In 1878 Nathaniel Harris Morgan edited the Genealogy of James, and Sarah (Denison) Harris, 1640-1878, of Boston and New London, Conn. and their Descendents; I have taken up this work where he left off, and have run my own line to 1934. Making the discovery that there was Mayflower Ancestry, and wonderful Colonial records I have run all marriage lines back to the Emigrant Ancestor; I have had wonderful success making it possible for all aspiring Descendents to Mayflower, Colonial, and Patriotic societies, also the first encounter by the Pilgrims, Indian and Colonial wars to find all records under one cover; I was asked to place a copy in the Library of the Daughters of the American Revolution, at Washington, D. C. and I have complied. My hope is that some Descendent will take up where I left off and carry on.

### Harris

Abstract from New Lights on the Pilgrims story, by Thomas Mason of Wales and England, 1920.

Young James Harris was apprenticed in 1555 to his Uncle William Harris, Silk Weaver, at Broomhill, England, at the age of 17 years. Young James when taken to task by Priest Bonner for not attending Confession for one year, replied my sins are so numerous I could not enumerate them, where upon he was flogged with a cane by Bonner. Coming down to the days of the Mayflower, we find in Bradfords paper a mention of a Mr. Harris who was of great assistance in helping the Pilgrims to get located in the new Country.

Still later we have the record of James Harris Silk Weaver 1640 in Boston and a member of the Pilgrim Church, (Old South Church), there are possibly several generations not accounted for but from James Harris and his wife Sarah Benison of Boston the record is clear.

## The Harris Family.

The Harris Family is of Welch descent, but the progenitor of the line in New England emigrated from London, England, and to or near Boston in the early 1600. The cross marriages have been kept purely English, till the fourth generation when through the McCalls came Scotch blood. In 1772 Asa Harris and his wife Faith McCall Harris, and quite a few relatives namely Rogers, McCall and Harris and others who were from around Lebanon, Conn emigrated to and settled along the western Mass. and eastern border lines of New York. Asa and his family seem to have settled at or near Pittsfield, Mass. where Asa is buried and likely Faith also. Asa was in the Revolution with the Berkshire Men in the Revolution of 1776--American Ancestry says he died there.

The eldest Son also names Asa was in 17 Regiment Caanan, Kings district (now Columbia Co N. Y. ) The 1790 census gives Asa as at Caanan, with the wife and one child, named James.

Around 1790-1 the fifth child of Asa and Faith Harris was married to Polly (Mary) Roach, and we find the birth records of the six children at New Hartford, Onida Co. N. Y. after 1803 we find them at Bristol, Ontario Co. N. Y. and before 1805 we find both Asa and his brother James and Families at Harris Hill, Erie Co. N. Y. so names and still called for them and where they have had a tavern. Asa remained in the Militia after the Revolution and attained the rank of Colonel and died there (Harris Hill) 1812.

A marker was placed there for him by the Buffalo D. A. R. His son Asa was Captain in the war of 1812. James moved to Buffalo 1807 and started a tavern. The the Britttish burned buffalo the family took refuge at White Corners (now Hamburg) later to Buffalo and started another tavern and sawmill. James died in 1822, his widow Polly married second to Isaac Woodward



and lived and died at Hamburg in 1853 (80 years) The known  
descendants of James can be found in New York, Ohio, Indiana,  
Pennsylvania, Illinois, Florida, and California, Texas, and  
Kansas.

Administration papers were granted to the widow Elizabeth 15, Sept 1715 On April 6, 1711. Samuel Rogers deeds to my Daughter Elizabeth and her husband Asa Harris 12 acres of swamp land. Soon after the death of her husband the family moved to Saybrook Conn. In 1753 the son Asa then of Saybrook and his brother Ephriam of Lyme sold the above swamp land which they held undivided between them and the children of their deceased Sisters Annah Beebe, and Mercy Waterhouse.

Note. James moved with his parents to Pittsfield Mass. from Lebanon about 1771-2 thence to Albany Co N Y then to New Hartford Then to Bristol, Ontario Co thence to Harris Hill which still bears their name and then about 1809 to Buffalo and started a tavern and live stable, an abstract from the remembrances of an octogenarian states I stayed all night at the Harris tavern or ordinarily sleeping on an improvised bed in the main room during the night the door opened and a group of indians came in and with grunts laid down on the Puncheon floor before the fireplace and slept the rest of the night departed in the morning as they came, with grunts. They seemed to be on good terms with the Harris who they called Jim and who said they were plentiful and sometimes milliarous. When the British set fire to Buffalo the Harris family moved what they could on a three spring wagon to Hamburg, when the war was over returned to Buffalo where James died 1822 The widow Polly later married to Isaac Woodward and moved to Hamburg and died there.



Charlotte Mills Gray lived with her parents at the place where she was born the first ten years of her life, this place has been known at Cummins Mill, McGees, Mills McClures Mills, and Mills Mill, since the early history of the Erie Co, N.Y. It is located one mile west of Water Valley on the east side of the eighteenth mile creek, directly in the bend of the creek town of Hamburg. Here her parents and grandparents John and Betsy Mills owned farms, a grist mill, a saw mill. In 1846 she with her parents moved to the Lake shore road two miles directly west of Angola, N.Y. to her fathers purchase fifty acres of land, on which he erected dwellings barns and a saw mill on the banks of Delaware creek which runs through the farm. This farm was sold in 1888 to Joseph Ahlers His heirs still own (1927) the road has been moved back from the lake front and a village of summer residents has been built upon it. She lived here till her marriage in 1855

Americk Gray, was the fourth son of Isiah and Mary (Morgan) Gray He was born on the Erie road one mile west of Angola N.Y. His father came with his parents Abijah and Dolly (Foster) Gray, 1820 from Marthas Vineyard Duke Co, Mass. in which locality the family had lived since 1648 coming originally from Scotland. Americk was a farmer, carpenter, and cabinet maker, he was born Feb. 4, 1833 and died of typhoid fever Nov 16, 1867 in Quindaro, (now Kansas City,) where he is buried.

Augustus Ferdinand Unger came from a Prussian family of the Military class. Was educated at Heidelburgh University, having two older brothers who were officers in the Prussian Guards and married, the Mother Mary (who at this time was a widow) not liking any more sons in Military life helped him to escape out of the German Empire. The Family was a Breslau, Province of Siliasia. Having to go through Switzerland in going to and from the University, in the vacation of 1828 on reaching Switzerland he made his way to the coast embarking for America landing in New York city at the age of 14 years.

He apprenticed himself to a large tobacco firm and learned to grade tobacco and make cigars. At the age of 21 he became a citizen of U.S. in the New York Courts 1835. Later he went to Buffalo and took a position with the A. C. Athens & Co, Manufacturers and exporters of fine tobacco goods. The firm later became the Adams & Athens co and still later the James Adams and Co. Mr. Unger traveled by stage, by river boat, horse back or walked or any way he could get to the planters of the south to buy tobacco for the firm at Buffalo. In 1842 he returned to Germany to visit his mother. She died before he reached Germany and shortly after he returned to America he sent money for a monument and as far as known never communicated with any of the family afterward. In 1849 in company with Buffalo men, namely John Eylesburgh, John Boughman, Mr. Titus, Mr. Philips, John Severance who made the trip overland to California by way of Galveston, Texas to the Gold Fields, staking claims near what is known as Stockton and near a river, remained about two years suffering untold hardships and returned by way of Cape Horn. On his return the family moved to Lockport N Y remaining there one year, feeling that there were possibilities in Indiana moved by way of Lake Erie and the Wabash Canal to Fort Wayne, Ind. in 1852.

Here on East Collumbia Street he started the First Cigar factory in Fort Wayne. He later moved over on Calhoun St in the north east of the Alley between Collumbia and Main st. (The Portried shoe store is at this time occupying the building.) The Peter Kisser store was across the alley south. A friendship was established that lasted till death.

In 1857 he sold the factory to Trauerman and Desauer, who later sold to Henry Ortleib. A hand carved wooden Indian stood on the side walk which Mr. Unger brought from Buffalo, it went with the store and in 1928 was standing in front of a store on south Calhoun St. The family Home on corner of Lafayette and Washington st was also sold and they bought the Cooper farm nine miles out on the Bluffton road where they moved and Mr. Unger lived till he died in 1884. Across the road from them was a tavern or road house where LaFountaine (part Indians) lived, shortly it changed into the hands of Salvator Pelkey (Peltier) was a pretty bad place of drunkenness and fights. Later Pelkey moved nearer Fort Wayne, Across from the Sand Point road.

This tavern was half way stopping place between Fort Wayne and



Bluffton, by the stage coach which also brought mail. Mr. Unger had been appointed Post Master shortly after moving and the stage driver layed the sacks under his feet while driving and brought it in to Mr. Unger and he sorted out what belonged there and placing the rest in the sack handed it to the driver. There was no town nearer than Fort Wayne, so it was known at the Little River Post Office. Hence the queer birth place of the youngest child. There was a river running through the Cooper farm known as the Little River and on the hill where the house stood had at one time been an indian camp and was known as Camp Green, there was a good sized spring between the house and River and across the river on a hill in the south west corner was an indian grave yard Every spring plowing there was found some articles of indian wares. The writer remembers a bushel basket of arrow heads and several tomahawks all of which after Mr. Ungers death was taken to Chicago by brother Charlie. Great hardships were experienced and in case of sickness it took one day to go to Fort Wayne and another to come back on horseback. In the winter months Mr. Unger made cigars for the Buffalo firm and also for the firm in Fort Wayne. The trade name of the cigar was the Flora Beele a pure Havanna. Mr. Unger was a great student and was educated beyond the average and used scientific methods in farming, and his great delight was in taking great care of an orchard which had its origin in seeds planted by John Chapman, whom the Coopers said stayed there quite frequently. There was more money made every year on the orchard than on the rest of the farm.

In 1884 Mr. Unger died and the wife Sylvia never became reconciled to his death and died four years later at the home of her daughter Alice in Fort Wayne where she had gone on a visit. Her death was sudden Both are buried in Prairie Grove Cemetery.

**HISTORY** The following story of Guy Wakeley was given to the writer by Dr. John Gray of Buffalo and is by the daughter, Mrs. Harriet Wakeley Ewers and his daughter in law Mrs. William Wakeley in April 1927. The story is founded on hearsay as neither of them ever saw Guy Wakeley.

Guy Wakeley was born and reared in the vicinity of White Corner, now Hamburg N Y He was lame and walked with a cane. The lameness was caused by a defective ankle injured while jumping in boyish sports when a small lad. By occupation he was a school teacher, teaching in the vicinity of White corners and Riley, Ohio. The lameness prevented his enlisting in the Civil war. It is supposed he was working at the hospital when he died.

Eleazer and Patty did not move to White Corners till after 1844 Eleazer was a cordwainer in Buffalo that year (directory of Buff.) Mary Alice and Sylvia Amelia were vest makers and lived at home till their marriage in May 1844. These girls were married with a double ceremony in North Church by the Rev. William Ainsley with two hundred guests at the home in Buffalo. William, Guy and a little girl named Anna were born there. Anna dying at about six. A letter from Sylvia to her husband then in California states she and Mary and the children went to Hamburg to see mother. The letter was dated 1850.

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## Mayflower

Between July 22 and August 11 1620. The Pilgrims took their leaves and farewells, and Winslow records we are only going aboard, The Ship lying to the quay and are ready to sail; The wind being fair we gave them (our friends) a volley of small shot (Musketry) and three pieces of ordinance, and lifting up our hands to each other and our hearts to God and for each other and to the Lord our God we departed; Goodwin says of the departing, The hull was wrapped in smoke thro which was seen at the stearn the great white flag of England doubly dissected by the great red cross of St George. A token that the Emegrants had resumed their dearly loved nationality.

Far above them at the main was the union jack of new device. And after 11 years of banishment for conscience sake from their motherland shores. This little band of exiles as true to their native as to their God, raised the flag of England above their own little vessel and under its folds set sail. To plant themselves for a larger life in the new\*~~fold~~ World. And thus opens up the log of othe Speedwell out of Delfthaven&Holland. and the western Ho of the Pilgrim fathers.

The Speedwell, Consort of the Mayflower, starting from Delfthaven, Holland. and the Mayflower from Plymouth, England. On account of the Speedwell leaking badly all lading was transfered to the Mayflower and overloaded made its way to America. On reaching land at Plymouth, Mass. on Saturday Nov 11 1620. The Passengers in cramped up quarters and positions for 113 days.

Bradford in his records says being thus arrived in good Harbor and brought safe to land, They fell upon their knees and blessed God of Heaven; who had brought them over ye vast and furious seas and delivered from all ~~per~~ ye perils and miseries thereof and again to set their feet on ye firm and stable earth theirs proper element.

## Howland

John Howland was possibly Kin to Carver and had aparently been in the family some years, It is evident he was more than a man servant

It is noticeable that Howland signed the Compact befor such men as Hopkins, and the Tilleys, Cook, Rogers, and Priest, which does not indicate much of the serkant relation; He was of the Essex family being born about 1593. dying 1673. On account of persecution had gone with the Pilgrims to Holland about twelve years before embarking for America in 1620. And was probably taking care of Carvers family in coming over;

In coming over John Howland fell overboard and was nearly drowned He was the 13 signer of the Mayflower Compact; Was assistant Governor 1632-3; Dept to the General Court 1641-6.

Was in the first encounter with the indians under Myles Standish at Meadow Creek Dec 3, 1620. three days before the landing of the Pilgrim band;

He was born in Essex Co, England. was the son of Bishop Richard Howland (who served at the funeral of Queen Mary of the Scotch) who was the son of John (2) of John (1) of Essex Co, New Port Pond England.

Master John Tilley silk weaver having twice married, and had a daughter by the first wife some 14 years of age, must have been over 55 years when he sailed on the Pilgrim ship. His birth and antecedents are from Essex Co., England. He was of the Leyden congregation. Bridget Van Der Veld was the second wife by whom he had no children.

Elizabeth Tilley daughter of the first wife was possibly 14 years when her parents died in 1621. Historians for many years erroneously called Elizabeth the daughter of Carver, but this has been corrected from Governor Bradfords papers, in his papers of 1640 Bradford says John Howland married Elizabeth daughter of John Tilley, and they are both now living and have 10 children now all living; And there oldest daughter hath four children; And there second daughter hath one child now all living, and the other of three are of marriageable age and so fifteen are come of them.

All descendants of Aea and Faith (McCall) Harris are eligible to Mayflower ancestry through the mother of Faith, Hannah Otis.



A Bible which belonged to John the Martyr is carefully preserved in the Archives of Alfred University Alfred, N.Y. This Bible Tradition tells us was the property of John the Prebendary of St Pauls of London who was burned at the stake.

James Rogers a descendant brought the book to this Country in a 1635; It had he said been concealed in a feather bed during the rest of Mary's reign, He used it as a pillow in his sojourn's and travels in the Wilderness as a sort of Talisman to protect him from nightly attacks from the Indians.

Descendants of the James Rogers line claims the Martyr line as theirs while dates are missing which would prove it conclusively still neither can it be disapproved so we have a right to our tradition as well as others.

The Roger real estate holdings were very large, The first grant of land within the Mohegan tribe holdings was by Sachem Uncas to James Roger There was always a strong friendship between the Mohegan tribe and the Rogers family. James Rogers was a Baker and carried on the most extensive business in Foreign and Domestic trade of any man in New London. He baked for the Soldiers. Throughout his last days he was subject to fines and imprisonment for nonconformity to the established Church.

Jacob Hindman died in Talbot Co. Maryland 1765-6. Was a wealthy land owner of the English Scotch descent, was a high sheriff of Talbot So. A vertryman of the parish. Son William was born 1 April 1734, Dorchester and was destined for the bar. Was entered at Inns court London where he completed his law studies. Returning to this country was admitted to bar in 1765. The next year on death of his father he inherited a large landed estate and from the beginning he threw the weight of his means and support to the cause of the Patriots 1776. In 1775 he was sec. of Talbot Co. committee of observation and was selected to carry out the resolves of the council of safety which was the supreme power of Maryland. He was also member of the State Convention. Treas. of the eastern shore of Maryland 1775-7. Was elected to the first senate of Maryland 1777. Re-elected 1781 served till 1784 when he became member of the continental congress 1788. 1789-92 was of the executive council. On resignation of Joshua Senny he was elected to fill unexpired term and in second Congress served from 1793-1799. Was defeated as a Federalist in the canvas in next election and was returned to the State legislature in Dec. 1800 Elected by that body to fill unexpired term of James Lloyd. Filled this place till 1801 then retired from public life and engaged in agriculture pursuits. A memoir of his life was published by Samuel Harrison. M D Baltimore Md. 1880.

We next find that James took up 200 acres land in Lancaster Co Pa 1738 This is now known as Franklin Co. Pa. Archives, 3 series, Vol. 24, p 427.

John Hindman owned 110 acres Hamilton tp. Franklin Co. Pa 1782 same in 1792. Pa series 2 Vol 20 25 p 786 439-21 John Private 8 class 2 Batt. Cumberland Militia Pa. Com-by Col. Samuel Culberson Sept 12, 1782 Rev. War.






The last will and testament of James was drawn up on the 1st of Sept 1804. Was sick at time. Probated 1 Jan 1805 and is at the Chambersburg Court House Pa. Was possessor of 3 sections of land, two in Pa and one in Steubenville, Ohio. Recommends that farms be sold in Pa and wife Mary and youngest son William occupy the farm in Ohio and that the exscutors buy land in Wayne Co Ohio for James and Samuel. Gives each of grandchildren 25 Pds. There is no records of any others but James the 5th son. (patriot)

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Rocky Springs Church or Falling Springs, by D.A.R.  
at Chambersburgh.

Rocky Spring church was founded by Scotch Irish of presbyterian faith in early 1800. Still preserved and kept up By D A R with its high pulpit sounding board and high pews with doors one of which is pew no 44 is eared the name James Hindman Patriot. The Rev. Craighead on appealing to congregation to stand by the Colonies in their right to govern themselves. One old Scotch lady rose to her feet and pointing her finger at the preacher said--Stop, I just want to tell ye if ye have such a purty boy as I have in the war ye no be so keen for fighting, quit talking and gang yourself to the war, yer always preaching to the boys about it but dinna think ye be very likely to gang yourself. Rev. Craighead answered her I will go. The whole congregation arose and declared their intnetion to follow their pastor who led them from the building and later joined Washington in New Jersey, of which was James Hindman. He is buried in the cemetery which adjoins the church. It is four miles North of Chambersburg on the road to Kokbury. Stands on limestone Knoll from which at the base flows a stream of pure spring water, sufficient to furnish the motive power for a grist mill a few yards away. It is this spring issuing out of rock which the church takes its name. A high stair case leads to the pulpit and contains a stand used by a precenter. In isle are communion tables on which side the communicants were seated. There are 58 pews with the straight backs high enough that a child's head could not reach the top and has panned doors on which are buttons fastened on the inside. On the pews are the names of the ones who occupied them. These sturdy Scotch Irish are the names of those whose services helped to make a nation and were in the victories of Trenton and Princeton and under General Wayne at Stony Point and with Arnold in the invasion of Canada and still others were made prisoners at New York and a captivity that was cruel. Thousands of people visit this church every year interested in the historical records. It would not seem right to omit these same patriots were in the battle of Brandy Wine, Monmouth and German town, where they were brought suddenly to encounter with trained men and the well equiped forces of the enemy.

James Hindman 5th son of James and Mary (patriot) as early as 1809 came from Franklin Co. Pa and settled on land in Franklin Tp. Wayne Co. Ohio where he proposed to make his future home. After clearing a portion of the land he returned to Franklin Co. his native estate where in 1812 he married Ruth Crunkleton, daughter of Robert, of Antrim Tp. At once started with his bride for the far west Wayne Co. Ohio. Owing to war 1812 and Indian troubles in this region they stopped with his older brother in Columbiana Co. Rented a farm and stayed till 1816. Things being quiet they came to Wayne Co. Ohio and here lived on the remainder of their lives. James had an inclination for military affairs and was Capt of the first militia in that Co. Later became Major of 1st Reg. and later Col. Was a member of the Masonic Fraternity and politics was a Jacksonian Democrat. He and wife are buried in the Apple Creek cemetery. Old homestead, which was from the Gov. is still in possession of one of the descendants, Ira Hindman and is one of the finest farms around that section of the country. Quite few of descendants live around there and still attend services at the Apple Creek Church which the pioneers of the Penn. Valley founded is of Presbyterian faith and mostly of Scotch Irish descent. Note, 1930.---Ira Hindman is dead the the children still own the farm which is now a State experimental farm.

## Frederick Brown Gen.

In the year 1812 Frederick Brown and son John came to Wayne Co. Ohio and entered 1200 acres of land near where Apple Creek now stands, improved a portion of it and in 1814 moved to it from Lancaster Co. Pennsylvania.

The following is a relic of the Apple Creek Church and believed to be the first temperance pledge signed west of the Ohio River.

Wooster Tp. Wayne, Co. Ohio.

We the undersigned, believing that spiritous liquors as a beverage is productive of evil, pledge ourselves to abstain from the use thereof; and we therefore agree that we will assist each other in our heavy work; such as harvesting, log rolling, and the erecting of buildings.

He was a devout Presbyterian and he and his sons and grand sons were members in the Apple Creek Church at different times, and some of his descendants through his son George still worship in the old church. The exact spot of the burial spot of Frederick is not known, as the church cemetery was not incorporated till 1817 and before that the burials were made on farms adjoining where Apple Creek now stands. Possibly later on when the wife died he was moved to the cemetery.

The first will probated in Wayne Co. was that of Frederick Brown. Dated 23, Aug 1816. Attested by Samuel Hindman and Daniel Kirkpatrick, probated 1st Oct. 1816. He willed his proceeds of 150 acres to the support of the ministry of the church during his wife's natural life, which terminated in 1830.
