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PREFACE

In January, 1934, I became interested in genealogy. Since then, through correspondence and visits with relatives, I have obtained the old records and letters reproduced herein.

I am attempting to obtain more of such records with the intention of publishing facsimiles of those that will throw light on our early ancestry. This seems a possible way to overcome the difficulties in tracing early relationships caused by the destruction, during the Civil War, of many records in Hanover County, Virginia.

This record is not to be considered as a finished work, but as a preliminary one, sent out for correction, and to obtain additional information.

Please send me photostat copies of similar records of the early Virginia Andersons and kindred families, or the addresses of those owning such records.

I am including in this record Anderson families of Colonial Virginia which may or may not be related to ours, as there is no way of knowing who are related or who may have records. The more descendants I reach the more apt I am to obtain records, so I shall greatly appreciate receiving, where lacking, full addresses of all living persons listed herein, and of those who may be descendants of those listed.

I shall greatly appreciate receiving the following information which I hope to publish at a later date.

Kindly send me corrections and additions to this record covering the descendants, or those thought to be descendants, of Robert Anderson I. I am not attempting to list all the de-

scendants of the other lines, only giving enough to show intermarriages.

When sending me such information kindly include, where possible, the following: Names of parents, list of their children, references where further information can be found; place and date of birth, school or college attended, also date of graduation; date and place of death, name and location of cemetery; war record, business, etc. If exact dates are not known give approximations, where possible, with "about" before the date.

In listing children, where dates are lacking, state whether or not the correct order of birth is given.

Where a person, marrying into the family, is a descendant of any line shown in this record, trace back his descent to an ancestor given in the record. Where one is not so related give references (book, volume, and page) where his ancestry can be found. If no such reference is known, give the name of the parents and grandparents, and where they were from.

It is not necessary to use my system of symbols, but you may find my abbreviations useful.

In this record symbols are used to designate individuals. Should you have occasion to write me regarding an individual with such a symbol, please give the symbol as well as the name.

These symbols consist of digits and letters. The last character of a symbol represents, where known, the position of the individual among the children of the parent whose line is given. 1 represents the oldest child, 2 the second born, etc., 0 being considered as 10, a as 11, b as 12, etc. One character is used for each generation. Where the order of birth is unknown the last letters of the alphabet are used. Capital letters

are used where I believe the order of birth is correct; 1, 2, 3, etc., a, b, c, etc., indicate certainty; Z, Y, X, and z, y, x, etc., indicate doubt. Where the symbols show this doubt and you can positively give correct order of birth, kindly do so.

The characters preceding the last in any symbol is the parent's symbol. I have used s to z as the symbols of the children of Robt. Anderson II, as given by E. L. Anderson on his chart, and in A5. So any individual having a symbol starting with s, t, u, v, w, x, y, or z will presumably be a descendant of Robt. Anderson II.

My symbol is v6745 being the fifth child of my father whose symbol is v674; he was the fourth child of my grandfather whose symbol is v67; my great grandfather's symbol is v6, he being the sixth child; and the symbol of my great great grandfather is v, the dates of birth of his brothers (and sisters, if he had any) being unknown.

Symbols are given before the individual's name.

Abbreviations, in brackets, immediately after a name refer to publications listed at the end of this Record.

Roman numerals or letters after these abbreviations indicate the volume, and the numbers after p. indicate page. A star * after the abbreviated reference to a publication shows that the individual's portrait is given in the publication.

These abbreviations, as well as initials of individuals which follow the list of publications are also used to show where I obtained my information. A star * after an individual's name indicates he furnished information regarding his immediate family.

(v675) Edward L. Anderson, (v691) Gen. T. M. Anderson, and (v697) Dr. Charles Anderson have written of our early ancestors and do not agree. Edward L. Anderson gives reasons for his conclusions, while the ancestry back

of Robert III in the accounts of Gen. T. M. Anderson and Dr. Charles Anderson, appear to me conjectures arrived at without the careful investigation made by E. L. Anderson. I am reproducing herein the family chart of Edward L. Anderson, and articles appearing in the *Richmond, Va. Standard* of 1881, mostly by B. A. Brock.

I give below the account of our early ancestry given by Edward L. Anderson in (A5 p. 3-10) "The Andersons of Gold Mine":

"In the first half of the seventeenth century there were several families of the name of Anderson in eastern Virginia.

"Owing to the destruction or loss of most of the records, it is impossible in these days to state the relationship existing between these families, but from the few remaining registers it appears that many of them held such official positions as to warrant that they were persons of means, influence and social distinction, and it is probable that most of the early Andersons were of kinship. (Charles City, York, 1642.)

"On the 4th of July, 1635, Richard Anderson, aged 17, left England for the colonies, and was followed July 31st of the same year by Richard Anderson, aged 50 years. These were probably father and son, who for prudential reasons took a dangerous crossing in different vessels. Both had subscribed to the oath of allegiance and supremacy and to that conformable to the discipline of the Church of England, and it is certain that the safe arrival of either might establish a family of wealth and worth, a great addition to a struggling colony. There can be little doubt that these Richards were the progenitors of the Hanover Andersons. The dates correspond with those whose ancestry we seek; the repetition of the name Richard for many generations, and the early appearance of their descendants in the magistracy, councils and parish vestries, as well as the marriages of the nearest descendants with such families as the Massies,

the Cloughs, the Poindexters, the Overtons, the Garlands, the Dabneys and the Sheltons, are strong evidences that the two Richards were men who were the predecessors of a distinguished family.

"The earliest Anderson to whom the Gold Mine family may be positively traced is:

"ROBERT ANDERSON I, d. 1712, aged about 72 years, who in the deed April 16, 1683, Land Office, book 7, p. 272, was grantee of 727 acres in New Kent for the importation of fifteen persons; and in November, 1686, from the Parish Book of New Kent he is shown to have been a vestryman of St. Peter's until the parish of St. Paul was cut off in 1704, in which latter parish he remained a vestryman until his death in 1712. This Robert Anderson I, married Cecilia Massie of a well-known family which appeared in Virginia about the time of the arrival of the two Richards. It appears they had issue: Richard, David, Matthew, John, Thomas, Nelson, one of whom married a Garland, and two daughters, Mary and Cecilia. Richard was a magistrate in K. & Q. County, 1699-1702. David's son was an officer in the organized militia of New Kent in 1700. John was a great grandfather of Captain John 5th and 3rd Virginia, who married Mary, daughter of Robert III.

"ROBERT ANDERSON II, d. 1716, aged about 53 years. On October 23, 1690, 'Robert Anderson junior,' took over the 727 acres in New Kent, which has been relinquished by his father, for the importation of fifteen persons and on the same date received 1,200 acres for the importation of twenty-four persons, and in 1702 he appears as 'Robert junior,' a vestryman in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent.¹ In 1704, on

the formation of St. Paul's, New Kent County (after 1720 of Hanover County), he appears as Captain Robert Anderson, his father as Robert Anderson senior. At this time there were but the two Robert Andersons in the vestries of St. Peter's and of St. Paul's and in the deeds. This captaincy appears to be of a parish militia, which had its origin about 1612 when the whole colony was an armed camp. (See Meade.) At this time and long afterwards, we find the Overtons, Garlands, Massies and others regular members of St. Paul's vestry. Robert Anderson II, married Mary Overton (sister of Capt. Jas. Overton) (1688-1749), of St. Paul's vestry, daughter of William Overton, who was born in England, 3rd of December, 1628, and Elizabeth Waters, daughter of Ann Waters of St. Sepulchre, London (1697).

"Robert Anderson II (d. 1716) and Mary Overton (d. about 1734) had issue as the deeds and parish records show, Richard, James, Garland, Matthew, David of Albemarle, Robert of Goldmine, Nathaniel, Charles, John, and possibly two daughters, Charity and Sarah. Robert II was Justice in New Kent in 1714. His brother, Richard, was a magistrate in King and Queen County, 1699-1702. Of these sons, David married Elizabeth Mills of English parentage, removed to Albemarle County and left many descendants who are well known throughout the Southern states. Overton Anderson, his grandson, died in 1809. * * * Samuel married a New; Charles married Janet Claiborne. John was the father of 'Cousin Jack,' who married Mary, sister of Col. Richard C. Anderson. Matthew was Burgess in place of John Syme, in 1734. He was a man of marked ability and good judgment and was greatly valued by his family and associates. He married Mary, daughter of George Dabney. His tombstone and that of his wife and only child stand in the churchyard in Gloucester.

* * * *

"The early Andersons settled in York Coun-

¹NOTE--V8 does not give either Robert on the Vestry of St. Peter's, but mentions Robert Anderson in 1686; Jno. Andrenson, Jno. Andrewson and Rob't Andrewson in 1689; Robert Anderson Jun'r in 1703. Among others at a meeting appeared "Capt. Rob't Anderson * * * in trustee for Saint Paul's pr'sh at ye Brick Church in St. Peter's pr'sh ye 29th Aug't, 1704" and signed Rob't Anderson Jun'r, p. 81 and 83. On Nov. 26, 1750, Mr. Matthew Anderson, who was present as a vestryman on Oct. 31, 1747, was appointed Church Warden in the Room of Mr. George Webb.—W.P.A.

ty. By the division of New York in 1654, they found themselves in New Kent, then in 1720 their homes were in Hanover when that county was taken from New Kent, and this without a move upon their part; later other changes took place, but Hanover has for generations been looked upon as the home county.

"The Goldmine plantation was named from a creek which flowed through it and emptied into the South Anna River, a southern branch of the Pamunkey, St. Martin's Parish, Hanover County."

The following is taken from the records (C. A.) of (v6c) Gov. Charles Anderson: "April, 1878, went with Edward L. Anderson to Gold Mines the paternal Estate on South Anna River and Gold Mine Creek 800 acres now owned by heirs of Joseph Tally, deceased, who bought in 1833 of Daniel Webster, who bought from —— Couch, who bought it of Robert Anderson's heirs, say in 1793. Mrs. Tally told us that an old lady, who heard him, said grandfather Robert Anderson had such a voice that he used to call John Fleming, a grandson of Col. John Symme, to go hunting with him. Rocky Mills, a noble estate and Col. Symme's place, is a mile away."

(v8Y31) William Travis Howard, Jr., writes me March 7, 1935, that he accompanied Edward L. Anderson and Gov. Charles Anderson on this visit.

The above statements from A5 of the parentage of Capt. John Anderson (cousin Jack) who married Mary, daughter of Robert III, are conflicting.

Goldmines is on the west side of Gold Mine Creek just north of Rockville, which is 20 miles northwest of Richmond on Highway 160. The Author visited Goldmines in Jan., 1936, and found it had been divided into a number of farms, and the old house replaced by one now occupied by Ben and Jake Wilshire. Near their house is a tombstone inscribed "Robert Anderson of Goldmines, born Jan. 1, 1712, died Dec. 19, 1792" and "Elizabeth Clough, wife of Robert Anderson, born April 3, 1722, died Nov. 10, 1779." Mr. Wilshire informed me this tombstone was placed there by Mr. Anderson about 58 years ago.

(x) Matthew, the son of Robert II, did not marry (DWV) Mary Dabney, but is supposed to have married (DX) Elizabeth Dabney. The (v3) Matthew Anderson, who married (DWV) Mary Dabney and is buried in the churchyard in Gloucester with his wife and child, was the son of Robert III.

Brock (R-24) gives the tradition that Thomas Anderson of Northumberland County, England, who established a shipyard in Gloucester, was the founder of the family in Virginia. Gen. T. M. Anderson also speaks of this and says he got his information from Robert Waller, a very aged gentleman he met in Williamsburg in 1866, who in his student days went to William and Mary College with a relative of ours. This must have been (v61) Richard Clough Anderson, Jr., W. M. '04.

Thomas Anderson, b. Feb. 10, 1733, d. Sept. 20, 1794, an architect from Northumberland, England, located in Gloucester Co. and married Frances Jones. He moved to Laurel Branch, near Verdun, Louisa Co., Va., in 1754. (See "Brief Biographies of Virginia Physicians of Olden Times" by Dr. L. B. Anderson, printed by The Richmond Clinic.) Verdun is near Ashland, Va., which is in the center of Hanover Co. It seems probable that Mr. Waller may have referred to this Thomas, who, I believe, is no relative of ours. Isabel Anderson, wife of (v6731) Larz Anderson, in her book, "Under the Black Horse Flag," gives Thomas as the father of Robert I, but she is not certain where she got this information.

The Journal of Samuel Davies (T I p. 111), who died in 1761, written in London, says: "Thursday, Feb. 14, 1754. Dined with Mr. Anderson of the South Sea House, a friendly, polite gentleman, and a secretary of the correspondents here with the Society for Propogating Christian Knowledge in Scotland. I find his uncle was the grandfather of the Andersons in Hanover."

Mr. Adam Anderson (W2 X 2nd Ser. p.

235), with whom Rev. Samuel Davies dined in 1754 was b. 1692, d. 1765, for 40 years clerk in the South Sea House. Ref. *Encyclopedia Britannica*.

Adam Anderson was probably a native of Aberdeen and his brother James was born there in 1680 (W2 X 2nd Ser. p. 235 and D I p. 371). Mrs. J. S. Watson sent me an abstract of Adam Anderson's will. She went to the Society for Propogating Christian Knowledge, Northumberland Av., London. Neither the will or their records gave any information that threw light on our ancestry.

Samuel Davies, if referring to our family, must have meant the generation of Robert Anderson III, for Robert II had been dead 38 years. The only Andersons to Virginia given in "Hotten's List of Emigrants to America 1600 to 1700," are: 1634, John Anderson, 20 years; 1634, Thomas Anderson, 18 years; 1635, Richard Anderson, 17 years; 1635, Richard Anderson, 50 years; 1679, Margaret Anderson in the Ketch Unity for Virginia; so it would seem that Robert Anderson I was born in America, although this is not certain as there undoubtedly were Anderson emigrants not on Hotten's List. Robert I may have emigrated from Aberdeen or he might have been the son of Richard Anderson, who, in 1635, at the age of 50, embarked for Virginia on the Merchants Hope, leaving a son in Aberdeen, who was the father or grandfather of Adam, as the latter may have referred to his great uncle. It is also possible, but very unlikely, that one of the younger emigrants was Robert's father, and later returned to Aberdeen and had a son, who was Adam's father. More definite information is needed before accepting Adam's uncle as our forefather as there may have been other Andersons in Hanover at that time, and it seems strange with such large families of boys, none of the known sons or grandsons of Robert I were named Adam. It is true a grandson was named James, possibly for his uncle James Overton, but no son was named James.

(v6731) Larz Anderson had Mr. Withington, an American living in London, who went down with the Lusitania, make an investigation seeking to trace our Anderson ancestry in Virginia and England, but the result was fruitless, after a number of years of effort.

Where issue is not given after an intermarriage in the following record, consult the line of the parent whose symbol is given in brackets.

Occasionally published records disagree with information furnished me by members of the family. Other errors may occur in this record where documentary proof is not given, and I shall appreciate their being called to my attention.

Sometimes symbols are used which will not be found in this volume under the line indicated by the first characters of the symbol, as "(05y4y) Col. Samuel Carr" on page 119. This shows he was a grandson of (05y) Barbara Overton, and that he will be given under her descendants in a later volume.

Whereas, said deceased by his last will and testament, proved in New Kent, did give and bequeath unto his son John Anderson, now of parish and county of Hanover, 30 pounds to buy him a tract of land, the said Mary Anderson for love and affection she bears to her son John Anderson, conveys to him a tract of land with plantation thereon containing 335 acres, which was bought of George Wilkinson as by deeds bearing date 13 and 14 Jan., 1719, and acknowledged in the Court of New Kent 14 Jan., 1719, lying in St. Paul's Parish, Hanover, adjacent to the upper moiety of said land purchased of said Wilkinson which is to be my son Charles Anderson's, conveyed to him by deed bearing date with these presents. Witnesses Thomas Crenshaw, Richard Lancaster, Sarah Harris, Bartelot Anderson. 5 April, 1734.

Mary Anderson (V4 VII p. 68) of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover Co., to her son Charles Anderson for 30 pounds currency as left him in the will of his father Robert Anderson, late of New Kent Co., etc. (see preceding deed), 335 acres in Hanover Co. 5 April, 1734. Vol. 1, p. 36.

John Anderson (V4 VII p. 68) of Hanover

Co. to his brother Nathaniel Anderson of same place, 1 acre in said County being a moiety of a tract which Mary Anderson bought of George Wilkenson and which she conveyed to said John Anderson by deed bearing date 23 March, 1733. Recorded 3 July, 1735. Vol. 1, p. 279.

w DAVID ANDERSON OF ALBEMARLE CO. (A1; R-30)

(V4 VII p. 115) Will of David Anderson of Albemarle County, 3 October, 1789; probated September Court, 1791. Sons William, Nathaniel and David, 300 acres in Hanover County; son Richard; to granddaughters Mary Johnson Anderson and Elizabeth Anderson, four slaves and increase which my youngest son Matthew Anderson, their father, has after his death; daughter Ann Minor and to her son Thomas, four slaves after the death of his mother; grandson Jack Anderson, son of Thomas Anderson, 465 acres in Hanover County; my daughter Sarah Hudson; son Edmund Anderson, land in Hanover whereon I formerly lived; son Samuel Anderson; grandson Anderson Barret; daughters Ann Minor and Sarah Hudson and their children; my wife Elizabeth and my sons David and Samuel to be exors. Codicil, 9 July, 1791. Mentions daughter Sarah Hudson and her husband Christopher Hudson and their children.

(From the above abstract one might suppose Ann Minor had a son Thomas mentioned in the will. This is not the case as can be seen in the complete will given on p. 32a).

Sons Edmund and Nathaniel Anderson; grandson Anderson Barrett; grandson Samuel, son of my son Samuel An-

Assembly of Virginia passed in 1782 to her, household furniture, etc. To her for life my leasehold estate which I purchased of Richard Foster Esq. at Vauxhall, afs'd called Belmont House, trusting my wife & promises of her good father that they will make proper provision for our niece Maria Gist Anderson whom my wife took an infant and adopted with the fondness of a mother. S'd leasehold, after death of my wife, to my nephew Francis Anderson, but if he die s. p. under 22, same to my niece Maria Gist

Anderson, but if she die s.p. same to be sold & money equally among my residuary legatees. Ex'ors to convey to Samuel Gist Esq. of Gower Street in fee, two tracts of land I purchased of ex'ors of John Bickerton dec. & Thomas Massie, the one in Hanover Co. of 600 acres, the other in Goochland Co. of 2,285 acres, both in Virginia, s'd. S. Gist to pay money I gave etc., otherwise same to be sold & s'd S. Gist to pay rent for time they have been cultivated for him. Ex'ors to sell tract in Louisa Co. which I purchased of Robert Harris & my share of lands in Albemarle Co. which descend to me under will of my grandfather Mills, both in Virginia. Ex'ors to sell my 2 houses in the Strand and Holy Well Street in City of Westminster. Negroes given me by my late father, to my mother for life she to treat them humanely & kindly. On her death all to be set free. £200 to my nephew Anderson Barret. Purchase money of s'd estates etc. & rest of estates to be divided into three. First part to my brothers and sisters that were living on 25 Dec. last. Equally, one having died since already, shares of those dead at my death to their children. The other two-thirds to Samuel Gist Esq. & my wife Mary in trust till my nephew Francis Anderson be 22 to employ same in trade either on present plan in partnership with Messrs. Birkett Shore & Keeves or otherwise. Profits for wife for maintenance of s'd nephew & niece M. G. Anderson.

Second third part to s'd nephew at 22 but if he die to my niece M. G. Anderson at 21, otherwise at share 1. Part three on 1 June 1800 to go as part 1, meanwhile to be used in trade. My wife Mary A. to be ex'trix, my friend Samuel Gist Esq., my brothers Nathaniel A. & Thomas A., my brother in law Dabney Minor & my nephew Overton Anderson to be ex'ors. Signed in the city of London G.B. Witns. Joseph Bowden, No. 6 Fower Dock, Henry Smith Shore, No. 10 Crosby Square, Aiskew Birkett, Rodney Street, Pentonville, Lionel Bradstreet, No. 10 Crosby Square Bishopsgate Street.

William Anderson, a native of Virginia, removed to London where he became a merchant and acquired a considerable estate.

A copy of William Anderson's Will is on file in the Virginia Archives Department, among the papers laid before the General Assembly in connection with the emancipation of the Anderson negroes.

His line evidently lapsed as the crown advertised for heirs (R-30 I.).

My will and desire is (that if necessary) my tract of land on Dan River in Patrick County, contg. 5000 a. also my part of two other tracts on Little Reed Island Creek in Grayson Co. each contg. 1000 a. my part of which is 1057 $\frac{1}{2}$ a. and the residue, say 942 $\frac{1}{2}$ a. belonging to Zachariah Stanley after payment of money he owes me, there having been a co-partnership between us in locating lands, we having located 12,115 a. on equal shares, 5115 a. of which I have transferred in the registration office to Richd. Chelton, by direction of sd. Stanley in letter to me in Decr. 1797. We also located 500 a. in Grayson Co., half of which sd. Stanley is entitled to and the residue to assignees of Henry Martin, also a tract in Buckingham Co. on Rock Island Creek, contg. 181 a. being that purchd. from Exors. of my brother Thomas Anderson, dec'd. to be disposed of, or any part thereof deemed necessary by my exors. for purposes heretofore mentioned. Daughter Polly Mosby, negro boy John and tract of land in Buckingham Co. contg. 181 a. provided it should not be thought necessary by my exors. to sell same as above directed. Daughter of my son Wm. Anderson and to any other female children he may have by his present wife, all my lands in Patrick and Grayson Counties, that may not be sold by my exors. &c. Son Wm. Anderson, my Cherry Desk and Bookcase, being same I purchased at sale of his grandfather Carr. Daughter in law, Elizabeth Lawrence, negro girl Rose; residue of estate both real and personal not heretofore disposed of I lend to my wife Sarah Anderson during her life or widowhood. Son Nathaniel Anderson forever at death of his mother or her intermarrying again, all my estate both real and personal, lent her. W. B. 5 p. 240.

"The data herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, W. 9701, based upon the Revolutionary War service of Nathaniel Anderson.

"The date and place of this soldier's birth and names of his parents are not given.

"Nathaniel Anderson entered the service sometime in February, 1776, was a Lieutenant in the Virginia Line in the Revolutionary War and served "upwards of three years;" no further details of service given.

"Nathaniel Anderson married December 2, 1787, in Hanover County, Virginia, Sally Jones; their marriage was recorded in the County Clerk's Office of said Hanover County. He died in February, 1799, in Caroline County, Virginia.

"Nathaniel Anderson's widow, Sally, married about a year after his death, one William Anderson, of Caroline County, Virginia, who was born August 4, 1773 (his relationship to Nathaniel not shown). William Anderson died in Caroline County, Virginia, June 14, 1836, and his widow, Sally, died August 28, 1840, in said Caroline County in the home of her son, Herbert Anderson, and Frances E. Anderson, whose age in 1850 was forty-five years (the relationship of Herbert and Frances E. Anderson not stated).

"Sally Anderson was survived by the following children:

"Herbert Anderson, the oldest son, whose father was William Anderson, was in 1850 aged fifty years and a Justice of the Peace for Caroline County, Virginia.

"Children continued—

"Armistead Anderson.

"Mary B., who in 1850 was the wife of one John Richardson or Richerson.

"Catharine T., who in 1850 was the wife of William E. Green.

"One of the four surviving children was also referred to as William A. Anderson, possibly the same as Armistead named above. It is not stated whether Nathaniel or William Anderson was the father of the three children last named.

"On August 12, 1850, one Elliott C. Roane, Administrator for Sally Anderson, applied in Caroline County, Virginia, in behalf of the above-named surviving children, all then living, for the pension due their mother, Sally Anderson, on account of the service of her former husband, Nathaniel Anderson, in the Revolutionary War. The claim was allowed.

"In 1785, Nathaniel Anderson's brother, John Anderson, was living near Hanover Town, in Hanover County, Virginia. In the same year, the following brothers of Nathaniel Anderson's wife, Sally, were living in the same place: Merriwether Jones, Jekyl Jones and Skelton Jones. One William Clough Anderson, a relative, moved from there to Kentucky, his exact relationship not stated.

"In 1783, Lieutenant Colonel Richard C. Anderson testified at Richmond, Virginia, in behalf of the soldier, Nathaniel Anderson, and in 1787 he held the office of Surveyor General for the Continental Line, in the Western County, his relationship to the soldier not given.

"The following family data also appear in the claim, but the relationship to the family was not stated: "Sarah J. Anderson was born 19th of July, 1790, and died 21st of July, 1839."

"In 1799, the name of Bathurst Jones was recorded in the County Court records of Caroline

Thus his mother, who died in 1804, was named Elizabeth Mills, as (wz) William Anderson could not have been referring to Mary Elizabeth Parkes who died in 1791.

The wills of (w) David Anderson and his wife Elizabeth Mills lead me to believe that (wu) Ann Anderson was the dau. of Elizabeth Mills. Possibly "The Minor Family of Virginia" is in error in giving Mary Elizabeth Parkes as the mother of Ann Anderson, b. 1751, who m. (dv48) Dabney Minor.

(wu315) Minor Meriwether, b. 1827, states in The Meriwethers and The Minors, "Dabney Minor married Ann Anderson, of Hanover Co., aunt of Col. Nat. Anderson of Memphis, and sister of Wm. In the name of God Amen, I David Anderson of the County of Albemarle, being of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to the Almighty God for the same and calling to mind the uncertainty of this transitory Life do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following:

Imprimis, I commend my Soul to God who gave it hoping through the death and merits of Jesus Christ, my Saviour to be made partaker of the never fading Joys of immortality at the day of Resurrection & as to what temporal estate it hath pleased God to bestow upon me, I give and bequeath the same, in manner & form following: That is to say I give and bequeath unto my son William Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever four slaves viz: Will, Lucy, Massie and Jack or the survivors of them, with all the increase of the said four slaves, from the day he had possession of them. Item I give and bequeath unto my son Nathaniel Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever four slaves, viz: Coy, Frances, Ned and Dinah or the survivors of them, with all the increase of the said four slaves from the day he had possession of them except Daphney, Daughter of the said Frances. Item, I do give and bequeath unto my son David Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever, four slaves viz: Sal, Bess, Amy and John or the survivors of them with all the increase of the said four slaves from the day he had possession of them, I also give and bequeath unto my said son David Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever all that tract of land and plantation, containing by estimation three hundred acres be the same more or less, situate in Hanover County, which I purchased of Benjamin Hart. Item Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Richard Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever, four slaves viz: Jupiter, Easter. Hannah and Sawney, or the survivors of them with all the increase of the said four slaves from the day he had possession of them, except Easter, Daughter of the said Easter. Item, I give and bequeath unto my two grand daughters, Mary Johnson Anderson and Elizabeth Anderson & to their heirs and assigns forever, four slaves viz: Harwood, Jesse, Daphney, and Easter or the survivors of them, with all the increase of the said four slaves, from the day my son Mathew Anderson, their father, had possession of them to be equally divided between my two said grand daughters at the death of their said father, reserving to him the use and profits of the said slaves, with their increase during his natural life. I give also and bequeath unto my said son, Mathew Anderson my riding mare. Item, I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Ann Minor to her heirs and assigns forever, four slaves viz: Isaac, Cloe, Lydda and Sam. or the survivors of them with all the increase of the said four slaves from the day she had possession of them. Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever four slaves viz: Gilbert, Moses, Aggy, and Winney with all the future increase of the said slaves. I also give unto my said son Thomas Anderson after the death of his mother my silver watch. Item I give and bequeath unto my grandson, Jack Anderson son of Thomas Anderson, to his heirs & assigns forever all that tract of land containing by estimation four hundred and sixty five acres, more or less, lying & being in Hanover County which said tract of land was coreyed to me at last May Hanover Court. relation thereto being had, will more fully appear provided, Nevertheless that the said tract of land, shall for-

ever be subject to sale by my Executors hereafter named for the payment of any damages that shall lawfully accrue and come against my estate for and on account of my being bound as security for my son the said Thomas Anderson in a bond conditioned for his making a settlement of negroes of his wife, when he should arrive at lawful age, and whenever my son, the said Thomas Anderson shall exonerate my Estate from any lawful claim, or demand whatsoever on account of being security for him as aforesaid, then it is my will and desire that the above specified legacy, to my grandson, Jack Anderson shall remain and stand firm to all intents and purposes, but not otherwise.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Sarah Hudson and to her heirs and assigns forever four slaves viz: Patt and her son Ned, Sawney and Anne or the survivors of them, with all the increase of the said four slaves from the day she had possession of them. Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Edmund Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever, all that part of the tract of land in Hanover County, whereon I formerly lived, which lies on the north side of New foundy River, below the confluence of the said River, and the mill swamp, together with all the land on the north side of the said swamp, up to the mill, containing two hundred and ten acres more or less, I also give and bequeath unto my said son Edmund Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever five slaves, viz: Frank, Roger, Beck and her two children Lydday and Lewis or the survivors of them, with all the increase of the said five slaves from the day he had possession of them. Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Anderson to his heirs and assigns forever, all that part of the tract of land in Hanover County whereon I formerly lived, which lies in the fork of New Found River, with the improvements thereon, together with the tract of land adjoining the same, which I purchased of John Mayo, on both sides the said river, containing in the whole, four hundred and seventy eight acres, more or less, reserving to my wife, Elizabeth Anderson the free use of the said land and improvements during her natural life. I also give and bequeath unto my said Son Samuel Anderson, to his heirs and assigns forever, five slaves viz: Peter, Pompy, Stephen, Abraham and Cate, or the survivors of them, with all the increase of the said five slaves from the day he had possession of them.

Item. It is my will and desire, and accordingly I order it so that my said son Samuel Anderson shall pay to my said son Edmund Anderson, the just sum of Fifty pounds current money within the term of five years from the date hereof as a compensation for the difference in value of their two lots of land, which could not (without inconvenience) be equally divided between them.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Grandson Anderson Barrett and to his heirs and assigns forever, four slaves viz: Hannah, and her two sons by name Charles & Lewis, also Page a lad lately purchased of General Nelsons' Estate now living with Mr. Dabney Minor (and is to be bound apprentice to the said Minor to learn the trade of carpenter) with all the future increase of the said slaves from the day his apprenticeship shall expire with Mr. Minor, provided, nevertheless, that in case my said grand-son, Anderson Barrett should die leaving no lawful issue, then it is my will and desire that the above named slaves with all their future

increase from the time he has possession, shall be equally divided between my two Daughters Ann Minor and Sarah Hudson, and should it so happen that one or both of my said daughters should die before such division, then their future part or parts of such slaves so dying shall be equally divided amongst their own children that may be living at the time of such death.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my wife, Elizabeth Anderson two hundred pounds current money, I also give unto my said wife four slaves viz: Ben, Luckey, Keezzy and her son Landsey with all the future increase of the said slaves, together with all the rest and residue of my estate of whatsoever nature, kind or quality whatever not herein before disposed of which as well money as other estate it is my will and desire may be at her own option to dispose of as she may think proper verbally or otherwise, not dounting she will dispose of the same to such of our children and grand children as in her opinion may be in the greatest need, and such so she may judge to have received the least share of my estate, and lastly I constitute and appoint my wife, Elizabeth Anderson, Executrix and my two sons, David and Samuel Anderson Executors of this my last will and testament. After the foregoing was set up in page form I received in December, 1935, from Miss E. Katherine Anderson, of 409 Whitlock Avenue, Marietta, Georgia, the following which she copied from a manuscript copy, undated, in possession of the Virginia Historical Society, its source unknown. This is apparently a list of the children of David Anderson and Elizabeth Mills as the date of birth of Richard Anderson corresponds with that given by Brock (R-30, IV). The date of birth of Sarah Anderson agrees with that in the Hudson-Gilmer Bible, and the date of birth of Elizabeth Anderson agrees with that given in (W2 1st. IX p. 241):

"In the name of God, Amen, I, ROBERT ANDERSON of the Parish of St. Martin's in the County of Hanover do make and ordain this my last will and testament. I recommend my soul to God, hoping for a joyful resurrection through the merits of Jesus Christ my Lord and Saviour.

"My body I desire may be decently buried at the discretion of my executors. My worldly goods I dispose of in manner and form following to-wit, I give and bequeath to my son Robert Anderson, to him and his heirs forever, a part of a tract of land I purchased from the late Archibald Cary, whereon my son Robert now resides containing about four hundred and ten acres as surveyed by the late Col. George Carrington. I give and bequeath to my sons George Anderson and Samuel Anderson to them and their heirs forever not as joint tenants in common, eight hundred and twenty acres of land a further part of the above mentioned tract, to be equally divided between them having regard to quality as well as quantity, each to take his lot so as to include the plantation and houses whereon they respectively reside. I give and devise to my three daughters Cicelia Anderson, Elizabeth Austin and Mary Tally, one hundred and twenty pounds Virginia currency each. I give and devise to my three grand children Elizabeth Gregory New, Mary Anderson New and Robert Anderson New, the sum of one hundred and twenty pounds Virginia currency, to be equally divided among them or the survivors of them. My will and desire is and I accordingly direct that my sons and daughters, and each of them or their legal representatives render a true, just, and perfect account of every kind of property (Lands excepted) which they have received or may re-

ceive from my estate in my lifetime respectively at the probable value thereat at the time received—and after my just debts and the specific legacies herein devised are paid, the residue of my slaves and personal estate to be divided among my sons Robert Anderson, Matthew Anderson, Richard Clough Anderson, George Anderson and Samuel Anderson, and my daughters Cecelia Anderson, Elizabeth Austin, Mary Talley, and my three Grand children, Elizabeth Gregory New, Mary Anderson New, and Robert Anderson New (my said three grandchildren to be considered as one Legatee). It is my desire that a negro boy, Tom (son of Lyddia now in possession of my son-in-law Anthony New) be included in that part of my estate which shall be allotted to my grandson Robert Anderson New.

"It is further my will and desire that my Executors or the survivor of them may sell the negroes or any part of them (which my son-in-law Anthony New hath received from my estate) with their increase they being each and every of them for my grandchildren, Elizabeth Gregory New, Mary Anderson New, and Robert Anderson New, and also the negroes or any part of them which may on a future division fall to my said Grandchildren, and lay out the money from such sales in other negroes or in any other manner which they or the survivor of them may judge most advantageous for my said Grandchildren or if my Executors or either of them should think proper (in my life time) to make sale of or any other way change the property already allotted to my said Grandchildren and which hath been received by my son-in-law Anthony New for the benefit of my said children, such sale or change shall be good to all intents and purposes. It is my desire that my estate should not be appraised unless it should be thought necessary by my Executors. And lastly I do appoint and ordain my sons Matthew Anderson and Samuel Anderson Executors to this my last will and testament hereby revoking all other Wills by me heretofore

made. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this day of May in the Year of Our Lord One thousand seven hundred and ninety one.







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or men reached the top promptly. Among the first was Maj. Anderson. Scarcely had he reached the top when a Captain Towles lunged at him with his sword, and struck him in the shoulder. He was forced over the edge of the parapet, striking bottom with such force that he was ruptured. His servant carried him back to camp. On the way they passed Count Pulaski, who was mortally wounded, and on seeing his old friend and messmate, gave him his sword, which remained a valued relic until destroyed in a fire in Dayton in the '60.

"Gen. Lincoln retreated to Charlestown surrendering May 21, 1780. Maj. Anderson was not yet out of the hospital at Fort Moultrie, when taken prisoner. On exchange of prisoners, he was ordered north and promoted to Lt.

Col. of the 3rd Reg. C.L. and detailed as special Aide de Camp to Gen. LaFayette. When Cornwallis was finally cooped up in Yorktown, Col. Anderson was ordered to report to Gov. Dinwiddie as Chief of Staff in connection with the assembled Virginia Militia, and so served till the surrender, when he joined his regiment and continued therewith until the general muster out in the fall of 1783.


"The Colony of Virginia had made grants of land to the officers and men of the line in lieu of monetary payment. Script had been given to the troops on their muster out. To give the script value, it was necessary that the allotment of land be surveyed and segregated. The members of the Society of the Cincinnati selected Col. Anderson, one of their members, for this purpose and a contract was signed Dec. 17, 1783. He came to Kentucky with his fortune, three slaves, and his household effects, on seven pack horses. He built himself a log house at a spring, on the headwaters of Bear Grass Creek. This place he named Soldiers' Retreat.

"The rupture he received at Spring Hill Redoubt, rendered it impossible for him to do any but the lightest field work. He, therefore, appointed a number of young men his assistants. Among them were John Cleves Symmes, Nathaniel Massie, Duncan McArthur, Maj. John O'Bannion, Lucas Sullivant, James Taylor and Arthur Fox.

"In 1795 he rebuilt his house of stone and also built the first schooner to sail the Ohio. It was named the "Caroline," was said to have been about 450 tons, and made one successful voyage to London and return, and back to London again, but on her return was wrecked somewhere in the West Indies.

"In 1826 the rupture sustained at the attack on Savannah became strangulated and inflamed, and no surgeon being near, caused his death."







I, Samuel Anderson of the County of Cumberland in the sixty ninth year of my age being in good health, and of sound mind, do make this my last will and testament, without calling upon any person or persons to witness the same, knowing that my handwriting is well known. I desire that I may be decently buried without pomp or ostentation, that all my just debts be paid as soon as possible by my Executors hereafter named. I have already given and delivered to my daughters Ann Langhorne, Elizabeth Thornton and Judith C. Trent (now deceased) five negro slaves each, and some little stock, furniture &c., each of which lots considered by me of equal value, in addition to the above slaves, whose names I consider unnecessary to mention, I lent to me daughters Langhorne and Thornton (a considerable time ago) three negroes to be returned to my estate with their children or their legal representatives, with an understanding, if said slaves so lent should not be called for in my lifetime, and that if it will not exceed their and each of their equal proportional parts upon a general division of my estate, that the negroes so lent to them be allotted to them, that is to say a boy, the name of Jerry and a girl by the name of Lavina to my daughter Langhorne and a girl by the name of Rady to my daughter Thornton being the same negro slaves lent as aforesaid to my said two oldest daughters.

To my son Benjamin Dabney Anderson I have already given a negro boy by the name of Wilson, and lent him three other negro slaves, to-wit, Sam, Charity and Rebeca and advanced for him considerable sums of money amounting perhaps to more than I shall be able to do for any of the rest of my children, but notwithstanding which I now confirm to him the loan of the negroes aforesaid, that is to say I lend them to him my said son Benjamin Dabney Anderson for the mutual use benefit and profit of himself wife and children for and during the lives of my said son and wife, and after their death I gave said slaves so lent, to their children to be equally divided between them meaning the said slaves and their increase to them and their heirs forever. I also lend to my said son Benjamin Dabney Anderson after the death of my wife, one third of the tract of land on which I now live containing six hundred and fifty acres that is to say Four hundred and ten acres of the same I own by devise from my deceased father

and two hundred and forty acres of the same under a patent bearing date the twentieth of October one thousand eight hundred and fifteen which may be found in my disk, the whole of this tract of land by estimation contains seven hundred acres, including the patent land aforesaid. The four hundred and ten acres aforesaid (devised to me as aforesaid) has never been separated by survey from the whole tract of seven hundred acres aforesaid, so about fifty acres of the same still belongs to the estate of my deceased Father unless indeed, the circumstances, I think I am in duty bound to mention, may alter the case, my Father did a number of years ago inform me, but my brother Robert Anderson, had complained to him, that his land, being a part of the original tract owned by my Father containing about Fifteen Hundred acres, did not hold out by survey the Four hundred and ten acres, the quantity intended to be conveyed to him by deed, and desired me to have the deficiency, if any laid off to him in some place adjoining his tract with as little injury to the balance as possible, this subject I mentioned to my brother, but we not agreeing to the best of my recollection on the place of laying laying off the same, he had a line run laying off Thirty six acres, the supposed deficiency, which my a late survey of his tract of land proved to be a few acres more than the real deficiency, and the Tjirty six acres aforesaid, charged to him, by the commissioner of this County (Cumberland) but he having never paid any tax for the same, it was advertised to be sold for its taxes, hearing or seeing the advertisement I had the tax on the land charged to me, paid the arrears, and have paid all the taxes on the same ever since; my own impression and wish is, that the representatives of my deceased brother benefit of the have the deficiency aforesaid for which reason, and because it may be some guide to my executors hereafter named, I have stated the circumstances aforesaid. To my son Samuel Q.Anderson, I give the other two thirds of the tract of land on which I live containing the quantity before specified including my interest or rather two thirds $\frac{2}{3}$ of my interest in the undisposed of part of said tract by my Father supposed to be about Fifty acres (that is to say after the death of his mother) including the dwelling house and outhouses immediately adjacent thereto, which is ment to contain the corn house, barn and quarters within the barn lot, as well as the houses still nearer the dwelling house; but in my case my said son Samuel Q. should die without issue lawfully begotten of his body, then I gave the same to my son Benj.D. under the same regulations; restrictions and dispositions, as heretofore observed in the disposition of the one third of same tract of land, but in case my said son Samuel D. should die leaving issue of his body then and in that case, I give to him the said tract of land to him and his heirs forever. To my daughter Sarah S.Anderson I gave the following negro slaves,to-wit: William, Henry, Tom, Polly, Eima and Robin a child of Polly,also a decent Pony,saddle and bridle to her and her heirs and after the death of her mother I give to her and her heirs forever,all the furniture,belonging or generally kept in the room generally called the new room, and also the bureau now in the chamber,to her and her heirs forever. To my beloved and best of wives I give the whole of my property,including land and every description of property whatever not heretofore disposed,for and during her natural life,to be disposed of in her life in any way she may think proper, and if she should not dispose of the same, and whatevr part she may not dispose,at her death,I direct should be equally divided between all my children that may then be alive or their legal representative,except my son,my eldest and beloved son Dabney, nor is he here left for any other reason,than verily beleiving I should not do by other children common justice in making him sharrer in this little surplus. And shoud my grandson William C.Trent die before he arrives to the age of twenty one,neither he or his Fatheras representative of my deveased daughter J.C.Trent are to partake of any part of my estate contained in this residuary clause of my last will and testament, but the same to be equally divided among my other living children or their legal representatives, to them and their heirs forever. 

THE BARTOW FAMILY

The Bartows (A2 p. 167) descended from Gen. Bertaut, who fled from France to Holland after the St. Bartholomew Massacre in 1572, and later went to Crediton, Devonshire, Eng., and Anglicized name to Bartow. THE CRAWFORD FAMILY

Crawford Family Records (C4) by Wm. M. Clemens shows: "Alexander and Patrick Crawford, brothers, were among the earliest settlers in Augusta Co., Va. Patrick lived on the farm lying on the Middle River, owned in 1914 by his descendant John H. Crawford. His wife was Sally Wilson. His Will was proved Dec. 18, 1787.

"His oldest child, Elizabeth, m. Alex Robinson.

"The next dau., Margaret (Peggy), was 1st w. of her cousin, John Crawford, of North Mountain. Sarah m. Robert Crawford. Martha, b. May 10, 1761, was 2d. w. of Col. Andrew Anderson. Mary (Polly), the youngest dau., m. James Crawford, d. 1798."

Col. Andrew Anderson was the son of John and Jean Anderson of Augusta Co., Va. (G4).

Ann Crawford m. Nelson Anderson, 1799, in Amherst Co.

The relationship with the Crawford family to which (v6c) Gov. Charles Anderson refers (R-76) may be through Ann Anderson (dau. of John Anderson and Sarah Waddy), who m. David Crawford.

(Cw18226x4) Mrs. W. B. Ardery informs me that in the Bourne Collection of Manuscripts, filed at Frankfort, Ky., in Historical Library, the record of John Anderson, son Robt. and Mary (Overton) Anderson, is given as married to a dau. of Samuel Waddy. This seems incorrect as Sarah Anderson, widow of John Anderson, late of Parish of St. Paul, Hanover Co., gen'l. decd. and John Anderson of same parish and Co., planter conveyed to John Thomson, 80 acres being land Samuel Waddy had conveyed 28 Jan. 1696 to John Anderson and Sarah, his wife, and the heir of her body, which heir the said John Anderson, party of these *present* 7 Aug. 1735 (V4 VII p. 67). I do not believe

John, son of Robert Anderson and Mary Overton, could have been married in 1696. His brother, Robert Anderson III, was born in 1712 (see Wm. Marshall Anderson Bible Record), and Robert Anderson II died 1716, aged about 53 (A5 p. 6). Of course, the age of Robert Anderson II at the time of death is uncertain, but it seems more likely that John Anderson who married Sarah Waddy was the brother and not the son of Robert Anderson II, provided there is a relationship.

C—DAVID CRAWFORD (C4; V7 I p. 465; C9 p. 373)

b. ca. 1625, was brought about 1643 to Jamestown, Va., by his father, John, who was born in Aryshire, Scotland, in 1600, and was killed in 1676 in one of the fights during Bacon's Rebellion.

They settled for a time in St. Peter (afterwards St. Paul's) Parish, in New Kent. David m. in James City Co., Va., 1649, and had issue: (V7 I p. 465, V4 IV p. 107 and [wqx531]) Cz—Elizabeth, b. 1650, m. Nicholas Meriwether (R-1); Cy—dau., m. Lewis, moved south; Cx—Angelina, m. THE DABNEY FAMILY

I am indebted to (T.W.) Mr. Trist Wood, of New Orleans, and (DWX652V) Dr. William M. Dabney, of Ruxton, Md., for information of the early Virginia Dabneys and they do not entirely agree.

W. M. D. thinks Cornelius was the sole Virginia progenitor of the Dabney family, while T. W. gives a tradition that he had a brother John¹, who married Susannah Jennings, and had a son John² Dabney, b. in England ca. 1665, d. 1699, emigrated to Va., m. Sarah Jennings, who afterward m. Wm. Winston, in 1701. This John² had a dau. Susannah³ Dabney, b. ca. 1698, m. Francis Strother. Their son William⁴ Strother m. Sarah Bayly (widow of Wm. Pannill). Their dau. Sarah⁵ Dabney Strother m. Col. Rich. Taylor. Col. Richard Taylor served under Washington in the Rev., moved to Ky. soon after Zachary's birth, and was a friend and neighbor of (v6) Richard Clough Anderson, and were the parents of Gen. Zachary⁶ Taylor (E), 12th Pres. of the U.S. In 1808, Zachary was commissioned 1st Lt. 7th U.S. Inf.; Capt. in War 1812, Maj. 1814. For victory over Seminole Indians at Okeechobee, Dec. 25, 1837, he was breveted Brig. Gen. He won the most decisive victory of the Mexican War over Santa Anna, at Buena Vista, which suggested him as a possible Whig candidate for President. Gen. Zachary⁶ Taylor m. Margaret Mackall Smith, and their dau. Ann⁷ Mackall Taylor m. Brig. Gen. Robt. C. Wood, Ass't Surg. Gen. U.S.A. Their son, Col. Robt.⁸ C. Wood, m. Wilhemine Trist, who were the parents of Trist⁹ Wood.

Both agree that d—Cornelius¹ Dabney, b. ca 1640, d. 1693, who first patented lands in Va. in 1664, emigrated to America from England, m. 1st Edith —, and had at least two sons. W. M. D. has seen in the Public Record Office, in London, Eng., a letter dated June 29, 1678, from Cornelius Dabney to Col. Francis Moryson, in which he says his wife Edith presents

her respects to Col. Moryson and would gladly send him one of her boys a year or two later. A family tradition gives d—Cornelius¹ Dabney (GH) (V IV—vestryman 1684-94, St. Peter's Parish Book, New Kent Co., Va.), m. 2d. Susannah and had dw—Cornelius² Dabney, b. ca. 1686, m. Sarah Jennings; dv—Mary² Dabney, b. Jan. 22, 1688, d. Sept. 7, 1748 (GH), m. Capt. Thomas Carr, b. 1679, d. May 29, 1738 (GH), who built "Bear Castle," Caroline Co., Va. (son of Thomas Carr, b. 1655, from Eng. to Va., of Topping Castle, Caroline Co., Va., which was burned Mar. 31, 1896, m. 1676, Mary Garland). After the death of (d) Cornelius Dabney, his widow, Susannah, m. (David?) Anderson.

"February 5, 1724—Susanna Anderson's will, recorded in Hanover, leaves her son, Cornelius Dabney, all her ready money and debts in England and Virginia, and appointing her son, Cornelius Dabney, sole executor of her will. She had three children by her second marriage—one daughter, who married James Trice, and another who married Captain Thomas Carr, and one son, David Anderson." The Dabneys of Virginia. Alice M. Tyler concluded from this that James Trice married Ruth Anderson. (See [wqx].)

T. W. writes me: "The above was sent to the author of 'Dabneys of Virginia,' by Mr. Wm. Winston Dabney, who made various copies and abstracts of Hanover Co. records before they were destroyed.

"Mr. Dabney's papers I understand can't be located.

"The above is in part an abstract and in part an interpretation.

"To change it to an abstract, cut out 'She had three children, etc.' and substitute, 'She names her son-in-law James Trice, and son-in-law Captain Thomas Carr. Also one son, David Anderson.'

THE DABNEY FAMILY

"We don't know exactly what information Mrs. Tyler had and in all probability she had knowledge that her ancestor, James Trice, had wife Ruth. Perhaps the Caroline Co. Records spared us (Order Bks.) show this.

"Naturally Mrs. Tyler concluded from the will in 'Dabneys of Va.' (the sole authority for the will) that Ruth was an Anderson. But the question is open—Was Ruth an Anderson or a Dabney? We know positively that Capt. Carr's wife was a Dabney." See p. 143.

THE ANDERSONS OF PITTSYLVANIA COUNTY

Miss Katharine K. Adams sent me two letters she received from the late Joseph Banister Anderson, and a copy of one from him to Mr. Homer Eiler, of Topeka, Kan. In the letter J. B. Anderson states:

"I have been collecting genealogical data of the ANDERSON-Claxton-Wentworth-Terry families for a number of years. Just before your letter of 24 Aug. came to hand, I had written to the clerks of a number of E. Va. counties asking them to examine the indices of the record books in their offices from 1634-1880 for wills, deeds, marriages &c of the Anderson family. The earlier records of Gloucester, New Kent, Isle of Wight, Hanover, were destroyed by fire during the Civil War, I was informed. Two deeds from Cumberland Co. were of no value to me. The clerk of Amelia Co. gave me the name of the 2d. wife of my g.g. father RICHARD ANDERSON—JANE FOSTER.

"I have the records, written by their own hands, of my father, Joseph Eggleston Anderson and my gr. father, Thomas Anderson, and of my g.gr. father, Richard Anderson. I am enclosing a list of names copied from their records. I hope it will be of service to you in collecting data for your branch of the family.

Dear father Louisville Feb 4- 1814

For some time past I have seriously contemplated a change of my residence for one in the Country. Indeed my first wish to settle in town resulted entirely from its supposed convenience with regard to my business: My feelings have ever desired the peacefulness of the country - I have of late determined to leave town provided I could procure a seat which pleased me. In putting the plan into execution I should be governed by my future feeling as to my professional pursuit whether I should continue the practice without interruption or retire for a few years from it and return to it in the Superior Courts. This plan I have occasionally thought of but have never matured it and should be influenced in my course by duty weighing the relative pleasure of agriculture and the bar - The indisposition which I have at intervals for several months, had, though not serious (I believe) but yet troublesome and vexatious, has not a little contributed to influence my wishes, the last reason I hoped however will be of but temporary existence. Some few years ago, you made to me the offer of Hollis

place provided I deemed it eligible seat for my habitation: at that time I supposed the town a more proper situation for residence, but I would now very gladly make it the seat of permanent abode if you have not since made any arrangement which would be broken by it - My own opinion always has been that if it could be enlarged by the purchase of some adjoining land on the East (I believe it belongs to Lawrence) it would be one of the most desirable seats I ever saw. In its cultivation I should delight

If you have made any arrangement inconsistent with this you know me too well to suppose I could wish it violated - I am aware of the incumbrance of the tenant and If I could indulge my feelings entirely I should wish to retire to the Country immediately but I apprehend I could not conveniently arrange my business so as to leave town finally much before that incumbrance would expire. This idea of removal I have not mentioned, as it may never happen and if it should agreeably to my wishes I should not make it known before the period arrived, it might have effect on my situation in town - Betsy is well and I am doing my business

My dear Father Bogota October 8th 1824

Ten days ago that is by the last mail from Cartagena I received your letter sent by Lang. By the same mail I received a letter from Lang, in which he informed me of his arrival at that place after extraordinary and most vexatious delays, both on his passage and at Jamaica. However no doubt he has informed you of all the incidents of his voyage. From his letter to me I expect to see him in a few days and I intend to keep this letter open until the morning when the mail again arrives and I shall hear from him or the consul on what day he left Cartagena.

I am happy to hear from your letter and that of Mr. Grahame of the 4th July that you and your family are well. The season has now arrived to make us very anxious to hear how our friends in Louisville and its neighbourhood passed through the fall months. My family is

Tolerably well. Arthur very frequently complains of a head ache, which sometimes makes us uneasy, but he is now running about Elizabeth & Ann are well. A disease of the bowels is a very common complaint in this country, particularly with all who have to pass through the hot lands of the Sea coast. However I have seen nothing to make me believe that this is a sickly country. The indisposition of my family was such as might have occurred any where, with the exception of Ferdinand Bullitt's case, that I believe was produced by the tropical sun and an unsound liver.

We have no important news here. We have been for some time in anxious expectation of hearing something interesting from Bolivar & the Piaromas. The last news gave an account of a successful engagement between two detachments of the armies and of the retreat of Cantuac the Royalist General. In the Republic of Colombia every thing is as tranquil as in the U. States and more so than in Kentucky when the relief laws are under discussion.

Now even in many things, the people here are a long way behind those in the U. States. Another generation will probably be necessary before they can come to the full enjoyment of all the blessings of a free government - Lang will be able to give you a better account of it than I can write. However every body who comes here stays a short time, having seen but little more than the bad roads & bad accommodations goes away with a bad account - We shall of course detain Lang with us as long as possible however he cannot remain long, as I shall wish him to be in Washington in the month of January. - Betsy and the children send their love to you. My Mother, Cecilia, Louisa and all the children Arthur very often dreams about being at his grand father's.

May 20 1833

Dear Louisa
Since the reception of your letter of the 25th April, we have had cases of the Cholera at St. Louis and the vicinity, during its progress. I did not writing, hoping that I might write when all were well. But, as there are yet some staggering cases, and it is uncertain when it may be expected that we can say we are entirely exempt from it. I shall wait no longer. I have lost one workman at my Post, and though many others have been and some are now sick, I hope we shall soon be well - Since I wrote you Mrs. Cox lost her only child a fine boy, with the hooping cough - She has been quite ill, but is now slowly convalescing. The rest of our friends are well. Ann Bullitt was confined last week to her bed, but is now well - Some weeks since I had cherished a hope, that Mother and yourself would have come on with Mr. Latham and Anna to visit me, but saw the appearance of the Cholera. I have not thought that you would come - A long and tedious summer will be gone to me - as I expect to be alone, in a large comfortable house until October when my Compty Office will commence with his family.

Do you ever hear from Lang or Milliken? If so, you are more favored than I am. He has not written since I saw him in Ky. Lang I think only one short note I hear occasionally from my strangers from our friends in Louisville, and sometimes from letters to Mrs. Atherton - They are all well at my last accounts Charles the best correspondent I have in the family. He writes more frequently and sociably than the others. Lang is entering a career of Politics. To this it appears

Dear Brother

Your letter in reply to mine of February 15th was received a few days since and my regret could only equal my surprise at finding the circumstances I believed so consolatory only increasing the sorrow it was designed to soften. You do me justice in believing my heart had no share in the error of my judgement if such you consider it which induced me to repeat to you the last testimony of your deceased parent to your sister. Yet even to this I will not plead guilty but must believe your self reprobates could only have arisen from your analysis to detract from your own merits; or if your high principled mind and affectionate heart will not admit that any merit can be attached to the dictates of filial affection yet permit me to say you have not justly estimated your scrupulous performance of the most sacred of duties.

In mentioning the receipt of your last letter to your father you will excuse my attempting any comment on its contents whatever emotion it was calculated to excite. Surprise was to me certainly not of the number long has thy heart been known to me and the love which so well displayed I only told me that heaven had conferred on thee the means of indulging its generous propensities.

could the expression of gratitude add any thing to the pleasure of having merited it not for your generosity to myself would my thanks be most warmly rendered but for that which has secured to a brother whom misfortune has only given another claim on my tenderness an independence which a cruel accident has denied him the power of attaining But still more for that which has relieved from the anxiety annexed to the happiness of beings the beloved being who holds the first place in my heart And now my Brother could the powers of language express so animated an encomium as the loss that rolled down the cheek of your venerable father while he listened to the words of his son Never but once while he bent for the last time over the lifeless form of the object of his youthful love and the faithful friend of his age. have I seen him so deeply affected. Your proscript perhaps gave the most unmixed pleasure of any part of your letter and the promises it contained in certainly the one of which we shall most sensibly feel the disappointment

Your scheme for relieving my domestic embarrassments communicated in your last letter is characteristically generous but not exactly adapted to the inconvenience it is designed to remedy. It is not a law to govern but a master to govern me my Dear Nicholas that is wanting that I am peculiarly unqualified for

Newark April 31st 1814

The circumstance of Brother Jabez having deferred his return for a longer time than was expected has compelled me to beg your attention by repeating a request contained in my last letter, with which hourly experience more strongly demonstrates the necessity of a compliance. You well know I gather to the removal of Archibald's children to another residence that I esteem this essential to the tranquility of my own existence I will not deny but it is no less true that the solicitude with which I press it is occasioned by a stronger interest than concern for my personal convenience could ever inspire his approach to the time that fate has decreed the period of human life, his sufferings by frequent illness, too plainly tell me that with my father exists the last tie that attaches me to their welfare will soon be broken. No sophistical arguments are necessary to prove that the anxious cares attendant on the charge intrusted to him are incompatible with the care required by our father age and infirmities his wish to decline it has been suppressed from the consideration that it was conferred on him as a favor; but however meritorious the intention may have been, it is certain its

effect has been far different considered in a pecuniary point of view it is a fact that after two years hard labour and much expense of patience, he is no richer than at the commencement of that period. So Jabez I presume is committed the sole power of disposing of the children of his Brother - Archibald has not written to my father but once since their arrival he appears to be as negligent of his children as he has been many years of his parent Attention to their welfare impiously demands they should be subjected to an austerity more severe than that which the mild disposition of my father has ever enabled him to exercise. In respect to the daughter I would wish to resign to the master of a boarding school the responsibility of endowing her with those personal and mental accomplishments which nature never destined her to possess. If the young men are designed for either of the learned professeions the Bloomfield Academy is considered much superior to that of Newark many an seat is it from this place by their parents; the accommodations are also less expensive & should they continue in Newark Thomas Brown would receive them as boarders and from the excellency of his moral character I know of no one more unexceptionable as a guardian of youth.

That I should have preferred requesting your influence to using my own in this affair may excite some surprise were my confidence in his affection what it once was I should have certainly applied directly to my brother, but his declaration that I had profited his esteem, and that my welfare or misfortunes even to him equally indifferent, is still too deeply imprinted on my mind to admit of my addressing him the next lecture equally with that of his former headache must be eternal, and consistently with the respect due to myself from him I can never ask or accept a favor. Once more I repeat there is a necessity for his immediately attending to the subject which I have written; his personal attendance of inconvenient to him I presume will not be indispensable I place implicit reliance on your filial if not your paternal affection in influencing his immediate decision.

The family are in health except my father who has for two days been much indisposed

The painful state of uncertainty in which I have remained for some weeks, my dear Nicholas, respecting the probable accomplishment of my anxious wish to return to you this season has hitherto delayed the acknowledgment of your last affectionate letter. After the arrangement of our Western journey my kind and attentive but a hensical Brother thought it would be more pleasing to me to spend the Winter in Carolina return to N. J. in the Spring, and from thence proceed to Ohio. He insisted my opposing my resolution to see you to the novel and agreeable town he preferred, and offered a delay of a few months the world be of no consequence to my deliberation that of the unknown how of months could be indifferent to me. I should care little for seeing you at a later period he replied that of I were really so romantic and irrational he thought it would be necessary to separate me from you who was much more likely to encourage my silly whims than to correct them. — So the expression of his will I am not accustomed to offer a positive denial although powers of persuasion were however exerted but at the friend who had gratified me by according to my wishes and every preparation arrangement was completed for commencing our journey the present week, an accident equally disastrous in its cause and effect has intervened to obstruct my wishes.

Last Monday brother John walked out to hunt at an early hour came in with wet fat dried there was a heavy and strange as it appears must have been one of these considerably and the other slightly and less heavily unconscious of it he did not notice it till Sunday Evening when on examining it found the tail and part of the rest of his

right foot much blistered with every appearance of being occasioned by fire however affirmed this was impossible and refused to have the proper planchette applied on Wednesday regardless of my insistence that he would keep her foot still he insisted on attending me to Dr. Hall's Examination and on returning from Elizabeth Town in the evening his foot and limb appeared much inflamed. I applied a poultice for reducing the inflammation but as it appeared to you worse the better on Saturday he slept not he proceeded to New York and consulted Doctor Horack who gave a prescription but no hope of rapid recovery and recommended his remaining in the City for some days for the benefit of his constant attendance. He returned to Newark however the same evening since that friend tell the present morning Monday I have regularly applied the prescription but as I feared with so little benefit that I have again sent him to New York he will either return this evening or should his physician deem his stay requisite until by this evening. Friend and you will readily concur with a host country I cannot intelligently. I can scarcely hope the dear fallen — unless a tedious protracted painful confinement of at least some weeks. At how I had a little for the journey which is to restore me to you must be employed in attempting to alleviate the sufferings of one whose hours of health have often been devoted to my pleasure and I much fear my journey will be delayed till the succeeding spring.

Till a delay in which calamity has no share, diminish the time wist you expect for my return? No my dearest friend, to my dying present and regret so painful an apprehension is not related not till my own heart aches edges that gratified and affection to you is not the most ardent feeling w. H. I doubt the full happiness of a life

ing so often to the pines of my sorrows as you whom and confidence. To myself every hour since our separation has more firmly convinced me I cannot be distant from you that your uniformly kind and affectionate care has become indispensable to my happiness and should I be fortunate enough now to meet you of my estimation alone to conceal as no power will ever again separate us but the boundaries of the grave.

The same reasons which has delayed my acknowledging yours have also prevented my answering these kind and welcome letters I hope to write to her in a few days as of the first favorable change which affords hope of our Brother's recovery I shall write earliest intelligible

I have the modesty to share in the attachment you express of the childrens wishes for my return they are probably caused rather by their forgetfulness of me than their remonstrance. I am more astonished at discovering I am very anxious to see them and am not a little angry at having given some silly proofs that I have not forgotten them since leaving them — My tragic remembrance over their maternal propensity to repeat the silly sayings of her old & less have more than once been repelled by her remonstrance of the import inattention with which I have often or told the numerous exploits of my Brody. Sophia commented on the marvellous severity of my early father's discipline in the discovery she made of his real father in the power of grape juice & the pride and pleasure I had derived in the early proficiency she made in the former accomplishment of sweeping.

In my valued friend O. L. Symmes present at your place of residence of my sorrow for his late illness, and pleasure at his convalescence — It is extremely satisfactory to me that by his new leave with you he enjoyed the benefit of your skillful and affectionate care — Little however has not in the slightest degree diminished my solicitude for him and my respect has increased since, not

from what I have heard but from what I have not heard I infer he is even weaker than when we part.

Newark June 5th 1815

I have addressed you my beloved Brother in a moment of greater gaiety but never with more calm composure than at present yet it is my task to announce to you the death of our only remaining parent scarcely would it be a painful one could I impart to you the peaceful tranquility that reigns in my own bosom this could not fail to be had you like me intrusted the closing scenes of our beloved father. We have nothing to regret for him and consequently not for ourselves. As long till life had ceased to be a blessing, he met death with the calm fortitude the fervent hope which the belief he was uniting in a happier existence inspired. For 6 painful months I mourned that life for him had lost its charms. For 6 days I was agonized in witnessing the struggles of his strong constitution against an incurable disease - those pangs are over; and I suffer no longer. he rests in peace. and I am at peace also. The death tho' not as we expected has been a sudden event. My last letter informed you of his declining health and of the hopes which arose from the return of spring. those hopes were vain his weakness rapidly increased until life

on the Saturday preceding his death he rode 3 miles with Brother July On Sunday he was for the first time confined to his room. On Monday he told me he felt he must soon leave me, that believing he was going to a better world his only regret on leaving this was his separation from me I made an effort to support my feelings, and while I pressed him to my heart assured him of my confidence that my fond attachments could not sustain him the earthly death would attest that I was not so selfish as to wish to retain him in his present state and my only wish was to see with him - It may not be... hazardous and dearly as I love you I do not wish for you to trust life has many pleasures for myself I have lived to a good old age, have enjoyed many blessings, and die in the hope of meeting you in a better world "but he added. I may properly recollect ardently as we hope what we desire. I felt this could not be, and the bitterness of disappointment hope was not added to his life. His corporal weakness rapidly increased, but the hope which supported him received additional strength, and at about 6 P.M. on Friday morning June 2^d he ceased to breathe returning to the last the hope of his mental faculties for ever when bereft of the power of utterance his proper countenance spoke

every emotion. On Saturday his remains were interred with every respect, the tears of all who knew him offering his most unequivocal eulogium - Thus have I lost the being on earth who loved me the most tenderly; yet could I recall him in the bloom of youth and health, not for a selfish gratification would I merit the power of death as in life I love him better than myself, and his happiness is dearer to me than my own yet has the residence which a while he shared it with me was incomparably dear to me which no temptation would have induced me to leave become a lonely solitudo I should bear it without regret, without the wish of returning; since I shall never more be expected with impatient tenderness, and welcomed with cheerful affection. As I implored the last gift of affection or the bane of my dying father it is true I recollect many expressions I could have given words to recall yet he remembered them not and I have the mournful pleasure of knowing that the idolizing preference he felt for me my birth was felt even in his dying hour every exertion which filial affection could make was made by our brother for the restoration of our father the most eminent physicians in New York were consulted by him, and no gratification spared which could soothe the pains no art could cure; and every affectionate attention

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which could alleviate my distress he has extended to myself For this, dear and excellent brother you have indeed been denied the painful satisfaction of witnessing the last agonies of your paternal friend; yet yours has been the blessed task of giving ease and competence to his age of being equally the object of his pride and affection. "If not in this we shall meet in another life" were the words of our departed father when he pressed your hand for the last time may this hope console you in life and be realized in eternity. C.L

THE OVERTON FAMILY

The will of Anne Waters, of the Parish of St. Sepulchre's, London, Widow, "being very aged," dated September 29, 1697, was proved July 4, 1700, at London, by Thomas Water(s).

In the name of God Amen I Ann Waters of the Parish of St. Sepulchres London Widow being very aged and weake in Body but of sound and disposeing minde and memory . . . doe make and declare these presents for and as my last Will and Testament in manner following . . . my Body to be decently Interred at the discretion of my Executor hereafter named. As to the disposition of my worldly Estate . . . I give and dispose thereof as followeth vizi. Imprimis I give unto my sonne John Waters who for divers yeares past hath been gone to Virginia ffive shillings and noe more. Item I give unto my sonne Samuel Waters and Margarett his wife tenn shillings a peece. Item I give unto my daughter Elizabeth Overton now in Virginia the summe of tenn shillings. And to my sonne in Law William Overton her husband alsoe tenn shillings. Item I give unto my sonne in Lawe Mr. William Goodwin ten shillings for a ring. The rest and residue of all and singular my ready money bonds bills goods chattels debts and Estate whatsoever not herein before bequeathed after my due debts and ffuneral is paid and discharged I wholly give and bequeath unto my loveing sonne Thomas Waters. To his owne proper use and benefitt hee haveing allwaires wrought and laboured with me in getting the same. And I doe ordaine and appoint him my said sonne Thomas Waters to be the sole Executor of this my Will. And doe hereby revoke all former Wills by me made and does confirme this only to be my last will. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seale the Twenty Ninth day of September

Anno Domini one thousand six hundred ninety seven. And in the ninth year of the raigne of our Soveraigne Lord William the third king over England.—Ann Waters. Signed sealed published and declared by the said Testatrix for and as her last Will in the presence of Edmund Betts, George Pannett
Ste. Mills Scr.

An article on the Overton Family was published in the Richmond Times-Dispatch of Sept. 5, 1915. It gives an account of Maj. Gen. Robert Overton b. ca. 1609, one of Oliver Cromwell's chief officers, taken from the Dictionary of National Biography. Gen. Overton m. 1632 Anne, dau. of Jeremy Gardiner of Stratford Bow, Middlesex, England. This Article states that William Overton, b. Dec. 3, 1638, the first of the name in Virginia, was the son of Gen. Robert Overton, but this seems to be a surmise and further proof is needed before accepting it as fact.

The will of Mrs. Barbara (Overton) Winston (dated Oct. 6, 1764) bequeathes to her son John Winston a book called *Josephus* which contained records of the birth of Wm. Overton and Mary Waters and their children, and the children of their daughter Barbara's son John Winston.

Two excerpts from this book were made in 1821, one by a Mrs. L. Payne and one by Dr. W. S. Pryor. These agree except that William Overton's birth is given as Dec. 3d, 1638, in one, and 1628 in the other, and Barbara Overton's husband is given as James Winston in one and John Winston in the other. (See V1 XI p. 307, V IV p. 2379; W4 p. 27 to 29, 71.)

Record from the Book JOSEPHUS

"In the Winston Manuscript Genealogy, by Isaac Winston, of Washington, D. C., now in

the Virginia Historical Society, Richmond, is found the ***data ***stated to have been derived from an account compiled from the book called *Josephus* in August, 1821.

Issue of James Winston and Barbara Overton: John Winston, born June 9, 1724, married Feb. 3, 1746. Issue of John Winston: William Overton Winston, born Nov. 6, 1747; Mary Todd Winston, born Nov. 30, 1750; James Winston, born Mar. 12, 1753; Molly Winston, born Mar. 28, 1755; John Winston, born Oct. 14, 1757; Elizabeth Winston, born Jan. 1, 1760; Joseph Winston, born Apr. 2, 1763; Martha Winston, born June 21, 1765; Bickerton Winston, born Jan. 28, 1768; Alsey Ann Winston, born Aug. 8, 1769."

The following is a copy of the Record in the book *Josephus* taken by Judge W. J. Leake from a copy of a copy made by W. S. Pryor in Aug., 1821:

"Wm. Overton, born December 3, 1628, in England; married Mary Waters, November 24, 1670. Emigrated to America.

"Elizabeth, their daughter, born June 28, 1673.

"William Overton, their son, born Augst. 14, 1675.

"Temperance Overton, their daughter, born March 2, 1679.

"Samuel Overton, their son, born Augst. 14, 1685.

"James Overton, their son, born Augst. 14, 1688.

"Barbara Overton, their daughter, born Feby. 5, 1690.

"Barbara Overton married John Winston.

"Barbara Overton Winston died Octo. 30, 1766."

The name Mary is certainly an error as her mother's will gives it as Elizabeth. It is possible, however, that she was christened Elizabeth and called Mary, which may be equally true of her daughter Elizabeth.

b. England, Dec. 3, 1638. (This is generally accepted as the correct date.) Emigrated to Virginia, m. at Yorktown (R2) Nov. 24, 1670, on board the vessel on which she came to this country, Elizabeth Waters (w. Ann Waters) (called Mary in *Josephus*).

"The Virginia land books contain record of a deed for 4,600 acres of land on the south side of Pamunk River on Falling Creek 23d. April, 1681, to William Overton, for transporting ninety-two persons to the colony, including Elizabeth Overton. Another deed to William Overton in 1690 was for additional land in St. Peter's Parish"—(R2. Also see A V p. 776).

(V I p. 71 gives) "Louisa County Records. Elizabeth Bacon, of the Co., of Louisa, Will of., Mentions her nephew William Overton. Gives to her nephew Philip Edloe Bacon. To her cousin Susan P. Farrar. To her nephew Algernon Sidney Bacon. To Dr. Julian Kean and his wife Mary Kean her dear friend. Executor—Dr. Julian Kean. No witnesses. William Overton and Lancelot Minor Jr. take oath that this will is in the hand-writing of the said Elizabeth Bacon whereupon the will is probated, Dr. Julian Kean qualifying as Executor with William Overton security. Aug. 13, 1838, Oct. 6, 1837, W. B. 10, p. 102."

W.M.D. writes me July 1, 1935: "I think the William Overton here referred to, was my

grand mother's half uncle, the son of Capt. John Overton & his second wife Ann Bacon. I remember having been taken as a boy of 10 or 11 to see Uncle William Overton of Prospect Hill, Louisa Co., evidently the above."

Issue: 1—Elizabeth Overton, b. June 28, 1673. Like her mother she may have been called Mary. There is a tradition that she m. Robert Anderson II. (R2 says "no trace"); 2—William Overton, b. "Of the family of Samuel (2) Overton, who married Miss Carr, I have learned but little. In Virginia Land Office there is record of a deed for land on 'south and north forks of Elk Creek, 7 January, 1725, to William Overton, son of Samuel Overton, sometime of New Kent County.' It was Samuel (2) Overton's daughter, Ann Overton, who married John Pettus, grandson of Colonel Thomas Pettus, of "Littleton," who was Councilor of State for Virginia, 1641-1660."

An error somewhere as Samuel Overton, b. 1685, could not have had a g.dau. b. 1702.

R2 gives: "Captain William Harris (died before 1733, according to Hanover County deed), married about 1695, Temperance (2) Overton, daughter of the immigrant, William Overton. She died February 19, 1710, according to her tombstone still in Hanover. Her eldest son was Major Robert Harris, who was born about 1696 and married January 30, 1720, Mourning Glenn. The St. Peter's Parish Register gives: 'Elizabeth, daughter of William Harris, baptized 27th of November, 1698; George, son of William Harris, baptized 13th of April, 1701; John, son of William Harris, baptized 28th of March, 1703.' These were probably children of Temperance Overton, whose mother and sister were named Elizabeth. Benjamin Harris, who died in Louisa in 1765, was, without doubt, another son of Temperance Overton. In both the Hanover and Louisa records he and brother, Robert, in deeding land name 'father William Harris.' And Benjamin, in his will, named brothers, Frederick and Robert, as executors, and bequeathed property to sons Overton, Robert and another not named, and daughter, Nancy. There were probably two others, William and James, of St. Martins, Hanover County, who were sons of Temperance Harris. Pedigrees of this family list the following as children of William and Temperance Harris, namely: John (who married a Miss Clough), Overton (who married Ann Nelson, born 1731), Frederick (who married Eliza, daughter of Richmond Terrell and Nancy Overton), Keziah (who, in 1750, married James Nelson, born 1723), Mary (who, in 1748, married Edward Nelson, Jr., born 1727), Ann (who married William Day), Temperance (who married Samuel Baker). Evidently these were all grandchildren of Temperance (Overton) Harris, who died in 1710. They may have been children of William Harris, Jr., hence the confusion. They were certainly not children of Robert and Benjamin. I hope to solve this problem and to

Dames papers of (wqx57) Roberta Trice Hunter, which referred to Historical Magazine, Vol. IV, page 80. Neither Miss Pendleton or I know what magazine this is. The dates may be wrong as a deed is on record in Louisa Co., D.B.D., 186, 1773, from Richard Anderson and his wife Mary to John Hawkins (V2 p. 353).

The Douglas Register gives under marriage records: "Anderson, Col: Rich: & Catherine Fox, both of Louisa 1780, Ap: 24 p. 19." (Do p. 9—W2 1st XV p. 32) and it gives the dates of baptism of their children Chandy, Susanna, Joseph and Nansy, who are mentioned in the will of Elizabeth Anderson, dated July 7, 1791, as her Grand Children, Children of Richard Anderson. This shows that Richard, husband of Caty Fox and son of Pouncey & Elizabeth Ander-

son was Col. Richard Anderson. While his marriage record to Caty Fox gives him of Louisa and the inventory of his estate was recorded there, the deeds by him & his wife Caty Anderson, sometimes called Katy or Catherine, give their residence as Hanover Co. (V2 p. 354). In the volume of Hanover Records, in the Archive Dept. of the Va. State Library in Richmond, covering the years 1783-1792 on page 529 is a deed recorded 1791 from Richard Anderson and Catharine his wife of Hanover Co., Witnessed by John Woodson Jr., Judith Anderson, Kitty Anderson, Thos. Wash, & Joseph Johnson, and signed by Richd. Anderson and Caty Anderson.

Col. Richard Anderson had daughters Kitty & Judith and son-in-law John Woodson by his 1st marriage. The Kitty Anderson, wits. of this deed may not have been his dau. as she was married when her grandmother made her will in 1791, in which she is named Kitty, not Killy as given in Valentine. Thos. Wash m. Susannah Fox, dau. of John Fox b. 1739 who was the bro. of Caty Fox Anderson (W2 1st. XXVI p. 129).

In the same vol. of Hanover Records, p. 5—25 Apr. 1783 Richard Anderson of Hanover Co. & wife Caty to Wm. Anderson of Louisa Co. 480 a. in St. Martin's Psh. Hanover; p. 343—Nov. 4, 1788 Rich. Anderson & Caty his wife of St. Martin's Psh. Hanover Co., and Edm'd Anderson & John Thomson, Justices of Hanover Co. certified Apr. 1, 1789 that said Caty did relinquish her dower rights; on p. 373—Jan. 6, 1790 Power of Attorney signed by Richard Anderson, was proved by Rich. Anderson Jr. at court Hanover Co. Jan. 7, 1790.

Elizabeth Anderson, in her will, pro. 1794, speaks of my granddaughter Elizabeth Anderson, wife to Matthew Anderson, dau. of her son Richard Anderson. Mrs. J. H. Hiden (See p. 34) has a photostat copy of a marriage bond which reads as follows: "Know all men by these Presents that we Matthew Anderson & John Nelson are held & jointly bound unto our Sovereign Lord King George the third in the sum of Fifty Pounds Court Money, to be paid unto our Sd. Sovereign Lord the King his Heirs and Assigns, To the Payment whereof well & truly to be made we bind ourselves & each of us, (we?) & each of our Heirs, Ass' & Admirs. Jointly & severally ——— by these Presents, sealed with our seal & Dated this Third Day of May 1772. The Condition of this Obligation is such that whereas there is a marriage intended to be solemnized (illegible)
Mattw Anderson & Eliz. Anderson (illegible)
there be no Lawfull cause to obstruct the sd. marriage then the above Obligation to be Void. Or Else to Remain in full force & virtue. Matthew Anderson (Seal)
Sealed & Delivered John Nelson (Seal)
In Presence of (Name of witness is not legible)

Sir; I do hereby certify that I Consent to the Marriage between Matthew Anderson and my daughter Elizabeth Anderson. Given under my hand and seal the 4th day of May 1772. Richard Anderson (Seal)

Thus Elizabeth was the daughter of the first wife Mary Johnson. She named a dau. (wqy) Mary Johnson Anderson, who is named in the will of (w) David Anderson as the dau. of his son Matthew (See p. 32-A).

Miss Pendleton informs me there is recorded in Louisa Co. a deed from Ann Cosby (late Ann Meriwether Johnson, wife of Thomas Johnson) conveying, under date 1756, eight slaves to her gr. daughter, wife of Richard Anderson.



(R2110325) R. C. Ballard Thruston wrote me as follows on Jan. 29, 1935:

"If you will now turn to 'The Conquest of the Northwest Territory and Life of George Rogers Clark,' by Wm. H. English, Vol. I, page 31, you will find a copy of the will of Jonathan Clark, dated April, 1734, probated June of that year. This I quote in my article. He bequeathed to his two sons the property where on 'my mother now lives'; the property whereon 'I now live after the death of my wife'; and the property in Goochland or Albemarle County. His father was evidently dead at the time of making that will—but his mother was still living. Just who she was I have not yet been able to determine with certainty. Mrs. Clopton makes her Elizabeth Lumpkins—Mr. Warner makes her Ann Fisher. I am not certain that either is right. Not long after his death, his wife—whose maiden name was Elizabeth Wilson, a Rogers descendant—married a Mr. Richards—I am not certain what his name was, but I think it was William Bird Richards."

R. C. Ballard Thruston wrote me as follows on Jan. 29, 1935:

"Mrs. Clopton found this Torquil McLeod material at Tappahannock in Essex County, and her telling me of it was the cause of my going there. There I saw the records, first of the Inventory of Torquil McLeod's estate, then the Appraisement—both in 1752, then the next year John Clark's report of the sales, then in 1759 his final reports. There were two of them—one early in the year and the other in November. Then, in searching, Mr. Warner found the John Bates, Jr., will, which locates the wife of John Rogers as Rachel and locates him and his daughter, Ann. Then in my further search I located the originals of all of these papers and had them photostated. The next thing I found was the first entry regarding Torquil McLeod in June or July, 1751, wherein he reports that his white servant has been rambunctious and the man was ordered whipped unless he obeyed. Then late in 1751, Mr. Warner found the deed for 96 acres to Torquil McLeod, the acquisition of which property made him a voter in the election for Burgess in January, 1752. I looked back of that as far as 1741 and found all of the polls of elections, in none of which did Torquid McLeod vote. I am inclined to think, therefore, that his marriage took place in 1750 or 1751. The probabilities

are that he completed the payment for 96 acres of land about the time that he acquired the deed. It was customary then, and I believe even still is customary in rural districts, to buy land under a title bond and make the deed when the payment is complete. In cities we make a partial payment and retain a lien for the unpaid amount.

* * * *

"In my study of the Minute Books I found that John Clark, as Administrator of Torquil McLeod brought suit against some twenty-odd people for amounts due McLeod, showing that he was a man of means and had loaned money to many of his neighbors. These suits were all handled by attorneys and extended over a period of Courts, many of them being continued from time to time.

"I have not gone through very many inventories in that section of the country, but Warner has and he tells me that horses were rare, yet I find that McLeod had a bay horse, a Dunn horse and a yearling. He also had a bridle, a saddle and housing—the housing being what we would today call a saddle blanket. He had a white man servant, four years to serve, and he had some three slaves.

"Each year he* paid Mrs. Richards six pounds for caring for the child. I think it was in the last entry in which he speaks of the child as a girl—in no case did he give the name of the girl.

* * * *

"From John Clark's reports, his mother cared for the McLeod daughter, probably as long as she lived. Just what disposition was made of

that farm, I have not yet found out. They are points that I am asking Mr. Warner to look up for me. I think the probabilities are that Ann McLeod lived with her grandmother until her grandmother died, and then went to live with John Clark and his wife in Caroline County, and I am satisfied that she was living with John Clark when she met William Marshall, Jr., and later married him."

Ann Clark and Torkle McLeod had only one child.

- The Anderson family of Virginia, prominent representatives of which are now scattered throughout the Southern and Western States, deduce from two brothers who emigrated from Scotland and settled in Hanover county, Va., near the close of the seventeenth century. They were:

*A tradition, however, gives the founder of the family in Virginia as Thomas Anderson, of Northumbria, England, who came to America as shipyarder at Gloucester Point in the seventeenth century. A representative of the family settled in St. George county, South Carolina, in 1710, emigrating of his own accord, as follows: "After three weeks lodgings in a tent—a buck logged, holding up the south an acre leaved, and wounded in the breast by a bullet, and a parson—parsoned, ample do."

III. Robert,⁹ here in still standing, "Hockley" Mill, formerly the seat of Colonel John Sydnor, on one side, and the Dabney plantation on the other. The name "Gold Mine" is said to have originated in the early days of the recovery of gold in the vicinity by the early colonists.

IV. Cecilia¹⁰ Anderson occurs as a trustee of the estate of James Hanover, county court, in the records of the Virginia Land Registry Office in 1719. The following received grants between that period and 1743: Iacobus John, Nathaniel James, C. of Ursula, George, Robert, John, Peter, Francis, Henry, Joseph, George, Paulus, William, Francis, Richard, and Elizabeth Anderson. Iacobus Charles Anderson, son of Robert, died 1770.

V. George Clough received a grant of 620 acres of land in King and Queen county June 6, 1669, Book No. 8, p. 194.

VI. Matthew,¹¹ born December 6, 1743, died December 24, 1805; married — Dabney.

VII. William,¹² born April 15, 1744, died July 22, 1772; married — V. Ann, — January 21, 1745; married Colonel Anthony New M. C., etc., and removed to Kentucky.

VIII. Cecilia,¹³ born August 2, 1748, died September 8, 1802; married April 3, 1768, William Anderson, ("Old Field July,") born April 15, 1711, died July 22, 1792.

IX. Richard Clough,¹⁴ born January 12, 1750, died October 16, 1826; married first, January 15, 1783, Elizabeth, sister of General George Rogers Clark;¹⁵ married second, September 17, 1797, Sarah, daughter of William and Ann McLeod Marshall,¹⁶ of Caroline county, Va. In youth he served as a clerk in the store of Patrick Contis, a merchant of Richmond, Va., from whom he received a legacy. Appointed captain of infantry from Hanover county January 26, 1776; assigned to Fifth Virginia regiment, of which — Pescy was first; — Presbury, of Baltimore, Md.; second, May 25, 1787, Jane Tucker, "John Howard, a granddau."

R-69 August 7, 1735, Sarah Anderson, widow of John Anderson, of parish of St. Paul's, Hanover county, and her son John, "plaint or," conveys to John Thompson lands on "Assawgn river."

September 4, 1735, Nelson Anderson, Thomas Anderson, and Stephen Prosser, of Hanover county, Va., are firmly bound to Nicholas Marleber, "gentleman," first Justice, &c.; that Nelson Anderson shall well and truly pay unto Robert Anderson, orphans of David Anderson, all such estates,

&c.

R-71 January 4, 1734, Pauncey Anderson, 186 acres from Nuckells. Nelson Anderson, witness.

R-72 November 2, 1735, Powney Anderson paid £8 to James Overton for improvement to land. Certified by Berthold Anderson, D. C.

R-73 November, 1734, Thomas Anderson, with Charles Anderson, free bond as to Chickahominy bridge.

R-74 September 3, 1738, original lease of Carr to Graves, "delivered" to Garland Anderson, October 7, 1738.

R-77 The records of King William county, Va., present will of Robert Anderson, died 1718, giving estate to his brother David Anderson; and the will of William Anderson, probated 1717, naming wife Dorothy, and children Elizabeth, Susannah, Dorothy, Sarah, Mary, Judith, and Ann. 1724, Dorothy, widow of William Anderson, makes deed of gift of slaves to her infant son William.

†Governor Anderson is quite confident that the name of Ella was Mary Ursula. He names her as the mother of the author of the "History of the State of Virginia." The trustees of Hanover, Tennessee, were of the same family. In the Hanover County, Va., records of 1700, there is a record of a deed from Mary Anderson, relict of Robert Anderson, of East Fauquier parish, Hanover county, conveying land to John Anderson, 100 acres of land on "Temperance Creek." William Anderson, son of Robert Anderson, died 1718, and his will recited his wife was Mary Ursula.

R-78 This is by reference to the Virginia Land Registry that Cecilia⁴⁴ Anderson received a grant of 400 acres of land upon the north side of New River, in what is now West Virginia, and a corner red oak on the same, running up by the mountain to another red oak, No. 1, p. 78.
