and threatened to do dreadful things if they went any further, because, as he claimed, they were trenching on his land. Fifteen years' possession madet itle enough to cause Hooper to get a deed of Homan's rights in the land on which the fence was to be built, but the law compelled Homan to allow the fence to be constructed where the father desired.

The name of this daughter comes to us in two deeds which she signed with her husband and in that spouse's will; strange as it may appear, "Richard" is the way the scriveners wrote it. Possibly the baptismal name was really the feminine form "Richarda;" but the copies of deeds and the notary's spelling in the will are plain "Richard."

1. Edward Holeman, cooper, and Richard his wife sold to Robert Hooper, Dec. 30, 1680, their rights to the ground where Robert Hooper's house stood.

2. Edward Homan, Sen., of Marblehead, cooper, and Richard his wife deeded to their son John Homan, mariner, Oct. 28, 1704, certain parts of the land and orchard where their house stood, etc.

3. Edward Homan made his will May 4, 1711, bequeathing to his wife Richard and his sons Edward, John, Peter, Philip and Joseph.

Robert Hooper, fisherman, of Marblehead, first appears as a householder Dec. 26, 1663, when he bought of John Stacey, Senior, and John Stacey, Junior, for eight pounds sterling, one quarter of an acre of land in Marblehead. He bought another tract of land, a quarter of an acre, with dwelling-house upon it, of Christopher Lattamore, for thirty-three pounds, ten shillings, Feb. 1, 1663-4. He and his wife Elizabeth sold the first named tract to William Browne Oct. 27, 1664, the consideration not being expressed. He bought a narrow strip of land "adjoin-

ing said Robert Hooper's house" for twenty shillings, Dec. 30, 1680. "Robert Hooper, planter" is the style of statement when he buys Edward Holman's rights in the house in which he (Hooper) was living about the same time. On the 23d day of September, 1681, Robert Hooper sold the place purchased of Lattamore to William Hewitt for thirty pounds, possession to be given from the death of Robert and his wife Elizabeth. Dec. 2, 1686, Hewitt sold the property to Richard Russell, specifying that it was "now in said Hooper's occupation," and subject to the aforesaid condition. [Es. Deeds, 7, 613.]

He deposed in a case in court 22 (1), 1668-9, giving his age as about 62 years. This would place his birth in the year 1606 or thereabout, and make him old enough to have been the father of John, Robert and Henry Hooper, the other very early residents of Marblehead. He would have been old enough to have been the merchant at Barbadoes mentioned in the business documents of Mr. Chrispin Hooper of London and Boston; but we have not any evidence whatever to connect the Marblehead family with that of Barbadoes; the mere name of the island merchant, "Mr. Robert Hooper," is no proof of identity.

In a list of "The Householders of Marblehead and Their Priveledges of Commons," in the town records of Marblehead, dated Oct. 7, 1674, "Robert Houper" is credited with rights for the pasturage of "I cow." "December 4th, 1677, Moses Mavericke by order of the select men and in their presence delivered three pounds in silver unto Robert Houper of what money had been received for the Townes account of land sold by the said men." There is no further explanation of this transaction. We notice in passing that Moses Maverick was the owner of the vessel of which Francis Hooper was master a few years before this time. [See Introduction to Part Three.]

By the courtesy of Mr. Henry E. Waite we here insert two affidavits that relate to land at Peach's Point, Scott's Cove, near which the Hoopers lived. The ages of the deponents were roughly guessed, probably, for Robert's does not agree with that given in a former deposition of his, according to which he, would have been about the age here attributed to his wife, — which seems probable.

A single reference to him occurs in the probate papers of another man's estate; he was one of the appraisers of the estate of William Pitcher in 1676. He died after Dec. 2, 1686.

We have no list of his children; but the presence at Marblehead at that time of John Hooper, who lived next door to Robert, and of Robert Hooper, Junior, a tax-payer before the close of the life of the older Robert; the marriages of Robert, Jr., and Henry Hooper so soon after, showing that they had been born early enough to have been sons of the first-recorded couple here, all form a chain of arguments of an inferential character which make it a reasonable supposition that the three were sons of Robert and Elizabeth; and we shall so construct the pedigree. To them we may properly add "Richard," wife of Edward Holman.

2. John² (Robert¹) born, as he deposed, about 1641; married Christian —. There is some reason to believe that she was a daughter of Samuel and Ann Condy of Boston and Salem, since Ann, in her will, Oct. 9, 1678, bequeathed pewter platters to John and Christian Hooper and their children, mentioning in particular Elizabeth and John; John Hooper was one of the persons who made oath to the will at Salem court, although not one of the witnesses, which would point to his having some near relation to the deceased. Christian was born, as she deposed, about 1645.

We have, for several reasons, concluded that John was a son of Robert, Senior. To be sure the name Robert was not given to either of his children of whom we know, or to theirs; while it was a stock name in the families of Robert, Jr., and Henry. Possibly he had an older son named Robert. Further investigations may show the facts.

"John Hooper of Marblehead" bought half an acre of land there of Peternell Bartoll for nine pounds, July 6, 1665; it was located "on the hill formerly called Goites Hill, betwixt the house of Robert Hooper on the southwest and the cove called the Scots Cove towards the northeast, to the sea toward the harbour, bounded by the path northwest." He sold to Edward Holman for fifty shillings, May 7, 1685, one half the ground on which the fishing stage they were jointly building was standing, with all rights, his wife Christian joining in the deed. He signed his name and made acknowledgment to the deed May 31, 1687. If he was a son of Robert and a brother-in-law of Holman this partnership would be very natural.

He was one of the citizens who signed a call for a town meeting March 14, 1673. [Essex Court Files.] His name stood under that of "Robert Houper" and spelled the same way, in the list of persons owning rights to pasture cattle on the Common Oct. 7, 1674, and like Robert, he was credited with "I cow." "John Houper" was a member of a committee chosen March 20, 1676, "to look after the stint of cattle upon the Common," i. e. to determine whose cattle and how many should be pastured there. He was one of the appraisers of the estate of Francis Chappell, 4 Oct. 1686.

The wife Christian was a member of the church, and in her name seven of the children were baptized Aug. 23, 1685.

John Hooper died before Dec. 12, 1709, when the widow Christian was appointed administratrix of his estate. The inventory showed carpenter's tools; half of a "stage, flake yard and warehouse" for the fishing business; dwelling-house and land adjacent, etc. Dec. 28, 1710, the widow presented her account. Division of the property was made July 1, 1713, to "John Hooper, the eldest son, a double portion;" to sons William and Joseph Hooper and the representatives of deceased son Samuel; and to daughters Elizabeth Haynes, Christian Meek and Deliverance Grose. Benjamin was not mentioned and may have died before that time, leaving no heirs.

Feb. 7, 1718–19, Joseph Hooper, fisherman, Elizabeth Haynes and Christian Meek, widows, quitclaimed all their rights in the estate to their brother John Hooper's son, John Hooper.

Peter Greenfield died shortly before Nov. 29, 1679, when his widow Hannah administered on his estate. The inventory shows that he owned a house and land, "a boat and all things belonging unto her;" furniture, a "muskett;" "ye half of 4, mars & ye half of one sucking colt;" some "estat in John Rhoads hands," etc.; total valuation, £143-16-02. Hannah married second Dr. Richard Knott and third Joseph Swett,* all of which is shown in deeds of land she made to Eleanor (Knott) Martin and Margaret (Greenfield) Henly. Dr. Knott died in June, 1684, and mention was made in probate papers of the portions of Anna, Margaret and Hannah Greenfield, due them, £60 in all.

Among persons whose taxes had not been collected up to March 14, 1680, we find the name of "Robert Hooper Jun: not to bee found;" which shows that he had been a rate-payer but was then absent from town, perhaps on a voyage. He was married in Marblehead, and so residing there, in 1684.

*This was Joseph Swett, Sen., grandfather of Ruth Swett, second wife of "King" Robert Hooper.

Robert Hooper, Marblehead, innkeeper, was one of those reported in Essex County in a paper on file in Mass. Archives, 128, 50.

While there is no list extant, giving his children, we may reasonably place one who bore the father's name and one who bore the surname of the mother for a Christian name, as children of this couple. Quite likely there were others, but no probate papers or other evidences are extant. It seems probable that the father died about 1689, and that his widow was the "Ann Hooper" who married William Poat, Sen., Aug. 7, 1689.

HENRY² (Robert¹), born as early as 1665, we believe; married at Marblehead, March 15, 1691-2, Mary Norman, widow of Joseph Norman; she was married to the first husband as "Mary Collins" Jan. 24, 1688-9; he died about the month of October, 1691, and administration on his estate was granted Dec. 15, 1691, to "Henry Hooper and Mary his wife late widow of Joseph Norman." Mary was daughter of John and Abigail (Johnson) Collins, born 20 (12) 1669.

Henry Hooper was a prosperous man; he carried on the fishing business. He had a fine mansion and all the appliances of a large business.

He died in the latter part of the year 1726; Dec. 30, 1726, administration on his estate was granted to "his two older sons, Henry and Robert Hooper."

10. ROBERT³ (*Robert*, *Robert*), born at Marblehead about 1685. It has been suggested that he may be the person described below.

Robert Hooper with his family of four persons was a settler at Wiscasset, district of Maine, in 1730, and remained there alone for four years. He was one of the petitioners for incorporation into a town, March 13, 1754, and one of those asking protection against the Indians, April 22, 1754. [Register, passim.]

II. GREENFIELD³ (Robert,² Robert¹), born at Marblehead about 1686; married there Jan. 16, 1706–7, Alice, daughter of Andrew Tucker, Sen., (who died Dec. 12, 1691, ae. 49) and received a share of his real estate. His wife Mary administered on the estate first, Feb. 22, 1691–2, and on her death Greenfield Hooper was appointed; the division of property was made July 27, 1730.

He resided at Marblehead; was a merchant; the town paid him, by vote of the town meeting Dec. 4, 1721, £1-18-06 for "candles for the watch" (the watchmen of the town) "and for the sick." He received payment at other times for similar supplies. He also had, as we learn from the inventory of his estate, a "workshop" with looms for weaving. He probably was a "tallow chandler," making the candles he sold. The date of his death is not recorded, but may be approximately set at about the first of October, 1747, as on the 5th of that month "Robert Hooper, Jr.," who was the second of the name in age in the town at that time, was appointed administrator of the estate of "his father Greenfield Hooper."

He was a "coaster." He mortgaged his estate June 26, 1744, his wife Elizabeth joining in the deed; she paid it off and

received discharge of the mortgage Dec. 28, 1750.

He died about the early part of April, 1748; as on the 11th day of that month administration upon his estate was granted to his brother, Dea. Robert Hooper. We have no record as evidence of children. Mrs. Elizabeth Hooper, widow, made a will in 1770, bequeathing all her property to her brother[-in-law] George Newmarch and his wife Anna, with a few other individuals not of the Hooper name.

Hooper joined in a quitclaim deed of property with Samuel, John, Seward, and Thomas Brimblecome and Elizabeth Gale Feb. 3, 1745.

He married third, Aug. 21, 1755, Abigail, daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth (Coggswell) Blaney, b. Jan. 11, 1726.

He was a deacon of the church and a prominent citizen; engaged in the fishing business, attending to the cure and sale, called "shoreman" in documents.

He was one of the founders of "New Marblehead," afterward called Windham, Maine; had lands allotted to him June 27, 1738; but it does not appear that he ever lived there.

He died at Lynn March 25, 1763; his estate was duly appraised and was settled by the widow Abigail July 14, 1763; dowry set off to her Aug. 15, 1767. His large property descended to his four sons, to whom guardians were appointed Nov. 23, 1764. His sons Robert, Joseph and William removed to the State of Maine, residing at Falmouth (Portland) and Wind-

ham, and his widow made her home at the last-named place in her old age. She died Nov. 29, 1792.

The date of his death does not appear in the records; but his widow Sarah was appointed administratrix of his estate May 19, 1760, and guardians were appointed for the children Robert, Sarah, Nathaniel, Mary and Tabitha. Her final account was rendered as "Sarah, wife of John Pearce," July 7, 1767, when the estate of the daughter Sarah, deceased, was also distributed.

He became a merchant of very great extent of business and owner of large and somewhat widely separated properties. His control of the fishing business of Marblehead and other interests was so pronounced that he was popularly called "King Hooper." He owned lands in Marblehead, Salem, Danvers, and at Lyndeborough, N. H., and elsewhere. He had a large and elegant house at Marblehead and also a mansion at Danvers where he did "royal" entertaining. His vessels sailed to the fishing grounds of this coast and to foreign ports. In May, 1747, he agreed to pay the expenses of a school for poor children, which was established. He had a high reputation for honor and integrity in his business dealings, and for his benevolence. He presented Marblehead with a fire

engine in March, 1751. One of his schooners, the *Swallow*, was captured at the West Indies in 1756. He was representative to the General Court in 1755; declined a seat in the Council on account of deafness in 1759.

Robert Hooper, Esquire, was one of the thirty-six persons appointed "councillers of the Province" in 1774, at the beginning of the agitation which led to the Revolution; and was one of twelve of that number who refused to accept the honor and participate in what they felt would be unjust to the people. He was, however, rather inclined to the side of the king during at least the early part of the war. He died May 20, 1790.

As a token of the real, inner life of the man we present a letter from Robert Hooper, Esq., to his granddaughter, Mrs. Ruth Hooper (Dalton) Deblois.

Marblehead, March 17, 1790.

My Dear Grd. Daughter

The rect. of your most dutiful Letter of the 20th ultimo, gave such a spring to my spirits, that, I could not contain myself, the joy overcame me as it did your kind Grd. Mamma; as ye distance between us, & my age advancing, & attended wth Infirmities, I gave up all hopes of ever seeing you any more in this World — But flattered myself I might hear from you according to your promise. — I am sorry you had the least Idea of presumption as to restrain your pen, when I flattered myself you must be fully convinced what a pleasure it always gave me to hear of the health of all the dear branches of my family & certainly yours is not the lowest in my esteem. But as you Justly observe we have been and still are 300 miles distance from each other & my advanced age makes it doubtful whether I may ever see you more in this World — your parting from me was next to Burying you - I have not the most distant doubt of your attention, duty & inclination, to show your Great regards for your aged Grand Papa & therefore nothing would give me more pleasure than to hear of the health and prosperity of every Branch of my family - I have the pleasure to acquaint you I have not had for 10 yrs. so favourable a winter & yr Gnd Mamma & all my family have enjoyed the same I have not had any Gout for 11 yrs to give me any confinement, a kind Providence has preserved my whole family from the Influenza & am in hopes it has left the Town. I note the Winter with you has been Very mild, it was so here until

February Commenced, but since that, We have had severe Cold, light flights of snow, followed by short & small rains, Very little Clear weather & very Chilley, But a General time of health has prevailed. Your Gnd. Mamma Joynes me in kind regards to yr Better half, Mr. Deblois, & are glad to hear of his health. On the whole may you & I & all our beloved Connections live a life of piety & Vertue remembering that the way of Holyness is the kings high Road to Happiness, for without Holiness no man Can see the Lord a Holy life will end in a happy death, & a Glorious Resurrection to life Eternal. I remain with strong affection to you, Mr. Deblois and all the family Your Tender Grand Father

I have wrote y'. good Papa & MSDA H WYW' all y' Sisters under his Cover.

Was quite as eminent in business as the Robert Hooper of an earlier period, who gained the soubriquet of "King Hooper;" a well-balanced character, and one that trained sons who also took high rank.

He died of dropsy in the chest, Jan. 30, 1814. His large estate, appraised at \$342,642.81, was amicably divided between the widow and children in due process of law, the widow conveying her rights in the real estate and receiving her "thirds"

of the personal, the five sons and the daughter, Mrs. William Reed, receiving the balance proportionally, Feb. 29, 1816.

William Reed was a merchant, long in partnership with his wife's brothers. He was representative to Congress, 1811 to 1815. Was so deeply interested in the cause of Temperance that he was called "The apostle of Temperance." Was devoted to the cause of Christ, the principal giver to the building of the stone meeting-house at Marblehead; a leading member of the First Congregational church. Was also active in various charitable and religious organizations. He died Feb. 18, 1837. Mrs. Reed was a worthy consort of her excellent husband. By the kindness of Mrs. Henry Waite we are able to present the accompanying portraits of this honorable couple.

Nathaniel Hooper made public profession of his faith in Christ, his Saviour, in 1811, uniting with the Congregational church of Marblehead; became a deacon of the church, a man of large generosity and of much public spirit. He was known among the fishermen as "The Oracle," being very helpful in settling controversies.

He represented the town at the General Court 1813–15 and 1822; was a member of the Convention of 1820. He died of heart disease April 4, 1825, "in the triumphs of faith and in possession of his faculties; Psalm 37:37."



Captain Robert Chamblett Hooper fitted for college at Phillips Academy, Andover, and entered the class of 1822 at Harvard, where he formed several lasting friendships, among them that with N. I. Bowditch, Esq., of Boston. He was only 13 when he entered, the youngest member of his class. At the close of the second year it was thought best for him to have a vacation and he went to sea in one of his father's vessels, the brig Union. He visited Gibraltar, Marseilles, Nice and other points, reaching home the following spring. Instead of resuming the college course he followed the marine line of education, and made voyage after voyage to West Indian, European and South American ports until he was qualified to sail as captain and "supercargo"—that is sailing-master and business manager of freights — in the brig Walga for Matansas and a Russian port. He sailed Feb. 27, 1826, being not then 21 years of age! He made a quick and successful voyage, and a year later was entrusted with what was then considered a very large ship, the Arbella, of 400 tons! and had similar good fortune in her. He went on in that life many years. At length he

retired from the sea and established himself as a "merchant" in Boston; he owned, bought and sold ships and other craft; imported sugar and other foreign commodities; owned a share of Central Wharf, on which his store was situated, and the whole of Constitution Wharf. In 1845 he built a satisfactory home for himself and family at "Oakland," as he called it, in Dorchester; later resided in Boston. He was a very successful merchant and popular gentleman. He died Nov. 26, 1869. We are happy to give his portrait.

On his return in 1880 he was appointed assistant in the Throat Department of the Mass. Gen. Hospital. Was one year also district physician of the Boston Dispensary at the North End in Boston, taking the additional department of aurist part of the time. In 1883 he was appointed instructor in laryngology at Harvard Medical School and began experimental work in the Physiological Laboratory; he published important papers on various branches of his chosen specialty. Was chosen fellow of the Am. Laryng. Association in 1882. Mr. Hooper was educated in the public schools of Marblehead. He received the honorary degree of A. M. from Harvard in 1866. He applied himself to business in his young manhood and showed uncommon ability and energy. Removed to Boston and became in due time a partner in the shipping and importing house of Bryant and Sturgis. Was very successful all his life in the various departments of business into which he turned, whether banking, railroad investment or other matters. He

was a representative to the state legislature three terms and state senator in 1857. Was appointed to fill an unexpired term as member of the U. S. House of Representatives Dec. 2, 1861, and filled the position so acceptably that he was re-elected six times. He was long on the Committee of Ways and Means and chairman of the Committee on Banking and Currency. He displayed great sagacity in dealing with the financial burdens of the government in the midst of the Rebellion, and was a prominent mover and shaper of the system of National Banks.

He was the founder of the School of Mines at Harvard University, and showed interest in affairs of importance for the community.

He was a member of the N. E. Historic-Genealogical Society; was the author of a valuable treatise on The Currency. He was a man of great courtesy and benevolence.

He died at his residence at Washington, Feb. 14, 1875.

ENGLISH ANCESTRY

JOHN HOOPER of Este Coker, County Somerset, made his will 5 April, 1605. Bequeathed to his daughters Alice and Joane, sons Anthony, Francis, Gyles and Edward. The residue of the estate to wife Agnes, whom he appoints executrix. Proved 28 May, 1605. Agnes Hooper, widow, was buried March 19, 1635.

In the parish registers of East Coker we find the marriage of this testator. The registers of the parish do not go back far enough to show whose son he was, nor do wills of the family yet appear that give this information.

John Hooper and Agnes Williams were married the 6 of November, 1568.

Among the children of this couple recorded (also mentioned in the will) we particularly note this:

Frauncis, son of John Hooper and Agnes, was baptized the xvith of Maie, 1577.

We do not find the record of this son's marriage, but the record of baptisms of some children; we are interested in the following:

Frauncis, the son of Frauncis (and Elizabeth) Hooper, was baptized the xith of May, 1611.

We here supply the name of the mother in this record, as before and after this date several children of *Frauncis and Elizabeth* are recorded, leaving no doubt that this child was also a child of Elizabeth.

ffrancis Hooper & Julian Holwaye were married Novemb: 1642.

To this couple a pair of twins were born the next spring:

William & John ye sonnes of ffrancis & Julian Hooper were baptized 12 March (1642-3).

"William the sonne of ffrancis Hooper" was buried 22 March, 1642-3.

But another child came to whom the same name was given:

William the sonne of ffrancis Hooper and Julian was baptized September 4, 1644.

A daughter was also born to this couple:

Marye the daughter of firancis Hooper & Julian ux: was baptized September the fifteenth 1646.

There is no record of the death or burial of Francis or Julian Hooper at East Coker.

If we have correctly interpreted the East Coker will and records the pedigree of the New England pioneer is this:

FIRST GENERATION IN AMERICA

I. Francis Hooper, whom we believe to have been the East Coker man whose pedigree is given in the foregoing pages, was at Marblehead as early as 1662, perhaps before that time,

and remained in the vicinity for several years. As he was a fisherman he did not make a home here, so far as we can learn. The very disagreeable experience he had in a collision at sea caused a lawsuit, and the testimony given in the case, preserved for us in the files of Essex County Court at Salem, forms a quaint narrative and furnishes all we know of the matter.

"This 24th of the 4th moth 1662

The testimony of Mighell Combs aged about twentye eight yers: Saeth that about a month past or there abouts: being at sea on the fishing grounds: I saw a shipp coming in from the sea knowing not what she was: wee Came to sayle closs uppon the wind to speak with ym: wee saw the said shipp stumbling in neere M^r ffrancis hoopers shallopp: whoe was at ancer and a fishing Rann them full aboord & sanck her in the sea: butt might have esvlie escaped the sayd shallopp if they had pleased: for they had sea Roome Innuff & the wind at theire plesure: to goe Ither ahead or asterne of them: wth Reasonable Care: I was nott much beyond a Cables (length) ffrom the shipp when this was dun: allsoe the shipps Company hullowed to us: and my Company Cried out to me to beare upp: seeing them sayle so despratly & what hurt was don ffor feare they would doe us a mischief: but wee stood a little further to weather the shipp: & then tackt in to save the fishermen whoe weare in danger of drowning:

Sworn in court at Salem 26:4:62 Attestes Hillyard Verin Clerics:"

William Carter and Elias Fortin were with Hooper in the shallop at the time and testified to the truth of "the master's" statements; they said that he caught hold of some part of the ship and climbed on board of her and thus was saved from drowning. The shallop belonged to Mr. Moses Maverick, of Marblehead, a large owner of vessels and doing an extensive business in fishing along the coast. He was from the west of England, and the men whom he had associated with him and in his employ were also, many of them, from Dorsetshire, Somersetshire and Devonshire.

We are unable to learn anything about the movements of Captain Francis Hooper after the year 1665, when he was in Essex court again on some matter connected with the fishing business. No records of himself at East Coker later than this can be found. It may be conjectured that he was lost at sea, but there is no evidence of this. While there is no record to prove that he was the father of William of Beverly, the fact that he was a "Francis Hooper" and that William was here in his boyhood, and that the clerk of Beverly knew his parents' names, all look toward the theory that he is William's father.

We are certainly justified in using the name Francis in the pedigree as the first American ancestor of this Hooper family.

SECOND GENERATION

2. WILLIAM² (Francis¹), born at East Coker, England, baptized Sept. 4, 1644; married at Beverly or vicinity about the year 1668, Elizabeth, whose surname has thus far eluded our search.

He came as a boy to Essex County. Was in the employ of Osman Trask, of Beverly, and gave testimony in a lawsuit of his employer's, Nov. 29, 1665. His age was given at the time as "about 17 years," a guess of the attorney, very likely. He bought a house and land at Beverly, at the locality called "Bass Cove," 5 acres with the house and 10 acres elsewhere, Feb. 10, 1668. He was a fisherman.

"William Hooper, aged about 30," deposed in Essex Court at Salem, "27 (9) 77," i. e., Nov. 27, 1677, regarding damages done by a gale at sea to the ketch William and Mary, belonging to Humphrey Woodbury, in which he was sailing. [Files 27, 37.]

His wife Elizabeth was admitted to the church of Beverly Dec. 3, 1678, and their children baptized in due time.

The exposed life of the fisherman left the little family forlorn, as the town records tell us:

"William Hoopper Aged aboute thirty years Dyed aboute the Eighth Day of november suddenly falling overboard at sea and was sonn unto ffrancis and Julian Hooper Coker in old England Anno 1679."

The father had returned to England before the boy settled down in his new home.

The probate files at Salem supply us with the single document which we give below, which closes the biography of this man.

On the reverse of this paper is a list of "debtes to be paid," amounting to "21-03-2," but lacking the names of the persons to whom they were owed; and a list of "Cred" [its] to the amount of "£01-18-6." The Court ordered that £8 be given to the eldest child and £4 to each of the others "living," and the same to be reserved for the expected child.

PART FOUR: THE MAINE FAMILY

It may be said in a general way that there are two stages of the history of the Maine Hooper family, first the "pre-historic" and second the historic. The former stage of the history—which is not un-historical but simply not connected by absolute proofs with the latter stage—begins with an Englishman, John Hooper, resident at Richmond's Island or the Scarboro shore, one may believe, who made a pair of boots for Capt. John Winter or some employee of his and received eight shillings for them in the year 1642, as Winter's accounts show. The surname was spelled "Hupper," but that does not affect the fact of his being properly called Hooper, since the name was often so mis-spelled in England and here.

Mary Hooper was a daughter of Capt. John Winter, the manager of the Richmond Island Plantation on the coast of Maine (1630–1648). It would appear that she had first married a husband by the name of "Coulinge," as "my daughter Mary Coulinge" was mentioned by Mr. Winter in his letters to Mr. Robert Trelawney, his employer in the thirties. But he ordered money paid to his "daughter Mary Hooper" in a letter in 1642 and wrote to her in 1644. She may have remained in England when her mother and sister Sarah came to this country. Who her husband was has not yet been ascertained, but probably a Devonshire man. There is no clue to the relationship that Hooper may have had to those of the name who came to America and settled here.

The next point of this un-connected early record is the fact that Thomas Hooper, apparently in the Piscataqua valley, furnished boards and staves for sugar boxes and fish boxes and barrels for various merchandise, to Mr. Peter Coffin as shown in the account presented in Essex Court under date of Feb. 2, 1659, in the lawsuit of Broughton vs. Cook in June, 1664.

Next we have one Thomas Hooper, who was on a fishing

voyage with Michael Partridge and was drowned about the entrance of Salem harbor in April, 1667. The inventory of his effects shows partnership in the shallop and fish and some articles of use there; but, like the two earlier records, gives no line relating to family, home or connections. He may have been the man who had carried boards as freight or even carried on the mill business five years before.

Referring to another town in Massachusetts, we find John Hooper with wife Elizabeth, parents of a child Elizabeth in Boston, Jan. 22, 1666; and Feb. 12 of that year the will of Edward Fletcher, cutler and minister, gave a bequest to his sister "Elizabeth Hooper." But there is nothing to show that the couple continued to live here, or that the sister resided in this country, as Fletcher had been abroad for years and his

property was partly at Gloucester, Eng.

The next point in this unconnected narrative is the payment of the "charges" of Elisha Hooper for the sum of 12 shillings and 6 pence for serving as a soldier "in the late Indian Warre unto the first September 1677" by the town of Wells, Maine. Yet again we find no particulars about the defender of the pioneer homes. However, Wells is very near Richmond's Island on the one side and York and Kittery, on the other side, where our actual family records commence. One accustomed to trace the connection of families cannot fail to be impressed with this fact, and to consider the probability that John, the boot-maker, Elisha, the soldier, and the men whom we are about to describe were related closely. Especially does this hypothesis grow in favor when we observe that one of the two men whose residence and family we know was a manufacturer of foot-wear, also, and that the trade descended in the line. But the writer is content to leave to later historians all attempts to connect what he has called the "pre-historic" stage with that which is clearly historical.

THOMAS and JOHN HOOPER are the men who stand at the head of the York County, Maine, Hoopers. While there is not a line yet found which demonstrates that they were related, their neighborhood and the occurrence of the same names in some cases suggest that they may have been brothers; so, without

affirming this, we place their records side by side and those of their descendants similarly, generation after generation. It happened that Thomas' descendants removed to Charlestown, Mass., after a little, and this left those of John alone to continue the history which was begun in 1642 by the first manufacturer (or one of the very earliest) of boots and shoes in the state of Maine!

I. Thomas ' Hooper first appears as a resident of Kittery, Maine, in 1694 through the record of his daughter Elizabeth's birth. Hailed from York in 1697, when he and his wife Elizabeth (Small) sold a tract of land which had been bequeathed to her in 1687, by Capt. Francis Champernowne, in whose family she had a home. She appears to have been the daughter of Francis and Elizabeth Small. Shortly after the sale of this land the couple returned to Kittery and made that their home. The town gave him the customary grant of land as a settler in 1700. How long he lived is not known, nor is the death of the wife on record. But in the year 1738 she was a widow and resided at Biddeford; she declined to administer on the estate of her son Benjamin that year; from that date nothing has been found concerning her.

He was a shoemaker, or, as the English phrase, long employed in legal documents, here runs, "cordwainer." As has been said above this was the trade of the first John Hooper known to American annals, the man who supplied Capt. John Winter in 1642. From time immemorial Englishmen have held tenaciously to the father's trade or profession, especially for the son who bore the father's name; and who shall deny the probability that the Kittery man was son or grandson of the pioneer?

John Hooper, of Kittery, bought a tract of land in the part of town which became Berwick, and was a member of the church of the latter place; they chose him one of their deacons and the town honored him, and he left a good record of character and citizenship. He died between May 22, 1756, when he made his will, and Jan. 7, 1762, when it was proved. He had married a wife named Charity, whose parentage has not been ascertained, nor the date of her decease.

The little house of worship where the ministry was begun is described by local historians. Mr. Hooper was very efficient in the spread of the Baptist ideas and practices and after several years of labor at home and in the surrounding towns removed to Madbury, N. H., and became pastor of the Baptist church there. He was also a citizen of great influence, held in high esteem by all. He was a delegate to the convention of New Hampshire which considered the proposed constitution of the United States in 1788; at the first session at Exeter the convention voted against ratifying the constitution, but at the second session, held at Concord, harmony prevailed and the state wheeled into line with the others. Mr. Hooper was also a delegate to the convention which revised the constitution of New Hampshire in 1791. He died in January, 1827.

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APPENDIX

HOOPERS IN ENGLAND WHO MAY HAVE BEEN ANCESTORS OR CONNECTIONS OF THE AMERICAN FAMILIES

BISHOP JOHN HOOPER was born in Somersetshire about the year 1495; was in some respects the noblest Hooper of English history. He was educated at Merton College, Oxford; took orders as a Cistercian monk and resided awhile at London. He became converted to Protestantism and went over to the Continent in 1546. There he remained several years, part of the time at Zurich in Switzerland (1547-9). On the accession of Edward VI to the throne of England he returned to London and preached there. He was appointed Bishop of Gloucester, but he had come to disapprove of the vestments of the sacred office and his objections caused his arrest and confinement in the Fleet Prison in London for some time. At length he surrendered the point as not vital and was consecrated and inducted into office. King Edward is said to have desired to have him remain at London and advise in matters concerned in the reformation of the Church. In 1552 he was appointed Bishop of Worcester "in commendam," and entered upon the duties of the position. "Prophetically," says Rev. Cotton Mather, "he took for his coat of arms A Lamb in a Flaming Bush, with Rays from Heaven shining on it." [Quoted in Me. H. & G. Recorder, vol. ix, p. 34.]

He opposed the attempt to set Queen Mary aside, yet when she ascended the throne and began her work of persecution Bishop Hooper was arrested and confined in Fleet Prison eighteen months; was condemned as a heretic and burned at the stake at Gloucester, Feb. 9, 1555–6.

He was remarkably diligent in his care of his diocese; himself preached frequently, at one period "3 or 4 times daily," as his wife wrote to Bullinger; he gave much attention and oversight to the work of his clergy; had a great heart of love for the poor, in proof of which he gave a dinner to them daily, often sitting at table with them and eating with them. His writings were collected and published at Oxford in 1855. He was a noble, consecrated Christian minister and leader, a valuable helper in the emancipation of the Church from the superstitions and errors which had been gathering upon it during the Middle Ages, leading back to the pure Gospel standards. He married in Germany, probably in 1546. We have not been able yet to learn the name of his wife or whether they had children.

THOMAS HOOPER of Cossington, co. Somerset, diocese of Bath and Wells, made will 25 Aug. 1634, proved 1634. To son William Hooper XX nobles within two years after my decease and my best doublet and jerkinge; to his first childe one cowe calfe; wife Joane executrix, and brother John Hooper overseer. Other children Thomas, Simon, Dorothie, Cressett, Marie and Anne Hooper; grandchild Joane Turkey; to Marie Simms and her children; to the children of Walter Wells and Edward Bulger. Henry Adin and Hugh Ball witnesses.

The parish registers of Cossington are extant only from 1675. Below we give the will of the brother, "overseer" of Thomas' will.

JOHN HOOPER of Bleadon, co. Somerset, yeoman, made will 12 April, 1635, proved at London 8 May, 1635. Wife Edith; the cathedral church of Wells and parish church of Bleadon; Mary Sims of Southbrinte; Thomas Hooper of Cossington, son of my deceased brother; Cressed, his daughter and the other children; children of Mary Sims; kinsman William Hooper to have the putting forth of the money for the heirs; god-daughter, Johan, daughter of Thomas Good of Stockton, and her sister Dorothy; John Hooper, son of William Hooper and Margery his wife. Land in Uphill. Edward Bulgir of Eastbrint; John Mitchell's children; John Tucker and his wife; to Simon Hooper land in the parish of Longworth; to Mary Hooper; to Edward Wull and Walter Wull's daughter; "if my wife have any child by me," etc. "Everie one of my household," naming them. "If John, son of William Hooper die and he have another child," etc.

Parish registers of Bleadon only give entries from 1713.

The son William of Thomas Hooper of Cossington, old enough to have a good sum of money and the best part of his father's wardrobe bequeathed him in 1634, but not yet a father — whether married or not — is not mentioned by his uncle John a year later. This fact would not militate against the supposition that William had received his "nobles" and outfit and had made his way to the West as a pioneer of New England. There is here no evidence that such was the case; merely an omission of the young man's name when the second son was mentioned; though it is fair to say that perhaps Thomas was specified because he was a namesake of the testator.

But the time and place are favorable to the *theory* that William, son of John of Cossington, may have been the William who was an emigrant to Massachusetts in 1635, the settler at Reading.

Chrispin Hooper, "of London, merchant," was appointed by Daniell ffarvacks and Isaac Pegay, of London, merchants, May 2, 1651, their attorney for the transaction of business in "the three plantations of Virginia, Newe England and Barbadoes." The document was recorded in the Suffolk County Registry of Deeds the 2d of the 12th month, February, 1652, Mr. Hooper having that day made oath to the letter of attorney before Mr. William Hibbens, one of the magistrates, at Boston. As attorney he made a settlement the same day with Joanna, wife of John Tuttle of Ipswich, for goods which had been shipped on consignment to Mr. Robert Hooper and Mr. Martin Bentley, merchants at the Barbadoes, due record of which is also in Suffolk Deeds.

This Chrispin Hooper dealt in fish and we have considerable account of one transaction of his in this line recorded in Suffolk Deeds.

Rhoda, wife of John Gore, testified that in August, 1654, she was with Mr. Hooper when he received a lot of fish, "fivety quintalls of refuse fish, whereof Thirty quintalls he received of mr. Isaac Walker web was New England fish and twenty quintalls hee received of one mr. Lattimer weh was new found Land fish, both parcels beeing verry good marchantable and well dryed weh fish the said hooper sent then aboard the shipp good fellow George dell master, in the boate of one Matthew grose, And further this deponent saith, that the said hooper was at the Receiving and waying of all the above-mentioned fish, excepting fower quintalls, web shee took accompt of in his absence hee being stept aside to speake with a freind and that shee heard the said hooper say that the fish was for the Acco. of mr. Edward Chamberlayn of Barbadoes." "Matthew Groase, Aged 25 years or there abouts "testified to the same transaction, adding that the fish "had beene fyred in the sone a whole day" before it was delivered to Mr. Hooper, and that "the said hooper in takeing wayte of the said fish was verry nice in the Choyce of It and refused that weh Coold not be refused, weh occationed angry words." John Jephson also testified that he was employed in the handling of the fish.

Chrispin Hooper was in Boston Sept. 10, 1662, when a deed of land was acknowledged and delivery of the premises made in his presence by

Elizabeth, wife of Robert Gibbs.

GEORGE HOOPER was a landholder in Boston in 1671, as appears from the reference to his land in deeds of adjoining property. He was a seacaptain or "mariner," as is shown by the title given him in a deed of additional land he bought of another mariner, Thomas Smith, and Rebecca, his wife, Oct. 20, 1674. The location is thus described: "at the northerly end of Boston, being butted and bounded Southwest by the land of Esdras Reade, Westerly by the highway that leads from the

side of the mill pond towards Winnisimet ferry place, Northerly by the land of the sd George Hooper; and easterly by the land of Obediah Reade; and measureth on the south west side sixty foure foot be the same more or less and on the front or westerly end sixty three foot be the same more or less and on the Northerly side seaventy foot be the same more or less and on the reare or easterly end thirty nine foot be the same more or less."

He was taxed for this property in the successive years till 1685, accord-

ing to the surviving lists.

With his wife Mary, "daughter of Charles Precious sometime of Boston, smith, deceased," he mortgaged lands in Boston to John Rich-

ards, Esq. Nov. 19, 1686.

He was master of the brigantine *Rebeccah*, and came in her from Newfoundland, "importing Sundry goods of the growth and Production of Europe which were not Bona fide laden in England, Wales or town of Berwick upon Tweed," and for this cause his vessel was confiscated "according to Act of Parliament; title given to purchaser Dec. 10, 1686." [Suff. Deeds.]

JAMES HOOPER, was a resident of Boston and paid tax there in the year 1688. He died Jan. 18, 1688–9, "ae. about 25 years;" was buried at

King's Chapel.

He made his will 16 Jan. 1688, proved 31 Dec. 1689. Was a merchant in Boston; owned part of new ship in building by Wm. Greenough; bequests to father Mr. Philip and mother Mrs. Jane Hooper, of Exon (Exeter), England; sisters Margery Yeo, Elizabeth Hooper and Mrs. Grace Sampson, brother Philip Hooper, merchant at Bilboa; contributes toward the building of the New Church in Boston; to Mr. Ratcliffe, minister, landlord Edward Crick and his wife each of them a gold ring, and friends Mr. John Poole and Elizabeth, his wife, of Boston. Inventory mentions a "boy" in his service named Nicholas Porter.

He may have been a grandson of the following:

RICHARD HOOPER, chirurgeon (physician), was an early resident of Hampton, then a part of Massachusetts, now of New Hampshire. Our

first note of him comes when he was set upon and beaten in the streets of that town by Samuel Sherburne, who was afterward indicted for the act and the constable was unable to arrest the assaulter, Dec. 9, 1684.

[N. H. State Papers, I, 553.]

There was some family connection between the parties, perhaps, for after the death of Dr. Hooper his wife Elizabeth, whose maiden name eludes our search, conveyed to Love Sherburne, widow of Samuel, a tract of land at Hampton, June 24, 1699. The "chirurgeon" built a house at Hampton and gave a note for some part of the cost as we learn from a suit brought to recover payment of the note dated April 3, 1684; suit brought in September following in Essex Co.

He removed to Watertown, living temporarily at Cambridge on the way. He died in 1691 and his estate was settled by the widow. After her death the trust developed on Mr. Francis Foxcroft, who gave bonds

I., by Nathaniel Codington, Assistant, Dec. 10, 1716, Remembrance Parker, as one record gives it, or Remember Perkins, as other documents indicate. He married second Deborah ——, as deeds prove. He removed to Newport, R. I., before Dcc. 20, 1733.

ROBERT HOOPER, master (mariner) and merchant at the Barbadoes, was one of the consignees of a cargo shipped by John Tuttle of Ipswich and settled for by Mr. Chrispin Hooper, formerly of London, merchant, but then doing business at Boston and elsewhere, in the last month of the year 1652. It is probable that the following was a son of his.

SAINT JOHN HOOPER, temporarily residing at Salem but a resident of Barbadoes, made Benjamin Marston of Salem his attorney May 14, 1702, with reference to moneys to be received from Capt. Ellis or Thos. Akers "when yor vessell sails for Bilbo" [Bilboa in Spain] which were to be invested in anything which "is Likely to Turne best to account their." Called in document "St. John Hooper of the Island of Barbadoes now resident in Salem, mercht." Signed "Sat Jno Hooper."

ROBERT LITTIS HOOPER, was Chief Justice of the Province of New Jersey, and before him Philip Cox, of the Blue Hills in the county of Summersett, carpenter," made a letter of attorney to his son Philip Cox of the said county in East New Jersey, Aug. 30, 1731. [York (Me.) Deeds, XIV, 256.]

He was chief justice 1725-8 and 1732 till his death in March, 1739. He resided at Perth Amboy, N. J.; a son and a grandson bore his name

and were men of eminence.

REVEREND WILLIAM HOOPER, "born near Kelso, Scotland and graduated at Edinburgh University, was engaged by a gentleman here to be tutor to his son"* and came to Boston about the year 1737. He had such gifts and education as led the people of the newly organized West Church of Boston (Congregational) to call him to be their pastor, and he was ordained by a council of which Rev. Benjamin Coleman was a leading member. After a happy pastorate of some nine years he accepted the invitation of Trinity Parish (Episcopal); suddenly taking his departure for England, where he was again ordained by the Bishop of Gloucester, and on his return entered on the rectorship of Trinity Aug. 28, 1747. In that office he continued till the close of his life; he "fell dead in his yard" April 14, 1767. Many testimonials are on record to the high character and excellent abilities of the good man. He published "The Apostles neither impostors nor enthusiasts," 1742, and a sermon on the death of Thomas Greene, 1763.

Honorable William Hooper, was born in Boston, Mass., baptized by his father at the West Congregational Church, Boston, of which the father was then pastor, June 21, 1741; married in Boston at King's Chapel, Aug. 16, 1767, Ann Clark. He was graduated at Harvard College in 1760; studied law with James Otis, Esquire; removed to North Carolina, where he practised law; was elected to the Assembly in 1773, having become favorably known by the assistance he rendered to the Provincial government in 1770 in the suppression of an insurrection. He became a man of prominence in the legislative body and was chosen as one of the delegates to the Continental Congress. He was a member of that body when the Declaration of Independence was passed and his name is on the famous document as one of those intrepid and far-sighted signers.

In 1777 he resigned. Was afterward appointed a Federal judge and one of the arbiters in a question of boundary between Massachusetts and New York.

Rev. William, William, William) was graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1809; received the honorary degree of A. M. from Princeton; became a minister (D. D.) and was a professor in his alma mater; later was president of Wake Forest College and engaged in the instruction of youth sixty-six years. He died about 1876. His son-in-law and cousin, John De Berniere Hooper, was a graduate of North Carolina

University in 1831; professor there; an elegant writer and a teacher for over forty years. He died Jan. 27, 1886. The family has been intimately associated with culture and education.
