HARRIS COAT OF ARMS

AMRS: Argent, a Lion rampant sable, surmounted by a chevron ermine.

CREST: An Eagle displayed, (or).

MOTTO: Kur Deu Res Pub Tra, (For God and Commonwealth).

AUTHORITIES: Design data from the family; Burke's "General Armory"; Bolton's "American Armory"; Virkus "Compendium of American Genealogy".

INTERPRETATION: The above official description written in terms common to heraldry means that the arms, or shield, is silver (argent) and on this is a Lion in rampant position which is black (sable). Then, surmounting this Lion is a Chevron of ermine.

The Crest is an Eagle with wings spread (displayed) and of gold (or).

In addition, as is the custom when blazoning in tinctures, we add the knightly helmet and the cloak or mantle. All parts are arranged as so frequently seen in days of old when a Knight would hang up his shield on a wall peg, then remove his helmet and hang that on the same peg and over the shield. We show the crest on top of the helmet because on special days when the Knight wore full military dress he fastened his crest to the top of the helmet by means of a wreath of twisted material as seen in this blazon. This wreath was likely to be cloth or leather. Lastly the Knight removed his cloak and draped that over the helmet with the ends falling around the shield as shown here.

Our ancestors were most proud of their emblems and displayed them whenever possible. In fact these coats of arms were symbols of great social distinction for to have one made one a gentleman. Without he was referred to as, "He's no gentleman" and of course then, his wife, "was no lady".

The meaning of symbols on coats of arms is not easy to find as they pertain to one's family history but we do know that certain symbols were commonly given as a result of certain conditions. Chevrons were symbols given to those who had protected the weak and lions were for special service to the ruler. Of course ermine is the royal fur. The black arrowheads are the conventional heraldic symbol of the tiny black ermine tail. Eagles were symbols of strength and those displayed were symbolic of readiness.

Even though we do not know the exact intimate family history related to these symbols one may be proud that his ancestors were of a class entitled to have a Coat of Arms and that they were gentlemen and ladies. There is some truth to the statement that we are the product of all that has gone before us. Cherish the memory of our ancestors.

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THE HARRIS COAT OF ARMS

"A Coat of Arms" is an emblem or a device which is displayed by titled persons of royal blood, and their descendants.

Coats of Arms were originally used for purposes of identification and recognition on the field of battle as well as in civil life. It is claimed by some writers that Coats of Arms, in some crude form, were used by Noah's sons after the flood. There are records of other Coats of Arms in one form or another, at different periods of ancient history. Heraldry, however, as we know it today, did not become of much importance until soon after the invasion of England by William the Conqueror, A.D. 1066. Heraldry became of general interest at about the time of the Crusades.

The Harris Coat of Arms most widely used, has been in existence for many centuries. It is described in Burke's General Armory, Burke's Landed Gentry, Burke's Peerage and Baronetage, Bethan's Baronetage and has been used for generations by the early Virginia families and their descendants.

HARRIS GENEALOGY

Landric de Beaugency of Orleands France, was ancestor to the powerful Barons of Beaugency, and had two sons, John and Hericeus or Herice - They lived about 996 to 1031 A.D.

Hericeus had a son - Ancelin de Beaumont, who went to England and held a Barony in Nottingham about 1088 A.D.

Ancelin's son, Ivo Fitz Herice or de Heris, was Viscount of Nottingham before 1130 A.D.

Ivo Fitz Herice's sons were:

1. Ralph Hauseline, who held a Barony in England in 1165 A.D.
 2. Robert Fitz Herice, who was executed by Henry II of England.
 3. Josseline.
 4. William who held three fiefs in Nottingham and 4 in Lincoln.
 5. Humphrey, who was of Berks, England in 1158 A.D.
- (A William Harris possessed estates in Wilts England)

The French name "Herice" seems to have been changed to the English "Harris" by these sons.

THE HARRIS FAMILY

The ancestors of this family came from Glamorgan County, Wales, to France, then to England during the reign of Charles II, where they remained until their removal to America, probably near the middle of the 17th Century and settled in the Colony of Virginia, The Stock is Anglo-Welsh.

HARRIS FAMILY Seat at Weston Hanges, Kent County England.

1. SIR WILLIAM HARRIS, Bart., m Alice Smith daughter of Sir Thomas Smith, Their Children:
 1. Sir Arthur Harris, b 1584, member of 34d Va. Corporation 1609-1614 and a member of Parliament 3-1632.
 2. Captain Thomas Harris, b 1587, came to Va. 1611, settled in Henrico Co., m (1) Adria Gurganey, m (2) Joane Osborne.
 3. John Harris, b 1588, Charter Incorporator of Va. Colony, Burgess of Shirley Hundreds 1629.

THOMAS HARRIS, son of Sir William Harris of Crixes Essex, b 1587, came to Virginia in the ship "Prosperous" in May 1611, during the governorship of Sir Thomas Dale, and settled at the "Neck of Land" in Henrico County. In the census taken Feb. 1624-25 in Virginia, he made a muster roll of his own family, and in this he gives his age as 38 years and the name of the vessel he came on as the "Prosperous".

Alexander Browne in his "Genesis", vol. 2, page 212, says: "Thomas Harris, Gent., subscribed and paid 1.25 to the second Virginia Co. in January and November 1609. I think he was the person of the name who went to Virginia with Dale in 1611 and was living in Charles City, February 1625, with his wife aged 23. He may have been the son of Sir William Harris."

Sir Thomas Dale, with his charter as Governor of Virginia, sailed from Lands in England, March 27, 1611 with three ships, "The Star" "Prosperous" and "Elizabeth", carrying three hundred people, and this fleet anchored at Ft. Algernon, now Old Point Comfort, May 22, 1611, making the crossing in less than 60 days which was good sailing in those days. On Nov. 13, 1611, the "Prosperous" arrived in England on its return trip from Virginia.

Thomas Harris was a Captain in the Charles City Regiment in 1623, against the Indians, and was 2nd in command to Captain Thomas Osborne in an expedition in 1627. He served as a member of the House of Burgesses from Charles City County in 1638-47.

A Captain Nat'l Butler wrote a pamphlet entitled "The Unmasking of Virginia" and presented same to the King. This pamphlet reflected upon the officials of the King's Administration in Virginia, The House of Burgesses undertook to reply to it and presented a document entitled "The answer to An Information Presented unto Your Majesty by Capt. Nat'l Butler, entitled, The Unmasking of Virginia". Thirty-four members of the House of Burgesses signed it, and among them was Thomas Harris, who spelled his name Harries. (Burgess Journals, Vol. 1).

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AND THE REV. J. EDWARDS, D.D., F.R.S.

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Thomas Harris received a grant of 750 acres in Henrico, within Diggs Hundred, Nov. 11, 1635 (Nugents Abstracts, Page 304), Southward upon the land of Edward Gurnay, Northward upon land of Joanne Harris, his wife, West upon the river and East into the woods (Nugent's Abstracts, page 33). This land was regranted to him with the addition of 70 acres for the Adventure of his wife Adria, as her name does not appear in the grant.

(Ref. Library, Richmond Va. C-S-71 L 724)

This grant was as follows: (Ibid, Vol. I, pages 105, 146, 147)
Capt. Thomas Harris, 820 Acres, Henrico Co., Feb. 25, 1639-1638.

(Nugent's Abstracts, page 615) Commonly known as Long Field, beg. at a creek over against Capt. Martin E-S-E. toward Sermo-W-N-W upon the main river. Due as follows: 100 acres for his own personal adventure, 100 acres for the personal adventure of his first wife, Adria, as being ancient planters in the time of Sir Thomas Dale, and 620 acres for the transportation of 13 persons.

He received another grant of 400 acres, which was bequested by Ann Gargancy, widow of Edward Gurganey, Gent., who came in the second supply in 1608 (works of Capt. John Smith, pages 108, 411, 524). Edward Gurganey (Gourgainy) came to Virginia in 1608 a head of his family to prepare a home for them. As his land fell within the Governor's land, he transferred his holdings to Henrico. He died shortly after the Assembly of 1619, as did his wife as shown in a patent to Capt. Thomas Harris as follows: Same to Capt. Thomas Harris July 12, 1637 (Nugent's Abstracts, page 438). Confirmation. Due unto the said Capt. Harris as followeth: 400 Acres being granted to Edward Gurganey by order of Court bearing date October 1, 1617, from the late Treasurer and Company and bequeathed by Ann Gurgancy widdows and relict of the said Edward to the said Thomas Harris as by her last will, bearing date 11th of February A.D. 1619-20 appeareth.

Thomas Harris married first in England Adria Gurganey, b 1598, daughter of Edward and Anne Gurganey. She died before Sept. 11, 1626, for at a General Assembly or Court held on that day, one Rebecka Graye aware and examaneth, "sayeth that ye good wife wright did tell this deponent that she told Thomas Harris he should bury his first wife being then betrothed unto him, which came to pass" (Va. Mag. Vol. 26, Page 13). The land grant records as quoted above show Adria Harris to be an Ancient Planter, which means that she came to Virginia before April 1616. She was listed among the "Maids" when returning on the "Marmaduke" in 1621, age 23, from a visit to England, where she probably had left her oldest children, because of the hard life in Virginia. With them in Virginia was Anne Woodlief, their kinswoman, age 7, and Elizabeth, a servant, age 15 years, who came in 1620, in the "Margaret" and John" (Eotton's Lists, pages 170-203-Rettan's Ref. H-187-5-H 739).

"Original Lists of Persons of Quality who went from Great Britain to the American Plantations". - Page 203, The Muster of Thomas Harris, b 1587, d Will proved Henrico, Feb. 1, 1678.

Thomas Harris, age 38 in the Prosperous in May 1611. Adria, his wife, age 23 years in the Marmaduke in Nov. 1621. Anne Woodlane, their kinswoman age 7 years. Servant Elizabeth, age 15 years, in the Margaret and John 1620.

Thomas Harris and first wife Adria Gurganay married in England. Their children: 1. Major Robert Harris, b 1615, came to Virginia, m a widow Mary (Claiborne) Rice, daughter of William Claiborne. 2. Mary, b 1625, m Colonel Thomas Ligon of Henrico County; Their child - Richard Ligon.

Thomas Harris married second, Joanne Osborne, after 1626. (Joanne was the daughter of Capt. Thomas Osborne, who was born in England about 1580 and came to the Colony of Virginia in 1619 on the "Bona Nove" of 200 tons, which sailed in Aug. 1619 with 120 persons.)Capt. Osborne settled in 1625 at Coxindale on the South side of the James River in what is now Chesterfield County. He was a Plantation Supervisor in 1619, Chief in Command in the Indian War of 1627; Viewer of Tobacco Crops 1639; in 1635 he took Patents for land on Proctors Creek. He was a Gentlemen Justice of the Peace in 1631 and a member of the House of Burgesses in 1629-1633. Capt. Osborne was married in England. His wife's name is unknown. Known issue: 1. Joanna Osborne; 2. Thomas Osborne.

Known issue of Capt. Thomas Harris and his 2nd wife Joanne Osborne: 1. Thomas Harris, d unmarried 1679; 2. Major William Harris, b 1629, d 1678. He m. Lucy Stewart; 3. Edward Harris.

Thomas Harris Jr. d unmarried in Sept. 1679. His will proved in Henrico Co. 1679, leaves his property to his sister-in-law Lucie and Cousin (nephew) Richard Ligon.

MAJOR ROBERT HARRIS

Major Robert Harris, one of the family, was born in Wales about 1645, d in 1701. He was married in 1651 to Mrs. Mary Rice (nee Claiborne and settled on the James River in Virginia. She was the daughter of William Claiborne and his wife Elizabeth Butler, who were married in 1621.

NOTE: The Virginia Historical Magazine, Vol. 1, Page 313 has the following in regard to the Claibornes of England: "The Ancient family from which Col. William Claiborne, the famous Colonial Secretary of Virginia, descended and derived its name from the Manor of Claiborne in Westmoreland near the River Eden. The manor is named in Doomday Book in 1086 and the family was for many generations Lords of the Place and of Brumpton, Cundale and others. He was born in 1586, came to Virginia in 1621, being a member of a distinguished family, was sufficiently influential to obtain large grants of land from King Charles I. In 1628 was appointed the first Colonial Secretary of the Colony of Virginia and a member of the Council. He was sent to England by the Commonwealth of Virginia as a special Commissioner to resist the encroachment of Lord Baltimore, who claimed a large portion of Virginia as well

as Maryland; was successful in this matter, but lost financially by his public spirit, however, was finally reimbursed by the State of Virginia (in a measure) for his losses during the Baltimore negotiations; was sent by Cromwell and his parliament to negotiate terms with the Colonies. In 1643 the King made his Treasurer for life. In the Northampton Records, April 1653, is an order referring to the worshipful Colonel William Claiborne, Governor. He d 1678. His father is buried in the Claiborne Church in Yorkshire England, tomb can be seen there now.

To Robert Harris and his wife, Mrs. Mary Rice (nee Claiborne), was born in 1652 a son, William. Their home was near Weyanoke Va. The son William, married Temperance Overton, 12-24-1670 (The daughter of William Overton and his wife, Mary Walters, of Glen Cairn, Hanover County Virginia).

NOTE: The said William Overton, b 12-3-1628, was a son of Colonel Robert Overton of England who distinguished himself at the Battle of Marston Moor; accompanied Oliver Cromwell to Scotland, 1650; commanded a brigade of Iron Sides at the Battle of Dunbar. He was a soldier and a scholar, intimate friend of Milton, who celebrated his exploits in *Defensio Secunda*. He was a political prisoner for many years in Tower of London; was a voluminous writer of Philosophy and Religion (See Biographical Dictionary). The records show that the Overtons received patents of Virginia lands aggregating 4322 acres at various times. Nearly every family of this line has had a son named Overton for over three hundred years.

William Harris, who married Temperance Overton, d 3-8-1687. He was buried in an Old Colonial Church at Weyanoke, on James River, and a bronze tablet marked his resting place. The old Church long since going to ruine, on July 1, 1875, the tablet was found and moved to Norfolk Va., and placed in St. Paul's Old Church. Engraved on the tablet is the following: "Here lyeth ye body of William Harris, who departed this life ye 8th day of March 1687, aged 35 years.

From this emigrant sprang our American family. The blood courses in the veins of hundreds and hundreds of families, scattered all over America and elsewhere. The family as such is noted for courage, brains, patriotism and loyalty. Many have held and many now hold high positions of trust in various branches of learning, in the army, in the navy and in every calling and profession, lawyers, some humorous and learned writers and famous physicians.

To William Harris and his wife Temperance Overton was born three sons: Christopher, b 1671; Robert, b 1673, and Overton, b 1675.

Major Robert Harris, 2nd son of William Harris and his wife Temperance Overton, was born in Hanover Co. Virginia in 1686. He was in the House of Burgesses from Hanover Co. 1736-40-42, was appointed by the King as Surveyer of the new County of Louisa, which cut off from Hanover; was Justice of Peace of Louisa County.

He afterwards moved to Albermarle County, was one of the early settlers on Doyle's River, obtained patents for more than 3,000 acres in that vicinity, first entry made in 1750. Page 221 Rev. E. Wood's History of Albermale County. He was Vestry man of Fredericksville Parish a number of years. His son Tyree succeeded him. His will bears date of June 18, 1765, (dca 8-1-1765, see Will), probated 8-8-1765, recorded in Albermarle Co. Will Book No. 2, page 185, a copy of which is in William Harris Miller's Genealogy, Page 267.

The female descendants of Major Robert Harris are eligible to membership in the United States National Society of Colonial Dames, on account of his services as a member of the House of Burgesses.

January 13, 1720, Major Robert Harris was married to Mourning Glen, b 1702, d 1770; she was a remarkable woman, kind, generous, charitable, a devout christian, and much beloved by her acquaintances and offspring. Her children and descendants down through the generations have a daughter named Mourning Glen, showing their high estimation of her.

NOTE: Her borther, David Glen, was one of Capt. Herrod's company of thirty men who, on Jan. 2, 1777, went from Harrodsburg Ky. by McClennon's Fort (Georgetown), Blue Licks and Maysville, struck the Ohio River near the mouth of Cabin Creek, for gunpowder, which they obtained at a great risk, and returned with it to Harrodsburg, the oldest town in Kentucky.

To Major Robert Harris and his wife, Mourning Glen, were born 11 children as follows:

1. ANNE, born 3-31-1724, m John Dabney
2. CHRISTOPHER, b 2-5-1725, m (1) Mary Dabney 2-22-1745, (who was the daughter of Cornelius Dabney Sr. and his 2nd wife, Sarah Jennings, only daughter of Charles Jennings of England) To them were born 8 children. Christopher Harris, m (3) wife, Agnes McCord in 1762, 11 children were born. He died 1794 in Madison County Kentucky.
3. TYREE, b 4-8-1728, m (1) Elizabeth Chapman, m (2) Mary Anne Simpson. He had 8 children. He succeeded his father as Vestryman of Fredericksville Parish Va. Went to Orange Co. North Carolina and became High Sheriff in 1766-67 under General Tyron, the Colonial Governor, was present and took part with him at the Battle of Alamance, 5-;8-1771. His Will is on record, Caswell Co. N.C., Sept. 1, 1789. (See Colonial Records of N.C.) Wheeler's History shows his character and his connection with the Regulator uprising, one of the factors bringing on the Revolution.
4. MARY, b 2-10-1729, m her cousin James Harris, who was b 1722, d 1792. To them were born 10 children. Their son Nathan was the father of Honorable John T. Harris and Reverend William A. Harris, for many years Principal of the Female Seminary in Staunton Va. Their son Joel was the grandfather of Joel Chandler Harris, who wrote "Uncle Remus".

5. WILLIAM, b 3-15-1730, in Frederic Co. Maryland, m (1) Miss Mitchie, m (2) Miss Thompson, m (3) Hannah Jameson, d 1776.
6. MOURNING GLENN, b 3-27-1732, m John Jouett, who was a Captain of Virginia State Militia in Colonial War. A signer of the Albermarle Declaration of Independence, 4-21-1779. He had 2 children, 3 1808. The following is taken from Frederick J. Haskin's account of the son's (Jack Jouett) ride that saved Thomas Jefferson from capture and British prison: "Jack Jouett, his father, and 3 brothers were all Captains in the Revolutionary Army -- a record that it is said no other family made. The father was a friend and neighbor of Jefferson. The mother was of the Harris family and her given name was one to make moderns stop, listen and laugh -- Mourning -- a name that suggests that our colonial ancestors were as gloomy at christenings as at funerals."
7. LUCY, b 4-12-1734, m William Shelton, who was signer of Declaration of Independence of April 21, 1779, and d 1803.
8. SARAH, b 5-24-1736, m John Rodes 5-24-1756. He was born in Albermarle Co. Virginia, 11-16-1729, he was executor of the Will of his father-in-law (Major Robert Harris) which was probated in 1765. Their 2 children were Mary E. Rodes and Robert Rodes. Many of their descendants live in Kentucky.
9. Captain ROBERT, was the great-grandfather of Tyree Harris III, Attorney of Nashville Tenn.; b 3-8-1741, m 1762 Lucretia Brown, b 1746 (daughter of Benj. Brown Sr.) He was a Captain in the Revolution.
10. RACHEL, b 6-24-1744, m William Dalton.
11. FRANCIS ELIZABETH, b 1-27-1746, m Joel Crawford, their son William Crawford, was a United States Senator from Georgia, Minister of France, Secretary of Treasury under Pres. Monroe, and prominent candidate for Presidency in 1824.

The above records were secured from Rev. Edgar Wood's History of Albermarle Co.
